CBI, NIA refute allegations of high-handedness in Manipur

IMPHAL, Oct 2: Amid tribal groups accusing the National Investigation Agency (NIA) and Central Bureau of Investigations (CBI) of high-handedness in Manipur, the central agencies on Monday said every arrest made in the restive state, which has been witnessing ethnic clashes since May, is based on evidence gathered by investiga-

The NIA and CBI officials working here in an ethnically charged environment have been facing the daunting task of completing investigations in various cases, including those related to attacks on army personnel in 2015, the probe agencies said. Refuting the allegations levelled by the Indigenous Tribal Leaders' Front (ITLF), an organization claiming to represent the Kuki-Zo community of Manipur hills, officials from both agencies said no partiality has been shown against any community, religion or sect,



and that only the rule book of the Indian Penal Code was abided by.

Referring to the recent arrest of Seiminlun Gangte, a tribal, the officials said he is one of the key accused in an SUV blast case that took place in the Kwakta area of Bishnupur district on June 21. Three people were injured in the blast.

He was brought to New Delhi after securing his transit remand from the competent court. In the national capital, the accused was produced before a designated court, which remanded him to NIA custody, they added. Intelligence gathering posts to come up along Indo-China border

MAGO, Oct 2: Border posts of the Indo-Tibetan Border Police (ITBP) along the India-China frontier from Ladakh to Arunachal Pradesh will have an additional team of intelligence officers for surveillance and information gathering. A highly placed source said the central government has approved a proposal for establishing the set-up that will be known as the Border Intelligence Post (BIP).

The move bears significance in view of the increased Chinese activities along the border and transgressions by China's People's Liberation Army (PLA).

A stand-off between the Indian Army and the PLA in Ladakh has been going on since

Each of the BIPs will be manned by fourfive officials of the Intelligence bureau and protected by ITBP personnel, the source in the know of the development said on the condition of anonymity.

Those personnel who would be deployed at the BIPs will keep an eye on activities across the border and share updates with the higher authorities and the government.

The source, however, refused to disclose the

amount sanctioned by the central government for the project citing its sensitive nature.

Mago is the first village close to the border with China in the Chuna sector in Arunachal Pradesh's Tawang district. An all-terrain motorable road was built in the village only in

There are around 180 border outposts (BOPs) of the ITBP along the entire India-China border and the establishment of 45 more was sanctioned recently.

Twenty Army soldiers were killed in a clash with the PLA in June 2020 in Ladakh's Galwan Valley. On December 9 last year, PLA troops intruded in Yangste in Arunachal Pradesh, which led to a clash between the soldiers of the neighbouring countries and resulted in injuries to both sides.

Since the India-China border is not fully demarcated, both sides have different perceptions of the Line of Actual Control (LAC).

There have been reports of PLA troops often transgressing the disputed areas. Speaking at a function here on Monday, Union Minister Kiren Rijiju said a country is safe when its borders are safe. (CONTD. ON PAGE-9)

Sarma said, "The cases of hearing impairment being observed in a certain percentage of children in the country can be drastically reduced if such special cases are brought to notice on time and necessary treatment protocols followed. We need to be create awareness on a mission mode."

Referring to the utility of cochlear implants in treating hearing impairment, the chief minister spoke about the treatment method being provided free of cost to affected children in Assam.

"The specially-abled (divyang) children are highly intelligent and are filled with confidence and bestowed with pleasant personalities. Scientists' discoveries made possible mRNA vaccines' creation against Covid-19

STOCKHOLM, Oct 2: It was a euphoric moment for scientists Katalin Karikó and Weissman who won the Noble prize in medicine on Monday for their discoveries that enabled the creation of mRNA vac-

Their discoveries could also be used to develop other vaccine shots

cines against Covid-19.

Hungarian-born American Katalin Karikó and American Drew Weissman were cited for contributing "to the unprecedented rate of vaccine development during one of the greatest threats to human health in modern times," according to the panel that awarded the prize in Stockholm.

The panel said the pair's "groundbreaking findings ... fundamentally changed our understanding of how mRNA interacts with our immune system.

Traditionally, making vaccines required growing viruses or pieces



of viruses — often in giant vats of cells or, like most flu shots, in chicken eggs — and then purifying them before next steps in brewing

The messenger RNA approach is radically different. It starts with a snippet of genetic code that carries instructions for making proteins. Pick the right virus protein to target, and the body turns into a mini vaccine factory

Nevertheless, simply injecting lab-grown mRNA into the body triggered an inflammatory reaction that usually destroyed it.

Karikó, a professor at Szeged University in Hungary and an adjunct professor at the University of Pennsylvania, and Weissman, of the University of Pennsylvania, figured out a tiny modification to the building blocks of RNA that made it stealthy enough to slip past those

immune defenses. Karikó, 68, is the 13th woman to win the Nobel Prize in medicine. She was a senior vice president at BioNTech, which partnered with Pfizer to make one of the Covid-19 vaccines

She and Weissman, 64, who is a professor and director of the Penn Institute for RNA Innovations, met by chance in the 1990s while photocopying research papers, according to Penn Today, the university's news website.

Dr. Paul Hunter, a professor of medicine at Britain's University of East Anglia, described the mRNA vaccines as a "game changer" in helping to shut down the coronavirus pandemic, crediting the shots

with saving millions of lives. "If it hadn't been for the mRNA technology, Covid would have been much worse," he said. "Vaccines generally were the turning point in slowing down Covid and the mRNA vaccines were just so much better than all the others," he said, noting that the main vaccine used in the UK, made by AstraZeneca, is

barely in use anymore. "We would likely only now be coming out of the depths of Covid without the mRNA vaccines," Hunter said. Bharat Pankhania, an infectious diseases expert at Exeter University, said that a major advantage of mRNA technology was that vaccines could be made in extremely large quantities since their main components are made in laboratories. India to clock GDP growth of 6.5% in FY24: NITI Aayog Ex-VC Rajiv Kumar

NEW DELHI, Oct 2: The Indian economy will grow at around 6.5 per cent in the current financial year as the country's macroeconomic situation is benefiting from the reforms that have been taken up in the last nine years by the Narendra Modi-led government, former NITI Aayog Vice-Chairman Rajiv Kumar said on Monday.

Kumar further said that India needs and can grow at 8 per cent-plus as that level of economic growth is required to meet aspirations of the country's young population and to generate sufficient jobs for its workforce.

'My growth projection (of India's GDP growth in FY 2023-24) is 6.5 per cent. "And I think we can easily maintain this (growth) over the next few years," he told PTI in an interview.

India's GDP growth in 2022-23 was 7.2 per cent, lower than 9.1 per cent in 2021-22. According to Reserve Bank of India's projections, India's GDP is likely to grow at 6.5 per cent in the current fiscal year.

Kumar further said, "Macroeconomic situation India is benefiting from the reforms that have been implemented in the last nine years. Therefore, both the external macroeconomic balance as well as the domestic ones are in good shape." He said that India's current account deficit is manageable, the country's foreign exchange reserves are sufficient to cover about 11 months of imports and the foreign direct investment flows are



Expressing concern over decline of India's exports between April and August by about 11 per cent compared to the same period last year, he said, "This reflects our age old situation which is that India's export performance is strongly correlated with the global trade performance.'

Kumar pointed out that as the global trade has weakened, India's exports performance has also weakened given the weak demand in Europe, the US and other developed

"We have to change this. We must do whatever we can to ensure that our exports

have a greater share of world markets," he said. On some US-based economists' claim that India is overstating economic growth, Kumar said that the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI) must take a firm position and give enough reasons as to why they are using the wholesale price index (WPI) deflator and not the Consumer Price Index (CPI) as GDP defla-

"And that needs to be firmly established

once and for all," Kumar emphasised. Meanwhile, India's real GDP growth was 7.8 per cent on a year-on-year basis in Q1 FY24, as per the Income or Production Ap-

Recently, former chief economic advisor Arvind Subramanian, in an article, argued that India's GDP is not measured from the expenditure side and measured only from the income side. This tends to over estimate

Last month, chief economic advisor V Anantha Nageswaran rejected criticism of "statistical discrepancy" in the first quarter GDP data, saying when the same statistical authority reported the severest contraction in the first quarter of 2020, the naysayers had called it credible as it suited their narrative.

The article by Nageshwaran was written in light of debates over India's economic performance and economist Ashoka Mody, a Princeton University professor, raising

concerns regarding the country's GDP growth rate for the first quarter of the financial year 2023-24. (PTI)

NEW DELHI, Oct 2: Three of the world's 10 slowest cities in terms of traffic speeds are in India, according to the findings by a USbased private non-profit research organisation.

As per the report, Bhiwandi in Maharashtra, Kolkata, and Bihar's Arrah are among the 10 slowest cities in the world on the speed index.

The study, conducted by the National Bureau of Economic Research (NBER), covered over 1,200 cities in 152 countries.

According to the report — 'The Fast, the Slow and the Congested: Urban Transportation in Rich And Poor Countries' — the average travel speed of motor vehicles throughout the day is the highest in Flint (US), slowest in Bangladesh capital Dhaka, and is the most congested in Bogota (Colombia).

It also said nine of the 10 cities with the slowest uncongested speeds are in Bangladesh, India, and Nigeria.

Researchers used data from Google maps to analyse traffic in more than 1,000 cities having a population of over 300,000.

Bhiwandi ranked 5th in the world's 20 slowest cities on the speed index, followed by Kolkata (6th) Arrah (7th), Bihar Sharif (11th), Mumbai (13th), Aizawl (18th), Bengaluru (19th) and Shillong (20th). (PTI)

NEW DELHI, Oct 2: The finance ministry under the then finance minister Arun Jaitley had decided to seek explanation from RBI deputy governor Viral Acharya on his controversial 'wrath of the markets' speech but refrained from issuing the letter to him, said ex-finance secretary Sub-

ash Chandra Garg in his book. Achrya later resigned six months ahead of his three-year tenure for 'personal reasons', said the book titled 'We Also Make Policy: An Insider's Account of How the Finance Ministry Functions'

Garg in his book said that Acharya had used false data to bring home the point that governments that do not respect central bank independence sooner or later incur wrath of financial markets.


"Governments that do not respect central bank independence will sooner or later incur the wrath of financial markets, ignite economic fire, and come to rue the day they undermined an important regulatory institution; their wiser counterparts who invest in central bank independence will enjoy lower costs of borrowing, the love of international investors and longer lifespans," Acharya had said in a lecture in Mumbai in October 2018 when the tiff between the government and the RBI was at its height. "Viral Acharya used data from the sovereign bond markets of Argentina to make the point that bonds were sold off and yields

and credit default swap rates rose massively when the governor (Martin Redrado) of the central bank resigned in the wake of the government's interference," Garg said in his book published by Harper Collins.

However, Garg said, the ministry examined the data used by Acharya in his lecture and found to be inaccurate. "Dr Viral Acharya had used

false data to make his point about the so called parallels between Argentina and India. This was not expected from a researcher of his stature. He had also delivered an incendiary speech, probably with no parallel in the annals of central banking, knowing well that the speech could further spoil the relationship between the government and RBI," the book said. Finance minister Arun Jaitley was also shocked when he was apprised of the data. With his consent, it was decided to call for an explanation from Acharya, it said, adding, a letter was drafted that basically contained four allegations.

"First, Viral Acharva delivered a public speech on theme 'On the Importance of Independent Regulatory Institutions: The Case of the Central Bank' on October 26, 2018, which created a strong impression in India in the media and the minds of economic and financial analysts, participants and commentators that the independence of RBI was under threat, as a result of the Government of India allegedly



taking measures to stifle its independence and taking measures to raid the reserves/buffers built in the balance sheet of RBI," Garg wrote. NEW DELHI, Oct 2: Metaowned WhatsApp banned 74 lakh accounts in August, keeping in line with IT rules, according to the latest India monthly report by the messaging platform. Of these, 35 lakh accounts were proactively banned, before any reports from users. The 'user-safety report' contains details of user complaints received and the corresponding action taken by WhatsApp, as well as WhatsApp's own preventive actions to combat abuse on the platform. "Between August 1 and August 31, a total of 7,420,748 WhatsApp accounts were banned. 3,506,905 of these accounts were proactively banned, before any reports from users," it said.



The Fed's next meeting on rates ends on Nov. 1. In currency trading Monday, the dollar rose to 149.65 Japanese yen from 149.38 yen. The euro slipped to USD 1.0575 from USD 1.0589. (AP)

















Cinematic lens master

oumendu Roy, the acclaimed cinematographer renowned for his collaborations with legendary filmmaker Satyajit Ray, passed away in Kolkata at the age of 90. His contributions to the world of cinema, especially in the realm of cinematography, were nothing short of remarkable. Roy's journey into the world of filmmaking began when he took up the responsibility of caring for an expensive camera on behalf of Technician's Studio during the shooting of Ray's debut film, "Pather Panchali". 22 per cent growth in Kerala's tax revenue

There is heartening news for Kerala's economy. The dark predictions about an imminent economic collapse made by incorrigible Government-baiters and doubting Thomases have been proved to be what they are: patent falsehoods. The facts speak for themselves. The data are self-explanatory. The news that makes delightful reading is that Kerala's tax revenue has recorded a robust growth. The fiscal year 2022-23 shows a remarkable growth rate of 22.11 per cent in 2022-23 compared to 2021-22. The State's own tax revenue has perked up in a big way. Kerala is second only to Maharashtra (25.6%) and Gujarat (28.4%). These two states have been able to produce better results because they boast strong manufacturing bases. Compared to this, Kerala's feat is no less impressivedespite it being a big consumption state.

The remarkable risein Kerala's own tax revenue is being ascribed mainly to the Goods and Services Tax (GST). Experts say GST collections are showing a steady improvement. The GST collections grew by 19.44 per cent to ₹ 34,641 crore in 2022-23. The State's own tax revenue has gone up to ₹77,164.84 crore from ₹ 63,191.75 croreposting an increase of nearly 14,000 crore.

The problems plaguing the State's economy are due primarily to the "faulty fiscal policies" of the Union Government towards the States in general and Kerala in particular. Just to cite an instance, the State's share of grants in aid from the Centre suffered the highest decline from 25.8 per cent to 20.6 per cent, representing a 5.2 percentage points. In the case of Kerala, the share of central taxes fell from 11.13 per cent to 9.38 per cent. As for revenue mobilization, the highest growth was witnessed in land revenue because of the increase in rates. Revenue from land transactions saw a 52.95 per cent rise from ₹ 470.81 crore to ₹ 720.10 crore. Excise duties of the State posted a 41.52 per cent growth to ₹2,875.95 crorein 2022-23 from ₹2,032.23 crore. Last year also saw a marked decline in borrowing as well - -47 per cent. This is being attributed to severe curbs on borrowing in Kerala in the name of off-budget borrowing. Kerala also recorded a big decline in revenue expenditure - -2.63 per cent. The all-India average for revenue expenditure growth was 11.5 per cent. This is an impressive achievementyiewed against the highest revenue expenditure growth recorded by states like Andhra Pradesh (26.1 per cent), Punjab (17 per cent), Maharashtra (16.1 per cent) and Odisha (16.1 per cent).

The habitual Kerala critics ended up with egg on their faces because the Fitch Ratings has reversed the outlook on Kerala to "stable" from "negative", while retaining the 'BB' rating for the state's long-term foreign and local currency issuer default ratings (IDR). The revised ratings are reflective of the improving trend in the wake of the pandemic. The state's economic expansion will effectively undo the increased debt burden, leading to steady debt ratios. The remarkable turnaround has come in less than 10 months. It may be mentioned that the rating agency had revised the outlo9ok of the State in October last year to negative from stable while keeping the BB rating.

Welcoming revision from negative to stable, Kerala's finance minister K N Balagopal asked the opposition parties to fight for the State's rightful share from the central pool of taxes and stop blaming the LDF Government for the state's financial problems.

Meanwhile, in an interesting development, economic experts have come up with a novel suggestion to counter the decline in the State's share from the divisive pool of central taxes. The prescription is this:Kerala should allow the number of migrant workers in the State to be counted as its population in the next census! The best way to do this is to encourage the migrant workers to settle in the State with their families. That way they will be included in the population count. The result will be a larger share from the central government's divisive pool. At present, Kerala's share from the central divisive pool has come down from 3.875 per cent in the 10th Finance Commission to 1.925 per cent in the 15th Finance Commission. The fall in the divisive pool for Kerala is because over 60 per cent of the weightage for such devolution is linked to population.

Kerala's population growth, at present, is less than 1 per cent annually, while north Indian states like Bihar, Madhya Pradesh Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh are growing at nearly 2 per cent per annum. This results in greater share for them in divisive pool. A survey conducted in 2013 had estimated Kerala's migrant population atclose to 25 lakh. It could well be anything between 50 and 60 lakh now. It is also estimated that the migrants send nearly 25,000 crore back to their home states annually. Kerala also prides itself on providing a slew of benefits to migrant workers. It is the first state to enact a social security scheme for them. (IPA Service)

BRICS declaration not enough, India has to work for labour force

Ensuring decent work, dignity, and respect for all" remains the chief challenge in the labour market with decent work and workers' rights as core issues, as it is reflected in the deliberations in the Ninth BRICS Labour and Employment Ministers' Meet (September 26-29, 2023) and the joint declaration made at the conclusion of the event in Durban, South Africa.

BRICS countries - Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa – have been facing four specific problems which remained in focus during the meet: Promoting labour rights for all and reducing decent work deficits; Universal access to social protection and ensuring a minimum basic income; Promoting decent work and closing the skills gap in the informal economy; and Building sustainable enterprises, innovation, and enhancing productivity.

The labour markets in BRICS countries are impacted by future of work mega drivers, including technological advancements, climate change, demographic shifts and changes in investment and trade patterns as well as mutually reinforcing crises, including the COVID-19 pandemic. The declaration has, understandably, avoided mentioning the impact of Russian aggression on Ukraine, on workforce, However, the countries have reaffirmed their commitments to respect, promote, and realise fundamental principles and rights at work to provide decent work for all and achieve social justice.

The countries have committed to "reducing informal work through the promotion of the transition from informal to formal economy, expanding social protection coverage, eliminating discrimination in employment and occupation, ensuring adequate and fair wages and enhancing job security." The promotion and realisation of labour rights has been given a high priority. Promoting an enabling environment for freedom of association and collective bargaining requires a combination of legal and institutional frameworks, strong employers' and workers' organisations and an efficient labour administration that promotes labour rights, facilitates labour inspection children were engaged in child labour in and other atypical and vulnerable workers

and professional dispute settlement services. Tripartism and regular consultations with the social actors must therefore be enhanced. The effective abolition of child labour remained priority, and the countries committed to step up our efforts to eradicate child labour based on the Durban Call to Action. Significance of labour rights and international labour standards have also been acknowledged.

Universal access to social protection has been acknowledges as human right. Ensuring a minimum basic income was emphasized and declared that BRICS members would aim at "providing at least a basic level of income security for all through nationally defined social protection floors."

It must be noted in this regard that "universal social protection" was endorsed during 2017 Labour Employment Ministers Meeting through BRICS Social Security Cooperation Framework, and an MoU was signed in 2018. However, very little has been done so far. The countries have however reiterated their "determination" to enhance progress towards universal social protec-**DEGREE OF THOUGHT**

again committed themselves for promoting decent work and closing the skills gap in the informal economy. It should be noted that much higher proportion of workers are in informal work, in India about 90 percent.

The joint declaration read, "we commit to closing the skills gap of the informally employed to reduce decent work deficits and enhance the ability of workers and enterprises to transition to the formal economy." To promote sustainable enterprises, innovation and enhancing productivity, the countries have agreed to establish a BRICS Productivity Ecosystem for Decent Work

The joint declaration is pleasant to read at a time when the labour market is facing unprecedented multiple crises. ILO Director-General Gilbert F. Houngbo, while addressing the meet, has called for ensuring labour rights. He regretted that 160 million

2020, while close to 50 million people as well as persons with disabilities. The were living in modern day slavery in 2021. He said that crises are compounding, social injustices persist, and the aspiration of decent work for all is a long way from being achieved.

ILO DG exposed the participating countries by saying, "We know that many including in the BRICS countries are working excessive hours. Forty-eight hour working weeks - and even much longer are all too common." Every day, millions of people work in unsafe or unhealthy conditions, just so they can feed themselves and their families. Well over two million die each year as a direct result of occupational accidents and diseases. Hundreds of millions more are injured at work. Discrimination in the workplace remains a problem of immense proportions. If we consider gender for instance, we see significant gender wage gaps and lower employment participation rates in most countries. While welcoming the BRICS declaration, ILO DG mentioned two spe-

cific issues - First, labour rights are human rights. A founding principle of the ILO is that labour is not a commodity. Workers must

be treated with dignity and be protected from the disproportionate power of employers, whether public or private. Secondly, respect for labour rights helps reduce inequalities and enables workers to claim a fair share of the wealth which they have helped to generate. Central to this are freedom of association and the right to collective bargaining. Houngbo also emphasized that "a higher proportion of workers in BRICS countries are in informal employment." On behalf of the Organised Labour in the BRICS countries, the BRICS Trade Union Forum conveyed their six key points. First, Deliberate and targeted investment in people for inclusive development, job creation and guaranteeing quality healthcare and education.

Second, Elimination of income inequalities in class, gender, or racial... more critical for informal, farm, domestic, platform,

ever-growing levels of income inequality remain a threat to social stability, progress and peace across the world, including in the BRICS nations. Third, Institutionalisation of social dialogue and cooperation by tripartite partners of government, business and labour to advance decent work and inclusive development remains fundamental if we are to make progress in overcoming our many socio-economic challenges. This means national processes should defend and advance decent work, collective bargaining and social justice.

Fourth, The ILO, its Governing Body and overall composition must be inclusive. Fifth, Advancing Social Protection and support for workers and communities facing deprivation, despair and poverty, whilst ensuring the long-term sustainability of economies and the planet, and improving the lives of working-class communities. And sixth, ... A just transition that ensures clean energy and environmental justice, whilst protecting and creating jobs and communities.

What transpired in the BRICS Labour Ministerial Meet 2023, has great significance for India, where informality is around 90 per cent, unemployment around 8 per cent, no social security coverage for 76 per cent of workers, and joblessness and price rise has triggered a cost-of-living crisis, about 68 per cent of people are not able to even afford healthy food, and majority of women and children are anaemic. PM Modi led government must honour the commitments made in the declaration and do something for workers, rather than pursuing such a labour reform through the four labour codes that Central Trade Unions believe anti-labour.

It must also be recalled that the present ruling establishment has all along since 2014 been violating the tripartite principle, and not even convening meeting of ILC, the highest tripartite body, since 2015. CTUs has been alleging to have sidelined in the present regime. Modi government must stand to the commitments made in BRICS Labour Ministers Meet. (IPA Service)

Saudi-Israeli deal would be a gamechanger, but not for discussed reasons

Saudi-Israeli agreement to establish diplomatic relations involving enhanced US commitments to Gulf security could be a game-changer for great power rivalry in the Middle East. To be sure, US President Joe Biden and Israeli Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu face formidable obstacles in paying the price tag Saudi Arabia puts on the normalisation of relations with Israel. In return for relations, Saudi Arabia has demanded legally binding security commitments from the United States, support for its nuclear programme, and unfettered access to sophisticated weaponry conditions that would be chal-

lenged in Congress. The kingdom has also linked diplomatic relations to ambiguously defined progress in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict - a demand Netanyahu will have difficulty meeting with his current coalition government, the most ultra-nationalist and ultra-conservative in his country's history.

Speaking to Fox News, Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman described the Palestinian issue as "very important" and one that "we need to solve."Bin Salman shied away from spelling out what a solution would entail

beyond saving he hoped it "will ease the life of the Palestinians."

Within days of the interview, Saudi Foreign Minister Faisal bin Farhan told the United Nations General Assembly and a webinar normalising relations with Israel would require a plan to establish an independent Palestinian state.

On the first visit to the West Bank by a senior Saudi official since the creation of the Palestine Authority in 1994, Ambassador Nayef al-Sudairi, the kingdom's first envoy to the Palestinian entity, said Saudi Arabia was "working towards establishing a Palestinian state with East Jerusalem as its capital."

Palestinian officials told their Saudi counterparts that as part of the kingdom's agreement to recognise the Jewish state, Israel would have to stop building new settlements, expand Palestinian control over security and construction in the West Bank, accept full Palestinian membership of the United Nations, and consent to the opening of a Palestine Liberation Organisation office in Washington and a US consulate in East Jerusalem.

Nevertheless, senior Israeli officials asserted that Saudi Arabia was merely paying lip service to the Palestinian issue in talks a former US Middle East peace about Israel.A senior Palestinian official conceded "that what is

being discussed includes elements that are less than statehood. We're talking about a pathway to getting there.

The obstacles haven't prevented Bin Salman and Netanyahu from raising heightened expectations recently by suggesting significant progress in agreeing on the terms of a US-Saudi-Israeli deal. Speaking to Fox News, Bin Salman said his country and Israel were getting "closer" daily to establish formal relations. Netanyahu was equally ebullient at the UN General Assembly. Largely overlooked in public discussions about a possible Saudi-Israeli normalisation of relations is the fact that the Saudi demands signal that the kingdom, like the United Arab Emirates, which is requesting an "ironclad" security arrangement with the United States, prefers the US rather than China to be its security partner for the foreseeable future.

What that tells you is that at the end of the day. they don't think there is anybody else they can rely upon if they really stranded," said Dennis Ross, negotiator. Ross was referring to Bin Salman by his initials.

Former US National Security official Council Kirsten Fontenrose argued that Bin Salman had created a situation where he could forcefully argue for a binding security arrangement even if efforts to forge a deal with Israel failed. "MBS looks at this and says, 'Right now, it looks like the sticking point is Israeli politics. So, even if I don't get this, I look like the good guy'," Fontenrose said. I expect there will be pressure from the Saudis moving forward, even if we don't get normalisation, to follow through... (saying), 'Well, we have arrived so closely on some of these ideas on a US security pact, we've done so much work on civilian nuclear cooperation, why don't we just continue this?" Fontenrose added

Even so, it is hard to believe that Saudi Arabia and the UAE think they can retain the freedom to hedge their bets and expand relations with China, as well as Russia, particularly regarding the Ukraine war and Western sanctions, in ways that the United States would see as threatening its national security and undermining its policies

While the United States would likely not disrupt the Gulf states' economic and trade ties with China, the Gulf's largest trading partner, it would limit Saudi and

UAE cooperation with China on geopolitical issues, nuclear development, technology collaboration, and arms acquisition.

"The administration is asking for some things from the Saudis. They want them to continue to peg oil to the dollar, there was some talk that they may allow the Chinese to buy oil with the Chinese currency... What is being asked here is not to stop their commercial relationship but to create boundaries in some of the high-tech areas... It's a two-way street," Ross, the former US ne gotiator, said.

The kingdom "cannot have it both ways. If it wants that kind of commitment from the United States, it has to line up with the United States... If our security relationship with Saudi Arabia is to be deepened because the Saudis want it, then there are certain obligations that come with that," said former US diplomat and prominent analyst Martin Indyk. Undoubtedly, Saudi Arabia and the UAE will test how far they can push the envelope if they come to a security understanding with the United States. Ultimately, however, they are likely also to find that a security arrangement would, at least in the Middle East, shift the geopolitical US-China power balance in the United States' favour. Shift in global trade makes Russia a dumping yard for excess Chinese containers

n a rather unnoticed development as a byproduct of the Russia-Ukraine war, a directional shift in Russia's Latrade with the world has turned the global container trade upside down, creating both challenges and opportunities for all players concerned. This container crisis is primarily a consequence of the deepening trade imbalance between Russia and China. According to Container Xchange, the technological platform for the global logistics trade, Russia is flooded with more containers bringing goods from China than can be sent back, with railway depots grappling with an overwhelming accumulation of empty shipping containers originating from China. The commodities exchanged between the two countries play a role in exacerbating the problem, as Russian raw materials are primarily transported to China via rail tanks and open wagons rather than in containers. The platform estimates that currently there are around 150,000 surplus containers in Russia. All containers from Russia to China go with a pickup charge. In fact, many Chinese companies are selling containers below market price to get rid of the boxes since it doesn't make sense to send them back to China. From Moscow to Shanghai, the offline market offers around \$1,500 for new containers. If cargo worthy containers are in good condition and cost less, they prefer to sell the boxes in the local market.

In February 2022, the average price of a 40ft high cube container in Moscow was \$4,175, which has come down to \$580 as of 25 September 2023. Similarly, the average price of a cargo worthy 20 ft container, which was \$1,961 in February 2022, has now hit a bottom of \$675.

China, traditionally a substantial purchaser of Russian energy, has now emerged as a vital source of imports, encompassing a wide range of products such as machinery, pharmaceuticals, auto parts, consumer goods, smartphones, cars, and agricultural equipment, from China. This shift has created a shortage of closed cargo containers, further intensifying the logistics challenge. This shift is also a direct result of numerous international companies exiting the Russian market amid ongoing geopolitical tensions and the conflict in Ukraine.

Trade between China and Russia witnessed substantial growth of 36.5 percent in the first seven months of 2023, totalling \$134.1 billion, according to Chinese customs data. China's exports to Russia surged by 73.4 percent, reaching approximately \$62.54 billion, while imports from Russia also grew significantly by 15.1 percent, totalling \$71.6 billion. Soon after Russia's invasion in Ukraine in February 2022, the bilateral trade between China and Russia dipped for a brief period of time and then picked up to reach record levels. Russia anticipates that its trade volume with China will surpass \$200 billion this year, a notable increase from the approximately \$185 billion recorded in 2022. Overloaded Russian ports and roads are causing transportation inefficiencies. Although some investments have been made to improve infrastructure, fiscal constraints complicate matters. Russia is seeking Chinese investors to address these issues, but uncertainty stays due to recent actions against Western companies. In an attempt to improve the container congestion, Russian shipping companies have started offering discounts to expedite the return of containers to China. The compatibility between Russia and China's foreign

policy objectives, emphasizing multipolarity and resisting control, may strengthen their partnership in Asia, impacting the region's geopolitics. This shift towards Asia represents a clear trend for Russia towards establishing better trade partnerships with Asian countries.

For instance, in 2022, trade between Russia and Central Asian countries increased by 15 percent, reaching more than \$42 billion. This growth is attributed to strong trade partnerships among countries in organizations like the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO), BRICS, and the Eurasian Economic Union (EAEU). Central Asian nations, such as Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, and Uzbekistan, collaborate closely with Russia on technology and independence-related matters. This expansion of trade bolsters Russia's regional influence and strengthens its ties with Central Asian partners.

European sanctions and voluntary boycotts have, on the other hand, redirected Russian trade away from the euro area, increasing dependence on non-sanctioning partners and leading to discounted commodity exports. This shift has reoriented Russia's global trade, making it heavily reliant on China and other Asian countries. Once a key euro area trade partner, Russia experienced a 50 percent dip in trade with Europe. While euro area exports to Russia initially dropped quickly, they have since partially recovered for non-sanctioned goods, while sanctioned goods exports remain low. Russia also reduced natural gas flows to Europe, causing a 90 percent drop in gas imports. Europe compensated by importing gas from Norway, Algeria, and Azerbaijan while increasing liquefied natural gas (LNG) imports, substantially diminishing Russia's influence in European energy markets. labetes is a complex condition with several types and no clear cause. If there is a history of a type of diabetes in a person's family, they may have a higher risk of developing the same condition.

Genetic factors can make some people more vulnerable to some types of diabetes. However, a person may not inherit the condition, and there may be ways to reduce the risk. Knowing how type 2 diabetes affects family members, for example, can encourage a person to take steps to prevent it.

Also, an awareness of family history may help with getting an early diagnosis. This, in turn, may help a person prevent some complications.

The role of genetic factors varies among types of diabetes. In type 2, for example, lifestyle factors appear to be more influential than genetics.

Knowing how genes, lifestyle, and the environment affect diabetes can encourage a person to minimize their risk of developing the condition and its

complications. Type 1 diabetes is an autoimmune disease. It occurs when the body's immune system mistakenly attacks healthy cells. This type often appears during adolescence, but a person can develop it at any age.

In the past, doctors believed that type 1 diabetes was wholly genetic. However, not everyone with type 1 diabetes has a family history of it.

Genetics Home Reference suggests that some genetic features may make type 1 diabetes more likely to develop under certain circumstances.

In people with this type of diabetes, scientists have found changes in the genes that produce certain proteins. These proteins play a key role in the immune system.

These genetic features make a person susceptible to developing type 1 diabetes, and certain factors can trigger the condition. Once a person develops type 1 diabetes, they will have many know as PCOS

For white, Hispanic, and African Americans, the added risk begins with a BMI of 25. For Asian Americans, this involves a BMI of 23. For Pacific Islanders, the risk begins with a BMI

People with two or more risk factors have a higher chance of developing type 2 diabetes.

Gestational diabetes

One Nation-One Election is Can Rabindranath Tagore vital for good governance

The idea of "One Nation, One Election" (ONOE) is not new. However, it has once again come into prominence after it was mooted by the Union Parliamentary Affairs Minister on 31 August 2023. The Government of India, merely a day later, announced the formation of a committee headed by the former President of India, Ramnath Kovind, to consider the prospect of simultaneous elections throughout the country. This triggered a heated debate among political parties, academicians, political commentators and the media for several days till it was overshadowed by the introduction of

the Women's Reservation Bill. The ONOE committee held its first meeting on 23 September 2023 and decided to invite national parties, recognised state parties and state government representatives for suggestions. It has also sought inputs from the Law Commission. The ONOE committee held its

poses the conduct of elections to the Lok Sabha, or the Lower House of Parliament, and all state legislative assemblies within a specific time frame in a single year and once every five years. Through such a fixed election window, it wishes to end the spectre of perpetual elections in the country. Such nationwide polls would involve elections to legislative assemblies of 28 states and union territories spread over thousands of kilometres.

In the earliest decades of independent India, concurrent elections were held in 1952, 1957, 1962, and 1967. All state legislative assembly elections during these years were held simultaneously with Parliamentary elections. However, in later years, the vagaries of politics and other circumstances broke that unified cycle. The premature dissolution of a few legislative assemblies in 1968 and 1969 disrupted this pattern of synchronised elections. In 1970, the fourth Lok Sabha itself was dissolved before it completed its term. Over a period of time, elections spread themselves out, making this phenomenon a perennial feature of India's democracy.

The framers of the Constitution had always envisaged simultaneous elections and had kept the provisions of ONOE in the Constitution. In 2015, GoI asked the Election Commission (EC) whether it could conduct simultaneous nationwide polls. The EC conveyed that this was indeed possible, but it warranted amendments to the Constitution and the Representation of People Act of 1951. At the same time, it would require adequate resources such as the electronic voting machines (EVM) manufactured and supplied to meet the heightened demand. In conjunction, simultaneous elections would need the deployment of paramilitary forces in sufficient numbers to maintain law and

order across the country. Supporters of simultaneous elections point to several ills that have accrued out of the current system of perennial elections. Perennial elections drain the public exchequer of money on non-productive items for an unending electoral process. Such expenditure could be avoided or significantly reduced if elections were held together. Today, GoI bears the entire expenditure in the conduct of the Lok Sabha elections and state governments on elections to state legislatures. According to a Centre for Media Studies report, around ₹55,000 crores or US\$8 billion, were spent



most an equivalent amount was reportedly spent in subsequent state elections. Their simultaneous conduct would substantially cut expenditures, and money could be better utilised in developmental programmes. Political parties themselves are pressed to spend, among other things, on election campaigns and advertisements. These. over time, have become highly expensive and put enormous pressure on political parties and candidates to collect resources from various donors. The impact of this phenomenon has been very toxic, both in terms of governance, integrity, and probity.

Secondly, the security forces get tied for extensive periods in election-related movements, thereby diluting their primary duty of maintaining national security and availability for major law and order situations. The forces deployed comprise the Central Armed Police Forces, the state armed police, home guards and the district police. In the current scenario, this deployment is very frequent since, on average, two to five state assemblies go to polls every six months. Given the fractured nature of politics in some states, elections are spread out over days and weeks to move forces in large numbers to keep the peace. This is neither good for the forces nor for peace

and normal life in the states. Those against ONOE point out the current constitutional architecture that will not permit its practice. A series of complex amendments need to be made to the Constitution and the election law. Furthermore. they will harm the national federal structure and weigh heavily against smaller and state political parties, as issues valid for a specific state will not find independent breathing space and deliberation when national and state elections are clubbed. They will, perforce, get sidelined in the shadow

of overpowering national issues.

There could be some merit in the arguments pressed by opponents of ONOE. However, opinions in favour or against, as well as gains by some political parties and losses to others, cannot be the decisive factors in a decision of this significance and magnitude. The two sides of ONOE need to be weighed on the scale of national interest and the overall interest of its citizens. There is little doubt that the outcome of perennial elections over several decades has been replete with negative national

> Perennial elections have prought out the ugly side of India's diversity—in region, caste, language, community, and voter appeasement. Political parties, eager to retain their hold and searching for electoral victory, have been going to extremes in exploiting the dormant societal divisions and, in many cases, manufacturing dissensions to drive new wedges in society. These have been highly detrimental to the national fabric and could feed discords rather than

unity. These tendencies will have much less space to play if concurrent elections are held once in five years. They will also help drive out issues of disharmony from the normal daily discourse as they have become today. ONOE will be a massive step in that direction.

Along with the toxicity in the political language is the near-total lack of observance of the principle of good governance as elections appear to be around the corner. The announcement of freebies and different packages for different social groups indicates extreme pandering to which political parties take recourse. No thought is given to the social and financial repercussions of such announcements and even the implementability of the assurances given. ONOE would at least limit the damage caused by such a blind race towards garnering votes at the cost of national salubrity.

It is evident that multiple elections lead to multiple periods of developmental disruption as the code is implemented. There is a substantial delay in the implementation of developmental works, putting states and the nation behind by several months per year in their march towards a more prosperous nation.

In sum, an election should mark the celebration of a vibrant democracy. It should not degenerate into an exercise maximising polarisation based on socio-economic toxicity. ONOE would be a great help in substantially minimising this adverse impact. (Courtesy: ORF)

be called a nativist?

antiniketan, declared a World Heritage Site in September by Unesco, was founded in 1901 by Rabindranath Tagore. It was started with just five students, one of whom was Tagore's son. Tagore was disillusioned with the 19th-century formal school education that had English as the medium of instruc-

British politician TB Macaulay, in his Minute on Education written in 1835, had emphasised on English language education: "The question now before us is simply whether, when it is in our power to teach this language ,we shall teach languages in which by universal confession there are no books on any subject which deserve to be compared to our own..

After that, Bengal Governor General William Bentinck officially made English the medium of instruction in schools. But Tagore, born in 1861, was of the view that children should be taught in the mother tongue, at least in their formative years.

Santiniketan, in West Bengal's Birbhum district, was started as an experiment in alternative education. The medium of instruction was Bengali and classes were held mostly in the open, under the shade of trees. In this respect, Shantiniketan was a precursor to the open university system of education practiced all over the world today. Given his preference for the mother tongue, it is

not surprising that Tagore's vast body of poetry, short stories, novels, plays and essays was mostly written in Bengali. He was different here from his wellknown contemporaries, Aurobindo Ghose and Saroini Naidu, who wrote monolingually in English.

It is not as if Tagore did not write poetry in English. But his relationship with the English language was an uneasy one. As MK Naik, a scholar of Indian literature, points out, Tagore's career as an Indian English poet began by sheer accident in 1912 when he was on his way to England by steamer for medical treatment. He spent his time during the long voyage translating some of his Gitanjali poems into English.

On reaching England, Tagore showed his translations to Irish poet WB Yeats, American poet Ezra Pound and English artist-writer William Rothenstein who were enthusiastic about the content of the poems, given that they came as a breath of fresh air in a war-torn world.

But Tagore's English was awkward and clumsy. Pound and Yeats realised that they would have to sit with Tagore to edit the poems before they could recommend them to the Swedish Committee for the Nobel Prize. Tagore won the Nobel Prize for Literature the following year. After Gitanjali, Tagore returned to India and wrote

a few more collections of poetry in English. These were The Gardener, The Crescent Moon, Fruit-Gathering, Lover's Gift and Crossing and The Fugitive. In the absence of poets of the stature of Yeats and Pound to work with Tagore, the poems declined in quality. Today, looking back, one can safely say that Tagore was a reluctant poet in English.

In a way, Tagore anticipates writers of the nativist school of criticism who made their appearance in the 20th century in post-independent India. These writers believed that writing should strictly be in the mother tongue and not in English, the language of the erstwhile coloniser. One of the pioneers of the movement is the Marathi novelist and critic Bhalchandra Nemade whose views author and Sahitya Akademi Award winner GN Devy describes as "widely influential". Nativism had a strong influence in India considering that writers and critics of the reputation of Devy himself, UR Ananthamurthy, Rajeev Patke, Ravindra Kimbahune and many others became its adherents.

However, as writer Vilas Sarang says, "The concept of nativism is closer to nationalism. Nemade should be alerted that his concept of nativism is likely to be covertly misappropriated by those organisations try awake.n (Courtesy: Scroll.in)

who raise the high flag of aggressive nationalism in our country.

Nemade may also be criticised for trivialising the argument by making the following facetious statements: writing in English is like writing with one's fingernails; Indian English writers cannot make literary sense of the banter that goes on, say, among barbers in a barbershop; in Jejuri, Arun Kolatkar goes to the Khandoba shrine in Jejuri as if he is going

to a Juhu Beach cocktail party. And so on. Such flippancy has provoked writers who write in English to strike back. In a 1997 issue of The New Yorker, for example, Salman Rushdie says: "The prose writing – both fiction and nonfiction – created in this period by Indian writers working in English is proving to be a stronger and more important body of work than most of what has been produced in the eighteen 'recognized' languages of India, the so-called 'vernacular languages' during the same time; and, indeed, this new and still burgeoning 'Indo-Anglian' literature represents perhaps the most valuable contribution India has yet made to the world of books.'

These language wars, as it were, have done nothing to give Indian literature the global visibility that it deserves. In retrospect, can Tagore be called a nativist?

Although Tagore may resemble the nativist writers and critics in his preference for the mother tongue, he was by no means an aggressive nationalist. Tagore's critique of nationalism comes out strongly in his 1910 novel Gora.

Here, Tagore is clearly opposed to his protagonist Gora's idea of Bharatvarsh, based on an acceptance of orthodox Hindu traditions and customs. Instead, through the characters of Binoybhushan, Lalita, Anandmoyi and Poreshbabu, he upholds the principles of the Brahmo Samaj, founded in 1828 by Raja Rammohun Roy and Tagore's own father, Debendranath Tagore.

The Brahmo Samaj rejected the authority of the scriptures and the four-fold division of caste into Brahmin, Kshatriya, Vaishya and Shudra, elucidated in texts like the Manusmriti. In its belief in the monotheistic idea of one god, and its rejection of idol worship, the Brahmo Samaj actually came close to both Islam and Christianity. In Gora, speaking unequivocally through the character of Poresh babu, Tagore writes:

'The gates of the Muslim community are open to the whole of humanity, and the Christian community also welcomes everyone. The same law applies to all communities belonging to the Christian world. If I want to become an Englishman, it would not be entirely impossible: by living in England and obeying their laws, I can gain entry into their society; I need not even become a Christian...With Hindus it is the exact opposite. The way into their community is completely shut, but there are a hundred thousand

Tagore's views become relevant in the light of a recent controversy in Pune, where a junior college lecturer was arrested for extolling the virtues of Islam and Christianity as monotheistic religions, while critiquing Hinduism's polytheism. 10 people are dead after church roof collapsed in northern Mexico during Sunday Mass

CIUDAD MADERO (Mexico), Oct 2: The roof of a church collapsed in northern Mexico during Sunday Mass, killing at least 10 people and injuring around 60, authorities said as searchers probed in the wreckage throughout the night and into Monday morning looking for survivors and more

Approximately 30 parishioners were believed to have been trapped in the rubble when the roof caved in, officials said. Searchers crawled under the roof slabs and officials brought in dogs to help search for possible survivors.

The Tamaulipas state police said about 100 people were in the church at the time of the collapse.

The state security spokesman's office said early Monday that 10 people had been confirmed dead from the collapse, which it described as likely being caused by a structural failure" The office said 23 of the 60 injured remain hospitalized, with two in serious condition. Tamaulipas state police said units of the National Guard, the state police and state civil defense office and the Red Cross were involved in the operation.

Indian mining tycoon, son among six killed in plane crash

JOHANNESBURG, Oct 2: An Indian billionaire and his son were among the six individuals killed when their private plane crashed near a diamond mine in southwestern Zimbabwe after experiencing a technical fault, according to media reports. Harpal Randhawa, the owner of RioZim, a diversified mining company producing gold and coal as well as refining nickel and copper, along with his son and four others was killed when the plane crashed in the Zvamahande area of Mashava, iHarare, a news and media website in Zimbabwe,

The Cessna 206 aircraft, owned by RioZim, was en route from Harare to the Murowa diamond mine when the tragic incident occurred on Friday. The single-engined aircraft crashed near the Murowa Diamonds mine, which is partly owned by RioZim. The plane experienced a technical fault, possibly resulting in a mid-air explosion, before plummeting into Peter Farm in the Zvamahande region. All passengers and crew onboard lost their lives in this accident, the report said.

The Herald, a state-owned daily newspaper, quoted police as saying four of the victims were foreigners and the other two Zimbabweans.

The Zimbabwe Republic Police reports a plane crash which occurred on September 29 between 7.30 am and 8 am, where six people are confirmed dead, police said. The Murowa Diamond Company (RioZim)-owned white and red Zcam aircraft had left Harare for the mine at 6 am and crashed about 6km from Mashava.

RioZim confirmed the crash and said it was working with relevant authorities to gather more information. Names of the deceased are yet to be released by police but journalist and filmmaker Hopewell Chinono, who was a friend of

Randhawa, confirmed his death. I am deeply saddened by the passing of Harpal Randhawa, the owner of RioZim who died today in a plane crash in Zvishavane. Five other people including his son, who was also a pilot but a passenger on this flight, also died in the crash, wrote Chinono on X. (PTI)

ops issued a statement saying that "we join in prayer at the tragic loss of life and those injured.'

Bishop José Armando Alvarez of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Tampico said the roof caved in while parishioners were receiving communion at the Santa Cruz church in the Gulf coast city of Ciudad Madero, next to the port city of Tampico.

The diocese later posted a list of people who had been injured, including a 4-month-old baby, three 5-year-olds and two 9-year-olds.

The number of young victims police officers said three of the dead were children — may have been due to the fact that baptisms were to take place at the church.

"We lament the painful loss of people who were there celebrating the baptism of their children," Alvarez wrote. At the same time, there were signs of hope.

"From underneath the rubble. thanks to Divine Providence and the work of the rescue teams, people have been pulled out alive!" Alvarez's diocese wrote in a statement posted on it social media accounts. "Let's keep praying!"

the church, apparently to shore up the roof while rescue teams crawled inside. Photos published by local media showed what appeared to be a concrete and brick structure, with parts of the roof fallen almost to the ground.

Security camera footage from about a block away showed the unusual, gabled roof simply collapsed downward.

Walls did not appear to have been blown outward, nor was there any indication of an explosion, or anything other than simple structural failure. The roof appeared to

be made of relatively thin poured concrete, and photos distributed by state authorities showed the roof slab resting on the top of pews in some parts of the church. That left open the possibility there were air spaces for any survivors.

"At this time, the necessary work is being performed to extract the people who are still under the ruble," Alvarez said in a taped message. "Today we are living through a very difficult moment.'

Video distributed by the state civil defense office showed the outer edges of the roof propped up by short wooden blocks.

It also showed initial efforts to lift off parts of the collapsed roof closer to the ground, in the centre of the church, with a crane. But the office said the efforts to lift roof sections were abandoned because of the danger that a chunk of the now-crumbling slab might fall back and endanger any survivors.

The video described how officials had reverted to manual rescue efforts, apparently sending rescuers under the slab with wood props or hydraulic jacks to reach those trapped underneath. Specially trained dogs also were sent into the rubble to detect survivors.

The civil defense office said the dogs did not initially appear to detect signs of survivors, so an older method was implemented that had been used in past earthquakes: sending rescue teams into the rubble to shout and listen for signs of any response

Building collapses are common

in Mexico during earthquakes, but the National Seismological Service did not report any seismic activity strong enough to cause such damage at the time of the collapse. Nor was there any immediate indica-

Top European diplomats meet in Kyiv to support Ukraine as signs of strain show among allies



KYIV, Oct 2: Some of Europe's top diplomats gathered Monday in Kyiv in a display of support for Ukraine's fight against Russia's invasion as signs emerge of political strain in Europe and the United States about the war. The foreign ministers from the European Union's 27 member countries converged on the Ukrainian capital for an unannounced informal meeting that officials said would review the bloc's support for Ukraine and discuss Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy's proposed peace

EU foreign policy chief Josep Borrell said the foreign ministers' first joint meeting outside EU borders sent a signal that EU support is "unwavering" and underscored the EU's commitment to Ukraine.

The United States, the EU and the United Kingdom have provided massive military and financial support to Ukraine, enabling it to stand up to the Kremlin's attack. The assistance is crucial for Ukraine's weakened economy and has so far been open-ended.

But uncertainty has set in over how long Kyiv's allies will keep sending it billions of dollars (euros).

US President Joe Biden on Sunday reassured allies of continued US financial support for the war effort, after Congress averted a government shutdown by adopting a short-term funding package that dropped assistance for Ukraine in its battle against Russia.

Many US lawmakers acknowledge that winning approval for Ukraine assistance in Congress is growing more difficult as the war grinds on. Ukrainian Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba told reporters that Ukraine held discussions with representatives of both parties in the US Congress to ensure more help will arrive.

"The decision was taken as it was, but we are now working with both sides of the Congress to make sure that it does not repeat again under any circumstances," Kuleba said.

"The question is whether what happens in the US Congress last weekend is an incident or a system. I think it was an incident," he added.

The EU meeting in Kyiv took place after the weekend election victory in EU member Slovakia of Robert Fico, whose pro-Russian agenda has increased the question marks about the EU's continued support for Kyiv.

The small eastern European country could bring more tension to the EU's discussions on Ukraine, as has happened with Hungary's at-times cool attitude toward Kyiv. Budapest has maintained close relations with Moscow and argued against supplying arms to Ukraine or providing it with economic assistance.

The foreign ministers of Hungary and Poland were not at the Kyiv gathering. Danish Foreign Minister Lars Løkke Rasmussen said Europe must be ready to provide further help "for many good reasons".

"First of all, in order to support Ukraine, but also to send a strong trans-Atlantic signal that what's going on on our own soil is something we have to take on a great responsibility for," Løkke Rasmussen said. (AP)

Indonesian president launches Southeast Asia's first high-speed railway, funded by China

JAKARTA, Oct 2: Indonesian President Joko Widodo inaugurated Southeast Asia's first highspeed railway on Monday as it was set to begin commercial operations, a key project under China's Belt and Road infrastructure initiative that will drastically reduce the travel time be-

The project has been beset with delays and increasing costs, and some observers doubt its commercial benefits. But Widodo has championed the 142-kilometre (88-mile) railway, which was issued its official operating license from the Transportation Ministry on Sunday.

The USD 7.3 billion project, largely funded by China, was constructed by PT Kereta Cepat Indonesia-China, known as PT KCIC, a joint venture between an Indonesian consortium of four state-owned companies and China Railway

The railway connects Jakarta with Bandung, the heavily populated capital of West Java cities from the current three hours to about 40 minutes. Its use of electrical energy is expected to reduce carbon emissions.

Widodo in his opening remarks officially named Indonesia's first high-speed railway the fastest in Southeast Asia, with speeds of up to 350 kph (217 mph) as Whoosh, from Waktu Hemat, Operasi Optimal, Sistem Handal, which means timesaving, optimal operation, reliable system in Indonesian language.

The Jakarta-Bandung high-speed train marks the modernisation of our mass transportation, which is efficient and environmentally friendly, Widodo said. Our courage to try new things gives us confidence and the opportunity to learn and will be very useful for the future, making our human resources more advanced and our nation more independent, he added.

Widodo, along with other high-ranking officials, rode Whoosh from its first station, Halim in eastern Jakarta, to Bandung's Padalarang station, one of the line's four stations, located

about 30 kilometres (18 miles) from the central area of Bandung. He took a 25-minute test ride on the train on September 13 and told reporters that he felt comfortable sitting or walking inside the bullet train even at its top speeds.

Chinese Premier Li Qiang took a test ride early last month while visiting Jakarta for three days of talks with leaders of the Association of Southeast Asia Nations and other countries.

Luhut Binsar Pandjaitan, the coordinating minister for maritime and investment, said China Railway has agreed to transfer its technology to Indonesia so that in the future the country's high-speed trains can be made domestically. For two weeks leading up to the inauguration, PT KCIC has been running a free-of-charge public trial.

Indonesia broke ground on the project in 2016. The line was originally expected to begin operations in 2019, but was delayed by disputes over land acquisition, environmental issues and

New UN migration chief says private sector 'desperate' to take migrants despite negative narrative

GENEVA. Oct 2: The new head of the UN's migration agency said on Monday that the private sector is "desperate" for their countries to take in migrants to mop up labour shortages, especially in the West endeavouring to steer a narrative away from reticence and suspicion about migrants in many parts of the world

Amy Pope, the first woman to head the International Organisation for Migration, sought to play up the economic benefits of migration for rich nations with aging populations and declining workforces in the face of "build-the-wall" rhetoric in the United States to block migrants from Latin America and right-wing movements in Europe that want to keep foreigners out.

"We hear from ... the private sector globally, but especially in Europe and in North America, that they are desperate for migration in order to meet their own labour market needs and in order to continue to fuel innovation within their own companies," Pope, who is American, told reporters.

She said the evidence was "fairly overwhelming" that migration benefits economies by filling jobs, powering innovation or "fuelling the renovation or revitalisa-



tion of aging communities." "Migration, on the whole, is a benefit. That's not to say that the rhetoric around migration reflects the fact that it is a tremendous benefit."

Governments who open up to migration often do so at their political peril: The Biden administration — which strongly supported Pope's candidacy — recently gave work permits to nearly 500,000 Venezuelans, whose home country has been in economic and political turmoil in recent years to help get them to work, pay taxes and stop being a burden on public finances.

But critics insist such policies are likely to encourage migrants to flock to the United States, and say they take manual and blue-collar jobs and put downward pressure on wages. Pope insisted that countries must ensure legal and proper "pathways" to migration, a long-

standing call by UN institutions. "The difference today is that 30 of the biggest economies have experienced very significant labour shortages — and we are seeing it everywhere," she said, adding that agriculture, construction, health care and hospitality were among the sectors affected. Pope said her first trip abroad in the job will be to East Africa, where drought and the impacts of climate change have driven many to flee.

She said 80 per cent of African migrants stay in Africa, and said her job was "not to focus just on south-to-north migration, which I know occupies a lot of the political space and a lot of the print space.'

She pointed to shrinking humanitarian aid budgets, the need to draw in the private sector into the "conversation" to support migration, and signs that migration is set to continue to grow. "Whether it's climate change, whether it's conflict, whether it's the inability to find a job or a future at home, or violence within neighbourhoods or communities, more and more people are looking to find a better life somewhere else in the world," she said of a message gleaned from her talks last week with migration experts in Asia. (AP)

'Conviction of ISRO scientists behind Chandrayaan-3 mission simply amazing'

WASHINGTON, Oct 2: External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar has praised the scientists behind India's successful Chandrayaan-3 mission, saying their conviction about it was "simply amazing."

Addressing a gathering of eminent Indian-Amerigave a first-hand account of what was happening on August 23 when India's third Moon mission Chandrayaan-3 touched down on the lunar south pole.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi was in Johannesburg, South Africa, to attend the 15th BRICS Summit from August 22-24. Jaishankar, who accompanied Modi, during the

visit, told the audience that they took time off from the BRICS meeting. "The Prime Minister was following the landing and was talking to the ISRO... because these are tense moments, you know, however confident anybody is about a mission, that that period you want to have, you want to have somebody around you who will give you reassurance. "And believe me, nobody can do reassurance better

than Mr. Modi is, is today reassuring the entire country and in many ways the whole world. So, he was actually plugged in from South Africa. And he was talking to the ISRO when this was unfolding," he said.

As the Lander Module of Chandrayaan-3 successfully touched down on the lunar surface. Modi spoke to the ISRO team at Mission Operations Complex (MOX) in Bengaluru virtually from Johannesburg. Once everything went well, Prime Minister Modi

decided that instead of flying back to Delhi, he would land directly in Bengaluru and go straight to the ISRO to congratulate the scientists behind the Chandrayaan-

"Since I was travelling with him, I too had a chance



to tag along," with Prime Minister Modi's visit to the ISRO's Telemetry Tracking and Command Network (ISTRAC) in Bengaluru on August 26, he said.

Modi flew down to Bengaluru directly from Athens after summit talks with his Greek counterpart Kyriakos Mitsotakis. Jaishankar recalled that there were about 1,000 people in the room where Prime Minister Modi met the ISRO scientists.

'They looked the most normal people you could think of yet you could feel they were the most special people. And the kind of confidence that they exuded, cause I was actually sitting among them. Jaishankar said he actually asked some of the sci-

entists, "So how tense were you guys? Were you worried? What were the possibilities of something not going the way you thought? And I must tell you, it was you know, the confidence there....

"That conviction about the mission was simply amazing," Jaishankar said, adding that "it stuck so deeply in my mind."

With the successful Chandrayaan-3 mission, India became the fourth country to master the technology of soft landing on the Moon after the US, China and the erstwhile Soviet Union. (PTI)

Turkiye strikes suspected Kurdish militant targets in northern Iraq after suicide attack in Ankara



ANKARA, Oct 2: The Turkish defence ministry says its warplanes have carried out raids on suspected Kurdish rebel targets in northern Iraq on Sunday following a suicide attack on a government building in the Turkish capital. A ministry statement said some 20 targets of the Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK) were "destroyed" in the aerial operation, including caves, shelters, and depots.

Earlier, a suicide bomber detonated an explosive device near an entrance of the Ministry of Interior Affairs, injuring two police officers. A second assailant was killed in a shootout with police on Sunday, the in-

A news agency close to the PKK said the group has claimed responsibility for the suicide bombing. The attack happened hours before Turkiye's Parliarecess with an address by President Recep Tayyip Erdogan. Two police officers were slightly wounded in the bombing near an entrance to the Ministry of Interior Affairs, Minister Ali Yerlikaya said on X. Assailants who arrived at the scene inside a light commercial vehicle carried out the attack, he said. "Our heroic police officers, through their intuition,

resisted the terrorists as soon as they got out of the ve-

hicle," Yerlikaya later told reporters. "One of them blew himself up, while the other one was shot in the head before he had a chance to blow himself up." "Our fight against terrorism, their collaborators, the (drug) dealers, gangs, and organised crime organisa-

tions will continue with determination," he said. The interior minister did not say who was behind the attack. However, ANF News, a news agency close to the banned Kurdistan Workers' Party, or PKK, reported on Sunday night that the group had claimed re-

sponsibility for the blast. Leftist extremists and the Islamic State group have also carried out deadly attacks throughout Turkiye in the past. Erdogan gave his speech in Parliament as planned and called the attack "the last stand of terrorism." "The scoundrels who targeted the peace and security of the citizens could not achieve their goals and they never will," he said. (AP)


Satyaram Reang

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Bihar's caste survey out; OBCs, EBCs nearly two-thirds of total population

Kumar government in Bihar on Monday released findings of its much-awaited caste survey which revealed that OBCs and EBCs constitute a whopping 63 per cent of the state's total population.

According to the data released here by Development Commissioner Vivek Singh, the state's total population stood at a little over 13.07 crore, out of which the Extremely Backward Classes (36 per cent) were the largest social segment followed by the Other Backward Classes at 27.13 per cent. The survey also stated that Yadavs, the OBC group to which deputy chief minister Tejashwi Yadav belongs, were the largest in terms of the population, accounting for 14.27 per cent of the total.

Dalits, also known as the Scheduled Castes, accounted for 19.65 per cent of the total population in the state, which is also home to nearly 22 lakh (1.68 per cent) people belonging to the Scheduled Tribes.

Those belonging to the "unreserved" category, which denotes the proverbial "upper castes" who dominated politics till the Mandal wave of 1990s, comprise 15.52 per cent of the total population.

The survey also establishes that the state's population is overwhelmingly Hindu, with the majority community comprising 81.99 per cent of the total population, followed by Muslims (17.70



per cent). Christians, Sikhs, Jains and those following other religions as also the non-believers have a miniscule presence, together making up for less than one per cent of the total population.

Lauding the government officials who undertook the gigantic exercise, chief minister Nitish Kumar said, "A meeting will soon be convened of all the nine political parties with an electoral presence in the state legislature and the facts and figures will be shared

RJD president Lalu Prasad, who is Kumar's ally as well as the father of his deputy Tejashwi Yadav, also issued a statement, declaring that the exercise will set the tone for "a nationwide caste census which will be undertaken when we form the next government at

the Centre" Both Prasad and Kumar have played an instrumental role in the formation of the INDIA coalition, which affirmed its commitment to holding a caste census at a meeting it held in Bengaluru recently.

The Bihar caste survey is "an epoch-making decision in independent India. We consider it as a fitting tribute to Gandhi Ji and his ideals of addressing the needs of the poor and marginalised," said water resources and information

and publicity minister Sanjay Jha. The decision to hold the survey is another example of the foresight of the chief minister, he said.

The opposition BJP, however, voiced dissatisfaction with the caste survey, stressing that it did social and economic realities" over the years

State BJP president Samrat Choudhary said that his party had "given its consent" for the exercise and would make an assessment of the findings which have now been made public.

Notably, the survey was ordered last year after the Narendra Modi government at the Centre made it clear that it would not be able to undertake a headcount of castes other than SCs and STs as part of the census.

The last time, a headcount of all castes was undertaken, was way back in 1931. Those calling for a fresh caste survey insist that a new estimate was required mainly for the weaker sections of the society which, with improved life expectancy in the post-Independence era, must have seen a rise in their proportion of the population.

The state cabinet gave its nod to hold a caste survey on June 2 last year when it also allocated an amount of ₹ 500 crore for the mammoth exercise. The survey briefly ran into rough weather when it was stayed by the Patna High Court which was hearing a bunch of petitions challenging the exercise.

However, the deadline it then set, of February 2023, was overshot and the survey itself could take off no sooner than January 7

Kejriwal said there was a time when Punjab was known for drugs and movies were also being made on the drugs issue. Patting the back of the Bhagwant Mann government over steps taken to curb the drug menace in the state, he said the Punjab Police have launched a war against drugs in the last 3-4 months.

Congress MLA Khaira was arrested by the Punjab Police on Thursday in connection with the 2015 drugs case from his Chandigarh residence.

No copyright in scriptures but their adaptations protected: Delhi HC

High Court has restrained several entities from reproducing and disseminating content belonging to Bhaktivedanta Book Trust, established by ISKCON founder Srila Prabhupada, saying while there can be no copyright in religious scriptures, their adaptations which are "transformative works" -- like Ramanand Sagar's Ramayana or BR Chopra's Mahabharat -- are entitled to protection from piracy.

Justice Prathiba M Singh, while dealing with the Trust's lawsuit on the issue, said copyright would vest in original parts of works which preach, teach or explain the scripture and the piracy of such copyrighted works of the plaintiff cannot be permitted. "Defendant Nos.1 to 14 shall stand

restrained in any manner from printing, reproducing, communicating, disseminating any part of the Plaintiff's works to the public either in print form or in audio-visual form or in electronic form including through websites, mobile applications, weblinks, Instagram posts or any other posts on the social media as would result in the infringement of Plaintiff's copyright," ordered the court recently in an ex parte interim

It also directed Google LLC and Meta Platforms Inc to take down the infringing works from their platforms while ordering suspension and blocking of the offending links by the authorities

The plaintiff submitted that it has copyright in all works of spiritual teacher Abhay Charanaravinda Bhaktivedanta Swami Prabhupada who simplified the religious books and scriptures and made it easy for the common man to understand them.

It was stated that during Prabhupada's lifetime and after his "Mahasamadhi" the plaintiff spread his teachings in various forms including printed and audio books, and the defendants were making them available on their online platforms, mobile apps and Instagram handles without any licence or right to reproduce or communicate them

"There can be no doubt that the Shrimad Bhagavad Gita is one of the most revered ancient scriptures in the world. The Bhagavad Gita along with the other scriptures like Bhagavatam which are written about by the Author (Prabhupada) are all public domain

"There can be no copyright claimed

in the Scriptures. However, any adaptations of the said work including providing explanation, summary, meaning, exegesis/interpretation or creating any audio visual works for eg, television series like Ramanand Sagar's Ramayana or B R Chopra's Mahabharata; dramatic works created by drama societies based on scriptures etc, being transformative works, would be entitled to copyright protec-

thors themselves," said the court. The court said though there can be no objection in the actual reproduction of the text of Shrimad Bhagavad Gita or other spiritual books, the manner in which they are interpreted by different gurus and spiritual teachers "copyright would vest in respect of the original parts of the literary works which preach, teach or explain the scripture."

tion - being original works of the Au-

The court stated that in the present case, Prabhupada himself set up the plaintiff Trust and handed over the copyrights to be administered by the trust and the defendant's content was "complete reproduction," which cannot be done without authorisation, licence or permission. These are not mere reproductions of the original scriptures but their meaning, summary, introduction, preface, cover etc, have all been reproduced, the court observed, adding that such conduct has an impact on the plaintiff's revenue from the copyrighted work.

"Such piracy of the copyrighted works of the Plaintiff-Trust cannot be permitted. If such piracy goes unchecked, the copyright in the said works would be considerably diluted leading to immense loss of revenues to the Plaintiff Trust. (PTI)

Want complete control on my films: 'Dhuin' director **Achal Mishra**



LEH, Oct 2: As a director-producer, Achal Mishra says he wants "complete control" over a project even if it means telling stories on a limited budget with a small crew.

The 27-year-old, who started his filmmaking journey with 2019's "Gamak Ghar", has made his second film "Dhuin" with three people and no predefined budget. He is also the editor and producer of the movie, which was screened on the second day of The Himalayan Film Festival here. "When making a film like 'Gamak Ghar', a lot of creative decisions, I realised, were being defined by how I learnt filmmaking... That became a decisive


thing in understanding a budget. "With budget, I've realised it also defines your process of how you are going to make a film. And, I don't want to write a film first and go on the floor and shoot it. I want to keep it as open as possible. Having a small budget and small crew allows that." Mishra told PTI in an inter-

view. Asked if he would like to have a producer on board, Mishra said that's a question he was still finding his way around.

'While shooting, I want complete control. Even after shooting the film, it's the authority that lets you have control over something as simple as the duration of a film," the photographer-director

Mishra gave the example of "Dhuin", which at 50 minutes runtime doesn't traditionally fit under the category of either a short film or a full-fledged feature film.

"There was no one else involved (as producer on 'Dhuin'). Had there been anyone else, it would have become 30 minutes or 1 hour 30 minutes (in length). If somebody lets me have that sort of freedom, then definitely (I'll take on a producer)," he added. With a bigger crew, the Darbhanga-born filmmaker said there's always a possibility of second guessing one's instincts. (PTI)



MUMBAI, Oct 2: "When you're hungry, you tend to overeat" is how Pankaj Tripathi describes his drive to do quality work, which motivated him to take up as many projects as possible.

Delhi's Roshanara Club where cricket met cinema via 'Gandhi'

NEW DELHI, Oct 2: The century-old Roshanara Club in Delhi besides serving as a cradle of Indian cricket, has a place in world cinema history as it featured in Richard Attenborough's Oscar-winning film on Mahatma Gandhi.

"Gandhi", Attenborough's 1982 film which won multiple Academy Awards, continues to hold its magic for the audience, even more than 40 years since it hit the the-

The biopic was shot on different locations in India, in cities like Delhi, Mumbai, Pune and Patna, among others.

In Delhi, Attenborough, known for his attention to details, used original locations, such as the Birla House, the Rashtrapati Bhavan (earlier Viceroy House) and Rajpath (now Kartavya Path), as much as possible to recreate key events including Gandhi's assassination and the funeral march of 1948, for which an army of extras were hired.

At Roshanara Club, a cricket match sequence was shot, with its lush green ground and British-era pavilion adding a layer of authenticity to the scene that was set in the early 20th century when Gandhi had visited Bihar, particularly Champaran district which would later serve as his 'karma-

In the scene, the cricket match can be seen interrupted by the arrival of a car, carrying two police personnel in uniform and one of them informing club guests about some disturbance in Motihari, the then district headquarters of Champaran, and an epicentre of Gandhi's movement for peas-

The historic club in north Delhi was established on August 15, 1922, and had turned 100 last year. However, in a dramatic turn of events, the famed club on September 29 was sealed by the Delhi Development Authority, which also took possession of the

sprawling property.

The action came nearly six months after an "eviction notice" was served on the Club by the DDA as its lease had expired earlier, a senior official said, hours after it was sealed last week.

Rajan Manchanda, general secretary of the Club and joint secretary of the Delhi & District Cricket Association (DDCA), has appealed to the authorities to "extend the lease period", given the historicity of the


"This is a historic club where cricket greats like Lala Amarnath, Nawab Pataudi, Bishan Singh Bedi, and even many current players have cut their teeth. It has hosted many international matches and Ranji Trophy matches," he told PTI.

"I will try my best for the 800m and will work on the soreness on my legs. I was pretty sure that I will win a medal (in 1500m) and was even confident of winning gold but had to be settled with a silver.'

Madhuri once ran a 1500m trial with Harmilan in her womb in order to keep her job with a public sector company in Pun-

Harmilan's father, Amandeep Bains, is also a South Asian Games medallist and a former men's 1500m national cham-

Harmilan, who used to race with boys when she was young, won her first international medal in 2016 -- a 1500m



bronze at the Asian Junior Championships in Ho Chi-Minh in Vietnam.

She suffered a knee injury in 2017, which led to her missing some big events during her recovery, which lasted for over a

In 2019, she regained full fitness and won a 1500m bronze at the Federation Cup in Patiala.

She broke the 1500m national record at the National Open Championship in 2021 with a time of 4:05.39, bettering Sunita Rani's previous mark of 4:06.03. However, a knee surgery meant that she was out of reckoning from the 2022 Commonwealth Games

"For nearly a year, I did not do anything. For four months, I was totally bed-ridden, then got multiple MRIs done. The doctors said it was water in the knee." she said.

"Then at last, doctors said it was plica syndrome (pain and swelling in the middle of the knee) and the only option was to have a surgery. I underwent surgery again, six months on a bed again, rehab, and then again on the track, and now an Asian Games medallist." (PTI)

Saurabh Walkar: NZ bank on Indian analyst for big performance in World Cup

Someone who has the experience of working with Indian players. New Zealand coach Gary Stead gave an audiwell," said Walkar.

New Zealand will start their World Cup campaign against defending champions England at Ahmedabad on October 5.

Another stern test awaits the

Black Caps when they face hosts India on October 22 at Dharamsala. But the Blackcaps can find

some solace from the fact that Walkar is familiar with players from both the teams, and he might just have an extensive data bank on them.

"I have worked with players like Rohit Sharma and Suryakumar Yadav during my time with the Mumbai Ranji team. It was also a fanboy moment for me as I had watched them only on TV earlier. "I have also associated with England cricketers like Jos Buttler during the Hundred at Manchester Originals

"So, the New Zealand team will require some high-level input from me during the World Cup. My duty will be to provide that to Stead. I believe I have the data for it," said Walkar,

who had worked eight years with the Mumbai Ranji side.

However, this is not the first time Walkar is getting associated with a national team. The 38-year-old Mumbaikar

had worked with Afghanistan during the ICC T20 World Cup 2021 in the UAE, in which Australia emerged the champions. "Lance Klusener (then

Afghanistan coach) interviewed me after applying for the job (of a performance analyst). I saw the job vacancy on their website. He was impressed with my presentation. "It was a great experience as Afghanistan were also a very new team, and they were com-

ing from a very different back-

ground. The whole team was very enthused about technical things and it was terrific to work with some talented players like Rashid Khan," he added. Walkar's beginning as a performance analyst was not easy because he had to give up his engineering course in Electron-

ics and Telecommunications in

2006, and along with it a possi-

bly lucrative career also. The spark for him to choose a career associated with cricket came rather unexpectedly.

"I always wanted to be associated with cricket. I had played some institutional cricket, local leagues etc. But that was not taking me anywhere. "But I got a chance to be at

England nets at CCI (Brabourne Stadium) and they had a performance analyst with them, and made me realise that I now have a way to continuously involved in cricket," he said. England had stayed in Mum-

bai for a little over a week to play two warm-up matches against MCA XI in preparation for their ODI and Test tour in 2008. But that decision to divert his career proved right as Walkar soon got an invitation to join Rajasthan Royals during the inaugural edition of the IPL.

It was a big break for a youngster to work along with some of the legends like Shane Warne. "It was a remarkable experience. Shane Warne was not big on numbers, as he believed

in keeping players motivated through a speech or a personal talk. Darren Berry (former RR technical director) was dealing with data and numbers," Walkar remembered.

Later, he received a chance to work with the Lucknow Supergiants, but by then the role of data analyst had assumed much more significance.

"Working at Lucknow (Supergiants) was a different experience as Andy Flower was a man of numbers and data. But what I have noticed is that the IPL franchises and players have opened up to the importance of data in cricket, something they looked down upon in the first two or three editions," he said. Walkar also had to adapt himself to the new era.

"It is also about adapting yourself to the needs of players and teams that you associate with. In the earlier years, we also did not have too much data. But in 2023, we have a solid base of 16 or 17 years of data (of players) to bank on," he added. (PTI)

On a day when Parul and Priti, despite giving off their best in the gruelling steeplechase event, were left chasing the shadow of Bahrain's Yavi Winfred Mutile, a 'lane infringement' by the Sri Lankan 4x400m mixed relay quartet saw the India's bronze turn to silver in a matter of minutes after the

completion of the event. The Indian quartet had earlier finished third on the podium behind

Sri Lanka. In 3000m steeplechase, Parul clocked 9:27.63 seconds, which was more than nine seconds behind the Bahrain runner, who took the top podium finish in 9:18.28 seconds, a new Games record. The previous record stood in the name of country-mate Jebet Ruth (9:31.36 sec) set during the 2014 Asian

Though Parul also breached the Asian Games record, it was nowhere close to her national record and personal best of 9:15.31 clocked at the World Championships in Budapest, which helped her qualify for the Paris Olympics, in August.

Compatriot Priti finished a good 16 seconds behind Parul, clocking a personal best 9:43.32 seconds to win the bronze in a close finish with Bahrain runner Mekonen Tigest Getent, who timed 9:43.71 seconds.

Yavi began to pull away in the sixth lap of the gruelling race, even as Parul faded out. The Kenyanborn Bahrain runner, who won the 2023 World Athletics Championships gold in the event beating country-mate Beatrice Chepkoech. finished at least 50 metres ahead of the 28-year-old Parul.

breached her personal best twice and leapt 6.63 metres to bag the silver behind Shiqi Xiong of China, whose jump of 6.73 metres helped her claim the yellow metal. Vietnam's Nga Yan Yue won the

In women's long jump, Ancy

bronze with a best effort of 6.50 metres. In the third attempt, Ancy registered her personal best of 6.56 metres, which she bettered in her fifth attempt.

The other Indian in the fray, Shaili Singh looked crestfallen, finishing a disappointing fifth with an effort of 6.48 metres. Such was Shaili's -- the U-20 World Championships silver medallist -- plight that she looked on the verge of an emotional meltdown before her last two attempts. Shaili gave it her all but it was

Ancy's day and she celebrated it by wrapping the tri-colour around her soon after winning the silver.

The quartet of Muhammed Ajmal Variyathodi, Vithya Ramraj, Rajesh Ramesh and Subha Venkatesan then clocked 3:14.34 seconds in mixed team 4x400m relay to win a bronze medal. But, to their joy, the Sri Lankan quartet -- which had beaten the favourites to the second spot by a fraction of a second with a time of 3:14.25 seconds -- was disqualified due to 'lane infringement'. (PTI)

"Quinnie is a personality, who has always enjoyed his time away from cricket. We know cricket these days requires immense amount of travelling and commitment and him as a personality always enjoyed a balance. His decision to retire is based one obviously opportunities to play franchise cricket but also opportunities to stay at home.

'That's always been clear in the way Ouinton has operated as personality. I retired at 33 and I look at his (Quinton) record and he has played a lot of ODI cricket already.

"I played 196 ODI games and I don't think he (145) is far off that. He has played a lot of cricket and how Quinnie is as a personality, he has probably made the best decision for himself where he is with himself and his family." (PTI)

India make quarters in all six team events; campaign ends in women's individual recurve section



HANGZHOU, Oct 2: Indian archers showed tenacity and authority in equal measure to storm into the quarterfinals in all the six team events of the Asian Games here on Monday.

The Indians played five team elimination rounds and dropped just one set on way to their respective quarterfinal matches in both recurve and compound sec-

India have got a bye into the quarters by virtue of topping the qualifications in the women's

compound team event. India remained in contention in all five gold medals up for grabs in compound section with all the four archers -- Ojas Deotale, Abhishek Verma, Jyothi Surekha Vennam and Aditi Swami -- progressing to their respective individual quarterfinals in the afternoon session.

In the recurve section, Dhiraj Bommadevara and Atanu Das advanced, while India's campaign ended in women's individual section, in the only blip of the

First, it was the top-seeded compound mixed team of Ojas Deotale and Jyothi Surekha Vennam, who showed the way as they dropped just one point from 16 arrows to eliminate UAE's Amna Alawadhi and Mohammed Binamro 159-151.

The duo will take on formidable Malaysia (No 8 seed) in the quarters, and thereafter, they should have an easy draw till the

Then, the Indian recurve mixed pair duo of Atanu Das and Ankita Bhakat were at their resilient best and overcome a firstset deficit to defeat Malayasia in a three-setter.

The fifth seeded Indian duo of Das and Ankita rallied to beat the Malaysian team of Syaqiera Binti Mashayikh and Muhamad Zarif Syahir Bin Zolkepeli 6-2 (39-38, 37-36, 39-33).

The Malaysia pair enjoyed a 2-0 lead with three 10s including one X in the first set. But, the experienced Indian duo bounced back with two 10s and went on to draw level, as the Malaysians crumbled under pressure.

The Malaysians hit the redring (8) once and went on to lose the second by a slender one-point margin. There was more misery in

store for the Malaysians who shot into the red ring thrice (8-8-8), while Das-Ankita drilled in three perfect 10s en route to a six-point win in the third set. The Indian pair sealed the

issue with three more 10s in the

fourth set and set up a last-eight clash against the fourth-seeded Indonesians.

Should they overcome the Indonesian challenge, the Indians may run into the top-seeded Koreans in a potential semifinal clash in the Olympic-qualifying event.

There are six quota spots available from the Asian Games -- the recurve mixed team winners and two archers ranked high in the individual events.

In compound men's team event, the second-seeded Indian trio of Ojas, Abhishek Verma and Prathamesh Jawkar thrashed 15th seed Singapore (Woon Teng NG, Lee Chung Hee Alan, Jun Hui Goh) 235-219.

The Indian triumvirate had a cautious start and had four 10s to take a 58-55 lead.

But the Indians came on their own from second end onwards and dropped just three points to rout their rivals by a 16-point

The compound men's team is pitted against lower-ranked Bhutan in the quarters and will likely face the third seeded Chinese Taipei in the semifinals.

The top-seeded Indian women's compound team of Jyothi, Aditi Swami and Parneet Kaur, who got a bye into the quarters, will open its campaign against ninth-seeded Hong Kong, who ousted Bangladesh

The Indian men's recurve team of Das, Dhiraj and Tushar Shelke beat Hong Kong's Kwok Yin Chai, Law Kwun Pok Lucien and Wn Chun Kit 6-0 (58-47, 57-49, 57-55) in a lopsided

The third-seeded Indians, who face lower-ranked Mongolia (No 11) in the last-eight, have an easy draw till the final, with Korea and Japan in the top half.

The unfancied women's recurve team of Ankita Bhakat. Bhajan Kaur and Simranjeet Kaur also shone through, ousting 12th seeded Thailand. The fifth-seeded Indians won

5-1 (49-47, 54-54, 55-54) and are

pitted against fourth-seeded Japan in a tough quarterfinal match-up. Reigning world champion Deotale began with an easy defeat of Ahmad Alshatti (Kuwait) 148-138. He then overcame Chen Chieh-Lun of Chinese Taipei 146-145 in a tough contest. The fourth seeded Verma defeated Belal Ayman Alawadi of Saudi Arabia 147-139, and then ousted Nguyen Van Day (Vietnam) 146-142 to make the last-eight. (PTI)

Rachin Ravindra: From cheering for NZ at a Bengaluru bar in 2019 to being part of 2023 World Cup batch HYDERABAD, Oct 2: Rachin Ravindra found the

night of July 14, 2019, one of the longest and hardest to endure as he watched New Zealand's heartbreaking defeat to England in the ODI World Cup final sitting in a Bengaluru pub. Ravindra, then all of 19 was on an annual trip to

India with his father's cricket club and the rollercoaster experience of watching the final is still etched in his memory. New Zealand losing that final to England on the boundary count-back rule divides opinion to this day.

Rachin, whose first name is inspired by the first names

of Sachin Tendulkar and Rahul Dravid, remembers that night as it was yesterday. As a budding cricketer dreaming to represent New Zealand one day, the Indian-origin circketer was shattered with the outcome of the game and the desire to represent New Zealand grew stronger.

Cut to 2023, he is among the fast rising cricketers in the New Zealand set-up. Primarily a batter, who also takes his left-arm spin very seriously, Rachin has already made a statement with a gutsy 97 as an opener in the World Cup warm-up against Pakistan here last

Born to Indian parents in Wellington, Rachin has a strong connect with the cricket mad nation with his family roots in Bengaluru. It was fitting that he made his Test debut in India two years ago and now he is set to make his World Cup debut here.

"Looking back on my Test debut, it was a special and emotional time. Being able to play in India, the fanfare around the game here, to be able to experience that is pretty special.

"My parents come from Bangalore and it is amazing to play a World Cup here," the 23-year-old PTI referring to the Kanpur Test which he was able to draw



From watching previous World Cup as a fanboy to now being part of the next one, it has been a pretty "cool" journey for Rachin.

"It is actually quite a story. My dad takes a bunch of age group boys to India (annually) and we were in Bangalore on a senior trip. We were watching the final (2019) in a stock exchange bar.

"I watched the whole final. It was unbelievable and

of the game. Having Indian supporters around us was pretty cool. It is an experience I will never forget."

New Zealand is probably the most liked team on the planet but on that night, no pleasantries were exchanged in that bar. A couple of days ago, New Zealand had ended India's run in the semifinals.

"All of us were New Zealanders, so we were massively going for the Black Caps but quite a few Indians were going for England, probably because of the

"That created a nice little atmosphere there as we all know how the game went," recalled Rachin. Did he think then that he will be part of the 2023 "It has been a great ride. You always think one day

you might get a chance. Being a 19-year old at that time, few years into professional cricket, you have those dreams to be part of a World Cup. It is pretty cool how it has come to fruition," he said.

Rachin, who opens for Wellington back home but bats in the middle-order for New Zealand, feels the experience of playing age-group cricket around the country will help him in this World Cup as the team travels all around India for its nine league games.

"For sure. Any sort of experience playing in India goes a long way. Grateful for these tours of India in my younger days. Goes a long way in playing spin and how to bowl in these conditions, face different type of seamers on different wickets. "The conditions over here are so different to what we get back home. I think it will definitely come in handy. Prior to this World Cup, I have played in Hyderabad, Chennai, Bangalore, up North. It gives you a bit of sense of belonging and calms you down knowing you have played here," said Rachin, whose father Ravi Krishnamurthy has been his coach since childhood.

Rachin might not get to open in the tournament proper like he did against Pakistan but he has already made a statement. However, he is fully aware of his role in the side. "Naah (laughs)," he responded when asked about opening the innings regularly. "It was a nice wicket to bat on. To be fair I do open for my domestic side, have always been an opener so nice to get the opportunity for New Zealand. Whatever role I get hopefully I would be able to do it," he added. (PTI)

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
