



Centre's interlocutor AK Mishra meets Muivah

KOHIMA, April 23 (PTI): The Centre's interlocutor for Naga peace talks, A K Mishra Friday met the principal negotiator of NSCN(IM), Thuingaleng Muivah at Chumoukedima police complex here Friday.

This was the second meeting between Mishra and the octogenarian Muivah, who was accompanied by about 11 senior NSCN(IM) leaders, this week

No detail about the meeting was shared with the media but a senior functionary of the outfit told PTI that there will be another round of talks between Mishra and a larger number of NSCN(IM) leaders again on Saturday.

Mishra, who arrived in Nagaland on Monday for his second visit to the state since assuming office in September last year, held an interaction with Naga National Political Groups (NNPG), a body of eight Naga organisations on Thurs-

The Centre has been holding separate talks



with the NSCN(IM) since 1997 and the NNPG from 2017. It signed the Framework Agreement with NSCN(IM) on August 3, 2015 and an Agreed Position with NNPG on November 17,

However, no final solution to the vexed issue has been arrived at with NSCN(IM) sticking to

Before leaving the state, he will meet the state government's core committee on Naga political issues headed by chief minister Neiphiu Rio and comprising Naga civil societies, officials said.

Nagaland chief secretary calls for digitalisation of government functioning

DIMAPUR, April 23 (NNN): Nagaland chief secretary J Alam has called for digitalisation of government functioning in the state. The Nagaland chief secretary said this while addressing a departmental review meeting with the department of Information Technology and Communication and the department of Power on Friday in Kohima. The meeting discussed at length with officials of both departments about issues related to the day-to-day activities as well as the projects currently being undertaken and problems that are hampering the smooth functioning of the two departments.

One of the most important outcomes of the meeting was the proposal made by the chief secretary and his team to phase out the manual process of issuing Inner Line Permit (ILP) and Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe certificates and also to make the whole process digital within a time period of three to four months.

The department of Information Technology and Communication gave a detailed power-point presentation regarding the activities currently being undertaken and shared a few infrastructure and capital shortage issues that the department is facing which in turn is greatly affecting the service output of the de-

The department of IT & C also highlighted the issue of non-availability of real time data and information and regular updates from certain departments as a



official portal of the state government and also in providing regular updates and information to the general public. Apart from these, the department of IT and C also shared some of the important activities currently being undertaken by the department like the State Data Centre which hosts the websites and applications of 70 departments, the online Inner Line Permit, Common Service Centres across the state, etc.

The department of Power also presented a very detailed report of its activities and projects currently being undertaken and also projects that are yet to be approved. The department also expressed that the biggest problem it is facing is the shortage of manpower in carrying out maintenance work which is infact one of the most vital functions of the department.

First Student Police Cadet (SPC) launched in Manipur Project aims at making student ideal future citizens

IMPHAL, April 23 (NNN): The first ever Student Police Cadet (SPC) Programme in Manipur was launched on Friday at Kendriya Vidyalaya, Lamphel, in Imphal West district.

SPC is a project to train high school students to respect the laws, practice discipline, and to develop civic consciousness and empathy for vulnerable sections of society. The programme aims to build a bridge between the police and the community by inculcating values and ethics in the school going students through indoor and outdoor classes and activities. For the first time in the country, the programme was launched in Kerala

In Manipur, the project is being implemented by the Manipur Police department joining hands with the Education department and supported by departments of Transport, Forest, Excise and local self-government.

The launching function was attended by Manipur DGP, P Doungel, commissioner (Education) M Harekrishna; additional DGP, L Kailun who is also the nodal of the SPC programme; principal of Kendriya Vidyalaya Lamphel, Hari Raj and other top officials of the Police department and stakeholders of the project.

Speaking on the occasion, P Doungel said that for the first time in the country, the Kerala police introduced the project in that state in 2010 and successfully implemented it. The implementation of the project in Manipur was delayed due to the Covid-19 pandemic, he also said.

Doungel then said that the project aimed to train high school students to respect the laws,

practice discipline, and to develop civic consciousness and empathy for vulnerable sections of society. "The project will strengthen the students' commitment towards the family, community, and the environment, enabling them to resist negative tendencies such as substance abuse, deviant behavior, intolerance, and other social evils," he added

In the first phase of the project, the SPC programme will be introduced in 20 different schools and it will be expanded to 50 more schools across the state in the second phase, the police chief said. All the required materials including computer sets will be provided by the Police department. The department will also provide vehicles for outdoor programmes of the project, the DGP further

it has been withdrawn from 23 districts of Assam and areas under 15 police stations each in Manipur and Nagaland. "Durable peace and stability has ensured that AFSPA gets withdrawn from the northeast and the role of chief ministers in the region has also been commendable, with Assam's Himanta Biswa Sarma taking the leading position," he noted.

Maintaining that there was a "public misconception" that the Army always wanted AFSPA to remain in force, Singh contended the Army's job is not to look after internal security but to guard the borders.

On continued imposition of AFSPA in Jammu and Kashmir, the minister said, "The situation is responsible for it, not the Army." Lauding the role of serving soldiers and veterans in protecting the country, the Defence minister said, "The soldiers are our strength and the veterans and 'veer naris' (widows of martyrs) our inspiration. "Even when a soldier retires and becomes a veteran, the warrior inside him lives on and it can be seen in his 'tevar' (attitude), body language," he added.

He also called on the general people to ensure that brotherhood is maintained within the country while the soldiers keep peace on the borders.

"We don't notice religion when a person dons the uniform and becomes a soldier for the country. "People of different religions had worked together in the 1971 War...this social harmony of Assam, India should not be broken," he said, felicitating war widows, families of martyrs, prisoners of war and former per-

sonnel who had suffered injuries in the 1971 battle. He also inaugurated an exhibition by the Directorate of Sainik Welfare, showcasing the valour and supreme

sacrifice of armed forces in the liberation war. Speaking on the occasion, chief minister Himanta Biswa Sarma while paying his tributes to the bravery of the war veterans of the Indo-Pak War of '71 and offering his deep tribute to all the soldiers who laid down their lives in the line of duty, said that the Indo-Pakistan War of 1971 was a landmark event in the history of the Indian sub-continent. He said that the valour and sacrifice of the war heroes not only registered the historic victory of India over Pakistan but also played a decisive role in realising the dream of an independent Bangladesh. Later in a tweet, Sarma said that nine war widows were honoured with ₹ 10 lakh each, eight per-

sonnel who had suffered injuries with ₹ 5 lakh each and two ex-prisoners of War with ₹ 2.5 lakh each. An amount of ₹ 2 lakh each was also given to 86 other veterans of the liberation war, he added.

Ukraine: Russians try to storm

a small group of people gathered outside a church where a priest prayed and sprinkled them with water on Holy Saturday. While British officials said the Russians hadn't gained significant new ground, Ukrainian officials announced a nationwide curfew ahead of Easter Sunday, a sign of the war's disruption and threat to the entire country. Mariupol, a part of the industrial region in eastern Ukraine known as the Donbas, has been a key Russian objective since the Feb. 24 invasion began and has taken on outsize importance in the war. Completing its capture would give Russia its biggest victory yet, after a nearly two-month siege reduced much of the city to a smoking ruin and killed an estimated 20,000 people there.

Occupying Mariupol would deprive the Ukrainians of a vital port, free up Russian troops to fight elsewhere and allow Russia to create a land corridor with the Crimean Peninsula, which Moscow seized from Ukraine in 2014. An advisor to Ukraine's presidential office, Oleksiy Arestovich, said during a Saturday briefing that Russian forces had resumed air strikes on the Azovstal plant and were trying to storm it. A direct attempt to take the plant

would represent a reversal from an order Russian President Vladimir Putin gave two days earlier. Russian Defense minister Sergei Shoigu reported to Putin on Thursday that the whole of Mariupol, with the exception of Azovstal, had been 'liberated' by the Russians. At the time, Putin ordered him not to send Russian troops into the plant but instead to block off the facility, an apparent attempt to starve out the Ukrainians and force them

Ukrainian officials have estimated that about 2,000 of their troops are inside the plant along with the civilians sheltering in the facility's underground tunnels. Arestovic said the Ukrainian forces were trying to counter the new

He said that Modi has set a target of making India number one in the world by 2047, when the nation celebrates the centenary of its Independence.

He had words of effusive praise for the people who had come out in large numbers despite "such hot weather". Notably, this was Shah's first visit to the state in more than two years. His last tour of Bihar was in January, 2020 when he had addressed a rally in Vaishali district, in the aftermath of the CAA-NPR-NRC controversy.

Jorhat-Moran stretch of NH37 becomes a death trap

SIVASAGAR, April 23: The 90

km stretch of the NH37 from Jorhat to Moran has turned into a veritable death trap after the first showers of the rainy season leaving the stretch with dangerous potholes all over and broken sides

The National Highway & Infrastructure Development Corporation (NHIDCL), engaged in improving and widening the 4-lane work of the NH37 appears to be totally indifferent to the plight of the commuters.

The traveling time between Jorhat and Dibrugarh has now doubled causing serious problems for the commuters and the hundreds of goods-laden trucks. Road accidents have become a

daily occurrence. On Friday four passengers were seriously injured in an accident that took place at Sukanpukhuri on NH37. The NHIDCL awarded contracts

to various companies for converting



the existing 2-lane NH37 into 4-lane with widening and improving with paved shoulder works, culverts, and construction bridges

The work began in 2015 but the Highway authority terminated the contract after a year or so following

unsatisfactory progress. After that, the portion between Jorhat to Janjhi (37.8 km) was awarded to one VPSIL company for ₹ 738.15 cr and between Janjhi to Demow (37 km) to Gannon Dunkerly Company Pvt Ltd (GDCL) for ₹ 1369.02 cr.

The projects were to be completed by 30-05 -2022 but not even 50 p.c. of the project works have been completed by now. The only completed work as of today is the 3.5 km Moran Town NH37 expansion and drain construction project for ₹ 14.52 cr.

Recently when the company officers came to assess the progress of work on the portion, activists from several political and student organisations created a ruckus at Darikapar protesting the tardy progress of work in which police had to use force to disperse the crowd.

NEW DELHI, April 23 (IANS): Even when the entire northeast India has been experiencing heavy to very heavy rainfall for the last

few days, the spatial variability due to various reasons has meant that Meghalaya has received 'large excess' rainfall while Tripura has received 'deficient' and Mizoram 'large deficient' rainfall since March 1 till Saturday.

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) data has shown that for the period between March 1 and April 23, the quantum of rainfall received by Meghalaya is 473.8 mm, which is 99 per cent more than the normal rainfall 237.5 mm for this duration; Tripura received 98.8 mm rainfall, minus 58 per cent of 234.1 mm normal for the duration and Mizoram received 64.4 mm rainfall, minus 66 per cent of 187.3 mm normal for the duration

In IMD parlance, 60 per cent or more rainfall is termed as large ex-

cess; 20 per cent to 59 per cent is excess; rainfall that is between minus 19 per cent to plus 19 per cent is normal; minus 20 per cent to minus 59 per cent is deficient while minus 60 till minus 99 is termed as large deficient.

Other states in the northeast received normal or excess rainfall.

For the same duration of March 1-April 23, Manipur received 150.4 mm (against the normal of 149.4

mm); Nagaland received 137.8 (against the normal of 148.6 mm) and Arunachal Pradesh received 420.9 mm (against 403.5 mm normal) while two states, Sikkim with 417.4 mm against 276.0 mm normal (51 per cent more) and Assam with 321.1 mm against 202.3 mm normal (59 per cent more) received excess rainfall.

Explaining the phenomenon, senior scientist from IMD, K.S. Hosalikar, said the orography of the region and wind direction played a major role. "The windward orography of Meghalaya and the hilly terrain further north is a major factor. Plus, this time round, the wind direction is from southwest to northeast direction. Therefore, there was more rain in the northern part of the NE region while Tripura and Mizoram in the southern parts remained dry.'

Hosalikar also pointed out the lack of favourable low pressure system in the northern Bay of Bengal in this season for the missing heavy rainfall over Tripura and Mi-

Meaning of life in the Spring season

umans find varieties of meaning in their lifetime. The 'purpose of life' is one of the ▲ Iriding powers making us face the uncertainties of life. The arrival of spring season, Easter season, and lunar New Year celebrations worldwide are but invitations for us to find newer meanings for life. There is not one big cosmic meaning for all; there is only the meaning we each give to our life, an individual meaning, an individual plot, like an individual novel, a book for each person"

Logotherapy, developed by Viktor Frankl (a neurologist and psychiatrist) is based on the principle that the primary motivational force for any individual is to find meaning in life. More than power or pleasure, logotherapy drives humans to find purpose in life. Therefore, logotherapy is "healing through meaning", a meaning-centered approach to life. Each person is a unique and irreplaceable human being whose existence is characterized by freedom of choice, personal responsibility, and a human spirit. The core principles of logotherapy are: (1) Freedom of Will – We can choose how we respond to life and are personally responsible for our choices. (2) Will to **Meaning** – We are motivated to find meaning, and when this search is upset, we experience existential frustration and feelings of meaninglessness. (3) Meaning of Life – We are called moment-tomoment to answer the demands that life places on us. The focus is not on what we feel we deserve from life but on our responsibility to give to life. We have the ability and the ultimate necessity to

self-transcend to improve humanity.
The Japanese concept "ikigai" which translates roughly as "the happiness of always being busy," is like logotherapy, but it goes a step beyond. It also seems to be one way of explaining the extraordinary longevity of the Japanese, especially on the island of Okinawa, where there are 24.55 people over the age of 100 for every 100,000 inhabitants - far more than the global average.

Ask these questions yourself, "Am I adding meaning to my life? Is life adding meaning to me?" Life is a constant search for meaning. Some find it early, while others don't. Life is a gift from God, and what you do with your life will be a gift to God in return. No one of us deserves life, but God has given us as a gift. We should be grateful for this most beautiful gift on earth. Life is a stage between non-existence and death. Death can become the beginning of our non-existence. Life is a brief period. We need to give meaning to this short life. We don't know when the death knell will call us. It is an unpredictable journey. Therefore, we have to make meaning with this short

We constantly daydream. We continuously create a world that doesn't exist. When some external force offers to mean, we become mere slaves to that definition of life. However, life becomes meaningful when we create, re-create, invent, reinvent, find, re-find, define, and re-define our lives through the up and down experiences.

The meaning of life is to give sense to whatever happens to self. This is accepting what comes and dealing with it. If you see life as a problem, then you have only problems. If you see life as a pro-



gram, you have plenty of time to attend all the programs and enjoy the fun. It depends much on how you look at life. On all these ordinary occasions, you need to reaffirm and reassert yourself.

Shad Helmstetter challenges us, "Do you want to live with a bad program? Do you want to go through the rest of your life literally at the mercy of a program you don't want? You don't have to. You can override almost any conditioning you have ever received in any part of your life. It

makes absolutely no difference how, where, what, why, or how you have been in the past. It makes no difference what you believe about yourself or what others have believed about you. It makes no difference what circumstances life may have tossed in your lap. You can put yourself in control. Now it's your turn. You can re-program. You can erase the old negative, counter-productive, workagainst-you programming and replace it with a healthy, new positive, productive kind of program-

ming. And it's easy. Erase and replace. All you have to do is learn how to talk to yourself." Now, learn to talk sensible things to yourself. Do not speak negative things to yourself. Consciously try to say positive things to yourself. Feel positive vibes, remember encouraging experiences, and think about the people supporting you.

Exercise: You can stop reading now and consciously tell yourself what you should be in the next minute, next hour, next day, next month, a year from now. If you want to grow in life, you need to have a frank and straightforward talk to yourself and open your life's good and not-sogood chapters. Remember, the programming you have received from enemies, rivals, or unsound sources affect you subconsciously. You need to remove them one by one, intentionally and steadily. This is a process. Don't expect to overcome within a day or two. It would be best if you had time. You need to fruitfully use your time and employ your vision to eliminate harmful programming. The most significant wall you ever have to climb is the negative programming you have received. You add more meaning to your life when you un-learn negative programming you have so far received and retained. At this springtime, New Year time, Easter season, let us reflect: What is the meaning I give to my life; Let me not live in the wrong program; I decide to re-program my life; I shall get help if necessary; I shall learn to talk about positive things to myself; I need time to re-program myself. Diversity being the essence of every society, multilingual and multicultural acceptance among societies strengthened them perceivably articulative on every difference that came in their way of congenial coexistence. Languages played their role to stitch differences into acceptance while finding common causes for shared inter-

ests to flourish. Sanskrit is known to be the mother of all languages. Despite its being the most communicated language in ancient times, in India, it lost its glow as a language in a post-independent establishment. When languages united people across the globe, Sanskrit for various reasons could not flourish in India. With a large number of people choosing English as their spoken tongue, Indians have as much claim on it as any native speaker in America or England. The reach of Sanskrit as a medium of communication got limited among a handful of elite people in India, probably giving it the recognition of the language of the spiritual elite, the pundits. Away from the reach of the common man, Sanskrit is dying in India. There should not be boundaries in embracing languages as they are meant to break boundaries naturally and bring people closer. Interestingly, many books which are known to be not available in their original Sanskrit manuscripts are now available in Persian and many other European languages. Many vernaculars grew from the linguistic expression of Sanskrit and flourished gaining popularity, while Sanskrit depleted to the level of insignificance. Spirituality in India was defined and propagated in it but subsequently got sidelined as the essence of Bhakti or devotion got disseminated to the populace in local languages too. With its treasure of knowledge remaining heavy and probably inaccessible to the common man, spiritual texts from Sanskrit got translated into vernaculars helping the common man to delve deeper into them without being dependent on Sanskrit.

Research reveals the geographical influence of Sanskrit in various global languages. Most Asian languages are seen to be impacted by the influence of Sanskrit. Interestingly, countries like Germany have understood the intellectual and linguistic depth that Sanskrit holds and began to popularize the language in their universities. Iranians, Arabs and even the British found merit and power in Sanskrit and translated great classics into their languages. Governments in India kept away from initiatives to strengthen the mother of all languages for the fear that such a decision might topple India's secular social engineering and invite the wrath of some sections. Schools adopting a three-language formula in their curriculum can teach Hindi, English, and an Indian language to the students. Many universities in the US teach Sanskrit as an Indo-European language. Interestingly, no language has a vocabulary as abundant as that of Sanskrit. To present an example, the English word 'sun' has 12 equivalents in Sanskrit. But English does not possess this vocabulary power and to fix this lacuna, it borrows new words from other languages including Sanskrit. An estimate says that of an approximate 6800 languages, about 200 languages in the world enjoy speakers more than a million each. The remaining languages have a meager number of speakers. With a huge number of people speaking it, Tamil enjoys a large acceptance in India and some other Asian countries. With the National Education Policy

coming into force, as part of its trilingual policy, states are authorized to take Sanskrit as a language through primary and secondary education. The policy is expected to bring a revamp in the education sector. India, a cultural diversity, despite its being a geographical unity, remained a single spiritual entity for ages as the language Sanskrit could bind the landscape through the spiritual aphorisms in texts that even today are monumental evidence of references that the world is appreciative about. The laxity with which the post-independent India treated Sanskrit was ruthless. To pursue Macaulayism, the idea of the English education system, we committed the biggest sin by burying the significance of the language of all languages. It was also due to the hypocritical secular track the country constitutionally decided to travel on, finding reasons to give Sanskrit a back seat. The fear of a probable backlash from the minority vote bank, if Sanskrit was favoured, was the main reason for the denial

Societies with genetic, social, and lin-

guistic diversities survive and flourish to their fullest potential, making intercultural assimilation of humanity, proclaiming the essential Indian Vedic idea of "Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam", which means the world is one family. Indeed, Sanskrit is the only language in which we can find such thoughts of unparalleled ancient wisdom on universal brotherhood. Hypocrisy is what is the gesture of the Indian conscience these days. We carefully, in a surreptitious manner, killed a language that our ancestors cherished, nourished, and flourished with for generations. All credit as to why it is going to be extinct in this large subcontinent will come to us. Boundless knowledge is confined in books, unable to be perceived in its real sense as translations fail to give the real joy of reading the original texts. Cities like Haridwar and Rishikesh are known to be the seats of Sanskrit learning and research. Aspirants from across the globe flock to these cities to learn about Sanskrit. Mattur village of Shimoga in Karnataka is famous for its Sanskrit-speaking families. About 5000 residents of this village communicate in Sanskrit. More conscious efforts from various corners should be taken in the direction of reviving Sanskrit. The government has reasons to justify its move to lift Hindi to an elevated platform. But does it have reasons to not support a language that housed great cultural treasures for long? SAVING BUSINESS DURING COVID AND BEYOND

Thile the Covid pandemic and the subsequent lockdown since March 2020 damaged many business units, a struggling shop owner managed to not just turn around her fortune but also expand and create a village-level business network to help a few others grow. Located in the severely flood-affected Na-Bordua village in the Garmari Gaon Panchayat in the Morigaon district, this small grocery shop started in 2014. After the lockdown was announced, the shop was nearly on the verge of closing down in

"We are poor and we don't have any agricultural land or any income source. We started a small shop in 2014 and gradually built it, and it became our family's livelihood source. However, the Covid changed everything," stated Charu Moni Hazarika.

The 45-year-old Charu, who runs this grocery shop, said that a few weeks after the lockdown was announced, their business went broke.

"During the lockdown, many in the village received supplies in the form of relief from the government, and people ended up purchasing in a very limited and measured amount from the shops. Moreover, the pandemic times saw a rise in purchases with credit. Those were tough times," informed Charu.

She continues, "We were tensed and frustrated, and apart from our shop we were also thinking about our family's survival. This is when we received support from Oxfam India.'

Oxfam India helped the family financially by supporting them with an amount of INR Thirty Thousand which enabled them to restock their shop with supplies; apart from that it also gave her and her family counseling on expanding their business. Since then, there has been no looking back for Charu; with profits earned in 2020, they invested in agriculture, subsequently expanding their source of income. More than the financial

support, they hugely benefitted from the guidance on income generation and finance.

"We never used to look at the small shop as a business to earn a profit, but only saw it as a means to survive. Apart from support, the people at Oxfam also gave us guidance on banking and

ideas to expand our business," said Charu. She informed that Oxfam India officials gave them the suggestion to start another business at the earliest and also suggested ensuring that it is foodrelated. She adds that they also encouraged them to expand their business and reach the people in

year in taking agricultural land on lease. My son, who didn't have any source of income then, started cultivating the field," said Charu. Now Charu has started selling the vegetables as well

Most of the households in the village practice farming and grow some other vegetables. But there is no vegetable 'shop' as such in the village. So, Charu reached out to other farmers in the village to convince them to use her shop to sell their

the village and the nearby villages.

"We provided the financial assistance in 2020 when the first phase of lockdown was announced, and we immediately advised them to be prepared for the worst," said Mukuta Bordoloi, a local community leader trained and groomed by Oxfam India. Some bit of persuasion also worked. "We also requested all those whom we know to purchase rations and supplies from them, and this helped them a lot. There are also people living a bit far from the shop in other villages who used to purchase from other bigger shops. We requested them to purchase from here too," added Mukuta.

The shop didn't face any crisis and gained and was able to make a profit even in the subsequent lockdowns in the years 2020 and 2021. "We invested INR15000 out of the profits earned last

farmers nearby are getting a place to sell their produce, and two - more people are getting associated with the shop. We sell our groceries and vegetables, and also the vegetables which we receive from the farmers " said Charu

Her 25-year-old son, Punakon Hazarika, who had planned to migrate to a bigger town in search of a job has changed his plans. Now from his vegetable cultivation and his mother's shop, he has been comfortably able to earn INR5000-6000 every month. "My friends who migrated are earning in the range INR10000-12000, but a major portion of their earning is spent on living expenses," said Punakon.

He has bigger plans in sight and now plans to start a second grocery shop. Explaining his plans he said, "During Covid lockdown, we saw how other businesses suffered, but food business survived. So, we have decided that our next business will be food-related, and we are thinking of ex-

panding in the form of a second grocery shop." Satisfied with their returns from farming, Punakon and Charu also plan to take more land on lease for cultivation, once they have managed to save enough money. "We have taken 3 bighas of land on lease where we cultivate vegetables but we plan to take another 5-8 bigha on lease. Apart from vegetables we also plan to cultivate mustard this time," Charu added.

Mukuta further informs that seeing their success, many others in the district have approached them for similar support and guidance, and this includes many youths who have no earning opportunity in the district and end up migrating to other states to take up work as migrant labourers.

On being asked why only one shop was given support, Oxfam India's project officer Iftikar Hussain said that the organization gave support by looking at several factors, including whether those getting support will be able to build on the support

"We tried to look at various factors before deciding who will get support, and we also ensured that those who received support are spread across and not confined to one location. We also did a rough assessment to understand how serious they are and whether they will be able to build a future for themselves," said Iftikar.

The mother-son duo of Charu and Punakon are certainly building a robust future not just for themselves but also for their community.

had used up most of my younger days in travel when I nostalgically recall those memorable moments of the snows of Lyesteryears. My first trip to peninsular India was one of them where I was to attend a seminar at Madurai Kamaraj University. It was typically Tamil all the way. The Dravidian dialectal is predominantly spoken by the entire Tamilakam.

Indian Railway has a distinctive adventure. As soon as I stepped into a compartment of Tamil Nadu Express in New Delhi, I was assailed by nostalgia. The Idli-Vada journey had begun. My berth was surrounded by deep-rooted skin-colour copassengers. Even before the train set in motion, a family around me sighed with happy anticipation for a feast. Little I express to share; it seemed to arrive into hostile forces. I was shockingly horrified to choose iravu (dinner) from the Pantry. The tayir ariici (curd rice) forced me signs of intoxication and I felt flat.

I realized in the morning that the train was catching a very good speed. My fellow passengers chatted about the relative merits of stations. It was kalai (breakfast) at Bhopal. I hopped off at a 30-second-halt in search of a perfect breakfast. Hot idlis with large chutney-sambar were impressed but not entirely surprised as food is an important part of the train journey. The train moved Itarsi, and Nagpur through the irregular chain of mountain ridges, highlands, and plateau of Vindhya Range. Four parallel bridges over the Krishna River at Vijaywada pleased my mind aesthetically. The train moved intermittently to the Coromandel Coast. It was curiva utayam (sunrise) at Chennai Central.

Being common genetic variants for skin in the southern city, I was easily identified as an outsider. With a crinkled blood-red shirt and a towel around his neck, a porter started pouring English in Tamil. South India differs quite radically from I experienced the joys of clambering and pretending to be a chimpanzee in that crowded coach of Vaigai Express. I was no Tarzan but I stayed afloat. The enchanting fragrance of flowers filled the coach. It was jam-packed by am'mas (mother/lady) transporting flowers in bulk. I crawled a bit further and encountered a dazzling array of flowers – jasmine, firecrackers flower (kanagambaram), marigold (samandi), and country roses. Women are very picky choosing only the freshest of flowers for ornamental needs

Soon after settling down, the hawkers arrived. I was chuckling as the varieties of snacks from chakli to vada, nipattu, kodubale, banana chips, mirchi bajji, malpuri, etc made it a great railway bazaar. After a heroic act, I was feeling ravenously hungry and looking for a choice. I got bewildered, stared at my effort, and had to taste some.

After five hours of seamless travel, the train finally ran over the Vaigai River and I got off at the last sleepy stoppage at Madurai. I noticed two boys on the platform with one PP-sized photograph welcoming me 'Vanakkam, ni ciruvan' (namaskar, you boy). By the end, I realized Tamil words are similar to Sanskrit. I responded to their grins with a smile 'nan tiru Kamal' (I'm Kamal). Our auto passed through the ancient Meenakshi Temple, towards the house of my friend Rangaraj's sister.

My host was hospitable and the only difficulty was the language since they communicate only Tamil. With my small vocabulary, I felt like entering a hostile island. I did recollect Lamuel Gulliver's "A voyage to Lilliput" that washed ashore after a shipwreck and finds himself a prisoner of a race of tiny people. The social influences of south Indian superstars mean a lot. While the entire family members were watching a Rajnikant movie, the little boy desperately wanted to talk with me. I could reply with just 'am' (yes) and 'illai' (no). He was frustrated and did frantic attempt "Koncam Tamilam illai (can't even speak a little Tamil)".

Serving a usual dinner from dosa to idli, vada and sambar-chutney relished the authentic Tamil thali, a magical confluence of flavours. The heat didn't subside at even night after the unbearable blazing sun. There're noble ways to stay cool. However. bed-on-terrace was effective indeed. The night was cool under the blue sky with millions of stars that twinkly reminded. It's the land of Tamilam. I discovered that understanding Tamil was not so easy. All I need to learn is a little bit of Tamil when I head on next time. I took rest blissfully that night.

Book Review

Importance of being a Woman in Anita Desai's Novels

Reality is merely onetenth visible section of the iceberg that one sees above the surface of the ocean - art remaining nine-tenths of it that lies below the surface. That is why it is near Truth than Reality itself. Art does not merely reflect Reality - it enlarges it," said Anita Desai. Her novels reflect this truth about women and Dr. Rashmi Rekha Saikia brilliantly explores this truth that comes out of Anita Desai's novels through her arduous research for a prolonged part of her academic


In Assam Anita Desai is quite ar in the academic circle and Dr. Rashmi focused on a very potential area in the novels of Desai. The upsurge of several women novelists in the Post-Modern era was quite significant as their writings heralded a new age in the field of literature by the inclusion of new themes focusing on the women's world and the feminine issues. Anita Desai was enshrined as the most successful novelist in the literary arena of the contemporary period. Desai is drawn to postcolonial themes including the role of women in the transitional society. Her novels are confined within the parameter of domestic and familial issues concentrating on man-woman relationships and women's sufferings as victims of male hegemony under patriarchal

domination. The book has five well-written chapters. The introductory chapter offers a sketchy account of the novelist's life and her works. Dr. Rashmi did not forget to include a short discussion on her concept of feminism and her approach to the novels from the feminist point of view. In the following chapter, she discusses the conjugal relationship as Desai dealt with it in the five selected novels.

In the third chapter, other interrelationships are focused - on fraternal, filial, and human relations in general. Hazards and complexities of marital relationships were the main concern in Desai's novels where she depicts the struggles and plight of women in family and society as well. A woman is a human being and the importance of being a woman seems to be in the family and society. In the penultimate chapter, Dr. Rashmi beautifully deals with that and the readers will surely appreciate it. It is a quest for self. The disruption of nuptial relations turns marriage into a farce and it is no longer made in heaven. The bleak truth that emerges is that in the novels of Desai, self-sufficiency and selffulfillment in the life of a woman are a far cry. The neurotic urges and hysteric behaviour in the character of Maya in Cry, the Peacock leading to her suicide are common frustration in the other

novels too. Some other dimensions are

reached when in a novel like Fire on the Mountains polygamy is discussed which Prof Ahuja described as a plurality of wives. Mr. Kaul secretly establishes extramarital relations with a teacher Miss David without the notice of his wife. No recognition is given to Mr. Kaul's extra-marital affairs but it is clear that Mr. Kaul violated the Hindu norms. Desai here explores more the psychological trauma of a humiliated wife who sees her husband attached to another woman. Helen Cixous rightly commented, "Women immersed in her naiveté, kept in the dark about herself, led into selfdisdain by the great arm of parental-conjugal phallocentrism." Here Dr. Rashmi discussed the 'Cultural conditioning' that reduces women to silent and subordinate objects. In the patriarchal society, women seem to occupy a very significant place because of their legal citizenship. But in reality, the age-old patriarchal subjugation compels a woman to be entirely subservient to the male authoritative society in both the social and economic spheres. AV Krishna Rao sounded positive when he says, "In the development of Indo-Anglian novel the feminine sensibility has achieved imaginative self-sufficiency which merits recognition despite the relatively late manifestation." Dr. Rashmi focuses again and again on how women in Desai's novels challenge domes-



Critics like Leela Gandhi, Meenakshi Mukherjee, and others have brilliantly provided new perspectives and insightful suggestions in their discussion of the Indian novelists dealing with the subjugation of women in the patriarchal society. Dr. Rashmi's book will be certainly an important addition to the list. What she focused on is the inner psyche of the females and how that deep delving into the intricate depths involved the Indian psyche as a whole. Isolation is an important feature in psychic complexities and women mostly fail to come out of this isolation imposed on them by family or society. Hindu marriage code gives equal rights to women and men but in reality, it is the male supremacy that ultimately counts. In the concluding chapter, Dr. Rashmi correctly focused on the novels of Desai to project the ambivalent aspect of deconstruction as well as reconstruction of gender roles and male-female polarity which forms

a natural part of a social, psychological, and biological framework. She concludes rightly, "The masterpieces of Desai establish that the paradigm of relationship has been analyzed with newer perspective rejecting the traditional morality making center sperelationship of today's culture."

Dr. Rashmi Saikia who did her Ph.D. in Indian literature from Assam University is now working at Gargaon College, Sivasagar as Associate Professor in the English Dept. She has four edited volumes to her credit including the recent one Female Voices in Literature. Her research works concentrate mostly on gender issues in Indian Literature. This book on Anita Desai will be a unique contribution to understanding the writings of Desai who is well-read in Indian Universities and colleges and especially in Assam. 

Rana couple arrested after they drop plan to recite Hanuman Chalisa outside Uddhav Thackeray's residence

MUMBAI, April 23 (PTI): Mumbai Police on Saturday evening arrested MLA Ravi Rana and his wife, MP Navneet Rana for allegedly "creating enmity between different groups" after escorting them out of their house in suburban Khar here amid high drama.

The development came hours after the couple cancelled their plan to recite the Hanuman Chalisa outside Maharashtra chief minister Uddhav Thackeray's private residence 'Matoshree' here.

The Ranas were booked under IPC section 153 (A) (Promoting enmity between different groups on grounds of religion, race, place of birth, residence, language, etc., and doing acts prejudicial to maintenance of harmony), and section 135 of the Mumbai Police Act (violation of prohibitory orders of police), said an official of the Khar police station in western Mumbai.

BJP leader Devendra Fadnavis, speaking in Nagpur, said the Shiv Sena-led Maharashtra government's way of handling the entire episode was "very childish".

3-year-old raped, killed and thrown into well in Rajasthan



JAIPUR, April 23 (IANS): In a horrific incident, a three-year-old girl, who along with her mother came to attend a marriage function at a village in Chittorgarh district of Rajasthan, was allegedly raped and killed by a youth who also came to attend the wedding.

The incident was reported from a village under the Bassi police station in Chittorgarh district on Friday.

The police have arrested the accused after registering a case of rape and murder.

According to the information received, two daughters in a family were getting married in the village. When everybody was busy with the marriage rituals, the accused first picked up a four-year-old boy and took him near a well around a kilometre from the wedding venue. As he started molesting the kid, the child cried loudly which scared the accused who then left the child back at the venue. After that, he picked up the three-year-old girl and took her near the same well. After raping the minor, he reportedly strangled her to death and

threw her body into the well.

Thereafter, he went back to the marriage function where he even danced before returning to his village with the wedding procession.

When the girl was not found till late evening, the relatives and villagers informed the police.

During police interrogation, it was found that the girl was last seen with Rameshwar Dhakad, a resident of Kishanpura in Bhilwara. At first, Dhakad kept misleading the police, but when the cops pressed hard, he confessed to

the crime.

Meanwhile, the local villagers, including BJP MLA Chandrabhan Singh, have accused the police and the administration of dereliction of duty, besides demanding death penalty for the guilty youth.

An empty water bottle was also thrown in the direction of the

Ranas when they came out.

Sardesai told Sena cadres that the police would be escorting the couple to the police station and they should stay calm and not take law into their hands.

Ravi Rana said if a case was being registered against them, cases should be registered against Sena leaders Anil Parab and Sanjay Raut too for `making threatening statements'.

Earlier, amid stiff resistance by workers of the ruling Shiv Sena, Ravi Rana and Navneet Rana on Saturday morning dropped their plan of reciting the Hanuman Chalisa outside Matoshree in suburban Bandra. They did not want to disturb the law and order situation in view of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's visit to the city on Sunday, Ravi Rana said.

In the morning, Shiv Sena workers broke through the barricades and tried to enter the premises of their Khar residence. But the situation was brought under control by the police.

Five of family killed in Prayagraj

PRAYAGRAJ (UP), April 23 (PTI): Five members of a family were killed with sharp-edged weapons in Khevrajpur village in the district, police said on Saturday. While the Samajwadi Party attacked the Yogi Adityanath dispensation saying that Uttar Pradesh is "immersed in crime", BSP chief Mayawati demanded a thorough probe into the incident.

Tharwai police station received information around 5.30 am that four-five people have been spotted dead in a house and on reaching there, police found the head of the house, Rajkumar (55), his daughter Manisha (25), his wife Kusum (50), his daughter-in-law Savita (30), and granddaughter Mitakshi (2) dead, senior superintendent of police (SSP) Ajay Kumar said. The incident happened on Friday night when Rajkumar's son Sunil was not in the house. He had gone to attend a wedding.

The SSP said that prime facie it appears that the deceased were hit with a stick or some blunt weapon and there are injury marks also on the head.

How the killings took place and other details will be known only after the post-mortem of the dead bodies, the SSP said, adding it will be videographed so that no evidence is left out. It was also found that there was a fire in the bedroom of the house which was extinguished by the fire brigade, he said. The family members have reached here and talks are being held with them.

A case has been lodged at Gangapar Tharwai police station area and seven teams have been formed to look into the whole matter, the SSP said.

A dog squad and forensic team have reached the spot and the evidence is being collected after inspecting the spot, police said. Reacting on the incident, SP president Akhilesh Yadav said "Under the BJP 2.0, UP immersed in crime. Today's testimonial" and attached the news report of the killing.

The BSP president Mayawati said, "The news of the brutal murder of five members of a family in Prayagraj is very sad, condemnable and worrying. The government should go to the bottom of the incident and ensure that strict legal action is taken against the culprits."

Earlier, on April 15, in Khagalpur village of Nawabganj police station area of Gangapar area here, four members of a family were murdered with sharp weapons and the head of the family was found hanging.

Rana Kapoor, Wadhawans laundered money worth ₹ 5,050 crore, says ED

YES BANK-DHFL CASE

MUMBAI, April 23 (PTI): The Enforcement Directorate (ED) has alleged that Yes Bank co-founder Rana Kapoor and Dewan Housing Finance Limited (DHFL) promoters Kapil and Dheeraj Wadhawan siphoned off funds worth ₹ 5,050 crore through suspicious transactions.

The ED said this in its second supplementary (third overall) charge sheet filed in special court here recently against Rana Kapoor, his family, Wadhawans and others in a money laundering

During the investigation, it came to light that a big part of the proceeds of crime (POC) generated in this case has been siphoned off overseas by Rana Kapoor and hence they are not available for attachment directly under the provisions of Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA), it said.

"Rana Kapoor, DHFL promoters Kapil Wadhawan, Dheeraj Wadhawan and others were involved in criminal conspiracy with each other in illegal diversion and siphoning off of funds through suspicious transaction of ₹ 5,050 crore," the central probe agency claimed in its fresh prosecution complaint (charge sheet) filed recently.

The ED said investigation has revealed that Yes Bank had bought debentures worth Rs 3,700 crore between April 2018 and June 2018 from DHFL. Therefore, the amount was transferred to DHFL. Subsequently, DHFL gave a loan of ₹ 600 crore to DOIT Urban Ventures Pvt Ltd (an entity, beneficially owned by Rana Kapoor and his family).

The probe also revealed that Yes Bank had used public money for the purchase of the above-said short-term debentures of DHFL, which has not yet been redeemed by DHFL.

On the other hand, DHFL obliged Rana Kapoor by giving



the so called loan of ₹ 600 crore to his beneficially-owned company, namely DUVPL, without adequate collateral, the agency said

It claimed that the loans given to the firm owned by Kapoor's family were to camouflage the entire act.

The investigation has revealed

that a loan of ₹ 600 crore was given against substandard properties having a meager value of ₹ 39.68 crore and by considering further conversion from agriculture land to residential land and an inflated value of ₹735 crore was shown, it added. It has also come to light that just before the sanction of these loans, Yes Bank had invested in DHFL. This indicates a criminal conspiracy between Rana Kapoor and Kapil and Dheeraj Wadhawan to get loan by pledging highly overvalued assets, the charge-sheet said, adding there was no active or operating business in DUVPL at the time of proposal of loan.

Since DUVPL has no business activity and as such not generating any revenue as of today and it may not be able to repay the loan considering its present business activity and revenue. This clearly indicates a case of quid pro quo, it said

Besides, Yes Bank had also sanctioned a loan of ₹750 crore to one M/s Belief Realtors Private Limited (beneficially owned by Wadhawans) for development of its Bandra Reclamation Project in Mumbai. Investigation has revealed that the entire amount was siphoned off by the Wadhawans

without spending a single penny for the declared purpose, the ED

The entire amount of loan disbursed to M/s Belief Realtors was siphoned off by the Wadhawans by way of layering through their shell companies and it was never used for the declared purpose, the charge sheet said.

"There is no doubt about the fact that Rana Kapoor has misused his official position to gain undue financial benefit for him and his family members," it said.

Investigation has revealed that the POC generated in this case has been layered in different forms in properties as well as in liquid form. It has also been revealed during the investigation that a big part of the POC generated in this case has been siphoned off overseas by Rana Kapoor. The proceeds of crime are thus, not available for attachment directly, the ED said.

The ED had started its investigation after recording of ECIR on March 3, 2020 and after the probe began, Rana Kapoor aggressively tried to dispose of his overseas properties to save them from being attached by the ED under PMLA, the charge sheet said.

The POC involved in this case is ₹ 5,050 crore. While Rana Kapoor is the founder of the said company namely DUVPL, his three daughters are 100 per cent shareholders therein.

Rana Kapoor is currently in judicial custody following his arrest in the case in March 2020. Wadhawans too are in jail custody after their arrest in another case.

PM to inaugurate, lay foundation stone of projects worth ₹ 20k cr during J&K visit

NEW DELHI, April 23 (PTI): Prime Minister Narendra Modi will on Sunday inaugurate and lay foundation stone of development projects worth over ₹ 20,000 crore in Jammu and Kashmir, including the opening of the Banihal-Qazigund road tunnel to establish all-weather connectivity between the two regions of the union territory.

Modi is travelling there to participate in the celebration for the National Panchayati Raj Day and address 'Gram Sabhas' across the country, the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) said in a statement. He will also visit Palli Panchayat in Samba district.

Seeking to develop and rejuvenate 75 water bodies in every district of the country, the prime minister will launch a new initiative named 'Amrit Sarovar', it said.

Modi is scheduled to attend the Master Deenanath Mangeshkar Awards Ceremony in Mumbai later in the evening where he will receive the first Lata Deenanath Mangeshkar Award, the statement said.

The award has been instituted in the memory of Lata Mangeshkar and will be given every year to a person for exemplary contribution towards nation building, it noted.



In the statement on Modi's visit to Jammu and Kashmir, the PMO said the government has been focused on bringing about wide ranging reforms to substantially improve governance and enhance ease of living for the people of the region at an unprecedented pace following the "constitutional reforms" of August 2019, a reference to the abrogation of Article 370 and making the erstwhile state into a Union Territory.

The projects being inaugurated or whose foundation stones will be laid in this visit will go a long way in facilitating basic amenities, ensuring ease of mobility and development of infrastructure in the region, it said. Modi will inaugurate the Banihal-Qazigund road tunnel, built at a cost of over ₹ 3,100 crore. The 8.45-km-long tunnel will reduce the road distance between Banihal and Qazigund by 16 km, and reduce journey time by around one and a half hours.

It is a twin tube tunnel, one for each direction of travel, and the tubes are interconnected by a cross passage every 500 m for maintenance and emergency evacuation. The tunnel will help establish allweather connection between Jammu and Kashmir, and bring the two regions closer, the PMO said. He will also lay the foundation

stone of three road packages of the

Delhi-Amritsar-Katra Expressway, being built at a cost of over ₹ 7,500 crore.

Among other projects, Modi will lay the foundation stone of Ratle and Kwar hydroelectric projects, a 850 MW facility to be constructed on Chenab river in Kishtwar at a cost of around ₹ 5,300 crore, and 540 MW Kwar hydroelectric project to be build in on the same river at a cost of over ₹ 4,500 crore.

In order to further expand the network of 'Jan Aushadi Kendras' in Jammu and Kashmir, and to make good quality generic medicines at affordable prices available, 100 centres will be inaugurated by Prime Minister Modi. These centres are located in remote corners of the Union Territory.

Modi will also inaugurate a 500 KW solar power plant at Palli, which will make it the country's first panchayat to become carbon neutral, the PMO said.

During his visit, he will also hand over 'SVAMITVA' (survey of villages and mapping with improvised technology in village areas) cards to beneficiaries under the scheme. The cards will give villagers documentary proof of their ownership of properties so that they can use them for financial benefits if required.

Govt issues advisory to TV channels on coverage of Ukraine conflict, Delhi riots NEW DELHI, April 23 (PTI): In a and transmitting any content which is

NEW DELHI, April 23 (P11): In a strong advisory to private television channels, the government on Saturday said certain debates on the coverage of the Ukraine-Russia conflict and the Delhi riots had provocative and socially unacceptable language, and it took exception to headlines such as 'Parmanu (nuclear) Putin' and 'Ali, Bali aur Khalbali (unrest)'.

While the government found tele-

vision news channels making "false claims" and "frequently misquoting" international agencies while reporting on the Ukraine conflict, it took objection to the reportage on "incidents" in northwest Delhi, contending that channels had given communal colour to the actions of authority. It also said that certain debates on television channels on the Delhi violence had unparliamentary, provocative and socially unacceptable language.

"Having regard to the above, the government expresses serious concern about the manner in which the television channels have gone about their operations in the matter of transmitting content...," read the advisory issued by the Information and Broadcasting Ministry to self-regulating bodies of television channels.

It also "strongly advised" them to immediately refrain from publishing

and transmitting any content which is violative of the aforementioned provisions of The Cable Television Networks (Regulation) Act, 1995, and the rules thereunder.

The government cited specific instances of "hyberbolic" statements by news anchors and "scandalous headlines/taglines" while reporting on the Ukraine-Russia conflict and disrupting the investigation process into the incidents in northwest Delhi by airing unverified CCTV footage.

Section 6 of the Programme Code under the Act states that "no programme should be carried in the cable service which – offends against good taste or decency; contains criticism of friendly countries, contains attack on religions or communities or visuals or words contemptuous of religious groups or which promote communal attitudes; contains anything, obscene, defamatory, deliberate, false and suggestive innuendos and half truths".

The advisory said that while reporting on the Russia-Ukraine conflict it has been observed that channels have been making false claims and frequently misquoting international agencies or actors, and using "scandalous headlines or taglines" completely unrelated to the news.

Don't blindly follow rules, conflicts have human face: CJI to judges

CHENNAI, April 23 (PTI): Judges cannot blindly apply rules as conflicts have a human face and before rendering any decision, they have to weigh socio-economic factors and the impact of their decision on the society, chief justice of the Supreme Court, Justice N V Ramana said here on Saturday

In this era of 'instant noodles', people expect instant justice. But they do not realise that real justice will be a casualty if we strive for instant justice, he said addressing an event at the Madras High Court.

People looked up to the judiciary in times of distress. And they firmly believe that their rights would be protected by the courts.

"It is necessary to contemplate how to improve the functioning of the judiciary, how to reach out to the people and fulfil their justice needs." On the language used in courts, justice Ramana said a common citizen cannot relate to the practices, procedures and language of courts. Hence, efforts should be on making the general pop-



ulation an active part of the justice delivery process.

"The parties must understand the ongoing process and development of their case. It should not be like chanting mantras in a wedding, which most of us do not understand," he said. Pointing out that strengthening the judicial institutions has been his top priority, Justice Ramana said buttressing judiciary is imperative for a democ-

racy, sustained on the rule of law.

During the last one year of his tenure as chief justice, he has been highlighting various issues affecting the country's legal system, he said.

"The biggest issue affecting all institutions nowadays, including the judi-

ciary, is ensuring sustained faith in the eyes of the public."

The judiciary is vested with immense constitutional responsibility of maintaining the rule of law and checking executive and legislative excesses. "We have the duty of upholding and enforcing the constitutional values. It is no doubt, a heavy burden. But it is one that we have gladly chosen on the day we took our constitutional oath. This is the reason why strengthening judicial institutions has been my top priority," he added.

Dispensing justice is not only a constitutional duty, but also a social one. Conflicts are inevitable for any society. But constructive resolution of conflict is integral to maintain the social order, he said. "Constructive conflict resolution is not a mere technical job. Particularly in a country like India, judges cannot blindly apply the rules, procedures and statutes. After all, conflicts have a human face. We are constantly aware about our duty to render justice, not merely procedural,

but also substantial.

Archery World Cup Indian men's compound team clinches Gold

Apart from these two events, Indian archers have gone through a challenging campaign at the first stage of the Archery World Cup.

In the men's individual recurve, only London 2012 Olympian Jayanta Talukdar could make the top eight. Tokyo Olympian Tarundeep Rai lost in the round of 32, Sachin Gupta crashed out in the round of 64 while Neeraj Chauhan was eliminated in the opening contest.

Meanwhile, the women's individual recurve saw Ridhi reaching the round of 16. Komalika Bari lost in the round of 32 while Anikta Bhakat and Simranjeet Kaur could not go past the first



Dominant Ravi grabs Gold, Bajrang settles for Silver, Gourav impressive in 2nd place finish

Lots of speculation around Test captaincy but Rob Key will take the decision: Stokes

LONDON, April 23 (IANS): England all-rounder Ben Stokes has said that while there will be "a lot of speculation" that he might be given the responsibility to lead the Test side after Joe Root stepped down as skipper, the decision will be taken by the England and Wales Cricket Board's (ECB) new managing director Rob Key.

Stokes has been heavily linked with the vacant England Test captain's position and has spoken about the role as well following his friend and teammate's decision to step down. The 30-yearold all-rounder thinks that it will be a "huge honour" if he gets the opportunity to captain the side.

"I know there will be lots of speculation around who will take over, and clearly as vice-captain and someone who has stood in on a few occasions my name will be strongly talked about," Stokes wrote in his column for Daily

"But all I will say is that it is a huge honour to captain England and whoever does it will get to enjoy that responsibility of trying to take the team forward. The decision will be down to Rob Key as the new managing director of men's cricket and I'm sure we'll



talk soon enough, as he will with other players and support staff. "It is an exciting time for us all,

at the start of a new era for the Test team. I'm back in the nets now and training ahead of my first game for Durham in the next couple of weeks and I can't wait," added Stokes.

Recalling the day when Root broke the news to him that he was stepping down as England Test skipper, Stokes said he was caught a bit off-guard. Root's captaincy over the last year-anda-half had come in for criticism after his side could manage just one Test win in 17 outings, with the latest disappointment coming in the form of the 0-4 Ashes thrashing followed by a 0-1 loss in the away Test series in the

"When my phone started ringing and I saw Joe's (Root) name flash up, I didn't know what to expect. But when he said: 'Mate, I just wanted to let you know before it becomes official...' I knew what was coming.

"As you can imagine it was quite an emotional conversation, but it wasn't a long chat, there will be time for that in the future.

utes and in return there was nothing but love, respect and support from me because that is what Joe Root has shown me throughout his time as England Test captain.

'When I took my break from the game in 2021 (due to mental health issues and finger injury), Joe was brilliant. The cricket came second; his concern was for my well-being.
