ULFA(I)'s impact is very much there in state: CM 'Paresh Barua's sovereignty demand non-negotiable'

GUWAHATI, Aug 21: Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma on Wednesday said ULFA(I)'s influence in the state is "very much there," though it has significantly declined over the years.

"We cannot deny its impact when there are still around 400 cadres in the Myanmar camp," Sarma told reporters, adding, "We have never claimed that ULFA (I) is absent, and we continuously urge the outfit's leadership to engage in negotiations.'

Sarma clarified that neither the Union Home Minister nor the CM has ever suggested that ULFA (I) has no presence in the state, though its influence has "definitely decreased over time.

"We have never officially said the ULFA(I) has no impact or influence', "he added.

"The process for talks is continuing and I do talk to ULFA(I) chief Paresh Barua, I have, however, not

talked to him since the elections," Sarma said.

"I do not call Barua but whenever he does, I pick up the phone and talk to him", he added.

hurdles in the talks process as the ULFA(I) chief speaks about sovereignty which is 'non-negotiable'.

"Discussions take place frequently and we hope that there will be a breakthrough one day", he added. Regarding the timing of future talks, Sarma said it depends on Barua, "If I am informed that he is ready for negotiations now, I will leave everything and sit for negotiations," he added.

Referring to ULFA's recent email claiming that the outfit had placed 24 bombs in multiple locations on Independence Day, Sarma said that the bombs did not explode, which means that police were not sitting quietly.

Police had recovered 10 'bomblike substances' from different locations with 10 cases filed in this connection. Two of these cases will be handed over to the NIA, while the remainder will be handled by the state police. Sarma after assuming office of the chief minister on May 10, 2021 had appealed to the ULFA (I) to come forward for peace talks and resolve the more than four decades old insurgency

BJP candidates file nomination papers for bypolls to two RS seats

GUWAHATI, Aug 21: BJP Rajya Sabha candidates Mission Ranjan Das and Rameshwar Teli on Wednesday filed their nomination papers for the two seats which became vacant in Assam following the recent

Das and Teli filed their papers in the Assembly on the last day of filing nominations in the presence of Union minister Sarbananda Sonowal, chief minister Himanta Biswa Sarma and his cabinet colleagues, BJP state president Bhabesh Kalita and party MLAs.

Elections to the two seats were necessitated with Union minister Sarbananda Sonowal and Kamakhya Prasad Tasa getting elected to the Lok Sabha from Dibrugarh and Kaziranga parliamentary constituencies, respectively.

Das, a veteran BJP politician, has been a four-time party MLA from Karimganj (North) constituency in 1991, 2000, 2001 and 2006 and is currently the chairman of Assam State Transport Corporation.

Teli, a prominent face of the tea-tribe community, was the Union minister of State of Petroleum and Natural Gas and Labour and Employment in the second Modi ministry since 2021. He was first elected to Dibrugarh Lok Sabha constituency in 2014 but was replaced in 2024 by Sonowal.

The state BJP had sent a list of 10 names to the central parliamentary committee for final selection.



After filing the papers, chief minister Himanta Biswa Sarma told reporters that both the BJP candidates will win the Rajya Sabha seats.

"Teli is a prominent face of the tea tribe community and had also served as a Union minister in the last term whereas Das is a senior BJP leader". Sarma said. Moreover, Das will be the first member in the

Upper House from Karimganj district, he added. "I am certain they will be excellent and inspiring Rajya Sabha members", he added.

Sonowal also extended his best wishes to the two candidates. Bypolls for the two Rajya Sabha seats are scheduled to be held on September 3. Assam has seven seats in the Rajya Sabha, (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

Parliament panel on Waqf Bill to hold first meeting

NEW DELHI, Aug 21: Parliament's Joint Committee on the Waqf (Amendment) Bill will hold its first meeting on Thursday and its members are scheduled to interact with representatives of the ministries of minority affairs, and law and justice.

The 31-member committee, headed by BJP member Jagdambika Pal, has been tasked by the Lok Sabha to scrutinise the contentious bill, which has drawn protests from the opposition parties and Muslim organisations.

The representatives from the minority affairs ministry are expected to brief the committee on the 'amendments proposed on the Bill", the Lok Sabha secretariat

The Bill is the first major initiative from the BJP-led NDA gov-

registration process for Waqf properties through a centralised portal. It proposes several reforms, in-

cluding establishing a Central Waqf Council alongside state Waqf Boards with representation to the Muslim women and non-Muslim representatives.

A contentious provision of the Bill is the proposal to designate the district collector as the primary authority in determining whether a property is classified as Waqf or government land.

The Bill was introduced in the Lok Sabha on August 8 and referred to a joint committee of Parliament after a heated debate, with the government asserting that the proposed law did not intend to interfere with the functioning of mosques and the opposition calling it a targeting of Muslims and an attack on the Constitution. Consider if mining can be banned in areas declared conservation, community reserves: SC

NEW DELHI, Aug 21: The Supreme Court asked the Centre on Wednesday to consider whether mining activities could be prohibited in areas that have been declared conservation reserves and commu-

A bench headed by Justice B R Gavai observed that the basic idea of providing community reserves and conservation reserves was to provide a corridor for free movement of wildlife from one national park or wildlife sanctuary to another. The bench, also comprising Justices P K Mishra and K V Viswanathan, said if conservation reserves and community reserves are to act as corridors, then mining activities in those areas may be detrimental to the movement of wildlife.

"However, since the basic idea of

conservation reserves is to provide a corridor for the free movement of wildlife from one national park/wildlife sanctuary ... we request the Union to consider whether at least in the areas which are declared as conservation reserves and community reserves, the mining could be prohibited or not," the bench said.

The court was hearing a matter related to mining activities within a

tion reserves and community reserves. The apex court had, in a verdict delivered on April 26 last year, directed that mining within a national park and wildlife sanctuary and within a one-kilometre area of from their boundaries shall not be permissible.

During the hearing on Wednesday, the bench said the government should promote eco-tourism.

The court noted that in February, it had asked the Centre to hold discussions with various stakeholders, including the states and Union territories, and recommend suggestions in this regard.

It said an affidavit has been filed before it by the Centre after taking into consideration the views expressed by various states at a meeting convened by the Ministry of Environment and Forests (MoEF) in March. (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

Assam to introduce Muslim marriage, divorce registration bill

GUWAHATI, Aug 21: The Assam government will introduce a bill in the upcoming Autumn Session of Assembly for compulsory government registration of marriage and divorce of Muslim people, chief minister Himanta Biswa

Addressing a press conference after a cabinet meeting, Sarma said the government will table the Assam Compulsory Registration of Muslim Marriage and Divorce Bill, 2024 during the upcoming session, which will begin on Thursday.

"Earlier, Muslim marriages were registered by the Kazis. However, this new bill will ensure that all marriages of the community will be registered with the government," he added.

Sarma also claimed that marriages of minors were also registered by the Kazis earlier, but the proposed bill will prohibit any such move. (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

Why have institutions like CCI 'remained passive' as Adani built monopolies, asks Cong

NEW DELHI, Aug 21: The Congress on Wednesday questioned the Competition Commission of India over its approval of all acquisitions by the Adani Group, asking why such institutions "remained passive" as the conglomerate built "monopolies" in critical infrastructure sectors, raising prices at consumers'

Congress general secretary incharge communications Jairam Ramesh said the Competition Commission of India (CCI) has reportedly raised concerns that the proposed Reliance-Disney merger could stifle competition.

"It is a good time to reflect on how the CCI should have also had the courage to address how the nonbiological PM's other favourite business conglomerate is acquiring companies and reducing competition across various industries," he said in a post on X.

"The CCI is legally required to approve mergers and acquisitions

that exceed a certain threshold. Yet, all acquisitions by the Adani Group have been approved, even as the company builds monopolies in sectors like ports, airports, power, and cement -- industries at high risk of market failure and anti-competitive practices -- often through threats and intimidation that have the backing of the powers-that-be," he al-

In recent years, the CCI has not hesitated to impose penalties on both domestic and global firms for alleged abuse of dominance, Ramesh said.

"Yet, a five-fold increase in User Development Fees (UDF) paid by passengers at Lucknow and Mangalore airports has been allowed by the Union government. These airports were among the six awarded to Adani after rules were altered to favour the company, despite objections from the NITI Aayog and the Ministry of Finance," he said. Similarly, electricity prices in

states like Haryana, Jharkhand, and Gujarat have risen sharply thanks to the Adani conglomerate's policies and actions, Ramesh claimed.

"Why do India's regulatory institutions, including SEBI, disappear when transactions involve the nonbiological Prime Minister's closest friend? Why have these typically proactive institutions remained passive as this friend has built monopolies in critical infrastructure sectors, raising prices at the expense of consumers?" Ramesh asked.

The Congress has been attacking the government for allegedly creating monopolies in various sectors to benefit the Adani Group.

The opposition party has also stepped up its attack on the government after Hindenburg Research launched a fresh broadside against market regulator SEBI chairperson Madhabi Buch, alleging she and her husband had stakes in obscure offshore funds used in the Adani money (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

Farmers' body writes to PM Modi, LoP demanding law guaranteeing MSP

NEW DELHI, Aug 21: The MSP remain" and on the other hand the Guarantee Kisan Morcha (MSP GKM) Wednesday wrote to Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Leader of the Opposition Rahul Gandhi, urging them to push for the enactment of a law to guarantee Minimum Support Price (MSP) for crops.

Over 250 farmer organisations from 26 states and union territories gathered for a meeting at Gurudwara Shri Rakabganj Sahib in Delhi on Wednesday, the MSPGKM said.

In their letter to PM Modi and Rahul Gandhi dated August 21, the MSP GKM requested the introduction and passage of the MSP bill in the next Parliament session to secure a guaranteed MSP for the farming community.

"Mr. Prime Minister, on one hand the government refuses to give us a law on the guarantee of MSP (Minimum Support Price) and says that "MSP was, MSP is and MSP will government has guaranteed MSP (Minimum Selling Price) for industrialists," they said in the letter.

"Sir, when the government can give protection to sugar mill owners and even government-run petroleum companies, then why cannot similar protection be given to the farmers who voted for their government," they further wrote. MSP GKM president V M Singh told PTI, "In 2011, Narendra Modi, who was then the chief minister of Gujarat, was chairman of a panel that had prepared a report on consumer affairs. The report had recommended the implementation of MSP, but the government at the time did not act on it. Now that he is the prime min-

ister, why is he not taking action?" Singh mentioned that in 2018, a round table conference was held at the Constitution Club of India here, where 20-22 (*CONTD. ON PAGE-2*)

He alleged that three families, a reference to the Congress, the National Conference and the PDP, over the last several decades stoked em-

bers of separatism and terrorism in Jammu and Kashmir with their policies before the BJP government at the Centre turned things around since 2014.

Kashmir is now identified with tourism and not terrorism, Chugh said, adding that brisk polling was witnessed in the recent Lok Sabha elections in the erstwhile state.

The government had in August 2019 abrogated Article 35A and Article 370, which gave special rights to Jammu and Kashmir, and bifurcated it into Union Territories of Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh.

The NC and the PDP, both constituents of the opposition INDIA bloc of which the Congress is the largest member, have called for restoring the two Articles. The Congress has, however, mostly stuck to the demand of restoration of the region's statehood but has not taken a categorical stand on the nullification of its special rights. (PTI)

Amazon's investment in India to make up for its losses; not to support Indian eco: Goyal

on Wednesday questioned Amazon's announcement of USD 1 billion investment in India, saying the US retailer was not doing any great service to the Indian economy but filling up for the losses it had suffered in the country.

He said that their huge losses in India "smells of predatory pricing", which is not good for the country as it impacts crores of small retailers. Launching a report on 'Net Impact of e-commerce on Employment and Consumer Welfare in India' here, the minister lambasted the e-commerce companies, questioning their business model that has been impacting small retailers in the country.

"When Amazon says that we are going to invest a billion dollars in the country, we celebrate, and we forget that the billion dollars are not coming in for great service or investment to support the Indian economy. They made a billion-dollar loss in their balance sheet that year, they had to fill in that loss.

"And how did that loss get caused, they paid ₹ 1,000 crores to professionals. I do not know who these professionals are...I would love to know, which chartered accountants, professionals or lawyers get ₹1,000 crores unless you are paying all the top lawyers to block them so that nobody can fight a case against you," the minister said.

He wondered whether the Rs 6,000 crore loss in one year does not smell of predatory pricing, as they are just an e-commerce platform and those companies are not allowed to do B2C (business to consumer) business.

As per the policy, the e-commerce platform legally can not do



B2C in the country

The minister alleged that these companies only re-route all the businesses through an entity to show that it is B2B. "How are they doing it? Should this not be a matter of concern for us," he said.

He added that the e-commerce sector has a role, but one has to think "very" carefully and cautiously about what that role is.

"How that role can be in an organised fashion. Is predatory pricing policies good for the country?" Goval asked. He also said that ecommerce companies are eating into the small retailer's high-value, high-margin products that are the only items through which the mom-and-pop stores survive.

The minister also said that with the fast-growing online retailing in the country, "Are we going to cause huge social disruption with this massive growth of e-commerce". Citing examples of Western countries, Goyal said Europe and America have seen the consequences of this.

"What has happened to the mom-and-pop stores there? How many do you see surviving, why did Switzerland allow e-commerce until recently (so late)," he said, adding "...I am not wishing away

retailers at 27 per cent a year, "we do not land up causing huge disruption for the 100 million small retailers across the country".

Amazon India is facing rising competitive intensity in India from players like Flipkart and SoftBankbacked Meesho, as well as the onslaught of firms like Blinkit, Swiggy's Instamart and Zepto that are making aggressive inroads into the market as busy consumers opt for the convenience of instant delivery of grocery and many other household items.

Last year, Amazon had talked of plans to invest USD 15 billion more in India, taking its total investment in the country to USD 26 billion. After meeting with Prime Minister Narendra Modi during his visit to the US in 2023, Amazon CEO Andy Jassy said: "I had a very good and productive conversation with Prime Minister Modi. I think we share a number of goals. Amazon is one of the biggest investors in India. We have invested USD 11 billion to date and intend to invest another USD 15 billion, which will bring the total to USD 26 billion. So, we are very much looking forward to the future of partnering

MUMBAI, Aug 21: Equity benchmark indices Sensex and Nifty closed higher on Wednesday, helped by gains in FMCG, consumer durables and healthcare stocks amid strong buying support from domestic institutional investors.

MUMBAI, Aug 21: The Indian rupee nosedived 14 paise to 83.91 (provisional) against the US dollar on Wednesday amid unabated outflow of foreign capital and volatile domestic equity markets.

Forex traders said a weak American currency and lower level of crude prices, however, cushioned the local unit at lower level.

At the interbank foreign exchange, the rupee opened weak at 83.79 and touched the intra-day low of 83.94 against the greenback. NAGAON, Aug 21: A special POCSO court in Nagaon on Tuesday sentenced two individuals to three years of rigorous imprisonment in separate cases of sexual

According to Swaraj Saikia, the government prosecutor, Lakhinandan Hazarika (26), a resident of Dighalidari village under Raha Police Station in Nagaon district, attempted to sexually assault a minor in 2018 during a local Bihu function.

In another case, Tuleswar Basumatary, a resident under Kachua Police Station, raped his daughter. The abuse, which began in early 2019 and continued for three months, came to light on April 2, 2019, when the child confided in her mother, leading to a complaint being filed.

The special POCSO court sentenced both accused to three years of rigorous imprisonment and imposed a fine of ₹ 20,000 each.

Rahul Gandhi's **Strategic Win**

he Modi government's sudden retreat on its lateral entry proposal, allowing private sector professionals to take up senior roles in government, marks a significant political victory for Congress leader Rahul Gandhi. While the withdrawal is largely seen as a response to pressure from Chirag Paswan's Lok Janshakti Party (LJP), it is clear that Gandhi's early and vocal opposition played a key role in shaping the outcome. At the heart of the debate was the fear that the lateral entry policy would dilute the representation of backward classes in senior government positions. Rahul Gandhi was among the first to raise concerns that this policy could undermine the existing quota system, which is designed to uplift marginalized communities. His intervention came at a critical time, leveraging growing apprehension among backward classes and their political allies. Gandhi's critique did not go unheard. It set off a chain reaction, rallying other opposition parties and emboldening the LJP to take a stronger stance against the proposal. Paswan's LJP, despite its limited electoral strength, wields considerable influence within the current political landscape. The party's opposition to the lateral entry plan amplified the concerns raised by Gandhi and helped build a broad-based resistance to the proposal.

For the ruling BJP, the timing of this controversy could not have been worse. With state assembly elections on the horizon and the memory of its recent electoral setbacks still fresh, the party was wary of alienating backward class voters. The fear that Gandhi and other opposition leaders could turn this issue into a rallying point against the government was a significant concern. The BJP's anxiety was further fueled by the perception that any erosion of support from backward classes could have far-reaching implications for its political fortunes. In response, the BJP attempted to counter the narrative by accusing the Congress of seeking to reallocate quotas from backward classes to Muslims. This claim was part of a broader strategy to deflect criticism and recast the debate in communal terms. However, this approach carried its own risks. Many perceived it as a divisive tactic, designed to inflame communal sentiments rather than address the substantive issues at hand. The BJP's strategy highlighted the complex dynamics at play in Indian politics, where policy decisions are often deeply intertwined with electoral calculations. The party's attempt to shift the narrative underscored the high stakes involved, particularly in the lead-up to key elections. However, the backlash against the lateral entry proposal demonstrated the sensitivity of social justice issues and the potential electoral consequences of missteps in this area.

Ultimately, the Modi government's decision to backtrack on the lateral entry policy reflects the power of public sentiment and political strategy. Rahul Gandhi's early intervention and the subsequent alignment of opposition forces against the proposal forced the BJP into a defensive position. The retreat serves as a reminder of the volatile nature of Indian politics, where policy initiatives can be swiftly reversed in the face of strong opposition and shifting public opinion. As the political landscape continues to evolve, the episode underscores the importance of social justice issues in shaping electoral outcomes. Rahul Gandhi's success in mobilizing opposition to the lateral entry plan has positioned him as a key player in the ongoing debate over quotas and representation, offering a glimpse into the challenges and opportunities

that lie ahead for both the ruling party and the opposition.

Mass upsurge in Bangladesh and riots in Britain have some common factors

an we find similarities in the antecedents to the disturbing scenes of violence frequently surfacing in different parts of the world? As has been widely reported, the recent incidents of mob violence in Bangladesh began with protests by young people, mostly students, opposing certain quotas in government jobs

The protests then escalated into a nationwide scene of rioting, which ultimately led to the overthrow of the regime of the Awami League chief Sheikh Hasina.

Almost in the same week, we also witnessed a similar outbreak of violence and arson by 'anti-migrant and anti-immigration' groups in Britain. It started in Rotherham, where a hotel was attacked due to its supposed ownership by, or provision of refuge to, immigrants.

The protesters were reacting to fake news on social media about the death of three young girls by a young man rumoured to be a Muslim immigrant.

The violence in Britain, supported by the far-right anti-immigrant lobby, had its appeal and spread to various cities and towns, including London, Hartlepool, Middlesbrough, Liverpool, Belfast and Leeds

The situation turned rather grave and difficult for the ruling government to control. Although these two events seem to have nothing in common except violence, can we find other similarities between them?

In Bangladesh, the initial student protests, mostly peaceful, were against the 30 percent reserved quota for descendants of freedom fighters in the 1971 Liberation War (who are usually linked to the Awami League).

The nature of the protests quickly changed, with massive gatherings of protestors, mostly young, targeting individuals and properties associated with the government and the Awami

They did not spare the residence of Hasina or a statue of Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, the

founding father of Bangladesh and arguably its most revered figure. They destroyed the Parliament House, probably viewed as a symbol of the regime they were protesting against.

Departing from the secularism upheld by the discredited previous government, the masses began attacking the minority Hindu community. The attack on Hindus was consolidated by the resurfacing of the fundamentalist Muslim organ-Jamaat-e-Islami, Bangladesh, which had been mar-

ginalised under Hasina's rule. The Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP), led by Khaleda Zia, which was in Opposition, also came to the forefront. Notably, the BNP has historically been aligned with Islamic ideals while remaining opposed to India.

distancing from **DEGREE OF THOUGHT** derpaid, itself Bangladesh's history of liberation and India's role in

its freedom movement, symbolised by the overthrowing of Mujibur Rahman's statue and similar attacks, the movement indirectly seems to have dissociated itself from the previous government's relations with India, sending a diplomatic signal.

As facts continue to emerge, it has become clear that Hasina's rule had morphed into a one-party regime, characterised by rampant corruption and effectively sidelining parliamentary democracy.

Significantly, the protests and mass violence in Bangladesh reflect a combination of forces, comprising livelihood issues related to job opportunities and the revival of Islamic fundamentalism, which was suppressed under the Hasina regime.

While the revoking of the ban on Jamaat may signify the erosion of Bangla culture and language, which was fiercely protected during the historic Bhasha Andolan (language movement) on February 21, 1952, this issue will remain a challenging and contentious one for Bangladeshi

Let us explore further why stu-

dents in Bangladesh took to the streets over the issue of 30 percent job reservation and how it spread as a mass movement. The students viewed the job quota as a threat to their future opportunities, which implies that there is a lack of employment opportunities, despite the official claims of a prosperous

and high-growth economy. As explained by a researcher, exports contributed more than one-fifth of the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) growth between 2000 and 2010. The major share of exports came from the garments industry, providing 85 percent of aggregate exports in 2022 - 23

In Bangladesh, garments happen to be a cheap labour industry (as well as outsourcing for foreign companies) where workers are consistently un-

with the monop-Dr. Sunanda Sen sony power exercised by foreign buvers and the wage compression

exercised by domestic employers. The same researcher reveals that the unemployment rate in Bangladesh in 2022 was the highest among those with advanced education, reaching 12.2 percent, while individuals with intermediate and basic education faced unemployment at 8.1 percent and 4.5 percent rates respectively during the same year. This by itself explains the resentment among young people.

While actual unemployment levels would be significantly higher if one considers the informally engaged workforce, the data above reflects the frustration of people, particularly of young students, who feared the prospect of further unemployment under the newly instituted quota regime.

The large numbers of mostly young people who joined the mob violence came with a sense of bitterness and a desire for retribution, as evident in their acts of looting and destruction of property owned by Awami League leaders and their sympathisers, which also included minority Hin-

mon for many in the country, including those employed in the export-oriented garment industry. The economic deprivation provided the foundation for mobilising protests, expanding the quota-related student movement to encompass broader themes, including religion. The damage extended beyond

Economic deprivation is com-

property, with the death toll nearing 500 due to army firing, and numerous fatalities resulting from attacks on targeted individuals and groups, particularly those labelled as 'the other'. Can we draw a parallel between the uprising in Bangladesh and the disturbing riots in Britain?

As already mentioned, the initial wave of protests in Britain came from anti-immigration groups. Their agenda was already set in terms of the desired goal of exclusion of the 'other' who do not qualify as the 'white-skinned' majority of British citizens.

In recent years, there has been an expansion of exclusionary norms adopted by British hypernationalists, which now encompasses not only dark-skinned African people, many of whom are Muslims, in search of sanctuary and better opportunity but also brown-skinned Muslims from the Middle East. This substantially broadens the range of those sought to be deported or attacked by the protestors, thus extending the notion of the 'other'.

Thus is born a potent mix of colonial nostalgia and White ethnonationalism and fears that the people they used to rule will now make them a minority in their own country. Racial divides were also prominent in the large-scale migration of Europeans to North America and the Pacific, nearly killing all 'aborigines' and indigenous populations of such places.

In Britain, the urge to get back the lost glory of the empire under colonialism is now visible in the prevailing attacks on immigrants from the rest of the world, mostly with skin colour darker than the White British.

The mood was also prevalent in

Brexit, which led to disruptions in many economic advantages for the country.

Finally, the protests are also impacted by the current wave of Islamophobia in Western countries, which has been especially fuelled by the unstable regimes leading to the flow of migrants from the Middle East. This explains the targeting of Muslims and all individuals with dark skin, who are collectively branded as the 'other' and deemed unwanted.

As it turned out, the 17-year-old boy who killed the three girls was neither a Muslim nor an African immigrant. He was born in Cardiff. His parents are of Rwandan descent. So it is pertinent to ask whether the current cycle of hatred and violence in Britain is linked to the livelihood issues faced by the protestors. In May 2024, the unemployment rates for new job seekers were 36.4 percent and 18.8 percent respectively for the 16-17 and 18-24 age groups.

Furthermore, with prices skyrocketing, Britain's inflation rate surged to 9.1 percent in 2022, a significant increase from the previous two years, which saw rates around 1 percent, and 2015, when the rate was near zero.

Additionally, living has become more expensive due to privatised transportation and cuts to the National Health Scheme

The above facts and circumstances in Britain and Bangladesh confirm an erosion of the opportunities to sustain livelihood at basic levels of subsistence.

This has been of primary importance in instigating the pervading agitations in Bangladesh calling for the exclusion of sections of the minority population in the country and those seeking immigration in Britain. To avoid a repeat of such upheaval in other countries, there is a need to avoid situations where people reach a sub-subsistence level of livelihood. This can only be attained through governance that ensures full employment, high growth and a fair distribution of output. (IPA

Secular Civil Code resonates

Minister Narendra Modi, during his Independ-Red Fort, decisively put to rest any doubts or speculations surrounding the stability of his coalition, making it clear that he maintains firm control over the government. His address reaffirmed that his objectives remain steadfast and unchanged. As expected, his speech was delivered with the characteristic vigor and unwavering resolve that have come to define his leadership

He emphasized the need for the Secular Civil Code (SCC), pointing out that the Supreme Court has repeatedly addressed and issued rulings on the Uniform Civil Code (UCC). According to him, a significant portion of the population rightly believes that the current civil code is both communal and discriminatory, and such codes have no place in a modern society.

The call for a Secular Civil Code (SCC) has become increasingly urgent. Notably, the Prime Minister chose to use the term "Secular Civil Code" instead of the more common "Uniform Civil Code" (UCC). likely to garner broader support from opposition parties. The idea of a Uniform Civil Code was first introduced by Dr. B.R. Ambedkar in the Constituent Assembly on November 23, 1948, as draft Article 35, and it was passed without oppo-

Article 44 of the Constitution now declares, "The State shall endeavour to secure a Uniform Civil Code throughout the territory of India for the citizens." During the debates in the Constituent Assembly, amendments were proposed by Hussain Imam and others, suggesting that no group, section, or community should be forced to abandon its personal laws and that any changes to such laws should only occur with the community's prior approval.

În his response to the debate, Dr. B.R. Ambedkar highlighted that India already possesses a Uniform Code of Laws addressing nearly all areas of human relations. He pointed out that the nation has a consistent and thorough criminal code applied uniformly across the country, as laid out in the Penal Code and Criminal Procedure Code.

Dr. Ambedkar further noted that India already has a uniform framework in place with laws such as the

Transfer of Property Act, which governs property relations nationwide. Similarly, the Negotiable Instruments Act, along with other ence Day speech from the legislation, demonstrates that the country essentially operates under a unified civil code.

In the Constituent Assembly, Dr. Ambedkar argued that the Uniform Civil Code should be seen as a secular law applicable to everyone. This perspective was echoed by former Chief Justice of India, Y.V. Chandrachud, in the 1985 'Shah Bano' case.

The case centered on Shah Bano Begum, a Muslim woman who sought maintenance following her divorce by invoking Section 125 of the Code of Criminal Procedure

The initial ruling was in Shah Bano Begum's favor, but her husband, Mohammed Ahmed Khan, challenged it by appealing to the Supreme Court. He argued that Section 125 of the Code of Criminal Procedure should not apply to Muslims as it conflicted with Muslim

However, the Supreme Court reiected this argument, stating that Section 125 is applicable to all individuals, regardless of their religion or personal law, and dismissed his petition. Prominent Muslim jurists, including Chaudhary Haider Hussain and former Bombay High Court Chief Justice M.C. Chagla, also strongly supported Article 44 and the Uniform Civil Code.

In the 2003 case of John Vallamattom vs Union of India, the Supreme Court once again voiced its disappointment that Article 44 of the Constitution had not been put into effect. The Court also questioned the government on whether it was prepared to implement the Uniform Civil Code.

As we approach January 26, 2025, marking the 76th Republic Day, we must reflect and ask ourselves: "Are we content to remain in a time where our laws are dictated by religion, gender, or any other class or community?"

If the answer is NO, then the implementation of the Secular Civil Code (SCC) becomes essential. Enforcing the Uniform Civil Code (UCC) would honor Dr. B. R. Ambedkar's vision, as laws should be codified without ties to any particular religion. Today's era demands a secular civil code, paving the way for liberation from religious discrimination. 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A code for all: Modi's call for British govt's order to treat extreme Thailand's new leadership can contribute misogyny as terrorism is welcome

n a welcome and novel move, the United Kingdom government is planning to treat extreme misogyny as a form of terrorism. However, the approach to handle the issue raises concern as relating it to terrorism, may lead to further complications

The UK Home Secretary Yvette Cooper issued an order last week to review the country's counter-terrorism strategy to address violence against women, identify gaps in the current laws, and study emerging ideologies. According to the daily The Telegraph this move will put violence against women in the same bracket as far-right extremism. Under the proposal, it would be compulsory for school teachers to refer students they suspect of extreme misogyny to the government's counter-terror program. The local police will assess anyone who is referred to the program to see if they display signs of radicalisation and need to be de-radi-

Speaking with The Telegraph, Cooper criticising the policy adopted by the previous Conservative government's on Prevent strategy stated, "For too long, governments have failed to address the rise in extremism, both online and on our streets, and we've seen the number of young people radicalised online grow. Hateful incitement of all kinds fractures and frays the very fabric of our communities and our democracy."

Cooper further added, "Action against extremism has been badly hollowed out in recent years, just when it should have been needed most. That's why I have directed the Home Office to conduct a rapid analytical sprint on extremism, to map and monitor extremist trends, to understand the evidence about what works to disrupt and divert people away from extremist views, and to identify any gaps in existing policy that need to be addressed to crack down on those pushing harmful and hateful beliefs and violence." This comes after a senior police official warned last month that social media influencers like Andrew Tate could radicalise youth into extreme misogyny in the same way terrorists draw in their followers.

Earlier last month, the UK's National Police Chiefs' Council released a report on violence against women and girls, calling it a "na-

tional emergency." The review could mean teachers will be legally required to refer pupils they suspect of being radicalised to Prevent, the government's order. counter-terror programme, amid concerns that online influencers could radicalise teenage boys in extreme misogyny. According to the Cambridge Dictionary, misogynist refers to showing feelings of hating women or a belief that men

are much better than women. Prior to existing as a legal duty. Prevent was introduced in 2005 by the then Labour government as a policy targeting the Muslim community in the wake of 9/11 two years earlier. The strategy took on a more formal form in 2005, post-7/7. Cooper has previously said the last government's counter-extremism strategy was nine years out of date. She believes the review will lay the foundations for Labour to deliver on its manifesto promise of preventing people from being drawn towards hateful ideologies.

It comes after a decade of warnings from the police and former government advisers about the need to address the rise of hateful extremism and the proliferation of

dangerous material online. Last week Dame Sara Khan, who was Rishi Sunak's independent adviser on social cohesion and resilience until May this year and acted as a counter-extremism commissioner under Theresa May and Boris Johnson, told the Guardian last week said that the Tory government had left the UK wide open to far-right violence by ignoring red flags and stoking fires with a

culture war agenda. Now here rises the question that whether the government is focussing on spread of misogyny or spread of terrorist ideologies or the increasing menace of social media, used to incite hate. All three issues require different approaches to tackle them, and by clubbing them together the Home Secretary might be adopting the same approach as was used by the Conservatives to strengthen the Prevent strategy. And further there are chances that instead of making the society more cohesive it may lead to further disintegration and spread of hate.

The Guardian reports that since riots broke out across England, last month, after disinformation circulated about the stabbings in Southport that left three girls dead, at least 72 people under the age of 18 are believed to have been charged

with related offences. By the end of Thursday last, at least 460 people had appeared in magistrate's courts in connection with the dis-

Officials will assess "the rise of Islamist and far-right extremism" alongside "ideological trends" that have gained traction including extreme misogyny. The scheme also aims to assess the causes and conduct of radicalisation of young people online and offline. BBC reported that it is not clear how long this "rapid review" will take. It is one of several policy reviews Labour has announced since coming to power in July, including the Strategic Defence Review, spending review and a review of the National Curriculum.

Critics argue that some reviews are a proxy for actual action, but Labour has pointed out that there has been no new Counter Extremism Strategy since 2015, and that an assessment of new and emerging threats is overdue.

For some years there has been concern around "Incel culture", an online movement of mainly young men who describe themselves as "involuntarily celibate" and blame women and "alpha males" for their problems. Though the Labour move is welcome, yet the approach adopted towards 'misogyny' does not look well thought out. Corelating misogyny to terrorism or radicalisation looks taking the matter, rather too far and the approach to handle it also becomes questionable. Prevent critics have long been saying that the strategy focuses on just one community i.e. Muslims alone and further no tangible benefit seems to have accrued from adopting this approach, rather it has siloed the Muslim community much more.

Further, the spread of misogyny is a sociological problem and the main culprit for its spread is the online platforms. So, it would have been better if the government had taken a rather holistic view of the problem and instead of taking the reported cases to the police, they would have been dealt through counselling efforts at the school level itself. Further the government needs to handle the rising menace of social media's influence rather more seriously and make efforts to bring-in a law regulating it sooner and make it tougher for hate spreaders to use the medium for the spread of their nefarious ideologies. ecent developments offer hope that Myanmar could move towards a settlement between the military regime and the resistance forces. These developments also hint that the imprisoned democratic leader Aung San Suu Kyi could be released to facilitate the peace process. These recent developments include Chinese foreign minister Wang Yi's sudden visit to Myanmar and meeting with Senior General Min Aung Hlaing, head of Myanmar's ruling military council, on August 14. Next, Yi headed to Thailand, where the incumbent Prime, Srettha Thavisin, was sacked by a Constitutional Court for appointing a minister with criminal background. A new Prime Minister, the 37-year Paetongtarn Shinawatra, has been appointed to the post. Paetongtarn Shinawatra is the daughter of Thaksin Shinawatra, a two-time former Prime Minister and the founder of The Phew Thai Party. The appointment of a young female Prime Minister in Thailand has a bearing on the political developments in Myanmar.

Thailand is the gateway to international humanitarian aid and its military is believed to have a soft corner for Myanmar's military regime and it impacts the country's policies. The Chinese foreign minister's unscheduled visit to Myanmar ahead of his scheduled visit to Thailand has set rumour mills abuzz. In the last few weeks, unexpected regime change has taken place in Nepal and Bangladesh, with analysts wondering if there is a foreign hand in these developments. Now, Thailand is added to the list. In recent weeks, the Myanmar military regime has seen severe setbacks, including the capture of a regional military headquarters by the resistance. Ever since, Myanmar's military government has been talking about foreign forces interfering in the country's internal affairs, hinting at China's in-

China sells military hardware and ammunition, as do India and Thailand, to the Myanmar regime. At the same time, all these three countries also sympathise with the resistance forces fighting the regime. China has made significant investments in Myanmar and has ambitious plans for the country under its Belt and Road programme. In an environment where the Myanmar military is fast losing its control over the country, all these countries so far working with the Myanmar military regime are recalibrating their strategies. In this context, the sudden visit of the Chinese foreign minister to Myanmar ahead of his Thailand visit is likely having more to it than meets the eyes.

Thailand can convince the Myanmar military to strike a compromise. It's because of Thailand's say in the ASEAN, where China is often seen as too powerful, who is better kept at bay. Thailand is also the country from where essential goods enter Myanmar. Under various sanctions, air cargo to Myanmar is not an option. In recent weeks, UN agencies revealed that Thai financial system was helping sanctioned institutions in Myanmar receive funds. For Myanmar to see a turnaround in its current civil war, Thailand has to play a crucial role. It can assert its leadership for regional peace and stability and pressure the Myanmar regime to let a civilian government come and clear the mess they have created over the past three years. If a regime change is not effected through mediation, Myanmar can take longer to return to normalcy due to all the violence and bad blood if the resistance captures power by force.

There is one more reason why Thailand at this stage is more likely to assert its influence for peace in Myanmar. The 72-year-old Thai monarch Maha Vajiralongkorn is under intense pressure from the people to make the laws involving the royalty less strict. He is also believed to be weighed down by succession plans that he has vet not chalked out. In a recent interaction with the media, Vajiralongkorn said that Thailand is all about compromises, hinting he may be ready for a compromise on the strict royal laws. The Thai King controls the Thai military, and it might succeed if he comes on board with a peace plan for Myanmar.

Given the emerging power equations in Thailand, where Queen Suthida and Prime Minister Paetongtarn Shinawatra are expected to wield considerable power in the next three to five years, the presence of Aung San Suu Kyi in neighbouring Myanmar will be another layer of support for them. China doesn't open its cards, but what the world knows about them is they care about their investments and business interests. In the changing ground reality in Myanmar, China would need to tweak its policies and be seen as a facilitator rather than a roadblock for peace in Myanmar. This alone would help its business and investments in Myanmar. (IPA Service)

Unfolding crisis: Darjeeling's growing floating population poses water, waste challenges

The scenic hill town of Darjeeling is famous for its 3T's - Tea, Timber, and Tourists. Originally established as a British sanatorium, it quickly earned the nickname 'Queen of Hills' and has become a popular tourist spot. The charming town welcomes visitors with stunning landscapes, drifting clouds, and pleasant weather, along with forested ridges adorned with numerous hotels, guesthouses, and homestays that cater to every luxury a tourist

However, the other side of this hill station is marked by the struggles of Darjeeling's residents, who face challenges with basic water and sanitation services

Darjeeling has become synonymous with water scarcity, still depending on the water supply system set up by the British government between 1910 and 1915 for just 10,000 residents. However, the city's current population is around 118,805 (Census of India, This unexpected growth has posed a major challenge in the proper planning and installation of crucial municipal services like water and sewage systems.

The city presents a dual effect, offering increased options for accommodating tourists, while also raising concerns about the capacity of the city to absorb this rampant growth and the pressure it exerts on municipal services.

The pristine beauty of the city (top) stands in stark contrast with the harsh reality of waste mismanagement.

Darjeeling is located on a landscape with uneven layers, leading most homes to depend on stacked stairs and narrow. slippery paths for access. The electric wires and water pipelines are intertwined, demonstrating a harmonious coexistence that highlights a symbiotic relationship between fire and water elements.

During our field-based study for developing the city sanitation plan for Darjeeling, an interview with Bandana, a sanitation worker, or Nirmal Bandhu where bandhu literally translates to friend or brother and is the state equivalent of the Swacch Saathi under the Swacch Bharat Mission), conveyed a notable emphasis on the challenges of managing household solid waste during the monsoon. 'Sab log kachara jhora mai dal dete hain." (People usually throw household waste into the drains going down the hill, which we learned was a sanitation practices.

In Darjeeling, jhoras are local stormwater drains or flood harvesting systems that play a vital role in managing excess water during storms. Similar to the Aahar Pynes in Bihar and Nullahs in the northern regions, these systems help to prevent flooding and protect the local environ-

This drain, among others, leads to one of the most visited sites. RockVille Garden. a picturesque tourist location known for its natural waterfall. The mismanaged disposal of waste has further exacerbated the problem of solid waste, creating a mountain of waste amid the scenic Eastern Himalayan mountain

common practice).

Many public and community toilets throughout the city are out of order and missing essential facilities like clean toilet seats, septic tanks, steady water supply, handwashing stations and electricity. This results in human waste directly entering open drains that flow into downstream water bodies, and in some instances, waste is left

public health risk. The city relies on natural springs, rainwater collection and an inconsistent municipal water supply, with the administration completely relying on the British-based water supply systems which have reached their utmost potential.

unflushed, posing a serious

The floating population has quadrupled in the recent time, and Darjeeling has struggled with severe traffic congestion for several years, particularly during the tourist season.

The traffic jams due to the tourist influx during peak season are causing significant problems on roads, even after adhering to the local government's directives, the traffic issue remains consistent. -Pasang Sherpa, president of the Himalayan Transport Coordination Committee.

Implementing centrai schemes such as Atal Mission for Rejuvenation and Urban Transformation (AMRUT) 1.0 and 2.0 and Swachh Bharat Mission is anticipated to generate positive changes regarding water supply and

However, there is room for further improvement, especially since current water sources, like Senchal Lake and natural springs, need to be augmented to effectively cater to the burgeoning population.

The condition of the community toilets and public toilets in the city also reflects the lack of awareness about safe hygiene practices among residents, raising questions about the effectiveness of the invest-

The efforts made by stateaided schemes 'Jal Dharo-Jal Bharo' to build citizens' awareness of rainwater harvesting and its usage have shown the potential Darjeeling holds towards addressing water scarcity with almost every household practising rainwater harvesting.

Samaj, a community-based organisation that functions at the grassroots level, has emerged across wards in recent years making water everybody's business irrespective of caste, religion or community.

Each household connected with the Samaj contributes a yearly fee for maintaining the perennial source and can fill the daily quota of 60 litres of water. To sustain life in such difficult terrain, communities must adopt nature-based systems, which are scientifically tested, scalable, replicable and cost-effective in the long run.

A more decentralised approach for handling both liquid and solid waste will uplift the longevity of the natural springs, and cleanliness of stormwater drains while mitigating the chances of any pooutbreaks sanitation-based diseases.

The hardships faced by the city of Darjeeling in providing hospitality services to the tourists are also resonated by other prominent hill stations and rapidly urbanising cities of the Indian Himalayan Re-

Considering these gaps in service deliveries, there lies great potential for knowledge sharing on safe sanitation practices from other hill cities and towns located in the Indian Himalayan region. A few recommendations to-

wards making the city waterwise are as follows:

1. Promotion of sound water and waste governance practices will require alignment of policies, guidelines, and goals at local, state and central levels encouraging stakeholder participation for effective policies to create an informed decision.

2. It is necessary to create innovative financing through acquiring knowledge about and implementing PPPs using models from other sectors; providing incentive-based funding provisions under state central governments; tied funds mentioned for water and sanitation in the 15th Finance Commission can also be leveraged to enhance the city's need for infrastructural integrity for both sanitation services and building the resilience of municipal service deliveries.

3. Innovation and technologies will need to improve data accuracy with state-of-the-art monitoring tools aligned with the Internet of Things; adopt and scale existing innovations to improve the reachability of service deliveries; adopt circularity whenever it is feasible for the longevity and sustainability of inter-dependable income groups.

4. Planning and evaluation will require metrics and an explicit feedback loop to guide policy planning and advocacy; profit from alliances that increase its capability to withstand inflation and develop resilience against loopholes such as corruption.

5. Research and capacity building will require investment in human resources through continuous investment in training to improve competencies; equity and gender considerations in capacity development activities: peerto-peer knowledge sharing of successful models depicting similar living conditions; and communication campaigns on sanitation, water and hygiene, to bring about behavioural change toward safe sanitation in the long run. Climate change intensified rainfall that triggered Wayanad landslides that would eventually see the land-

limate change made the rainfall that triggered the recent Wayanad landslides in north Kerala 10% heavier, as per a rapid study published by scientists of the World Weather Attribution (WWA) group on Wednesday (August 14). More such landslides are likely to occur, per the report. It also added that minimising deforestation and quarrying, while also improving early warning and evacuation systems, will help protect people in northern Kerala from future landslides

The multiple landslides in Meppadi panchayat in Wayanad district on July 30 claimed the lives of at least 231 people as per a recent statement by a state minister. More than 100 people are still missing, and rescue teams have retrieved 205 body parts from the area, including from the waters and banks downstream of rivers that flow through

Signatures of climate change in

Wayanad landslides In the aftermath of this tragedy, scientists with the WWA conducted a preliminary, rapid study of whether human-induced climate change had worsened the rainfall that triggered the landslides. The WWA is an initiative by scientists across the world to study if recent extreme weather events were caused or made more probable by it. They have also provided such preliminary immediate studies for several extreme weather events in India and Asia, including the heatwaves of 2023 and

The team of 24 researchers, including six scientists from India, studied North Kerala (districts north of Ernakulam, including Wayanad), and analysed the one-day maximum rainfall during the monsoon season here from June to September. For this, the team used a combination of both observation data across years (including data provided by the

India Meteorological Department and the US's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) and climate modelling (25 models across three separate modelling experiments).

Their report, published on August 14, found that climate change – a warming of 1.3°C since the pre-industrial era – has made single-day monsoon downpours in Wayanad about 10.8% heavier. This may sound small, but it marks a significant contribution of climate change to the event, the authors clari-

Heavy rainfall is not uncommon during the monsoon season in Wayanad, noted Mariam Zachariah, one of the authors of the study, but "what set this time apart is the very heavy rainfall that fell on July 29 and 30," she said, at the team's virtual press conference on August 13. Zachariah is a researcher at the Grantham Institute, Climate Change and the Environment at Imperial College London, UK.

The IMD's data shows the rainfall in north Kerala during this time was the third highest after the 1924 floods that the state witnessed, and in 2019. It even surpassed the rainfall that led to the

2018 floods in Kerala, she added. Several factors may have con-

Moreover, the heavy rain that fell on the already-saturated soil in the area – characterised by "loose, erodible soils" according to the study - was another

crucial factor. "The soils in Wayanad were highly saturated, which is common in the region during the rainy monsoon season. meaning the meteorological cause of the landslide was the heavy rainfall on the preceding day of the event," the report summary said.

The report also highlighted the roles that deforestation and quarrying - the latter still continues in the district, the report quoted references as saying

may have caused in the event. "While the linkage between land cover, land use changes and landslide risk in Wayanad is mixed in the limited existing studies, factors such as quarrying for building materials, and a 62% reduction in forest cover, may have contributed to the increased susceptibility of the slopes to landslides when the heavy rain fell," the report said.

As per a study published in 2020, this sharp decrease in forest cover in Wayanad district occurred between 1950 and 2018; area under tea plantations increased by around 1800%. Incidentally, the area where the landslides occurred - including the village of Mundakkai, which was among the villages that bore the brunt of the landslides – is adjacent to tea estates.

"In today's climate, which is 1.3°C warmer than it would have been at the beginning of the industrial period, an event of this magnitude is expected to occur about once every 50 years," the report noted. Over the last 45 years – when the climate has warmed by 0.85°C - such heavy one-day rainfall events have become about 17% more intense, the study also said.

The need for better early warning systems

More such landslides can occur, the rapid study by the WWA has warned. According to the report, such one-day bursts of monsoon rainfall will continue to become even heavier, risking even deadlier landslides. With Wavanad being one of the districts in Kerala that studies show is among the most susceptible to the risk of landslides, this calls for developing better early warning systems so that people can be quickly evacuated out of harm's way, the authors said at the press conference. However, the report also noted how "notoriously difficult" landslides are to predict, and that India's early warning

systems are still in their infancy. 'While early warning of extreme rainfall and the potential for landslides was shared by the IMD, the information was not tailored or specific to the places

slides," the report added. "These statelevel warnings are often ineffective because they do not specify which particular slopes are most at risk and cover thousands of people, making it difficult to encourage early action.'

Though India's Union minister for home affairs Amit Shah said that the IMD had warned Kerala would witness heavy rainfall Kerala's chief minister Pinarayi Vijayan has refuted the claim. The IMD's press releases also show that even on July 29 (the landslides occurred between 1 and 6 am on July 30), it only gave an orange alert for Kerala which translates to "Be Prepared". The red 'Take Action" alert for the state came after the landslides occurred, Vijayan said. IMD press releases also confirm this. Interestingly, all press releases on weather updates provided by the IMD after August 1 say that "Action may be taken based on ORANGE AND RED COLOUR warnings" (stressed in capitals in the press releases) and that "Vulnerable regions likely urban and hilly areas action may be initiated for heavy rainfall warning'

The WWA report highlighted that the Wayanad disaster shows the "need for a more robust and localised early warning system that can provide accurate, timely, and actionable alerts". These warnings should also be "understandable to all and contain precise advice on actions to take" after receiving the warning, the report noted. "This requires not only technological enhancements but also improved coordination between government agencies and local communities to ensure that early warnings translate into effective early actions, ultimately saving lives.'

Towards a system that works

Attribution is an important component of climate change studies and the WWA report is interesting, said Jagdish Krishnaswamy, Dean of the School of Environment and Sustainability at the Indian Institute for Human Settlements,

Bengaluru. Krishnaswamy was not involved in the WWA rapid study. "I really appreciate that the attribu-

A study by Krishnaswamy and other scientists in 2017 found that subsurface watershed residence time – a measure that provides information about the storage, flow pathways, and source of water under the earth's surface, including the average time that rainwater falling in a catchment takes to reach a stream – decreases in specific ways as mean rainfall intensity rises. Current model systems, however, do not capture this well, per the study, and the predicted increases in rainfall intensity (as climate change science predicts will happen in future) could make river

floods in such areas more likely. "So shallow subsurface flow pathways [water flowing immediately below the ground] are an important part of the hydrology of the Western Ghats, rainfall intensity," Krishnaswamy told The Wire.

Additionally, attribution of landslides to land use change has to be done cautiously and with evidence, Krishnaswamy added

"Of course the impact is much higher downstream because of the type of land use...we are exposing a lot of people and infrastructure to the hazard by building houses or expanding infrastructure in particular locations. But you can have some landslides originating in forested areas, even in this particular case, the landslide started in a forested area. A few years ago, the forested sites his team worked in, in the Upper Nilgiris — not far from Wayanad — was also affected by a landslide.

"Adaptation has to be very local," he told The Wire. For example, in the wet seasons, authorities in collaboration with civil society may want to consider evacuating people from certain high risk areas and have them come back to the region in the non-monsoonal months to eke a livelihood out of those places, he said. This is something Krishnaswamy also spoke about in detail during an interview he gave to Asianet News after the Wayanad landslides.

"That is something that needs to be thought of very creatively," Krishnaswamy said. "Also in terms of temporary shelters for people who can move out of these areas during the monsoon and come back later."

Odisha is a good example to consider in this context, said Krishnaswamy. After the 1999 super cyclone in Odisha, responses to subsequent cyclones have improved greatly; early evacuation systems have been in place and there has hardly been any mortality.

"However, the conditions and the terrain in the Western Ghats are different so we have to design it accordingly. But we can come up with a system which will work," he said. (Courtesy: The



Putin's slow response to the Kursk attack could test the patience of some of his backers in Russia

MOSCOW, Aug 21: A year ago this week, President Vladmir Putin strode onto a stage in the Kursk region to commemorate the 80th anniversary of one of the Soviet army's proudest moments in World

Addressing a rapt audience that included soldiers fresh from fighting in Ukraine, Putin called the decisive victory in the Battle of Kursk "one of the great feats of our peo-

Now, as Russia prepares to celebrate the 81st anniversary of that 1943 battle on Friday, Kursk is again in the news — but for a very different reason.

On Aug. 6, Ukrainian forces made a lightning push into the region, seizing villages, taking hundreds of prisoners and forcing the evacuation of tens of thousands of civilians. Russia was caught unprepared by the offensive and reportedly is drafting conscripts to repel some of Ukraine's most battlehardened units.

Putin has a history of responding slowly to various crises in his down the attack. But 2 1/2 years after launching a war in Ukraine to remove what he called a threat to Russia, it is his own country that seems more turbulent.

He appeared uneasy at an Aug. 12 televised meeting of his security staff about Kursk, cutting off the acting regional governor who had started listing the settlements seized by Ukraine. The president and his officials referred to "the events in the Kursk region" as a "situation," or "provocation."

State media fell into line, showing evacuees queueing for aid or donating blood, as if the events in Kursk were a humanitarian disaster and not the largest attack on Russia since World War II.

Putin also appeared sluggish in responding to the June 2023 uprising by Wagner chief Prigozhin in what became the most serious challenge to his authority yet.

After the mutiny fizzled, Prigozhin initially was allowed to remain free, but Schulmann said Putin eventually "got the last laugh" when the mercenary leader was killed a month later in a stillmysterious crash on his private

As the Ukrainian offensive enters its third week, Putin sought to keep to his schedule and even embarked on a two-day trip to Azerbaijan, without mentioning the crisis. On Tuesday he briefly referred to it, promising "to fight those who commit crimes in the Kursk region.'

With domestic dissent stifled and with the media firmly under his control, Putin can afford to make the "absolutely cynical" decision to ignore what is happening in the Kursk region, Schulmann said.

Still, Putin's hold on power "is unlikely to be weakened as a result of this humiliation," wrote Eugene Rumer, senior fellow and the director of the Carnegie Russia and Eurasia Program, in a commentary. Israel-Hamas war latest Hezbollah fires more than 50 rockets hitting



JERUSALEM, Aug Hezbollah launched more than 50 rockets, hitting a number of private homes in the Israeli-annexed Golan Heights

The attack on Wednesday came a day after US Secretary of State Antony Blinken met with fellow mediators Egypt and Qatar as he pressed ahead with the latest diplomatic mission to secure a cease-fire in the war in Gaza, even as Hamas and Israel signaled

that challenges remain. Hamas in a new statement called the latest proposal presented to it a "reversal" of what it agreed to previously and accused the US of acquiescing to what it called "new conditions" from Israel. There was no immediate US

First responders in Golan Heights said they treated a 30vear-old man who was moderately wounded with shrapnel injuries in Wednesday's attack. One house was engulfed in flames, and fire fighters said they prevented a bigger tragedy by stopping a gas leak.

Hezbollah said the attack was in response to an Israeli strike deep into Lebanon on Tuesday night that killed one and injured 19. On Tuesday, Hezbollah launched more than 200 projectiles toward Israel, after Israel targeted a Hezbollah weapons depot some 80 kilometers from the border, a significant increase in the daily skirmishes.

Israel and Hezbollah have traded near-daily strikes for more than 10 months against the backdrop of Israel's war against Hezbollah's ally, Hamas, in Gaza. The exchanges have killed more than 500 people in Lebanon mostly militants but also including around 100 civilians and noncombatants — and 23 soldiers and 26 civilians in Israel.

Israel captured the Golan Heights from Syria in the 1967 Mideast war and later annexed it, saying it needs the strategic plateau for its security. The United States is the only country to recognize Israel's annexation, while the rest of the international community considers the Golan to be occupied Syrian territory.

Defense Minister Yoav Gallant says Israel's military is shifting its attention from Gaza to the border with Lebanon.

Touring northern Israel on Tuesday, Gallant said Israel has scaled back its activities in Gaza, where it has been fighting a war against Hamas for nearly a year, and turned its focus to Hezbollah militants in Lebanon.

"Our strongholds are moving from the south to the north, we are gradually changing, we still have a number of missions in the south," Gallant told troops.

Hezbollah began striking Israel almost immediately after Hamas' October 7 attack. The sides have been engaged in almost daily fighting since then, raising fears of a broader region-wide war. Those fears have grown as Hezbollah has vowed retaliation for an Israeli strike in Beirut last month that killed a top Hezbollah commander.

Hezbollah launched more than 120 projectiles towards northern Israel on Tuesday, causing damage to a home and sparking a number of fires. Israel said it was striking the source of the launches. More than 500 people have been killed in Lebanon, including at least 100 civilians. In Israel, 23 soldiers and 26 civilians have been killed. (AP)

Iran's hard-line parl approves all members of president's Cabinet first time since 2001

TEHRAN, Aug 21: Iran's hard-line parlia ment on Wednesday approved all members of reformist President Masoud Pezeshkian's Cabinet, the first time in over two decades a leader has been able to get all of his officials through the body. All 19 officials won approval in an afternoon vote, the first time that's happened in Iran since 2001. Among those officials is Abbas Araghchi, 61, a career diplomat who will be Iran's new foreign minister.

Araghchi was a member of the Iranian negotiating team that reached a nuclear deal with world powers in 2015 that capped Tehran's nuclear program in return for the lifting of sanctions. In 2018, then-President Donald Trump pulled the US out of the deal and imposed more sanctions on Iran. Pezeshkian said during his presidential campaign that he would try to revive the nuclear deal. The candidate who received the most support from lawmakers was the country's new defense minister, Aziz Nasirzadeh, who received 281 votes out of

Bus carrying Shiite pilgrims from Pak Imran Khan demands open court to Iraq crashes in Iran, kills 28

TEHRAN, Aug 21: A bus carrying Shiite pilgrims from Pakistan to Iraq crashed in central Iran, killing at least 28 people, an official said Wednesday.

The crash happened on Tuesday night in the central Iranian province of Yazd, said Mohammad Ali Malekzadeh, a local emergency official, according to the state-run IRNA news agency.

Another 23 people suffered injuries in the crash, 14 of them serious, he added. He said all the bus passengers hailed from Pakistan.

There were 51 people on board at the time of the crash outside of the city of Taft, some 500 kilometers (310 miles) southeast of the Iranian capital, Tehran.

Iranian state television later broadcast images of the bus, turned upside down on the highway with its roof smashed in and all its doors open. Rescuers stepped gingerly through the broken glass and debris littering the road. In the state TV report, Malekzadeh blamed the crash on the bus brakes failing and a lack of attention

In Pakistan, authorities described those on the bus as coming from the city of Larkana in Pakistan's southern Sindh province, Pakistan's Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif said he was "deeply saddened" by the crash and that diplomats were providing assistance to those affected. "My thoughts are with the bereaved families,"

Sharif said on the social platform X. Iran has one of the world's worst traffic safety records with some 17,000 deaths annually. The grave toll is blamed on wide disregard for traffic laws, unsafe vehicles and inadequate emergency services in its vast rural

ISLAMABAD, Aug 21: Jailed mer chief of Inter-Services Intelliformer prime minister Imran Khan on Wednesday demanded an open court trial of former Pakistan spymaster Lt Gen (retd.) Faiz Hameed if his links with the May 9 violence were established as then "it would not be an internal military affair."

These remarks came just two days after Khan on Monday expressed his fear that authorities were coercing the arrested former spymaster to become a state witness against him (Khan) in the May 9, 2023 riots.

After Khan was arrested in an accountability case last year, hundreds and thousands of his followers and workers of his party Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) vandalised a dozen military installations, including the Jinnah House (Lahore Corps Commander House), Mianwali Airbase and the ISI building in Faisalabad on May

The Army headquarters (GHQ) in Rawalpindi too was attacked by the mob for the first time.

The arrest of Hameed, the for-

gence (ISI), was disclosed by the military last week.

During an informal conversation with journalists at the Adiala Jail at Rawalpindi, where he has been lodged since last year, Khan said that if Hameed is "indeed the mastermind behind the May 9 conspiracy, then the trial should be held openly," adding that the incident was a local issue rather than a matter of national security.

Earlier in one of the similar informal talks with the media soon after Hameed was arrested, Khan had said it was an internal matter of the army.

"They'll make Faiz Hameed turn state witness against me," he told reporters and added, "The army chief should facilitate a transparent trial for Faiz Hameed." Hameed, who served as director

Nagaland to cover 70% population under NFSA

DIMAPUR, Aug 21: The Nagaland government has identified 70.95% population of the state to provide food and nutritional security free of cost under the National Food Security Act (NFSA), 2013. The remaining 29.05% population is not covered under the Act as per the 2011 census.

In a notification on Wednesday, the state government said 2,37,434 households with 11,93,922 beneficiaries under the priority household (PHH) scheme and 47,500 households with 2,09,657 beneficiaries under the Antyodaya Anna Yojana (AAY) will be covered.

The notification said the food and civil supplies department was endeavouring to maximize coverage of non-NFSA beneficiaries by streamlining tide-over allocation.

The state government notified the guidelines for distribution of the tide over foodgrains through the targeted public distribution system (TPDS).

There are a total of 1852 fair price shops in the state - 459 in urban areas and 1,342 rural areas. Foodgrain (rice) under the NFSA



will be given free of cost only to PHH and AAY ration card holders till December 2028 as per the Government of India directive.

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As per the guidelines, the beneficiaries with an annual income of Rs 2.5 lakh and above, who are not covered under AAY and PHH scheme and issued general household (GHH) ration cards, will be covered from the allocation of tide-over rice.

Tripura chief minister Manik Saha, addressing the gravity of the situation, spoke with Union home minister Amit Shah on Wednesday morning, urging for more NDRF teams to assist in flood response and rescue operations. Saha took to X to inform the public of his discussions with the Home Minister, stating: "Spoke to Hon'ble Union Home Minister, Shri @AmitShah Ji and briefed him on the current situation arising out of the severe flood. I also requested additional NDRF teams to support our response efforts."

The chief minister expressed his gratitude, mentioning that Home Minister Shah assured him of full support during the crisis. "I am grateful to him for providing all possible support to us at this hour," Saha added.

Since August 19, Tripura has been hit by continuous heavy rainfall, resulting in a severe flood crisis. The devastating situation has claimed the lives of seven individuals due to landslides, and more than 32, 000 people have been displaced, seeking shelter in relief camps.

In light of the worsening conditions, the chief minister announced the closure of all government schools and colleges. On Facebook, Saha shared the following message: "Important Announcement: Due to the current situation and heavy rainfall, the government has declared a two-day closure for all schools on August 21st and 22nd. Additionally, all colleges will remain closed on August 21st. All students, teachers, and staff are requested to stay safe and follow

tion requests. He noted that the Lokayukta's Special Investigation Team has once again submitted a proposal to the Governor on Monday seeking permission to file a charge-sheet against Union Minister H D Kumaraswamy in an alleged illegal mining lease case.

The SIT had first requested Gehlot's nod in November last year to prosecute the Union Minister for Heavy Industries and Steel, who had allegedly granted mining lease to Sri Sai Venkateshwara Minerals when he was the Chief Minister in 2007 in violation of

Speaking to reporters at Ganigera in Koppal district, Siddaramaiah said the Governor issued show-cause notice to him on July 26, the same day he received a petition seeking sanction for his prosecution, while in Kumaraswamy's case, Gehlot has not taken any action. "Has he (the Governor) not discriminated ?" the Chief Minis-

Gehlot on August 16 granted sanction permitting investigation against Siddaramaiah under 17A of the Prevention of Corruption Act and prosecution under Section 218 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023, in connection with the Mysuru Urban Development Authority (MUDA) site allotment

"In my case, no police officer has sought (sanction). Lokayukta

has also not sought (sanction). There is no preliminary inquiry. Despite that, sanction was given. In his case, after Lokayukta conducted investigation, they have requested for sanction (but it was not given). Is it discrimination or not? Siddaramaiah said.

Responding to questions, the Chief Minister said he has not said anywhere that Kumaraswamy would be arrested.

"If there is a circumstance (in connection with the case) to arrest him, we will arrest him without any hesitation. Such a circumstance is not there now. He is now scared that the Governor will give sanction," the Chief Minister said.

On Tuesday, Siddaramaiah had also said the Governor did not give permission to the Lokayukta to prosecute former BJP ministers Shashikala Jolle, Murugesh Nirani and G Janardhana Reddy.

Siddaramaiah has termed as "trumped-up" the allegations of irregularities in the allotment of sites to his wife Parvathi by the MUDA.

In his writ petition challenging the Governor's order in the High Court on Monday, the Chief Minister submitted that it was issued without due application of mind, in violation of statutory mandates, and contrary to constitutional principles, including the advice of the Council of Ministers, which is binding under Article 163 of the Constitution of India

Siddaramaiah, who has vehemently denied any wrongdoing, said the Governor's decision is legally unsustainable, procedurally flawed, and motivated by extraneous considerations.

On the petition filed by him, the High Court passed interim orders directing the trial court to defer proceedings on complaints against him and further instructing that no precipitative action be taken pursuant to the sanction till August 29.



War of words breaks out between CM Siddaramaiah & Union Minister Kumaraswamy

BENGALURU, Aug 21: A war of words has broken out between Karnataka Chief Minister Siddaramaiah and Union Minister H D Kumaraswamy over the Lokayukta's Special Investigation Team (SIT) seeking Governor's sanction to prosecute the latter in an alleged illegal mining lease case.

Siddaramaiah told reporters at Ganigera in Koppal district on Wednesday that he has not said anywhere that Kumaraswamy would be arrested in connection with the case. But the Chief Minister added: "If there is a circumstance (in connection with the case) to arrest him, we will arrest him without any hesitation. Such a circumstance is not there now.

He is now scared that the Governor (Thaawarchand Gehlot) will give sanction,", the Chief Minister said. "If he is not scared, he would not have held a press meet today.

Hitting back at the Chief Minister, Kumaraswamy told reporters here: "100 Siddaramaiahs should come (to arrest him). Do you think so (I am scared) when you see me?" Responding to this, the Chief Minister said: "It's not 100 Siddaramaiahs....It's the police who arrest Kumaraswamy....not me...one constable is enough to arrest him. Even if 100 Siddarmaiahs come, arrest can't be made. I am not arresting... arrest is done by police." (PTI)

Will resign willingly if need arises: Kumaraswamy BENGALURU, Aug 21: Union

Minister H D Kumaraswamy on Wednesday said he will willingly resign if the need arises unlike Chief Minister Siddaramaiah who found fault with Governor Thaawarchand Gehlot's permission to investigate and prosecute him in the Mysuru Urban Development Authority land allotment scam.

Reacting to the Chief Minister's allegation that the Governor was not giving consent to prosecute him, Kumaraswamy asked what stops Siddaramaiah from approaching the Supreme Court against him in connection with the alleged scam related to Sri Sai Venkateshwara Minerals.

Lokayukta's Special Investigation Team has once again submitted a proposal to the Governor on Monday seeking permission to file a charge-sheet against Kumaraswamy in the alleged illegal mining lease case.

The SIT had first requested Gehlot's nod in November last vear to prosecute the Union Minister for Heavy Industries and Steel. who had allegedly granted mining lease to the private firm when he was the Chief Minister in 2007 in violation of law.

The Chief Minister on Wednesday reiterated that the Governor sanctioned in haste investigation and prosecution against him.

Accusing the Governor of discriminating against him, Siddarama-Lokayukta's said recommendation to prosecute Kumaraswamy has been pending with Gehlot since November 2023. (PTI)

"Barring two-three minor incidents that took place at different places, the bandh was peaceful across the state," Director-General of Police (DGP) U R Sahoo said.

In the last 10 days, police officials held multiple meetings at various levels with market and transport associations to ensure the bandh was observed peacefully and law and order situation remained under control, DGP Sahoo said.

Many markets across the state remained closed in view of the bandh

Over 65 lakh students failed class 10, 12 exams in 2023: MoE

NEW DELHI, Aug 21: Over 65 lakh students did not pass class 10 and 12 board exams across the country last year with the failure rate being higher in state boards than the central board, according to Ministry of Education (MoE) officials.

An analysis of class 10 and 12 results of 59 school boards, including 56 state boards and three national boards, revealed that more girls appeared in class 12 exam government-managed schools but it is opposite in private schools and government-aided

"Around 33.5 lakh students of class 10 are not reaching next grade. While 5.5 lakh candidates did not appear, 28 lakh failed. This is one of the cause for low retention rate and Gross Enrolment Ration (GER) at higher secondary level," a senior MoE official said.

Similarly, around 32.4 lakh class 12 students did not complete the grade. While 5.2 lakh did not appear, 27.2 lakh failed. In class 10, the student failure rate in central board stood at 6 per cent while that of state boards was much higher at 16 per cent. In class 12, the failure rate at central board is 12 per cent while that of state boards is 18 per cent. The ministry officials noted that the open school performance was poor in both the classes.

The highest number of student failure in class 10 was in Madhya Pradesh board followed by Bihar and UP. While in class 12, the highest student failure was reported from Uttar Pradesh followed by Madhya Pradesh. "Overall performance of students in 2023 declined in comparison with previous year. This could be due to larger syllabus for examination," the official said. More girls appeared for class 10 and 12 board exams from government schools than boys. "This may reflect gender bias while spending on education by parents. However, girls dominates in pass performance across government, aided and private schools," the official said. (PTI)

28 children died of Chandipura virus since July in Gujarat: Patel

GANDHINAGAR, Aug 21: Chandipura virus has claimed the lives of 28 children under the age of 14 in Gujarat since the first case was reported in July, the state legislative assembly was informed on Wednesday.

Responding to a 'short notice question' by AAP MLA Umesh Makwana, health minister Rushikesh Patel told the House that Gujarat has so far reported 164 cases of viral encephalitis, caused by certain pathogens including the Chandipura virus, with 101 children succumbing to the infection.

Of these 164 cases detected so far, 61 were caused by the Chandipura virus, he said.

Chandipura virus causes fever, with symptoms similar to flu, and acute encephalitis (inflammation of the brain). It is transmitted by vectors like mosquitoes, ticks and sandflies.

He said the sandfly, which carries the Chandipura virus, lives in the cracks of mud houses that are very common in the hinterland.

"So far, 101 children under the age of 14 have died due to acute encephalitis. Of these, 28 have died due to Chandipura virus infection, while 73 succumbed to encephalitis caused by other viral infections," said Patel.

The minister said 63 children were discharged after treatment, while four were still under medical care. The situation is under control, he said and stressed that no new case has been reported in the past week and no death has been reported for the

According to the minister, the government has launched a drive across the state for vector control and containment of the Chandipura virus. (PTI)

SC resumes hearing on issue of LMV driving licence

NEW DELHI, Aug 21: The Supreme Court on Wednesday decided to resume its hearing on the legal question of whether a person holding a driving licence for a light motor vehicle is also entitled to drive a transport vehicle with an unladen weight not exceeding

A five-judge Constitution bench headed by Chief Justice D Y Chandrachud took the decision after Attorney General R Venkataramani, appearing for the Centre, said though the consultations to amend the Motor Vehicles (MV) Act 1988 were "almost complete", but the roposed amendments are yet to be tabled before Parliament.

The top most law officer said the amended Bill can be presented before Parliament in the Winter session and suggested the bench either defer the hearing till it is cleared by the House or proceed with the matters.

The bench, also comprising justices Hrishikesh Roy, P S Narasimha, Pankaj Mithal and Manoj Misra, said as it has already heard the matter for some time and hence, it will proceed with the hearing without waiting for Parliament to clear amendments in the MV Act.

The legal question has given rise to various disputes over payment of claims by insurance companies in accident cases involving transport vehicles being driven by those having licences to drive LMVs.

Earlier on April 16, the bench had deferred the hearing on the issue after the attorney general submitted a note indicating that the consultations carried out by the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways have culminated in proposals for amending the MV Act that will be put before the newlyconstituted Lok Sabha following general elections.

"By its communication dated April 15, 2024, the Ministry has placed on record the details of the proposed amendment to the statute. "In view of the impending General Elections, the Attorney General for India requests that these proceedings may be deferred until the last week of July 2024 so as to enable the Union government to bring forth a proposal for the amendment of the Motor Vehicles Act 1988 before the newly constituted Parliament following the General Elections," the bench had said. The impact, if any, of the amendments which are proposed

on the reference will be decided in the course of the hearing, it had said while deferring the hearing.

Prior to this, the apex court had asked the Centre if a change in law is warranted on the legal question of whether a person holding a driving licence for a light motor vehicle is entitled to legally drive a transport vehicle of a particular weight. It had also sought the assistance of the attorney general in dealing with the legal question.

Observing that these are policy issues impacting "the livelihood of lakhs of people", the court had said the government needs to take a "fresh look" at the matter, which needs to be taken up at the policy

"Whether a person holding a driving licence in respect of a light motor vehicle (LMV) could, on the strength of that licence, be entitled to drive a transport vehicle of light motor vehicle class having unladen weight not exceeding 7,500 kg," reads the legal question being dealt with by the court.

The bench had said ascertaining the position of the union ministry will be necessary after it was told that the apex court's 2017 verdict in the case of Mukund Dewangan versus Oriental Insurance Company Limited was accepted by the Centre and rules were amended to align those with the judgment.

In the Mukund Dewangan case. three-judge bench of the top court had held that transport vehicles, the gross weight of which does not exceed 7,500 kg, are not excluded from the definition of an LMV. "There may be lakhs of drivers across the country who are working on the basis of the Dewangan judgment. This is not a constitutional issue. It is purely a statutory issue," the bench had said. "This is not just the question of law, but also the social impact of the law.... Road safety has to be balanced with the social purpose of the law and you have to see if this causes serious hardships. We cannot decide issues of social policy in a Constitution bench," it had said. On July 18 last year, the Constitution bench commenced hearing as many as 76 petitions to deal with the legal question.

The lead petition was filed by M/s Bajaj Allianz General Insurance Company Limited.

The Motor Vehicles Act provides for different regimes for the granting of driving licences for different categories of vehicles. (PTI)

Internet suspended, schools remain shut in Badlapur

THANE, Aug 21: In the wake of a massive protest at Badlapur in Maharashtra's Thane district over the alleged sexual abuse of two kindergarten girls, internet services in the town were suspended while most schools remained shut on Wednesday, officials said.

At least 17 city police personnel and around eight railway cops were injured in the incidents of stone-pelting at the railway station and other parts of Badlapur during the protest on Tuesday and the investigators have arrested 72 persons in connection with the violence,

According to officials, additional police force has been deployed in the town to maintain law and order, and the situation in the town is limping back to

normalcy. Entire Badlapur town virtually came to a standstill on Tuesday after thousands of protesters blocked railway tracks at the station and stormed a local school building after the alleged sexual abuse of two girls by the school sweeper in the

washroom last week. The protesters hurled stones at police personnel and vandalised the school building over the sexual abuse incident. The police cane-charged the protesters to disperse them and clear the tracks for train movement.

Talking to PTI, DCP Sudhakar Pathare said on Wednesday that internet services in the town have been suspended in the wake of the protest and subsequent violence.

"The internet services will be restored after taking a review of the situation in the town," he said. Most schools in the town remained shut on Wednesday, local people said.

"At least 17 city police personnel, including two officers, were injured as an angry mob attacked them with stones during the protest in Badlapur on Tuesday over the sexual abuse of two girls. We have registered three FIRs on charges of violation of prohibitory orders, armed unlawful assembly, assault, damage to public property, among others against the miscreants," a senior police official in Badlapur

The injured police personnel are being treated at different local hospitals, he said.

"A total of 40 persons have been arrested so far in connection with stone-pelting and other crimes. Attempts to identify other offenders are on. CCTVs footages and video news clippings are being examined," he added.



Commissioner of Government Railway Police (GRP) Ravindra Shisve said one FIR has been registered in connection with the violence at Badlapur railway station and 32 persons have been arrested.

"Seven to eight railway police personnel, including officials, were injured in the stonepelting," he said. "The situation is normal and under control today," he said.

Police on August 17 arrested an attendant at the school for sexually abusing the two girl students of the kindergarten. As per the complaint, he abused the girls in the toilet of the school. In the wake of the incident, the school management has suspended the principal, a class teacher and a female attendant. The state

government on Tuesday ordered the suspension of three police officials, including a senior police inspector, for alleged dereliction of duty in probing the sexual abuse of the two girls. Angry parents of the school children and iocal citizens, including several women, gathered outside the school on Tuesday morn-

ing and also resorted to a 'rail roko' protest at the railway station, blocking the path of local trains from around 8.30 am.

Some of the protesters, including women, later damaged the school property by breaking its gate, window panes, benches and doors.

The school where the incident happened belongs to a close relative of a BJP leader from Badlapur, sources said. Maharashtra Deputy Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis on Tuesday said he has ordered the formation of a special investigation team headed by senior IPS officer Arti Singh, while Chief Minister Eknath Shinde said action will be taken against the school. He said the case will be fasttracked and the guilty won't be spared. Talking to a news channel, senior lawyer Ujjwal ikam, who has been appointed as the special public prosecutor in the sexual abuse case. condemned the inordinate delay by the police in lodging an FIR in the case.

"This is a sensitive case. It is shameful why the police officers did not not take up the matter seriously. Why the senior police officials ignored the complaint will definitely be probed and those found guilty will be punished. The most important thing is that during such cases, if the police delay in taking cognisance, then crucial evidence is lost," he said.

Opposition parties have targeted the Mahayuti government over the issue. (PTI)

Protection of adolescent girls from cervical cancer

WHO calls for providing lifesaving vaccines to all kids

NEW DELHI, Aug 21: The World Health Organisation on Wednesday called on the countries in its South-East Asia Region to accelerate action to protect all children with lifesaving vaccines being offered under the childhood immunisation programme, focusing on those who have missed all or some doses, and protect all adolescent girls from cervical

"We should aim for a big catch-up to vaccinate all zerodose and partially-vaccinated children, and restore the immunisation progress lost during the (COVID-19) pandemic, protect all adolescent girls from cervical cancer and accelerate efforts to eliminate measles and rubella from WHO South-East Asia by 2026," said Saima Wazed, Regional Director, WHO South-East Asia, in her inaugural address to the 15th meeting of the WHO South-East Asia Regional Immunisation Technical Advisory Group (SEAR-ITAG).

Wazed acknowledged and thanked all experts, national programme managers, immunisation champions and partners, including the vaccinators and community workers and the communities themselves, on the expanded immunisation programme completing 50 years this year.



"We can proudly say, in the last 50 years, together, immunisation programmes have helped hundreds of millions of people in our region live healthier, longer, more productive and prosperous lives," she said. "Today, the South-East Asia region continues to be free of wild polio virus transmission and has maintained elimination of maternal and neonatal tetanus as a publichealth problem. Five countries have eliminated measles and rubella, and six have controlled hepatitis B through im-

munisation. "Seven countries consistently reach over 90 per cent of children with three doses of diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus (DTP3) vaccines," Wazed said.

However, the region missed the target to eliminate measles and rubella by 2023. The WHO-UNICEF Estimates of National Immunisation Coverage data released last month shows slow progress and no meaningful change in childhood-immunisation coverage last year compared to 2022, and the coverage is yet to be restored to the pre-pandemic 2019 levels.

"Nearly 2.7 million (27 lakh) children in our region did not get any vaccine and another 0.6 million (six lakh) children were partially vaccinated in 2023. We need to understand where and why these children were missed and prioritise reaching them as soon as possible. No child should ever fall sick or die of any vac-

when safe and effective vaccines exist to protect them," Wazed said.

The stagnation in post-pandemic recovery highlights the need to innovate, she added.

"We need to find locally-impactful approaches and most critically, enhance the political and social leadership that are the basis for intensified actions needed to meet our regional targets, Wazed said.

One of the priorities in the regional director's Regional Roadmap for Results and Resilience is "reaffirming investment in women, girls, adolescents and vulnerable populations"

"Against this, we must ensure that all adolescent girls in our region are protected and get at least one dose of HPV vaccine to protect them from cervical cancer," Wazed said. Revitalising immunisation

programmes, strengthening community-centred health systems, ensuring vaccine supply and boosting demand through community engagement are critical components for success. Policy and resources should urgently prioritise routine immunisation, particularly for measles, and focus on reducing zero-dose and partially-vaccinated children, she said. (PTI)



NEW DELHI, Aug 21: Filmmaker Shoojit Sircar says his yet-untitled Abhishek Bachchanstarrer is a story that looks at everyday life with a smile, much like his previous films. Sircar, who has worked with megastar Amitabh Bachchan on multiple films including "Piku" and "Gulabo Sitabo" and "Pink", which he produced, has teamed up with his son Abhishek Bachchan for the first time.

Set to release in theatres on November 15, the film will once again explore a father-daughter relationship, similar to 2015's "Piku".

It was a collaboration long in the making and is one of Abhishek Bachchan's finest works so far, he said.

"It's a very simple observation of life with a little smile. When I watch the film, its post-production, it brings a smile (to my

face). And, I can guarantee that it is one of the finest of Abhishek Bachchan films. We always wanted to work together but we were not getting the right kind of script," the filmmaker told PTI in an interview.

Asked about the long gap this time between his stories considering "Gulabo Sitabo" (2020) and "Sardar Udham" (2021) released on streamers during the pandemic, Sircar said he did not

"When I have a script and when I know that this script is ready to move on to the floor, that's when I do it. Because of the Covid and 'Gulabo Sitabo' and 'Sardar Udham Singh' releasing back-to-back, I didn't have the time to focus on a script," he said.

The director said he normally takes a year and sometimes more to finalise a story. His last bigscreen release was 2018's "October", starring Varun Dhawan and Banita Sandhu.

"I make very few films and my subjects are very offbeat but it's usually stories of everyday life that I see. Some love them and some don't but I am okay with it. I'm thankful to those who appreciate them," he said.

Despite the slice-of-life nature of his films, Sircar has managed to strike a balance between commerce and story with his releases, which he believes is important for any director to stay in the business for the long run. "I try because somewhere these films are expensive and they need recovery. As a director, I have to take that responsibility. That recovery lies on me. I can't go absolutely offbeat, where I know that this film is not going to recover... I have to be responsible for it." Sircar, who studied

in Delhi and formed his own theatre group called Act One before shifting to Mumbai to pursue filmmaking, believes his non-film influences may be responsible for the kind of stories he tells which don't necessarily follow the typical film formula.

"My understanding of cinema, theatre and art was quite fragmented. I didn't know that I would become a director, or that I'd even reach Mumbai. Sitting in Delhi, I used to think about going to Mumbai - it was a dream. But when I landed in Mumbai, it was, in itself, like an achievement. What I'd do or not was far too much," he said, recalling his early years. The filmmaker, who made his

debut in 2005 with romantic war film "Yahaan", said when he was in Delhi he worked in theatre across departments like music, art and direction. (PTI)

KIYAN NASSIRI NAMED AS NEW FACE

No Jhinghan among India probables for Intercontinental Cup



NEW DELHI, Aug 21: Influential centre-back Sandesh Jhingan's name was missing as Chennaiyin FC forward Kiyan Nassiri, son of East Bengal's Iranian legend Jamshid, on Wednesday inched closer to his maiden India selection after being named among new head coach Manolo Marquez's 26 probables for the Intercontinental Cup preparatory camp.

Mohun Bagan SG right-back Ashish Rai and East Bengal goalkeeper Prabhsukhan Singh Gill, who are yet to play for the senior India team, also received callups for the camp in preparation for the three-team annual tournament that will be held from September 3-9 in Hyderabad.

It is understood that key defender Jhingan, who sustained a right knee injury during India's Asian Cup group match against Syria in January, is yet to recover from the

Jhingan, the 31-year-old central defender, also missed out on selection for the team's camp ahead of the FIFA World Cup 2026 preliminary joint qualification round 2 matches against Kuwait and Qatar, in May. Syria, placed 93rd in the latest FIFA rankings and Mauritius, who stand at 179, are the other two teams in the competition. India are currently ranked 124th. The preparatory camp will start in Hyderabad from August 31.

The fourth edition of the Intercontinental Cup will be the first full tournament after the retirement of the legendary Sunil Chhetri and the first assignment for Marquez who was named India head coach last month. India have won the tournament twice in the past.

The 23-year-old Kiyan, who grew up in (PTI)

Kolkata and whose mother was born and brought up in Shillong, has been excelling upfront while playing for Indian Super League side Chennaiyin FC.

His father has been an East Bengal legend and currently lives in Kolkata, having represented the Iranian U-20 team in the 1977 FIFA World Youth Championship.

Doeschate, a former Netherlands all-rounder with considerable coaching experience around the world, said playing spin is about making a mental shift rather than bringing about major technical changes. "I don't think much of what we're going to bring is technicertain phases of the game.

The 44-year-old Dutchman, who will be assisting head coach Gautam Gambhir along with Abhishek Nayar, said the team is also desperate to win the Champions Trophy next year. "There's the Champions Trophy . With only three ODIs left in preparation, it's going to be really challenging to switch between the formats and get the team ready for that, which again is something they're desperate to win," he said.

Doeschate said qualifying for the World Test Championship final in June next year is another important goal for Team India.

Currently, India are leading the WTC table with Australia in close pursuit, and Doeschate the 10 Tests that India are scheduled to that position of strength. "In terms of

what we're looking forward to... qualifying for the WTC final... there's a great opportunity with 10 Tests left. "We have five in India and then we are going to Australia, which is going to be great."

Doeschate said walking into the Indian cricketing establishment was a daunting task, particularly after them winning the T20 World Cup in June. "In terms of timing, it's quite difficult to walk into a team that's iust come back with the World Cup.

"But in terms of what's ahead of us for the next 18 months, it's mouth-watering as a coach. It's all the series you want to be involved cal knowledge. It's more about in and all the challenges you want mindsets, situational awareness, to come up against," he said. (PTI)

"I will now put this challenging and deeply unfortunate period behind me," Sinner said in a statement posted on social

"I will continue to do everything I can to ensure I continue to comply with the (sport's)

anti-doping (program) and I have a team around me that are meticulous in their own compli-

Not everyone is completely ready to just move forward. And it will be interesting to see how much scrutiny Sinner receives from other athletes, from spectators, from the media during the year's last Grand

Slam tournament, where he will be the top-seeded man. "Different rules for different players," 2021 Wimbledon semifinalist Denis Shapovalov

wrote on social media. Here is a look at some of the issues connected to what happened with Sinner:

Who is Jannik Sinner? Sinner is a 23-year-old Italian who moved up to No. 1 in the ATP rankings for the first time in June and is considered one of the leaders of the next group of male tennis stars who will succeed the Big Three of Roger Federer, Rafael Nadal and Novak Djokovic.



Sinner's first Grand Slam trophy came in January at the Australian Open, where he eliminated Djokovic in the semifinals before erasing a twoset deficit in the final to beat Daniil Medvedev.

He is 48-5 with a tour-leading five titles; his most recent championship came at the Cincinnati Open on Monday. What is Clostebol, the drug

Sinner tested positive for? Clostebol is an anabolic

steroid that can be found in ointments and sprays sold over-thecounter in some countries, such as Italy, and used to treat cuts or scrapes.

It is considered a performance enhancer, and several athletes in various sports have been suspended after testing positive; one high-profile example was San Diego Padres star Fernando Tatis Jr., who received an 80game ban from Major League Baseball in 2022

Sinner submitted a urine sample that showed traces of Clostebol during the Indian Wells tournament in California in March; an out-of-competition sample eight days later also tested positive.

Why was Sinner allowed to continue competing?

Sinner was provisionally suspended for the two positive results, but he appealed those bans, saying that he inadvertently was exposed to the steroid. He argued that one member of his team purchased a spray that contained Clostebol in Italy, then gave it to another team member — a physiotherapist — who cut a finger. Sinner said the physiotherapist then gave him a massage, which transmitted the substance to Sinner.

The International Tennis Integrity Agency (ITIA), which handles anti-doping and anticorruption investigations for the sport, accepted his explanation, as did an independent tribunal,

After silver at Olympics, Chopra takes field in Lausanne in bid for Diamond League title

LAUSANNE, Aug 21: Two weeks after winning his historic silver medal at the Paris Olympics, star Indian javelin thrower Neeraj Chopra will resume action at the Lausanne Diamond League meeting on Thursday, seeking to reclaim the DL trophy at the season-ending finale next month.

Nursing a long-standing groin injury, Chopra claimed a silver in the Paris Olympics on August 8 with a 89.45m throw, having won a historic gold in the Tokyo edition of the Games three years ago.

The 26-year-old double Olympic medallist Indian on Saturday confirmed his participation at the Diamond League meeting in Lausanne, leaving a decision on a possible surgery after the end of the season.

Chopra was the Diamond League champion in 2022 and finished second behind Jakub Vadlejch of Czech Republic in the winner-takes-all DL final in Eugene, USA, last year. This season's DL finals will be held in Brussels on September 14. He needs to finish in the top-six of the Diamond League meetings series standings to qualify for the season finale.

There is another DL meeting -- in Zurich on September 5 -- which has men's javelin throw event in its roster.

After a busy couple of days post the Olympic final on August 8, Chopra started training in Switzerland and is determined to finish the season on a high despite being restricted by the injury. He is currently at sixth spot in the standings with five points.

Two-time world champion Anderson Peters of Grenada, who took the bronze in the Paris Olympics with 88.54m, has been on the ascendancy after a poor last season, and he is capable of pulling off big throws, having already gone past the 90m mark in his career. Chopra has been the most consistent javelin thrower in the last couple of seasons, before Nadeem pulled off the heist in Paris, and the Indian will start as favourite in Lausanne on Thursday.

Border Gavaskar Trophy on par with Ashes for Australia: Mitchell Starc



SYDNEY, Aug 21: Australia pace ace Mitchell Starc believes that with the upcoming Border-Gavaskar Trophy against India becoming a five-Test affair for the first time in over three decades, it would be "right on par" with the esteemed Ashes series for his team. The marquee series between India and Australia, set to begin in November, was extended by a match this year for the first time since the 1991-92 season.

"Being five matches now it's probably right on par with an Ashes series," Starc told Wide World of Sports.

Since 2014-15, Australia have failed to lay their hands on the Border Gavsakar Trophy, with India winning four consecutive series including the historic triumphs Down Under in 2018-19 and 2020-21.

Starc is not only intent on reversing this trend but also harbours aspirations of a clean sweep, particularly as the series forms a crucial part of the World Test Championship.

"We always want to win every game at home and we know India are a very strong team," he said.

Currently, India leads the Wold

Australia in second place. "As we're placed at the minute we're the top two teams on the Test ladder... so a very exciting series coming up for the fans and certainly the players. "Hopefully when we're sitting there on the 8th of January we have that trophy

back on our shores. The 34-year-old is just 11 matches shy of reaching a milestone 100 Tests and has no plans to quit red-ball cricket.

Indian paraathletes eye 12 medals at Paralympics

NEW DELHI, Aug 21: Eyeing an unprecedented five gold and a dozen medals in total, the first batch of the Indian athletics team, including star javelin thrower Sumit Antil, left for the Paris Paralympics in advance to get acclimatised to the conditions.

The 16 para athletes will stay at hotels in Paris for a few days before entering the Games Village on August 25, three days before the Opening Ceremony. The likes of Antil, who is bidding to become the first Indian to defend his Paralympics gold, will train at facilities near the French capital to acclimatise with the weather conditions there. Para athletics events will be held from August 30 to September 8, the closing day of the Paralympics, at Stade de France, the same venue where the able-bodied athletes competed during the Paris Olympics. "Sumit Antil and some other para athletes will train at Nelson Mandela Sports Complex for a few days before entering the Games Village," para-athletics head coach Satyanarayana told PTI. Nelson Mandela Sports Complex is around 5km from Stade de France. It has state-of-the-art training facilities for athletics, rugby, swimming.

"Some will stay at hotels near the Games Village and they can use the training facilities there during day time," he added. Asked about Indian para-athletics team's medal prospects at the Paris Games, he said, "We are aiming for at least five gold and 12 medals

"These leagues give us the right platform, especially the youngsters, to stand up against the best competition in the world, train with and against them and try to beat them," Sharath, who will be representing Chennai Lions, said.

"Playing at home does not allow you to get intimidated, and that attitude helps you grow at the international level. So, after every season, we have identified great talents. We hope it

Over-reliance on coaches can stop players from finding own solutions: Ashwin

NEW DELHI, Aug 21: Ravichandran Ashwin doesn't like "latching on to people" and that's one reason why he has never warmed up to the idea of banking on coaches in the traditional sense as he believes that such dependence makes players dogmatic.

In his 14-year international cricket career, spanning 281 games and 744 wickets across formats, Ashwin's sense of agency and his ability to time and again rediscover himself, have helped him survive the grind.

"A lot of players are heavily dependent on coaches or mentors, or one person which I think is a very dangerous trend because latching on to people and overdependency can cause you to not be able to open to new ideas," the 37-year-old off-spinner told PTI in a telephonic interview recently.

It is not that Ashwin never had a sounding board. His first state team coach WV Raman, one of the respected names in Indian cricket, and Tamil Nadu legend and former India batter S Badrinath, have been guiding forces for him.

But his equation with them never turned into the kind of dependence that would take away his own ability to search for solutions.

"See very often the challenge of a coach is to be able to offer you several solutions. This is because what works for one (particular player) might not work for the other," he explained.

"One modern-day coaching philosophy which I totally disagree with is the fact that they try to copy-paste the same technique (solution) that's worked for another cricketer," Ashwin, who recently



made his debut as an author with 'I Have The Streets: A Kutti Cricket Story', added. While he is completely aware that some players get results by surrendering to the vision of their coaches, he also feels that such dependence can lead to a closed mind. "Because as a cricketer, you constantly are thrown up with new challenges, so you must be able to find your own answers," the tweaker, who is behind only the legendary Anil Kumble in the list of India's highest Test wickettakers, pointed out.

To Ashwin, Raman has been that catalyst, who helped him focus his intuitive mind. "People can give you a helping hand. But they cannot guide you through in your career, you will have to be open to fresh ideas. "For me, WV allowed me the freedom to express, and, you know, try new things. He also taught me how and on what path I need to travel, but he never said, 'This is the path you need to travel upon'.

"So in a way, in my early days, guidance from WV ensured that I was never really over-reliant on anybody." Ashwin said getting a second opinion is never a bad idea but cricket primarily is a self-

"If you don't have awareness of your own game and if you can't teach yourself, I think you are always going to be dependent on someone which I think is a very dangerous part.

"I am not saying people with coaches or people who are dependent don't do well in life but there is a chance of selling yourself short," he asserted.

He is gearing up for a big 10-Test season and the Bangladesh series next month will be his first under new head coach Gautam Gambhir, someone with whom he has also played a lot.


Ashwin also admires him as one of the "heroes" of Indian cricket.

"Gautam is someone I still share a very, very good relationship with. Because of the fact that he is a very straightforward and an honest guy. "I think Gautam is also one of those guys that we should always be backing. He's a hero of Indian cricket," he said of the new coach, who took charge in the recent tour of Sri

The best in the world have struggled to read his signature 'carrom ball' but Ashwin, who first saw Ajantha Mendis bowl it during an age-group camp in Chennai, said that it took him nearly three years before he was satisfied with its execution.

For the uninitiated, a carrom ball is a delivery which turns the other way and is released with a flick of the middle finger. In case of a right hander, it will turn away from the bat.

"I started bowling those balls in the nets 2006 or 2007 onwards, which was probably the second season for me in first-class cricket. (PTI)



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
