SILCHAR: Three persons, hailing from Manipur, have been arrested in Assam for allegedly looting shops and a petrol pump, using firearms, in different parts of Cachar district, a senior police officer said here on Sunday. The accused persons have been engaged in robberies in various parts of the district and arrested on Saturday, Cachar additional superintendent of police Subrata Sen told reporters. During an initial investigation, it has been found that all of them are residents of Manipur's Kangpokpi district and they have been displaced from their homes following an ethnic strife in the neighbouring state. "They had initially taken shelter in a camp in Mizoram's Kolasib district. Later, they entered Assam and got involved in illegal activities here," Sen claimed. Two firearms and ammunition have also been recovered from their possession. Sen said. Navies of India, US explore ways to expand cooperation

NEW DELHI, Sept 24: Ways to expand bilateral maritime security cooperation in sync with fast-expanding India-US strategic partnership figured prominently during Navy Chief Admiral R Hari Kumar's four-day visit to the US, officials said on Sunday.

The Chief of Naval Staff visited the US from September 19 to 22 primarily to attend the 25th International Seapower Symposium (ISS).

"The visit of the Navy Chief to the US provided a significant opportunity for apex level navy-to-navy engagements for deepening bilateral cooperation as well as engaging with diverse partners across the Indo-Pacific," Indian Navy spokesperson Commander Vivek Madhwal said.

The ISS is hosted by the US Navy at US Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island, to enhance its cooperation among likeminded navies to work towards the shared vision of an open and rules-based Indo-Pacific. On the sidelines of the ISS, Admiral Kumar also held bilateral meetings with his counterparts from various countries, including the US, Australia, Egypt, Fiji, Israel,



Italy, Japan, Kenya, Peru, Saudi Arabia, Singapore and the UK.

'The extensive engagements during the visit are a demonstration of the Indian Navy's steadfastness towards realising the vision for a free, open and inclusive Indo-Pacific," Madhwal said.

During the visit, extensive deliberations were also held towards exploring greater operational engagements between the Indian and the US navies (CONTD. ON PAGE-9)

#### Heroin seized

**GUWAHATI:** Nearly 300 grams of heroin worth around ₹ 2.4 crore was seized from three persons from various parts of Assam. police said on Sunday. The accused were arrested from Karbi Anglong, Kamrup Metropolitan and Bongaigaon districts, a senior official said. In the first case, police set up a check-point in an area under Borpather police station in Karbi Anglong district in the wee hours following a tip-off. "Around 177 grams of heroin was seized from a woman who was travelling in a bus. She had concealed the narcotics in 14 soap boxes," the official added. Guwahati Police too carried out an anti-drugs operation and arrested a youth from Noonmati area. "Nearly 12 grams of heroin was found on him," the official said. In another case, Bongaigaon district police arrested a person from Sonaikhula village in Manikpur and seized 10 soap cases containing 107 grams of heroin, he added.



### Manipur CM holds talks with BRO officials over plans to fence India-Myanmar border



IMPHAL, Sept 24: Manipur chief minister N Biren Singh on Sunday held a meeting with officials of the Border Roads Organisation (BRO) to discuss plans to erect fencing along a section of the India-Myanmar border.

The meeting comes a day after the CM told reporters that his government has urged the Union Home Ministry to cancel the free movement regime along the India-Myanmar border and complete its fencing.

The free movement regime allows people residing close to both sides of the India-Myanmar border to venture 16 km deep into each other's territory without any document

In a post on X, formerly Twitter, the CM said: "Held a meeting with the officials of BRO and deliberated the plan to begin construction of an additional 70 km of border fencing along the Indo-Myanmar border. I was joined by the Chief Secretary, DGP & officials from the Home Department.'

"In view of the rise in illegal immigration and drugs smuggling from the neighbouring country, safeguarding our porous borders has become an urgent necessity," Singh added. (CONTD. ON PAGE-9)

SHILLONG, Sept 24: Two tribal communities involved in the conservation of the endangered Western Hoolock Gibbon in Meghalaya have got a shot in the arm with a local coffee and chocolate producer announcing to support their cause. The Western Hoolock Gibbon is

called Huro by the Garo community while people in eastern Khasi-Jaintia Hills call it Huleng.

Dasumarlin Majaw, the proprietor of Smoky Falls Coffee, told PTI that their firm will help in the conservation of the endangered ape found in the forests of the state.

"We are officially launching the conservation initiative at the World Coffee Conference and Expo, a world-class event for coffee and coffee producers, in Bengaluru on Tuesday. We are excited to be working on something new," she said.



The collaboration for the conservation project was initiated by Sauramangala Foundation founder Nagakarthik, whose concept of combining Meghalaya's finest coffee/cocoa and conservation efforts of the endangered ape will stand to benefit both parties, she said. Majaw said she could not relate

The Huros are found in several forests of Garo Hills and there are a few of them at the Sonja Wildlife Rescue Centre, where they were brought after rescuing them from people who had held the apes as captive pets.

The Garo Hills Autonomous District Council also had formally identified a village wildlife reserve in Selbalgre village, about 20 km from Tura in West Garo Hills district, which is considered as a habitat for the Huros. Around 300 km east of Sebalgre, communities in Hima Malai Sohmat (Malai Sohmat chieftainship) in East Khasi Hills district are also working on the conservation of the Hulengs (local name for Hoolock Gibbons).

Malai Sohmat dorbar had in 2019 banned hunting and killing of Hulengs in the community forests in about five villages. Since then, these communities have been trying to find ways not to cut trees and instead find alternative livelihoods through (CONTD. ON PAGE-9)

# **RBI likely to keep interest rate** unchanged as inflation still high: Experts

NEW DELHI, Sept 24: The Reserve Bank is likely to maintain status quo on policy rates for the fourth time in a row at its bimonthly monetary policy review meeting early next month, as retail inflation continues to remain high and the US Federal Reserve has decided to keep a hawkish stance for some more time, according to experts.

The Reserve Bank had raised the benchmark repo rate to 6.5 per cent on February 8, 2023 and since then it has retained the rates at the same level in view of the stubbornly high retail inflation and certain global factors including elevated crude oil prices in the international market.

The Reserve Bank Governorheaded six-member Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) meeting is scheduled for October 4-6, 2023. The last meeting of the MPC, the highest rating-setting panel, was in August.

"We do expect the RBI to hold on to a status quo position this time as inflation is still high and liquidity tight. In fact, going by RBI forecast on inflation, it would be above 5 per cent in Q3 too, which will ensure that the status quo prevails for the calendar year for sure and probably Q4 too," said Madan Sabnavis, Chief Economist, Bank of Baroda

Sabnavis further said there are uncertainties relating to Kharif crop, especially on pulses, which can increase prices.

"The comfort is that there is less concern on growth which is on target." he added

Although the Consumer Price Index (CPI)-based retail inflation eased a bit to 6.83 per cent in August from 7.44 per cent in the preceding month in July, it remained above the Reserve Bank's comfort level of 6 per cent.

It may be mentioned that the government has mandated the RBI to keep inflation at 4 per cent with 2 per cent margin on either side. Aditi Nayar, Chief Economist,

ICRA Limited said the headline CPI inflation is expected to ease to 5.3-5.5 per cent in September 2023 from 6.8 per cent in August 2023, benefitting from the halving of the average price of tomatoes as well as a favourable base.

... We expect the CPI inflation to ease to 5.6 per cent in Q3 FY2024 and further to 5.1 per cent in Q4 FY2024, amid upside risks to food inflation on account of the impact of uneven and sub-par monsoons and low reservoir levels on Kharif yields and Rabi sowing, respectively," she said. Nayar said ICRA expects the

CPI inflation at 5.4 per cent for 2023-24, with Q2 at 6.2 per cent, Q3 at 5.7 per cent and Q4 at 5.2 per cent, with risks evenly balanced. CPI inflation for Q1, 2024-

25 is projected at 5.2 per cent. On his expectations from the next bi-monthly monetary policy, Sanjay Bhutani, Director, Medical Technology Association of India (MTaI) said the RBI has gone along with the market sentiment of

retaining the benchmark interest rate at 6.5 per cent for quite some MPC's last policy review in August. In the US and in India, the economy has shown resilient growth, and inflation numbers have risen beyond comfort levels.

"While food prices have softened, crude oil prices have climbed up, thereby raising inflationary expectations as evidenced by sharp rise in US treasury yields. The MPC will consider all these factors and maintain status quo on repo rates, as headline inflation is expected to come down in the coming months," he said.

The Reserve Bank mainly factors in the CPI-based inflation while arriving at its bi-monthly monetary policy.

The borrowing cost which started rising in May last year has stabilised with RBI keeping the repo rate unchanged at 6.5 per cent since February, when it was raised from 6.25 per cent. Later in the next three bi-monthly policy reviews in April, June and August the benchmark rate was retained.

The MPC consists of three external members and three officials of the RBI. The external members on the panel are Shashanka Bhide, Ashima Goval, and Javanth R Varma. Besides Governor Das, the other RBI officials in MPC are Rajiv Ranjan (Executive Director) and Michael Debabrata Patra has worsened considerably from (Deputy Governor). (PTI)

Biz messaging, WhatsApp engines of growth, says Meta India's Devanathan NEW DELHI, Sept 24: Business

messaging and WhatsApp are the next engine of growth and key priority for Meta in India, its top executive said exuding confidence that the company is "just getting started" given the "immense headroom" here, as more businesses digitise and transform.

Businesses across the board are innovating and using WhatsApp to reach new audiences with sectors such as banking, e-commerce, gaming and small businesses taking the lead, Sandhya Devanathan, Vice President, Meta India, said. Businesses all across are inno-

vating right from bill payment to sale of metro tickets, or banks sending statement balances, she said citing instances of how companies are embracing WhatsApp. "...honestly I think we're just scratching the surface, if we think

about the headroom...I see WhatsApp as next engine of growth for our company here in India, so absolutely business messaging and WhatsApp are a key priority for India Meta organisation," Devanathan told PTI.

WhatsApp monetisation in India is a "key priority" for Meta globally, she added.

As per the last published numbers, Facebook has 440 million users in India, and Devanathan says that Meta has, since then, grown across its family of apps. As many as 200 million businesses are on WhatsApp globally, using the WhatsApp Business app. "We do not breakdown the India number, but it is a pretty good number, it is

a huge number in India," she said. "The reason why it (WhatsApp monetisation) is a priority is because we see that headroom, we are just getting started ... everything from bill payments now with NPCI to buying metro train tickets, I think Chennai is already live and we'll have a few more getting added on...to banks sending statement balances," she said asserting that Meta is seeing wave of innovation across verticals and sectors. There is an immense potential as more than more companies here

digitise and transform. because the headroom is not going to come only from the marketing side. It is going to come from customer service, re-engagement, how they talk to their customers through entire journey like notifications or orders and things like that. So I'm excited about what you see there," she said.

WhatsApp engagement with JioMart (that allows consumers to shop from JioMart via WhatsApp chat) was a global-first for Meta. "We're learning from that or

The popular messaging platform recently announced the expansion of its payments service in India to make it easier for people transacting with businesses to pay for purchases directly in the chat, with a choice of UPI apps, including rival digital payment options, as well as credit and debit cards.

Meta founder and CEO Mark Zuckerberg asserted that India is leading the world in people and businesses embracing messaging.

WhatsApp is working with partners Razorpay and PayU "to make paying for something as simple as sending a message", and the Metaowned platform has unveiled a host of new features to woo businesses in the booming commerce market. A series of new tools have been announced for turbocharging businesses, including WhatsApp Flows and Meta verified badge, to speed up how to get things done with businesses in a WhatsApp chat". WhatsApp Flows is a new feature for businesses to create richer in-chat experiences for their customers like booking a reservation, ordering delivery or checking in for a flight, directly on WhatsApp. Businesses will be able to choose from a series of flexible, pre-made building blocks so they can easily design rich, customisable experiences for their customers.

Zuckerberg had said WhatsApp Flows gives businesses the ability to create customised experiences within chat threads.

Citing some examples of how this would work, he had said that with 'WhatsApp Flows', a bank can build a way for customers to book an appointment to open a new account, a food delivery service can build a way to place an order from any of their partner restaurants or an airline can build way to check in for a flight and pick up a seat. All this without having to leave the chat thread. (PTI)

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### M-cap of 8 of 10 firms lose ₹2.28 trn; **Reliance Retail receives full subscription** HDFC, Reliance biggest laggards amount of Rs 2,069 cr from KKR

NEW DELHI, Sept 24: The combined market valuation of eight of the 10 most valued firms plunged by ₹ 2,28,690.56 crore in a holiday-shortened last week, with HDFC Bank and Reliance Industries taking the biggest hit, amid an overall weak trend in equities.

Last week, the BSE benchmark fell 1,829.48 points or 2.69 per cent, and the Nifty declined 518.1 points or 2.56 per cent. Equity markets were closed on Tuesday on account of Ganesh Chaturthi.

From the top-10 pack, Reliance Industries, HDFC Bank, ICICI Bank, Infosys, ITC, State Bank of India, Bharti Airtel and Bajaj Finance were the laggards while Tata Consultancy Services (TCS) and Hindustan Unilever were the gainers. The market valuation of HDFC Bank plummeted by ₹ 99,835.27 crore to ₹ 11,59,154.60 crore. Shares of the company fell by nearly 8 per cent last week.

NEW DELHI, Sept 24: Reliance Retail Ventures Ltd, the retail arm of Reliance Industries, has received the full subscription amount of ₹ 2,069.50 crore from the global investment firm KKR and has allotted 17.1 million equity shares.

Following the share allotment, KKR's shareholding in Reliance Retail Ventures Ltd (RRVL) has increased to 1.42 per cent, from 1.17 per cent.

"Reliance Retail Ventures Ltd today received the subscription amount of ₹ 2,069.50 crore from Alyssum Asia Holdings II Pte. Ltd. (KKR) and allotted 17,158,752 equity shares to KKR," Reliance Industries said in a regulatory filing on Saturday evening.

Earlier this month, Reliance Industries had announced KKR's investment of ₹ 2,069.50 crore in RRVL, the holding company of the retail business of billionaire Mukesh Ambani-led group, for a 0.25 per cent additional stake at a valuation of about ₹ 8.36 trillion.

Founded in 1976, KKR has approximately \$ 519 billion in assets under management as of June 30, 2023.

Earlier this month, RIL received ₹ 8,278 crore from Qatar Investment Authority (QIA) for around 1 per cent stake in RRVL at a valuation of ₹ 8.278 trillion (\$ 100 billion)

In 2020, RRVL had raised ₹ 47,265 crore (around \$ 6.4 billion) from global private equity funds for a 10.09 per cent stake, valuing the company at more

### Number of MSMEs in **Bengal estimated to** have reached 1 cr after pandemic: Official

KOLKATA, Sept 24: The number of MSME units in West Bengal is estimated to have reached 1 crore with the economy bouncing back after the pandemic, a senior official said. Addressing a programme, West Bengal Small Industries Development Corporation Ltd (WBSIDCL) executive director V Teja Deepak said there were 90 lakh MSME units in the state before the pandemic.

"There were 90 lakh Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) in Bengal before the COVID-19 pandemic, and now it must have reached 1 crore after the pandemic," he said.

Maintaining that the state government's schemes such as Shilper Samadhan' have been a great help to the sector, he said the time taken to give various permissions for setting up businesses has also come down significantly.

"Bengal is doing well in the export of textile and leather, and the Biswa Bangla' marketing is attracting buyers across the globe," he said. Speaking at the programme organised here by SBI and The Statesman on Saturday, PSU Andrew Yule and Company's CMD RS Manku said the entity makes over 50 per cent of its procurement from MSME units.

KOLKATA, Sept 24: Jute mills have asked the jute commissioner to issue an advisory prohibiting the use of purchased jute yarn for the manufacture of B Twill bags (used for foodgrain packaging) meant to be supplied on government account against production control orders (PCSOs). The request was made by the Indian Jute Mills Association (IJMA) chairman Raghavendra Gupta in a recent letter to the regulator following weak order flow for the mills. The IJMA argued that factories involved in the conversion of "intermediate" jute goods such as "yarn" into jute bags should not qualify as jute mills. The definition of a jute mill in the Jute and Jute Textiles Control Order, 2016 states that a manufacturer must be mandatorily involved in the conversion of "raw jute" into jute textiles by mechanical process or electrical process or both processes. There is bumper production of jute in Bangladesh this season and amid anti-dumping duties on several mills and traders of the neighbouring country, yarn from Bangladesh is illegally making its way to mills to produce jute bags meant for government supply, an IJMA official told PTI. ### India and Canada strained ties

he recent denial by India of its involvement in the killing of Khalistan separatist Hardeep Singh Nijiar in Canada has not only strained relations between the two nations but has also raised questions about India's standing with its strategic partner, the United States. US National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan's statement at a press conference last Friday suggests that the United States may be more inclined to believe Canada's allegations than India's denial. Sullivan left no room for ambiguity when he stated, "I firmly reject the idea that there is a wedge between the US and Canada. We have deep concerns about the allegations, and we would like to see this investigation carried forward and the perpetrators held to account." Sullivan's unambiguous stance underscores the fact that the Biden administration is not fully convinced by India's explanation. While the United States has a vested interest in building a strong bilateral relationship with India to counterbalance China's influence in the Asia-Pacific region, it appears that the trust in India's position has been eroded by recent events. It is clear that the Biden administration is treading carefully to avoid damaging its relationship with India. However, the sense of closeness that existed between the two nations before this incident may not be as strong moving forward.

The strained relationship between Canada and India has also cast doubt on Modi's plans to invite President Biden as a guest on Republic Day. Sullivan's comments regarding this matter are noteworthy: "We are in continuous communication and consultation with the Canadian government. And we will remain so as we go forward. And I do not have anything to announce about travel by the President to India in January or at any other time today." Canada's significance to the United States cannot be overstated. In the context of the Ukraine crisis, Canada has actively supported Ukraine, providing not only political but also military assistance. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy's recent address to the Canadian parliament highlighted Canada's critical role in aiding Ukraine during a time of crisis. The accusation against India has been made by Canada's top executive, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, which has led to questions about his motivations. This issue was reportedly discussed during meetings between Modi and Trudeau at the G20 summit in Delhi, as well as in discussions between Biden and Modi.

This crisis comes at a precarious moment for Western countries, which have been looking to India as a rising military, trade, and technological counterweight to China. India's strengthening ties with Israel and its shift toward a more aggressive approach to counter-terrorism have also been noted. This reorientation has come to be known as the "Doval doctrine", named after Aiit Doval, Modi's influential national security adviser. For Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the Canadian affair could not have come at a worse time, as he was basking in the success of the G20 summit. It is now incumbent upon him to demonstrate diplomatic prowess in persuading President Biden to understand India's position. Failure to do so could lead to further complications in India's relations with Western nations. The strained relations between India and Canada have placed significant diplomatic challenges on the table. India's ability to navigate these challenges and rebuild trust with the United States will be a crucial test of its diplomatic acumen in the global arena.

The current upsurge in prices in India is led by food prices. In July 2023 while retail inflation was 7.44 per cent (over July of the previous year), food price inflation, which covers all food items including foodgrains, vegetables, milk products and such like, was 11.5 per cent. Food price inflation came down a little in August to around 10 per cent, largely because of some supply management measures adopted by the government relating to vegetables like tomatoes, and this was responsible for bringing down the overall retail inflation rate to 6.83 per cent; but obviously food price inflation, and with it overall retail inflation, continues to re-

main a serious problem. It is not just in India that food prices are rising sharply. This is a global phenomenon characterising not just the third world but even the advanced capitalist countries. The usual explanation attributes it to the scarcity caused by the Ukraine war, but while the Ukraine war can in principle be such a cause of inflation by generating scarcity, the current rise in food prices is, if at all, more in anticipation of such a scarcity than a result of any actual scarcity. There is plenty of evidence from all over the world which shows that even before any actual scarcity has occurred, profit-margins have increased in the retail foods sector, which indicates a jacking up of prices by monopolists in anticipation of scarcity. The same is true in India, because of which many are talking about "inflationary expectations" being at play, which drive up actual prices because of a rise in expected prices.


But inflationary expectations can play a role only when, despite there being no actual shortage, the actual supply situation is not characterised by great abundance. After all when there are huge foodgrain stocks lying around, prices are not jacked up by suppliers in anticipation of inflation: if such stocks are held by the government, suppliers know that they would be released to consumers at prices that would negate any jacking up. Even if the stocks are held by private sellers, their priority would be to bring down the level of stocks rather than jack up prices; what is more, even if some suppliers jacked up prices, others would see in it an opportunity to take away customers from these sellers and reduce their levels of stocks. "Inflationary expectations" in other words play a role only when the underlying situation is one where supplies are not too comfortable.

This has been the case with the world foodgrains market for quite some time. The annual per capita world cereal production for instance (tak-

Moreover, a rising proportion of cereal output from 2002 onwards has been diverted to ethanol production, which means that the per capita availability of cereals for consumption purposes for the world's population must have shrunk.

If this shrinking availability did not give rise to any persistent and significant inflationary pressures till now, the reason lies in the fact that under the neoliberal regime there has been a drastic squeeze on the purchasing power of the working people, especially in the third world. There has been in short a precarious balance maintained between shrinking availability and shrinking demand because of income compression imposed on the working people. Because of this even while poverty and undernutrition have increased greatly in the neoliberal era (though this fact is usually sought to be concealed by the numerous "poverty studies" under the aegis of the Bretton Woods institutions), this deprivation has generally not taken the form of an inflationary squeeze. was itself a result of an extraordinarily unwise policy of the government, which Modi thought it could bring down foodgrain inflation in the open market by disgorging the stocks it held. The speculators just bought up what the government disgorged, so that inflation continued as before, while government stocks were gratuitously run down, thereby further strengthening inflationary expectations and hence the inflationary process. And of course when foodgrain prices rise, fuelled by inflationary expectations, this tends to have the general impact of raising prices of other food items as well. There are two alternative ways

of combating the food inflation that is occurring. One is through monetary policy, raising interest rates and tightening credit in general. In the old days on such occasions only the credit given to the foodgrain sector was tightened, under a policy called "selective credit control": but in the neo-liberal era this has fallen into disuse, because of which interest rate policy is used, which necessarily hurts the viability of small enterprises and causes significant unemployment. This way of controlling food price inflation in short entails the creation of unemployment; and this alas is the generally favoured panacea for nflation under capitalism.

The other way of controlling inflation is to widen the reach of the public distribution system, so that government stocks are not disgorged in the open market, but consumers are taken off the open market and government stocks are distributed among them, so that speculators cannot have access to these stocks.

Of course enlarged sales through the public distribution system will have to be followed by enlarged procurement by the government through the Food Corporation of India, if the system of food distribution is to survive; and anyway the government is planning to procure 52.1 million tonnes of rice in this year's kharif season. This is an absolutely essential measure for beating the current food inflation. The extraordinary silliness of the measures that were sought to be put in place through the three infamous farm laws now becomes obvious. If those measures had not been withdrawn because of the agitation of the farmers, then procurement would have been privatised and the government would have had no means of combating inflation which would have continued unabated under the aegis of the private sector. Fortunately the farmers saved the country, and public procurement of foodgrains continues to prevail; and the government still has a weapon in its hand to combat inflation without generating mass unemployment. Charter, such as the economic and financial blockade imposed on Cuba." The Brazilian leader also condemned a global increase in racism and xenophobia and warned against the rise of "farright adventurers who deny politics and sell solutions that are as simple as they are wrong. "Many have fallen to the temptation of replacing failed neoliberwith primitive, alism authoritarian, and conservative nationalism."Bolivian President Luis Arce also denounced the blockade of Cuba as "inhuman and criminal."His Argentinian counterpart, Alberto Fernández, also called for an end to the blockade of Cuba, saying that its continuation was "unacceptable."He went on to demand that Havana be removed from the U.S. list of state sponsors of terrorism. Widening his criticism of Washington's foreign policy, Fernández added: "The sanctions imposed by the U.S. on Venezuela must cease immediately. Their prolongation over time has only harmed the living conditions of Venezuelans and led millions of them into exile." In his remarks, Cuban President Miguel Díaz-Canel described the blockade as an "extraterritorial, cruel, and silent economic war that is accompanied by a powerful political machinery of destabilization against my country." Biden did not respond to calls to lift the sanctions in his own U.N. speech. Instead, he made an appeal for the world to remain united in defending Ukraine against Russia's invasion, warning that no nation can be secure if "we allow Ukraine to be carved up." (IPA Service)

He has declined that invitation, according to the Associated Press. Biden said other goals of his deal with Lula will be to get their nations and others to emphasize safety and health on the job. Presumably, improved strength for unions will translate into narrowing the wealth gap between rich and poor. Biden did not specifically mention the wealth gap as a separate issue, however.

"This announcement is also an invitation" to other nations to join the partnership, the U.S. president said. That may be easier said than done. Repressive anti-labor regimes hold sway in dozens of nations. Those governments often find it profitable to let multinational corporations exploit their workers-with national police forces and troops ready to enforce such oppression.

### Studying the genes that delay Alzheimer's How to recognize the symptoms of decline may lead to treatments nonfamilial of

seases that run in families usually have genetic causes. Some are genetic mutations that directly cause the disease if inherited. Others are risk genes that affect the body in a way that increases the chance someone will develop the disease. In Alzheimer's disease, genetic mutations in any of three specific genes can cause the disease, and other risk genes either increase or decrease the risk of developing Alzheimer's.

Some genetic mutations or variants interact with other genetic alterations that lead to Alzheimer's disease. In some cases, gene alterations can interact with Alzheimer's-causing genetic variants in a way that proves beneficial; they actually suppress the pathological brain changes the other mutations would normally lead to. These protective gene variants can drastically slow or prevent cognitive decline. In two recent case reports on familial Alzheimer's disease, mutations delayed Alzheimer's symptoms for decades.

I am a neurologist and neuroscientist who has spent my career studying Alzheimer's disease and dementia both in the laboratory and in the clinic. Determining how genes affect brain chemistry is vital to understanding how Alzheimer's disease progresses and devising interventions to prevent or delay cognitive decline.

#### The amyloid hypothesis

In the early 1990s, scientists proposed the amyloid hypothesis to explain how Alzheimer's disease develops. The first neuropathological changes detected in the brain of Alzheimer's disease patients were the formation of amyloid plaques – clumps of protein pieces called beta-amyloid. Other changes in the Alzheimer's brain, such as the accumulation of another type of abnormal protein called neurofibrillary tangles, were thought to develop later in the course of the disease.

Beta-amyloid begins to accumulate in the brain up to 15 years before symptoms emerge. Symptoms correlate with the number of neurofibrillary tangles in the brain – the more tangles, the worse the cognition. Researchers have tried to determine whether preventing or removing amyloid plaques from the brain would be an effective treatment.


Imagine the excitement of the scientific community in the 1990s when researchers identified three different genes causing familial Alzheimer's disease and all three were involved with

beta-amyloid. The first was the amyloid precursor protein gene. This gene directs cells to produce the amyloid precursor protein, which breaks down into smaller fragments, including the beta-amyloid that forms amyloid plaques in the brain. The second gene was termed presenilin 1, or PSEN-1, a protein needed to cut the precursor protein into beta-amyloid. The third gene, presenilin 2, or

PSEN-2, is closely related to PSEN-1 but found in a smaller number of families with familial Alzheimer's disease. These findings added strength

to the amyloid hypothesis explanation of the disease. However, uncertainty and opposition to the amyloid hypothesis have developed over the past several decades. This was in part tied to a recognition that several other processes - neurofibrillary tangles, inflammation and immune system activation - are also involved in the neurodegeneration seen in Alzheimer's.

The hypothesis also got significant pushback after many clinical trials attempting to block the effects of amyloid or remove it from the brain were unsuccessful. In some cases, treatments had significant side effects. Some researchers have come up with a protein called apolipoprotein E,



strong defences of the hypothesis. But until a clinical trial based on the amyloid hypothesis could show definitive results, uncertainty would remain. Genetic discoveries with

treatment implications The vast majority - more than

90% - of Alzheimer's cases occur in late life, with disease prevalence increasing progressively from age 65 and up. Such cases are mostly sporadic, with no clear family history of Alzheimer's. However, a relatively small

number of families have one of the three known genetic mutations that cause the disease to be passed down. In familial Alzheimer's, 50% of each generation will inherit the mutated gene and develop the disease much earlier, usually from their 30s to early 50s.

In 2019 and 2023, researchers identified changes in at least two other genes that markedly delayed the onset of disease symptoms in people with familial Alzheimer's disease mutations. These mutated genes were found in a very large family in Colombia whose members tended to develop Alzheimer's symptoms by their 40s. A woman in the family carrying a mutated PSEN-1 gene did not have any cognitive symptoms until she was in her 70s. A genetic analysis showed that she had an additional mutation in a variant of the gene that codes for

or ApoE. Researchers believe the mutation, called the Christchurch variant – named after the city in New Zealand where the mutation was first discovered - is responsible for interfering with and slowing down her disease.

Importantly, her brain had a great deal of amyloid plaque but very few neurofibrillary tangles. This suggests that the link between the two was broken and that the suppressed number of neurofibrillary tangles also slowed down cognitive loss.

In May 2023, researchers reported that two siblings in the same large family also did not develop memory problems until their 60s or late 70s and were found to carry a mutation in a gene that codes for a protein called reelin. Studies in mice suggest that reelin has protective effects against amyloid plaque deposition in the brain. In these patients' brains, as with the patient who had the Christchurch variant, there were extensive amyloid plaques but very few neurofibrillary tangles. This observation confirmed that the tangles are responsible for the cognitive loss and that there are several ways to "disconnect" amyloid and neurofibrillary tangle accumulation.

Finding medicines that might mimic the protective effects of the Christchurch variant or the reelin mutation could help delay Alzheimer's disease symptoms for all patients. Since the vast

The US Food and Drug Administration's 2021 approval of the first antibody treatment for Alzheimer's, aducanumab, sold under the brand name Aduhelm, was controversial. Only one of the two clinical trials testing its safety and effectiveness in people yielded positive results. The FDA approved the drug on the basis of that single study through an accelerated approval process in which treatments meeting an unmet clinical need can receive expedited approval.

The second antibody. lecanemab, sold as Leqembi, was approved in January 2023 via the same accelerated approval pathway. It was then fully approved in July 2023.

The third antibody, donanemab, completed a successful phase three clinical trial and is awaiting more safety data. When that is submitted to the FDA, the agency will consider the drug for approval. (Courtesy: The Wire)

If the person is not experiencing symptoms, the doctor may order a follow-up test to confirm the diagnosis.

Treatment depends on the type of diabetes. A person with type 1 needs to take insulin every day, using injections or pumps.

For a person with type 2 diabetes, a doctor recommends selfcare strategies and other ways to manage blood sugar levels. This might involve taking prescribed medications, including insulin.

It is important to follow the recommended treatment plan. Anyone who is having difficulty doing this or experiencing any side effects should consult their doctor for guidance right away.

· Help lessen social media dependency • Improve well-being



# **US provided Canada intelligence on Nijjar's killing: NYT**

WASHINGTON, Sept 24: The US provided Canada with intelligence after the killing of Sikh separatist Hardeep Singh Nijjar, but communications intercepted by Ottawa were more definitive and led it to accuse India of orchestrating the plot, The New York Times has reported citing sources.

The report came on Saturday as the top US diplomat in Canada confirmed that there was "shared intelligence among Five Eyes partners" that had prompted Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's offensive allegation against India in the killing of a Khalistani extremist on Canadian soil.

The allegations have infuriated India, which rejected the allegations as "absurd" and "motivated" and expelled a senior Canadian diplomat in a tit-for-tat move to Ottawa's expulsion of an Indian official over the case. India also accused Canada of being a safe haven for terrorists.

Trudeau on Friday said that Canada shared with India "many weeks ago" evidence on the killing of Nijjar and wants

New Delhi to commit constructively with Ottawa to establish the facts in the "very serious matter." When asked about Canada sharing any information in the case with India, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) in New Delhi said: "No specific information has been shared by Canada on this case, either then or before or after.

**Russian airstrikes** kill 2, wound 3 in southern Ukraine



KYIV, Sept 24: Russian airstrikes on Sunday killed two people and wounded three others in southern Ukraine's Kherson province, the region's governor reported on Sunday as the war in Ukraine entered a 20th month.

According to Gov. Oleksandr Prokudin, Russian forces struck the city of Beryslav, destroying an unspecified number of private houses. A woman was killed and three people were wounded, including a police officer, he said.

Another airstrike also killed a 67-year-old man in the village of Lvove, Prokudin said without specifying the type of weapons used in the attack.

The communities hit both are located in the Ukrainian-controlled part of the Kherson region, where the Dnieper River that bisects the province has marked a battle line since Russian troops withdrew across it in November 2022, a retreat that boosted the invaded country's morale.

The Russians regrouped on the river's eastern bank and regularly shell cities and villages across the river, including the city of Kherson, the regional capital that was occupied early on in the war but retaken by Ukrainian forces more than 10 months ago.

In Russia, a Ukrainian drone hit an administrative building in the city of Kursk and "insignificantly damaged" the roof, regional Gov. Roman Starovoit reported. He didn't report any casualties or say what the building housed.

Unconfirmed media reports both in Russia and Ukraine said it was the offices of the Kursk branch of Russia's main security agency, the Federal Security Service, also known as the FSB.

The Kursk region of Russia borders Ukraine and also is a frequent target of attacks. The drone strike on Sunday took place as residents commemorated the anniversary of the regional capital's founding.

There was no immediate comment from the Ukrainian authorities, who usually don't acknowledge responsibility for attacks on Russian territory.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy was traveling home from North America, where he addressed the UN General Assembly and paid his first wartime visit to Canada.

In a social media statement on Saturday, Zelenskyy said he stopped in Poland on his way back to Ukraine to give state awards to two Polish volunteers. Zelenskyy apparently didn't meet with any Polish officials, but in a post on X, previously known as Twitter, he thanked Poland for "its invaluable support and solidarity that helps defend freedom of our entire Europe" Poland has taken in large numbers of Ukrainian refugees and been a fierce supporter of neighbouring Ukraine since Russian President Vladimir Putin sent troops into the country on February 24, 2022. However, a trade dispute has recently tested the relationship between Kyiv and Warsaw. (AP)

Later, in a press conference, Lavrov said the U.S. was "effectively engaged in hostilities with us, using the Ukrainians as fodder." "You can call this whatever you want to call this, but they are directly at war with us,"



he said. "We call this a hybrid war. But that doesn't change the reality." Under assembly procedures that give the microphone to presidents ahead of cabinet-level officials, Lavrov spoke four days after Ukrainian President Volodomyr Zelenskyy and U.S. President Joe Biden.

Zelenskyy accused Russia of "weaponising" food, energy and even children against Ukraine and "the international rules-based order" at large. Biden sounded a similar note in pressing world leaders to keep up support for Ukraine: "If we allow Ukraine to be carved up, is the independence of any nation secure?" On North Korea, he reiterated criticism of the North's violations of Security Council resolutions regarding its nuclear and ballistic missile programs but said Washington is "committed to diplomacy that would bring about the denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula.'

Since invading Ukraine in February 2022, Russia has offered a number of explanations for what it calls the "special military operation" in Ukraine. Among them: claims that Kyiv was oppressing Russian speakers in Ukraine's east and so Moscow had to help them, that Ukraine's growing ties with the West in recent years pose a risk to Russia, and that

it's also threatened by NATO's eastward expansion over the decades. Lavrov hammered on those themes in his General Assembly speech last year, and he alluded again Saturday to what Russia perceives as NATO's improper encroachment.

But his address looked at it through a wide-angle lens, surveying a landscape, as Russia sees it, of Western countries' efforts to cling to outsized influence in global affairs. He portrayed the effort as doomed.

The rest of the planet is sick of it, Lavrov argued: "They don't want to live under anybody's yoke anymore." That shows, he said, in the growth of such groups as BRICS - the developing-economies coalition that currently includes Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa and recently invited Argentina, Egypt, Ethiopia, Iran, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates to join next year.

"Our future is being shaped by a struggle, a struggle between the global majority in favor of a fairer distribution of global benefits and civilized diversity and between the few who wield neocolonial methods of subjugation in order to maintain their domination which is slipping through their hands," Lavrov said, adding that the United Nations needs to change to have "a fair balance of interests."

Both Lavrov and Zelenskyy also addressed the U.N. Security Council on Wednesday but didn't actually face off. Zelenskvv left the room before Lavrov came in.

Lavrov also sat out Zelenskyy's speech at the General Assembly, but rejected the Ukrainian president's 10-point peace plan as "not feasible" and "not realistic" during the press conference following his speech. "I had my own affairs to attend to. We know what he's going to say. Why waste time?" the Russian said to explain his absence. Nonetheless. he said he'd watched video of the Ukrainian president's remarks there and in the Security Council and thought "he seemed rather grim." (AP)

### Carbon removal: why ambitious 'no nonsense' plans are vital to limit global heating to 2 degree Celsius

SYDNEY, Sept 24: 2023 is proving to be a year of climate and weather extremes. Record-busting global air and ocean temperatures, unprecedented low levels of Antarctic sea ice, and devastating fires and floods have been reported across the world.

Less discussed by the world media is the continuing rise in atmospheric greenhouse gases driving these changes. Carbon dioxide (CO2) is at a level not seen since the hothouse world of the Pliocene, 3 million years ago. On top of that, an El Niño event is now likely, so widespread extreme events may intensify in coming months.

Despite the changes we are seeing, global efforts to cut emissions fall well short of what's needed to keep heating to less than 2 degree Celsius, let alone the more ambitious Paris Agreement target of 1.5 degree Celsius. This creates an urgent need for the purposeful removal of atmospheric CO2 as well as cuts in emissions.

In a recent article in Nature, we argue for a different approach to pricing carbon. It should take into account how it is removed from the atmosphere, for how long, and with what confidence. This will help fund the most promising technologies for reaching net-zero carbon emissions by 2050.

#### Carbon removal is on the agenda

The United Nations hosted a "no-nonsense" Climate Ambition Summit in New York this week with the aim of accelerating the global transition away from carbon. This must be done to avoid breaching 2 degree Celsius of global heating relative to the pre-industrial era.

Two strategies are being pursued: carbon emission reductions carbon dioxide removal (CDR), also called "negative emissions".

At COP26 in 2021, global resolutions on cutting emissions drove the push for "net zero" across nations, cities and sectors. However, some worldwide activities, including aviation and heavy industry, face challenges eliminating emissions. Carbon credits have become the main way to offset their remaining emissions.

The dilemma lies in the nature of carbon credits. Most are allocated for so-called "avoidance" measures. A prime example is not clearing forest, which has come under intense scrutiny.

And these measures do nothing about the existing excess carbon dioxide.

A big change in our thinking is needed. The emphasis must shift from emission "avoidance" to 'removal" offsets that actively pull carbon from the atmosphere. So how do we tackle the monumental challenge of reducing atmospheric CO2?

What's needed is a shift from avoidance to verifiable carbon dioxide removal. Almost all current removal efforts come from traditional land management. Less than 1% comes from innovative removal technologies.

Removal technologies include: biochar – where carbon from plant material is sequestered as charcoal and stored in soil direct air carbon capture and storage (DACCS) – which directly removes CO2 from the air and stores it in geological formations

A major advance at COP26 was to work out the projected demand and market trajectory for carbon offsets. Offset credits play a vital role in advancing CO2 removal technologies and developing carbon markets.

Another key goal was to formulate a carbon trading rulebook. The resulting Taskforce on Scaling Voluntary Carbon Markets predicts demand



for carbon offsets will grow tenfold by 2030 and 50-fold by 2050.

So what are the obstacles?

We identify a potential bottleneck. Developing, testing and scaling up CO2 removal technologies takes time. This means a lag in supply could stymie the rapidly growing demand for carbon dioxide removal.

Another problem is that the current carbon offset market offers a flat rate, no matter the quality or effectiveness of the CO2 removal method. There is an urgent need for a tiered market that values high-quality, proven CO2 removal methods. This will provide an incentive to fast-track

their use. The carbon offset market's pricing mechanism is a stumbling block. The price for offsetting a tonne of CO2 is in the range USD 10-100. Cheaper avoidance strategies, such as not clearing forests, heavily influence this price.

The existing pricing falls short when we consider the costs of CO2 removal technologies, which can exceed US\$200 per tonne removed.

The prevailing metric, simplifying everything to "one tonne of carbon", doesn't consider the complexities of CO2 removal. Each method has its own specifics about how long it can store carbon, how reliably it can be verified and the potential risks or side effects. Shoehorning such a varied field into a single metric stifles innovation in CO2 removal.

What are the solutions?

Understanding the market's resistance to intricate metrics, we propose a more nuanced yet approachable two-step solution:

Shift in metrics: change the standard from a "carbon tonne" to a "carbon tonne year". This recognises the longevity of CO2 removal methods and rewards those that store carbon longer. Such a metric connects directly with efforts to cut emissions. A mandatory warranty: each "carbon tonne year" requires a warranty from the seller to vouch for the method's reliability (verification) and its overall safety (assessing risks and side effects).

These changes will foster a system that appropriately values CO2 removal methods that are long-lasting, reliable and safe. It creates an incentive to develop and use these methods.

In our Nature article, we advocate a structured ten-year plan. This timeframe is crucial for maturing the markets, establishing effective regulatory frameworks and fine-tuning verification.

It's essential to prepare for the evolution and scaling up of carbon dioxide removal. A decade provides a realistic window to develop the processes needed to reach net zero.

The magnitude of this task cannot be overstated. In just a few decades, CO2 removal must operate on a colossal scale, comparable to global food production

The New York summit has set the stage for the COP28 meeting in Dubai later this year. An ambitious long-term global strategy can still provide a sustainable future within the heating limits set in the 2015 Paris Agreement.

It's time to get real about carbon. (AP)

### Manipur govt plans to reintroduce all-out war against illegal poppy cultivation

GUWAHATI, Sept 24: The Manipur government has again reintroduced the all-out war against illegal poppy cultivation. It has been preparing to destroy acres of poppy plants ahead of their harvest at the end of October in different parts of the state, state officials said.

The destruction operations will be planned carefully by the newly formed Anti-Narcotics Task Force (ANTF) and implemented by forming teams. Apart from state forces, the central security forces are also being engaged in this war.

In an order, joint secretary (Home) Mayengbam Veto Singh stated that the new move is in pursuance of a Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) communication regarding ground verification and destruction operations in connection with illicit opium/poppy cultivation in Manipur

To this effect, the state government has reconstituted ANTF with the objective of bringing together stakeholders concerned on a single platform for effective coordination and implementation of the War on Drug-2.0 and anti-drug campaign activities with immediate effect.

A joint committee of the Narcotics Control Bureau and Narcotics and Affairs of Border (NAB) has also been formed to survey and destroy poppy plantations in this sensitive border state, Manipur Chief Minister N. Biren Singh said in a statement on Saturday. Illegal poppy cultivation and its harvesting is one of the main causes of communal violence in the state.

The new ANTF comprises IGP (Intelligence/NAB) as head of the task force; IGP (Zone-III), IGP (Cyber Crime), ICAR director, principal chief conservator of forests, joint secretary (Home), DCs/SPs of districts concerned, TA&H director, Social Welfare director, Horticulture director, MARSAC director, Forensic Science director, additional district magistrates (ADMs) of Imphal West and East, Cyber Corporation (IT) representative, and two government advocates as members; SP (NAB) as convener-1 & secretarial support, and NCB, Manipur head as convener-2. Notably, around 14,359.4 acres of poppy cultivation and 20 acres of cannabis were destroyed under BJP 1.0 (2017-2022), while under BJP 2.0 (2022-23), 4,305.1 acres of illegal poppy cultivation were destroyed. 3.517.8 acres of poppy cultivation were destroyed in 2022 alone.

Taking to his Twitter handle, Patton said: "Concerned by the video circulating that suggests poor quality shoes have been provided to Nagaland Police personnel. Urging @DGP\_Nagaland to verify its authenticity and take appropriate measures.3

He said ensuring the welfare and safety of our forces is paramount. The circulated video supposedly recorded by a Nagaland police personnel showed that the sole of a new pair of hunting boots supplied to them could be easily torn apart by bare hands.

The video showed the police personnel saying they have to do their duty day in and day out wearing these kinds of shoes. He said while the upper portion of the shoe seems quite right, the lower part is easily breakable. DGP Sharma could not be contacted for his comments on the matter.

AGARTALA, Sept 24: Tripura State Electricity Corporation Ltd (TSECL) has hiked power tariff by an average of 5 to 7 per cent, an official said on Sunday. # **Speed and scale of infrastructure development** matching aspirations of 140 crore Indians: PM

NEW DELHI/UDAIPUR, Sept 24: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday said the speed and scale of infrastructure development matched the aspirations of 140 crore Indians as he flagged off nine Vande Bharat Express trains connecting religious and tourist destinations across 11 states.

Flagging off the Vande Bharat Express trains via video conferencing, Modi also slammed the previous governments for not paying adequate attention for modernisation of railways and assured that the "day is not far when Vande Bharat will connect every part of the country".

Governors, chief ministers, Union ministers and elected representatives were present at the nine railway stations from where the indigenously built semihigh speed trains were flagged off.

The trains stopped at various stations where they were welcomed by enthusiastic school children and hoards of people with elected representatives addressing functions en route.

Union minister Kailash Choudhary and Rajasthan BJP president C P Joshi boarded the Vande Bharat Express train at Udaipur and travelled till Chhittorgarh where a huge crowd of BJP workers raised the slogans of "Vande Mataram" and "Bharat Mata ki Jai' as the train chugged into the station.

In his address, the prime minister said



the popularity of Vande Bharat trains was rising constantly and more than 1.11 crore passengers have already travelled in them.

Govt has 'mismanaged' economy across all sectors: Congress

NEW DELHI, Sept 24: The Congress on Sunday alleged that the government has mismanaged the economy across all sectors and since it is "too inept" in fixing issues such as unemployment and price rise, it is distorting the data instead.

Congress general secretary Jairam Ramesh said now that the special session of Parliament is over, it is clear that the Modi government was trying to "distract and divert" the nation from some critical issues -- "the Adani scam, the caste census and especially the rising unemployment, growing inequality and the economic distress"

In a statement, he said no matter how much the Modi government hides the data, the reality is that the vast majority of people are suffering.

He claimed that some of the facts reported last week are being "brushed under the carpet"

He said RBI's latest bulletin of September 2023 shows the "complete failure" of the Modi government to execute a recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Forty-three per cent of people were in the labour force in February 2020. Over 3.5 years later, the participation rate remains around 40 per cent. As a matter of grave concern, a report from Azim Premji University shows that over 42 per cent of graduates under the age of 25 were unem-

ployed in 2021-22," Ramesh said. In 2022, women were still making only 85 per cent of their earnings before the pandemic, he claimed.

"Remember that India was already facing the highest unemployment rate in 45 years before the onset of the pandemic — a sta-

tistic that the Modi government tried hard to hide from the public domain," he alleged.

The Congress leader highlighted that the prices of essential commodities have been rising sharply, impacting the household budget of ordinary families.

"After the uncontrolled spike in tomato prices, now tur dal prices are up 45 per cent from January 2023, and overall pulses inflation has touched 13.4 per cent. Prices of atta are up 20 per cent since August, besan is up 21 per cent, gur is up 11.5 per cent, sugar is up 5 per cent," Ramesh said

Uncontrolled price rises across the essential household sector shows the inability of the Modi government to manage the economy, he added.

Ramesh also alleged that the crony capitalism of the Modi government has concentrated all economic benefits to a select few firms, making it next to impossible for MSMEs to compete.

"A report by Marcellus found that 80 per cent of all profits went to just 20 companies in 2022. In contrast, the market share of small business was at its lowest level in India's history; small business sales were around 7 per cent of the total before 2014 but fell to under 4 per cent in Q1 2023. Seventy-five per cent of small businesses are losing money, according to a 2023 survey of 100,000 small business owners by Consortium of Indian Associations," he said in his statement.

Noting that credit to the private sector is the engine of growth, Ramesh said a decade of stagnant credit is a symptom of a mismanaged economy. (PTI)

# Probably winning Telangana, certainly winning MP, Chhattisgarh, 'very close' in Rajasthan: Rahul

NEW DELHI, Sept 24: Exuding confidence about a good showing in the upcoming assembly polls, Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Sunday said that as of now the Congress is certainly winning Madhva Pradesh and Chhattisgarh, probably winning Telangana, and there is a "very close" contest in Rajasthan which the party believes it will emerge victorious in. Gandhi also referred to the row over BJP MP Ramesh Bidhuri's derogatory remarks against BSP leader Danish Ali in Lok Sabha, alleging that the BJP indulges in such tactics to distract from the demand for a caste census. He asserted that the opposition is adapting and working together and the BJP is "in for a

surprise in 2024" general elections. Speaking at a conclave organised by the Pratidin Media Network of Assam, Gandhi also said the idea of 'One Nation, One Election' was aimed at distracting from real issues of the people.

"It's one of the BJP's distraction strategies," he asserted. The main issues in India are concentration of wealth, huge inequality in wealth, massive unemployment, huge unfairness towards the lower caste, OBCs, and tribal communities, and



"What you are seeing today, this gentlemen Mr. Bidhuri and then suddenly Mr. Nishikant Dubey, all this is the BJP trying to distract from the idea of the caste census. They know that the caste census is a fundamental thing that the people of India want and they don't want to have that discussion," the former Congress chief said.

"Every time we bring a point on the table, they use this type of stuff to distract us and we have learnt now how to deal with it." he said

BHOPAL, Sept 24: Prime Minister Narendra Modi will address a mega congregation of BJP workers here in poll-bound Madhya Pradesh on Monday. The 'Karyakarta Mahakumbh' is being organised on the birth anniversary of Jana Sangh co-founder Deendayal Upadhyaya to mark the formal culmination of the BJP's 'Jan Ashirwad Yatras' that crisscrossed the length and breadth of the state, party leaders said. This will be the third visit of the prime minister to Madhya Pradesh in the past 45 days where the ruling party is locked in a close contest with Congress.

According to sources, the BJP has set an ambitious target of gathering 10 lakh people for the Monday event being projected as a show of strength by the saffron party. "Modiji is going to address 'Karyakarta Mahakumbh' at Jamboree Maidan in Bhopal on September 25, the birth anniversary of Deendayal Upadhyaya," MP BJP chief VD Sharma told PTI. The prime minister will arrive at the Maidan at around 11 am. He is expected to leave Bhopal at 1 pm, he added.

"Lakhs of BJP workers are expected to reach the venue. They are very excited to hear Modiji," Sharma said.

The BJP had rolled out five vatras to reach out to the masses early this month, with party president JP Nadda flagging off the first Yatra from Chitrakoot in Satna on September 3.

These yatras have covered 223 out of the total 230 assembly segments in MP. "The formal culmination of these yatras would

Rajasthan, we are very close, and we think we will be able to win. That is what it is looking like, and by the way, that is also what the BJP internally is saying."

The Congress learnt a very important lesson in Karnataka that the BJP wins elections by distracting and not allowing us to construct our narrative and so we fought the polls constructing our party's

"What we did in Karnataka is we gave a clear vision for the state, 'this is the social security programme that we are going to set up for you' and then we control the

narrative. "If you look at the Telangana polls, we are controlling the narrative, the BJP is not even in the narrative, it is gone. The BJP has been decimated and it is over in Telangana," Gandhi said. He claimed that the Congress is controlling the narrative in Madhya Pradesh and Chhattisgarh in the run up to the polls there.

"If you speak to people in Rajasthan on what is the issue in terms of anti-incumbency, they will tell you they like the government," he said.

"We are adapting in a situation where the BJP controls the media. Don't think the opposition is not capable of adapting, we are adapting, we are working together, we are 60 per cent of India's population. BJP is in for a surprise in 2024 (Lok Sabha polls)," he said.

Gandhi also said that the women's reservation bill can be implemented "tomorrow morning" and all that is required to be done is to state that 33 per cent of

### Three people go missing after being swept away in Parvati river

KOTA, Sept 24: Three people went missing after being swept away in the Parvati river near Kishanpura village in Rajasthan's Kota district, police said on Sunday.

The incident occurred on Saturday afternoon when the three people were taking a bath in the river's overflowing water and catching fish, they said.

Three persons -- identified as Rahul Guiarati (23), Banti Jatav (42) and Babulal (45) -- all residents of Gandhi Colony under the Baran Sadar police station area were swept away in deep water in the Parvati river on Saturday afternoon while they were bathing and catching fish, said SHO Ramvilas.

The river's water level reportedly suddenly began rising and the three persons, along with two others named Kishan and Neelu, were swept away by the strong current of the water, he added.

The SHO said Kishan and Neelu somehow managed to reach the shore while the three others went missing.

The State Disaster Response Force (SDRF) and civil defence teams began the search operation soon after the incident but the three missing have not yet been traced, he added. (PTI)

NEW DELHI, Sept 24: The percentage of Indians appearing in TOEFL to pursue secondary education and certifications abroad has seen a gradual increase over the years while those taking the test for immigration purpose has declined, according to Educational Testing Service (ETS).

The Princeton-based ETS, which conducts the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) and Graduate Record Examination (GRE), said the trend reflects the shifting aspirations of the younger demographic.

According to data exclusively accessed by PTI, the percentage of Indian test takers for licensure, certification or to attend secondary school abroad, has gone up from 5.83 per cent of the total aspirants in 2021 to 7.77 per cent in 2022. During the same period, the percentage of Indian test takers appearing in



TOEFL for employment or immigration has declined from 8.19 per cent to 7.22 per cent. Top officials at ETS have con-

served since 2018. The data showed that the percentage of Indians appearing in TOEFL to attend a graduate or postgraduate business programme/a graduate or postgraduate programme, other than a business programme, has increased from 70.84 per cent in 2021 to 71.87 per cent in 2022.

"From our data, we observed a growing trend of secondary education students opting for the TOEFL test. This trend is testimony to the shifting aspirations of the younger demographic, especially in their pursuit of international education," Sachin Jain, the Country Manager of ETS India and South Asia, told PTI.

There was a 53 per cent growth in Indian TOEFL test takers in 2021 compared to the previous year. In 2022, the number of test takers saw a 59 per cent rise over 2021.

"There are so many industry reports that talk about the number of Indian students heading abroad hitting 2.5 million in the next three to five years. So that, I think, is a very strong macro push that is happening," Jain said.

'The second thing is, I think there is a lot more, I would say enablement by foreign countries towards Indian talents.... another big macro kind of pull which is happening right from Australia, Canada and the UK, the big destination markets as we call them like all of them have changed," he added. The top cities in India with the highest number of test takers are New Delhi, Mumbai, Bengaluru, Pune, Hyderabad, Gurugram, Chennai, Kolkata and Ahmedabad.

Starting July 26, ETS executed a series of changes in the English language proficiency test to create an optimal experience for those taking it. Reducing the duration to less than two hours instead of three and allowing the candidates to be able to see their official score release date upon completion of the test, were among a few of the changes. # From panchayat to Parliament: How 33 pc reservation empowered women at panchayat level

NEW DELHI, Sept 24: Geeta Mahanand, the sarpanch of Risama panchayat in Chhattisgarh's Durg, said she would have never come forward to contest the rural polls had there been no reservation for women in the Panchayati raj system.

A housewife who was thrust into politics after the seat was reserved for women, Mahanand said reservation not just empowered her to make decisions but also boosted her confidence to do more for the society.

In the three decades since reservation of seats for women in panchayati raj institutions was introduced, the country saw women dismantling gender barriers to take the lead in the political field at the grassroots level and excel in it.

In 1992, the P V Narasimha Rao government passed the 73rd and 74th Constitutional Amendment Acts mandating the reservation of one-third of seats for women in Panchayati Raj institutions. Over three decades later, the 128th Constitution amendment bill, referred to as the Nari Shakti Vandan Adhiniyam, is seen as yet another significant stride towards achieving gender equity in politics.

After becoming sarpanch, Mahanand took proactive steps to improve cleanliness in her panchayat. "We received a grant of Rs 20 lakh for our cleanliness efforts. We paid special attention to cleanliness in all institutions. We constructed toilets and employed women under the Swachh Bharat initiative, paying them from the panchayat fund.

More than 175 people have been killed and several hundreds injured since ethnic violence broke out in Manipur on May 3, when a 'Tribal Solidarity March' was organised in the hill districts to protest against the majority Meitei community's demand for Scheduled Tribe status. Meiteis account for about 53 per cent of Manipur's population and live mostly in the Imphal valley, while tribals, including Nagas and Kukis, constitute 40 per cent and reside mostly in the hill districts. "You are, therefore, requested to formulate a detailed, time-bound action plan to implement the action points of the G20 declaration pertaining to concerned departments," said the order issued by the planning department special secretary.

"Detailed action plan containing major milestones and timelines be sent to the undersigned latest by September 30," it added.

A combined score of 1,886.0 earned the Indian troika the second spot behind hosts China, who smashed the Asian record with a score of 1,896.6.

Junior world champion Ramita then won the individual bronze in her event, shooting 230.1 in the eight-shooter finals.

China won both the gold and silver medals in the event with Huang Yuting breaking the Games record with a score of 252.7 on way to top podium finish. Han Jiayu came in second with 251.3 points.

The 19-year-old Ramita was in contention for a silver medal before she fell behind because of a rank poor 9.9 on the 13th shot.

Mehuli, the other Indian to make the eight-shooter final, finished fourth with a score of 208.43. Despite ending up second best to China in the team category, all three Indian women shooters were in the 'zone' on Sunday.

Considering what he has gone through the year, especially the range of emotions in the last one month, a third ODI hundred could not have come at a better time for him.

Iyer was India's designated number four before the injury pegged him back and a virtual no show in the Asia Cup meant his place in the playing eleven was far from secure.

In the meantime, Ishan Kishan also made a strong claim for a middle-order spot with a few good knocks.

Iyer had a lot to prove in the Australia series and a run-out in the first ODI



showed that luck too was not on his side. However, he made his own luck at the high-scoring Holkar Stadium on Sunday. When he walked out to bat at number three, he had Gill at the other end like he had on Friday when got run out attempting

The mix up might have played on his mind but in a high-pressure scenario, Iyer oozed confidence from the start and showed the same faith in Gill while taking

a quick single to get off the mark. Iver is known for his belligerent play against the spinners but he was equally effective against the pacers.

He began with a lofted hit off debutant Spencer Johnson before producing a couple of crisp cover drives off Josh Hazlewood. As Ĝill took his time to get going in

the powerplay, Iyer found the gaps with ease. An odd short ball was directed at Iyer deliberately but he was quick to put it

An aerial strike over cover off Sean Abbott pretty much confirmed that Iyer was in his elements. The 45-minute rain delay did not disturb his rhythm and he returned to do what he does best: take the attack to the spinners.

After slapping left-arm pacer Johnson for a straight six to bring up his fifty, Iyer punished leg-spinner Adam Zampa for bowling a half-tracker and his third six came in the following over from offie Matthew Short, a massive hit over wide long-on.

Strike rotation was also a key part of his innings comprising 39 singles.

Iyer completed a memorable hundred with a single off Zampa in the 30th over. The roar from him after reaching the milestone was understandable considering the series of events over the past six months.

The much needed runs from his bat might have come on a belter of a track and against an ordinary looking Australian attack.

But it might just be enough to settle the middle-order debate going into the World Cup at home. (PTI)

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
