'Nagaon, Dhubri poll results show foundation of Assam's social fabric weak'

### Nothing communal in 'our own' Gaurav's victory: CM Himanta

GOALPARA/GUWAHATI, June 6: Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma on Thursday claimed that the Lok Sabha election results in Nagaon and Dhubri seats pointed to the fact that the foundation of the state's social fabric was very weak.

Congress MLA Rakibul Hussain won the Dhubri seat by a record margin of over 10 lakh votes, while party MP Pradyut Bordoloi emerged victorious in Nagaon by 2,12,231 votes.

"The dangerous election results of Nagaon and Dhubri have again proved that the foundation of the social fabric of Assam is very weak... Rakibul Hussain won by over 10 lakh votes. What does this signify? It shows the danger in front of our society and 'jatiya jibon' (national life)," Sarma told reporters here.

"...You think about leading by over 10 lakh votes and not a single Hindu voted there; so how much is the danger in front of our social fabric?... This 10 lakh will become 12 lakh in next 10 years with 29 per cent growth of Muslim population," he added.

Sarma also claimed that Bordoloi, too, won from Nagaon with leads from Muslim-majority assembly segments in the seat, while the BJP took leads in all the Hindu-dominated legislative constituencies.

"Laharighat, Dhing, Rupahi and Samaguri (all Muslim-dominated seats) have made Congress victorious by 2-2.5 lakh margin (in Nagaon). So, if there is not some kind of resistance, the situation of Assam will be very dangerous," he added.

Hussain defeated sitting MP and AIUDF chief Badruddin Ajmal with an emphatic margin of 10,12,476 votes. The Congress leader polled 14,71,885 votes and the AIUDF chief managed 4,59,409 votes. "Ajmal could never win by 10 lakh votes. Rakibul Hussain winning by 10 lakh votes is a warning of a thunderbolt for our society, especially Lower, Middle and North Assam although it may be good news for the Congress. Nobody wins by such a margin even though it may be a good thing for him personally," Sarma said.

"Those who feel insecure in Dhubri constituency after the outcome of the result, we are with them... If there is no challenge from the BJP or people with nationalistic fervour, Assam will be washed away and nobody will survive," he claimed.

Addressing a press conference in Guwahati later during the day, the chief minister stressed that Ajmal and Hussain were only (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

### ASDC blames disunity among anti-BJP forces for election defeat

**DIPHU, June 6:** The Autonomous State Demand Committee (ASDC) has attributed its defeat in the Lok Sabha election from the 6th Diphu parliamentary constituency to disunity among anti-BJP forces.

"The main reason for the defeat of the anti-BJP elements this time is the arrogant attitude of the All Party Hills Leaders Conference (APHLC) and Congress, as both parties refused to come together to put up a

common candidate. Therefore, it is the APHLC and Congress who have inadvertently supported the BJP," said Jotson Bey.

Regarding what they can do to regain acceptance among the people, Bey said, "First, we have to inform the people of the damage done by previous leaders like Holiram Terang and former MP and CPI (ML) leader Dr Jayanta Rongpi. Rongpi has played very dirty poli-

ologies and principles to undermine the regional party ASDC.'

Bey alleged that Dr Rongpi was involved in massive corruption in the Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council and claimed that after he (Bey) became the chief executive member (CEM) of KAAC, corruption was curtailed. While people are blaming the present leader for the party's downfall, it was the CPI (ML) that injected poison into the ASDC. Bey also said that factions of ASDC were formally joined together into a single organisation in

### JD(U) wants Agnipath scheme to be reviewed: KC Tyagi



NEW DELHI, June 6: BJP ally Janata Dal (United) leader KC Tyagi on Thursday said his party has demanded a review of the Agnipath scheme and will "pursue" the caste census issue which, he asserted, was a need of the time.

He also said his party's support to the BJP was "unconditional"

"There is anger among voters on the (short-term army recruitment) Agniveer scheme. Our party wants those shortcomings to be removed, on which people have objections,' Tyagi told reporters here.

He said the JD(U) is not opposed to the Uniform Civil Code (UCC) but all stakeholders should be consulted on it.

"On the UCC, the chief minister (Nitish Kumar) had written to the Law Commission. We are not against the UCC. But there should be consultation with all the stakeholders, chief ministers, political parties and different sects, and a resolution should be found," he

Asked if his party will push for a caste census, Tyagi said, "No party in the country has denied a caste census. Bihar has shown the way, the prime minister also did not oppose... It is the demand of the time, and we will pursue it."

On its support to the BJP as a member of the National Democratic Alliance (NDA), he said, "There is no pre-condition, there is unconditional support. But it is in our mind and heart that Bihar should be given special status. After bifurcation, the situation Bihar has faced, it cannot be corrected without granting it special status.'

Support of allies like the JD(U) is crucial for the BJP as it could not reach the majority mark on its own in the (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

According to the latest report from the Assam State Disaster Management Authority (ASDMA), more than 1,29,500 people continue to be affected by the floods in Cachar, Hailakandi, Hojai, West Karbi Anglong, Karimganj, Morigaon, and Nagaon districts.

Nagaon remains the most severely affected, with over 55,000 people suffering, followed by Cachar (51,000), and Karimganj, where 11,000 people are grappling with floodwaters.

As of Wednesday, nearly 2.5 lakh people were impacted across eight

The total casualty count due to this year's floods, landslides, and storms has reached 34. Authorities are currently manag-

ing 78 relief camps across five districts, accommodating 16,947 people, and operating 25 relief distribution centres across the same

Over the last 24 hours, relief efforts have seen the distribution of 318.11 quintals of rice, 42.57 quintals of dal, 12.25 quintals of salt, and 1,912.9 liters of mustard oil among flood victims.

Presently, 293 villages remain submerged, and 5,702.1 hectares of crop areas have suffered damage across the state, as reported by ASDMA. Floodwaters have caused damage to embankments, roads, bridges, (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

JORHAT, June 6: Deputy leader of Congress in the outgoing Lok Sabha Gaurav Gogoi on Thursday described the parliamentary election results as an "insurance policy" that the people found against the alleged authoritarian politics of the BJP.

He also claimed that with the BJP failing to secure a majority on its own, its NDA allies would support the opposition INDIA bloc and vote against the saffron party on sensitive matters in Parliament. "People of India have found (in the election results) an insurance policy against the authoritarian politics of BJP," Gogoi said in an interview with PTI. The BJP was cut to size by the people in this election, the three-time Congress MP claimed.

"Prior to this, the BJP with absolute brute majority was able to bulldoze a lot of bills through the Parliament and standing committees. They will no longer be able to do that now, primarily

due to two reasons," he said. One reason is the BJP has to take the sensitivities of their NDA allies into consideration, Gogoi said.



"Concerns of the people of Andhra Pradesh, concerns of the politics of JD(U) will matter a lot more now. BJP leadership will have to take these into account if they form the government," the Congress leader said.

"The second feature of the insurance policy is the numbers of the INDIA aliance. We have strong enough opposition in the Lok Sabha to block any bill that violates the spirit of the Constitution, and on contentious issues, we will be able to convince certain allies of BJF to vote with their conscience and defend the Constitution," he said. Gogoi, who snatched the Jorhat seat in Assam from the ruling BJP by a margin of 1,44,393 votes, asserted that JD(U) and TDP are not staunch BJP allies.

"Often they have been on the opposite side of BJP and that's why I think people will have a much more different Parliament than in past 10 years," he added. On BJP losing in key seats across the country, Gogoi maintained that people voted with a lot of thought and deliberation on who their local representative should be.

"That is where BJP lost a trick. They were too over-confident, too arrogant and could not feel the pulse of the people," he said.

Congress was highlighting the issues of the people and was also careful with choice of candidates, he said adding: "I do find that in many seats it was not the candidate or the party, but the people who were fighting on the streets, people were fighting the elections. ### Petrol is much cheaper in defends price hike

GUWAHATI, June 6: Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma on Thursday defended the increased petrol and diesel prices which were hiked one day after the results of the Lok Sabha poll were announced.

Sarma asserted that fuel and diesel costs in Assam are at least ₹ 7 less per litre than those of opposition-ruled states like West

Effective from June 6, the Assam government raised the Value Added Tax (VAT) on petrol and diesel, resulting in a rise of ₹ 1.01 per litre for petrol and ₹ 1.02 per litre for diesel.

Following this, people voiced their disapproval at fuel pumps on the increase in the price of petrol and diesel. However, CM Sarma justified the state government's decision, claiming that Assam had significantly lower prices than other states.

"We brought down the price of petrol and diesel by ₹ 3 per litre prior to the Lok Sabha elections. However, we were forced to raise the costs by ₹ 1 because of the flood and other statewide issues," Sarma added.

According to him, despite this small hike, in comparison to Assam, Mamata Banerjee's West Bengal has far higher prices of petrol and diesel.

"Anyone who compares the cost of petrol and diesel in Assam and Bengal will find that the prices in Assam are cheaper by more than 7 rupees compared to West Bengal," Sarma stated.

#### China lodges protest against PM Modi's response to Taiwan President Lai's greetings BEIJING, June 6: China on Thurs-

day protested to India over Prime Minister Narendra Modi's social media statement that he looked forward to having closer ties with Taiwan, insisting that New Delhi should resist Taiwan authorities' "political calculations."

China views Taiwan as a rebel province that must be reunified with the mainland, even by force. Modi's remarks came in response to a congratulatory message from Taiwan President Lai Ching-te on his election victory. Lai, elected as Taiwan's President last month, in a message posted on X said: "My sincere congratulations to Prime Minister @narendramodi on his election victory. "We look forward to enhancing the fastgrowing #Taiwan-#India partnership, expanding our collaboration on trade, technology & other sectors to contribute to peace & prosperity in the #IndoPacific," Lai said.

In his reply posted on X, Modi



said: "Thank you @ChingteLai for vour warm message. I look forward to closer ties as we work towards mutually beneficial economic and technological partnership". Reacting to the messages, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Mao Ning said China has lodged a protest with India on this. First of all, there is no President in the Taiwan region, Mao said, when asked for her comments at a media briefing here.

"On this question, China opposes all forms of official interactions be-

tween Taiwan authorities and countries having diplomatic relations with China," she said. There is but one China in the world and Taiwan is an inalienable part of the territory of the People's Republic of China, she said. The One China principle is a universally recognised norm in international relations and the prevailing consensus, she said. India has made serious political commitments and should resist Taiwan authorities' political calculations, she said. "China has protested to India about this," she said.

Lai, 64, was sworn in as President of the estranged island of Taiwan last month after winning the Presidential poll. In his inaugural address on May 20, Taiwan President Lai called on Beijing to cease its intimidation of the self-ruled island after his Democratic Progressive Party (DPP), which has championed democracy in the face of years of growing threats from China, won. Key indices Sensex and Nifty had plunged by nearly 6 per cent on Tuesday due to below-expectation results of Lok Sabha polls. Investors lost a record ₹ 31 lakh crore in a single day due to market meltdown.

The indices recovered more than 3 per cent on Wednesday with NDA allies affirming their support to BJP to form the new government. In two days of gain, investor wealth has recovered by around ₹ 21 lakh crore. "The benchmark indices maintained their positive mo-

### Rupee falls 9 paise against US dollar

MUMBAI, June 6: The rupee depreciated 9 paise to settle at 83.53 against the US dollar on Thursday due to foreign capital outflows and rising crude oil prices in international markets.

Forex traders said a weak American currency and firm trend in the equity markets supported the local currency even as investors remained concerned ahead of the RBI's monetary policy decision to be an-

nounced on Friday. At the interbank foreign exchange market, the local unit opened at 83.40 and touched the intra-day low of

83.53 against the greenback during the session. The local unit finally settled at 83.53 against the American currency, down 9 paise from its previous

On Wednesday, the rupee settled 7 paise higher at 83.44 against the dollar.

According to Anuj Choudhary, Research Analyst at Sharekhan by BNP Paribas, the rupee depreciated due to a surge in crude oil prices and selling pressure from FIIs (foreign institutional investors). However, a weak US dollar and positive tone in the domestic markets supported the rupee at lower levels.

'We expect the rupee to trade with a slight negative bias on worries over rising crude oil prices, and as FIIs continue to sell in the markets. However, positive tone in the domestic markets as NDA is expected to come back to power for the third consecutive term, raising optimism over policy continuity may support the rupee at lower levels," Choudhary said, adding that USD-INR spot price is expected to trade in a range of ₹ 83.20 to ₹ 83.80".

Meanwhile, the dollar index, which gauges the greenback's strength against a basket of six currencies, was trading 0.03 per cent lower at 104.18.

Analysts attributed the weakness in the dollar index to a sharp fall in US Treasury yields after the latest data showed job growth in May was slower than estimated, raising expectations of an interest rate cut by the US Federal Reserve.

Market participants are likely to take further cues



from the weekly employment data and trade balance numbers to be released later in the day. Besides, the decision of RBI's rate-setting panel is likely to impact investor sentiment, they added.

The Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) of RBI on Wednesday started its three-day deliberations to decide the next monetary policy. Reserve Bank Governor Shaktikanta Das will announce the outcome on

"The Reserve Bank of India is set to keep its repo rate at 6.5 per cent at its June 7 review. The policy is turning more restrictive as cooling inflation pushes up real rates, hurting growth," said Amit Goel, cofounder and Chief Global Strategist at Pace 360.

He further said the RBI's record dividend payment of ₹ 2.1 lakh crore to the government for FY24 may alleviate concerns about the growth outlook.

Brent crude futures, the global oil benchmark, advanced 0.31 per cent to USD 78.65 per barrel.

On the domestic equity market, the 30-share BSE Sensex climbed 692.27 points, or 0.93 per cent, to close at 75,074.51. The broader NSE Nifty rose 201.05 points or 0.89 per cent to 22,821.40.

Foreign investors were net sellers of Indian equities on Thursday as they offloaded shares worth ₹ 6,867.72 crore on a net basis. (PTI)

symbolic as Muslims voted in one pattern across the state.

"Earlier AIUDF and Congress both used to get Muslim votes, but this time all votes shifted to the Congress. With around 90 per cent of polled votes of Muslims in Nagaon, Barpeta and Dhubri going to Congress, it has become a Muslim party," he added. The people from the Muslim community got all the benefits of different welfare schemes, but development was not on their agenda when they voted, Sarma alleged. He estimated that Muslims constitute about 40 percent of Assam's total population at present and they have become "completely polarised" towards one party.

"Due to Dhubri and Nagaon, Congress will not be zero in Assam for the next 100 years," he added. According to the 2011 Census, Assam had a total Muslim population of 1.07 crore, making up 34.22 per cent of the total 3.12 crore residents of the state. There were 1.92 crore Hindus in the state, around 61.47 percent of the total population. The CM, however, said there was "nothing worrying" about the victory of another Congress candidate and sitting MP Gaurav Gogoi from Jorhat as he is "our own" and there was nothing communal

"Today if the Hindu society votes in only one side, people allege that Hindus have done communalism. This election clearly proved that Hindus are not communal and there is a need to fight against communalism in the Muslim society," he added. Stating that someone will win and someone will lose in elections, Sarma said that changes in demography in Lower, Middle and North Assam have become "very dangerous"

"Every time after elections, people calculate what BJP, AGP or Congress won. But my calculations don't stop there. I believe that this election again reminded me of the impending danger in front of Assam's future,"

The CM also gave an example of Guwahati Lok Sabha constituency and claimed that out of 6,43,797 votes of the losing Congress candidate Mira Borthakur Goswami, around 2.2 lakh votes came from Muslim-majority areas of Kamrup district. "In Dalgaon constituency, Congress took a lead of 1.8 lakh votes. In Paka Betbari, Congress took a lead of 1.3-1.5 lakh votes. So, where is communalism? Who does communalism? If you go to a polling booth in a Hindu-dominated area, the votes are divided between BJP, Congress and AGP," he claimed.

The Assam CM claimed that the BJP-led NDA took a lead in 93 assembly seats, that too by huge margins, and it has never happened for any party in Assam. "In Guwahati, BJP and Congress both got votes. Jorhat proved that Assamese people are not communal, Hindus are not communal. Today, Congress won from a Hindudominated constituency, but has BJP won from a Muslim-majority seat?" he asked. Sarma, however, said BJP won from Karimganj as sitting MP Kripanath Mallah managed to retain his seat by just 18,360 votes with many Muslims voting for BJP due to some local issues with the Congress candidate Hafiz Rashid Ahmed Choudhury.

4.98 trillion) in two days. "With the poll-related uncertainty now almost over and the NDA ready to form the government, the mood remained upbeat for the second straight session as Sensex crossed the psychological 75k mark on the

back of a splendid all-round buying support. "With the buoyancy returning to the market, the fear gauge volatility index also eased considerably and fell 11 per cent," said Prashanth Tapse, Senior VP (Research), Mehta Equities Ltd.

Wednesday. The gains for tech stocks helped offset a 4.9 per cent drop for Dollar Tree, which matched analysts' expectations for profit but fell just shy for revenue. The retailer also said it's considering selling or spinning off its Family Dollar business

The broad retail industry has been highlighting challenges for lower-income US households, which are trying to keep up with still-high inflation.

Treasury yields fell in the bond market following some mixed data on the economy. One report said real estate, health care and other businesses in the US services sector returned to growth last month and beat economists' forecasts. Perhaps more importantly for Wall Street, the report from the Institute for Supply Management also said prices rose at a slower pace in May than a month before.

Another report suggested hiring slowed last month by more than expected at US employers outside the government.

Stocks had been shaky recently after reports suggested the US economy's growth is fading under the weight of high interest rates. Wall Street has actually been hoping for such a slowdown because it can drive down inflation and convince the Federal Reserve to deliver much-desired cuts to interest rates. But it also raises the possibility of overshooting and sending the economy into a recession, which would ultimately hurt stock prices. (AP)

### Being critical not anti-national: JNU VC at Tezpur University

**TEZPUR, June 6:** Tezpur University (TU) hosted a thought-provoking public lecture on 'National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 and Indian Knowledge Traditions', delivered by Prof Santishree Dhulipudi Pandit, noted academician and vice-chancellor (VC) of Jawaharlal Nehru University, on Thursday at the KBR auditorium of the University.

Prof Pandit's lecture delved into the synergies between the NEP and India's rich traditional knowledge systems (IKS). While doing so, Prof Pandit gave examples from both contemporary times and Indian traditions. "NEP focuses on a multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach, and the importance of this approach was evident during this election," the vice chancellor said. The exit polls predicted something, and the result was something else. This was because the human mind can't be predicted and requires a multidisciplinary approach, she said.

Taking a dig at the colonial mindset, the JNU VC said, "Knowledge is power, and narratives are created by controlling it. Due to the colonial mindset, we have formed an inferiority complex, and it is time through NEP the focus should be on ancient Indian wisdom. Giving examples of Ahom and Chola kingdoms, she said that earlier few would have come across the glory of these kingdoms.

Linking IKS and Science, Prof Pandit said that Indian tradition advocates respect for five elements, i.e., earth, water, fire, air, and space, without which nature takes its course. Prof Pandit pointed towards the rising temperature in India and climate change.

She then urged the august gathering to decolonise one's mindset to reimagine and reconstruct our knowledge. "Education brings inclusivity, and we should study locally to understand national and global phenomena," the VC said. She further added that the north-east being a diverse region has a lot to contribute to IKS. However, the VC emphasised that while exploring India's rich traditions, one needs to be critical, and critical does not mean anti-national. She urged the new government to increase expenditure on education and to empower publicly funded educational institutions.

Earlier, delivering the welcome address, Tezpur University VC, Prof Shambhu Nath Singh, said that the university shall continue this public lecture series by inviting distinguished speakers for greater academic engagement and intellectual discourse.



#### Naidu returns as kingmaker

n the present landscape of Indian politics, Chandrababu Naidu has emerged as a pivotal figure following the 2024 elections. Unlike the youthful Jana Sena founder Pawan Kalyan, Naidu is no 'Comeback Kid.' At his age, he embodies the title of 'Mr. Negotiator.' While the Jana Sena remains a part of the National Democratic Alliance (NDA), Naidu's Telugu Desam Party (TDP) and Nitish Kumar's Janata Dal (United) represent potential weak links. Naidu and Nitish Kumar share an unpredictability that poses a significant challenge to Prime Minister Narendra Modi. Their historical opposition to Modi's governance, coupled with their recent political maneuvers, keeps the political climate tense. Despite aligning with the NDA, their support is far from guaranteed, creating an air of uncertainty around the Modi 3.0 government. This unpredictability demands immediate concessions from Modi, particularly the long-sought special category status for Andhra Pradesh and Bihar. Naidu's political acumen dates to the mid-1990s when he played a key role in the United Front's quest to select a Prime Minister. The bifurcation of Andhra Pradesh in 2014 and the subsequent loss of Hyderabad to Telangana dealt a severe blow to Naidu's TDP. leading to a decade of economic stagnation under the leadership of Jagan Mohan Reddy's YSR Congress Party (YSRCP).

However, recent electoral successes have rejuvenated Naidu's political standing. Promising unwavering support to Modi, Naidu's assurances are met with skepticism. His crucial role in potentially securing Modi's third term as Prime Minister is underscored by the fact that the BJP lacks a majority in the Lok Sabha. Meanwhile, the opposition INDI-Alliance remains acutely aware of Naidu's significance. His past confrontations with Modi's governance style are frequently highlighted, emphasizing his potential to disrupt political equations. The INDI-Alliance, despite its slim chances of forming a government, persistently courts Naidu. His favorable relationships with DMK Chief MK Stalin and Shiv Sena (UBT) leader Uddhav Thackeray add to his strategic importance. Naidu's recent meeting with Stalin underscores his influential position, further complicating the BJP's calculations. The TDP's demands, including key ministerial portfolios and the NDA convener post, present a dilemma for Modi. The BJP's proposal of a Minister of State and Deputy Speaker's post may not satisfy Naidu, who seeks substantial concessions for Andhra Pradesh. The state's economic distress, exacerbated by the bifurcation, necessitates significant financial aid and special category status. Naidu's negotiating prowess is well-docu-

As Chief Minister of an agrarian state grappling with economic challenges, Naidu's demands are far from trivial. The state inherited a disproportionate share of the population, debt, and liabilities post-bifurcation, with only 47 percent of the revenues. Modi's need for TDP's support is critical, unlike in 2018. The stakes are high, with Naidu capable of influencing the Modi government's stability even before it takes full shape. As a seasoned negotiator, Naidu's strategies are expected to shape the political landscape in the coming months. Whether Modi can meet Naidu's demands or face political turbulence remains to be seen. Chandrababu Naidu's role in national politics post-2024 is indisputable. His ability to negotiate and his strategic alliances position him as a kingmaker. The Modi 3.0 government's fate, to a large extent, hinges on Naidu's future moves. As the political dynamics unfold, Naidu's actions will be closely watched, with farreaching implications for the NDA and Indian politics at large.

# 2024 verdict against Modi-Shah's politics of crony-capitalist Hindutva

RSS's Hindutva renais-RSS's Hindutva renaissance, did not respond to the call of the so-called Hindu Samrat. Narendra Hridaya Modi, and instead voted for 79year-old veteran Dalit leader, belonging to Pasi caste, Awadesh Prasad. In a single stroke, the voters of Ayodhya shattered two myths: Modi's consecration of Ram temple miserably failed to arouse Hindutva passion among the Hindus; and secondly, it also shattered the myth of Modi being the only face of Hindutva.

There is no doubt that this electoral battle was fought against the mighty saffron rule by the constitution-armed poor people of India. In the history of independent India, this has been one of the most significant battles. The people of India managed to send the message across that their voice could not be ignored; they cannot be dissipated for promoting the class interest of the comprador bourgeoise and crony capitalists.

People of India, especially the rural people all across the country, must be complimented for not falling into the provocative communal trap of Modi and continuing to maintain communal peace and harmony till the completion of the electoral procedure. This is also a sign of caution for the urban intellectuals and academics to refrain from treating the Dalits, poor and proletariats as naïve pawns

of the Hindutva project. Their candid rejection of Modi leadership nonetheless got reflected in their not responding to his slogan of "abki baar 400 paar," with the best retort coming from Ayodhya, the sanctum sanctorum of Hindutva. iwadi Party candidate, Awadesh Prasad. This defeat sends a very strong and urgent message to the protagonists of Hindutva.

Modi being handed over a much-diminished mandate does not merely underline that Modi myth has been shattered; it also underscores wider implications. Modi being cut-to-size has made it explicit that the Hindus of India are tired of his communal agenda. However, BJP's 241 seat margin also means that Modi's divisive politics. Yet, Verdict 2024

forces has occupied centre stage in Indian politics.

Since the 2019 victory, RSS and Modi have been trying to create an impression that Hindus are fully polarised and communalized and will go along with the BJP. This election results have completely negated that perception. There is little doubt that for winning the 2019 election, Modi and his saffron ecosystem had rode the ultra-nationalist wave in the wave of the killing of 40 CRPF soldiers. If that massacre had not happened, Modi would not have secured the landslide that he did in that election. People of the country still remember Modi seeking vote on the name of the killed soldiers

In this election, the people, particularly in the Hindi heartland, which is the BJP's core base, didn't see a Modi wave. The mask of nationalism and religion which the RSS and Modi have worn for long was disrobed this time. The common people, poor and proletariat had come to realise that this was merely a facade and it was meant to serve the interest of billionaires and crony-capitalists hovering up

This election also makes it clear that people are too willing to strike back; there should be someone to join shoulders with them. This was flawlessly done by Rahul Gandhi.

Reservation agenda occupied the centre stage in 2024 general elections, but it was more than that. The issue of Mandal and Kamandal had first surfaced during the rule of V P Singh. letariats such a fierce manner as is seen in the present times.

has numerous subdivisions. This was a major stumbling block in the path of spread of Hindutva. Almost 95 percent of the Indian population that fall under the categories of backward communities, Dalits, Tribals, minorities and economically weaker sections among the forward castes still do not have corresponding share of representation in professions.

Rahul Gandhi's remark is worth mentioning: "Political leaders stumble through their lives chasing power, spending every minute how to gain it, but without attaining clarity of political thought.

Every political person will have a political crystallisation but many will not gain such a crystallisation. I have got the clarity that I have to work to ensure representation for the 90% of our population. And this battle has to be fought with love, respect and strength. It is also true that the Congress party in the coming days will have to transform their politics.'

Modi is an insecure politician who suffers from both inferiority and a God complex. Modi claiming to be "not biological" but "sent by God" was the subject of utter ridicule all through, even among his own fan base. He in fact insulted motherhood in his pursuit to win the election. Clearly, all that has backfired.

Some experts and academics are trying to project the result as a setback and not as a defeat. They have also put out an interesting debate in public domain: Why do some Indians want Modi again? Who are the Indians who want him back? Evidently, it is the compulsion to protect the class interests that the rich, upper middle class and capitalists are projecting him as the saviour of new India.

The rightist forces strive for strong military and financial muscle. For them, true economic self-sufficiency and reducing the wealth gap would be anathema. BJP's cartelization of the economy is in conformity to the Hitler's political perception. A closer look at the character

of the Indian ruling class would make it abundantly clear that it has been basically rightist, who preferred a ruler of the iron-man image. The corporate class's dalliance with fascism is noth-

Hitler, Mussolini, among others, The rich and capitalists have primarily been opposed to the poor and proletariat. Ever since India achieved independence, the rich and capitalists have been using the state machinery to goad them and keep them under their control. Not allowing them to participate in election and exercise their right to vote has been the most effective instruments for the rich and capitalists.

It is worth mentioning that it was early seventies the assembly elections in Bihar along with some other states witnessed massive upsurge of the Dalits for exercising their democratic rights. Resurfacing of the Naxalite movement in Bihar owed to this. That year also witnessed large number of killings of Dalits and proletariats by the upper caste feudal landlords.

Since then, bloody clashes during the elections have become a common phenomenon. Recently, a Supreme Court bench observed that he had seen booth capturing, which was worse than alleged misuse of EVM. Unfortunately, Justice Khanna did not see the ground realities and was away from the truth. Booths were captured primarily for two reasons: first to exercise their electoral rights, and second to protect their right from, being usurped. It is something else that some political parties and their leaders resorted to booth capture for their personal gains. But in these cases too, it was the urge for power that worked.

Let me cite an example from Bihar. The CPI(ML) has won two seats. Arrah and Karakat. Both these areas had witnessed massive upsurge of peasant armed struggle in late sixties and early seventies. Hundreds of Naxal cadres were killed. For last couple of decades the areas have been witnessing the bourgeoise peace. An impression has been gaining ground that the movement and its gains have been lost.

But this time, the CPI(ML) candidates from these seats defeated political giants. One of them, R K Singh of BJP, a former home secretary of Bihar and senior Union Minister, who symbolised the upper caste power, got defeated from Arrah. The old support base had woken up and defeated Singh, the face of rightist old feudal forces.

lections often bring unexpected outcomes, our many true strength lies in its smooth transitions of power. With the latest results in and the victor declared, the focus shifts to fortifying democracy. For India to thrive, it needs both a stable government and a robust Opposition.

Following the seven-phase elections, the June 4 results suggest that Narendra Modi is set to continue as Prime Minister. Despite the efforts of the INDIA block, a coalition of regional parties, their chances remained slim. Election outcomes can be unpredictable, as seen in 2004 when the U.P.A. unexpectedly formed the government despite the B.J.P.'s "India Shining" campaign falling flat. Regardless of who wins, both the ruling party and the Opposition will face significant challenges. Modi has described his last decade in office as merely the beginning, promising more substantial actions in his third term. "Wait for bigger decisions in the third term. I'm already working on a roadmap that will be completed soon," he stated.

Modi's quest for a third term goes beyond cementing his legacy in every sector; it's a bold effort to outdo Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru's three-term record. This ambitious goal, however, faces hurdles such as shifting public opinion and the complexities of internal party politics, both of which could greatly shape the political

Despite the significant achievements of Modi's previous terms, his anticipated 'Modi 3.0' administration will face several challenges. Key among these are steering the nation through postpandemic recovery, tackling social unrest, handling complex foreign policy matters, and fulfilling the diverse expectations of the elec-

Modi still has several key issues from the BJP's core agenda to address. These include implementing a Uniform Civil Code, establishing

'one nation-one poll', advancing India to become the third-largest economy, and continuing to reform land and labour policies. In preparation for the next phase of governance, the Modi government has been developing a '125-day plan' over the past three months. Originally conceived as a 100-day plan, it was extended by an additional 25 days, with a particular emphasis on youth initiatives. This agenda is expected to encompass 50 to 70 key objectives, setting the direction and priorities for the new adminis-

Modi might undermine his opponents and possibly dismantle the Indian coalition, potentially reshaping India's political landscape. He advocates for synchronizing all elections nationwide, from local to national levels, under the 'one nation, one poll' initiative.

While this change aims to streamline and organize the electoral system, it could also centralize power within the ruling party and decrease the frequency of elections. Modi has already taken steps to advance this proposal. A committee led by former president Ramnath Kovind has recommended holding Lok Sabha and state elections simultaneously.

However, the delimitation process, which involves redrawing the boundaries of parliamentary and assembly constituencies, must follow the completion of the decennial census. This exercise could have significant political repercussions, particularly for the Southern

An affidavit submitted to the Supreme Court projects that delimitation will increase the number of Lok Sabha seats from 543 to 888 and Rajya Sabha seats from 250 to 384. Modi has made provisions for sufficient seating in the new Parliament building to accommodate these changes.

Due to the South's effective population control policies, its population has decreased, which could result in the Southern states losing at least 100 seats in the delimitation process. This shift may inten-

sify a North-South divide, sparking disputes among regional parties in the South

The BJP is advocating for a Uniform Civil Code to be applied to all Indian citizens, irrespective of their religion. Uttarakhand, under BJP governance, is moving forward with its implementation, with other BJP-ruled states expected to follow suit soon. However, this initiative raises concerns about possible social unrest and backlash from various religious communities.

Throughout the campaign, the Opposition voiced fears that the BJP might amend the Constitution to remove the term 'secular.' With a strong majority, a Modi-led government could potentially revise the Preamble to eliminate the words 'socialist' and 'secular,' which were introduced by the 42nd Amendment. However, this did not

Modi is steering India towards becoming the world's third-largest economy with his 'Viksit Bharat' agenda, emphasizing manufacturing, technology, infrastructure, and clean energy. However, challenges related to funding, implementation, and public acceptance could pose obstacles to its success, potentially shaping the political landscape in

Despite facing setbacks such as arrests and crackdowns, the Opposition managed to present its most united front in years. Nevertheless, exit polls suggest that they may not significantly diminish the BJP's parliamentary majority. Congress leader Jairam Ramesh asserts that the Opposition coalition will secure more than 272 seats and will decide on a prime ministerial candidate within 48 hours.

Should the Indian coalition succeed in forming a government against considerable odds, it could mark a pivotal transformation in India's political scene. However, it would encounter hurdles, including the selection of a Prime Minister and the implementation of its ambitious agenda. (The writer is a popular columnist & views are

ndia's latest GDP figures could not have come at a ■ better time for the ruling party BJP. As the final phase of parliamentary voting draws to an end, the GDP figures for 2023-24 at 8.2 per cent show a hefty growth rate of the Indian economy. If the BJP led NDA wins in the polls, which is the most probable event, the financial market could be predicted to soar high.

But what is the secret behind such rosy picture when the rest of the world is not doing too fine. China for one is sliding and beset with prospects of serious financial melt-down. America is of course unabashedly healthy and defying all prediction of a recession despite rounds of interest rate hike. However, the policy interest rates in the US remain very

To get an insight into the growth triggers for the Indian economy, it is important to look at the dynamics of changes in overall investments, the trends in final consumption demand, exports performance and the flow of funds from overseas.

Private final consumption is a major factor in the Indian economy, which amounts to around 60% of the GDP's expenditure side. It is thus the trend in this segment which basically sets the pace of the economy. In fact, a few years back some of the leading economists had pointed out that India's growth was overmuch dependent on the trends in private consumption and it was a unstable model, being described as a "single engine

There are subtle changes in the composition and triggers for the continuing strong performance of the economy. These trends show some happy dynamics which takes the economy out of a possible morass.



a stable base for future growth

is driven by investment. More particularly by public investment. Public investment, which is mainly government led investments in infrastructure building and in social capital, is driving the economy forward.

Public investment has grown close to 29% of GDP which is a healthy trend. This could be made possible by a number of factors including robust growth in collections of revenues and indeed the final revenue collections are in excess of budget estimates. The GST yields have persistently crossed Rs 1 lakh crore month after month. This has enabled the public finances in a comfortable sphere. The fiscal deficit remained at 5.6% despite step up in outlays.

The government finances have been further helped by a co-operating Reserve Bank. The central bank has transferred unprecedented high dividends to the government. The central bank has transferred Rs 2.11 lakh crore to the central government. Additionally, the large surplus earned by the public sector banks could also have pushed up the central government's expenditure plans, yet remaining within prudent fiscal parame-

Coming to the next trigger, the latest figures indicate that domestic consumption has continued to remain strong. Some of the high frequency figures indicate hectic pace of growth in certain segments like auto sales, housing loans, fuel consumption. These are mainly in the urban sector. In the rural segment the strength of demand remains somewhat depressed, despite forecast about normal monsoon this year.

Thirdly, the exports are picking up although rather slowly. Merchandise exports have come into positive territory from negative in the previous quarter. Imports are also rising indicating strong domestic demand. Services exports are of course buoyant, though some uncertainties have emerged with the emergence of newer AI

For the policy makers, namely RBI and the North Block, the situation is further comfortable because of the benign inflation situation. CPI inflation was at 4.8% in April 2024, lower than 4.9% in March 2024. It has trended downward since January 2024. The downward pressure emanates primarily from petroleum related commodity groups namely, fuel and light and transport and communication services.

Given the favourable overall background, the next government has its task cut out. The emphasis should be to maintain the tempo of the economy by utilising its buoyant resources for continuing with infrastructure building programmes. If these triggers are maintained, it will in due course spill over into larger private sector investments.

Private investments come when their capacity utilisation is up and showing a rising trend. The indications from the

business confidence surveys and other indicators show that the sentiments for larger private investments are turning positive. One can expect some significant pick up in private sector investments.

Indeed, Indian private investments as well as some large major private sector companies are all set to enter India. Taking advantages of the incentive schemes of the central government, more investors are feeling upbeat about India. Significant new beginning is expected in sectors like computer chip making and in semi-

conductors industry. Going is so far good, but it is important to take note of the observations of a technical nature. Some economists have pointed out that the GDP deflator, that is the way the statisticians try to eliminate the effects of rising inflation on the GDP figures to get a peek at the real GDP trends, has been rather lenient.

These economics feel that the GDP deflator used for calculating the final figures was too low for giving more weightage to the WPI inflation figures than the CPI numbers. The WPI trends have been very low and sometimes in the negative, while the CPI hovered around 5.4%. They question the use of WPI heavy delegator against the CPI led one. The former shows a far higher rate of growth than if CPI heavy deflator is used.

Nonetheless, leaving aside some of the technical issues. there is no doubt that the Indian economy is showing a bounce in its steps. The economy has shown remarkable resilience and recovered sharply in the post-COVID phase in a hostile global environment. Given these trends, one can safely predict the economy's pace to remain robust and the financial markets could show the same rising streak. (IPA Service)

### Narendra Modi's Should the Supreme Court have done more Pyrrhic victory

arendra Modi won an electoral victory on June 4, which can at best be described as a Pyrrhic victory. This term owes its origin to King Pyrrhus of Epirus whose army suffered irreplaceable losses while defeating the Romans in the Battle of Asculum in 279 BC.

Closer to our times and nearer home we have the turn of events after the Battle of Gangwana between the armies of the Marwar Rathores and the combined forces of Jaipur and its Mughal overlord led by Jai Singh in 1741. In this battle the imperial army of over forty thousand massed in a field at Kunchagaon near Pushkar with its fabled artillery guns lined up to force terms on the rulers of Jodhpur and

As it happened it fell upon Bakht Singh of Nagaur and his cavalry numbering about a thousand to take on the imperial forces. But that didn't deter Bakht Singh and his horsemen charged into the massed imperial forces and quickly punched through Singh's gun line.

Rathores through the Jaipur army, cutting down thousands of men. They lost most of their men but the huge toll extracted demoralised the Mughal forces. After this victory the imperial army soon disintegrated. Jai Singh never recovered his elan and died two years

The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) led National Alliance Democratic (NDA) might have won the 2024 elections but its apparently inexorable march towards establishing a Hindutva theocracy was halted by the combined formations committed to the letter and spirit of the Constitution

Hindi-Hindutva phalanx that threatened to overrun the federal character of India has been weakened. Most of all in its Gangetic heartland where the BJP led by the Modi-Yogi double engine train has been derailed by the youthful and educated duo

Rahul Gandhi. The results also cut Modi down to a more realistic size. He won in Varanasi in 2019 by 4.93 lakh votes only to have it whittled down to 1.52 lakhs yesterday. Ironically Rahul Gandhi won in Rae Bareli by over 3.9 lakh votes after being humiliated in another Gandhi craft addressing 206 ral-family bailiwick, Amethi, lies, making people like in 2019.

This represents a telling reversal of fortunes. Modi is irrevocably on the decline with both biological and historical times against him. His swagger at the BJP's "victory" meeting was visibly contrived and forced. He tried to weave his oratorical magic with his usual mix of hyperbole and half-truths but failed to enthuse the faithful.

For instance he claimed to have made India the world's second largest manufacturer of mobile phones. The truth in this is only skin deep. India now assembles ₹ 4.4 lakh crores of mobile phones but the value addition is only 16%, while China manufactures more than six times that with a value addition of almost 100%.

India exports as much diamonds and jewellery by its value addition is even lesser. India exports even more petroleum products (over \$70 billion), mostly from the Reliance refinery in Jamnagar but its value addition, hence the contribution to the national economy, is a thin sliver. These numbers are due to Modi's focus on the big and visible, but what is the national benefit?

Similarly, Modi highlighted the spruced up and long nosed Vande Bharat Express trains, but over 95% of passengers still travel in crowded and grimy trains piled up on each other usually without minimal facilities. But he tried to convince people that their lives had improved.

The perceived standard of living is a relative concept. How does a passenger in a typical second class bogie view the passenger zipping by in a plush Vande Bharat Express? I wrote here on April 17 that I don't see the Modi Express' going much further than the halfway mark. But the electronic media's relentless barrage of Modi positivism and their flood of concocted polls cooked Modi's goose by making over 400 the new norm.

Modi himself contributed to the high expecdismissing Rahul Gandhi to less than fifty. He accorded the same gracelessness to Akhilesh Yadav, M. K. Stalin, Mamata Banerjee and Tejaswi Yadav. They all fought back and whittled him down.

In the last 82 days Modi crisscrossed the country in his IAF Boeing 777 air-

lies, making people like me wonder if the country was running on auto-pilot? No political leader anywhere in the world spent so much time campaigning as Modi did in a decade.

A leader's post is akin to a pulpit which is meant to preach, convince and motivate. Modi instead used his platform mostly to hurl political invective on his opponents and rivals. When he spoke of achievements he hugely exaggerated. In the end more voters saw through him than believ-

Modi's political climb has been driven by such exaggerations but results yesterday tell us that the bubble has been pricked. By its own estimations the Modi led BJP fell short of its declared goal by over 150 seats (ab ki baar char sau paar).

The BJP seat tally diminished in all its dominant states and increased only in Orissa and Telangana. The BJP is still the largest party in Parliament, but it has been cut to size. Inside the party Narendra Modi too has been cut to size.

The BJP, which despite the malign influence of the RSS, used to have a vigorous inner party democracy with debate and discussion animating it, had been stifled for a decade. Modi ran it by diktat along with a bunch of faceless and callow aides who can no longer continue to do so.

The party now knows that the path is fraught with consequences. It may not revert back to the days of Vajpayee and Advani, but the days of Modi and Shah will become the days of Modi and Shah with Nitin Gadkari, Rajnath Singh and others speaking up. It might tone down his hubris with humility?

The new NDA will now be heavily dependent on the two most notorious political about-turn artists on the national stage: Nitish Kumar and Chandrababu Naidu. Both have raged and railed against Narendra Modi individually till the recent past.

The arithmetical balance (Janata Dal-United 12, Telugu Desam Party 16) requires them to function in tandem to upset the BJH applecart. It is difficult to see political events that will align their actions, but they will constantly be breathing down Modi's neck. That might force Modi to be a more conciliatory person. Which might not be a bad thing for the government? (Courtesy:

ooking back at the recently concluded Lok Sabha election cycle, the longest in ✓India's history, it is easy not to take notice of the role the Supreme Court has played in the conduct of the elections.

After all, the Supreme Court has adopted a hands-off approach in relation to almost all election-related cases that it heard in the last six weeks, deferring to the authority of the Election Commission of India.

However, the refusal to act in most cases impacted the election in significant ways.

There is no consensus among legal experts on whether the court's approach is desirable, especially in light of the alleged abdication by the Election Commission of its function to conduct the election in a free and fair manner.

Hands-off approach

In March last year, a five-judge Constitution bench of the Supreme Court had changed the process for appointment of election commissioners in order to secure their independence. The court had created a committee comprising the Prime Minister, the Leader of the Opposition and the Chief Justice of India to make appointments to the Election Commission until Parliament enacted a law on the subject.

However, in December, the Parliament passed a law that created a new committee to nominate members to the Election Commission comprising the Prime Minister, the Leader of Opposition and a Union Cabinet Minister – rather than the Chief Justice of India, as provided by the judgment.

Scroll had reported that this law went against the spirit of the judgment by bringing the matter of selecting election commissioners, which the judgment sought to shield from executive influence, back within the Centre's control.

This law was challenged in January this year. A two-judge bench of the court had refused to stay the law. In March, as per the new law, two new election commissioners were appointed by the Union government. Again, the appointments were challenged before the Supreme

However, the court refused to stay the appointments as well as the law on the ground that the Lok Sabha election was about to com-

In February, another five-judge Constitution bench of the Supreme Court had held the Union government's electoral bonds scheme as unconstitutional and quashed it. However, it decided the petitions challenging the scheme seven years after they had been filed. The bench had held substantive hearings in the matter only in October and November of last

The Supreme Court had refused to stay the scheme in 2021.

As a result of the court's delay in hearing the matter, the unconstitutional scheme had been in operation from 2018 onward. The ruling party at the Centre, the Bharatiya Janata Party, was the largest beneficiary of the scheme and could utilise the money it gained from the scheme on the current election, as well as the previous general election and all assembly elections since 2018.

On April 15, the Supreme Court rejected a petition seeking arrangements to be made by the Election Commission to enable internally displaced persons from Manipur settled outby setting up special polling booths in the states to which the displaced persons had

On April 26, the court dismissed pleas seeking the tallying of all Voter Verified Paper Audit Trail slips to verify votes cast through Electronic Voting Machines.

On May 14, it refused to entertain a plea petition seeking to disqualify Prime Minister Narendra Modi from elections for allegedly making hate speeches and invoking religion

On May 24, it declined to pass interim directions to the Election Commission to publicly release the booth-wise absolute number of voters amid the Lok Sabha elections. However, on May 25 the Election Commission ended up publishing the absolute number of votes cast in each parliamentary constituency during the first five phases of the election.

to ensure free and fair elections?

It only bucked its hands-off approach in one case, when on May 10 it provided interim bail to Delhi Chief Minister and Aam Aadmi Party national convenor Arvind Kejriwal in a money laundering case. In a first-of-its-kind verdict, the court allowed Kejriwal temporary bail only to campaign for the Lok Sabha election.

However, even here, the court failed to uniformly apply this principle. It rejected the interim bail applications of former Jharkhand chief minister and the working president of the Jharkhand Mukti Morcha party Hemant Soren and the AAP's Punjab MLA Jaswant Singh, both also arrested in money laundering cases. Both had sought to rely on the precedent of the bail granted to Kejriwal.

appointment law has been the Election Commission's failure to meaningfully act against BJP leaders' repeated poll code violations. This has been flagged by retired bureaucrats as well as a former Supreme Court judge while a recent study by the Cen-

tre for the Study of Developing Societies and Lokniti showed decreasing public trust over the functioning of the Election Commission.

'There was a strong case for staying the 2023 law and the installation of the present Election Commission since the law clearly breached the rationale of [the court's March 2023 judgment] that emphasised the need for an independent selection committee to ensure that independent commissioners are appointed," senior lawyer and writer Kaleeswaram Raj, who practices in the Supreme Court and the Kerala High Court, told

Raj had been part of the legal teams that successfully challenged the election commissioner appointment process in 2023 and failed to secure a stay on the subsequently passed law.

'The country had to pay a heavy cost due to the judicial indulgence shown," he said.

Constitutional historian and former bureaucrat SN Sahu, who served as press secretary to former President of India KR Narayanan and director in Prime Minister Manmohan Singh's office, told Scroll that the judiciary ought to have promptly intervened and taken action against BJP leaders for their communal appeals

"Securing the purity and integrity of the electoral process is not the sole duty of the Election Commission," he said. According to "other organs of the government, including the legislature, the executive and the judiciary also have key roles to play".

Rai agreed. "The role of the Supreme Court with respect to election has been highly disappointing," he said. He added that the court had clearly failed in carrying out its constitutional function as against the executive, Parliament and the Election Commission itself"

Should the judiciary have stepped in? Some legal experts, though, don't think that fill in the vacuum of effective regulation of the

"Article 324 of the Constitution of India squarely vests the superintendence, direction and control of elections with the Election Commission," Ritwika Sharma, senior resident fellow and lead at the legal policy think-tank Vidhi's Centre for Constitutional Law told Scroll.

"The Supreme Court has decided on the more principled issues concerning elections and electoral reforms," she continued. "But it has remained hands-off with respect to the more practical issues concerning the conduct of elections.'

Sharma warned that if model code of conduct violations begin to be taken cognisance of by the judiciary, they will enter the judicial process and get mired in inevitable delays.

"Scepticism concerning the independence of the Election Commission should not translate to placing a greater responsibility on the judiciary to address violations of the poll code, given how overburdened the judicial process s," she said.

Shubhankar Dam, chair professor of public

Portsmouth, agreed. "Courts don't want to, and shouldn't, micromanage elections,"

said. He added that "the text of the Constitution has never prevented Supreme Court from doing anything." Nevertheless, "the main reason

why it has chosen not to intervene in elections is its institutional limitations," he said.

Raj disagreed on this. "The hands-off approach has relevance only when the court's order interferes with an ongoing election," he said. "It is unconvincing when the court adopts such an approach when the direction sought for will, in no way, meddle with the polls.

"Article 324 contemplates functional autonomy for the commission," he emphasised. "It doesn't create any embargo in the power of judicial review of the Supreme Court, as long as the court doesn't stall an ongoing election.'

On the other hand, Sharma said that solutions must be sought from the Election Commission, given its vast repository of power under Article 324. She reminded that in the past as well, the commission had "taken stern action in case of violations of the model code of conduct, which it is fully empowered to do.

According to her, "despite the Election Commission not doing enough, or perhaps because of that, difficult questions must be asked of the government and the commission itself about how a free and fair election can be conducted.

"More than institutional mechanisms, public opinion could drive the Election Commission to introspect and discharge its functions responsibly," she said.

Dam offered a more cynical outlook. "I am sceptical as to whether there any good solu-

According to him, "it is a myth that the Election Commission has suddenly become craven to the government." He said that the model code of conduct has never been properly imposed in India and that the Election Commission "has always been influenced by the ruling party." "What has changed is the way in which hate speech is amplified due to social media," he said. "Today, the impact and potential for harm of hate speech is significantly higher.'

### Trump hangs like a Damocles' Sword over US-South Korea relations

'nder Biden's political leadership, the United States (US) reached out to its allies and partners with a reassuring slogan: 'America is Back'. The message was resoundingly meant to be for the Asia-Pacific where America's hub-and-spokes system of alliance has buttressed its reach and influence and had come under duress under the Trump administration. Both Japan and South Korea faced political pressure from the Trump administration. Trump's grand bargain included propositions of the US troop withdrawal from its allies, should they fail to pay more money for US deployment in their countries.

One of the pressing priorities of the Biden administration has been to reverse any doubt about America's alliance commitments alongside assuring its allies about its support. The attempt was to put the US diplomatic machinery back on the global map and dispel fears of American diplomatic and political retrenchment.

Under the Biden administration, there have been conscious efforts from Washington to allay fears of the US allies in the Indo-Pacific, of a self-centered America. South Korea is at the heart of that effort, along with other critical allies like Japan. It did not come as a surprise when President Biden invited leaders of both Japan and South Korea to Camp David in August last year. The purpose was twinfold: Assure America's two most critical allies in the Pacific of a common deterrence strategy against China and script a diplomatic détente between Tokyo and Seoul.

The US relations with South Korea, its treaty ally in Northeast Asia, suffered most under the Trump presidency, as diverging issues dictated the relations. Biden's Indo-Pacific outreach sought to assuage Seoul's concerns by working towards strengthening its presence and network in the Pacific theatre.

As the next US elections seem delicately poised with both Democrat and Republican possibilities equally alive, alarm bells are ringing again in Seoul as the fear of Trump coming back to power looms over bilateral and regional ties. Such apprehensions have raised an important question: What will be the future of US-ROK relations under the next US president?

**Allaying Seoul's fears** 

As US President Joe Biden and his political rival Donald Trump look to face off in two debates on 27 June and 10 September this year, Seoul will be keenly watching. Already, Trump's interview with the Time Magazine last month, in which he reiterated the issue of the US allies' military spending in the context of NATO and South Korea, has raised some



On the question, 'Would you [Trump] withdraw US troops from South Korea', Donald Trump replied, 'I want South Korea to treat us properly' and further added that 'We've [US] essentially paid for much of their military, free of charge. And they agreed to pay billions of dollars. And probably now that I'm gone, they're paying very little. I don't know if you know that they renegotiated the deal I made.' These comments have widened a trust gap for many in Seoul and is reminiscent of the sentiments which Trump evoked in 2019.

The Biden administration has rushed to put in place some strong structural measures to strengthen US-ROK relations so that they remains futureproof to leadership transitions in both countries. Fearing that the negotiations would again become a point of contention between Seoul and Washington, both countries fast-tracked the Security Measures Agreement (SMA) in January this year which will finalise defence cost-sharing for the 28,500 US Forces Korea (USFK) soldiers deployed in South Korea. Under the SMA, costs related to the Korean workers in the US Forces Korea (USFK), construction costs and other expenditures related to logistical support are included. The negotiation of the new

SMA two years before its expiration date in late 2025 points towards an understanding in both capitals that this may become an irritant in the ties should Trump assume the White House. The earlier SMA was signed in March 2021 for six years, with both sides agreeing on a 13.9 percent increase with an amount of USD 1.03 billion favouring South Korea as opposed to the 400 percent proposed under the Trump administration with some additional guarantees. ton and Seoul during Trump's tenure could be the issue of denuclearisation of the Korean Peninsula. If elected, Trump would likely adopt a markedly different approach towards the DPRK, thereby impacting the broader agenda of denucleari-

During his presidency, Trump created history by stepping onto North Korean soil and meeting with Kim Jong Un on three occasions. While these actions showcased Trump's unpredictability and unconventional diplomatic style, they also engendered distrust in South Korea and destabilised the strategic equilibrium in the region. Given that deterrence relies heavily on signalling and state behaviour, South Korea, reliant on US extended deterrence, found itself in a precari-

ous position. Indeed, more openness in engaging with Pyongyang from a Trump presidency could create dissonance between the two sides. If Trump wins, he is expected to engage with Kim Jong Un again and even accept the DPRK's condition to retain its nuclear weapons. This stance will likely create a fissure in the alliance and embolden section conservatives who support South Korea's nuclearisation.

Biden, through his Indo-Pacific policy and other regional policies such as a tripartite alliance between the US, Japan, and South Korea at Camp David and the AUKUS agreement has tried to restore the strategic balance in the Pacific. The Yoon-Biden period in bilateral leadership has focused on removing structural inconsistencies and infusing predictability in relationships. **Taiwan contingency** 

Since Trump left the White House in January 2021, positions on either side, in China and the US, have hardened on the issue of Taiwan. While the US Senate has proposed the Taiwan Policy Act of 2022 which seeks to overhaul the US's bilateral relationship with Taiwan, China's actions suggest that it may be working against a deadline towards invading Taiwan. These circumstances have left both the security balance of the Pacific in the doldrums: conventional and strategic.

The emerging competitive mix in the region has enforced a strategic dilemma on Seoul, one of choosing between its alliance commitments and the fear of entrapment with the US alliance against China. Although under President Yoon, South Korea has leapt forward by taking a clear position, emphasising the need to maintain peace and stability in the Taiwan strait, it has still not committed any combined assistance with the US in any

Taiwan contingency, in contrast to Japan. This will likely become a point of contention as the US plans to re-strategise its assets in the Indo-Pacific aimed at deterring China. If Trump wins, the role of USFK apropos Taiwan will take centre stage shifting the alliance focus from North Korea to China.

In a recent interview, Elbridge Colby who occupied a senior position in the Trump administration voiced this opinion, even as he expressed the need to 'overhaul the USFK to China-related contingencies' rather than just North Korea. This has generated a debate among South Korean strategic experts concerning the importance of self-defence and having a re-look at the US-ROK alliance. Its historically complicated relationship with Japan has not been particularly helpful in providing strategic clarity to Seoul.

Trump and some of his decisions in dealing with South Korea like his revision of the Korea-U.S. Free Trade Agreement (KORUS) loom large, even as Trump maintains a lead over Biden in election polls and fundraising. On the contrary, the Biden administration will bet on stability in US-ROK relations under the next Democratic presidency given some of the groundwork in this direction in the last four years, most profoundly in the areas of tech-cooperation. 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### The sun rises over Normandy's beaches on D-Day's 80th anniversary

on the D-Day generation, it rose again over Normandy beaches where soldiers fought and died exactly 80 years ago on Thursday, kicking off intense anniversary commemorations against the backdrop of renewed war in Europe, in Ukraine.

Ever-dwindling numbers of World War II veterans who have pilgrimaged back to France, and Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine that has dashed hopes that lives and cities wouldn't again be laid to waste in Europe, are making the poignant anniversary of the June 6, 1944, Allied landings even more so 80 years on.

As now-centenarian veterans revisit old memories and fallen comrades buried in Normandy graves, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy's presence at D-Day commemorations with world leaders who are supporting Ukraine's fight against Russia's invasion — including United States President Joe Biden — will inevitably fuse together World War II's awful past with the fraught present on

The break of dawn almost eight decades exactly after Allied troops waded ashore under hails of gunfire on five code-named beaches — Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno and Sword — kicked off a day of remembrance by Allied nations now standing together again behind Ukraine and with World War II ally Russia not invited by host France. It cited Russia's "war of aggression against Ukraine that



has intensified in recent weeks" for the

With the dead and wounded on both sides in Ukraine estimated in the hundreds of thousands, commemorations for the more than 4.400 Allied dead on D-Day and many tens of thousands more, including French civilians, killed in the ensuing Battle of Normandy are tinged with concerns that World War II lessons are being lost.

"There are things worth fighting for," said World War II veteran Walter Stitt, who fought in tanks and turns 100 in July, as he visited Omaha Beach this week. "Although I wish there was another way to do it than to try to kill each other." "We'll learn one of these days, but I

won't be around for that," he said. Conscious of the inevitability that major D-Day anniversaries will soon take place without World War II veterans, huge throngs of aficionados in uniforms and riding vehicles of the time, and tourists soaking up the spectacle, have flooded Normandy for the 80th anniversary.

"It's so historic and we just have to remember the sacrifices of everybody who gave us our freedom," said Becky Kraubetz, a Briton now living in Florida whose grandfather served with the British Army during World War II and was captured in Malta.

"It gives you goosebumps, everything that happened here. Imagine just jumping into the water, freezing cold," the 54-yearold said as she gazed across the English Channel, tears in her eyes. "The bravery, the courage, for people to face that is just unbelievable — very, very humbled to be

She was among a crowd of thousands of people that stretched for several kilometers (miles) along Utah Beach, the westernmost of the D-Day beaches. In a quiet spot away from the official ceremonies, France's Christophe Receveur performed his own tribute, unfurl-

ing an American flag he had bought on a trip to Pennsylvania to honor those who died on D-Day. "To forget them is to let them die all

over again," the 57-year-old said as he and his daughter, Julie, then carefully refolded the flag into a tight triangle, adding that those now dying in Ukraine fighting the invading Russian army were also on

"All these troops came to liberate a country that they didn't know for an ideology - democracy, freedom - that is under severe strain now," he said. (AP)

### Israeli strike kills at least 33 people at Gaza school the military claims was being used by Hamas

**DEIR AL-BALAH, June 6:** An Israeli strike early on Thursday on a school sheltering displaced Palestinians in central Gaza killed more than 30 people, including 23 women and children, accord-

ing to local health officials. The Israeli military said that Hamas militants were operating from within the school.

It was the latest instance of mass casualties among Palestinians trying to find refuge as Israel expands its offensives in the Gaza Strip. A day earlier, the military announced a new ground and air assault in central Gaza, pursuing Hamas militants it says have regrouped there.

## EU elections across 27 nations

**THE HAGUE, June 6:** Polls opened in the Netherlands on Thursday to kick off four days of voting in European Union parliamentary elections across the 27 member states that are expected to deliver gains for the hard right.

Estonians can cast their ballots across six days that started on Monday, but the Netherlands is the only EU country to start its single-day vote so early, followed by Ireland on Friday and the rest of the EU nations over the weekend. Europe-wide results will be announced Sunday night after all member states have completed voting.

The Dutch voting comes six months after Geert Wilders' far-right Party for Freedom sent shockwaves around Europe by becoming the biggest party in the Dutch national parliament. Polling suggests Wilders will build on that popularity and set the tone for much of the

Since the last EU elections five years ago, populist, far-right and extremist parties are leading governments in three EU nations, are part of governing coalitions in several others, and appear to have surging public support across the

The EU elections are the world's second-biggest exercise in democracy behind the election in India, and the stakes (AP)

Almost 400 million voters will be electing 720 members of the European Parliament from beyond the Arctic circle to the edges of Africa and Asia. They will have an impact on issues ranging from global climate policies and defense to migration and geopolitical relations with China and the United

Since the last European elections in 2019, war has broken out on the fringe of Ukraine, a country that desperately wants to join the EU.

A founding member, the Netherlands was long unwavering in its support of EU policies. Research from the Clingendael think tank, though, suggests dissatisfaction with the EU among Dutch people, and that while most believe that the Netherlands should remain in the bloc, many also believe it should be more self-sufficient.

While many voters are predicted to lurch to the right, the Christian Democrat-dominated European People's Party led by European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen, is currently the EU legislature's biggest bloc and is bound to be the coalition kingmaker when the dust settles on the elec-

### Netherlands kicks off 4 days of Yemen's Houthi rebels unveil solid-fuel 'Palestine' missile that resembles Iranian hypersonic

DUBAI, June 6: Yemen's Houthi rebels have unveiled a new, solidfuel missile in their arsenal that resembles aspects of one earlier displayed by Iran that Tehran described as flying at hypersonic

The rebels fired its new "Palestine" missile, complete with a warhead painted like a Palestinian keffiyeh checkered scarf, at the

southern Gulf of [ Aqaba port of Eilat in Israel on Monday. The attack set off air raid sirens but caused no reported damage or iniuries.

Footage the leased by Houthis

Wednesday showed the Palestine being raised on what appeared to be a mobile launcher and rising quickly into the air with plumes of white smoke coming from its engine. White smoke is common with solid-fuel missiles. Solid-fuel missiles can be set up

and fired faster than those contain-

ing liquid fuel. That's a key concern for the Houthis as their missile launch sites have been repeatedly targeted by US and allied forces in recent months over the rebels' attacks on shipping through the Red Sea corridor. One such strike hit the Houthis even before they were able to launch their missile.

For their part, the Houthis described the Palestine as a "locally made" missile.

However, Houthis are not known to possess the ability to manufacture complicated missile and guidance systems locally in Yemen. the Arab world's poorest country,

gripped by war since the rebels seized the capital, Sanaa, nearly a decade ago. The Houthis have, however, been repeatedly armed by Iran during the war despite a United Nations arms embargo. While Iran claims it doesn't arm the Houthis. ships seized by the US and its allies have found Iranian weaponry, missile fuel and components on board. Iranian media reported the launch of the Palestine and described it as locally manufactured, citing the Houthis. However, design elements on the missile resemble other missiles developed by Iran's paramilitary Revolutionary Guard. That includes one called the Fattah, or "Conqueror" in Farsi.

Iran unveiled the missile last year and claimed it could reach Mach 15 — or 15 times the speed of sound. It also described the missile's range as up to 1,400 kilometers (870 miles). That's a little short of Eilat from Houthi-controlled areas of Yemen, but missile can be reconfigured to boost their range. In March, Russia's state-run RIA Novosti news agency quoted an anonymous source claiming the Houthis had a hypersonic missile. "While we cannot say for sure what exact version the Palestine' corresponds to, we can say with high certainty that is is an advanced and precision-guided (Guard)-developed solid propellant missile provided by Iran," wrote Fabian Hinz, a missile expert and research fellow at the International Institute for Strategic Studies. ### The UN says a quarter of the world's children under 5 have severe food poverty. Many are in Africa

KALTUNGO, June 6: The 9-month-old twins cried nonstop and tugged at their mother, seeking attention but also food. They had received little in the past 24 hours, and there were signs of deeper hunger in the heads too big for their tiny bodies.

"Not much milk comes out," said their 38-year-old mother, Dorcas Simon, who struggles to breastfeed and has three other children. She laughed, as if to conceal the pain. "What will I give them when I don't have food myself?"

Here in northern Nigeria, where conflict and climate change have long contributed to the problem. her twins are among 181 million children under 5 or 27 per cent of the world's youngest children - who live in severe food poverty, according to a new report Thursday by the UN's children agency.

The report, which focused on nearly 100 low- and middle-income countries, defines severe food poverty as consuming nothing in a day or, at best, two out of eight food groups the agency recognises. Africa's population of more than 1.3 billion people is one of the most affected mainly due to conflict, climate crises and rising food prices.

The continent accounts for one-third of the global burden and 13 of the 20 most affected countries. But it has also recorded some progress, the report said. The percentage of children living in severe food poverty in West and Central Africa fell from 42 per cent to 32 per cent over the last decade, it said, noting advances including diversified crops and performance-based incentives for health workers.

In the absence of vital nutrients, children living

with "extremely poor" diets are more likely to expe-

rience wasting, a life-threatening form of malnutri-

tion, the agency known as UNICEF said.

the northeast where Simon lives, UNICEF is training

thousands of women in how to boost their families' nutrient intake with cassava, sweet potato, maize, millet and vegetables grown in gardens at home, and how to rear livestock and chickens. More than a dozen women gathered this week in

Kaltungo's Poshereng village to learn dozens of recipes they can prepare with those foods which, in the absence of rain, are grown in sand-filled sacks that require little water.

Mothers in Nigeria also face the country's worst cost of living crisis. Growing food at home saves

Aisha Aliyu, a 36-year-old mother of five, said her latest child "used to be skinny but is growing fatter" because of what they now grow at home. Hauwa Bwami, a 50-year-old mother of five, nearly lost her grandchild to kwashiorkor, a disease with severe pro-

tein malnutrition, before the UNICEF training started a year ago. Now she grows enough food that she sells to other women.

Kaltungo is in a semi-arid agricultural region where climate change has limited rainfall in recent years. Some children have died of acute malnutrition in the past because food is scarce, said Ladi Abdullahi, who trains the women.

The training "is like answered prayers for me," Simon said in her first time with the group. But it can be a painful lesson. Another trainee, Florence Victor, 59, watched helplessly as her nine-month-old grandchild succumbed to malnutrition in 2022.

Malnutrition also can weaken the immune system over time, leaving children vulnerable to diseases that can kill.

In the Sahel, the semiarid region south of the Sahara Desert which is a hot spot for violent extremism, there has been an increase in acute malnutrition worse than severe food poverty — that has reached emergency levels, said Alfred Ejem, senior food security advisor with the Mercy Corps aid group in Africa. Because of displacement and climate change, families have resorted to "bad coping mechanisms like eating leaves and locusts just to survive," Ejem said. In conflict-hit Sudan, children are dying of se-

vere malnutrition in large numbers. In Nigeria's troubled northwest, the French medical organisation Doctors Without Borders said at least 850 children died last year within 24 to 48 hours of being admitted to its health facilities.

"We are resorting to treating patients on mattresses on the floor because our facilities are full," Simba Tirima, MSF's Nigeria representative, said on Tuesday.

## NIA arrests key accused in conspiracy to exacerbate violence in Manipur



**NEW DELHI, June 6:** The National Investigation Agency (NIA) on Thursday arrested a key accused from Imphal airport in a case relating to a transnational conspiracy by insurgents and terrorist outfits to exacerbate violence in Manipur and spread terror in the northeastern state.

Thongminthang Haokip alias Thangboi Haokip alias Roger, a member of Kuki National Front-Military Council (KNF-MC), has been arrested under various sections of Indian Penal Code and the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act in a case registered suo motu by the NIA on July 19 last year, the NIA said in a statement.

"The conspiracy had been hatched by Kuki and Zomi insurgents backed by terrorist organisations based in the northeastern states and in neighbouring Myanmar with the aim to exploit the current ethnic unrest in the region and wage war against the government of India through violent attacks, as per NIA investigations," it said.

The accused was found to have been involved in attacks on security forces at various places during the ongoing insurgency and violence, said the statement.

Front-Burma (KNF-B) of Myanmar, for logistics support to aggravate the volatile situation in the state of Manipur and create terror in the minds of the people, it said.

DIMAPUR, June 6: With regard to the unfortunate demise of three IRB personnel from Nagaland during election duty recently, the Rising People's Party (RPP) demanded that the state government releases ex-gratia payments within 10 days after the counting process.

According to the ECI directive, ex-gratia payment amounting to Rs. 15 lakhs per deceased personnel/polling officers etc., should be paid on or before June 14 by the state government, the RPP said in a statement on Thursday. In 2019, a "token representation" of just one berth had been turned down by Nitish Kumar

JD(U) sources said the party is keen on portfolios such as railways, rural development, agriculture, water resources and heavy industries.

Among the frontrunners for ministerial berths in the party include its Rajya Sabha MP Sanjay Jha, Rajiv Ranjan Singh 'Lalan', Kaushalendra Kumar, Ramprit

Mandal and Lovely Anand, they said. Earlier in the day, party leader K C Tyagi told re-



## Water levels drop nationwide, southern region hit hardest

**NEW DELHI, June 6:** The monitoring data from 150 main reservoirs revealed a total live storage of 39.765 billion cubic meters (BCM), which constitutes just 22 per cent of the total live storage capacity of these reservoirs, according to official data.

Last week, the total capacity was 23 per cent of the storage capacity of these reservoirs. As the temperature rose, a week-on-week decline has been seen in the reservoir level for the past three months

The southern region continues to be hit hard at just 13 per cent ca-

The region, including Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Karnataka, Kerala, and Tamil Nadu, has 42 reservoirs with a total capacity of 53.334 BCM. The current storage is alarmingly low at 7.114 BCM (13 per cent), significantly down from last year's 23 per cent and the ten-year average of 19 per

The Central Water Commission (CWC) released its weekly reservoir bulletin on Thursday, according to which there is a total live storage of 39.765 BCM, which constitutes just 22 per cent of the total live storage capacity of these reservoirs.

The total live storage capacity of the monitored reservoirs is 178.784 BCM, approximately

#### Why civic chief was not suspended for 'inaction'?: HC

Rajkot fire tragedy AHMEDABAD, June 6: The Gujarat High Court on Thursday came down heavily on the state government over the Rajkot game zone fire that killed 27 persons last month, and sought to know why the then chief of the local civic body was not suspended for not taking action against the facility that was being run without permis-

The high court expressed anger after learning that though a demolition notice was served to the TRP Game Zone, where the devastating fire took place on May 25, by the Rajkot Municipal Corporation (RMC) in June last year, no action was taken for one year against the facility by the civic body, whose commissioner was Anand Patel at

During a hearing held on Thursday, RMC's lawyer G H Virk, through an affidavit, informed the court that no periodic checks were carried out by the RMC's fire department at the TRP Game Zone and there was no compliance of the safety measures in accordance with the Fire Safety Act.

It was also revealed during the hearing that the game zone owners never applied for any fire NOC and the facility was running without any police permission, which is mandatory under section 33(w) of the Gujarat Police Act.


The court was also apprised of the RMC's Town Planning Department knew about the illegal structure and a notice for demolition was given in June 2023. Prior to that, a notice was also given in April 2023 to remove the unauthorized construction under the provisions of the Municipal Corporation

"So you fired the Town Planning Officer. But why was the then municipal commissioner not suspended? The responsibility lies at the top. A demolition order was passed in June 2023. Then what happened after that? You rested in peace till 27 lives were lost. You did nothing for one year," said Jus-

tice Vaishnav. He even asked why Indian Penal Code (IPC) section 302 (murder) should not be invoked against IAS officer Patel, who was the commissioner at the time of the incident and then transferred without a posting by the state government.

In the RMC's defence, Virk told the bench that Patel was unaware of the unauthorised structure because fire officers of the RMC never marked any communication regarding the game zone to Patel ever since it came up on a piece of land in 2021.

General Kamal Advocate Trivedi assured the bench that action will be taken once the state government-appointed Special Investigation Team (SIT) submits its final report. (PTI)

In the eastern region, which includes Assam, Jharkhand, Odisha, and West Bengal, the 23 reservoirs monitored have a capacity of

The bulletin also gave a detailed analysis, noting that better than normal storage is found in basins such as the Ganga, Brahmaputra, Narmada, and Sabarmati.

Close to normal storage is observed in the Indus, Godavari, and other rivers. Deficient storage is reported in the Mahanadi, Krishna, and Cauvery basins.

Highly deficient conditions prevail in the east flowing rivers between Pennar and Kanyakumari, and between Mahanadi and Pen-

Out of the 150 reservoirs, 47 have more storage than the last year, while 59 have storage levels above the ten-year average. Conversely, 19 reservoirs have

**NEW DELHI, June 6:** The extensive campaigning tours and related events undertaken by Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal indicate that he does not appear to be suffering from any serious or "life threatening" ailment, a Delhi court has held while denying him interim

In yet another setback to Kejriwal, the court on Wednesday dismissed his application for interim bail on medical grounds in the money laundering case linked to the alleged excise policy scam, as reported by the PTI.

The extensive campaigning tours and related meetings/events undertaken by Arvind Kejriwal as highlighted during the course of arguments indicate that he does not appear to be suffering from any serious or 'life threatening' ailment so as to entitle him to the benefit," Special Judge Kaveri Baweja said.

### Ghatkopar hoarding was installed on weak foundation: Report

#### Billboard collapsed in Ghatkopar could withstand a wind speed of only 49 kmph

MUMBAI, June 6: A hoarding that collapsed in Mumbai last month claiming 17 lives was installed on a weak foundation, as per a report submitted by a technological institute to police, officials said on Thursday.

While ideally any hoarding structure in the city should be able to withstand wind speeds of 158 kilometres per hour, the billboard that collapsed in Ghatkopar could withstand a wind speed of only 49 kmph, according to the report submitted on Wednesday.

On the day of the incident, the wind speed was 87 kmph, an offi-

As many as 17 persons died and 74 others were injured after the illegal hoarding, measuring 120 feet x 120 feet in size, crashed onto a nearby petrol pump during a dust storm and unseasonal rains here on

May 13, as per officials. After the tragedy, the Brihamumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) asked the Veermata Jijabai Technological Institute (VJTI) to find out reasons behind the hoard-

ing crash. The institute on Wednesday sub-



mitted the report to the Mumbai crime branch, which is probing the hoarding collapse incident, a senior police official said.

"The hoarding was installed on an inadequate and a weak foundation," the official said citing the report. Technical experts of of VJTI had collected samples of the foundation and piling of the structure after the incident, he said.

"Considering the withstand capability of the hoarding, it establishes that it was deliberate negligence on part of the persons concerned (accused) and not an act of God," the official told PTI. Bhavesh Bhinde, director of an advertising firm which had installed the hoarding, was arrested

after the incident. The accused had opposed his arrest saying the high velocity of the wind that led to the hoarding collapse was an "act of God" and was not in his control.

A Special Investigation Team (SIT), probing the hoarding collapse, had arrested Bhinde and structural engineer Manoj Sanghu, empanelled by the BMC, who had given a stability certificate to the

A former director of the advertising firm, Janhavi Marathe, is also an accused in the case and search for her is still underway, the

A Mumbai court on May 31 reected Marathe's anticipatory bail

While Marathe claimed she was "merely a signing authority" in the hoarding contract, police told the court she had "direct and active" involvement in the construction of the collapsed structure.

Engineer Sunil Dalvi, who had been posted in the BMC's N-ward (in which the incident area falls), has also been questioned by the crime branch's SIT in connection with the incident, the official said.

He was in-charge of the civic body's hoarding department and it was his duty to take action against illegal hoardings, he said.

He had issued a notice to Government Railway Police (GRP) for installing the illegal hoarding in Ghatkopar, but withdrew it later, the official said, adding the same billboard collapsed on May 13. (PTI)

Aaryan, one of the top stars in the industry today, said a film's mathematics should add up at the end of the day. "There are so many rights of a film when it releases. So you get an 'x'

amount of money out of it. If your star value and the entire project's value gives profit to the entire team, I think then the math adds up. If it doesn't, then you have to, you should take a cut... It's a healthy discussion," Aaryan told PTI in an interview here.

Khan, known for directing big budget blockbusters such as "Ek Tha Tiger" and "Bajrangi Bhaijaan", both starring Salman Khan, said this discussion has been prompted by the shift in industry dynamics after the pandemic.

"It's a healthy debate and it's getting a positive response from actors. directors, and producers. The audiences, their viewing patterns changed, their habit of coming to theatres got diminished. So there was this whole debate about that if that's diminishing, what are the other avenues where we can earn money from?

### Made every effort to pitch ball on scrambled seam but it was swinging so much: Arshdeep

NEW YORK, June 6: Pacer Arshdeep Singh said he only focussed on sticking with his plan even as controlling the ball on the drop-in pitch in cloudy conditions was a big task for India quicks in their eight-wicket win against Ireland, in their T20 World Cup openeer here.

Though India had an easy outing at the Nassau Country Stadium on Wednesday, dismissing Ireland for 96 in 16 overs and overhauling the target in 12.2 overs, Arshdeep conceded that controlling the swing was an onerous task and he banked on team-mate Jasprit Bumrah's advice to overcome the issue.

"I made every effort to pitch the ball on the scrambled seam but the ball was swinging so much that it was hard to get it on the scrambled seam. Yes, there were a lot of wides from me," conceded the left-armer, who bowled five wides but also took the prized wickets of openers Andy Balberine and skipper Paul Stirling in the third over.

"Jassi bhai (Bumrah), with his loads of experience, keeps telling us not to go after wicket. Just keep it simple, keep bowling in the right areas and whatever result comes it's good... whether you are able to stop the flow of runs or get wickets," said Arshdeep during the post-match press conference.

"Control means one should not get greedy, not to go after getting wickets. It was cloudy and the ball was swinging. At the start, the plan was to take advantage of that by bowling in the right areas and if they (Ireland) take risks then fine, but it will also give us better a chance to take wickets," the left-armer

"The plan was to keep it simple and aim straight for the wicket to get more LBWs, clean bowled and caught-behind decisions, keep all the options open. And, if they go for a big slog or try going down the wicket, then it's okay, but yeah we will keep



bowling the same way." With the pitch here becoming a hot topic of debate because of below-par scores, Arshdeep said for a bowler like him, he would rather focus on his process rather than look at the scoreboard.

"I guess, as bowlers, we back ourselves to defend anything and we make every effort to ensure whatever be the score that is our par score. (We) follow the

process and not look too much at the scoreboard.

"I have come here after playing the IPL, where 240 were par scores. When we talk about pitches, the main focus is what we can control because the pitch is the same for both teams. So, whichever team applies better and bowls better lengths will get better results." Arshdeep also denied there

were talks in the dressing room regarding not going all out in the outfield in order to avoid

'No, nothing of this sort has been talked about. When the competition is on, you don't think what sort of conditions there are. If there is a catch to be taken, you have to put your body on the line. We don't think too much on those lines. The effort is to put as much preparation as possible, and that is what gives success.

The lanky pacer said the team would approach the match against Pakistan here on Sunday in the same manner.

"It's the same. Any team that is in front of you nothing changes. Our process remains the same, length will remain the same. As far as planing goes, we have to see what batter plays well in which position. It dosen't matter what team is playing against you, we only think how best we can perform and give our best," he said. NEW YORK, June 6: India will continue with wicketkeeper-batter Rishabh Pant at No. 3 in the T20 World Cup following his gritty performance against Ireland, said batting coach Vikram Rathour, who also expressed his delight at having a fully-fit Hardik Pandya back in the fold.

Both Pant and Pandya, who returned to top-flight cricket in the IPL, are making a comeback to international cricket after a long gap.

The duo delivered the goods in India's eight-wicket thrashing of Ireland in their opening game here on Wednesday.

On a challenging pitch with uneven bounce, run-scoring was difficult but Pant unleashed a few stunning shots, including a reverse-scoop over the Irish wicketkeeper's head for a match-winning six in his unbeaten 36.

The Ireland match was Pant's first game for India since December 2022 when he was involved in a horrific car accident.

"Yes, he has been batting really well. The two games (warm-up and Ireland) he has played, he has looked really, really good,"



Rathour told the media after the match here at the Nassau County Cricket Stadium.

"Yes, at the moment he is our No. 3 and it helps that he is a lefthander," Rathour added, in a way cementing the combination of skipper Rohit Sharma and Virat Kohli at the top.

### Babar under pressure, India favourites in T20 WC clash against Pakistan: Rashid Latif

NEW DELHI, June 6: Babar Azam has a long way to go before becoming a captain who can handle pressure, said former Pakistan skipper Rashid Latif, declaring that India would be favourites against his country owing to a more balanced squad when the two sides clash in the T20 World Cup on Sunday.

The India-Pakistan showdown, to be held in New York, is one of the most eagerly-awaited games of the ongoing tournament being co-hosted by the USA and the West Indies.

"...the focus is on the game on June 9 against India. Babar (Pakistan captain) will be under a lot of pressure because of the game against India rather than performing in the World Cup," the 55-year-old former wicketkeeperbatter told PTI videos in an exclusive interview.

"But he has to learn to carry pressure, he should learn that from Virat and Rohit. They know how to carry the game. As a batter Babar is one of the best but as a captain and leader, there's a lot that he needs to learn," he added.

Latif said India have superior spinners and based on current form, Rohit Sharma's men are favourites for a win on Sunday.

"Kuldeep Yadav is that one player who if remains fit for India throughout the World Cup, he can cause trouble for batters. He is India's key bowler and also a key to success. Given the current form and stats definitely India has an advantage ahead of June 9," he said.

Latif also pointed out that the Pakistan's preparedness is nowhere close to being as good as it was during its strong performances in the 2021 and 2022 editions, when the team reached

"The Pakistan team plays well in the ICC tournaments but the team doesn't look as prepared as they were in 2021 and 2022. The damage happened after the last ODI World Cup with changes in captaincy, the selection committee, and players," he explained.

"The team doesn't know who their openers will be and what they have tried has failed miserably," he pointed out.

Latif lamented the decline of Pakistan's bowling, especially the pacers. He blamed poor fitness for it.

"A lot of bowlers like Shaheen, Naseem, Rauf, Shadab came back from injury and now Imad Wasim is injured. The biggest issue has been the fitness of the bowlers," he said.



"Former greats like Wasim Akram, Waqar Younis, Mohammad Asif were way fitter than them and never used to miss any Tests or ODIs. But these guys,

despite playing shorter formats, don't have adequate fitness," he added. He also criticised the selection of bowlers who play similar roles in the

side.
"...they bring back Mohammad Amir and Imad Wasim. Earlier when these two bowlers used to play for Pakistan and in the PSL, they used to bowl the early overs between 1-4.

"Now, Rauf and Shaheen perform the same role, if you have four bowlers with the same role, who will bowl in the middle overs?" he asked.

He lauded India for getting their bowling combination right.

"Look at India, they have got Kuldeep, Axar, Jadeja and Chahal who can bowl in the middle and also the early overs. Pakistan couldn't develop Abrar Ahmed much. If Shadab Khan goes for runs in the middle overs, Pakistan doesn't have a lot of cover," he

said. Latif also questioned the timing of South African Gary Kirsten's appointment as Pakistan coach.

"The timing of his joining is very wrong. He joined the team on May 19 after the IPL season for Gujarat Titans ended," Latif pointed out.

"He only knows players by their names, but when you are going to the World Cup then you at least need to have spent at least a year with the players. He did not get this time and the Pakistan board is to blame for that," he said.

Talking about Virat Kohli, Latif said, "Virat has a lot of fans in Pakistan and also the players playing are his fans. Like I also say this whenever Sachin used to play earlier, I never wanted him to get out.

"Babar only has Rizwan and occasionally the support of Fakhar Zaman. Babar's quality is way above his teammates and I think this acts as a disadvantage for him." (PTI)

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
