'Specially abled children' important human resource component: Himanta

National Health Fest for Divyang children and athletes organised

GUWAHATI, April 7: Chief minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said that 'specially abled children' hold immense potential as the State government has taken several initiatives for their empowerment and uses them as an important component of the state's human resources.

Speaking at a national health fest for Divyang children and athletes on the occasion of Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav- Return to play inclusion revolution here on Thursday, Sarma said that the State government under the Deendayal Divyang Pension Scheme is paying monthly Rs 1000 to more than one lakh beneficiaries.

Under Deendayal Disabled Rehabilitation Scheme, several divyang people have benefited. Moreover, specially abled people were given more than 1.20 lakh UDID cards in the state. Scholarships were given to the specially abled students as well.

The chief minister on the occasion also requested the parents of specially abled children below six years of age with



hearing difficulty to avail the benefits of the State government's special scheme 'Sneha Sparsha' to get free cochlear implant for their kids to lead a normal life.

He also said that Prime Minister Narendra Modi, after coming into power, has been using the term 'Divyangians' for the specially abled people. Sarma added that the specially abled people are

in no way weak as they are indispensable to implement the government's objective of 'inclusive growth'.

Organised by the Special Olympic Bharat, Social Welfare Department, Health and Family Welfare Department, the National Health Fest is an effort to provide consultations on dental health and other health parameters of the people

with intellectual disability. The event was organised in 75 cities across the country with the projected participation of more than 75,000 children and athletes with intellectual disability. In Assam the event organised in Guwahati and Jorhat also provided health consultations and vaccines for Covid 19 pandemic to the specially abled children.

Referring to the success stories of specially abled artists like Sudha Chandran, Rabindra Jain, mountaineer Arunima Sinha, Paralympic medal winners Sumit Antil, Avani Lekhara, Bhavina Patel, etc., Sarma said that the lives and achievements of these personalities are the testimonies of the indomitable power of specially abled people.

Synchronising with the occasion, the chief minister also presented mementos to some specially abled athletes for their stellar performance in some international events including the Olympics.

Pak SC strikes down deputy speaker's decision to reject no-trust motion against Imran Khan

ISLAMABAD, April 7 (PTI): Pakistan's Supreme Court on Thursday struck down National Assembly deputy Speaker Qasim Suri's controversial move to dismiss a no-confidence motion against Prime Minister Imran Khan, in a major blow to the cricketer-turned politician who is now likely to face a no-trust vote in Parliament after the ruling.

Suri, who is associated with Khan's Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf party, on April 3 dismissed the no-confidence motion against the premier claiming that it was linked with a 'foreign conspiracy' to topple the government and hence was not maintainable. Minutes later, President Arif Alvi dissolved the National Assembly on the advice of Prime Minister Khan who had effectively lost the majority.

Chief Justice Bandial, who is heading a five-member bench comprising Justices Ijazul Ahsan, Mohammad Ali Mazhar Miankhal, Munib Akhtar and Jamal Khan Mandokhel, declared as unconstitutional the controversial ruling by the deputy speaker regarding the rejection of the no-confidence motion in Parliament.

In a unanimous verdict, the five-member bench also declared dissolution of the parliament as unconstitutional.

The bench restored the parliament and declared the advice by Prime Minister Khan to President Alvi to dissolve the as-

sembly as unconstitutional.

The court ordered the Speaker to call the session of the assembly on April 9 at 10 am to organise the no-confidence vote.

Security in and around the apex court was beefed up. Riot police forces were deployed outside the court building.

During the hearing, Chief Justice Bandial noted deputy speaker's ruling is, prima facie, a violation of Article 95.

Various lawyers appeared in the court to plead in the complex case. Naem Bokhari represented deputy speaker Suri, Imtiaz Siddiqui appeared for Prime Minister Khan, Ali Zafar represented President Alvi and attorney general Khaled Javed Khan represented the government.

Babar Awan appeared on behalf of the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf party, Raza Rabbani for Pakistan Peoples Party and Makhdoom Ali Khan for Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz.

Apart from leading lawyers representing various parties, the court also called at the rostrum Shehbaz Sharif, Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz president and main Opposition leader, and asked about his view on the way forward in the wake of uncertainty due to dissolution of assembly and announcement of fresh elections. Shehbaz said how the Opposition leaders can take part in the election after being labelled (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

Heroin worth over ₹ 3 crore seized in Morigaon, three held

GUWAHATI, April 7 (PTI): Three persons, including a woman, were arrested in Assam's Morigaon district on Thursday after heroin worth over ₹ 3 crore was seized from their possession, police said. Acting on a tip-off, a police team intercepted a vehicle in the Dantialburi area under Laharighat police station limits and recovered 390 grams of heroin from there, additional superintendent of police Suprotive Lal Baruah said. The drug was being transported in 28 soap boxes, he said. An investigation is underway, the police officer added.

Suspected Maoist cadre held

GUWAHATI, April 7 (IANS): The Assam Police on Thursday arrested a person from the state's Kamrup district for allegedly having links with the Maoists, officials said. The arrest comes just a few days after the National Investigation Agency (NIA) arrested a woman from Dibrugarh district. A police officer said that a Crime Branch team arrested Hriday Kalita from his native village of Chaygaon. He is being questioned by the senior police officers. The police, however, have refused to share further details regarding Kalita's arrest. The NIA had on Sunday conducted searches in 17 different locations in Assam's Cachar, Karimganj, Dibrugarh and Dhubri districts, and also arrested a woman Maoist cadre Reema Orang a.k.a. Saraswati, who has been on the run for a long time. The NIA and the Assam police stepped up its search after the arrest of a Maoist leader Arun Kumar Bhat-tacharjee a.k.a. Kanchan Da, a member of the central committee of CPI (Maoist) last month. The CPI (Maoist) is a banned organisation under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, 1967. Assam chief minister Himanta Biswa Sarma on Wednesday said that Maoists' threat resurfaced in the state leading to the stepped up operations against them by the security agencies.

Ukraine pleads for weapons as fight looms on eastern front

KYIV, April 7 (AP): Ukraine told residents of its industrial heartland to leave while they still can and urged Western nations to send "weapons, weapons and weapons" on Thursday after Russian forces withdrew from the shattered outskirts of Kyiv to regroup for an offensive in the country's east. Russia's six-week-old invasion failed to take Ukraine's capital quickly and achieve what western countries say was President Vladimir Putin's initial aim of ousting the Ukrainian government. Russia's focus is now on the Donbas, a mostly Russian-speaking region in eastern Ukraine.

In Brussels, Ukrainian Foreign minister Dmytro Kuleba urged NATO to provide more weapons



and help his war-torn country prevent further alleged atrocities. Ukrainian authorities are working to identify hundreds of bodies found in Kyiv's northern outskirts after Russian troops withdrew and to document evidence of possible

war crimes. "My agenda is very simple. ... it's weapons, weapons and weapons," Kuleba said as he arrived at NATO headquarters for talks with the military organisation's foreign ministers. "The more weapons we (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

JCCPA fires yet another salvo at APHLC chief

DIPHU, April 7: The Joint Coordination Committee for Protection of Autonomy (JCCPA) condemned the statement of JI Kathar, the president of All Party Hills Leaders Conference (APHLC), showing his willingness to align with a political party.

JCCPA in a press release said that the president of APHL, JI Kathar, in a statement had said that the Autonomous Statement Demand Committee (ASDC) lost its entity as a political party as it has merged with an NGO, the Joint Coordination Committee for Protection of Autonomy (JCCPA); and hence the APHLC has no other regional-based political party to make an alliance with, but subsequently, he said that the APHLC is ready to make an alliance with the ASDC if it separates itself from the NGO.

The JCCPA said, "The ASDC, in a press conference, has made it loud and clear that, unlike the APHLC, it is a registered political party and it has a long history of struggle for the democratic rights of the hill people of Karbi Anglong (East and West) and Dima Hasao. As for the JCCPA, it is not an NGO as such. Being an IAS (Retd) officer, Mr Kathar should have known what NGO means."

JCCPA said Karbi Anglong, West Karbi Anglong and Dima Hasao are three of the nine districts where the AFSPA will remain in force while it has been withdrawn from 23 districts of the State. JCCPA criticised the ruling BJP for the proposal to merge the Class I and II posts of the KAAC into the State cadre saying that it would adversely affect not only the autonomy but also the functioning of the Autonomous Council.

High immune response to Covid variants in breakthrough cases after 2 Covaxin jabs: ICMR study

NEW DELHI, April 7 (PTI): In a recent ICMR study, breakthrough cases after full vaccination with Covaxin have shown a significant increase in the immune response against coronavirus variants of concern - Beta, Delta and Omicron.

Individuals who recovered from Covid also showed significant immunity boost post-vaccination with Covaxin but lower than the breakthrough cases. However, those who had taken two doses of Covaxin had very low neutralizing titres demonstrating the waning immunity after three months of the second dose of Covaxin, the study showed.

"The study highlights the significance of administering a booster dose or precaution dose of Covid vaccine as it provides better protection against the disease," Dr Pragna Yadav, a senior scientist at NIV Pune and the lead investigator of the study, told PTI. The findings of the study, conducted in February this year after isolating the Omicron



variant, were published in the Journal of Infection on April 5.

"The impact of the third wave of the pandemic in India, caused by Omicron, triggered us to study the effectiveness of Covaxin against this variant. "We assessed

the sera of naïve, recovered and breakthrough cases vaccinated with Covaxin for its neutralising ability against Omicron and other variants," she stated.

As part of the study, participants were categorised into three groups - 52 Covid-

19 naïve individuals vaccinated with two doses of Covaxin with an average age of 41.7 years, 31 Covid-19 recovered cases vaccinated with two doses of Covaxin with average age of 41.7 years and 40 breakthrough cases after two-dose vaccination with Covaxin with an average age of 43.7 years.

The sera samples of naïve, recovered and breakthrough cases were collected on average 97, 99 and 110 days, respectively. The breakthrough infection was found to occur on average 43 days after the second vaccination. A majority of the breakthrough cases had mild disease (95%) and two were asymptomatic, while 32.5% had co-morbidities like diabetes, hypothyroidism, hypertension, cardiac arrhythmias and allergic asthma. "Breakthrough cases had the highest neutralising activity against all variants demonstrating a significant increase in the immune response post-infection. Recovered cases also (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

CNG price increased again; 10th hike in a month takes total rise to ₹13.1

NEW DELHI, April 7 (PTI): CNG prices in the national capital on Thursday were hiked by ₹ 2.50 per kilogram - the 10th increase in rates in the last one month.

CNG in the National Capital Territory (NCT) of Delhi now costs ₹ 69.11 per kg, up from ₹ 66.61 per kg, according to the information posted on the website of Indraprastha Gas Ltd (IGL) - the firm which retails CNG and piped cooking gas in the national capital and adjoining cities.

This is the second straight day of increase in price by ₹ 2.50 per litre and the 10th since March 7.

In all, the CNG price has risen by ₹ 13.1 per kg in the last one month. In the last one year, prices have increased by ₹ 25.71 per kg or 60 per cent, according to data compiled by PTI. However, there was no change in the rates of Piped Cooking Gas (PNG) on Thursday. It continues to cost ₹ 41.61 per standard cubic meter.

City gas distributors have been



periodically raising prices since October last year when domestic as well as international gas prices started to climb as economies

world over recovered from the pandemic-induced slowdown.

Prices rose by ₹ 8.74 per kg in the last three months of 2021, and from January there was a steady increase of about 50 paise a kg almost every week. The rates have gone up after the government more than doubled the price of natural gas to USD 6.1 per million British thermal units from April 1. Natural gas when compressed becomes CNG for use as fuel in automobiles. The same gas is also piped to

household kitchens and industries for cooking and other purposes. On Thursday, Mahanagar Gas Limited (MGL) raised Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) price by ₹ 7 per kg to ₹ 67 per kg in Mumbai, while Gujarat Gas hiked rates by ₹ 6.50 per kg to ₹ 76.98 per kg. Prices vary from city to city depending on the incidence of local taxes such as VAT.

The increase in CNG prices follows ₹ 10 per litre hike in petrol and diesel prices in 16 days and a

₹ 50 per cylinder raise in the cooking gas LPG rates. A record 137-day hiatus in petrol and diesel price revision ended on March 22. On the same day, the price of a 14.2-kg LPG cylinder was increased to ₹ 949.50 in the national capital. In some places, the LPG price has touched ₹ 1,000. According to IGL, CNG will now cost ₹ 71.67 per kg in Noida, Greater Noida and Ghaziabad and ₹ 77.44 per kg in Gurugram, the cities adjoining Delhi.

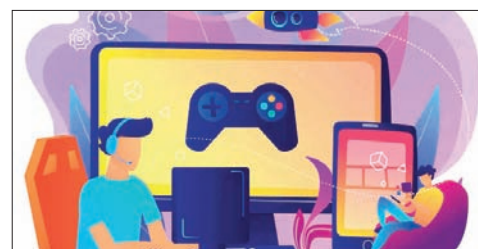

Righteous GST implementation to bolster online skill gaming sector in India



NEW DELHI, April 7 (IANS): With the GST Council expected to meet soon, there has been a lot of conversation around GST restructuring, rate rationalisations, for and against views around minimum thresholds and more. Online skill gaming sector, one of the recognised sunrise sectors which has of late seen a lot of positive feedback from the Centre, has also been waiting to hear on GST for many distinct reasons.

The online skill gaming industry has been on an upward trajectory for the last 4-5 years and the pandemic put this industry growing at the rate of 38 per cent CAGR into the spotlight. As per a recent BCG report, this sunrise sector in India has gained significant momentum with excellent Internet service providers, penetration of the use of mobiles across social and demographic barriers and India's enthusiasm to adopt and adapt to the online gaming platforms. India's share is currently at 1-2 per cent of the global gaming market with a market size of USD 1.8 billion of which Real-Money gaming has the largest constituent of revenue pool driven by higher user paying propensity (around 20 per cent of total market size). The total number of users of gaming services are close to 433 million and is expected to touch 650 million by 2025. However, apart from fine-tuning the regulatory mechanism, there's an urgent need to look at the GST levied on the sector.

Last year on May 24 a Group of Ministers (GoM) formed by the GST council to examine the taxation regime applicable to online gaming was seen as a progressive move, the industry hopes to see a stable and clear taxation regime. However, the committee was dissolved and a new one was formed earlier in February 2022. Currently, services provided by online skill gaming platforms are classified under service accounting code 998439 of the GST services classification and through this attracts a rate of 18 per cent on the Gross Gaming Revenue (GGR) for the service provider whereas, the games of chance (including gambling, casinos and more) are subjected to 28 per cent GST.

The industry operators believe that the legislative view as proven by the jurisprudence in the country multiple times, clearly differentiates games of skill from games of chance and so the taxation levied should continue to take into account this differentiation. Furthermore, international practices related to taxes on gaming have proven that tax-rate shouldn't exceed 20 per cent.

Ukraine pleads for weapons

get and the sooner they arrive in Ukraine, the more human lives will be saved," he said. While NATO is striving to avoid actions that might draw any of its 30 members into a war with Russia, secretary-general Jens Stoltenberg urged nations that belong to the western alliance to send Ukraine more weapons, and not just defensive arms. Western countries have provided Ukraine with portable anti-tank and anti-aircraft weapons, but they have been reluctant to supply aircraft, tanks or any equipment that Ukrainian troops would have to be trained to use. Moscow announced more than a week ago that it planned to concentrate its forces in the east, and they have largely withdrawn from Kyiv and the north. Growing numbers of Putin's troops, along with mercenaries, have been reported moving into the Donbas, where Russia-backed separatists have fought Ukrainian forces for eight years and control some territory. Ukrainian Deputy Prime Minister Iryna Vereshchuk urged civilians to evacuate to safer regions before it was too late. She said Ukrainian and Russian officials agreed to establish 10 civilian evacuation routes on Thursday. The change of Russia's focus brought relief to Chernihiv, a city near Ukraine's northern border with Belarus that was encircled and cut off for weeks.

"Apparently, the naïve cases had very low neutralizing titres against all the variants compared to the recovered and breakthrough cases," Dr Yadav stated. The Omicron variant has shown a pronounced resistance to neutralization with the sera of all the three groups compared to B.1, Beta and Delta variants, she said. Dr Yadav noted that Omicron was less effectively neutralized with the sera of naïve cases (12.9 fold) than recovered (7.98 fold) and breakthrough (8.84 fold) compared to B.1. Although the immune response was less against the Omicron, it would still protect individuals from developing severe disease, hospitalisation and mortality, she added.

Covid is here to stay; but...?

Even as the new Covid-19 infections are declining and countries across the world are withdrawing the curbs they had imposed, including the mandatory requirement of wearing masks and physical distancing, the latest IMF working paper says that the pandemic is not over, and the health and economic losses continue to grow. It is now evident that Covid-19 will be with us for the long term and there are very different scenarios for how it could evolve from a mild endemic scenario to a dangerous variant scenario, the study titled - "A Global Strategy to Manage the Long - Term Risks of Covid-19" has emphasised. This realisation calls for a new strategy that manages both the uncertainty and the long-term risks of Covid-19. There are four key policy implications of such a strategy the authors of the paper have said.

First, we need to achieve equitable access beyond vaccines to encompass a comprehensive toolkit. Second, we must monitor the evolving virus and dynamically upgrade that toolkit. Third, we must transition from the acute response to a sustainable strategy toward Covid-19, balanced and integrated with other health and social priorities. And fourth, we need a unified risk-mitigation approach to future infectious disease threats beyond Covid-19. Infectious diseases with pandemic potential are a threat to global economic and health security; the authors have reminded the world while suggesting that the international community should recognise that its pandemic financing addresses a systemic risk to the global economy, not just the development need for a particular country. Additionally, the paper says, the international community should allocate additional funding to fight pandemics and strengthen health systems both domestically and overseas, which will require about USD 15 billion in grants this year and USD 10 billion annually after that.

More than 6 million people have died according to official estimates. However, other studies have estimated the actual death toll ranging from 16 to 20 million, which is approximately equal to that of World War I. IMF's World Economic Outlook 2022 has projected the cumulative output loss from the pandemic through 2024 to be about USD 13.8 trillion. On tests, the daily target was set at 1 per 1000 people, and about two in three developing economies continue to test below this target despite the Omicron wave. Meanwhile, high-income countries are testing 80 times more than low-income countries. The study foresees at least four possible scenarios in the post-Omicron world, which are based on the conceptualised scenarios of earlier studies published in 2022 by Jeremy Farrar and the WHO. These are "Mild" Endemic, "Injurious" Endemic, "Disruptive" Endemic, and "Dangerous Variant" Scenario. The refreshed ACT Accelerator budget of USD 23.4 billion is a good starting point, the study says, which can be updated as required. However, it mentioned the lack of financing for a balanced and integrated global response. So far only about USD 18.7 billion in grant form for the ACT Accelerator has been raised. The IMF Pandemic Proposal had identified a grant need of USD 35 billion, so a gap of about USD 15 billion remains. Moreover, many hidden scars need to be addressed, because the pandemic has exacerbated inequality, poverty, unemployment, learning poverty, and so on. The world needs a unified approach to the solution to the problem.

'Game changer' Imran Khan is not out yet!

Pakistan's cricket star-turned-politician Imran Khan did not hesitate to admit that the "establishment" (the Pakistan military) gave him three options. The first option was to face a no-confidence vote in parliament. The second one was to dissolve parliament and hold snap elections and the third one was to resign as prime minister and forget about patronage of the military. Khan's party Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) swept into power in 2018, albeit with the blessings of the military, pulling strings to ensure that PTI has 121 seats in the assembly, thus making it a minority government. The military denied the claims of giving Khan three options and backing him in the election, but he successfully dodged the ouster by following one of the three pieces of advice after consulting his cronies and advisers. Pakistan's former celebrity cricketer Wasim Akram wrote on Twitter: "The Game Changer #ImranKhan #Skipper #NotOutYet #Surprise". The tweet of the former captain and international sports commentator has earned 72.3K likes and 10.2K Retweets in a day.

What Akram and other supporters of Khan have not mentioned is that Khan remained loyal to "His Master's Voice" - the military bigwigs who continued to interfere in foreign policy, civil administration and political affairs. For nearly half of the 75 years of Pakistan's birth, the country was ruled by the military which caused immense harm to the national economy, and sustainable development goals, blocking the capacity building of democratic institutions and freedom of expression.

As a result, the news organisations that were critical of the PTI government fell prey to Inter-Services Intelligence, the military's spy agency. The dreaded agency has long been accused of enforced disappearances, extrajudicial killings and torture of journalists in custody, especially in restive Balochistan and Waziristan of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.

Several prominent journalists were killed. Journalists critical of the military establishment were forced to go into exile. The owners of several private news organisations were stopped by the ISI from employing these journalists. The opposition moved to oust Khan accusing him of failing to revive the economy and crackdown on corruption. Now he is blamed for "burning down democratic order" as the minority government dissolved parliament to avoid the vote of no-confidence that he claims is backed by the United States because he visited Moscow on the day Russia launched the invasion of Ukraine. After the chaos in parliament before its dissolution, Pakistan's independent newspaper Dawn in an editorial wrote: "The nation is stunned. Ahead of the vote of no-confidence, the prime minister had repeatedly hinted that he had a 'trump card' up his sleeve. There were indications all along that something might be amiss: even as political pundits and the media confidently predicted Imran Khan's defeat in the vote of no-confidence, he seemed unperturbed. No one could have guessed that his last ploy would involve having the democratic order burnt down by a democratically empowered party." Maleeha Lodhi, a Pakistani diplomat and political scientist wrote in the Dawn: "The Imran Khan government's denouement raises the question of how he ended up facing a vote of no-confidence. Although that parliamentary process was subverted and a constitutional crisis ensued it will still mark an end to his rule. Few governments in Pakistan's recent history began their term with Khan's advantages. He had unqualified support from the military, widespread public goodwill, control of Punjab, a divided and demoralised opposition and a popular yearning for change." The country's political landscape has recently been abuzz with political activity as parties and individuals changed alliances and the PTI and the opposition were seen trading barbs and allegations alongside intensifying efforts to ensure their success in the no-confidence contest. Zaigham Khan, a leading political analyst told Al Jazeera: "[The dissolution is] a blatant violation of the constitution and can lead to a very serious crisis." If the apex court of Pakistan orders the speaker to go ahead with the no-confidence motion, the dissolution of parliament will become invalid, the analyst said. Former Prime Minister Muhammad Khan Junejo appealed to the Supreme Court in 1988 after the assembly had been dissolved by former president General Zia-ul-Haq, who had taken power in a military coup years earlier. The court agreed his government had been dissolved unconstitutionally but ruled that since elections had been announced anyway it was best to move on. The fate of Khan's political future now rests upon the Supreme Court's decision. Although opposition leaders seemed confident to win a vote of no-confidence against Khan, chances are weak to get a proactive verdict. It's highly unlikely the Supreme Court will overrule the decision to hold the vote at all. Public mental health in India: A case of misplaced priorities



In 2017, President Ram Nath Kovind stated that India was facing a "possible mental health epidemic" and asserted the need to provide accessible mental health services by 2022. Almost prophetically in India's Union Budget for financial year [FY] 2022-23, mental health found a rare mention, even if it took us a pandemic to realize its significance. Many experts and stakeholders lauded the move, deeming it "gratifying", "timely" and "much-needed". But are the celebrations premature?

The Budget promises Rs 86,200.45 crores to the health sector for FY 2022-23, which amounts to 2 per cent of the total fiscal outlay. A total of Rs 670 crores is allocated to mental health, which is a 12.5 per cent increase from the previous financial year, although it amounts to only a 0.77 per cent of the total health budget. It is worth noting that 94 per cent of these funds are earmarked for two centrally funded institutes: National Institute of Mental Health and Neuro-Sciences [NIMHANS], Bengaluru (Rs 560 crores) and Lokpriya Gopinath Bordoloi Regional Institute of Mental Health, Tezpur (Rs 70 crores).

Furthermore, Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman explained that "the pandemic accentuated mental health problems in people of all ages" and announced the launch of a National Tele Mental Health programme "to better the access to quality mental health counselling and care services". The creation of a digital ecosystem for healthcare is fast gaining momentum in India's public health policies and programmes. The proposed telemental health programme is in tune with India's Ayushman Bharat Digital Mission [ABDM] launched in September 2021, aiming to provide accessible digital health services to Indians.

With the help of technical support from the Indian Institute of Information Technology-Bengaluru, 23 centres of excellence [CoEs] will be set up, with NIMHANS serving as the nodal centre. However, budget estimates for this new programme have not been disclosed.

The flagship initiative under the proposed programme is the nationwide Tele Mental Health Assistance and Nationally Actionable Plan through States (T-MANAS). A statement issued by NIMHANS detailed the vision of the initiative to ensure a comprehensive continuum of care for people in mental distress by providing immediate intervention and linking to in-person mental health services.

NIMHANS director Dr Prathima Murthy explained that the 23 CoEs are psychiatry departments from different states and union territories handpicked by the union government. These CoEs will essentially look after the running of the helpline in that state/region, including training of counsellors, monitoring and conducting operational research. In a diverse country like India, offering contextualized mental healthcare in local languages is a step in the right direction.

It must be noted that telemental health is a broad term referring to remote delivery of mental health services, including diagnosis, assessment, symptom tracking and treatment, by means of telephone, video calls or mobile-based applications. Its potential advantages include improved access to care for existing users of mental health services in

underserved regions, reduced clinic-related infrastructure costs, and lower perceived stigma attached with visiting a mental health provider. This modality is of value in India, where the treatment gap for various mental disorders ranges from 28 to 83 per cent. The acceptability of such services is also evident in the surge in users resorting to telemental health, especially during the COVID-induced national lockdown. However, a detailed programme implementation plan has not been released yet. Will the helpline offer therapeutic services like counselling and psychotherapy? What are the guidelines to be operationalized for referral-related decision support systems? How will it ensure

compliance in cases which require referral to healthcare facilities? Answers to these questions are crucial in determining effective implementation of the programme.

An abysmal dearth of mental health professionals poses a formidable challenge to the programme. According to the National Mental Health Survey (2016), the number of available psychiatrists in India ranged from 0.05 to 1.2 per lakh population. There is a paucity of clinical psychologists and psychiatric social workers in absolute numbers, and a considerable variation in geographic distribution with a majority of mental health professionals concentrated in cities. In such a scenario, it is imperative to question - who will provide the tele-services? An already overburdened mental health workforce can hardly take on new responsibilities.

To combat this, there are plans to rope in ASHAs [Accredited Social Health Activists], ANMs [Auxiliary Nurse Midwives], and other community health workers in the telemental health programme for early identification of symptoms in rural and remote areas. Whether their responsibility will be restricted to creating awareness about the helpline or providing telecounselling is anyone's guess.

However, involving female frontline workers is an effort doomed to fail. Even before the pandemic, there is evidence to suggest they were overworked and underpaid, in addition to facing challenges like juggling domestic work and poor functionality of healthcare facilities.

A review of telemental health services based largely in the developed world asserts

that outcomes of such services are comparable to in-person care, effective for a range of service-users and mental conditions. When it comes to resource-limited settings like India, however, we may not be able to generalize these findings. While a review of such services in low- and middle-income countries suggests positive outcomes for disorders like Alzheimer's, dementia and depression, the evaluation uses standardized tests developed in the West with limited usage in the Indian context.

India hosts an array of mental health helplines run by state governments, civil society and non-profit organizations. There is a need for robust evaluation of such helplines before rolling out the new programme to ensure provision of evidence-based telemental healthcare.

The success of a telehealth programme is contingent upon a minimum requirement of access to mobile phones. According to data from the National Family Health Survey-5, Indian women's ownership of a personal mobile phone averages at 54 per cent. However, there is a considerable rural-urban divide with only 46.6 per cent of rural women having a mobile phone that they themselves use.

It is safe to say that women from lower-income households are worse-off. To make matters worse, pervasive gender norms also act as barriers to women's engagement with mobile phones. A 2018 study suggests mobile phones are seen as a potential risk to girls' reputation before marriage and as a deterrent to fulfilment of domestic caregiving 'duties' after marriage. This renders women's mobile phone usage vulnerable to constant surveillance by male relatives.

Yet another consideration is the protection of data privacy of the telemental health service users. Stigma related to mental health conditions and associated treatment seeking is widespread in India, and particularly greater when it comes to women. It serves as a major barrier to utilization of mental health services, and justifies all fears relating to breach of privacy. As seen in the case of antiretroviral treatment for HIV [human immunodeficiency virus], mandating personal identifiers like Aadhar for telemental health services could lead to a drop in enrolment and service utilization.

Transgender persons, on the other hand, face a double whammy of the lack of valid documents needed to access public services as well as the absence of an effective legal framework to protect them from discrimina-

tion in case of any lapse in confidentiality. It is imperative to iron out the details of mental health data privacy in order to ensure their safe access to such tele-services.

India launched the National Mental Health Program [NMHP] in 1982 with an overarching goal of providing mental health care by utilizing the existing public health infrastructure. In order to scale this up, India inaugurated the District Mental Health Programme [DMHP] in 1996, decentralizing programme administration and implementation to the district-level. The main components of the programme include district-level activities like community engagement and outreach, and tertiary-care activities (Scheme A and B) like developing centres of excellence and institutional training of postgraduate students.

A paltry Rs 40 crores (or six per cent) of the total mental health budget are allocated to the NMHP, which only includes the tertiary-level Schemes A and B. This amount has remained unchanged from budget estimates from 2019. Furthermore, funds for the DMHP, the main service delivery component of the NMHP, are allocated through the flexible pool of non-communicable disease. In the absence of a clearly defined line-item for DMHP in the budget documents, the exact budget estimates cannot be ascertained.

Mental health does not operate in a social vacuum. Addressing social determinants of mental health like poverty, education and living conditions in our programs are just as essential as strengthening mental healthcare service delivery. The National Mental Health Policy (2014) enshrines principles of community mental health including mental health promotion, community engagement and intersectoral collaborations.

The utility of community-based interventions through NGO-led projects like Atmiyata and Vishram, in improving mental health literacy, facilitating access to social welfare benefits, and reducing emotional distress and anxiety is well documented. However, the Union Budget offers little hope in giving fillip to such community-based interventions.

While technology undoubtedly offers a huge window of opportunity in improving public mental health, it must be accompanied by concurrent developments in the existing mental health infrastructure. Focusing on training primary care physicians in basic mental healthcare and creating a cadre of community mental health workers alone can ensure effective integration of mental health services in primary care. Efforts should be also directed to creating awareness about recognition of signs of distress, suicide prevention and availability of mental health services in order to ensure uptake of the services.

In the context of the telemental health, it is crucial to build a diverse referral network, provide continued support, training the counsellors in comprehensive care, and being transparent about data collection and usage, in order to gain public confidence in the programme. The government should actively engage with other stakeholders working in this space and establish robust monitoring and evaluation mechanisms for future course corrections and improvements.

Any laxity in these efforts will possibly relegate the upcoming programme to just another helpline, in an ocean of many. (IPA Service)

Football World Cup Qatar puts its best foot forward

This is Qatar's year to put its best foot forward. A major producer of natural gas, the tiny Gulf state is under the magnifying glass as it enters the final phase of hosting the 2022 World Cup later this year and emerges as a potential part of efforts to reduce European dependence on Russian energy.

On balance, Qatar looks like it has already succeeded, as much on its own steam as with the help of its erstwhile detractors in the Gulf and elsewhere in the Arab world, including the United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia.

Over the past decade, much of the attention has focused on labour rights in the Gulf state as a result of world governing soccer body FIFA's awarding of the 2022 World Cup hosting rights to Qatar in 2010. Qatar remains a target of criticism by human rights groups, despite implementing far-reaching reforms of its kafala or labour sponsorship system that long put workers at the mercy of their employers. The criticism is rooted in the Gulf state's weak implementation of the reforms; a problematic judicial system; a top-down, centralised decision-making process; and poor handling of World Cup and sports-related incidents.

In the latest incident, The Guardian newspaper, a pillar of critical coverage of the Qatari World Cup, reported that migrant workers, a majority of the population, had collectively paid billions of dollars in illegal recruitment fees over the last decade. Qatar outlawed burdening migrant workers with recruit-

ment fees as part of its reforms.

Qatar opened recruitment centres in eight labour-supplying countries to ensure that recruitment would meet ethical standards in line with recommendations made by a Qatar Foundation study. The centres have reduced the risk of employment terms in workers' contracts being unilaterally changed but have been unable to curb the levelling of recruitment fees.

To compensate for their inability, the Supreme Committee for Delivery & Legacy, the Qatari organizer of the World Cup, has obliged companies to contracts to repay the fees without workers having to provide proof of payment. Companies have so far pledged to repay roughly USD\$28.5 million to some 49,000 workers, \$22 million of which have already been paid out.

It is a step the government could apply nationally with relative ease in an effort to demonstrate sincerity and, more fundamentally, counter the criticism. Similarly, in response to complaints raised by human rights groups and others, the government could also offer to compensate families of workers who die on construction sites. None of these measures would put a dent in Qatari budgets but would earn the Gulf state immeasurable goodwill.

"The migrant workers injured or families of those who died in the build-up to the World Cup should be cared for," said Lise Klaveness, the newly-elected president of the Norwegian Football Federation, at this week's FIFA Congress in Doha. Klaveness' stirring speech drew a fiery response from Supreme Committee secretary-general Hassan Al-

Thawadi. "We're not seeking validation. Legacy is being delivered as we speak. We've showcased to the world what tournament hosting can do," Al-Thawadi said.

Nevertheless, Qatar hasn't done itself any favours with its handling of the case of Abdullah Ibhais, a Jordanian-Palestinian Supreme Committee communications executive, who opposed putting a spin on a strike by migrant workers, including some assigned to World Cup-related projects. The workers were on strike because their salaries had not been paid. Ibhais was subsequently accused of leaking state secrets and awarded a social media tender to a Turkish bidder in return for Turkish citizenship. He asserts that he was forced to sign a confession and was initially refused access to a lawyer.

Ibhais was sentenced to five years in prison based on evidence that, according to Human Rights Watch, was "vague, circumstantial, and in some cases contradictory." However, an appeals court subsequently reduced his sentence to three years in jail.

In a statement, the Supreme Committee insisted that the allegations against Ibhais had "merit. The committee contended that the assertion that the charges constitute retribution for "raising matters pertaining to workers' welfare is absolutely false."

In contrast to recurring rights issues that cast a shadow over the Qatari World Cup, Qatar garnered substantial goodwill during the 3.5-year-long United Arab Emirates-Saudi-led diplomatic and economic boycott designed to force the Gulf state to subordinate itself to the will of

its detractors.

Perceived as the underdog confronted with demands that would have de facto deprived it of its independence, Qatar was lauded for its resilience and steadfastness that ultimately persuaded the UAE and Saudi Arabia to end the boycott in January 2021.

Since then, Qatar was awarded for its key role in assisting the United States in its bungled withdrawal from Afghanistan with the US nominating it as a 'Major Non-NATO Ally.'

Qatar is the only Gulf state to enjoy that status. It ranks Qatar among the United States' closest allies alongside Australia and Japan and opens the door to more joint military exercises and potential arms sales.

The nomination takes on added significance at a time that Gulf States worry about United States efforts to rejigger and reduce its secu-

rency commitments in the region and strike a deal with Iran on reviving the 2015 nuclear agreement that curbed the Islamic republic's nuclear program.

The deal would lift many US sanctions against Iran and return it to the international fold without addressing Iran's ballistic missiles program and support for militias in Lebanon, Iraq, and Yemen - issues that are major concerns for Saudi Arabia, the UAE, and Israel.

Nevertheless, human rights groups will view the final stretch to the World Cup scheduled for the end of the year as an opportunity to increase pressure on the Gulf state to address their remaining concerns.

The final stretch is not only an opportunity for activists. It also is an opportunity for Qatar to put its best foot forward on labour issues that it already acknowledges and has made significant strides in addressing. (IPA Service)



Sri Lanka is facing its worst economic crisis since gaining independence from the UK in 1948 Lanka appoints advisory panel to help resolve growing debt crisis, engage with IMF

COLOMBO, April 7 (PTI): The Sri Lankan government has appointed an advisory committee comprising eminent economic and fiscal experts to provide guidance on addressing the current debt crisis and engaging with the IMF and other lenders as the country struggles to combat the unprecedented shortage of foreign reserves.

The Presidential Advisory Group on Multilateral Engagement and Debt Sustainability includes Indrajit Coomaraswamy, former governor of the Central Bank of Sri Lanka and former director of the Economic Affairs Division of the Commonwealth Secretariat, according to a statement issued by the President Media Division on Wednesday.

The other members are Shanta Devarajan, Professor of the Practice of Development, Georgetown University and former chief econ-

omist of World Bank; and Sharmine Coorey, former director of the Institute of Capacity Development of the IMF Institute, and former deputy director of the Africa Department, IMF.

"Among the responsibilities that the Presidential Advisory Group will undertake are to engage in discussions with relevant Sri Lankan institutions and officials engaging with the IMF, and to provide guidance that will address the present debt crisis and lead towards sustainable and inclusive recovery for Sri Lanka," the statement said. Rajapaksa is yet to appoint a new minister of finance. The country's Finance Minister Ali Sabry on Tuesday resigned, a day after President Gotabaya Rajapaksa appointed him after sacking his brother Basil Rajapaksa amidst the island nation's worst economic crisis.

Basil Rajapaksa was fired as he



was planning to visit Washington to hold negotiations with the International Monetary Fund (IMF).

A government parliamentary group met with Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa on Wednesday

to discuss urgent steps that must be taken to improve the situation so that citizens would no longer need to stand in long queues for fuel, gas and essentials, Shehan Semasinghe, a state minister, said.

He asserted that the government has not lost its parliamentary majority despite 42 of its members saying they would remain independent of the ruling SLPP coalition in parliament. "Our majority is solid," Semasinghe said.

Speaking in Parliament on Wednesday, Chief Government Whip Johnston Fernando said the government will face this problem and there is no reason for President Gotabaya Rajapaksa to resign as he was elected to office.

"As a responsible Government, we state that President Gotabaya Rajapaksa will not resign from his post under any circumstances," Fernando said.

Sri Lankans have protested for weeks over lengthy power cuts and shortages of gas, food and other basic goods. The public anger has prompted nearly all Cabinet ministers to quit, and scores of lawmakers

to leave Rajapaksa's government.

Meanwhile, police said they are planning to deploy a special security arrangement for key locations such as the President's House, Presidential Secretariat, Prime minister's residence-cum-office and Parliament in view of the growing public protests over the country's worst economic crisis.

Sri Lanka is facing its worst economic crisis since gaining independence from the UK in 1948.

An Indian credit line in a special economic relief package has only provided a temporary solution.

India had recently announced to extend a USD 1 billion line of credit to Sri Lanka as part of its financial assistance to the country to deal with the economic crisis following a previous USD 500 billion line of credit in February to help it purchase petroleum products.

UK to build 8 nuclear reactors amid new energy strategy

LONDON, April 7 (AP): Britain plans to build eight new nuclear reactors and expand production of wind energy as it seeks to reduce dependence on oil and natural gas from Russia and other foreign suppliers following the invasion of Ukraine.

Prime Minister Boris Johnson announced the plans Thursday as part of a new energy security strategy that will also accelerate development of solar power and hydrogen projects. The government said it wants to almost triple nuclear power generation capacity to 24 gigawatts by 2050.

"We're setting out bold plans to scale up and accelerate affordable, clean and secure energy made in Britain, for Britain, from new nuclear to offshore wind, in the decade ahead," Johnson said. "This will reduce our dependence on power sources exposed to volatile international prices we cannot control."

China successfully launches new satellite for Earth observation

BEIJING, April 7 (PTI): China on Thursday successfully launched a new Earth observation satellite which will become part of its land-sea radar satellite constellation and capture fine-resolution images to help Beijing safeguard its maritime rights and interests.

The satellite Gaofen-3 03 was launched from Jiuquan Satellite Launch Centre by a Long March-4C rocket and has entered the planned orbit successfully.

The satellite will be networked with the orbiting Gaofen-3 and Gaofen-3 02 satellites to form a land-sea radar satellite constellation and capture reliable, stable synthetic aperture radar (SAR) images.

Earth Observation (EO) satellites produce a large number of SAR images every day. SAR images have attracted much attention due to their all-weather operation, high spatial resolution, and recent improvements in processing these images.

Yoon vows to strengthen deterrence against N Korea's nuclear, missile threats

SEOUL, April 7 (IANS): President-elect Yoon Suk-yeol vowed on Thursday to strengthen deterrence against North Korea's nuclear and missile threats during a visit to a US military base, his spokesperson said.

Yoon flew by helicopter to Camp Humphreys in Pyeongtaek, 70 km south of Seoul, amid heightened tensions in the wake of North Korea's test-firing of an intercontinental ballistic missile last month and concerns that Pyeongyang could carry out a nuclear test, Yonhap news agency reported.

"Strong deterrence through the Korea-US military alliance and combined defence posture cannot be emphasised enough in a grave international security situation surrounding the Korean Peninsula, including North Korea's ICBM launch," Yoon was quoted as saying by spokesperson Bae Hyun-jin.

Bae said Yoon "stated his determination to further increase the solidarity of the South Korea-US alliance and strengthen deterrence and the response posture against North Korea's nuclear and missile threats."

The base, located some 70 km south of Seoul, serves as the headquarters of the 28,500-strong US Forces Korea (USFK) and the US-led UN Command.

During the visit, Yoon met Gen Paul LaCamera, commander of USFK and the South Korea-US Combined Forces Command (CFC), as well as Deputy CFC Commander Gen Kim Seung-kyum.

"The freedom and prosperity the Republic of Korea enjoys today were made possible by the dedication and sacrifice of the numerous soldiers gone before us," he said as he thanked the troops under LaCamera's command.

LaCamera responded that it would be a dereliction of duty to not do everything to bring stability to the Korean Peninsula, Bae said. He emphasised the importance of the "iron-clad alliance" and thanked the South Korean people for making the construction of the base possible.

The CFC is currently in the process of relocating to Camp Humphreys from Yongsan in Seoul, the same area that Yoon is pushing to move the presidential office to.

Past presidents-elect, including Park Geun-hye, Lee Myung-bak and Roh Moo-hyun, visited the CFC in Yongsan but not the base in Pyeongtaek.

Yoon called Camp Humphreys the "heart of the South Korea-US military alliance" and noted that it was his first visit to a military base since his election.

After touring the facilities, he shared a meal with South Korean and American troops at the canteen and took photos with them before returning to Seoul Air Base, just south of the capital, Bae said.

In a press release later, the USFK said Gen LaCamera provided Yoon with an overview of his commands' "ironclad" commitment to strengthening the bilateral alliance and providing a "robust" combined defence posture for peace on the Korean Peninsula. It also noted Yoon conversed with American and South Korean troops about their responsibility to defend South Korea "against any threat or adversary."

On his way to the base, the spokesperson said Yoon got an aerial view of the Samsung semiconductor plant in Pyeongtaek and took special interest in its vast facilities, saying he will push to elevate the country's high-tech industries to a world-class level.

Turkey suspends trial of Saudi suspects in Khashoggi killing

ISTANBUL, April 7 (AP): A Turkish court ruled Thursday to suspend the trial in absentia of 26 Saudis accused in the gruesome killing of Washington Post columnist Jamal Khashoggi and for the case to be transferred to Saudi Arabia.



Kaghoggi, a United States resident who wrote critically about Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, was killed on Oct. 2, 2018, at the Saudi Consulate in Istanbul. He had gone into the consulate for an appointment to collect documents required for him to marry his Turkish fiancée, Hatice Cengiz. He never emerged from the building.

Turkish officials alleged that Khashoggi was killed and then dismembered with a bone saw inside the consulate by a team of Saudi agents sent to Istanbul. The group included a forensic doctor, intelligence and security officers and individuals who worked for the crown prince's office. His remains have not been found.

The Istanbul court's decision comes despite warnings from human rights groups that turning the case over to the kingdom would lead to a cover up of the killing, which has cast suspicion on the crown prince.

It also comes as Turkey, which is in a deep economic downturn, has been trying to repair its troubled relationship with Saudi Arabia and an array of other countries in its region. Some

media reports have claimed that Riyadh has made improved relations conditional on Turkey dropping the case, which had inflamed tensions between two countries.

The move would pave the way to a resolution of disputes between the two regional heavyweights since the 2011 Arab Spring, including Turkey's support for Islamist movements like the Muslim Brotherhood, which Riyadh considers a terrorist group. Turkey also sided with Qatar in a diplomatic dispute that saw Doha boycotted by Bahrain, Egypt, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates.

Last week, the prosecutor in the case recommended that it be transferred to the kingdom, arguing that the trial in Turkey would remain inconclusive. Turkey's justice minister sup-

ported the recommendation, adding that the trial in Turkey would resume if the Turkish court is not satisfied with the outcome of proceedings in the kingdom. It was not clear, however, if Saudi Arabia, which has already put some of the defendants on trial behind closed doors, would open a new trial.

During Thursday's hearing, lawyers representing Cengiz asked the court not to move the proceedings to Saudi Arabia, the private DHA news agency reported.

"Let's not entrust the lamb to the wolf," the agency quoted lawyer Ali Ceylan as telling the court, using a Turkish saying. "Let's protect the honor and dignity of the Turkish nation." The court however, ruled to halt the trial in line with the Justice Ministry's "positive opinion," DHA reported. It also decided to lift arrest warrants issued against the defendants and gave the sides seven days to lodge any opposition.

There was no immediate reaction from Saudi Arabia to the court's decision.

Human rights advocates had also urged Turkey not to transfer the case to Saudi Arabia, arguing that justice for Khashoggi would not be delivered by Saudi courts.

At the time of the crime, Turkey apparently had the Saudi Consulate bugged and shared audio of the killing with the CIA, among others.

China protests to US over Pelosi's planned visit to Taiwan, warns strong measures Yemen's president steps aside amid efforts to end war

BEIJING, April 7 (PTI): China on Thursday lodged a diplomatic protest with the US and delivered a stern warning that it will take "strong measures" if US House of Representatives Speaker Nancy Pelosi visited Taiwan, saying such a visit would severely impact Beijing-Washington ties.

"China firmly opposes" Pelosi's planned visit and has lodged solemn representation with the US side, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Zhao Lijian told a media briefing here answering questions on her planned trip.



"Immediately cancel Nancy Pelosi's plan to visit Taiwan. Stop official interactions with Taiwan and fulfil its commitment to not supporting Taiwan independence forces," Zhao said.

"If the US insists on having its own way, China will take strong measures in response to defend national sovereignty and territorial integrity," he said.

"All possible consequences arising out of this will be completely borne by the US side," he said, when asked to outline strong measures.

"I just made our position clear. If she does make the visit, China

will take strong measures and the consequences will be borne by the US side," he said.

Stressing that China will take resolute and forceful measures to firmly defend national sovereignty and territorial integrity, Zhao warned that the consequences of any visit will be borne by the US.

China claims self-ruled Taiwan as part of its mainland and vows to integrate it. Beijing in recent months ratcheted up its military activities around Taiwan amid assertion by the Taiwanese politicians that China could attempt

action similar to that of Russia's military invasion of Ukraine.

Reports from the US said that Pelosi plans to visit Taiwan on Sunday after a trip to Japan. This will be the first visit by a US official holding a high office to Taiwan in 25 years.

Also Sunday marks the 43rd anniversary of the US-Taiwan Relations Act, which outlines America's commitment to defend Taiwan, though Washington is committed to maintaining One-China policy.

Zhao said China firmly opposes all forms of official interactions between the US and Taiwan.

"The US Congress is part of the US government. It should follow the One-China policy of the US government. If speaker Nancy Pelosi visits Taiwan it will severely violate 'One China principle' as stipulated in the three joint communique between the two countries," he said.

"It gravely undermines China's sovereignty, territorial integrity and seriously impacts the political foundation of China-US relations," Zhao said, adding that "it will also send a very wrong signal to the Taiwan independence forces".

SANAA, April 7 (AP): Yemen's exiled president stepped aside and transferred his powers to a presidential council on Thursday, as international and regional efforts to end the country's long-running civil war gained momentum with a two-month truce.

Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates, major players in the conflict appear to have played a role in President Abed Rabbo Mansour Hadi's decision, quickly welcoming it with a pledge of \$3 billion in aid. The head of the new council has close ties to Riyadh.

Whether the switch will expedite an end to the grinding war remains to be seen, as UN-sponsored negotiations have been at an impasse and fighting, airstrikes and missile attacks continued until late last month. The Houthis did not immediately comment on Hadi's announcement.

Peter Salisbury, Yemen expert at the International Crisis Group, described the power transfer as "A Big Deal". The development, he tweeted, is the "most consequential shift in the inner workings of the anti-Houthi bloc since war began".

Hadi, 76, said the newly established council will run the internationally recognised government and lead negotiations with the Iranian-backed Houthis, according to a statement aired on state-run media.

The move is meant to unify the anti-Houthi camp after years of infighting and disputes, and was almost certainly orchestrated in Riyadh, where Yemeni factions were meeting over the past week to discuss efforts to end the war.

"With this declaration a Presidential Leadership Council shall be established to complete the implementation of the tasks of the transitional period. I irrevocably delegate to the Presidential Leadership Council my full powers," Hadi declared on Yemen's state-run TV. Hadi also sacked Vice President Ali Mohsen al-Ahmar, a powerful military figure, and also delegated al-Ahmar's powers to the presidential council.

The presidential council is chaired by Rashad al-Alimi, an advisor to Hadi and former interior minister with the government of late strongman President Ali Abdullah Saleh.



Japan and Singapore continue to share the number one spot in the ranking Pakistan's passport again 4th worst in world

LAHORE, April 7 (IANS): Pakistan's passport has been again ranked the fourth worst in the world by the Henley Passport Index, which grades travel documents from different countries on the basis of international mobility enjoyed by their holders, Express Tribune reported.

According to the index, Pakistan is placed on the 109th position on the list, with visa-free access to only 31 destinations across the world. Only three other countries' passports rank lower than Pakistan's in the world which includes Syria, Iraq and Afghanistan.

Meanwhile, there was little change in the top 10 most powerful passports compared to the last ranking. Japan and Singapore continue to share the number one spot in the ranking, with passport holders from both countries able to access 192 destinations around the world visa-free, the report said.



The ranking also reveals that Ukraine has a visa-free/visa-on-arrival score of 143, a 'record high' for the country, and now ranks in 34th place, climbing up one spot since January. Russia trails behind in 49th place, with a score of 117, falling from 46th place, which it held earlier this year.

Meanwhile, the UK passport has climbed the ranks from 6th place to 5th with a visa-free score of 187, while the US passport is one step behind in 6th place with a score of 186. Afghanistan remains at the bottom of the ranking with its nationals only able to access 26 destinations visa-free.

Shanghai wrestles with food shortages under virus shutdown

BEIJING, April 7 (AP): Residents of Shanghai are struggling to get meat, rice and other food supplies under anti-coronavirus controls that confine most of its 25 million people in their homes, fuelling frustration as the government tries to contain a spreading outbreak.

People in China's business capital complain that online grocers often are sold out. Some received government food packages meat and vegetables for a few days. But with no word on when they will be allowed out, anxiety is rising.

Zhang Yu, 33, said her household of eight eats three meals a day but has cut back to noodles for lunch. They got no government supplies.

"It's not easy to keep this up," said Zhang, who starts shopping online at 7 a.m. "We read on the news there is (food), but we just can't buy it," she said. "As soon as you go to the grocery shopping app, it says today's orders are filled."

The complaints are an embarrassment for the ruling Communist Party during a politically sensitive year when President Xi Jinping is expected to try to break with tradition and award himself a third five-year term as leader.

Shanghai highlights the soaring human and economic cost of China's "zero-COVID" strategy that aims to isolate every infected person.

On Thursday, the government reported 23,107 new cases nationwide, all but 1,323 of



which had no symptoms. That included 19,989 in Shanghai, where only 329 had symptoms.

Complaints about food shortages began after Shanghai closed segments of the city on March 28.

Plans called for four-day closures of districts while residents were tested. That changed to an indefinite citywide shutdown after case numbers soared. Shoppers who got little warning stripped supermarket shelves.

City officials apologized publicly last week and promised to improve food supplies.

Officials say Shanghai, home of the world's busiest port and China's main stock exchange, has enough food. But a deputy mayor, Chen Tong, acknowledged Thursday getting it the "last 100 meters" to households is a challenge.

"Shanghai's battle against the epidemic has reached the most critical moment," Chen said at a news conference, according to state media. He said officials "must go all out to get living

supplies to the city's 25 million people."

At the same event, a vice president of Meituan, China's biggest food delivery platform, blamed a shortage of staff and vehicles, according to a transcript released by the company. The executive, Mao Fang, said Meituan has moved automated delivery vehicles and nearly 1,000 extra employees to Shanghai.

Another online grocer, Dingdong Maicai, said it shifted 500 employees in Shanghai from other posts to making deliveries.

Li Xiaoliang, an employee of a courier company, complained the government overlooks people living in hotels. He said he is sharing a room with two coworkers after positive cases were found near his rented house.

Li, 30, said they brought instant noodles but those ran out. Now, they eat one meal a day of 40 yuan (\$6) lunch boxes ordered at the front desk, but the vendor sometimes doesn't deliver. On Thursday, Li said he had only water all day.

The local government office "clearly said that they didn't care about those staying in the hotel and left us to find our own way," Li said. "What we need most now is supplies, food."

After residents of a Shanghai apartment complex stood on their balconies to sing this week in a possible protest, a drone flew overhead and broadcast the message: "Control the soul's desire for freedom and do not open the window to sing. This behaviour has the risk of spreading the epidemic."

'ALL THE OLD KNIVES' Masterfully plotted, complex, and immersive slow burn

From its tense opening to its edgy end, 'All The Old Knives' is a film that captivates the viewer. Masterfully plotted, director Janus Metz Pedersen manages to create a patient thriller from Olen Steinhauser's screenplay, which is adapted from the novel of the same name, authored by Steinhauser.

The film stars Chris Pine as Henry Pelham and Thandiwe Newton as Celia Harrison, both CIA officers and star-crossed lovers whose relationship was shattered by a terrorist hijacking that occurred eight years earlier.

Henry travels from Vienna to

Carmel-by-the-Sea, California, to meet Celia, where she now resides with a husband and two children. The two of them meet over dinner as Henry, who is still stationed at the CIA office in Vienna, learnt from Ilyas Shishani (Orli Shuka), one of his contacts, who confessed before his death that the hijackers of the ill-fated Flight Turkish Airline 127 were successful because of a mole in the CIA. Still reeling under this high-profile incident, Pelham's boss Vick Wallinger (Laurence Fishburne), keen on discovering who the mole was, assigns Pelham to check on retired Bill Compton (Jonathan



Pryce), who now lives in London, and Celia Harrison, who after the Austrian debacle, decided she's had enough and left the agency to settle down to live an ordinary life in California. Narrated in a non-linear manner, the plot unravels at a slow pace, in an unusual fashion, around the dining table where Henry is eager to clear her name but perhaps more intensely interested in discovering why she had left him behind in Austria.

The film expertly

manipulates the mood and atmosphere by juxtaposing scenes from the past with those in the present.

Pine and Newton are compelling actors and share great on-screen chemistry, albeit one potentially born out of lust, but it is strong enough for the viewers to wonder alongside Henry why exactly did she run and run so far away. Since the narrative revolves around the duo,

the rest of the supporting cast hardly has any scope to display their performances.

On the visual front, DOP Charlotte Bruus Christensen's frames are impressive. She combines her skill sets and palettes intriguingly and solidifies two distinct vibes across the film's timelines. The visuals and the soundtrack are meshed effortlessly by Mark Eckersley's astute editing. Overall, the film is a fascinating slow-burn, complex and immersive. IANS

The

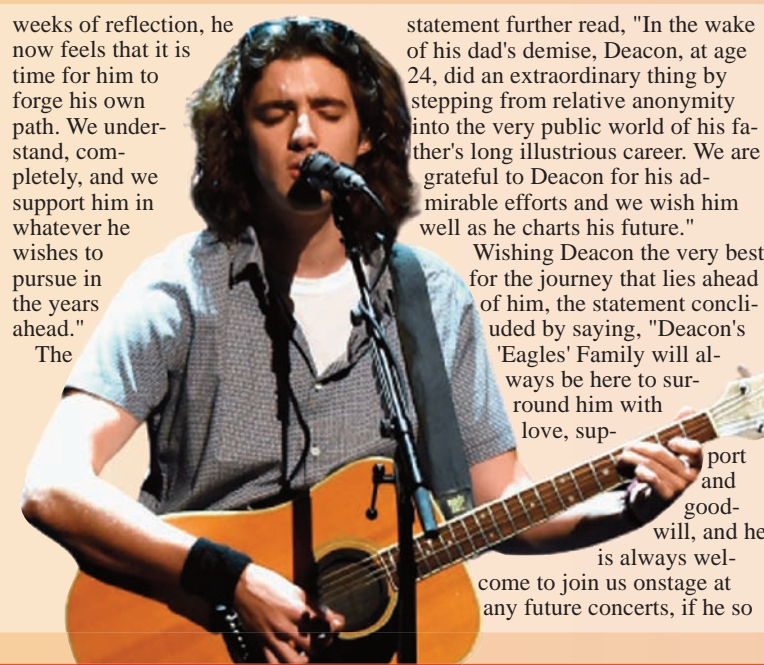

But before getting locked up in judicial custody, he relinquishes his position in favour of his wife, Bimla Devi (Nimrat Kaur), and remote controls the state from behind the bars.

In prison, he is pampered by his sycophants till the arrival of super inspector, Jyoti Deswal (Yami Gautam), who insists that one should be assigned work according to one's level of education.

Since Ganga Ram Chaudhary is only eighth-passed, he is eligi-

ble to work as a gardener, carpenter, or any other menial work. But being the CM and a man of clout, his pride is injured.

He tries seeking his wife's help to get Inspector Jyoti transferred, but she blatantly refuses, citing a perception issue.

When he learns that prisoners who study are exempted from working in prisons, he contemplates appearing for the Secondary School Certificate exam, which is the tenth standard or "Dasvi" in Hindi.

But when he realises that education empowers you, he takes up the challenge, and how with the help of other inmates, he works towards studying for the exam forms the crux of the narra-

tive. Being a satire, the writers have crafted a vitreous cocktail of naked ambition and blustery bravado with a distinctly bitter aftertaste. On the face of it, you chuckle constantly, but subconsciously you realise the sad state of affairs that prevails. While the writing is good in parts, it is also the weakest element of the film as the narrative lacks chutzpah.

On the performance front, the film is an outright Abhishek Bachchan canvas. He plays the big-headed, self-important politician who mellows with time to perfection. He is aptly supported by Nimrat Kaur as his timid wife, who suddenly tastes power, and faster than a chameleon changes its colour, she transforms herself

into a bumbling shrewd character who lacks any real conviction other than a desire for power and position.

Coming to Yami Gautam as the super-strict police inspector, despite delivering a competent performance, she does not have the persona to play such a character she seems to be a misfit in the film, and the makers of the film are solely to be blamed for it.

The rest of the supporting cast are flat stock characters who have their moments of limited on-screen glory.

The music and songs in the film appear of mediocre quality with oft-heard tunes.

Overall, the film is fairly entertaining and engaging.



Seven ISL clubs confirm to participate in new football league

MUMBAI, April 7 (IANS): Seven clubs from the Indian Super League (ISL) will vie for top honour in the inaugural Reliance Foundation Development League (RFDL) in Goa, scheduled to be held from April 15 to May 12, it was announced today.

Seven clubs, Bengaluru FC, Chennaiyin FC, FC Goa, Jamshedpur FC, Kerala Blasters FC, Mumbai City FC and Hyderabad FC, will be joined by a team from the Reliance Foundation Young

Champs (RFYC) in the new football league.

The ISL clubs have confirmed their participation for this first of its kind initiative in India that will provide a unique opportunity for emerging players to compete against the best talent in their age group from across the country.

The added bonus for teams that finish in the top two at the end of the league will be given the chance to participate at the Next Gen Cup to be hosted in the United Kingdom for the

first time later this year.

The Next Gen Cup will be hosted by the Premier League (PL) as part of its longstanding partnership with the ISL to support the development of football in India.

The top two teams from the RF Development League will be joined by selected PL Club youth teams, providing Indian players the chance to experience playing in the UK and competing against academy sides from the most watched football league in the world.

The PL and its clubs will also provide digital knowledge sharing workshops to best support the ISL clubs involved.

Speaking on the development, Nita M. Ambani, Founder and Chairperson, Reliance Foundation, said, "I am thrilled about this unique opportunity that the Reliance Foundation Development League will offer to young players across the country. They are the future of Indian football, and I am convinced that providing them the plat-

form to play against the best players in their age group will help them grow.

This league is yet another step towards creating a world-class ecosystem to develop the tremendous potential for football in India.

As we emerge from the pandemic, I am sure the youngsters will cherish the chance to get back on the field and show us their talent."

Players born on or after January 1, 2001 will be eligible to participate in the league but

each team has been granted permission to include up to 5 players born on or after January 1, 1999 in their squads. No more than three such players will be permitted to be part of the playing XI at all times.

Each club can travel to Goa with a maximum of 24 players but no foreign nationals can be included in their squads.

The Reliance Foundation Development League will be played on a single round robin basis, allowing each team to feature in seven matches. To

ensure playing standards are maintained, the schedule will permit two full days of rest between games and a four day window of no matches halfway through the competition.

The matches will be played at two grounds in South Goa, with three training grounds available to the teams to prepare for their encounters.

The teams are expected to arrive in Goa by April 12 and train for the next two days before the tournament commences.

REAL MADRID STUN CHELSEA WITH 3-1 WIN

LONDON, April 7 (IANS): Real Madrid have one foot in the door of the UEFA Champions League semifinal after Karim Benzema, with a stunning hat-trick, bullied Chelsea 3-1 here on Thursday.

Benzema opened the scoring in the 21st minute as he got a great cross from Vinicius and headed it into the back of the net to give the visitors a 1-0 lead at Stamford Bridge.

Three minutes later he did it again as this time it was Luka Modric with a super service to Benzema who again managed to head the ball into the net to double Real Madrid's lead.

In the 30th minute it was Militao again off a Toni Kroos corner but this time his header went right into the hands of Mendy. Chelsea reduced Madrid's lead to one as Kai Havertz in the 40th minute was able to head one in past Courtois.

Kai Havertz dragged Chelsea back into the contest from nowhere before half-time, but the luckless Edouard Mendy gifted Benzema his hat-trick goal with an under-sold pass.

A minute into the second-half Real Madrid regained its two-goal lead as Benzema was able to intercept a weak pass from Mendy the keeper who was out of his net and managed to shoot the ball into the empty cage.

The prolific striker moved his competition goal return to 13 in just seven matches. Benzema took his season's tally to 37 goals in 36 matches for Real, handing his side a major chance of making the semifinals in their bid to land a 14th Champions League



title.

The final whistle blew after five minutes of added time and Real Madrid had pulled off an impressive win on the road thanks to another hat-trick from their star striker Karim Benzema.

After watching his side fall to a 3-1 defeat in the Champions League, Chelsea coach Thomas Tuchel reflected on a below-par performance from his side.

"It is a heavy loss. It was one of the worst first halves that I saw from us here at Stamford Bridge. At this kind of level you cannot play like this individually or as a team," Tuchel told to Chelsea official website.

"From all of us, we were by far not good enough; we were not doing what we are used to doing. The first half was so far from any standards that we set ourselves," he said.

Tuchel pinpointed a lack of precision in the pass and strength in the tackle as reasons behind the difficult first half, while chances spurned after the break also proved costly.

The return leg is scheduled for next Tuesday, April 12 in Madrid at the Estadio Santiago Bernabeu where Real Madrid will look to book their spot in the semifinals of the UEFA Champions League.

Villarreal win quarterfinal first-leg thriller 1-0 against Bayern Munich



MADRID, April 7 (IANS): Villarreal claimed a 1-0 lead at home against Bayern Munich in their Champions League quarterfinal first-leg tie here on Wednesday.

Arnaut Danjuma's eighth-minute goal gave the Spanish Europa League champions the win and Unai Emery's men were unlucky not to take an even greater league to Munich next week. Danjuma opened the scoring in the eighth minute when he was in the right place to get a touch on Dani Parejo's effort to direct the ball past Manuel Neuer.

Villarreal were looking confident and looking to take the game to Bayern, who had plenty of the ball, but didn't seem to have much idea what to do with it, reports Xinhua.

Coquelin thought he had dou-

bled Villarreal's lead four minutes before the break when his cross from the left beat Neuer and floated into the far corner of the net, but the goal was ruled out because striker Gerard Moreno was offside in the buildup.

Things didn't improve for Bayern in the second half with Moreno intercepting a poor pass from Neuer and sliding the ball just wide from 40 meters while at the other end, Pau Torres got a head on the ball to deflect Coman's goalbound effort.

Moreno then hit the post from 20-meters as the game remained wide open, with Bayern looking to attack, while Villarreal tried to take advantage of the spaces they left on the break.

There were no further goals and the tie will be decided next Tuesday (IST) in Germany.

Barcelona to travel as favourites in Europa League tie against Frankfurt

MADRID, April 7 (IANS): FC Barcelona will continue their challenge for a title this season when they visit Eintracht Frankfurt in the first-leg of their Europa League quarterfinal on Thursday.

Coach Xavi Hernandez is without right back Sergino Dest and forward Memphis Depay though injury, while Luuk de Jong also misses out after testing positive for Covid-19 at the end of last week and Dani Alves isn't included in Barca's squad for Europe.

Meanwhile Sergi Roberto, Samuel Umtiti and Ansu Fati are long-term absentees, who have also remained in Barcelona to continue their recovery process.

The absence of Alaves is a problem for Xavi, who will probably have to play Oscar Mingueza, who doesn't seem to form part of the coach's plans, at right back, while he could make some rotations in central defense, with Eric Garcia in for Ronald Araujo.

The club and Araujo seem to be close to agreement for the Uruguayan defender to extend his

contract with the club and a new deal could now be signed in the coming days after several months of on-off discussions, reports Xinhua.

Talks are also ongoing with winger Ousmane Dembele, who looked to have a foot out of the door after rejecting a new contract in January.

Xavi has maintained faith in the Frenchman despite many wanting the winger to be left in the stands for the rest of the season and the coach has been rewarded with a series of impressive performances.

Barca's 1-0 win at the weekend over Sevilla lifted them to second in LaLiga with Pedri's excellent goal assuring the points and the 18-year-old will again be Barca's focal point in Germany.

Eintracht are currently ninth in the Bundesliga and Barca have to be seen as clear favorites, but the German side showed when they knocked Betis out of the last round that they are a dangerous side on the break and Barca will have to avoid any lapses of concentration in possession.

Du Plessis leads by example; performs really well, says Glenn Maxwell

MUMBAI, April 7 (IANS): Royal Challengers Bangalore (RCB) all-rounder Glenn Maxwell on Thursday showered praise on captain Faf du Plessis, saying that the former South Africa captain leads by example with his actions and performs really well.

So, to see him go really well, and start well for us is awesome for us. We love having that depth in our batting order and he certainly gives it to us." Maxwell is now available to turn out for Bangalore when they face Mumbai Indians on Saturday in Pune. He had missed the first few matches due to his wedding to Indian-origin pharmacist Vini Raman in Melbourne and had to wait for Australia's series against Pakistan to end on April 5 as Cricket Australia rules don't allow their contracted players to play domestic T20 competitions when international matches are on. "I'm glad I look fit. I don't know. I don't exactly feel it. I haven't done much over the last few weeks. I was looking forward to getting over here. I know I had a week from when I landed to the first game that I was playing, so, I wanted to do that as preparation time and know that I can get myself up to match ready for that first game. I just can't wait for the night to get back out there with the guys," stated the all-rounder.

IPL 2022: Warner, Nortje are match-winners; can win games single-handedly, says Smith

MUMBAI, April 7 (IANS): Former South Africa captain Graeme Smith believes that having 'match-winners' David Warner and Anrich Nortje in the playing eleven of Delhi Capitals will ensure the duo can win the matches single-handedly.

Warner and Nortje missed the first two matches of Delhi due to varying reasons. But they are now available for selection when Delhi face Lucknow Super Giants at the DY Patil Stadium later on Thursday.

"If you have got Warner and Nortje fit and ready to go, you simply pick them. It's a no-brainer.

They are match-winners and could win you games single-handedly. It will add impactful players to your line-up and that in T20s is hugely important," Smith was quoted as saying by cricket.com.

If Warner opens alongside Prithvi Shaw against Lucknow, it will be his first match for Delhi in this season, especially after starting his IPL journey with them from 2009 till 2013. Warner then went on to be a success for Sunrisers Hyderabad, leading them to the trophy in 2016 as well as smashing runs at will. But a rough run in last two seasons meant Warner wasn't retained by

Hyderabad and in mega auction, Delhi picked him up.

Smith, who won the inaugural edition of the IPL with Rajasthan Royals in 2008, feels that Warner coming in will take huge pressure off Shaw and captain Rishabh Pant in the batting order. "We know Warner is not the easiest character but if you can get him in the right frame of mind and keep him motivated, I think he could be a huge asset. We saw that in SRH. He led them from the front and then things kind of wobbled and fell apart.

"(Ricky) Ponting will know him well and how to get the best out of

him. He will have a very clear mindset of how to use Warner. We saw him in the World Cup and he still has got a lot of ability. He is destructive and him and Prithvi Shaw up the order could take a lot of pressure off Pant."

On the other hand, Nortje was retained by the Capitals ahead of countrymate Kagiso Rabada due to stellar job in 2020 and 2021 seasons. But the explosive pacer hasn't played any cricket since the Men's T20 World Cup in October-November last year due to injuries. But with Nortje available for selection now, Smith feels his presence will

make Delhi's bowling line-up stronger.

"Anrich Nortje for me is still a little bit of a lottery. He is coming off a big injury and hasn't played any cricket since the T20 World Cup. They might take a longer-term view on him and they would want someone like him to have some game-time and get better and better. He is looking fit, he is looking healthy and could be the man for them that could make a big impact. He bowls quick and can get you those big wickets. Delhi would want him into this competition as quickly as possible."

Sindhu, Srikanth storm into quarters; Sen, Bansod out of Korea Open

Punjab Kings vs Gujarat Titans: Ferguson vs Livingstone could be one of IPL's hottest battles

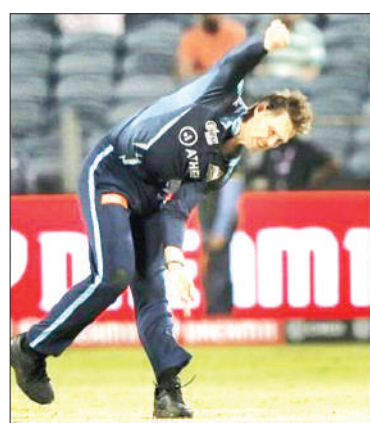
MUMBAI, April 7 (PTI): Gujarat Titans' lethal pace attack is all set to ask some probing questions to the dynamic Punjab Kings top-order when the two teams lock horns in an IPL match on Friday. In terms of composition and balance, both Gujarat and Punjab are very different and that makes for an enticing contest on a Brabourne Stadium track where runs are always on offer.

Punjab in their three games have shown that the approach this year would be to go hammer and tongs during the Powerplay overs and set the tempo for the rest of the innings.

In IPL however, there are some intriguing sub-plots that make it an engaging Friday. It will be a battle between Punjab's costliest buy (apart from skipper Mayank Agarwal's retention) Liam Livingstone and New Zealand's speed merchant Lockie Ferguson.

Having literally terrorised Delhi Capitals' Mandeep Singh with his pace and steep bounce in the earlier game, expect Ferguson to unleash his thunderbolts on Livingstone, who had taken the CSK attack to cleaners in the previous game with his 32-ball-60.

Ferguson and Mohammed Shami make for the most potent new ball pair after the first two weeks. With head coach Anil Kumble they would like to



devise a strategy to keep Punjab Kings under check during the Powerplay overs. Hardik Pandya again bowling full tilt and touching 140 clicks also adds to the potency of the Gujarat attack but their batting still looks a bit questionable save Shubman Gill and skipper Pandya.

It is the middle-order of Bhanuka Rajapaksa, Livingstone and newcomer Jitesh Sharma, that is expected to provide fireworks with M Shikhar Khan and Odean Smith at the rear.



They would like to target the weak Indian bowlers like Rahul Tewatia and Varun Aaron, who is known for leaking runs in all these years of IPL.

However where Gujarat might face problems is in the batting front. Shubman Gill is the only assured batter they have till now.

In the first match against Lucknow, they didn't have to chase much and the second game saw them defend 170 odd purely because of their opening bowling depth. Vijay Shankar as a top-order batter has looked far from convincing and Matthew Wade hasn't yet hit the rhythm although he is capable of big hits.

Abhinav Manohar is very new at

this stage while Tewatia and David Miller aren't exactly known for their consistency.

In case of Punjab, they have two match-winning bowlers in Kagiso Rabada and leg-spinner Rahul Chahar but Arshdeep Singh, debutant Vaibhav Arora and Livingstone himself did a commendable job against Chennai.
