Himanta curbs power subsidy for ministers and & officials

GUWAHATI, Feb 11: In a decisive move aimed at enhancing transparency and accountability within the government, chief minister Himanta Biswa Sarma has directed the power department to install individual prepaid meters in all government quarters, including residences in the ministerial colony.

The initiative, as per Sarma, comes following his discovery that a nominal monthly power bill was being deducted from the salaries of ministers and senior officers

Expressing his surprise on the micro-blogging site X on Sunday upon learning about the subsidized power enjoyed by government officials, Sarma swiftly instructed the department to implement the installation of prepaid meters.

"In my recent interactions with officials from the Power Department, I was informed for the first time that a very nominal monthly power bill is deducted from the salaries of ministers and senior officers. Immediately, I instructed the department to install individual prepaid meters in every government quarter, including residences in the ministerial colony. Amit Shah gives 'winning formula' to BJP to sweep Karnataka in LS polls

MYSURU, Feb 11: Union home increase votes by 10 per cent in minister Amit Shah has given state leaders a "winning formula" to ensure that the party's alliance with the JD(S) wins all 28 seats in the Lok Sabha polls, by converting Prime Minister Narendra Modi's popularity into votes, Karnataka BJP unit president B Y Vijayendra said on Sunday.

Speaking to reporters after Shah's meetings with state BJP core committee members and leaders of the party's Mysuru cluster here, he said no discussion on candidate selection had taken place today, and that the seat-sharing terms with JD(S) will be decided by the leadership of both parties at "Delhi level."

"Amit Shah's Mysuru visit was successful... He said that in the upcoming Lok Sabha polls the situation is favourable for the NDA to win all 28 seats in Karnataka. He gave suggestions regarding our plan of action in converting Narendra Modi's popularity into votes, and said efforts should be made to every booth," Vijayendra said.

Speaking to reporters here after the meeting, he said all the leaders who attended today's meetings are confident that if Shah's plan of action is implemented effectively at booth level, the BJP and JD(S) can win all the Lok Sabha seats in the

"We too have assured him (Shah) that we will work together unitedly as per his guidance," he said, adding that the senior party leader's visit has instilled enthusiasm among party workers and leaders.

In the 2019 polls, the BJP had won 26 of the total 28 Lok Sabha seats from Karnataka, including that of Sumalatha Ambareesh, an independent supported by the party from Mandya. The Congress and the JD(S) had secured just one seat

According to Punit Ram Das Maharaj, the manager of the bank, the number of daily visi-

"The bank provides free booklets and red pens to devotees and keeps track of each account. One has to write 'Sitaram' at least 5 lakh times to get an account opened in the bank and then a passbook is issued.

One97 Communications Ltd (OCL) has investment from Chinese firm Ant Group Co

NEW DELHI, Feb 11: The government is examining foreign direct investment from China in Paytm Payments Services Ltd (PPSL), the payment aggregator subsidiary of One97 Communications Ltd, sources said.

THE HILLS TIMES

In November 2020, PPSL had applied for licence with the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) to operate as a payment aggregator under the guidelines on Regulation of Payment Aggregators and Payment Gateways.

However, in November 2022, RBI rejected PPSL's application and asked the company to resubmit it, so as to comply with Press Note 3 under FDI rules.

One97 Communications Ltd (OCL) has investment from Chinese firm Ant Group Co.

Subsequently, the company filed the required application on December 14, 2022 with Government of India for past downward investment from OCL into the company in order to comply with Press Note 3 prescribed under FDI guidelines.

An inter-ministerial committee is examining investments from China in PPSL and decision would be taken on the FDI issue after due consideration and comprehensive examination, sources said.

Adani Ports secures top position for climate actions

NEW DELHI, Feb 11: The Adani Ports and Special Economic Zone Ltd (APSEZ), the country's largest port operator, has secured top position for its climate actions and environmental performance in assessments done by four global rating agencies, the company said in a statement on Sunday.

The CDP assigned leadership band "A-" to APSEZ, recognising the company's efforts in implementing the current best practices to tackle climate change risks and opportunities, the firm said.

Around 23,000 companies, worth over half of the global listed market cap, participated in the assessment performed by the CDP on behalf of the investors representing an AUM of over \$136 trillion.

Adani Ports, the port operator and logistics company of the Adani Group, received the highest rating of "A" for its emission reduction initiatives, climate governance,

and risk management processes. "APSEZ has also secured the top position in the environmental dimension of the S&P Global Corporate Sustainability Assessment (CSA) 2023 among the 324 leading players in the Global Transportation and Transportation Infrastructure sector, which includes marine ports, shipping, air, road and rail transport, logistics, mass transit system and other

transportation businesses," it said. The environmental pillar provides 56 per cent weight for climate indicators and strategy, with Adani Ports improving its score for the third consecutive year to



Under Press Note 3, the government had made its prior approval mandatory for foreign investments in any sector from countries that share land border with India to curb opportunistic takeovers of domestic firms following the COVID-19 pandemic.

Case against 2 persons Direct tax collection reaches in Navi Mumbai

THANE, Feb 11: A case has been registered against two persons in Maharashtra's Navi Mumbai township for allegedly causing a loss of ₹ 28.53 lakh to a businessman in the supply of light diesel oil, police said on Sunday.

According to a police complaint filed by the 31-year-old businessman, during a period of non-production at his chemical company located in Taloja area, a former employee of the firm and a vendor allegedly orchestrated a plan to procure the light diesel oil for the company without proper authorisa-

The oil was then sold off, resulting in substantial financial gains to the accused and a loss of ₹ 28,53,076 to the business of the victim, who hails from Nashik, an official from Taloja police station

The alleged offence took place between March 2022 and September 2023, the businessman

Based on the complaint, a case was registered on Saturday against the company's former employee and the vendor under sections 420 (cheating) and 406 (criminal breach of trust) of the Indian Penal Code, the police said. (PTI)

Jeff Bezos sells nearly 12 million Amazon shares worth at least \$2 billion



SEATTLE, Feb 11: Jeff Bezos filed a statement with federal regulators indicating his sale of nearly 12 million shares of Amazon stock worth more than \$2 billion.

The Amazon executive chairman notified the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission of the sale of 11,997,698 shares of common stock on Feb. 7 and Feb. 8.

The collective value of the shares of Amazon, which is based in Seattle where he founded the company in a garage about three decades ago, was more than \$2.04 billion, according to the listed price

The stocks were grouped in five blocks between 1 million and more than 3.2 million.

In a separate SEC filing, Bezos listed the proposed sale of 50 million Amazon shares around Feb. 7 with an estimated market value of

Bezos stepped down as Amazon's CEO in 2021 to spend more time on his other projects, including the rocket company, Blue Origin, and his philanthropy. His address on the stock filings is listed as Seattle, although he reportedly has relocated to Miami. (AP)

Inflation is nearly back to 2%. So why isn't the Federal Reserve ready to cut rates? WASHINGTON, Feb 11: From time, they note, the economy is Wall Street traders to car dealers to

home buyers, Americans are eager for the Federal Reserve to start cutting interest rates and lightening the heavy burden on borrowers. The Fed is widely expected to do

so this year — probably several times. Inflation, as measured by its preferred gauge, rose in the second half of 2023 at an annual rate of about 2% — the Fed's target level. Yet this week, several central bank officials underscored that they weren't ready to pull the trigger just

Why, with inflation nearly conquered and the Fed's key rate at a 2-year high, isn't now the time to

Most of the Fed's policymakers have said they're optimistic that even as the economy and the job market keep growing, inflation pressures will continue to cool. But they also caution that the economy appears so strong that there's a real risk that price increases could spike

And some are worried that if they cut rates now and inflation reaccelerates, then the Fed could be forced into an about-face and have

"History tells many stories of inflation head-fakes," said Tom Barkin, president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond, in a speech Thursday.

Inflation had seemed defeated in 1986. Barkin noted, when Paul Volcker was Fed chair.

"The Fed reduced rates, but inflation then escalated again the following year, causing the Fed to reverse course," he said.

"I would love to avoid that roller-coaster if we can," said, Barkin, who is among 12 Fed officials who vote on interest rate policv this year.

Several officials have said they want more time to see if inflation

solid enough that it can thrive without any rate cuts. Last month, for example, America's employers delivered a burst of hiring, and the unemployment rate stayed at 3.7%.

"They're going to be glacial, and take their time," said Steven Blitz, chief US economist at GlobalData TS Lombard. "They're willing to say, 'We don't know, but we can afford to wait so we're going to

The sturdiness of the economy has also raised questions about just how effective the Fed's 11 rate hikes have been. If higher borrowing rates are only barely restraining the economy, some officials may conclude that high rates should stay in place longer or that few rate cuts will be needed.

"I don't feel there's a sense of urgency here," Loretta Mester, president of the Cleveland Federal Reserve, told reporters Tuesday. "I think later this year, if things evolve as anticipated, we would be able to start moving the rate down.'

Yet their caution carries risks. Right now, the economy appears on track for a "soft landing," in which inflation would be defeated without ployment. But the longer that borrowing rates stay high, the higher the risk that many companies and consumers would stop borrowing and spending, weakening the economy and potentially sending it into a recession.

High rates could also compound the struggles of banks that are saddled with bad commercial real estate loans, which would be harder to refinance at higher rates.

The high cost of borrowing has become a headache for David Kelleher's Chrysler-Jeep dealership just outside of Philadelphia. Just 2 1/2 years ago, Kelleher recalled, his customers could get an auto loan below 3%. Now, they're

Duty concession on gold will be major concern for India: GTRI

NEW DELHI, Feb 11: Duty concessions on gold, which accounts for 80% of India's imports from Peru, is the most challenging issue for New Delhi under the proposed free trade agreement with the South American nation, a report said on Sunday.

India and the South American nation Peru are

bilateral trade and investments between the two countries. In such pacts, two trading partners either significantly reduce or eliminate customs duties on the maximum number of goods traded between them, besides easing norms to promote trade in services. The next round of talks is ex-

pected to start this week in Lima, Peru. "Tariff concessions on gold, accounting for \$1.8 billion or 80% of India's imports from Peru in FY23, is the most challenging issue for India," GTRI founder Ajay Srivastava said.

NEW DELHI, Feb 11: Petronet renewing a contract to buy 7.5 million tonnes of LNG from Qatar annually from 2029 for 20 years is the largest-ever extension of super-chilled fuel in the world, and will support India's clean energy goals, officials said.

The original 25-year deal was signed in 1999 and supplies started in 2004. Qatar has since then never defaulted on a single cargo and neither did it slap penalties under take-or-pay clause when the Indian firm did not take deliveries because prices were too high, top Petronet officials said.

Supplies under the extended contract would start after Petronet takes deliveries of 52 cargoes it had failed to take in

2015-16 when prices had shot up sharply. While the volumes in contract have not changed, price changed four times, including the latest one when the contract extension was renegotiated.

The composition of the gas promised to be delivered has also changed. Ras-Gas, which is now QatarEnergy, had originally signed to supply 'rich' or gas containing components of ethane and propane that is used as feedstock in petrochemical complexes.

It supplied 5 Million Tonnes (MT) a year of LNG that contained methane (used to produce electricity, make fertilisers, turned into CNG or used as cooking fuel), as well as ethane and propane on a firm basis and the rest on best endeavour

In the revised contract agreed last week, where the price is also lower, QatarEnergy will supply 'lean' or gas stripped of ethane and propane. But Petronet officials said Oatar will continue to supply 'rich' gas as long as they dont have a facility to utilise ethane and

'We will continue to receive 'rich'

LNG," a top company official said. State-owned Oil and Natural Gas Corporation (ONGC) spent Rs 30,000 crore on building a petrochemical complex at Dahej in Gujarat to use ethane and propane from LNG coming from Qatar, to make products that are used to manufacture plastics to detergents.

"They (ONGC) will continue to get those components," another official said. In 1999, in response to a tender, Ras-Gas had offered to sell LNG to Petronet LNG Ltd, a joint venture of state-owned oil firms, headed by the Secretary in the Oil Ministry, at USD 2.53 per million British thermal unit at a crude oil price of USD 20 per barrel.

The LNG price was to rise or fall by 2 cents per mmBtu in tandem with every dollar movement in oil price. At a USD 100 a barrel oil rate, the LNG price was to be USD 4.13 per mmBtu.

Sources said the second best offer in that tender was from Petronas of



Malaysia that quoted the same fixed cost but a slightly higher linkage to oil and coal prices. In case of Petronas, LNG price would have risen or fallen 3 cents per mmBtu for every rise or fall in oil prices.

But strangely, an unsolicited offer from RasGas pricing LNG in a band of USD 16-24 per barrel oil price (USD 2.01 per mmBtu to USD 3.04 per mmBtu gas price) was accepted by Petronet in 2000.

In 2003, Petronet renegotiated the price and agreed to have a fixed price at USD 20 per barrel of oil (USD 2.53 per mmBtu) for the first five years from 2004-2009 and indexation with actual crude prices thereafter.

Under the 1999 contract, RasGas

began supplying the first tranche of 5 MT a year or 'rich' LNG at Dahej in Gujarat in 2004. But supply of the remaining 2.5 MT could not start as contraction of

Kochi terminal in Kerala was delayed. In 2005, Petronet entered into negotiations with RasGas to advance the tranche-2 volumes of 2.5 MT. They proposed to buy the entire 7.5 MT a year of contracted supplies at Dahej.

Petronet signed a revised deal in 2006 wherein it agreed to take 5 MT of rich gas and for the rest agreed to RasGas condition that the rich gas will be supplied only on best endeavour basis rather than as contractual commitment, sources said, adding that the best endeavour basis has now been extended to all of the 7.5 MT

After five years of fixed price, a new price kicked in from 2010. The rate was 12.67 per cent of the 12-month moving average of the basket of crude oil imported by Japan, called the Japanese Crude Cocktail, or JCC. This formula had a rolling ceiling and floor of 60month average JCC, plus or minus USD

While the international oil prices dropped to multi-year lows in 2015, this ceiling and floor meant that LNG cost to India would remain at highs of USD 12-13 per mmBtu even though gas in spot or current market was available at half the

This floor and ceiling had benefitted India when rates remained at USD 8-9 despite crude oil shooting up to USD 147 a barrel and LNG rates touching USD 20 per mmBtu in previous years.

The high prices of 2015 led to renegotiation of the price. The formula was revised to 12.67 per cent of the three-month average price of Brent crude plus a fixed component of USD 0.52 per mmBtu.

Sources said the 20-year extension is only for 7.5 MT a year of original volume and the additional 1 MT will be dealt with separately.

The new contract price is at about 12.2 per cent of Brent oil. The USD 0.52 per mmBtu of fixed cost has been scrapped and so has the responsibility on part of the Indian firm to ship the LNG.

Now QatarEnergy will ship the gas, an exercise that will cost it around USD 0.30 per mmBtu.

Petronet officials said the company had chartered-hired two ships, called 'Disha' and 'Rahi' from a consortium of Shipping Corporation of India (SCI) and Japanese firms K Line, NYK Line and Mitsui OSK Line. That contract was for 25 years and ends in 2028 after which ships will return to the consortium.

A third ship, 'Aseem' was hired in 2006 for ferrying additional volumes of LNG from Qatar. Petronet will lease out the ship after 2028, they said.

Since entering into a deal with Oatar. Indian firms have signed deals to import LNG from Australia, the US and Russia.

According to Wood Mackenzie, the sales and purchase agreement extension between QatarEnergy and Petronet covers a total volume of 150 MT over 20 years, surpassing the two 108 million tonnes deals signed by QatarEnergy with the China National Petroleum Corpora-

tion and Sinopec in the past two years. "This agreement plays a crucial role in enabling India to reach its target of increasing the proportion of natural gas in its energy mix to 15 per cent by 2030, a significant rise from the current 6.3 per cent," said Daniel Toleman, Director, global LNG (Asia), at Wood Mackenzie. Committee highlights plight of commuters and town's vibrancy issues

TEZPUR, Feb 11: The delegate

team of the Committee for Revival Tezpur Railway (CRTRS), led by MP Birendra Prasad Baishya, recently met Union Railway minister Ashwini Vaishnaw at Rail Bhawan, New Delhi, and submitted a memorandum highlighting the sufferings faced by the people commuting to Dekargaon Station. The memorandum emphasised the cost and time involved due to the stalling of the hundred-year-old train service facility for the people of Tezpur town since 2011, attributed to the nonconversion of the 8 km long broad gauge line from Dekergaon to

Highlighting the memorandum in a press note, the CRTRS mentioned that the discontinuation of broad gauge conversion from Dekargaon Station to Tezpur was due to opposition from some sections of people in the interest of widening road connectivity to Tezpur town and establishing an



Inter-State Bus Terminus (ISBT) at the railway station, which is no longer required due to the establishment of ISBT at Dhanuanager as per the Tezpur Master Plan (2010-2030). Moreover, the Committee emphasised that the growth of Tezpur town itself was due to the establishment of this station in 1895 for the commercial outlay of tea for mercantile marine through the river Brahmaputra. The withdrawal of train service gravely affects the vibrancy of the town, and the loss of train service facilities seriously affects the poor and downtrodden sections of people, bearing high costs in road transport with no alternative at hand.

Further, the press note said that the committee, from various deliberations with the officers of the Northeast Frontier Railways (NFR), came to understand that the revival and gauge conversion of Tezpur Railway Station will align

with the present infrastructural marvels of Indian Railways and may result in the construction of super flyovers along the track, thereby brushing aside common apprehensions of high traffic jams and possible factors of accidents.

In its memorandum, the committee prioritised the introduction of intercity train facilities from Tezpur town, which will keep the whole track free from traffic congestion as it will run early in the morning and late in the evening.

cerned authorities of Manipur government. The MCPCR issued the advisory while showing serious concern about the educational rights of internally displaced students. It urged the state Education department and all concerned zonal education officers (ZEOs) to ensure that children between the ages of six and 18 years do not drop out of school.

All school authorities, including private schools were also advised not to expel students or discontinue their studies simply because their parents or guardians are unable to pay tuition fees or if their parents or

guardians have lost their lives due to the crisis. "If children are forced to leave school due to the conflict, the school authorities must take steps to refund any admission or other fees already paid or deposited at the time of admission, especially if the amount is substantial," the MCPRC stated in the advisory. As the new academic session approaches, the state education department must also ensure that all internally displaced children are enrolled in schools and provided with uniforms, textbooks, and stationary items on a priority basis, it stated.

It further asked private school authorities to comply with the reservation of 25% under RTE norms and provide sponsorship and concessional fee facilities to needy displaced students according to their capacity and on a case-by-case basis.

The authorities must also provide a Remedial Education Programme to needy displaced children on a regular and need-based basis, it added.

The MCPRC further suggested that every relief center should reserve a "Learning Centre" exclusively for children, where they can freely read, study, engage in life skill activities, participate in recreational programs, and revise what they have been taught in

Other advisories include ensuring the right to food, access to medicines, and the arrangement of recre-

ational activities, sports, arts, and culture. In a written reply in the Rajya Sabha in August last year, Union minister of State for Education Annapurna Devi had stated that 14,763 school-going children have been displaced as a result of the ongoing

ethnic crisis in Manipur. She further noted that over 93% of these displaced children have successfully enrolled in the nearest schools, aided by designated nodal officers appointed for each relief camp to streamline the admission process for such students. (NNN)

hite Paper is a document containing information about pressing issues before the government explaining their plans before their introduction. It is therefore absurd and ridiculous for a government to issue a white paper, after a delay of 10 years while it slept, at a time when its term is set to expire, brings the document at the last session of the Parliament's term only two days before its conclusion, just before a country is going to elect a new government.

Modi government's white paper for a period 2004-2014, says that Congress-led UPA rule had turned India's economy into a non-performing one through indiscriminate revenue expenditure, off-budget borrowings and a pile of bad debts at banks.

The 59-page document tabled by the government in the Parliament detailed how the Modi government pulled the economy from being counted among the fragile five in the world to the fastest-growing and most attractive investment destination.

White paper has actually wrongly presented the performance under the UPA rule. For example, the white paper boasted India's average per capita GDP grew roughly from \$4,000 in 2014 to \$6,000 during Modi's tenure. While it did not say that annual average per capita GDP growth was 5.9 per cent during UPA rule which tumbled down to merely 3.8 per cent during Modi rule. The distorted presentation can be seen in net foreign investment which was 1.2 per cent of GDP under UPA but only 0.8 per cent under Modi. Similar is the case with foreign reserves which tripled during UPA, while exports growth was 17 per cent of GDP.

As against this exports growth under Modi is merely 14 per cent. Private investment fell from 26 per cent of GDP under UPA to 22 per cent under Modi. Manufacturing growth rose from 15.3 per cent of GVA in 2004 to 17 per cent in 2014 but fell to 14 per cent in the year 2023-24.

Foodgrain production grew under UPA rule by 34 per cent but under Modi rule it grew by only 31 per cent. There are numerous such examples. The narrative of the white paper is thus faulty that aims only to praise Modi rule, and unfairly decry UPA rule, by cherry picking data, and not giving the true pic-

The document degenerated in self-praise, while a white paper needs to be focused on pressing current issues (not the issues of the past), and the government's plans to be introduced to resolve them during their term and concrete planning for the future.

Modi government intentionally tabled the document at the far end of last session of the Lok Sabha before expiry of its term so that it could not be discussed properly due to lack of enough time in the House of the People lest the real political intentions of the government is exposed on the eve of election, though it alleged "misgovernance" and 'corruption" under UPA rule. The principle of justice says that Congress had a right to have an opportunity and enough time to defend itself on the same platform where allegations were made, in this case in the Parliament of India.

The timing and manner of presentation of the white paper itself was injustice, which was alleged even by the "Black Paper" of the Congress which was released to highlight the "failures" of the Modi government alleging that its last ten years of rule 2014-24 have been a period of "injustice" and "discrimination". The 54-page Black Paper highlighted social, economic, and political injustices under Modi rule.

"The Modi government's 10 years in power have devastated the country's economy, aggravated unemployment, destroyed the country's agricultural sector, abetted crimes against women and committed grave injustices against minorities in the country," alleged the Black Paper. Modi government remained silent on distress of farmers, unemployed, and workforce, and the common people. (IPA Service)

West Asia: A global concern for peace and stability

he recent spate of Houthi attacks, ongoing conflicts between Israel and Hamas, and escalating tensions related to the UNRWA's alleged involvement in the October 7, 2023, attack on Israel have sparked renewed apprehension about the potential for peace and diplomatic resolutions in the volatile West Asian region. Despite Israel's consistent denial of the accusations, the days ahead are poised to be pivotal in shaping the trajectory of peace initiatives in the area.

RLD negotiating with BJP for Lok Sabha alliance is a bad signal for INDIA bloc

s RLD President Jayant Chaudhary under tremendous pressure to join NDA Or he wants to bargain with Akhilesh Yadav for a favourable seat sharing for Lok Sabha polls? On January 19 Akhilesh Yadav announced seat sharing with RLD while giving seven seats in Western UP having influence of powerful jat community. But RLD leader has started negotiations with BJP and the prospect of RLD has brightened with Prime Minister announcing Bharat Ratna to former Prime Minister Charan Singh.

It may be mentioned that there was a time when late Prime Minister Chaudhary Charan Singh grandfather of Jayant was undisputed leader of Jat community. Later on his son Ajit Singh and grandson Jayant enjoyed the support from the community.

The seat sharing formula given by Akhilesh Yadav had three seats for Samajwadi Party candidates under the symbol of RLD. These seats are Muzaffarnagar, Kairana and Bijnore. a move that may have upset Jayant Chaudhary. The leaders and supporters of RLD are also unhappy with this formula. Internal survey conducted by RLD also reveal that party candidates can win from these seats on their own.

Although RLD dominates in some areas of Western UP but there has been erosion in support base of Jayant Chaudhary which was evident in 2022 assembly polls when farmers despite their long agitation voted for BJP candidates belying all expectations. During 2022 assembly elections, RLD was in alliance with Samajwadi Party and contested 33 seats and won eight seats. One seat was won by RLD in the bypolls.

In 2019 Lok Sabha polls, RLD contested three seats in alliance with Samajwadi Party but could not win a single seat. Later on Akhilesh Yadav sent Jayant Chaudhary to Rajya Sabha with the support of Samajwadi Party.

Under the new development BJP has capitalised on the unrest in RLD over the seat formula with Samajwadi Party and reportedly offered four seats Kairana, Baghpat, Mathura and Amroha. There are reports that BJP may also give one Rajya Sabha to RLD.

Although Akhilesh Yadav and Dimple Yadav said that they were confident Jayant Chaudhary would not join hands with BJP but there is a mysterious silence from RLD leadership. All the media panelists from RLD have also been asked not to issue any statement or talk about this issue. On the other hand, BJP leaders have publicly welcomed the move to bring RLD to NDA. There are reports that RLD MLAs will accompany BJP MLAs to Ayodhya for darshan of Ram Temple.

Samajwadi Party has also announced that it would leave only 11 seats for Congress as INDIA partner. The names of seats are not known. The talks between Samajwadi Party and Congress are still in progress. There are reports that Congress wants to contest in as many as 21 seats.

It would be worth mentioning here that Samajwadi Party released the first list of candidates for 16 Lok Sabha seats. These seats also include those where Congress had been thinking fielding candidates.

During last Lok Sabha polls in 2019, Congress won only one seat that too of Mrs Sonia Gandhi while BSP in alliance with Samajwadi Party won 10 seats and Samajwadi Party won only five seats. This time Samajwadi Party wants to contest 65 seats as the performance of the party was quite impressive as it increased the vote share and got 111 seats in 2022 assembly polls.

With the Ram Mandir inauguration on January 22, there is a wave of Hindutva in Uttar Pradesh and BJP is capitalizing on it. In that context, it is essential that the SP leader Akhilesh Yadav tries his best to arrive at an electoral understanding with the RLD and the Congress to take on the resurgent BJP. Already the battle is tougher, any desertion of RLD to the side of BJP, will be disastrous for INDIA bloc. (*IPA Service*)

Post TMC-Cong break up, BJP bets on Ram Mandir, CAA for 35 LS seats in Bengal

KOLKATA, Feb 11: Struggling to gain political traction on issues of corruption, the West Bengal BJP is shifting its focus to emotive topics such as the Ram Temple in Ayodhya and the Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA) in a bid to achieve its target of securing 35 out of the 42 Lok Sabha seats from

The BJP's strategy is buoyed by the decision of the Trinamool Congress to contest alone in the upcoming Lok Sabha elections in West Bengal, breaking away from the INDIA bloc in the state.

This move has raised hopes within the saffron camp of consolidating anti-TMC votes, a trend evident in the party's surge from a 17% vote share in 2014 to 40% in 2019, resulting in 18 Lok Sabha

Despite facing internal strife and electoral setbacks since its defeat in the 2021 assembly polls, the BJP's attempts to capitalise on corruption allegations against the Mamata Banerjee government have fallen short. With a target of winning 35 out of the 42 Lok Sabha seats, the BJP is now banking on emotive issues like the Ram Temple and CAA.

"Both inauguration of Ram Temple and implementation of CAA are core issues of the party,' Agnimitra Paul, BJP state general secretary told PTI.

She emphasised the party's resonance with voters in Bengal by saying, "Both the issues are emotive, and people can connect with



An idol of the new Ram Lalla was consecrated at the Ayodhya temple on January 22, the event coming just months ahead of the Lok Sabha elections and 34 years after BJP veteran LK Advani's iconic 'Mandir Wahin Banayenge' speech during his Rath yatra that

shaped Ram Mandir politics. Echoing this sentiment, BJP MP and former state president Dilip Ghosh underscored the emotive appeal of these issues, asserting their historical significance in uniting Hindu voters and addressing refugee concerns, particularly

among the Matua community. "The promise of implementing the CAA has played a significant role in BJP's electoral successes," said Ghosh.

"The Ram temple issue has benefitted the BJP in the past, and this time too, it will help us to unite the

Hindus across the country, including Bengal," the BJP leader said during whose tenure as state pres-

The Matuas, a significant portion of the state's Scheduled Caste population, have been migrating to West Bengal since the 1950s, fleeing religious persecution in East

Pakistan, now Bangladesh. Their cohesive voting behaviour makes them a valuable voting bloc, particularly in alignment with the BJP's stance on the CAA.

Riding on the promises of the Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA) and the National Register of Citizens (NRC), the Matua community in 2019 voted en masse for the saffron camp in the

The CAA, enacted by the BJPled central government in 2019,

persecuted non-Muslim migrants, including Hindus, Sikhs, Jains, Buddhists, Parsis, and Christians, from Bangladesh, Pakistan, and Afghanistan who entered India before December 31, 2014.

Union Minister and Matua leader Shantanu Thakur had recently said the CAA will be implemented soon, amidst reports that rules of the legislation would be framed before the Lok Sabha polls.

While the BJP aims for over 35 seats, insiders indicate a more pragmatic goal of 24.

Speaking on the issue of BJP resorting back to Ram Mandir and CAA to win the election in the state, party leaders said it reflects an "acknowledgement of organisational challenges and a desire to counter the Trinamool's narrative of Bengali sub-nationalism".

"Organisationally, we are not in a very good situation where we can claim that we will win 35 seats in the state. Second, as this is the Lok Sabha election, the TMC's pitch of Bengali sub-nationalism won't blunt our narrative, unlike the assembly polls," a senior state BJP leader said. The TMC has fanned the 'Bengali pride' and had created a poll narrative of sub-nationalism to counter BJP's identity politics in the 2021 assembly polls.

The party also pointed out that the break-up of the INDIA bloc in Bengal with TMC deciding to fight alone will further help in consolidation of the anti-TMC votes in BJP's account. (PTI)

80% of organ transplants between 1995 and 2021 were on men: Govt data

NEW DELHI, Feb 11: More than 80 per cent of the total 36,640 transplants from dead and living donors between 1995 and 2021 were performed on men, with the government saying it has taken several steps to address the gender disparity in the sphere. According to government data presented in Lok Sabha on Friday in a written response to a question, Minister of State for Health S P Singh Baghel said that of the total transplants, 29,695 were performed on men and 6,945 on women, which translates to a ratio of about 4:1. However, the share of women receiving transplants increased from 27.6 per cent in 2019 to nearly 30 per cent in 2022. The answer came in response to a question asked by YSR Congress Party MP Kuruva Gorantla Madhav. Madhav had asked if the government has taken cognisance of the fact that between 1995 and 2021, four out of five organ recipients have been men in the country and what are the steps taken to address the issue.

In his response, Baghel said the government has implemented the National Organ Transplant Programme under which steps have been taken to raise awareness on organ donation. In order to narrow down the trend of gender disparity in organ transplants, the Ministry of Health has been conducting regular awareness and sensitisation sessions, he said. Activities have been organised on various ethical aspects of organ donation and transplantation for different stakeholders such as state government representatives, legal representatives, police personnel, non-governmental organisations, healthcare professionals of Institu-

Kerala to form inter-state panel to monitor movement of wild animals across state borders

THRISSUR, Feb 11: A day after a 42-year-old man was trampled to death by a wild elephant at Wayanad's Mananthavady, the Kerala government on Sunday decided to form an inter-state coordination committee to monitor the movement of wild animals across state borders.

State Forest Minister A K Saseendran, after an evaluation meeting held here, told the media that Wayanad district, which has been witnessing higher number of man-animal conflicts recently, will receive two more Rapid Response Teams (RRT) in addition to the one it has now.

"An inter-state coordination committee will be formed before February 15 which will discuss the further course of action. As of now, there are three forest divisions in Wayanad. A special cell for these three divisions will be formed and a nodal officer will coordinate the functions," Saseendran

He added that of the 500 beat forest officers from today's passing out parade, 170 will be posted in Wayanad.

The minister also informed that the elephant which trampled Payyampally resident Aji, was

He said the forest department officials have been directed to tranquilise the animal if it was found in a suitable place.

"As far as we understand there was a delay in receiving information from the Karnataka department regarding the movement of the elephant. We don't have the facility to receive information from the chip installed by Karnataka or Tamil Nadu. Hence, we have decided to form an inter-state coordination committee to avoid such instances,' Saseendran said

To control the man-animal conflict, which includes the venturing of wild animals into human habitat, amendments need to be made to the concerned Forest Act, which only the union government can do, the minister pointed out.

Meanwhile, BJP leader and Union Minister of State V Muraleedharan on Sunday sought the resignation of the state Forest Minister.

He alleged that despite the presence of a radio collar, the Kerala Forest Department failed to warn the people about the venturing of the wild

Muraleedharan also attacked Wayanad MP and senior Congress leader Rahul Gandhi and asked whether he was aware of the incidents in his con-

Aji's funeral will be held at his residence this evening. The Kerala government had on Saturday announced ₹ 10 lakh compensation and assured a job to one of his family members.

A major protest broke out at Mananthavady over the death of Aji on Saturday, with the locals taking it to the streets.

However, after the announcement of various reliefs by the government, the agitators had ended their protest and handed over the body for postmortem.

Saseendran had announced that the government will take care of the education of the two children of the deceased man.

Wayanad MP Gandhi had expressed shock at the "untimely demise" of Aji.

The CCTV visuals of the incident showed Aji and others trying to escape from the wild elephant and jumping into the compound of a house. However, the jumbo destroys the compound wall and chases the man.

Locals alleged that the elephant had crossed the Kerala border from Karnataka and reached Kuruvadweep locality near here early in the morning but the Forest department had failed to announce this and warn the people from venturing out.







Maxwell was also fastest to reach five centuries, touching the landmark in 93 innings, compared to Rohit's 143 innings.

Saxena grabs 9/68 as Bengal stare at second successive defeat

THUMBA (KERALA), Feb 11: Domestic cricket stalwart Jalaj Saxena destroyed Bengal with career-best figures of 9/68 as the visitors found themselves on the brink of a second successive defeat in the Ranji Trophy Group B here on Sunday.

U19 WC Final: Australia survive Limbani, Tiwary strikes to post 253/7 against India

BENONI (SOUTH AFRICA), Feb 11: Indian pacers Raj Limbani and Naman Tiwari struck timely blows but Australia still managed to post a competitive 253 for seven in the Under-19 World Cup title clash here

Quite understandably, Australia chose to bat first in a pressure match but their batsmen, except Harjas Singh who made a 55 (64b, 3x4, 3x6) could not build on the starts on a rather easy-paced pitch.

Limbani (3/38), who worked up a fair clip from the pitch, bowled opener Sam Konstas with a lovely in-coming delivery to deny the Aussies a quick start as they have done often in this tournament.

But the Australians found stability through Harry Dixon (42, 56 balls) and skipper Hugh Weibgen (48, 66 balls).

Dixon, in fact, started off in a blazing fashion, hammering left-arm pacer Tiwari (2/63) for 4, 6, 4 in the second over, but he settled into a more sedate rhythm in the company of Weibgen.

The hallmark of their second-wicket alliance that worth 78 runs in 18.1 overs, was the way they played the Indian spinners, a massive restrictive force throughout this showpiece.

There were no big hits but Dixon and



Weibgen managed to push the scoreboard forward with those singles and twos without taking any undue risks.

Just as the stand was coasting along, Indian captain Uday Saharan threw the ball to Tiwari, who was withdrawn after an expensive first spell.

Tiwari answered his leader's call in the perfect fashion getting rid of a set Weibgen, the hands of Musheer Khan at point.

The left-arm quick dismissed Dixon two overs later to bring India back into the game. The left-handed Aussie opener had to check his shot at the last minute as Tiwari's back-of-the-hand slower ball caught him in two minds, and Murugan Abishek completed a fine tumbling catch inside the circle.

The Aussies were 99 for three then. But

Harjas and Ryan Hicks (20) added 66 runs in 11.2 overs for the fourth wicket to keep their team's innings going.

Harjas, who till now averaged just eight in this event, looked to struggle early on as he made just five runs off the first 20 balls. But a six and four in successive balls off off-spinner Priyanshu Moliya gave him the much-needed confidence.

The left-hander was a transformed player from that point onwards and nullified the off-breaks of Abhishek with a series of sweeps and slog-sweeps, and two of them landed deep inside the stands for maximums.

Harjas completed his first fifty of the tournament with a four off Tiwari to long-off but failed to stay longer as another attempt to sweep left-arm spinner Saumey Pandey saw him getting adjudged leg-before.

Raf MacMillan too departed soon as the Australians were slipped to 187 for six, but Oliver Peake (46 not out off 43 balls) and Charlie Anderson (13) added precious 34 runs for the seventh-wicket.

Limbani, who seemed to struggle his hamstring in the latter stages of his spell, returned to dismiss Anderson but the Aussies still managed to reach a healthy total as they made 66 off final 10 overs. (PTI)
