Flood situation deteriorates further

GUWAHATI, Aug 13: The flood situation in Assam further aggravated on Sunday as the number of affected individuals surpassed 75,200 across eight districts and sub-divisions.

Chirang, Darrang, Dhemaji, Dibrugarh, Golaghat, Kokrajhar, Sivasagar, and Sonitpur are the districts and sub-divisions currently grappling with the flood's impact. Dhemaji remains the hardest hit,

with over 46,750 people affected

solely in that district. Sivasagar accounted for around 22,650 floodaffected individuals. Key rivers like the Brahmaputra at Dhubri and Nimatighat, Disang at Nanglamuraghat, and Dikhou at Sivasagar continue to flow above the danger level, according to an

official bulletin from the Assam

State Disaster Management Au-

thority (ASDMA) on Sunday. A total of 357 villages in the state are currently dealing with the consequences of floodwaters, which have affected 6,136.25 hectares of agricultural land. A new fatality was reported

from Sivasagar during the day, bringing this year's flood-related death toll to twelve. Across the affected districts and sub-divisions, district administra-

tions are operating 61 relief camps and 52 relief distribution centres, providing shelter to 1,515 people. In Sivasagar alone, over 1,280 individuals are taking refuge in eight relief camps. The flood has

Man lynched to death

NAGAON, Aug 13 (PTI): One person was beaten to death by vilagers on suspicion of being a thief in Assam's Nagaon district on Sunday, police said.

According to senior officials, the incident took place at Bamungaon under Lanka police station in Hojai in the wee hours.

"We got information in the morning that one person was severely beaten by villagers suspecting him to be a thief. When police reached the spot, the victim was already dead. The body has been sent for post-mortem to Nagaon Civil Hospital," a senior official said.

The deceased has been identified as Hibzur Rahman, who hailed from Hojai sub-divisional area, he

added. "We have apprehended six individuals so far. Probe is on to find out and arrest more people involved in the incident," he added

RBI selects McKinsey and Company, Accenture Solutions to use AI, ML to improve regulatory supervision

MUMBAI, Aug 13 (PTI): The Reserve Bank has selected global consultancy firms McKinsey and Company India LLP and Accenture Solutions Pvt Ltd India to develop systems using artificial intelligence and machine learning for its supervisory functions. The RBI is looking to extensively use advanced analytics, artificial intelligence and machine learning to analyse its huge database and improve regulatory supervision over banks and NBFCs. For this purpose, the central bank plans to hire external experts.

In September last year, the RBI invited expressions of interest (EoI) for engaging consultants for the use of advanced analytics, artificial intelligence and machine learning for generating supervisory inputs. Based on the scrutiny/evaluation set out in the EOI document, the central bank had shortlisted seven applicants to participate in the request for proposal process (RFP) for the selection of consultant(s).

The seven firms were Accenture Solutions Private Limited; Boston Consulting Group (India) Pvt Ltd; Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu India LLP; Ernst and Young LLP; KPMG Assurance and Consulting Services LLP; McKinsey and Company; and



Pricewaterhouse Coopers Pvt Ltd. Of these, McKinsey and Company India LLP and Accenture Solutions Private Limited India have been awarded the contract, as per a Reserve Bank document. The value of the contract is about ₹91 crore.

While the RBI is already using AI and ML in supervisory processes, it now intends to upscale it to ensure that the benefits of advanced analytics can accrue to the Department of

The Department of Supervision has been developing and using linear and a few machine-learnt models for supervisory examinations. The interest now is to explore the data to identify its attributes that can be leveraged to generate new and improved supervisory inputs, said the EoI issued in September.

The supervisory jurisdiction of the RBI extends over banks, urban cooperative banks, NBFCs, payment

panies and select all Indian financial institutions. It undertakes supervision of these entities with the objective of assessing their financial soundness, solvency, asset quality, governance framework, liquidity, and operational viability to protect depositors' interests and financial

The RBI undertakes continuous supervision of SEs with the help of on-site inspections and off-site monitoring, the EoI said.

Across the world, regulatory and supervisory authorities are using machine learning techniques (commonly referred to as 'suptech' and 'regtech') for assisting supervisory and regulatory activities, it added.

NITI on draft bills on 5 cash crops

NEW DELHI, Aug 13 (PTI): The commerce ministry is seeking views from different ministries and government think tank Niti Aayog on draft bills pertaining to five cash crops like tea and tobacco, an official said. The ministry has circulated separate notes for the bills related to cash crops of tea, coffee, spices, rubber and tobacco, which seek to promote their growth and create a conducive environment for businesses by decriminalising minor offences, the official said.

After taking the comments, the ministry will approach the Union Cabinet for approval on the drafts of the Spices (Promotion and Development) Bill; the Rubber (Promotion and Development) Bill; the Coffee (Promotion and Development) Bill; the Tea (Promotion and Development) Bill; and the Tobacco Board (Amendment) Bill.

In 2022, the Department of Commerce proposed the repeal and updation of decades-old laws on these sectors and to introduce new legislation with a view to promoting their growth and creating a conducive environment

"Earlier the Niti Aayog had raised certain issues with the ministry on these five bills. Now all the issues have been resolved," the official added.

The Department of Commerce proposes the repeal of Tea Act, 1953; Spices Board Act, 1986; Rubber Act, 1947; Coffee Act, 1942 and updation of Tobacco Board

According to the draft bills, the new proposed legislations reflect the present realities and objectives of these

Explaining the rationale behind the proposal to repeal the Rubber Act, the draft bill has stated that in recent years, there have been widespread changes in the industrial and economic scenario especially with regard to development in rubber and allied sectors.

The draft Coffee (Promotion and Development) Bill has underlined that substantive portions of the existing Act dealing with pooling and marketing of coffee have become redundant/inoperative. According to the draft Spices (Promotion and Development) Bill, 2022, there is a need to enable the Spices Board to provide focused attention across the entire supply chain of spices.

The ministry has proposed repeal of the archaic Tea Act as there is a paradigm shift in the recent decade with respect to the way tea is grown, marketed and consumed.

Similarly, the draft bill on tobacco has sought to update the existing law by promoting ease of doing busi-

Commerce ministry seeking views of ministries, ACC battery market demand in India to rise to 220 GWh by 2030: Report

NEW DELHI, Aug 13 (PTI): The advanced chemistry cell battery market demand in India is expected to grow at a CAGR of 50 per cent from 20 GWh in 2022 to around 220 GWh by 2030, according to a CII report released on Sunday. The growth is expected to be supported by the thriving local battery manufacturing industry and a robust local supply chain.

As a result, India is expected to localize a significant portion of the entire value chain from material processing to pack assembly and integration, said the report on 'Raw materials for Battery & Component Manufacturing'. The report, prepared in collaboration with 6Wresearch, is the third in a series of reports on 'Roadmap for Future Mobility

"EV is determined primarily by the battery running the powertrain of the vehicle. Advancements in the battery technology space is pivotal for the development of better-performing EVs," said Vipin Sondhi, Chairman, CII National Committee on Future Mobility and former CEO & MD, Ashok Leyland and JCB.

He added, "It is imperative for India to not only strengthen the national battery raw materials and

manufacturing set-up but also to become a globally trusted supplier of high-quality, innovative battery materials to counter the Chinese supremacy in the domain.

The report recommends incentivizing development of domestic mines as several raw minerals such as cobalt, nickel, lithium and copper have a negligible reserve, production, and refining capac-

It also calls for lowering the custom duty of critical minerals used in battery manufacturing and incentivising setting up of mineral processing plants to extract required minerals. India needs a battery chemical processing industry at par with several other stages of battery manufacturing and various measures in form of incentives, exemptions from various taxes etc., said the CII report.

This may be done by way of incentives from the government, additional funding for R&D, collaboration with countries with advanced technology for technological collaboration and simplification of the regulations related to chemical industry- obtaining licenses, environmental clearances, and other approvals etc., it added. The government last month announced the re-bidding

of production-linked incentives for 20 GWh Advanced Chemistry Cell manufacturing -- India's Rs 18,100-crore programme to boost local battery cell production. ACCs are the new generation of advanced storage technologies that can store electric energy either as electrochemical or as chemical energy and convert it back to electric energy as and when required. These have major applications in electric vehi-

cles, maintaining grid stability, solar rooftop, consumer electronics etc. With India's commitment towards renewable energy and achieving net-zero by 2070, energy storage is expected to play a crucial role in the overall energy ecosystem. The government approved the PLI scheme 'Na-

tional Programme on ACC Battery Storage' for achieving a manufacturing capacity of 50 Giga Watt Hour (GWh) of ACC to enhance manufacturing capabilities with a budgetary outlay of Rs 18,100 crore.

Under the initiative, the emphasis of the government is to achieve greater domestic value addition, while at the same time ensuring that the levelised cost of battery manufacturing in India is

SPIC reports decline in Q1 PAT at ₹ 43.97 cr due to global energy prices

CHENNAI, Aug 13 (PTI): Southern Petrochemicals Industries Corporation Ltd (SPIC) has reported a decline in its profit after tax for the April-June 2023 quarter at ₹ 43.97 crore, due to rising global energy prices, the company said on Sunday.

The city-based agri-nutrient and fertiliser company, a part of AM International, Singapore had reported profit after tax of ₹ 66.85 crore during the corresponding quarter of the previous vear.

For the year ending March 31, 2023, the company's profit after tax stood at ₹ 284.44 crore, a statement released by the company said.

Centre directs institutions to work in tandem on scheme for loans to street vendors

Sebi levies ₹ 60 lakh fine on individual for flouting regulatory norms

NEW DELHI, Aug 13 (PTI): Capital markets regulator Sebi has levied fine totalling ₹ 60 lakh on an individual for violating market norms. The penalty is to be paid by Manish Goel (Manish Kr. Goyal), a Sebi-registered research analyst, within 45 days.

In its 46-page order on Friday, Sebi found that Manish had collected ₹ 4.16 crore from 583 clients by charging them for services provided as a Research Analyst.

However, he failed to comply with basic requirements of research analyst (RA) norms and also promised assured returns and mis-sold his services to clients.

The regulator also observed that Manish assured the members of the Whatsapp/Telegram groups that they would get one stock recommendation for free in case anyone suffers a loss on account of a particular stock recommendation. "... the promise of an assured return in the Whatsapp/Telegram chats, which were not supported by any research on noticee's part, amounted to dissemination of misleading information which amounted to a violation of PFUTP (Prohibition of Fraudulent and Unfair Trade Practices) regulations," Sebi's adjudicating officer Soma Majumder said in the order.

NARCL may wind up Srei group's equipment finance arm, retain SIFL

KOLKATA, Aug 13(PTI): After completion of the takeover of two Srei group firms through NCLT route, state-owned asset reconstruction company NARCL is expected to retain only one of the acquired companies, official sources said.

The Kolkata bench of the National Company Law Tribunal (NCLT) has approved the resolution plan of NARCL for takeover of the twin Srei firms under Insolvency and Bankruptcy

The resolution plan had already received approval from banking sector regulator Reserve Bank of India.

NARCL emerged as the winning bidder for the two Srei group firms -- Srei Infrastructure Finance Ltd (SIFL) and Srei Equipment Finance Ltd (SEFL) -- through a bidding process in Feb-

"According to the resolution plan submitted, the National Asset Reconstruction Company Ltd (NARCL) will cease all fresh lending activities in the group's equipment financing arm -- SEFL, and after recovering the outstanding debt, it will be 'wound up'," the official told PTI.

The loan repayment process may extend for the next seven years, he said.

At present, most of the assets remain within SEFL's books due to a previous restructuring.

"As outlined in the resolution plan, NARCL, upon assuming control of the companies, will abstain from pursuing fresh lending from SEFL. The non-banking financial company (NBFC) will be dissolved once its outstanding debt is recuperated and ongoing court cases are settled," an official close to the development told PTI.

"SIFL with a cleaner balance sheet and a few legal imbroglios will be revitalised, and fresh lending operations will be conducted under this entity. Regulatory authorities are also aligned with this perspective, as previously discussed," the official said

This strategy aims at ensuring business con-

tinuity and safeguarding employment. Kanorias, the erstwhile promoters, did not offer any comments on the development. No official comments were received from

On February 15, the Committee of Creditors (CoC) for the Srei group firms endorsed NARCL's resolution plan, which garnered the highest vote share of 89.2 per cent. There were three final contenders for Srei

NARCL offered a Net Present Value (NPV) bid of Rs 5,555 crore. Authum Investment and Infrastructure secured the second-highest vote

with 84.86 per cent through a bid of ₹ 5,526

The consortium comprising Varde Partners and Arena Investors with a financial bid of approximately ₹ 4,680 crore, secured the third spot with around nine per cent of the vote, according to the official.

The total value of NARCL's resolution plan stands at ₹ 14,301 crore, encompassing a cash component of ₹ 3,001 crore, debentures and security receipts amounting to ₹ 3,300 crore, along with an uncommitted payment of ₹ 8,000 crore via Optionally Convertible Debentures (OCDs). These payments are contingent upon the recovery from underlying assets over the ensuing seven years.

Creditors accepted a haircut of 55 per cent, considering a complete retrieval of the uncommitted value of ₹ 8,000 crore. The cumulative claims of financial creditors for the two NBFCs amounted to ₹32,750.22 crore.

The Reserve Bank of India superseded the

boards of SIFL and SEFL in October 2021 due to governance concerns and repayment defaults. Subsequently, the banking regulator approached the NCLT Kolkata to initiate the insolvency proceedings against the twins for a consolidated resolution.

Not so keen on any other new acquisitions: Tata Steel CEO Narendran



NEW DELHI, Aug 13 (PTI): Tata Steel - which is in an expansion mode in India - is not so keen on any other new acquisitions, the company CEO T V Narendran has said.

The statement from Narendran has come amid Vedanta Ltd reviewing and evaluating its steel and steelmaking raw materials businesses.

In June, Vedanta Ltd said it will immediately begin the review and evaluate a broad range of options including potential strategic sale of some or all of its steel businesses.

"Not so keen on any other new acquisitions... We don't need it." Narendran said in a reply to a question on his company's interest in

buying Vedanta Ltd's steel business. There is a lot to do at Tata Steel's existing sites, he added.

The company has a plan to scale up its annual installed steel making capacity to 40 million tonnes per annum (MTPA) by 2030 in India, from around 22 MTPA at present.

quired Jharkhand-based steel company ESL Steel Limited through an insolvency resolution process.

The company set up a green field integrated manufacturing facility, which is currently commissioned at a capacity of 2.5 MT per annum.

Speaking on Tata Steel UK operations, Narendran, who is also the MD of the company, said "we are (still) engaged with the UK government to find a solution. If we can find a common ground with the government (there).'

There is no problem in the UK. The production is not affected. The only challenge is the upstream assets are old and reliability of the equipment is sometimes not so great, he said. India-headquartered Tata Steel owns the UK's largest steelworks at Port Talbot in South Wales and employs around 8,000 people across all

its operations in the country. The company had sought 1.5 billion pounds from the UK government to execute its decarbonisation plans. However, the British government earlier this year made a counter offer which was much lower to the company's expectations.

Rahul's resurrection and LS polls

ver the last year, Rahul Gandhi has been attempting political resurrection. First, via the five-month walkathon of Bharat Jodo Yatra that saw him play the role of a doughty fighter. Second, a subsequent five months spent outside of Parliament which allowed Gandhi to assume the role of a martyr. The martyrdom parade might have been stopped by the Supreme Court's recent judgment staying Gandhi's disqualification. Yet, the judgment also lends to Congress' claim of unjust punishment. From the assassination of Indira Gandhi and Rajiv Gandhi to the renunciation of Sonia Gandhi, the myth of Gandhi family martyrdom has provided an essential glue to the Congress, in absence of a clear ideology. This particular reiteration of 'Rebranding Rahul' has been more fruitful than earlier versions. It has helped cement Gandhi's centrality not only to the Congress but also to the larger opposition coalition. Many Congress supporters feel the stage is now set for a rejuvenated Gandhi to undertake a third and final act; the role of the primary challenger to Narendra Modi for the office of the Prime Minister.

But on this question, Congress still finds itself stuck in a quagmire. Its 2024 strategy is composed of two mutually conflicting goals; the achievement of a broad opposition unity and the recovery of the former 'Congress space'. Congress realises that a presidential style 'Rahul vs Modi' contest, as a referendum on a national agenda, might not work favourably for it. In subsequent elections, Congress lost 171 out of the 186 seats where it battled head-to-head. Most of these seats lie in northern and central India where the popularity gap between Modi and Gandhi is still formidable. To cite an example; a recent C-voter survey in Madhya Pradesh showed 57% people to continue to repose faith in Modi as their preferred choice for PM, as opposed to a much smaller 18% who favour Rahul. Thus, self-interest pushes both the Congress and regional parties towards a shared platform against powerful incumbents, with the hope of converting the national election into a series of state elections.

It is very likely that any strident attempts by the Congress to project Gandhi as their PM candidate would scupper the goal of broad opposition unity heralded by the India alliance, at least, in its current configuration. The disqualification had not only supercharged a shared threat perception among the opposition ranks, it had also conveniently discharged the vexed issue of the PM candidate, enabling the entry of fellow PM aspirants Arvind Kejriwal, Mamata Banerjee and Nitish Kumar. Thus, the reception of Gandhi's parliamentary career does complicate the fragile political equations involving the INDIA alliance. A straightforward way to assuage the anxieties of its coalition partners would be to rule Gandhi out of con-

Prime Minister has let down the suffering people of Manipur once again

rime Minister Narendra Modi finally opened his mouth on Manipur violence in Lok Sabha on August 10 to reply the no-confidence motion brought by the opposition INDIA alliance, but only to expose himself to be sanctimonious – talking piously and giving assurances in the backdrop of inaction and 'complete breakdown of law and order and constitutional machinery in the state' as Supreme Court of India has observed. Same is the feeling of the people of Manipur who have still been suffer-

Manipur violence erupted on May 3, 2023, and continues since under the double engine government of BJP in the state and the Centre, while PM is keeping mysterious silence, and the country needed no-confidence motion to make him open his mouth. Manipur was burning, while PM Modi was eulogizing himself and his government.

In the first 1:40 hrs he spoke, there was no Manipur Violence and the suffering of the people of the state. Opposition heard him with patience, all his selfgrandiose and hypnotizing attempt by selling big dreams, waiting to hear him on Manipur. PM Modi got them frustrated by talking about everything else but not on Manipur Violence, which made INDIA alliance to stage a walkout after 1 hour 40 minutes of his speech.

The effectiveness of PM Modi's shrewd political strategy is obvious, but he did not stop at that. He continued his speech which lasted about 2 hours 20 minutes. He continued with his self-grandiose while there was no opposition in the House, and Manipur was still burning. But at last, he came to the point, but for only about 10 minutes, and only for expressing his pious utterple of Manipur, which seemed only sanctimonious as they were brought to mask the ground reality of putting grease to the communal fire in which Manipur burns sill now with complete breakdown of law and order for which, he tried to make it appear that his double engine government was not at all accountable.

Congress and the opposition INDIA alliance were attacked in PM Modi's extensive speech, which was objected by them since PM was supposed to reply on the Manipur violence. The House became a scene, and the leader of the Congress in Lok Sabha Adhir Ranjan Chowdhury was suspended for "misconduct". Amid chaos in the House, when the opposition started walking out, PM Modi, after his 1:42 minutes, mentioned the name of Manipur for the first time.

Have the government at the Centre and the State become deaf, dumb, and blind? Does it require a High Court order to know what was happening in Manipur? What would be a better proof of the lie and incompetency of a prime minister, which in enshrined in his own speech!

"Yesterday, Amit bhai said that an order came from the high court of Manipur, which saw a sequence of events that led to violence in the state. Many families lost their loved ones. Terrible crimes were committed against women and this is condemnable,"

It should a matter of shame that the PM needed the High Court of Manipur to see the sequence of events that led to violence in the state, especially if the government was not aware of it.

Though he repeated, "I want to tell Manipur that we are trying out best to ensure Manipur moves towards peace soon.

"The country was shocked by the lies spread by the opposition about the situation in Manipur," PM Modi alleged while referring to the statement of Union Home Minister Amit Shah made in the Parliament on the previous day.

The Quest for Equality and Autonomy in India's Tribal Communities

s the BJP pushes for the implementation of a uniform civil code, it has adopted a cautious approach due to emerging concerns from the tribal regions. With over 700 distinct tribes in India, each possessing their own set of customary laws resion, and inheritance, these laws hold sacred and inviolable status among the tribes. Recognizing the potential ramifications of imposing a uniform code on them, the BJP has become wary of the risks involved. They fear that enforcing a common code could lead to ethnic violence, hamper national integration, and disrupt the peace process in the Northeastern states. Additionally, the BJP is apprehensive of facing political risks, such as a decline in its electoral base among tribal communities, setbacks in co-opting tribal leaders, potential desertion by allies, and the risk of losing power in the Northeastern states. As a result, the party is treading cautiously on this contentious issue. Opposition to the implementa-

tion of a uniform civil code has

gained momentum in the Northeastern region of India, with various regional parties, community organizations, and religious groups voicing their concerns. Notably, the chief ministers of Nagaland, Meghalaya, and Mizoram, Arunachal Pradesh, who lead parties allied with the BJP, have openly expressed their reservations towards the uniform code. Their opposition stems from the strong resistance to such a code among the tribes they represent. In a notable move, Nagaland Chief Minister Neiphiu Rio led a delegation of ministers to Delhi in early July to meet with Union Home Minister Amit Shah. During the meeting, they pleaded that the implementation of a uniform civil code would infringe upon Article 371(A) of the Constitution, which guarantees the preservation of customary laws and traditions of the Nagas. A few days before this meeting, Rio's party, the Nationalist Democratic Progressive Party, reassured the Nagas of their unwavering commitment to safeguarding their identity, customs, traditions, and unique history. The opposition from these BJP-aligned chief ministers and their parties highlights the depth of concern among the tribes in the Northeast regarding the proposed uniform

civil code. Despite being part of

the BJP-led alliance, they priori-

toms and traditions of their respective communities, reflecting the complexity and sensitivity surrounding the issue.

The resistance against a uniform civil code from various quarters has led BJP MP Sushil Modi, who chairs the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Law, to propose exity. Supporting this stance, the Vanvasi Kalyan Ashram, an organization associated with the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh and working among tribal communities, called for the Law Commission to conduct thorough investigations in tribal areas. They emphasized the need to comprehend the traditional systems of tribes concerning marriage, divorce, adoption, succession, and other matters before presenting any recommendations to the government. Furthermore, media reports citing sources from the Nagaland government suggested that Union Home Minister Amit Shah assured the delegation led by Chief Minister Neiphiu Rio that the proposed uniform civil code would not adversely affect tribal communities.

Upon achieving independence, India recognized tribal areas as regions with unique governance requirements, ensuring that the Indian State respected the autonomy of tribal councils. This approach granted tribes special rights and privileges, safeguarding their distinctive way of life. They were granted the freedom to abide by their customary laws in family matters, resolve interpersonal disputes through tribal village councils, and maintain ownership and utilization of land within forests, along with managing natural resources. However, as time passed, the State gradually encroached upon tribal autonomy, particularly in matters relating to the exploitation of natural resources in tribal areas. Consequently, tribal autonomy now exists only in family and social affairs, with its significance diminishing in other domains. Imposing a uniform civil code would further erode the last vestige of tribal autonomy. The tribes stand to lose even this remaining stronghold of self-governance, leading to an erosion of their unique way of life and traditions.

The central government should refrain from encroaching upon the last bastion of tribal autonomy. Simultaneously, it must adopt a cautious approach while addressing the existing distortions and imbalances in tribal regions, ensuring the active involvement of the tribes themselves. It is crucial to recognize that this island of autonomy does not guarantee an idvllic existence for all its inhabitants, particularly women. While men often enjoy the benefits, women are left with the remnants or, in Therefore, any reforms must prioritize gender equality and w empowerment, striving to create a more equitable and inclusive envi-

ronment for all tribal communities. According to the customary laws prevalent among various tribal communities in India, such as the Mizos, Gillongs, Wanchos, Nagas, Santhals, Oraons, Jamatiyas, Halams, Dongaria-Kandhas, and Paudi-Bhuyans, the inheritance pattern heavily favors sons over daughters. In these communities, the youngest son typically inherits the father's assets, including the ancestral house, while daughters do not receive any share in their father's property. In cases where there are no sons, daughters still do not have a claim to the property, as it usually passes on to close male relatives, such as the father's brother or his sons. Although there may be instances where a father gifts a small piece of land to his daughter, it is more of a gesture of kindness rather than a recognition of her rightful inher-

This gender-biased inheritance system prevalent in tribal customs has led to unequal distribution of assets, with sons benefitting from the lion's share of immovable property like land and daughters being left without any inheritance rights. It highlights the need for addressing such inequalities and advocating for gender equality within tribal societies.

Divorced women fare no better than daughters under the Mizo customary laws. The prevailing practice allows a man to divorce his wife merely by uttering the words, "Ka ma che (I divorce you)," leaving her without any claim to the family property. This situation is even more severe than the misuse of the law of wellspaced triple talaq by some Muslim men to dismiss their wives. The lack of rights and protections for divorced women under such customary laws highlights the urgent need for reforms to ensure gender equality and safeguard the rights of women within the com-

Married women in tribal communities do not necessarily experience blissful lives either. Polygamy remains prevalent

among affluent families, particularly among Northeastern tribes, as reported by the National Family Health Survey-5 (2019-20). These wives are burdened with the responsibility of managing both household chores and agricultural lands. However, despite their sigmany cases, receive nothing at all. nificant contributions, they are systematically excluded from decision-making processes within the family, vilage, and community. The gender disparity extends to political representation as well, evident by the scarcity of women members in the legislatures of Nagaland, Mizoram, Meghalaya, and Arunachal Pradesh. This lack of female representation reflects the larger issue of women's marginalized status and limited agency within tribal societies. To address these inequalities, there is a pressing need for empowering women with equal rights, opportunities, and participation in decision-making at all

Enforcing a uniform civil code upon tribal communities would be arbitrary, imperious, and tyrannical, undermining their last vestige of autonomy. Instead, the tribes should be allowed to retain their unique self-governance. However, the central government must initiate a process of constructive dialogue with them to reform their customary laws and put an end to discrimination against women. Equal rights for daughters in inheriting parental property, fair provision for divorced women in terms of property and alimony, and the abolishment of polygamy are crucial areas that demand reform. Mizoram's progressive step in 2014, with the enactment of the Mizo Marriage, Divorce, Inheritance of Property Act, reflects the potential for evolution.

The central government can foster a conducive atmosphere for dialogue among other tribal communities to revamp their ageold family laws. While change may not happen overnight, initiating these dialogues is a significant step towards progress. The aspirations of tribal women for equal rights and empowerment are evident, and addressing these issues through dialogue and reform is a collective responsibility. Though it may take decades to fully effect these changes, the process must commence without delay, as the voices of tribal women yearn for a more just and inclusive future. Assassination of a candidate raises tempo in Ecuadorian presidential polls

cuador will vote for a ✓ tional assembly on August 20 this year. Indications from the opinion polls just ten days before polling suggest that the Left wing candidate Luisa Gonzalez belonging to the party of former pres Rafael Correa, is leading as against the seven other candidates belonging to other parties and the groups belonging to the right.

Gonzalez is the only woman member in the presidential race and she was a leading member of the dissolved national assembly Other front runners include Otto Sonnenholzner, a journalist and former vice president Lenin Moreno's term from 2017 to 2021., Yaku Perez, an environmental activist and Fernando Villavicencio, an activist and investigative journalist famous for revealing charges against former president Correa. Unfortunately on August 9, Fernando Villavicencio was assassinated in an election

Current president Guillermo Lasso was elected in 2021 presidential elections in a run off on April 11 by narrowly defeating the left wing candidate Andres Arauz who was a follower of Correa. Lasso dissolved the national assembly in May this year ordering snap elections following a constitutional crisis. Lasso nor anyone from his conservative CREO party is participating in the elections.

Former president Rafael Correa who was president for ten years from 2007 to 2017 was sentenced in 2020 for breaking company finance laws. Correa had denied the charges. He is living in Belgium in exile but he is having big influence on the activities of his supporters in Ecuador. Correa made lot of changes in favour of poor during his ten year rule. He still commands big respect from the electorate in this Latin American state.

In terms of voter concerns. insecurity is the top one, given that the country's murder rate shot up 245 percent between 2020 and 2022.

More than half of Ecuadorans polled said that fixing the country's insecurity problem is their biggest priority.



Only on Wednesday, the popular presidential candidate Fernando Villavicencio was shot dead at a campaign rally in Quito. He was very vocal against drug cartels and corruption. President Lasso also condemned the killing and said that organised crime was behind his killing. The assassination has raised

the tempo in the election campaign. If no candidate receives more than 50 percent of the vote—or 40 percent with a 10point lead—a runoff will take place on October 15.

In addition to the presidential election, voters will elect lawmakers for the country's unicameral National Assembly. Winners will govern until May 2025, when Lasso's term was meant to end.

Ecuador is located in the western corner at the top of the South American continent. Ecuador is named after the Equator, the imaginary line around the Earth that splits the country in two. Most of the country is in the Southern Hemisphere.

Ecuador is roughly the size of Colorado and is bordered by Colombia and Peru. The high Andes Mountains form the backbone of the country. Cotopaxi in the Andes is the highest active volcano in the world.

About 10 percent of the population is of European descent. Another 25 percent belong to indigenous or native cultures and the remainder are of mostly mixed ethnicity. Many of the native people are subsistence farmers and only grow enough food for their family. The leftwing candidate Gonzalez has a programme of giving rights and special assistance to the indigenous people.

Ecuador is considered one of the most diverse areas of the world. There are some 25,000 plant species, and over 1,600 known bird species. The search for oil has caused environmental devastation due to oil leaks and destruction of forests.

Ecuador has many geographical zones, including Andean peaks, tropical rainforests and - 1,000km (600 miles) off the coast - the volcanic Galapagos Islands, home to the animals and birds whose adaptations evolutionary shaped Charles Darwin's theo-

In 2022, Ecuador was beset by rising gang violence linked to Mexican drug cartels, including shootings and car bombings. President Lasso declared a state of emergency in two regions and labelled such violent incidents "a declaration of open war".

Some analysts have suggested the country is on the edge of becoming a narcostate. . The assassination of one of the presidential candidates just before the August 20 elections is further confirmation of the terror of drug cartels in the country.

The coming presidential elections in Ecuador is being observed with keen interest by the other Latin American nations. In 2021 elections, the Left lost narrowly, since then the people's discontent has risen against the Lasso regime. It is to be seen whether the presidential candidate Luisa Gonzalez can inspire confidence among nearly 16 million electorate in favour of her programme for a corruption free pro people government. Does depression and anxiety increase cancer risk?

epression affects about % of the world's adult population. People with depression often have additional mental health issues, most notably anxiety.

Past research shows about 40-50% of people with anxiety will also have depression. And this percentage is similar for people with major depression who also experience anxiety.

Because of the profound impact they can have on the body, depression and anxiety has been linked to an increased risk for certain diseases, including heart diseases like heart attack and stroke, and dementia.

Additionally, previous studies have linked depression and anxiety to a higher risk of developing certain types of cancer.

Now, researchers from the University Medical Center Groningen have discovered evidence to challenge the theory that depression and anxiety increase a person's cancer risk.

The study was recently published in the journal Cancer, a peer-reviewed journal of the American Cancer Society.

How depression and anxiety impact cancer risk

According to the study's lead author Dr. Lonneke A. van Tuijl, who at the time of the study was a post-doctorate researcher in the the University Medical Center Groningen and is now an assistant professor in the Department of Clinical Psychology at Utrecht University, it's a long-held belief that depression and anxiety increase the risk for cancer, but previous studies on the subject are actually quite conflicting.

"Studies also differ in definitions and approaches, making it hard to derive an overall conclusion using more traditional methods," she told Medical News

Today. "In the PSY-CA consortium, we aimed for more harmony across the included cohorts with how the constructs were defined and the analyses we used. For example, we ensured that we adjusted for smoking behavior and other known risk factors wher-

ever possible," she said.

For their study, Dr. van Tuijl and her team analyzed data from the International Psychosocial Factors and Cancer Incidence Consortium. This database includes information from 18 prospective study groups with more than 300,000 adults from the Netherlands, the United Kingdom, Norway, and Canada.

The researchers found no associations between depression and anxiety and overall breast. prostate, colorectal, and alcoholrelated cancers during a followup of up to 26 years.

tion and were a little surprised that this was not the case for overall, breast, prostate, colorectal, and alcohol-related cancers," Dr. van Tuijl said. "However, the findings were so consistent and clear.

How are depression and anxiety related?

Depression is a mental health condition where a person experiences a continual feeling of sadness that affects their ability to live their lives.

There are a number of different causes for depression, including: • Bereavement, such as the

- loss of a person in your life • a major life change, such as the loss of a job
- genetics · physical, sexual, or emo-
- tional abuse • certain medications
- certain illnesses

Like depression, anxiety is also a mood disorder. With anxiety, a person constantly feels worried and nervous.

For some people, anxiety can be a sign of underlying depression. And for others, their anxiety may trigger their depression. It is not uncommon for a person to have both depression and anxi-

Unhealthy habits increase cancer risk

The research team did find depression and anxiety were linked

to a 6% higher risk of developing lung cancer and smoking-related cancers, and for anxiety symptoms rising to 24% increased risk for a depression diagnosis. However, this risk was substantially reduced after adjusting for other cancer-related risk factors; including smoking, alcohol consumption, and body mass index (4% for anxiety symptoms and 8% for a diagnosis of depression). Scientists believe lung and smoking-related cancer findings support the importance of addressing tobacco use and other unhealthy habits that may de-

and/or anxiety. "I hope that our findings will be used to provide relief to patients with cancer who attribute their diagnosis to previous depression or anxiety," Dr. van

velop as a result of depression

Tuijl said.

"We presented our findings at a scientific conference last year, and an oncologist in the audience was pleased with our findings because it gave her something to provide as evidence to patients who were occupied with thoughts that their diagnoses (were) attributed to a previous depression or anxiety," she said.

Additionally, Dr. van Tuijl said their next research will be further examining known risk factors and their relationship to depression and anxiety.

"For example, it could be that depression leads to more smoking, which in turn increases the risk for lung cancer," she contin-

"Or, it could be that the association between anxiety and smoking-related cancers is only

evident in people who are overweight. These two possibilities some relief to our patients who [are] something that we're researching further in PSY-CA, and the results on this will be published soon," she added.

Does stress cause cancer? After reviewing this study, Dr. Parvin Peddi, a board certified medical oncologist and director of Breast Medical Oncology for the Margie Petersen Breast Center at Providence Saint John's Health Center and associate professor of medical oncology at Saint John's Cancer Institute in Santa Monica, California, told Medical News Today these findings are consistent with what she sees in her clinic.

"Although some patients have underlying or previous history of depression/anxiety, many do not," she explained.

"However, this is very common thinking for patients that they got cancer because of stress, anxiety, or depression, or that if they have ongoing stress, it will make it more likely for cancer to come back. It's nice to have this study as evidence that this is not true and for patients to, of course, reduce anxiety/stress but not stress about the stress!" — Dr. Parvin Peddi

Dr. Kristina Espinosa, an accredited clinical psychologist with Miami Cancer Institute, part of Baptist Health South Florida,

may blame the state of their mental health for the reason they have cancer," she told MNT. "As a mental health provider, the discussion of how chronic psychological distress can affect one's outlook and coping ability is ever-evolving.

"This research offers preliminary alignment with how a variety of factors influence health and illness. Mental health needs to be better understood for interventions to effectively target and reduce risks and increase overall well-being," Dr. Espinosa added. Tips to lower cancer risk

For readers looking for ways to lower their overall cancer risk, both Drs. Peddi and Espinosa

- suggest these tips: • Eat a well-balanced diet
- Exercise regularly Do not smoke
- Use sunscreen
- Get regular cancer screenings Avoid behaviors that can lead potential infections

"It is important to note that while these are considerations. other factors, such as genetics and environmental factors that are beyond one's control, play a role in cancer risk. Does intermittent fasting really help you lose weight?

¬ arly hunter-gatherers faced long periods of fasting. Their access to food relied on successful hunting, fishing, and the availability of wild plants.

Over time, the development of modern agriculture and the transition to industrialised societies changed our regular eating patterns, shifting our dinner time to later in the day to accommodate work schedules.

Today, with access to an abundance of food, we rarely experience prolonged periods of fasting, except for weight loss or religious practices. It's now common to have four or more meals a day, with the most calories consumed later in the day. Frequent snacking is also common, over a window of around 15 hours.

However, research increasingly shows our health is not only affected by what and how much we eat, but also when we eat. So what does this mean for meal scheduling? And can intermittent fasting help?

Our body clock controls more than our

Our internal biological timekeeper, or circadian clock, regulates many aspects of our physiology and behaviour. It tells us to be awake and active during the day, and rest and sleep during the night. It can also tell us the best time to eat.

Our body is biologically prepared to have food during the day. Food digestion, nutrient uptake and energy metabolism is optimised to occur when we're supposed to be active and eating.

Working against this default stage, by regularly eating when we're supposed to sleep and fast, can compromise these processes and impact our health. Erratic eating patterns, including latenight meals, have been linked to weight gain and a greater risk of metabolic disease.

Shift-workers, for example, and people who work evening, night or rotating shifts, have a higher risk of obesity, heart disease and diabetes. But adopting an eating pattern that aligns with our circadian rhythm can reduce these risks.

So can intermittent fasting help?

Nutritional interventions are increasingly focused not only on "what" we eat but also "when". Intermittent fasting is one way to restrict the timing, rather than the content, of what we

There are several types of intermittent fasting, one of which is time-restricted eating. This means eating all our calories in a consistent 8-12 hour, or even shorter, interval each day.

But is it backed by evidence?

Most of what we know today about intermittent fasting and time-restricted eating is from mouse studies, which demonstrate remarkable weight loss and overall health benefits associated with these types of dietary interventions.

However, some aspects of mouse physiology can be different to humans. Mice need to eat more frequently than humans and even a short period of fasting has a more significant physiological impact on mice. One day of fasting in mice leads to a 10% loss of body weight, whereas humans would need to fast for 14 days to achieve similar results. This makes a direct translation from mice to humans more compli-

While health benefits of intermittent fasting and time-restricted eating have also been observed in humans, the findings in respect of weight loss are less clear. Current data suggest only modest, if any, weight loss in human participants who undergo these diet regimens when compared to calorie-restricted diets.

Drawing definitive conclusions in humans may be more difficult because of the small sample sizes and individual differences in metabolism, variations in study design (such as the use of different protocols with varying times and duration of food restriction), and participants not complying with their instructions.

Working against this default stage, by regularly eating when we're supposed to sleep and fast, can compromise these processes and impact our health. Erratic eating patterns, including latenight meals, have been linked to weight gain and a greater risk of metabolic disease.

Most studies describing the health benefits of time restricted eating or intermittent fasting also found these diets were accompanied by calorie restriction: reducing the time of food access implicitly leads people to eat less. Studies that controlled calorie intake did not detect any more benefits of intermittent fasting than calorie restriction alone.

The weight loss and health benefits observed with intermittent fasting is likely attributed due to the resultant reduction in calorie intake. Similar findings have been reported for time-restricted eating.

Benefit of following our body clock

Nevertheless, time-restricted eating offers additional health benefits in humans, such as improved glucose metabolism and blood pressure, even without differences in calorie intake, in particular when restricted to the earlier part of the day (that is, when having a six-hour eating window with dinner before 3pm).

Restricting food intake to the daytime for shiftworkers can alleviate metabolic differences caused by shift-work, whereas this effect is not observed when food intake is restricted to nighttime. One idea is that consuming food early, in alignment with our circadian rhythm, helps to synchronise our circadian clock. This restores the rhythm of our autonomous nervous system, which regulates essential functions such as breathing and heart rate, to keep our physiology "tuned", as it was shown in mice.

While there's much still to learn from research in this field, the evidence suggests that to maintain a healthy weight and overall wellbeing, aim for regular, nutritious meals during the day, while avoiding late-night eating and frequent snacking. (Courtesy: Scroll.in)

our chances of developing Type 2 Diabetes Mellitus (T2 DM) depend on a combination of various risk factors rather than one single risk factor

Knowing the risk factors for Type 2 diabetes (external link) can help you make changes that promote positive effects and thus prevent development of diabetes

Certain risk factors like family history, age, race, or ethnicity, can't be changed, however you may be able to avoid some risk factors by maintaining a healthy lifestyle and being physically

Risk Factors for Type 2 Diabetes 1. Family history

Genetics plays a role as a risk factor for Type 2 diabetes. You're two to six times more at risk if you have a family history of Type 2 diabetes, 2. Race or ethnic background

It is observed that diabetes has a

higher prevalence in certain race and ethnic background populations including Asian-Indian 3. Age If you are 35 or older then you are

at higher risk for prediabetes and Type 2 diabetes. Even though the risk of Type 2 DM increases as a person gets older, due to current lifestyle practices the incidence of Type 2 DM in young individuals has increased significantly 4. Gestational diabetes If you have a history of gestational

diabetes (external link) i.e. Diabetes during pregnancy, then you are at increased risk of developing diabetes later in life. About 50 per cent of women with gestational diabetes go on to develop

Type 2 diabetes. You can lower your risk by reaching a healthy body weight after delivery. Lifestyle changes leading to over-

It is important to know that obesity

or overweight is one of the major risk factors for Type 2 diabetes.

If you have obesity, you're about six times more likely to develop Type 2 diabetes than those at a healthy weight. Insulin is a hormone produced by the pancreas in the body to regulate the

blood sugar levels. In obese individuals with Type 2 diabetes, the amount of insulin produced may not meet the requirements of the body, thus, the blood sugar remains elevated. This is termed insulin resist-

Acanthosis nigricans (a skin condition with dark, thick patches on the neck or armpits), deranged cholesterol levels and central (abdominal) deposition of fat can be signs of insulin re-

sistance and risk for diabetes. Your Body Mass Index (BMI) can help you identify if your weight is healthy, if you are overweight or

Most adults with a BMI of 25 or higher are overweight and have a higher risk of developing Type 2 diabetes. Asian-Indians are considered overweight if their BMI is 23 or

For prevention of Type 2 diabetes (external link), reduction of obesity is a key goal which can be achieved by reducing caloric intake and increasing the physical activity

1. Prediabetes

Prediabetes is defined as glucose levels above normal but below diabetes thresholds. People with prediabetes are at high-risk state for diabetes with an annualised conversion rate of 5 per cent to 10 per cent.

As death toll from Maui fire reaches 93, authorities say effort to count the losses is just starting

LAHAINA, Aug 13 (AP): As the death toll from a wildfire that razed a historic Maui town reached 93. authorities warned Saturday that the effort to find and identify the dead was still in its early stages. It's already the deadliest US wildfire for over a century.

Crews with cadaver dogs have covered just 3 per cent of the search area, Maui Police Chief John Pelletier said.

"We've got an area that we have to contain that is at least 5 square miles and it is full of our loved ones," noting that the death toll is likely to grow and "none of us really know the size of it yet."

He spoke as federal emergency workers picked through the ashen moonscape left by the fire that razed the centuries-old town of La-

Teams marked the ruins of homes with a bright orange X to record an initial search, and HR when they found human remains.

Pelletier said identifying the dead is extremely challenging because "we pick up the remains and they fall apart ... When we find our family and our friends, the remains that we're finding is through a fire that melted metal." Two people have been identified so far, he said.

Dogs worked the rubble, and their occasional bark — used to corpse — echoed over the hot and colourless landscape.

"It will certainly be the worst natural disaster that Hawaii ever faced," Gov. Josh Green remarked Saturday as he toured the devastation on historic Front Street.

"We can only wait and support those who are living. Our focus now is to reunite people when we can and get them housing and get them health care, and then turn to rebuilding.

At least 2,200 buildings were damaged or destroyed in West Maui, Green said, of which 86 per cent were residential. Across the island, he added, damage was estimated at close to USD 6 billion. He said it would take "an incredible amount of time" to recover."

The confirmed death toll was later raised to 93 from the total of 89 announced in a press conference with Green and other offi-

At least two other fires have been burning on Maui, with no fatalities reported thus far: in south Maui's Kihei area and in the mountainous, inland communities known as Upcountry. A fourth broke out Friday evening in Kaanapali, a coastal community north of Lahaina, but crews were able to extinguish it, authorities



said. Green said the Upcountry fire had affected 544 structures, of which 96% were residential.

Emergency managers in Maui were searching for places to house people displaced from their homes.

As many as 4,500 people are in need of shelter, county officials said on Facebook early Saturday, citing figures from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the Pacific Disaster Centre.

Retired fire captain Geoff Bogar and his friend of 35 years, Franklin Trejos, initially stayed behind to help others in Lahaina and save Bogar's house. But as the flames moved closer and closer Tuesday afternoon, they knew they had to

Each escaped to his own car. When Bogar's wouldn't start, he broke through a window to get out, then crawled on the ground until a police patrol found him and brought him to a hospital.

Bogar returned the next day, he found the bones of his 68-year-old friend in the back seat of his car, lying on top of the remains of the Bogars' beloved 3-year-old golden retriever Sam, whom he had tried to protect.

Trejos, a native of Costa Rica. had lived for years with Bogar and his wife, Shannon Weber-Bogar, helping her with her seizures when her husband couldn't. He filled their lives with love and laughter. "God took a really good man,"

Weber-Bogar said. The newly released death toll surpassed the toll of the 2018

Camp Fire in northern California, which left 85 dead and destroyed the town of Paradise. A century earlier, the 1918 Clo-

quet Fire broke out in droughtstricken northern Minnesota and raced through a number of rural communities, destroying thousands of homes and killing hun-

The wildfires are the state's deadliest natural disaster in decades, surpassing a 1960 tsunami that killed 61 people.

An even deadlier tsunami in 1946, which killed more than 150 on the Big Island, prompted development of a territory-wide emergency alert system with sirens that

Hawaii emergency management records do not indicate the warning sirens sounded before fire hit the town. Officials sent alerts to mobile phones, televisions and radio stations, but widespread power and cellular outages may have limited their reach.

Fueled by a dry summer and strong winds from a passing hurricane, the wildfires on Maui raced through parched brush covering the island.

"It outpaced anything firefighters could have done in the early hours," US Fire Administrator Lori Moore-Merrell said, adding that it moved horizontally, structure to structure and "incredibly fast." "It was a low-to-the-ground fire. It was grass-fed by all evidence that we could observe today," she said.

The most serious blaze swept into Lahaina on Tuesday and destroyed nearly every building in the town of 13,000, leaving a grid of gray rubble wedged between the blue ocean and lush green slopes.

Maui water officials warned Lahaina and Kula residents not to drink running water, which may be contaminated even after boiling, and to only take short, lukewarm showers in well-ventilated rooms to avoid possible chemical vapor

One terrorist killed, 3 injured in Pakistan

KARACHI, Aug 13 (PTI): One terrorist was killed and three others injured on Sunday in an exchange of fire with security forces in the port city of Gwadar in Pakistan's troubled Balochistan province, the army said.

Gwadar port is one of the focal points of the multi-billion China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) with many Chinese workers working at the port. China is investing heavily in Balochistan under the CPEC.

According to the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), Pakistan military's media wing, the operation was launched after the presence of terrorists in the area was reported.

'The security forces have cordoned off the entire area [and] launched a search operation," the ISPR said. Pakistan has seen an uptick in terror activities, especially in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Balochistan, after the outlawed Tehrik-e-Taliban Pakistan ended its ceasefire with the government in November last year.

Last month, as many as 12 soldiers of the Pakistan Army were killed in separate military operations in the Zhob and Sui areas of Balochistan. This was the military's highest single-day death toll from terrorist attacks reported this year.

Syrian capital rocked by explosions

BEIRUT, Aug 13 (AP): The sound of repeated explosions could be heard in the area around the Syrian capital before dawn on Sunday, state media and Damascus residents said. There was no immediate statement from government officials on the source or target of the attack. Similar incidents in the past have usually been attributed to Israeli airstrikes, with Syrian air defences responding to shoot down the missiles.

Britain-based opposition war monitor the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said the explosion came from a warehouse storing rockets for Iran-backed militias, though it could not confirm whether it was an Israeli strike.

The Observatory said it was still unclear if anyone was wounded or killed in the explosion. The most recent reported Israeli strike was on August 7, when Syrian state media reported airstrikes in areas around Damascus, killing at least four Syrian army soldiers. The Observatory has said those strikes targeted weapons and munitions warehouses and positions of Iran-backed militias around Damascus. Israel, which has vowed to stop Iranian entrenchment in its neighbour, has carried out hundreds of strikes on targets in government-controlled parts of Syria in recent years, but it rarely ac-

Niger's junta gains upper hand over regional bloc threatening military force, analysts say



NIAMEY (NIGER), Aug 13 (AP): One week after a deadline passed for mutinous soldiers in Niger to reinstate the country's ousted president or face military intervention, the junta has not acquiesced.

No military action has been taken and the coup leaders appear to have gained the upper hand over the regional group that issued the threat, analysts say. The West African regional bloc ECOWAS had given the soldiers that overthrew Niger's democratically elected President Mohamed Bazoum until last Sunday to release and reinstate him or they threatened military action. On Thursday, the bloc ordered the deployment of a "standby" force to restore constitutional rule in Niger, with Nigeria, Benin, Senegal and Ivory Coast saying they would contribute troops.

But it's unclear when, how or if the troops will deploy. The move could take weeks or months to set into motion, and while the bloc decides what to do the junta is gaining power, some say.

"It looks the putschists have won and will stay ... The putschists are holding all the cards and have cemented their rule," said Ulf Laessing, head of the Sahel program at the Konrad Adenauer Foundation.

ECOWAS is unlikely to intervene militarily and risk dragging Niger into civil war, he said, adding that ECOWAS and Western countries would instead likely press the junta to agree to a short transition period. Europe and the United States will have little choice but to recognize the junta in order to continue the security cooperation in the region, Laessing said. The July 26 coup is seen as a major blow to many Western nations, which saw Niger as one of the last partners in the conflict-riddled Sahel region south of the Sahara Desert that they could work with to beat back a growing jihadi insurgency linked to al-Qaida and the Islamic State group.

The US and France have more than 2,500 military personnel in the region and together with other European countries have invested hundreds of millions of dollars in military assistance and training Niger's forces. There was still little clarity about what would happen days after ECOWAS announced the "standby" force deployment.

A meeting of the region's defense chiefs was postponed indefinitely. The African Union is expected to hold a meeting on Monday to discuss Niger's crisis. The group's Peace and Security Council could overrule the decision if it felt that wider peace and security on the continent was threatened by an intervention.

The delay of the defense chiefs' meeting to discuss the "standby" force shows that ECOWAS views the use of force as a last resort, said Nate Allen, an associate professor at the Africa Centre for Strategic Studies.

"Given the likely challenges an intervention would face, (the use of force would) require a high degree of consensus and coordination not just within ECOWAS, but within the African Union and international community writ large," he said. But those with ties to the junta say they are preparing for a fight, especially since the soldiers are unwilling to negotiate unless ECOWAS acknowledges its leader, Gen. Abdourahmane Tchiani, who overthrew the president, as the new ruler.

"ECOWAS is demanding that (the junta) immediately release president Bazoum and restore him as head of state. Is this a joke?" said Insa Garba Saidou, a local activist who assists Niger's new military rulers with their communications and says he is in direct contact with them. "Whether Bazoum resigns or not, he will never be Niger's president again.'

As time drags on, there is mounting concern for Bazoum's safety, who has been under house arrest with his wife and son since the coup.

Those close to him say his situation is deteriorating with no water, electricity and a lack of food. Niger's junta told a top US diplomat that they would kill the deposed president if neighbouring countries attempted any military intervention to restore his rule, two Western officials told The Associated Press. Most Nigeriens are trying to go about their lives as the standoff continues between the coup leaders and regional countries.

For the most part, the streets in the capital, Niamey, are calm with sporadic pockets of pro-junta demonstrations.

On Friday hundreds of people marched toward France's military base

demanding the French leave while waving Russian flags Mercenaries from the Russian-linked Wagner group already operate in handful of other African countries and are accused of committing human rights abuses. Earlier this month during a trip to neighbouring Mali, which is also run by a military regime and cooperates with Wagner, the junta reportedly asked the mercenaries for help. But many Nigeriens don't have time for protests and are more focused on feeding their families. The country of some 25 million people is one of the poorest in the world and the harsh travel and economic sanctions imposed by ECOWAS are taking a toll.

Leader of Ecuadorian crime gang moved to maximum-security prison

GUAYAQUIL (ECUADOR), Aug 13 (AP): Authorities moved the leader of one of Ecuador's most powerful gangs into a maximum-security prison Saturday, three days after the assassination of a presidential candidate who had denounced threats from the feared criminal. President Guillermo Lasso said the relocation of Los Choneros leader

Adolfo Macías, alias "Fito," was meant "for the safety of citizens and detainees." The gang boss was moved out of a jail with lighter security into a maximum-security prison in the same large complex of detention facilities in the port city of Guayaquil. "Ecuador will recover peace and security," Lasso tweeted. "If violent reactions arise, we will act with full force." About 4,000 soldiers and police officers raided the jail where Macías was being held Saturday and seized weapons, ammunition and explosives. Corrections officials released images of the raid showing several prisoners, including Macías, who is serving a 34-year sentence for drug trafficking, organised crime and homicide. Ecuador's transformation into a major drug trafficking hub and the ensuing three-year surge of violence reached a new level with Wednesday's assassination of Fernando Villavicencio during a campaign rally in Quito, the capital. The candidate, who was not a front-runner, was known for speaking up against drug cartels.

UK's Suella Braverman speaks of tragic loss of lives as migrants drown

LONDON, Aug 13 (PTI): The British govt is under renewed pressure on Sunday as six migrants drowned in the English Channel and 59 were rescued after their vessel sank off the French coast. Home Secretary Suella Braverman said she spoke to UK Border Force teams as she expressed her grief over the "tragic" loss of lives.

The Opposition Labour Party and campaigners renewed their calls on the government to act on the small boat crisis of unsafe vessels being used by migrants to cross over illegally into the UK.

"My thoughts and prayers are with those affected by the tragic loss of life in the Channel today.

This morning I spoke with our Border Force teams who have been supporting the French authorities in response to this incident,'

Braverman tweeted on Saturday.

The overloaded vessel got into difficulty and capsized 20km off Sangatte in France on Saturday. Five French ships, two British ships and a helicopter were involved in the rescue operation to save lives.

"This incident is sadly another reminder of the extreme dangers of crossing the Channel in small boats and how vital it is that we break the people smugglers' business model and stop the boats," a said. Labour's shadow immigration minister, Stephen Kinnock, accused the government of having "no workable plan" to sort out the asylum system. "It's time to end the small boats nightmare – we can't sit by as more lives are put at risk. The country deserves better than this mess," he writes in the 'Sunday Mirror'

The Conservative Party government also faced pressure on the issue from within its own ranks, with former Tory chairman Jake Berry calling for "radical changes" to turn the tide. "We have a moral duty, both to our own citizens and those asylum seekers, to act," he

China's foreign minister visits Cambodia days after incumbent premier hands off the job to his son

PHNOM PENH, Aug 13 (AP): China's foreign minister visited Cambodia over the weekend to reaffirm his country's commitment to the southeast Asian country after its incumbent prime minister handed off the job to his son following a one-sided election last month, officials said.

Wang Yi is the first foreign leader to visit Cambodia, days after Hun Sen's announcement that his 45-year-old son and the country's army chief, Hun Manet, is replacing him. A video of the meeting was posted on Hun Sen's Telegram

Eang Sophalleth, Hun Sen's spokesman, told reporters after the meeting that Wang Yi expressed China's willingness to cooperate with the newly-appointed prime minister. Cambodia's foreign ministry later released a statement citing Wang Yi as expressing China's support for "the King-

dom's emerging government leadership.' Hun Sen, the longest-serving government head in Asia, and his party sealed a landslide victory in the country's general election after barring the main opposition group —the Candlelight Party— from contesting the polls on a technicality. Western nations and rights groups criticised the elec-

tion saying it was neither "free" nor "fair.' Wang Yi met with both Hun Sen, his newly appointed son



as well as Foreign Minister Prak Sokhonn. He praised the election saying it was free and fair, with more than 80 per cent of Cambodians participating in the presence of several dozens of foreign observers. On August 7, King Norodom Sihamoni formally appointed Hun Manet as the new premier. He will take office on August 22 when the new National Assembly adopts the new cabinet.

Hun Manet won his first seat in Parliament in the election,

and the handover from his father is part of a larger, generational shift: Many younger lawmakers —mostly educated in the West — are expected to take up ministerial positions, including Hun Sen's youngest son and others related to older party members. Cambodia is a key Chinese diplomatic partner, helping dampen criticism of Beijing within the 10-member Association of Southeast Asian Nations, several of whose members are engaged in territorial disputes with China in the South China Sea.

In return, China has gained an outsized role in Cambodian politics and the economy, as seen in the numerous Chinesefunded projects, hotels and casinos dotting the landscape.

China's state banks have also financed airports, roads and other infrastructure built with Chinese loans. More than 40 per cent of Cambodia's USD 10 billion in foreign debt is owed to China. In June last year, China and Cambodia broke ground on a naval port expansion project that has raised concerns from the US and others that it could give Beijing a strategically important military outpost on the Gulf of Thailand. Hun Sen in 2019 reportedly granted China the right to set up a military base at the Ream Naval Base. He has long denied that, saying Cambodia's Constitution prohibits foreign military facilities.

'Authorised' poultry syndicate baffles Dimapur trader's body

DIMAPUR, Aug 13: The Dimapur Chamber of Commerce and Industry (DCCI) expressed shock that the office of secretary taxation of the Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council in Assam has allegedly authorised a poultry syndicate and allowed to set up a check gate at Khatkhati near Dimapur to intercept vehicles transporting chickens to Nagaland on the pretext of license checking.

The Poultry Union Dimapur (PUD) imposed an indefinite ban on import of poultry to Nagaland on August 10 opposing the syndicate system that allegedly charges Rs 30 per kg of poultry before any poultry consignment is allowed to enter Dimapur. The union decided to continue the ban till a viable solution is reached in order to stop exploitation of poultry traders and consumers of Naga-

Extending support to the poultry ban by the PUD, the DCCI in a release wondered why the Nagaland government and the

not come up with any concrete action and update the public on the issue.

Saying that it has always been at the forefront against any form of monopoly or unfair trade practices, especially in the commercial hub Dimapur, the DCCI said the recent disclosure by the PUD of a syndicate system operating in neighbouring Assam with regard to import of live chickens into Nagaland is indeed alarming.

The traders' body reiterated its stand that there should not be any syndicate system, whether in poultry or any other businesses, in Dimapur and the whole of Nagaland. The syndicate system has for long stifled healthy competition in business, especially at the cost of local entrepreneurs and small-time businessmen, it observed.

Noting that the total ban on import of live chickens is affecting almost every household in Nagaland, the DCCI extended support to the PUD in its fight against the syndicate

system as it will deprive the local poultry traders and farmers of their profit margin, and ultimately their very livelihood. The DCCI members along with members

Left Front announces candidates for Tripura Assembly bypolls

AGARTALA, Aug 13 (PTI): A day after meeting Tipra Motha and Congress leaders, the CPI (M)-led Left Front on Sunday announced its candidates for the September 5 bypolls in Dhanpur and Boxanagar assembly constituencies in Tripura's Sepahijala district. While Kaushik Chanda will be the Left Front's candidate from Dhanpur constituency, Mizan Hussain will contest from Boxanagar, front convenor Narayan Kar said.

In the last Assembly elections, Chanda had lost to Union Minister Pratima Bhoumik from Dhanpur, but the CPI (M) managed to retain the Boxanagar seat defeating the BJP candidate in a triangular contest. Mizan is the son of Boxanagar CPI (M) MLA Samsol Haque who passed away in July causing a vacancy. The bypoll in Dhanpur was ne-

cessitated after Bhoumik resigned from the Assembly days after her election. "The two candidates will submit their nomination papers on August 15," Kar told a press conference. CPI (M) state secretary Jitendra Chowdhury told reporters he had a

meeting with two opposition parties — Tipra Motha and Congress — on Saturday and discussed about the polls.

"We told the leaders of both parties that the CPI (M) has a strong political base in Dhanpur and Boxanagar. While the CPI (M) won the Boxanagar seat despite a difficult situation, the party could not win in Dhanpur seat because of Tipra Motha's presence," he said.

Claiming that the Left Front is '200 per cent' sure of getting support from Tipra Motha and Congress in the bypolls, Chowdhury said all the three parties have vowed to avoid split of anti-BJP votes to defeat the saffron party. The CPI (M) state secretary claimed that the BJP has been ruling the northeastern state with 'less mandate' (39 per cent vote share)

of Independence Day celebrations

IMPHAL, Aug 13 (PTI): Security arrangements were beefed up in Manipur on Sunday after some Imphal valley-based banned organisations called for a strike on Independence Day, officials said.

Security forces also conducted search operations in vulnerable areas of five districts police said.

Preparations for the I-Day celebrations are in full swing across the state with BSF, police and Assam Rifles personnel and students joining rehearsals for march past to be held on August 15.

"Rehearsals for I-Day celebrations were held on Saturday at Peace Ground in Churachandpur district's Tuiboung area. Twenty-one parade contingents of BSF, police, students and Assam Rifles participated in the preparations," an official said. Preparations are also underway in the capital Imphal with temporary gates being erected and hoardings being put up to celebrate Inde-

pendence Day on August 15. "Security measures have been significantly heightened after several militant outfits called for a strike on I-Day," another

official said. Several outlawed outfits, such as Coordinating Committee (Corcom), called for a general strike on I-Day from 1 am to 6.30

Corcom includes banned groups including United National Liberation Front (UNLF), People's Liberation Army (PLA), and PREPAK.

Two more proscribed outfits in Manipur have also separately called for a shutdown on August 15.

"Search operations were conducted in the fringe and vulnerable areas of Imphal-West, Imphal-East, Thoubal, Bishnupur and Churachandpur districts by the state police and central security forces and recovered 12 arms, six ammunitions and eight explosives," the Manipur Police said on Twitter.

Notably, more than 160 people lost their lives and several hundred were injured since the ethnic clashes broke out in Manipur on May 3, after a 'Tribal Solidarity March' was organised in the hill districts to protest against the Meitei community's demand for Scheduled Tribe (ST) status.

Meiteis account for about 53 per cent of Manipur's population and live mostly in the Imphal Valley. Tribals — Nagas and Kukis constitute little over 40 per cent and reside in the hill districts.

They said that over the past four days, the eight-member team from different parts of the country has visited affected villages and relief camps across the state.

The eight members were Pratima Enghipee (CPIML leader from Karbi Anglong of Assam, Bibek Das (CPIML leader from Assam), Sucheta De (CPIML leader from Delhi), Avani Chokshi (CPIML leader from Karnataka), Clifton D' Rozario (CPIML leader from Karnataka), Krishnaveni (All India Progressive Women's Association), Madhulika T (All India Lawyers Association for Justice) and Du. Saraswati (Dalit and women's rights activist from Karnataka).

"We are shocked at the political turmoil created by the double-engine BJP governments in Manipur and at the Centre," they said.

The team had visited villages and relief camps in Imphal valley, Kangpokpi and Churachandpur districts.

In a written statement distributed during the press conference, the team alleged that the unprecedented violence in the state is the gift of the BJP on the 75th anniversary of India's independence. "Never before in the history of India has a government

overseen such a complete decimation of society's social fabric that entire communities within a state are ethniated into different parts of a state," it stated

It alleged that the double-engine BJP government has manufactured this segregation in a state, which despite previous conflicts, was able to reconcile and live together. The violence and ethnic segregation has been raging for more than three months now and it is the product of the actions of the BJP government, the statement also said. Even as the chief minister proved thoroughly incompetent and reluctant to put an end to the violence, the Prime Minister prioritized his visits to France and the US over Manipur, the statement added.

The miserable response of the Prime Minister and the union home minister in Parliament exposed the bankruptcy in offering any comprehensive political solution to this crisis, it further alleged. On the conditions of the displaced people taking shelter at the relief camps, they stated that the situation is grim.

Across the valley and the hills, thousands of internally displaced persons live in desperate conditions. Basic services are lacking and the government has wiped its hands off the suffering people, they alleged in the written

Sikkim to get organic agriculture university

CM lays foundation stone

GANGTOK, Aug 13 (PTI): Chief Minister Prem Singh Tamang on Sunday laid the foundation stone for the Sikkim Organic Agriculture University (SOAU) at Mondegaon in Soreng district. Stating that Sikkim has established itself as the country's first organic state, Tamang said SOAU will be a centre of excellence where sub jects related to organic farming will be taught.

Hundreds of students from the state go outside to study agriculture, horticulture and forestry, he said, adding that he had met over 500 students in Dehradun itself who were doing urndergraduate and post-graduate courses in these subjects.

With the SOAU coming up in Sikkim, the students of the state will no longer have to travel outside for studying these subjects, Tamang said.

He directed officials to identify temporary spaces for the commencement of courses at the

The Sikkim assembly passed the Sikkim Organic Agriculture University Act, 2023 earlier this year. The varsity will also boost economic activities in the remote Mondegaon area, the chief minister said.

"The SOAU will become a hub of economic activities, generating employment opportunities for the local people once the infrastructure is developed within a year," Tamang said.

Women of tribal organisations attend solidarity prayer for strife-torn Manipur

GUWAHATI, Aug 13: Women representatives from eight apex tribal organisations of Nagaland comprising of Ao, Angami, Chakhesang, Lotha, Pochury, Rengma, Sumi and Zeliang, organised a solidarity prayer for the ethnic clashes and violence against women in strife-torn Manipur at PHQ junction.

Angami Women Organisation (AWO), Chakhesang Mothers Association (CMA), Lotha Eloe Ekhung (LEE), Pochury Mothers Association (PMA), Rengma Mothers Association (RMA), Sumi Totimi Hoho (STH), Watsu Telen (WT), Zeliang Mpui Organisation (ZMO) and Central Nagaland Women Association (CNWA), Angami Public Organisation took part on the occasion.

Leading the solidarity messages and call to shun violence, APO vice president, Neivor Rutsa. maintained that since the situation in Manipur was man-made, it could also be brought under con-

trol and stopped eventually. He reiterated that atrocity or violence in any form especially against women and children cannot be justified and therefore, deemed that it has to be stopped at the ear-

Rutsa said besides loss of precious lives, the unrest was also hampering the career and education of the children.

"The neighbouring state Manipur has been burning for more than hundred days now. We are deeply concerned and our hearts weep especially for the womenfolk," AWO president Neilhuzono Nagi said. The AWO president also asserted that atrocities against women or any human being would not bring solution to any problem. She appealed to the people of Manipur to stop the violence and let good sense prevail. CMA president, Zhonelü Tunyi, said the mothers were gathered to express solidarity with the people of Manipur who were going through untold hardships.

She pointed out that women were made to bear the brunt of the violence ever since it broke out more than three months back.

Tunyi said that abuse and insult perpetrated on womenfolk cannot be tolerated anymore.

"Mothers and daughters have become targets after the unrest broke out because of land issues. This is a very big disgrace and should be stopped immediately,"

she said. LEE president, Renboni Ezung, expressed solidarity with the people of Manipur and said the mothers were voicing out against the violence. She said that unrest in the neighbouring state cannot be looked at in isolation. Ezung said that Manipur as one of the sister states in the Northeast was considered as family and that Nagas feel the pain, shame and unspoken anger against the unrest.

She called upon the leaders at both the Centre and Manipur to listen to the voice of the people and restore peace. Speaking on behalf of PMA,

Atono Nyuthe, said the ethnic clash in Manipur was not just a local, tribal or racial issue, but one that was universal in nature. Describing the situation as "a

humanitarian crisis", Nyuthe said that people needed to come together now more than ever. "It is an absolute tragedy that

two of our womenfolk were being used as pawns in a political game and their precious lives were thrown away so easily under the most terrible circumstances," she

RMA president Sojule Tep appealed to the people of Manipur to stop the "madness", lay down their arms and embrace dialogue.

She also appealed to the people



to respect each other's rights and dignity, uphold the values of democracy, secularism and remember that human beings were created by God in His image.

Tep also appealed to the people government in Manipur and Centre to intervene and urgently address the root cause of the conflict.

Speaking on behalf of STH, Piholi Swunetho, expressed pain and shock at the ghastly act carried out against two women in Manipur in a widely circulated video. She added that it was more un-

settling that the viral video was not an isolated event and that there were reports of other brutal act of atrocities meted out against women that went unreported or the victims

silenced with dire consequences. While condemning devious crimes, she reminded perpetrators that they were once also nurtured and looked after by mothers and sisters. "It may seem foolish, inconceivable and a pathetic attempt to seal a festering wound to talk about healing at this juncture, however, we pray to our sovereign Lord to sweep over and grant healing to the wounded hearts and

souls in Manipur," Swunetho said. Speaking on behalf of Watsü Telen Mungdang, Aotula said protection and preservation of women and children was intrinsic to the moral core of human beings and absolute among virtues.

Condemning the violence in-

flicted on womenfolk in Manipur, she said the Naga mothers were gathered to express their solidarity and sympathy with those who had suffered physical and mental torture. She said outraging the modesty of women was the most humiliating, painful and detestable thing possible

While expressing sympathy and solidarity with those afflicted by the unrest, Aotula called upon all the responsible citizens to be building blocks for dialogue.

Speaking on behalf of ZMO, Dr. Zaiwang, said Nagas must not remain mute spectators to the atrocities and social injustices being witnessed in neighbouring Manipur. She said coming together to express solidarity to the victims was an indication of conviction and belief. Although Nagas could not do much physically, she said they could pray for the those affected by the turmoil and be source

of solace and comfort. She expressed hope that humanity would triumph over the atrocities, while peace and hope would return to the land.

CNWA president, Atoli Sema, said womenfolk were created to bring humanity into the world, but they were being mistreated and disgraced to a great extent in Ma-

She strongly suggested that the constitution of India should be rewritten and death penalty should be awarded to rapists. "Women are made beautiful so that they would be loved. But men are destroying the very body which birthed and nurtured them. How many more of such cases shall we tolerate? We will not stop now until justice is delivered. All women in the Northeast should rise up against these atrocities against women," Sema

NEW DELHI, Aug 13 (PTI): The Congress on Sunday called for wider consultations involving experts and the general public on the three Bills that seek to overhaul India's criminal justice system to stay away from the "trap of bulldozing the entire criminal law structure" without discussion. In a statement, Congress general secretary Randeep Surjewala said that on August 11, without any prior intimation or public consultation or inviting suggestions from legal experts, jurists, criminologists and other stakeholders, the Modi government introduced three Bills from its "black magic hat", thereby restructuring the nation's entire criminal law apparatus in a "clandestine, hidden and opaque

"The introductory remarks of the home minister himself gave away the fact that Amit Shah is himself out of depth, ignorant and oblivious to the entire exercise," the Congress leader said.

"Other than some credit seeking and point scoring in desperation, a hidden exercise, away from the public glare or stakeholders' suggestions and wisdom, cannot serve the public purpose of reforming the criminal law structure of the country," he said.

Union home minister Amit Shah introduced the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) Bill, 2023; Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS) Bill, 2023; and Bharatiya Sakshya (BS) Bill, 2023 that will replace the Indian Penal Code, 1860, Criminal Procedure Act, 1898, and Indian Evidence Act, 1872, respectively.

The minister also urged Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla to refer the three bills for examination by the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Home Affairs. In a detailed analysis, Surjewala



countered Shah's remarks on the changes made through the Bills and alleged that he had "lied and misled" on many points of the proposed

"While the Bills have been referred to the Select Committee of Parliament, the Bills and their provisions must be thrown open for a larger public debate by judges, lawyers, jurists, criminologists, reformers, stakeholders and the general public in order to stay away from the trap of bulldozing the entire criminal law structure without discussion that is so ingrained in the DNA of the BJP government," he said.

"We hope that better sense will prevail," he added. Congress MP Manish Tewari has also called for wider consultations on the bills.

Each provision in each of these enactments has been extensively litigated over the past 150-100 years and the interpretation of each provision has been settled by judicial pronouncements by the privy council, federal court, Supreme Court, various high courts and in some cases even by subordinate courts," Tewari said on X. formerly known as Twitter.

The three new Bills introduced by Shah and referred to the Standing Committee on Home Affairs need to be examined critically provision by provision in the light of judicial pronouncements interpreting them, he said.

"It therefore is imperative that a Joint Committee of Parliament consisting of lawyers, retired judges, former police officials/civil servants, jurists and members active in human, women and civil rights movements should be constituted by Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla, Vice President Jagdeep Dhankhar to examine all these three bills very very critically," Tewari said on Saturday. These Bills have serious implications on the fundamental rights enshrined in Part -III of the Constitution of India especially the Golden Triangle of rights Article-14, 19 and 21, he asserted.

Among other things, the three Bills propose to repeal the sedition law and introduce a new provision with a wider definition of the offence. Besides defining terrorism for the first time,

the changes aimed at transforming the country's criminal justice system include provisions for maximum capital punishment for mob lynching, sexual assault of minors, maximum imprisonment of 20 years for all types of gangrape and community service as one of the punishments

India, UK striving to create more transparent, corruption-free society: Jitendra Singh

and the United Kingdom are striving to create a more transparent and corruption-free society, Union minister Jitendra Singh has said.

He also called for wider cooperation between the two countries in sharing information and communication technology (ICT) innovations, promoting cross-sector cooperation and forging partnerships to prevent and combat corruption, according to an official statement issued on Sunday.

UK minister for security, Tom Tugendhat, called on Singh and held a "bilateral" meeting on the sidelines of the G20 anti-corruption ministerial meet being held in Kolkata, it said. Tugendhat was accompanied by a high-level British government delegation and reaffirmed closer cooperation with India. Singh said Prime Minister Narendra Modi has reiterated that India has a strict policy of zero tolerance against corruption, said the Personnel Ministry statement.

Tugendhat renewed the UK's offer that India, being a signatory to the United Nations Convention Against Corruption (UNCAC), also implement Article 16 of UNCAC that deals with bribery of foreign public officials (foreign bribery), it added.

He also called upon India to sign the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development



ing Bribery of Foreign Public Officials in International Business Transactions, also known as OECD anti-bribery convention of which Britain is a member, the statement said

Singh stated that India has already ratified the UNCAC.

"On December 1, 2022, India, led by PM Modi, assumed the G20 presidency amidst global crises. Embracing India's message of 'Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam', both developed and emerging economies of G20 have come together for sharing responsibilities in tackling critical global issues like fighting corruption," he said.

Singh said steps have been taken to ensure transparency and accountability in the functioning of the government. "This includes the adoption of e-governance, implementation of the Aadhaar system for direct benefit transfer, procurement reforms and citizen charters in public offices," the statement said.

Singh said India actively participates in the G20 anti-corruption working group (ACWG) forum and related joint meetings. "Under India's leadership, the G20 ACWG has achieved significant milestones, including the adoption of three sets of high-level principles and hosting three successful working group meetings. This will give political impetus to the ongoing momentum of facilitating international collaboration and enhancing accountability in the fight against corruption," he said.

BJP gave RLD 'respect', any decision on forging alliance to be taken by leadership of both parties: UP min

LUCKNOW, Aug 13 (PTI): The Rashtriya Lok Dal's alliance with the BJP in the 2009 Lok Sabha polls had proved "most advantageous" for the Jayant Chaudharyled party as it had won five seats and any decision on forging an alliance with the Samajwadi Party ally is yet to be taken, Uttar Pradesh minister Kapil Dev Aggarwal has said. He also claimed that the RLD's voters were today attracted towards the BJP.

The minister's remarks come days after the RLD accused the BJP of spreading rumours about the party joining the National Democratic Alliance (NDA).

A delegation of RLD MLAs had on Wednesday met chief minister Yogi Adityanath triggering speculation that the party might join the BJP-led NDA. However, talking to PTI, RLD national spokesperson Anil Dubey had said the party MLAs met the chief minister to highlight the problems of farmers due to drought and floods.

This is being projected as a preparation for the RLD to join the NDA, which is "false", Dubey had said, adding the BJP was worried about the popularity of the RLD and that is why it is engaging in "propaganda". Aggarwal said whether the RLD forges an alliance with the BJP or not in the Lok Sabha polls early next year

I am not even in Parliament," he said.

"Since this government came to power, they always come up with something against me whenever they are cornered and they want to digress from real issues... but they have never been able to prove anything against me," he said.

On the opposition alliance, he said, the Congress has joined the

INDIA bloc and it will give them (the BJP-led NDA) a good fight in the 2024 Lok Sabha elections. "I feel INDIA is a very good

title. We are going to make India great again. The BJP government has destroyed India," he said. "I am very hopeful. And I think and I hope the citizens of the country give this group a chance to make India better again, secular again, progressive again and... united again." He also asked why Prime Minister Narendra Modi has not visited Manipur so far and why he talked in a "derogatory way" about the state during his speech in par-

"Those shocking videos need to be sent to the prime minister again to show what is happening in Manipur," Vadra said, referring to the video of two women being paraded naked in the state.

"It is definitely a very sensitive matter. The prime minister himself should look into what is happening in Manipur. They have their government there. They need to resolve the matter or let another party handle it," he said.

On the suspension of opposition MPs from Parliament, he said it shows a complete misuse of power by the ruling dispensation.

"As they use central agency on (opposition party) people, they use the suspension tactics," he said.

NIA carries out raids in five states in PFI conspiracy case

NEW DELHI, Aug 13 (PTI): The

National Investigation Agency on

Sunday conducted a series of raids in five states as part of its continued efforts to foil the Popular Front of India's conspiracy to disturb peace by driving a communal wedge among the people and destabilise the country, an official said. Fourteen locations were searched in Kerala, Karnataka, Maharashtra, West Bengal and Bihar, leading to the seizure of several digital devices as well as incriminating documents, a spokesperson of the federal agency said. The official said the raids were conducted in Kannur and Malappuram districts of Kerala, Dakshin Kannada in Karnataka, Nashik and Kolhapur in Maharashtra, Murshidabad in West Bengal and Katihar in Bihar. "The NIA has been working to unravel and thwart the attempts by PFI and its top leadership to create an armed cadre and raise a PFI Army for establishing an Islamic caliphate in India by 2047 through acts of terror, violence and sabotage. "PFI has been conspiring to radicalise gullible youth and provide them weapons training in a bid to further its violent anti-India agenda by fighting against certain sections of the society," the spokesperson said. The official said the agency suspects that several mid-rung PFI agents are operating as master trainers, conducting arms training camps in various states for its highly radicalised cadres. "Based on intelligence and investigative analysis and insights, it (NIA) has been raiding multiple locations in various states over the past several months to identify and arrest these cadres and operatives," the spokesperson said. NIA registered a case against PFI in April last year and arrested several of its top leaders, including over a dozen National Executive Council members, following country-wide operations in Sept 2022. The probe agency has filed a charge sheet against PFI as an organization and 19 of its members in March followed by weapons training in April.

IIT Delhi drops one set of midsemester exams to reduce student stress: Director Rangan Banerjee



NEW DELHI, Aug 13 (PTI): The Indian Institute of Technology, Delhi has revamped its evaluation system and dropped a set of mid-semester exams to reduce students' stress, according to institute director Rangan Banerjee. The decision comes against the backdrop of several cases of student suicides across IITs which has sparked a debate about whether the curriculum and the rigorous study schedule are impacting the mental

"Earlier we used to have two sets of exams during a semester, final exams at the end of each semester and several continuous evaluation mechanisms. We conducted an internal survey and based on feedback from all students and faculty, we have decided to drop one set of exams. So, now there will be two sets of exams besides routine evaluations," Banerjee told PTI in an interview.

"We felt that the exam calendar was too packed and hence decided to reduce student burden and stress. The decision has also been approved by the Senate and will be implemented from the ongoing semester. A maximum cap of 80 per cent weightage has been kept for the two exam-

The IIT Council, in its meeting in April, decided that there is a need for a robust grievance redressal system; increasing psychological counselling services; reducing pressure, fear of failure and rejection among students. The issue of student suicide, alleged discrimination, and ensuring the mental well-being of students was discussed at length during the

According to data shared in Parliament last month, IITs have reported

the highest number of student suicide cases in the last five years. From 2018 to 2023, at least 39 out of the total 98 deaths by suicide in top higher education institutions of India took place at IITs.

Delhi HC stays IT reassessment proceedings against NGO Oxfam India

NEW DELHI, Aug 13 (PTI): The Delhi High Court has stayed the income tax reassessment proceedings against NGO Oxfam India.

The court issued a notice to the Income Tax (I-T) Department and sought its response to a petition filed by the NGO, challenging the notices and order issued against it.

According to records, a survey was conducted on the NGO on September 7, 2022 which led to the initiation of the reassessment proceedings for the year 2016-17 and a notice

was issued to Oxfam on March 29 this year. "A counter affidavit will be filed within the next six weeks. Rejoinder thereto, if any, will be filed at least five days before the next date

of hearing. List the matter on November 22, 2023," a bench of justices Rajiv Shakdher and Girish Kathpalia said. "In the meanwhile, there shall be a stay on the continuation of the reassessment proceeding, till further directions of the court," it said. A notice was issued to the NGO on March 29 under the provisions of the IT Act which triggered the reassessment proceedings against the petitioner on the grounds that the petitioner was allegedly engaged in litigation activities that were violative of Section 8(1) of the Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act (FCRA). Also, it had allegedly received suspicious contributions from foreign nationals

on to protect 'vulnerable' fishing cat

KOLKATA, Aug 13 (PTI): A conservation breeding programme has been launched in a zoo in West Bengal to protect the fishing cat, a 'vulnerable' species, state forest minister Jyotipriya Mallick said.

The exercise will be carried out in other places as well, and, if the breeding programme for West Bengal's state animal becomes successful, several of the fishing cats to be born will be released into their natural habitat by 2024.

The programme started at Garchumuk Zoological Garden in Howrah district and it will be conducted in districts like Bankura and Jhargram in the southern part of the state and a few places in the north, Mallick said. The Conservation Breeding Programme is the science of conserving a species by preventing imminent population collapse in the wild due to a large number

of eliminative pressures such as habitat loss, habitat fragmentation industrialisation, poaching, illegal trade and climate change, an official said. The conservation breeding programme aims at conserving the genetic diversity of the species and restocking or reintroducing the species to re-establish a self-sustaining population in its natural wild habitat, the official said.

"A total of six to eight pairs of fishing cats are expected to be released into their natural habitat in 2024," Member Secretary of West Bengal Zoo Authority, Sourav Choudhury, said. The fishing cat (Prionailurus viverrinus) or 'Baghrol' in Bengali is a mediumsized wildcat that is found in the Indian subcontinent and parts of south-east Asia. Certain characteristics allow the animal, which has been described as a 'vulnerable



species, to survive in wet, watery

Probe panel constituted, says civic chief

THANE, Aug 13 (PTI): Eighteen patients have died in the last 24 hours at the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Hospital in Kalwa in Thane, civic commissioner Abhijit Bangar said on Sunday.

These comprise 10 women and eight men, of which six are from Thane city, four from Kalyan, three from Sahapur, one each from Bhiwandi, Ulhasnagar and Govandi (in Mumbai), one patient is from some other place and and one is unidentified, he said.

Twelve of the deceased were above the age of 50, Bangar added. Earlier, state health minister Tanaji Sawant and local deputy commissioner of police Ganesh Gawde had put the number of deaths at 17.

Addressing a news conference. Bangar said chief minister Eknath Shinde had taken feedback about the situation and had ordered the setting up of an independent probe committee that will be headed by the commissioner of health services and will include collector, civic chief, director of health services, interventionist at state-run JJ Hospital in Mumbai and civic sur-

It will carry out probe into the clinical aspect of the deaths, he added.

These patients had complications of kidney stone, chronic paralysis, ulcer, pneumonia, kerosene poisoning, septicemia etc, he said.

"The line of treatment will be probed and statements of kin of the deceased etc will be recorded. Allegations of negligence levelled by some kin is a serious matter, which the probe committee will look into," Bangar said.

"The entire Covid staff of 500



has been shifted to this hospital and additional nursing staff has been appointed. We are also aiming to have round the clock post mortem facility here," he told re-

Earlier in the day, state health minister Sawant said the dean of the hospital had been asked to submit a report in two days.

A Thane Municipal Corporation official said the deaths were being analysed and several civic officials are at the heavily-patronised facility for inspection of records etc.

Speaking to PTI, deputy commissioner of police Ganesh Gawde said, "We have information of 17 deaths in the last 24 hours. We have been told the usual figure per day is six to seven.'

"The hospital management told us some of the patients arrived there in a critical stage and succumbed during treatment. Some were elderly. We have increased police presence at the hospital to avoid any untoward incident due to

region Jitendra Awhad said the hospital was mismanaged and asked the administration to set things right before it was too late.

State minister Aditi Tatkare, who visited the hospital, called the deaths unfortunate and said the Maharashtra government will take all efforts to ensure such an incident is not repeated.

Nationalist Congress Party spokesperson Clyde Crasto sought a detailed inquiry into the deaths.

Chief minister Shinde belongs to Thane and the medical negligence leading to these deaths took place in his backvard (Thane is the stronghold of Shinde), Crasto said.

It goes to show Shinde is not paying attention to Thane and is "probably so busy in breaking and forming governments that he has no time for his own people", the NCP leader alleged.

State NCP chief Jayant Patil too slammed CM Shinde, saying the latter boasted about "government at your doorstep" but there was lack of medical facilities in his own backyard.

Former Thane mayor Naresh Mhakse, who is also spokesperson of the Eknath Shinde-led Shiv Sena, said the hospital was "over loaded" and was treating 650 patients per day against a capacity of 500. The civil hospital in the area is being renovated so the load falls on this facility in Kalwa, Mhaske claimed.

Hospital sources, meanwhile, said some doctors were down with dengue which was also affecting the running of the facility.

UK has no intention of becoming a place where those seeking to evade justice can hide: British security min

NEW DELHI, Aug 13 (PTI): The United Kingdom has no intention of becoming a place where those seeking to evade justice can hide, British security minister Tom Tugendhat said, amid India's continuing push for extradition of billionaire fugitives Vijay Mallya and Niray Modi.

Tugendhat, without citing specific cases, said that legal processes must be adhered to in matters relating to extradition.

"We both (the UK and India) have legal processes that must be gone through. But the UK government is absolutely clear, we have no intention of becoming a place where those who are seeking to evade justice can hide," he told PTI in an interview.

Tugendhat was in India on a three-day visit from August 10-12 primarily to attend the G20 anticorruption ministerial meeting in Kolkata. In Delhi, he held talks with external affairs minister S Jaishankar and national security advisor Ajit Doval.

The British security minister was replying to a question on India's persistent demand for extradition of a number of economic offenders including Mallya and Nirav Modi who are living in the UK. Nirav Modi, the fugitive diamond merchant wanted in India to stand trial on fraud and money laundering charges.

The 52-year-old businessman last year lost his legal battle in the highest UK court against being extradited to India in the estimated USD 2 billion Punjab National Bank loan scam case.

But his case is now said to be "statute barred", indicating further pending litigation.

Mallya, who fled to the United Kingdom in March 2016, is

wanted in India over a default of Rs 9.000 crore that was loaned to Kingfisher Airlines by several banks. Asked about his talks with NSA Doval, the British security minister declined to share the details but noted that the broad bilateral cooperation is focused on security of the two nations and the prosperity of the citizens.

"We're talking about the security of our two nations and the prosperity of our citizens, their ability to conduct their business at home and abroad," he said.

"But we're also talking about the challenges we face and we've both made it clear in different ways that the challenge of China is one that faces us both and we've seen incidents on your northern border, but we've also seen the way in which technology has changed and the way in which we need to address it as areas in which we need to have greater cooperation," he said. Tugendhat highlighted how India and the UK are cooperating in new technologies relating to ar-

tificial intelligence (AI). "We see today that India is not

just a centre of Indian AI, it's also a centre of British AI." he said.

"There are many firms whose data points, whose data sources are located here, often in Bangalore, and using the extraordinary technical capabilities of Indian AI experts to analyse data and to improve the productivity of their businesses," he added.

"This is a fantastic benefit both to the United Kingdom and of course to India. And so making sure that we're able to do that, we're protecting our interests and we're developing those technologies is absolutely essential to our common future," Tugendhat noted.

The India-UK relationship was elevated to a Comprehensive Strategic Partnership during the India-UK virtual summit held between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and his then British counterpart Boris Johnson in May 2021.

At the summit, the two sides adopted a 10-year roadmap to expand ties in the key areas of trade and economy, defence and security, climate change and people-topeople connections among others.

Modi govt has rendered country's health system 'sick': Kharge

NEW DELHI, Aug 13 (PTI): Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge on Sunday alleged the Centre has rendered the country's health system "sick" with even AIIMS facilities grappling with staff shortage, drawing a sharp rebuttal from Union health minister Man-

Taking to X, formerly known as Twitter, Kharge targeted Prime Minister Narendra Modi, citing a media report which claimed that 19 All India Institutes of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) are facing a shortage of doctors and other staff.

"Loot and jumlas have made the country unhealthy. Only lies are embedded in every word of Modi ji! (The government) claimed that it has set up many AIIMS. The truth is that our AIIMS are facing a severe shortage of doctors and other staff," the Congress chief said in Hindi. "Mr. Modi, from apathy during the coronavirus pandemic to scams in Ayushman Bharat... your government has made the country's health system sick," Kharge alleged.

"The people have been awakened, your deceit has been recognised and the time has come for your government's farewell," he added.

In a series of posts on X, Mandaviya countered Kharge, saying while only one AIIMS was opened during the Congress' rule, 15 are being opened under the Modi government. Two more arrested over JU student's death

Allegations of sexual harassment surface

KOLKATA, Aug 13 (PTI): Two students of Jadavpur University were arrested on Sunday for their alleged involvement in the ragging of an undergraduate student who died after falling from the balcony of a hostel, police said.

Police have taken cognisance of JU students' social media posts, including photographs, which suggest there was an element of sexual harassment in the ragging of the deceased. "He was definitely tormented by the boarders. There can be some passive sexual harassment. We are probing the matter," a senior police officer said. Three people

have been arrested in the case so far, he said. "A second year student of Economics hailfrom Bankura town and a Sociology student from Arambagh in Hooghly district were arrested on Sunday morning. A former student of the university, who was staying at the hostel, was nabbed on Friday," he said.

"The names of the two surfaced after night-long grilling of the arrested former student. Both are boarders from the same hostel and were present when the teenager allegedly fell from the second floor of the hostel building. We will question them," the officer told PTI. The two students will be produced before a court later in the day, he said. Police said they have till date spoken to nine people, of whom two were security guards of the hostel. Kolkata Police have recovered the deceased's mobile phone from the room of the former student who was arrested.

messages in the seized cell phone, police are also going through the deceased's redcoloured diary recovered from his room in the hostel. A Kolkata Police team also visited the deceased's home in Nadia district to match the handwriting.

"The first accused has admitted that it was he who had talked to the mother of the deceased's son. It was he who told the mother that her son was fine. He has been lying to us," the policeman said. An FIR has been registered after the deceased's father lodged a complaint, alleging that a few boarders of the hostel were responsible for his son's death. Swapnadip Kundu, a resident of Bagula in Nadia district, fell from the secondfloor balcony of the main hostel building around 11.45 pm on Wednesday and died while undergoing treatment at a hospital at

But the fabled city of temples, ghats and soul searching is transitioning – tradition and modernness in tow – into a centrepiece of the government's promotion of religious tourism.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi, in a recent Mann Ki Baat address, said the recent jump in the number of tourists in Varanasi, reflects a "cultural reawakening."

According to Uttar Pradesh tourism department's official website, the city has 10 times the number of tourists it had before the Covid pandemic. In 2019, the total number of tourists in the city amounted to nearly 68 lakh. Four years later, it matches that figure in one month alone with nearly 7.2 crore tourists in 2022. During Covid in 2020, the number had dropped to under 10 lakh. This makes Varanasi, a city with over 12 lakh people according to the last census, the most visited city in Uttar Pradesh - more than Mathura which topped the list with 6.5 crore tourists in 2022. Agra, the city of the Taj Mahal, gets the most number of foreign tourists though. Most people point to the redevelopment of the Kashi Vishwanath Dham Corridor as the reason for the massive rise in tourist footfall to the city that has long combined mysticism with



its many 'touristy' attractions - the Ganga cruise, the famed 'aarti' and its age-old craft of

According to Kashi Vishwanath Temple Trust CEO Sunil Verma, 10 crore tourists have visited the temple since the inauguration of the corridor in December 2021. The corridor – which has been instrumental in the boom in Varanasi's tourism sector – is spread across 5 lakh square feet with long queues of devotees raising slogans of "Har Har Mahadev" intermittently as they await their turn for 'darshan'.

"About 1-1.5 lakh devotees visit the temple on a daily basis. During the ongoing Sawan month, it has gone up to 1.5 lakh-2 lakh per day," Verma told PTI. Many tourists say the new corridor is what

has brought them to the eastern Uttar Pradesh city on the banks of the Ganges. "The government's efforts [in revamping the temple] have made things easier now. There have been many improvements from before. Facilities both for darshan and for staying here are great," said Sanjay Modi, a tourist from Gujarat. "Every Hindu should visit Kashi once," added his wife Avani.

Banaras Hindu University student Satyam Srivastava said the modernisation of ghats and the redevelopment of the temple has contributed vastly to the city's tourism boom. "It is also part of the government's ideology to make the country culturally rich," he said.

According to his friend Amit Kumar Rao, "the crowd has gone up in the city but there is no inconvenience.

Godowlia, the bustling heart of the city, teems with tourists, lakhs of them daily, who walk with determination towards the revamped temple or the Dashashwamedh Ghat, among other places, immune to the chaos of the aggressive honking of two-wheelers, overenthusiastic tour guides as well as the rain, frequent this time of the year.

Some tourists said that unlike other religious cities such as Haridwar, a trip to Varanasi is cheap. Others pointed out that the controversy surrounding the Gyanvapi mosque is another reason for the recent interest in the city.

Rohit Raghay, a tourist from Delhi, said apart from a visit to the temple and the ghats, some are curious about the distance between the mosque and the temple and want to see it for

The Gyanvapi-Kashi Vishwanath dispute refers to the contested claim that the mosque was built on the ruins of the temple. The mosque is currently being surveyed by the Archaeological Survey of India after a Varanasi court order on the matter.



UK-based publication Screen quoted a TIFF spokesperson as saying that "Punjab 65" is no longer part of the programme



nition in 1976 for K Balachander's "Moondru Mudichu", co-starring cinema veterans Rajinikanth and Kamal Haasan. Widely considered the star of Tamil cinema at the time, Sridevi's on-screen charisma garnered attention from producers from the Hindi film industry as

well.

After playing the lead role in the action comedy "Himmatwala", Sridevi established herself as a Bollywood icon and went on to star in hits like "Sadma", "Chaalbaaz", "Lamhe", "Chandani" and "Judaai", before taking a break from acting. In 2012, she made a come-

back with "English Vinglish" which was a critical and commercial success .

Hailed as Indian cinema's first woman superstar, Sridevi was honoured with Padma Shri, the fourthhighest civilian award given by the Government of India.

Sridevi forever made her mark on the film industry by charting new avenues for women to take on leading roles in Indian cinema and her last film "Mom" (2017) was also an effort in the same direction.

The actor passed away in 2018 in Dubai at the age of 54.

Decoding the performance, Fulton, while giving due credit to Malaysia, said that coming into the final after a "high-quality" semifinal against Japan the previous day hadn't been easy. India thrashed Japan 5-0 in the
