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Border pillars to be erected in 5 'disputed areas'

Himanta and Conrad hold border talks ● Out of six disputed areas Pilingkata has 'difference of interpretation': CM

GUWAHATI, June 2: In a definitive step towards resolution of longstanding boundary differences between Assam and Meghalaya, the two states governments on Monday decided to erect border pillars in five of the disputed areas by Independence Day, chief ministers of the two states said.

These are among the six disputed areas, out of the total 12, for resolving which both the two states had signed an agreement in March 2022, they said.

Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma and his Meghalaya counterpart Conrad Sangma were addressing a joint press conference here after a meeting on various inter-state issues. "Out of six areas for which agreement was signed, we will try to erect the border pillars in five of these areas by August 15," Sarma said.

"There is some difference in one



of these five areas. Meghalaya wants a village that had been allotted to us, but they have given the assurance that same amount of land will be transferred to us. We have asked for one week's time to consider and inform them," he added. On the sixth area of dispute, Sarma said it relates to Pilingkata

area and there is some "difference of interpretation". "The deputy commissioners of both the states will sit and discuss it," he added.

Sangma said the small issues are being resolved and border pillars in the five areas are expected to be erected by Independence Day. "The resolution of the border

dispute in a phased manner is a major milestone in our relations," the Meghalaya chief minister said. Sarma added that both the states have decided on taking forward discussions on the other six disputed sites, but no time frame has been fixed for completing it.

On the 55MW Kulsi multi-purpose project along the inter-state border, they said the two states have decided in principle to work on it together.

"Kulsi is a win-win project for both states. We have decided to work on it together with the condition that people living in that area will be taken into confidence," Sangma said.

Sarma added that both states will work together on the hydel project, while Assam government will take forward the irrigation part of this multi-purpose project which will benefit large (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

Met Dept predicts more rains

State flood situation critical; death toll touches 10

GUWAHATI, June 2: The flood situation in Assam remained grim on Monday with the water levels rising in many parts of the state, officials said.

The India Meteorological Department's Regional Meteorological Centre (RMC) in Guwahati has said that moderate rainfall is very likely to occur at most places of Assam, while heavy to very heavy rainfall has been predicted at a few places and extremely heavy rainfall in isolated places.

A report by the Assam State Disaster Management Authority (ASDMA) on Sunday night said that two more people lost their lives in Cachar and Sribhumi districts, and around four lakh people are reeling under the deluge across 15 districts.

The total number of people losing their lives in this year's flood and landslides has increased to 10.

Cachar is the worst hit with over one lakh people affected, followed by 85,000 people in Sribhumi and 62,000 in Nagaon, it added.

The administration has been operating 155 relief camps and relief distribution centres in 12 districts, taking care of 10,272 displaced people at present.

The authorities have distributed 1,090.08 quintals of rice, 284.63 quintals of dal, 952.76 quintals of salt



and 4,726.26 litres of mustard oil among the flood victims of the state during the last 24 hours.

At present, 764 villages are under water and 3,524.38 hectares of crop areas have been damaged across Assam, the ASDMA said.

Embankments, roads, bridges and other infrastructure have been damaged by flood waters in many districts across the state.

At present, the mighty Brahmaputra is flowing above the danger mark at Dibrugarh and Nimatighat. Its tributaries Dhanisiri at Numaligarh and Kopili at Kamrup are flowing above (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

2 killed in wild buffalo attack in Tezpur



TEZPUR, June 2: Two persons died and two others were injured after a wild buffalo attacked them in Tezpur town of Assam's Sonitpur district on Monday, a forest department official said.

Local forest authorities are in touch with personnel from Kaziranga to tranquilise the animal, as it remains confined in a swamp in Tezpur, he said.

Divisional Forest Officer (Tezpur) Champak Deka said the wild buffalo attacked and killed Dharson Das in Jahajghat area in the early hours of Monday.

As it proceeded through the town, the animal attacked three more persons, of whom Bhojon Gope succumbed to injuries at the Tezpur Medical College and Hospital (TMCH), the official said.

The two injured persons, undergoing treatment at the TMCH, are in a critical condition, Deka said. "We have contacted a rescue team from Kaziranga National Park and sought its help to tranquilise the buffalo," the DFO added. (PTI)

Five-time world champion Carlsen seemed to have the upper hand almost throughout the four-hour-long contest, but a critical mistake in time trouble allowed Gukesh to turn the tables on the Norwegian and secure a remarkable win. (PTI)

Himanta takes stock of flood situation in Lakhimpur district

GUWAHATI, June 2: Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma on Monday visited flood-affected areas in Lakhimpur district to take stock of the situation.

During his visit, Sarma inspected the flood-affected areas of Amtala and Barbila, as well as the submerged areas by the Pahumara River, and interacted with affected residents to understand their situation. He also reviewed the measures implemented by the district administration. It may be noted that a significant portion of the area was inundated due to a breach at the Amtala embankment.

During a media interaction, the chief minister stated that the breached section of the embankment would be repaired promptly, and measures would be taken to drain water through a nearby stream to allow residents to return to their homes.

"The reconstruction of the embankment is planned for September-October," he added. The chief minister also inspected the damaged section of the under-construction Pahumara-Dijo connecting road under the Asom Mala (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)



Over 20,000 people affected in first wave of flood in Dibrugarh

DIBRUGARH, June 2: The flood situation in Dibrugarh district remains critical, with 66 villages across six revenue circles submerged as of Monday.

Although the water level of the Brahmaputra has receded due to improved weather conditions, low-lying areas continue to be inundated.

A total of 20,179 people have been affected by floodwaters in the Chabua, Moran, Dibrugarh East, Dibrugarh West, Naharkatia, and Tengakhat revenue circles.

"Three relief camps have been opened, and 149 inmates have taken shelter in camps located in the Naharkatia and Dibrugarh West revenue circles. A total of 20,539 animals have also been affected in

the first wave of flooding in Dibrugarh. Relief materials, including tarpaulins, have been distributed by the district administration," an official said.

While no human or livestock casualties have been reported so far, 14 large animals were rescued on Sunday. The floods have caused damage to schools, health sub-centres, and other public health infrastructure in areas such as Doldhal Forest Village and Gereki Nepali.

Meanwhile, a review meeting was held on Monday at the conference hall of the Deputy Commissioner's office in Dibrugarh to assess the current flood situation.

The meeting was attended by Shantanu Gogoi, deputy secretary of the Revenue and Disaster Management Department, and Mrinal

Jyoti Bora, Project Officer from the Assam State Disaster Management Authority (Irrigation Division).

Additional Deputy Commissioner (Disaster Management) Dr Monika Bora briefed attendees on the ongoing flood scenario in the district.

District Project Officer Dipjyoti Hatikakoti of the DDMA delivered a detailed PowerPoint presentation covering flood-affected areas, rescue operations by the SDRF, NDRF, and Fire & Emergency Services, status of relief camps, and availability of relief materials.

The session also featured an in-depth discussion on urban flooding in Dibrugarh town. Executive Officer of the Dibrugarh Municipal Corporation, Novas Kr Das, outlined the preventive measures taken to avoid a repeat of last year's urban flood crisis. Officials also reviewed the current condition of embankments damaged during last year's floods.

Deputy Secretary Gogoi held additional discussions with representatives from departments such as Public Health Engineering, Health, Water Resources, PWD (Roads), Power, Handloom & Textiles, Housing, (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

Nadda asks BJP workers to provide assistance to flood-hit people in NE

NEW DELHI, June 2: BJP president J P Nadda on Monday said he has directed the party workers to provide all possible assistance to those affected by continuous heavy rainfall in parts of the northeastern states.

He also requested the people in the affected areas to take necessary precautions, avoid unnecessary travel and follow the advisories issued by local authorities.

"Deeply concerned for the people affected by the continuous heavy rainfall in parts of the Northeastern states, I have directed BJP state units and Karyakartas to provide all possible assistance in accordance with the issued guidelines," Nadda said in a post on X.

"I urge everyone in the affected areas to take necessary precautions, avoid unnecessary travel and follow the advisories from local authorities," he added.

The flood situation in the northeastern states of Assam, Meghalaya, Manipur, Sikkim and Arunachal Pradesh is grim after heavy rainfall in several parts. (PTI)

Indore couple missing in M'laya: Man's body found, search for wife continues

INDORE, June 2: The body of an Indore resident who had gone missing along with his wife in Meghalaya last month was found on Monday, while search for his wife continues, a Madhya Pradesh police official said here.

Raja Raghuvanshi and his wife Sonam had gone missing on May 23 in Sohra (also known as Cherrapunji) in Meghalaya's East Khasi Hills district after going there for their honeymoon.

"We have received information that Meghalaya police recovered a body which was identified as that of Raja Raghuvanshi by his brother Vipin Raghuvanshi. The details of the death will be had after we get the post mortem report. The police there have not got any clue so far of Sonam Raghuvanshi," Indore Deputy Commissioner of Police (Crime Prevention Branch) Rajesh Kumar Tripathi told PTI. MP Chief Minister Mohan Yadav, in a post on X, expressed grief.

"The news of the disappearance and finding of the body of Indore resident Raja Raghuvanshi, who had gone to visit Meghalaya after marriage, is very sad. The search for his wife Sonam is on," he said. Yadav's cabinet colleague Kailash Vijayvargiya said the search operation had encountered heavy rains. "It was raining heavily during the search operation for the Raghuvanshi couple in Meghalaya. We are very sad that we could not save Raja Raghuvanshi, but the search for his wife is on. We pray to God for her safety," he said. Raja Raghuvanshi's family runs a transport business, with kin saying the couple got married here on May 11 and (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

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'Water and blood cannot flow together', says all-party Indian delegation in Malaysia

KUALA LUMPUR, June 2: All-party parliamentary delegation visiting Malaysia has emphasised India's zero tolerance to terrorism, asserting that "water and blood cannot flow together", the Indian mission said on Monday.

The delegation, led by JD(U) MP Sanjay Kumar Jha, met with representatives from Democratic Action Party led by YB M. Kula Segaran, Deputy Minister in the Prime Minister's Department (Law and Institutional Reform), and Parti Keadilan Rakyat in Malaysia and conveyed India's perspectives and national resolve against terrorism, the India High Commission in Malaysia posted on X.

"Discussions centred on India's resolute response to terrorism under Operation Sindoor. There was emphasis on India's zero tolerance to terrorism, and the view that 'Water and blood cannot flow together'," it added.

The delegation's remarks were in the context of India suspending the Indus Waters Treaty following

the Pahalgam terror attack. New Delhi has maintained that the treaty will remain in abeyance until Pakistan stops sponsoring terrorism.

Brokered by the World Bank, the 1960 treaty defines a mechanism for water sharing and information exchange between the two nuclear-armed neighbour nations for the use of the Indus River water and its five tributaries -- Sutlej, Beas, Ravi, Jhelum, and Chenab.

The delegation held "constructive talks" with the representatives of Parti Keadilan Rakyat led by YB Sim Tze Tzin.

"India's zero-tolerance approach to terrorism was outlined, reaffirming our national unity against cross-border threats," the mission said in another post.

"KEADILAN representatives appreciated the detailed explanation provided by the delegation and engaged in a constructive discussion on the way forward and responsibilities each nation has in fighting the menace of terrorism," it said. (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

Assam launches 'Gaja Mitra' to defuse growing human-elephant tensions

GUWAHATI, June 2: Amid rising incidents of human-elephant conflict in Assam, the state has rolled out a new initiative-Gaja Mitra-aimed at safeguarding both rural communities and the region's elephant population, Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma announced on Monday.

According to Sarma, the programme is being implemented in five of the most affected districts-Goalpara, Baksa, Udalguri, Sonitpur, and Nagaon-where encounters between people and elephants frequently lead to crop destruction, property damage, and loss of life on both sides.

Launched as part of a broader

conservation push, the project adopts a holistic strategy to address the crisis. Central to this approach is the restoration of elephant habitats through afforestation and ecological enrichment. By improving forest corridors and ensuring sufficient food availability in the wild, the initiative aims to reduce the need for elephants to stray into human settlements.

A senior forest official noted that technology is also at the heart of Gaja Mitra. Artificial intelligence-powered camera traps have been installed in forested areas, serving as real-time alert systems. "These high-tech devices detect elephant movement and send in-



stant notifications to nearby villages, giving residents crucial time to act and avoid potentially dan-

gerous encounters," he added.

To support farmers, the initiative has introduced enhanced crop

procurement measures in vulnerable zones, designed to shield cultivators from financial losses caused by elephant raids. Additionally, specially trained community teams-dubbed Gaja Mitras-are being deployed as on-the-ground mediators. These local volunteers will raise awareness, assist during elephant movements, and strengthen coordination between forest officials and villagers, in line with the principle of Jan Bhagidari (people's participation). Assam's forest minister Chandra Mohan Patowary recently revealed that the state records, on average, more than 70 human and 80 elephant deaths annually due to these conflicts. (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

India, US desire to give preferential market access to businesses, says Goyal

PARIS, June 2: India and the US desire to give preferential market access to each other's businesses and teams of both the countries are working together on the proposed bilateral trade agreement, Commerce Minister Piyush Goyal has said.

In February, US President Donald J Trump and Prime Minister of India Narendra Modi announced plans to negotiate the first tranche or phase of a mutually beneficial, multi-sector Bilateral Trade Agreement (BTA) by fall (September-October) of 2025. It is aimed at more than doubling the bilateral trade to USD 500 billion by 2030 from the current level of USD 191 billion.

"Both countries are committed to work together, both countries desire to give preferential access to each other's businesses and we are working towards the bilateral trade agreement," Goyal told reporters here. Goyal is here on an official visit to hold talks with French leaders and business representatives to boost trade and investments.

When asked about an announcement of Trump to double tariffs on steel and aluminium to 50 per cent, he also said that the two countries will continue to work together to resolve all these issues bilaterally.

"Let us wait and watch...both the US and India share good relations and we will continue to work together to resolve all these issues bilaterally," he said.

Trade experts have stated that the further increase in the import duty by the Trump administration would impact Indian exporters,



particularly those engaged in value-added and finished steel products and auto-components. On May 30, Trump announced that he would double the existing 25 per cent tariffs on steel and aluminium imports from June 4. Trump originally invoked this provision in 2018 to set the 25 per cent tariff on steel and 10 per cent on aluminium. He raised tariffs on aluminium to 25 per cent in February 2025.

In 2024-25, India exported USD 4.56 billion worth of iron, steel, and aluminium products to the US, with key categories, including USD 587.5 million in iron and steel, USD 3.1 billion in articles of iron or steel, and USD 860 million in aluminium and related articles.

India has already issued a formal notice at the World Trade Organization (WTO), reserving its rights to impose retaliatory tariffs on US goods in response to the earlier

steel tariffs.

A team of US officials is visiting India this week for discussions on the proposed interim trade agreement between the two countries.

The visit gains importance as India and the US are likely to agree on an interim trade agreement by the end of June, with New Delhi pushing for full exemption from the 26 per cent reciprocal tariff on domestic goods.

India's chief negotiator, Special Secretary in the Department of Commerce Rajesh Agrawal, last month had concluded his four-day visit to Washington.

He held talks with his US counterpart on the proposed agreement. Goyal too was in Washington to give an impetus to trade talks.

There is a possibility that both sides agree on an interim trade deal before the first tranche.

The US remained India's largest

trading partner for the fourth consecutive year in 2024-25, with bilateral trade valued at USD 131.84 billion. The US accounts for about 18 per cent of India's total goods exports, 6.22 per cent in imports, and 10.73 per cent in the country's total merchandise trade. Talking about India's free trade pact with four-European nation bloc EFTA, Goyal said USD 100 billion FDI (foreign direct investment) commitment under the agreement does not include money coming into stock market through FIIs.

"This is solid FDI coming into the country... This USD 100 billion of FDI comes with technologies... It will (also) catalyse nearly USD 500 billion of investments roughly.

"With this investment, the whole ecosystem gets created, hotels come up, infrastructure comes up, power and water is utilised. The whole ecosystem will add much more to the economy. So it's a massive investments that we are looking coming through this EFTA agreement," he added. The implementation process of this pact is progressing fast and is expected to come into force before the end of this year. The two sides signed the Trade and Economic Partnership Agreement (TEPA) on March 10, 2024. Under the pact, India has received an investment commitment of USD 100 billion in 15 years from the grouping while allowing several products such as Swiss watches, chocolates and cut and polished diamonds at lower or zero duties. Tata's Gopalpur SEZ joins World Economic Forum for clean energy revolution

ability, GIP will bring together its own development goals and India's National Green Hydrogen Mission, which aims to position the country as a global leader in the production, utilisation, and export of green hydrogen and its derivatives. "Gopalpur Industrial Park is proud to be part of this transformative initiative by the World Economic Forum", the Managing Director of Tata Steel Special Economic Zone Limited, Manikanta Naik, said.

"The ongoing rapid industrialisation of Odisha, which includes large clusters like GIP, is also offering new opportunities to dedicate our infrastructure and expertise to create a decarbonised future," Naik said.

He said the GIP by leveraging global best practices and innovative partnerships, aims to contribute significantly to India's clean energy targets.

"We expect a few more projects of similar nature to come up in GIP

shortly," he said.

Stating that around 25 per cent of GIP's available land has been earmarked for green hydrogen/ammonia and renewable energy sectors, Naik said, "The GIP has also signed land leasing and blocking agreements with multiple green hydrogen players, facilitating a total capacity of more than 2 million tonnes per annum of green ammonia with an estimated multi-phased investment of more than Rs 27,000 crore..

With these investments in place, GIP will be able to contribute around 10 per cent of India's green hydrogen/ammonia production target by 2030 under the National Green Hydrogen Mission, he said.

GIP's infrastructure master plan has several key components, including a 2.5 km long, 60 m wide exclusive utility corridor connecting GIP to Gopalpur Port to ensure secured and efficient transportation of green ammonia for global exports, he added. (PTI)

parts of Kamrup and Golapara districts in the downstream areas.

Assam and Meghalaya have a longstanding dispute in 12 areas along the 884.9-km-long inter-state border. The two states had signed an agreement in March 2022 in the presence of Union Home Minister Amit Shah in New Delhi towards ending the disputes in six areas. Out of 36.79 sq km of disputed areas taken up for settlement in the first phase at six places, Assam got 18.46 sq km and Meghalaya received 18.33 sq km. Meghalaya was carved out of Assam in 1972 and had since then challenged the Assam Reorganisation Act, 1971, which is recognised by Assam as its border. (PTI)

the danger level. The Barak is flowing above the danger mark at Badarpur Ghat, while its tributary Kushiya at Sribhumi and Katakhal in Matizuri are also flowing above the danger mark, ASDMA said. The situation is likely to worsen for the people living in low-lying and river bank areas due to continued heavy rainfall in the state and neighbouring areas, chief minister Himanta Biswa Sarma cautioned on Sunday evening.

Union Home Minister Amit Shah dialled Sarma to take stock of the situation and assured of all possible assistance, as multiple agencies remained engaged in rescue and relief operations. Fourteen stranded people were evacuated by an IAF helicopter from the Assam-Arunachal Pradesh border. Road, railway and ferry services have been hit in different parts as most parts of the state continued receiving rain over the past few days. (PTI)

While engaging with flood-affected people, he stated that the state government would provide all possible assistance. Additionally, he visited the eroded section of the Barbila embankment and instructed the Water Resources Department to take measures to prevent further erosion.

Earlier, Sarma held a meeting with NEEPCO officials of the Ranganadi Power Plant to discuss water release procedures, technical protocols, coordination with district administration, and prior public notifications. He reviewed NEEPCO's water release procedures and instructed that water be released gradually in phases rather than all at once.

He emphasized addressing technical aspects and directed officials to maintain coordination with the district administration for timely public alerts. It may be noted that this year's floods have submerged 129 villages across five revenue circles in Lakhimpur district, affecting 46,687 people. Additionally, 454.82 hectares of agricultural land and 22,871 livestock have been impacted. The administration has opened three relief camps sheltering 425 people and established 49 relief distribution centres. For rescue operations, one NDRF team and four SDRF teams have been deployed.

"These instances reflect a growing pattern of deportations conducted by the Assam Police and administrative machinery through informal 'push back' mechanisms, without any judicial oversight or adherence to the safeguards envisaged by the Constitution of India or this court," it claimed. "The 'push back' policy, as implemented, violates Articles 14 and 21 of the Constitution by deporting individuals without due process, thereby denying them the opportunity to contest their deportation and infringing upon their right to life and personal liberty," the plea claimed. It alleged that the indiscriminate application of deportation directives, coupled with absence of proper identification, verification and notice mechanisms, has resulted in a situation where Indian citizens were being wrongfully incarcerated and threatened with removal to foreign territories without lawful basis. The plea sought a direction that no person shall be deported pursuant to the February 4 order without a prior reasoned declaration by the foreigners tribunal, without adequate opportunity of appeal or review and verification of nationality by the Ministry of External Affairs. It also sought a declaration that the "push back" policy adopted by Assam was violative of Articles 14 (equality before law) and 21 (protection of life and personal liberty) of the Constitution and contrary to binding judicial precedents. The team also interacted with a 15-member delegation of the National Defence College (NDC), New Delhi, which is currently undertaking a foreign country study tour to Malaysia, it said. The team also visited Torana Gate, a gift from the people of India to Malaysia, which was inaugurated during Prime Minister Narendra Modi's visit to the country in 2015. The Torana Gate in Little India, Kuala Lumpur, symbolises the unity and stands as a mark of strong and continued friendship between India and Malaysia, the embassy said.

Apart from Jha, the delegation includes MPs Aparajita Sarangi, Abhishek Banerjee, Brij Lal, John Brittas, Pradan Baruah, Hemang Joshi, former external affairs minister Salman Khurshid, and former ambassador Mohan Kumar. The delegation to Malaysia is one of the seven multi-party delegations India has tasked to visit 33 global capitals to reach out to the international community to emphasise Pakistan's links to terrorism.

Tensions between India and Pakistan escalated after the Pahalgam attack, which claimed 26 lives. India carried out precision strikes on terror infrastructure in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir in the early hours of May 7, following which Pakistan attempted to attack Indian military bases on May 8, 9, and 10. The Indian side responded strongly to the Pakistani actions. The on-ground hostilities ended with an understanding of stopping the military actions following talks between the directors general of military operations of both sides on May 10. (PTI)

Indore couple missing in M'laya

left for Meghalaya on May 20. As per Meghalaya police, the couple had arrived in Mawlakhat village on May 22 on a rented scooter. They trekked over 3,000 steps down a gorge to visit the famous 'living roots' bridges in Nongriat village, where they stayed the night in a homestay. On May 24, their scooter was found abandoned outside a cafe along the road from Shillong to Sohra, as per police.

Heavy rainfall, landslides and low visibility have been major challenges for the rescue teams, armed with drones, in the last few days, as per police in the north eastern state. Madhya Pradesh MPs Shankar Lalwani and Sumer Singh Solanki had earlier reviewed the rescue operations with Meghalaya DGP I Nongrang and Chief Secretary D P Wahlang, officials said.

Earlier, the deceased's brother Sachin Raghuvanshi had claimed the couple may have been kidnapped and had urged the use of the army to trace them. He had told reporters here that local hotel staff guides and those renting out two-wheelers in the north eastern state may be involved in the disappearance. (PTI)

MakeMyTrip introduces predictive 'Seat Availability Forecast' to assist train travellers

GUWAHATI, June 2: Online travel platform MakeMyTrip has rolled out a new feature, 'Seat Availability Forecast', aimed at easing the travel planning process for Indian railway passengers. The tool leverages historical booking data and real-time demand analytics to predict how long seats on a selected train are likely to remain available, helping users book more strategically.

According to an official statement from the company, the feature is intended to address a key challenge faced by many travellers: the unpredictability of confirmed ticket availability. While train bookings in India open 60 days in advance, a significant number of passengers confirm their travel plans much later—often leading to the booking of waitlisted tickets. MakeMyTrip's internal data suggests that nearly 40% of users engage in multiple booking sessions, and of those, around 70% eventually settle for waitlisted seats due to declining availability. With booking patterns fluctuating weekly, the window for confirmed reservations remains inconsistent.

In April, most high-speed trains were sold out around 13 days prior to departure, while by May, increasing demand pushed that figure to over 20 days. The new feature aims to bring greater predictability to this process. Commenting on the launch, Rajesh Magow, Co-founder and Group CEO of MakeMyTrip, said, "We are focussed on our mission to anticipate and address the nuanced needs of Indian rail passengers. Seat Availability Forecast is a result of that effort, rooted in data science, built to be seamless, and designed to solve a real planning challenge for millions of users."

Sensex, Nifty end lower as renewed global trade concerns weigh on sentiments

MUMBAI, June 2: Benchmark equity indices Sensex and Nifty on Monday ended marginally lower, following sluggish trends in global markets amid renewed global trade concerns.

Besides, the Russian-Ukraine conflict, sharp jump in Brent crude oil prices and foreign fund outflows dented investors' sentiment, experts noted.

After tumbling 796.75 points or 0.97 per cent to 80,654.26 in intraday trade, the 30-share BSE Sensex witnessed volatile trends and later ended 77.26 points or 0.09 per cent lower at 81,373.75.

The NSE Nifty dipped 34.10 points or 0.14 per cent to settle at 24,716.60. During the day, it dropped 224.55 points or 0.90 per cent to 24,526.15.

"Benchmark indices closed lower with marginal losses in a volatile start to June. Markets started the week on a cautious, range-bound note, with Nifty-50 sharply lower at open on fresh trade tensions after the US announced the doubling of steel and aluminium tariffs to 50 per cent. Despite positive domestic cues after surprisingly strong GDP growth in the January-March 2025 quarter, markets were dragged lower in the morning on worsening global headlines ranging from trade to war.

"US and China traded barbs with each other over the weekend while Russia Ukraine conflict worsened after drone attacks. Markets soon staged a strong recovery erasing the sharp morning losses, as investors look forward to RBI meet and widely expected rate cut," Satish Chandra Aluri, Analyst, Lemonn Markets Desk, said.

From the Sensex firms, Tech Mahindra, Tata Steel, Tata Motors, Titan, HDFC Bank, IndusInd

Bank, Infosys and Kotak Mahindra Bank were among the biggest laggards.

On the other hand, Adani Ports, Mahindra & Mahindra, Power Grid, Eternal and Hindustan Unilever were among the gainers.

The BSE midcap gauge jumped 0.58 per cent and smallcap index went up by 0.36 per cent.

Among sectoral indices, BSE Focused IT dropped 0.70 per cent, metal (0.58 per cent), teck (0.45 per cent), consumer durables (0.40 per cent), commodities (0.18 per cent) and oil & gas (0.13 per cent). Realty surged 2.38 per cent, services (1.20 per cent), FMCG (0.65 per cent), utilities (0.57 per cent) and power (0.35 per cent).

In Asian markets, Japan's Nikkei and Hong Kong's Hang Seng settled lower, while South Korea's Kospi ended in positive territory. Markets in China were closed for a holiday. European markets were trading lower in mid-session deals. US markets ended on a mixed note on Friday.

Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) offloaded equities worth ₹ 6,449.74 crore on Friday, according to exchange data. US President Donald Trump on Friday said he would double tariffs on steel and aluminium to 50 per cent. "The domestic market continued its consolidation phase for the third consecutive week, influenced by renewed concerns over a potential tariff war and escalating geopolitical tensions between Russia and Ukraine.

"While global uncertainties have led investors to adopt a risk-averse approach, the Indian market has demonstrated resilience, underpinned by robust institutional inflows and selective sectoral strength like FMCG, real estate, and financial stocks," Vinod Nair, Head of Research, Geojit Investments Limited, said.

Meanwhile, India's manufacturing sector growth fell to a three-month low in May, restricted by inflationary pressures, softer demand and heightened geopolitical conditions, a monthly survey said on Monday. The seasonally adjusted HSBC India Manufacturing Purchasing Managers' Index (PMI) fell from 58.2 in April to 57.6 in May, highlighting the weakest improvement in operating conditions since February.

Supportive domestic macro indicators include a potential RBI rate cut, a better monsoon, Q4 GDP data and better GST collection, Nair added.

Indian economy expanded at a faster pace than expected in the last quarter of the 2024-25 fiscal, helping clock a 6.5 per cent growth rate in the year that elevated its size to USD 3.9 trillion and held promise of crossing the world's fourth-largest economy Japan in FY26.

The Indian economy grew at 7.4 per cent in January-March - the fourth and final quarter of April 2024 to March 2025 fiscal (FY25) - reflecting a strong cyclical rebound that was helped by a rise in private consumption and robust growth in construction and manufacturing.

Gross GST collections remained above the ₹ 2 trillion mark for the second straight month, rising 16.4 per cent in May to over ₹ 2.01 lakh crore. Global oil benchmark Brent crude jumped 3.28 per cent to USD 64.84 a barrel.

On Friday, the BSE Sensex declined by 182.01 points or 0.22 per cent to settle at 81,451.01. The Nifty dipped 82.90 points or 0.33 per cent to 24,750.70. (PTI)

Health minister Ashok Singhal reviews departmental performance

Issues key directives to strengthen services in flood-affected areas

GUWAHATI, June 2: Health and Family Welfare Minister Ashok Singhal on Monday reviewed the functioning of the Health and Family Welfare Department during a meeting held at the National Health Mission office in Guwahati.

The meeting was attended by senior officials including Commissioner & Secretaries P Ashok Babu and Barnali Sharma, Commissioner & Secretary of Medical Education and Research Dr Siddharth Singh, Director of Health Services Dr Umesh Phangcho, Director of Health Services (Family Welfare) Kamaljit Talukdar and Executive Director of the National Health Mission, Assam, Dr Manoj Choudhury.

The meeting reviewed various aspects of the department's work, including implementation of schemes, infrastructure development and the delivery of health services, particularly in flood-affected areas.

Minister Singhal emphasized the need for continuous health check-ups and timely distribution of essential medicines in relief shelters. He instructed doctors, nurses and health workers to remain fully



alert to tackle the rise in waterborne and other infectious diseases during and after the floods.

He also reviewed the department's efforts to control the spread of malaria in the Indo-Bhutan border areas of Kokrajhar and Chirang districts.

During the meeting, the Minister identified several priority areas and issued directions for immediate action.

He directed the department to establish a Fast Referral Unit (FRU) in each Assembly constituency to provide maternal, pediatric and emergency health services.

He also instructed the Director of Ayush, Assam, to arrange regular yoga training sessions at every Ayushman Aranya Mandir as part of the Fit India Movement and to encourage community participation in health awareness initia-

tives.

Minister Singhal stressed the importance of fully digitizing the administrative and information systems of the department to enhance efficiency and transparency. He asked officials to ensure the availability of essential medicines in every government hospital across the state.

Additionally, he directed the department to conduct regular training and personality development programs for doctors, nurses, ASHA workers and all healthcare staff to improve the quality of service delivery.

The meeting also included a detailed review of the current status of blood banks in the state, the progress of Ayushman Bharat-Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AB-PMJAY) and Ayushman Assam-Mukhya Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AA-MMJAY) and precautionary measures to be taken in light of the recent rise in COVID-19 infections.

Minister Singhal emphasized the need for a proactive and people-centric approach in delivering healthcare services, especially in times of crisis like the ongoing floods.

Margherita admin intensifies flood relief and rehabilitation operations

MARGHERITA, June 2: In the wake of severe floods impacting more than 15 villages under the Margherita Revenue Circle, the Margherita Co-District Administration, in close coordination with the Tinsukia District Administration, has launched and sustained a comprehensive relief and rehabilitation mission to support affected communities.

As of now, 21 relief camps have been established across the affected areas, providing temporary shelter and essential supplies to displaced families. "Relief materials, including food, drinking water, and basic necessities, have been adequately supplied to all camps to ensure immediate sustenance," officials confirmed.

To support the nutritional needs of children, the ICDS Project Margherita has been actively distributing nutritional food supplements, with dedicated Anganwadi workers ensuring timely and adequate coverage.

In an effort to safeguard public health and hygiene, the Public Health Engineering Department (PHED) has installed temporary toilets and is distributing bleaching powder in flood-affected areas to prevent the outbreak of waterborne diseases.

Medical teams from the Margherita Urban Primary Health Centre (UPHC) and Ketetong Block Primary Health Centre (BPHC) are conducting regular health camps in the relief sites. These teams are monitoring health conditions, offering immediate medical assistance, and helping mitigate the risks of communicable diseases during this emergency.



In recognition of the needs of livestock owners, animal fodder has already been distributed in over 12 villages, with distribution ongoing to ensure comprehensive coverage.

Circle Officer of Margherita, along with assigned Magistrates and Land Revenue Assistants (LRAs), are carrying out on-site visits to the camps to supervise operations, ensure the efficient delivery of services, and interact directly with affected residents.

The administration also acknowledged the crucial role played by gaon pradhans, police personnel, and local volunteers, who have been working round-the-clock to support operations, provide logistics assistance, and maintain public order.

According to the latest bulletin from the Water Resources Department, the water levels of both the Buridihing and Tirap rivers are receding, providing a positive outlook and raising hope for a return to normalcy in the days ahead. The district administration assures that all necessary steps will continue to be taken to support the affected population and restore livelihoods and infrastructure in the aftermath of the floods.

Minor boy drowns in Jamuna River at Manja

DIPHU, June 2: In a heartbreaking incident, a minor boy drowned in the Jamuna River at Manja, Karbi Anglong, on Sunday afternoon. The child's body, which had gone missing, was recovered today (June 2) after a tireless search operation.

The rescue effort was jointly carried out by the State Disaster Response Force (SDRF), Kuki Students' Organisation (Manja Unit), and the Kuki Colony Village Authority.

As per reports, the child was at the riverbank with his mother when he accidentally slipped into the water. In a desperate attempt to save him, the mother also entered the river but was unable to rescue her son. She narrowly escaped drowning and was saved by a local youth, Thangminhao Lhouvum, son of Pastor Thangkhojang Lhouvum.

The mother is currently undergoing treatment at the Diphu Medical College & Hospital (DMC&H) in Karbi Anglong.

The tragic incident has cast a pall of grief over the community, and local leaders have extended their condolences to the bereaved family.

Mass protest erupts in Margherita over suspension of coal workers

MARGHERITA, June 2: In a powerful show of solidarity and outrage, hundreds of coal workers from North Eastern Coalfields (NECL) Margherita and ANE Mining Private Limited staged a mass protest on Saturday morning at the Tikak weight bridge area, voicing strong opposition to a controversial directive allegedly issued by ANE Mining Pvt. Ltd. to suspend contract-based workers effective June 1.

The announcement has sparked widespread panic and anger among the more than 400 affected employees and has raised alarm bells across the local business community.

According to Pallav Shyam Wailung, General Secretary and Spokesperson of the Tirap Autonomous District Council Demand Committee, the abrupt suspension not only jeopardizes livelihoods but also threatens to destabilize the entire socio-economic fabric of Margherita region, which heavily relies on coal operations for survival.

"A few years ago, six major collieries—Bargolai, Tikak East and West, Ledo OCP, Tirap, and Tipong—were operational under NEC CIL. Over time, due to environmental and other concerns, only Tikak East Colliery (Expansion) remained functional. Now, even that has come under threat," said Wailung.

He lamented that the 200-year-old Northeast Coalfields (a subsidiary of Coal India Ltd.), once a symbol of industrial legacy in Assam, has

been reduced to ruins due to mismanagement and lack of long-term vision.

"NEC is not just a company. It is a lifeline for Margherita. From rickshaw pullers to shopkeepers, from educational institutions to hospitals, everyone is connected. Shutting down coal production is not just shutting jobs—it's shutting down lives," he said.

Wailung drew a sharp contrast between colonial-era governance and the present-day handling of the coal industry.

"The White Sahabs (British-era officials) laid the foundation of industrial growth here. The Black Sahabs (modern-day officials), instead of strengthening it, have looted, exploited, and destroyed this legacy. This is not an accusation; it's a lived reality," he remarked.

The closure of all six collieries under NEC CIL has triggered grave concerns, especially given their contributions to local CSR initiatives—supplying electricity and water, operating the VKV School in Bargolai, running the Central Hospital in Margherita, and constructing public infrastructure like latrines and toilets.

"We are now entering dark days in the Margherita region," Wailung warned, referring to the current industrial stagnation.

The Tirap Autonomous District Council Demand Committee has called for the immediate reopening of Tikak East, Tikak West, and Tirap Collieries, utilizing the existing dumping grounds to resume operations.

Cattle feed distributed

Furthermore, the organisation called for the issuance of Other Backward Class (OBC) certificates to Tea Tribes using the designation "Adivasi," instead of the broad term "Tea Tribes," asserting that the generic label undermines the unique identities of individual tribal communities.

Another prominent demand focused on raising the minimum daily wage for tea garden workers to Rs 550. The protesters noted that the last increase in minimum wages occurred in 2016, with workers receiving only temporary wage hikes since then.

AASAA also sought land pattas for Adivasis who have lived on surplus ceiling land, government land, and forest areas for generations.

Moreover, AASAA called for healthcare benefits for retired tea workers, including lifelong free medical care and transportation, placing the responsibility on tea garden management.

After the demonstration, AASAA submitted a formal memorandum containing their demands to Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma through Dibrugarh District Commissioner Bikram Kairi.

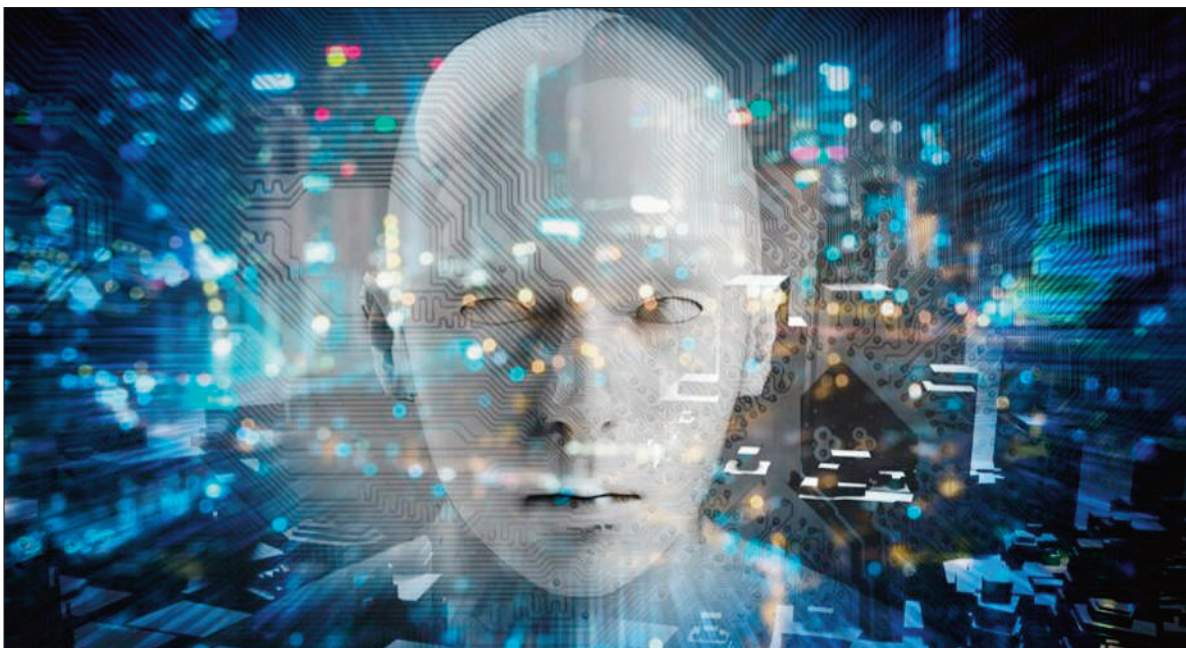

BOULDER (US), June 2: A man with a makeshift flamethrower yelled "Free Palestine" and hurled an incendiary device into a group that had assembled to raise attention for Israeli hostages in Gaza, law enforcement officials said Sunday. Eight people were injured, some with burns.

The suspect, Mohamed Sabry Soliman, 45, was booked into the Boulder County jail north of Denver and expected to face charges in connection with the attack the FBI was investigating as a terrorist act. Online records did not immediately show when he would make a court appearance.

The burst of violence at the popular Pearl Street pedestrian mall, a four-block area in downtown Boulder, unfolded against the backdrop of a war between Israel and Hamas that continues to inflame global tensions and has contributed to a spike in antisemitic violence in the United States.

The attack happened on the beginning of the Jewish holiday of Shavuot, which is marked with the reading of the Torah and barely a week after a man who also yelled "Free Palestine" was charged with fatally shooting two Israeli embassy staffers outside of a Jewish museum in Washington.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu issued a statement Monday saying he, his wife and the entire nation of Israel were praying for the full recovery of the people wounded in the "vicious terror attack" in Colorado.

"This attack was aimed against peaceful people who wished to express their solidarity with the hostages held by Hamas, simply because they were Jews," Netanyahu said.

Across the US, the New York Police Department said it has upped its presence at religious sites throughout the city for Shavuot.

"Sadly, attacks like this are becoming too common across the country," said Mark Michalek, the special agent in charge of the FBI's Denver field office, which encompasses Boulder. "This is an example of how perpetrators of violence continue to threaten communities across the nation."



The eight victims who were wounded range in age from 52 to 88 and the injuries spanned from serious to minor, officials said.

The attack occurred as people with a volunteer group called Run For Their Lives was concluding their weekly demonstration to raise visibility for the hostages who remain in Gaza.

Video from the scene shows a witness shouting, "He's right there. He's throwing Molotov cocktails," as a police officer with his gun drawn advances on a bare-chested suspect who is holding containers in each hand.

Alex Osante of San Diego said he was having lunch on a restaurant patio across the pedestrian mall when he heard the crash of a bottle breaking on the ground, a "boom" sound followed by people yelling and screaming.

In video of the scene captured by Osante, people could be seen pouring water on a woman lying on the ground who Osante said had caught on fire during the attack. A man, who later identified himself as an Israeli visiting Boulder who decided

to join the group that day, ran up to Osante on the video asking for some water to help.

Suspect reemerged after initial attack before being arrested

After the initial attack, Osante said the suspect went behind some bushes and then reemerged and threw a Molotov cocktail but apparently accidentally caught himself on fire as he threw it.

The man then took off his shirt and what appeared to be a bulletproof vest before the police arrived. The man dropped to the ground and was arrested without any apparent resistance in the video that Osante filmed.

As people tried to help the woman on the ground, another woman who appeared to be a participant in the event yelled to others out of the camera's view, defending their cause, saying they don't talk about the government but just talk about the hostages.

Lynn Segal, 72, was among about 20 people who gathered Sunday. They had finished their march in front of the courthouse when a "rope of fire" shot in front of her and then "two big flares."

She said the scene quickly turned chaotic as people worked to find water to put out flames and find help.

Segal, who said she is Jewish on her father's side and has supported the Palestinian cause for more than 40 years, was concerned that she might be accused of helping the suspect because she was wearing a pro-Palestinian shirt.

"There were people who were burning, I wanted to help," she said. "But I didn't want to be associated with the perpetrator."

Authorities say they believe the suspect acted alone

Authorities did not disclose details about Soliman but said they believe that he acted alone and that no other suspect was being sought. No criminal charges were immediately announced but officials said they would move to hold Soliman

accountable. He was also injured and was taken to the hospital to be treated, but authorities didn't elaborate on the nature of his injuries.

FBI leaders immediately declared the attack an act of terrorism and the Justice Department denounced it as a "needless act of violence, which follows recent attacks against Jewish Americans."

"This act of terror is being investigated as an act of ideologically motivated violence based on the early information, the evidence, and witness accounts. We will speak clearly on these incidents when the facts warrant it," FBI Deputy Director Dan Bongino said in a post on X.

Israel's war in Gaza began when Hamas-led militants stormed into southern Israel on October 7, 2023, killing some 1,200 people, mostly civilians, and abducting about 250 others. They are still holding 58 hostages, around a third believed to be alive, after most of the rest were released in ceasefire agreements or other deals.

Israel's military campaign has killed over 54,000 people in Hamas-run Gaza, mostly women and children, according to Gaza's Health Ministry, which does not say how many of the dead were civilians or combatants. The offensive has destroyed vast areas, displaced around 90 per cent of the population and left people almost completely reliant on international aid.

The violence comes four years after a shooting rampage at a grocery store in Boulder, about 25 miles (40 kilometres) northwest of Denver, that killed 10 people. The gunman was sentenced to life in prison for murder after a jury rejected his attempt to avoid prison time by pleading not guilty by reason of insanity.

Multiple blocks of the pedestrian mall area were evacuated by police. The scene shortly after the attack was tense, as law enforcement agents with a police dog walked through the streets looking for threats and instructed the public to stay clear of the mall. (AP)

Macron, US senators warn: Putin 'is preparing for more war'

PARIS, June 2: Russian President Vladimir Putin is stalling at the peace table while preparing a new military offensive in Ukraine, two senior US senators warned on Sunday, arguing that the next two weeks could shape the future of a war that has already smashed cities, displaced millions and redrawn Europe's security map.

Republican Sen. Lindsey Graham and Democratic Sen. Richard Blumenthal spoke to The Associated Press in Paris after meeting President Volodymyr Zelenskyy and touring neighbourhoods shattered by what they called the worst Russian bombardments since the full-scale invasion began.

In Paris for talks with French President Emmanuel Macron — who they say is "100 per cent aligned" with them on the war — the senators warned the window to prevent a renewed assault is closing.

A sweeping US sanctions bill could be the West's last chance to choke off the Kremlin's war economy, they said — adding that they hope their first-hand findings will shift momentum in Washington and help bring a sceptical President Donald Trump on board.

"What I learned on this trip was he's preparing for more war," Graham said of Putin. Blumenthal called the sanc-



tions proposed in legislation "bone-crushing" and said it would place Russia's economy "on a trade island".

"It is crunch time for Putin and for the world because Russia is mounting a new offensive," he said. At the heart of their push is a bipartisan sanctions bill, backed by nearly the entire US Senate but still facing uncertain odds in Washington. It would impose 500 per cent tariffs on countries that continue buying Russian oil, gas, uranium and other exports — targeting nations like China and India that account for roughly 70 per cent of Russia's energy trade and bankroll much of its war effort. Graham called it "the most draconian bill I've ever seen in my life in the Senate".

"The world has a lot of cards to play against Putin," he said. "We're going to hit China and India for propping up

his war machine."

Peace talks or stalling tactic?

With peace talks yielding little and Trump's approach to Ukraine highly uncertain, Graham and Blumenthal have stepped into the breach — blunt emissaries on a lonely mission. Political opposites moving in lockstep, they're crossing Europe, and the aisle, with the moral urgency of two men trying to forestall another Russian offensive before it's too late. Peace talks are scheduled to resume Monday in Istanbul. But Ukrainian officials say Moscow has yet to submit a serious proposal — a delay both senators described as deliberate and dangerous.

"Putin is playing President Trump," Blumenthal said. "He's taking him for a sucker." The senator said Putin "is, in effect, stalling and stonewalling, prolonging the conversation so that he can mount this offensive and take control of more territory on the ground." Graham added: "We saw credible evidence of a summer or early fall invasion, a new offensive by Putin. ... He's preparing for more war."

Trump has yet to endorse the sanctions bill, telling reporters Friday: "I don't know. I'll have to see it." Graham said the legislation was drafted in consultation with Trump's advisers.

Graham backed the president's

diplomatic instincts but said, "By trying to engage Putin — by being friendly and enticing — it's become painfully clear he's not interested in ending this war." Blumenthal hoped the bipartisan support for Ukraine at least in the Senate — and the personal testimonies they plan to bring home to Congress and the Oval Office — may help shift the conversation.

"He needs to see and hear that message as well from us, from the American people," he said of Putin.

A moral reckoning

In Kyiv, the senators said, the war's human toll was impossible to ignore. Graham pointed to what Ukrainian officials and Yale researchers estimate are nearly 20,000 children forcibly deported to Russia — calling their return a matter of justice, not diplomacy. Blumenthal described standing at mass grave sites in Bucha, where civilians were executed with shots to the head. The destruction, he said, and the stories of those who survived, made clear the stakes of delay. "Putin is a thug. He's a murderer."

Both said that failing to act now could pull the US deeper into conflict later. If Putin isn't stopped in Ukraine, Blumenthal said, NATO treaty obligations could one day compel American troops into battle. (AP)

Sweden faces call to halt international adoptions after inquiry finds abuses, fraud

STOCKHOLM, June 2: A Swedish commission recommended on Monday that international adoptions be stopped after an investigation found a series of abuses and fraud dating back decades. Sweden is the latest country to examine its international adoption policies after allegations of unethical practices, particularly in South Korea. The commission was formed in 2021 following a report by Swedish newspaper Dagens Nyheter detailing the Scandinavian country's problematic international adoption system. Monday's recommendations were sent to Minister of Social Services Camilla Waltersson Grönvall. "The assignment was to investigate whether there had been irregularities that the Swedish actors knew about, could have done and actually did," Anna Singer, a legal expert and the head of the commission, told a press conference.

"And actors include everyone who has had anything to do with international adoption activities."

"It includes the government, the supervisory authority, organisation, municipalities and courts. The conclusion is that there have been irregularities in the international adoptions to Sweden." The commission called on the government to formally apologise to adoptees and their families. Investigators found confirmed cases of child trafficking in every decade from the 1970s to the 2000s, including from Sri Lanka, Colombia, Poland and China. Singer said a public apology, besides being important for those who are personally affected, can help raise awareness about the violations because there is a tendency to download the exis-

tence and significance of the abuses.

An Associated Press investigation, also documented by Frontline (PBS), last year reported dubious child-gathering practices and fraudulent paperwork involving South Korea's foreign adoption program, which peaked in the 1970s and '80s amid huge Western demands for babies. The AP and Frontline spoke with more than 80 adoptees in the US, Australia and Europe and examined thousands of pages of documents to reveal evidence of kidnapped or missing children ending up abroad, fabricated child origins, babies switched with one another and parents told their newborns were gravely sick or dead, only to discover decades later they'd been sent to new parents overseas.

The findings are challenging the international adoption industry, which was built on the model created in South Korea.

The Netherlands last year announced it would no longer allow its citizens to adopt from abroad. Denmark's only international adoption agency said it was shutting down and Switzerland apologised for failing to prevent illegal adoptions. France released a scathing assessment of its own culpability. South Korea sent around 200,000 children to the West for adoptions in the past six decades, with more than half of them placed in the US.

Along with France and Denmark, Sweden was a major European destination of South Korean children, adopting nearly 10,000 of them since the 1960s. (AP)

Pak despatches two delegations to key capitals to present its perspective on recent conflict with India

ISLAMABAD, June 2: Pakistan on Monday unveiled the details of its global diplomatic push to seek international support following the recent conflict with India and highlight the importance of dialogue to tackle problems between the two countries.

The diplomatic outreach comprises two delegations marching towards different directions to garner support for the country, the Foreign Office said in a statement.

The move comes after India sent seven multi-party delegations to 33 global capitals as part of its diplomatic outreach following the terrorist attack in Pahalgam that claimed 26 lives.

On Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif's directive, a high-level multi-party delegation will visit New York, Washington DC, London and Brussels from 2 June 2025, the Foreign Office (FO) said.

The nine-member delegation is led by the Pakistan People's Party Chairman and former Foreign Minister Bilawal Bhutto Zardari.

The other members of the delegation include federal minister Mudasir Malik, former foreign ministers Hina Rabbani Khar and Khur-

ram Dasgiri Khan, former ministers Syed Faisal Ali Subzwari and Sherry Rehman, Senator Bushra Anjum Butt. It also includes two former foreign secretaries - Jilil Abbas Jilani and Tehmina Janjua.

Another delegation, led by Special Assistant to the Prime Minister, Syed Tariq Fatemi, will visit Moscow from June 2. The details of its composition were not shared.

The two delegations would engage in a series of meetings with the leadership of international bodies, public office holders, senior officials, parliamentarians, think tanks, media and diaspora, the FO said.

"The visits of these delegations are aimed at projecting Pakistan's perspective on the recent Indian aggression," it said, adding that they would also "highlight that dialogue and diplomacy should take precedence over conflict and confrontation".

The need for immediate resumption of the normal functioning of the Indus Waters Treaty will also be a key theme of the delegations' outreach, according to FO. (PTI)

RFK Jr says autism 'destroys' families



WASHINGTON, June 2: Emery Eversoll and her mother shared a good laugh when Health and Human Services Secretary Robert F. Kennedy Jr. said that some autistic children will never write poems.

The 16-year-old's bedroom is full of notebooks featuring her prose. Sometimes, she quietly recites poetry to get through an outburst of anger. Her mother began suspecting she may have autism, in part, because she had memorised every word from a favourite book by age 2.

Still, this Kansas family is optimistic about Kennedy's plans to launch a broad-based study of what causes autism, the complex developmental disorder that impacts the brain and causes delays in language or learning, social withdrawal and an unusual need for routine.

Kennedy has vowed to identify some of the causes of autism, which has been studied for decades, by September.

Kennedy has said autism "destroys families". He said children with autism "will never pay taxes, they'll never hold a job, they'll never play baseball, they'll never write a poem, they'll never go out on a date. Many of them will never use a toilet unsupervised".

His comments and his plan to swiftly study its causes, have splintered a community of millions of people living with autism. For some, they were an overdue recognition of the day-to-day difficulties for families with autistic loved ones. To others, Kennedy deeply misrepresented the realities of their disability, provoking concern about his ability to handle a sweeping assessment

of the disorder.

Some worry, too, that Kennedy has spent years suggesting that vaccines might cause autism, despite decades of scientific research that shows no such link.

Ohio father Scott Copeland, himself autistic and a parent to two autistic children, does not trust that Kennedy will conduct a legitimate study.

"It'd be like standing up and saying you're going to have the cure for cancer in six months," said Copeland, who's 56. "Angry isn't a sufficient word."

Life with autism can be a daily struggle

While announcing plans to study the causes of autism, Kennedy described a grim life for those who have to cope with it.

For Kelly Van Den Bergh, Kennedy's comments reflect a painful reality for the son she loves. The Massachusetts mom of five has an 18-year-old son, Daniel, who has profound autism.

Daniel cannot speak, although a tablet helps him communicate. He frequently punches himself so hard that he's at risk for fracture or concussion. About a decade ago, doctors recommended he enter a full-time residential facility for his safety. It took years for his mother to agree to that, and, even now, tears well up in her eyes as she talks about that decision. "My child, I do truly believe, that if he were able to tell us, he would not want autism because this has not affected him in a positive way," Van Den Bergh said. "So, for me, having someone finally recognize my son and his population is amazing." (AP)

Several areas in Miao subdivision have been inundated Arunachal flood, landslide toll rises to 10



ITANAGAR, June 2: With one more death reported from Lohit district, the toll in landslides and floods in Arunachal Pradesh rose to 10 even as incessant monsoon rains lashed the state on Monday, officials said.

According to the State Emergency Operation Centre (SEOC), 938 people in 156 villages in 23 districts have been affected by the monsoon deluge.

The body of Gupitaj Bharali, swept away by flooded Sukha Nallah in Upper Digaru was recovered downstream at Lasa Pani in Lohit district on Sunday.

Governor Lt General K T Panik (Retd) has expressed deep sorrow over the loss of lives and extended heartfelt condolences to the bereaved families. He urged

residents to remain alert, especially in vulnerable and landslide-prone areas. Calling on district administrations to remain vigilant, the governor emphasised the importance of night time movement restrictions in risky zones and advocated proactive communication to keep citizens informed and safe.

With major rivers and their tributaries flowing above danger levels, flood-like conditions and landslides have also been reported in West Kameng, Kamle, Lower and Upper Subansiri, Papum Pare, Dibang Valley, Lower Dibang Valley, Lohit, Changlang, Kra Daadi, Kurung Kumey, and Longding districts of the state.

In East Kameng district, a devastating landslide on the Bana-Seppa stretch of National Highway

13 late on Friday night swept away a vehicle carrying two families, killing all seven occupants.

In another incident, two labourers were buried under debris while working on a cabbage farm near Pine Grove in Lower Subansiri district. Two others were rescued.

Two persons, one from Assam's Dispur at Parshuram Kund in Lohit district and another in Anjaw district, have gone missing in separate incidents, the report said, adding, search operations are currently underway.

In Kamle district's Pamuk village, a man was injured in a landslide and is receiving medical treatment.

In Changlang district, flash floods from the Buri-Dihing River washed away 50 per cent of the

Makantong bridge at the Trans Arunachal Highway, on Saturday, severing vital road connectivity between Miao and Bordumsa.

Several areas in Miao subdivision have been inundated, causing significant losses to livestock and horticultural property.

Tourist resorts such as Zupra and River Cafe, located along the Noa-Dehing River in Miao, have been submerged. The Industrial Training Institute at Balinong near Namchick, under Kharsang circle, suffered massive losses, with floodwaters destroying hostels, staff quarters, water tanks, and other key facilities.

The Noa-Dehing River has also eroded large swathes of agricultural and horticultural land in Dharmapur block under Namphai circle. The M'pen and Deban areas are now under water, officials said.

In Upper Subansiri district, the water supply system has been severely disrupted due to multiple breaches in the Hangkar pipeline following heavy rainfall on Friday. Public Health Engineering Department (PHED) teams are working to restore the supply, while tankers have been deployed to ensure interim relief.

Deputy Commissioner Tasso Gambo, along with PHED Executive Engineer Tago Dulom and other officials, visited the damaged site on Sunday. The DC directed immediate repairs and urged rapid water tanker distribution to affected areas.

In Namsai district, authorities have set up a relief camp at Alubari Government Secondary School, where 59 displaced people are currently taking shelter. (PTI)

ITANAGAR, June 2: In a significant step toward strengthening the power network in Arunachal Pradesh, Power Grid Corporation of India Limited (PGCIL) has

completed the 220 kV double circuit Kathalguri-Namsai transmission system five months before its scheduled deadline. The line was energised late on

Saturday night, a PGCIL statement said here on Monday.

The project, carried out under the Tariff-Based Competitive Bidding (TBCB) model, enhances the

reliability of electricity supply across the region. Stretching 71 km, the new line connects the

Assam gas-based power plant operated by NEEPCO at Kathalguri to a modern 220 kV gas-insulated substation (GIS) at Namsai in Arunachal Pradesh.

A bay extension at the Kathalguri end has also been completed to improve system operations.

The infrastructure upgrade allows smoother power flow from the national grid into Arunachal Pradesh, while also improving voltage stability and providing critical system backup, essential for a dependable year-round electricity supply.

It is expected to significantly support the region's development initiatives, the statement said.

Arunachal Pradesh Deputy Chief Minister Chowna Mein praised the accomplishment.

"Kudos to PGCIL for their exemplary execution and unwavering commitment to the Northeast. This project is a cornerstone in our journey toward robust and reliable energy infrastructure," he said in a social media post. (PTI)

India to get remaining S-400 missile systems by 2026, says Russia



NEW DELHI, June 2: Russia is committed to delivering the remaining units of the S-400 air defence system to India by 2025-2026, the country's Deputy Chief of Mission in India, Roman Babushkin, said on Monday, highlighting that the system performed "very efficiently" during the recent India-Pakistan tensions.

Babushkin also hinted at expanding bilateral cooperation with India in air defence and anti-drone systems.

"We heard that the S-400 performed very efficiently during the recent clashes between India and Pakistan. We have a long history of collaboration. The air defence systems, according to what we are experi-

encing, the situation in Europe and here, this is one of the promising topics of our partnership in defence preparation in general," Babushkin told PTI Videos.

Babushkin confirmed that the contract for the remaining two S-400 units is on track, with deliveries expected to be completed by 2025-26, in line with publicly announced timelines.

India signed a USD 5.43 billion deal with Russia in 2018 for five squadrons of the S-400 Triumf missile system, a state-of-the-art air defence platform capable of engaging multiple aerial threats at long ranges. Three squadrons have already been delivered.

On the potential expansion of defence collaboration, Babushkin expressed openness to further dialogue.

"We are open for promotion of this partnership for the discussion of the expansion of dialogue on air defence systems," he said, noting the strategic importance of such cooperation in the current global security environment.

Commenting on the growing threat of drones, particularly in light of their extensive use during the India-Pakistan clash, the deputy chief of mission highlighted Russia's experience in countering such challenges.

"We are facing this threat for several years already, and I think that our systems are being modernised constantly. I think it would be a joint interest from both sides how to counter this threat and lead to some other cooperation," he said, adding that anti-drone systems are already part of the ongoing India-Russia defence dialogue.

Babushkin also provided an update on a possible visit by Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov to India.

"The exact dates are not yet finalised, but it can happen anytime soon. We expect this month," he said. (PTI)

India-born restaurateur Asma Khan among 195 women features in record-setting song

NEW DELHI, June 2: India-born British restaurateur Asma Khan is among women from 195 countries who have featured in the "195" song which has entered the Guinness World Records for most nationalities to contribute vocals to a musical recording.

The song has been produced to raise awareness about gender equality and to ignite a global movement to uplift people through the transformative power of sound healing frequencies.

The Frequency School, co-founded by US Grammy-nominated and multi-platinum music producer Maejor, Martina Fuchs, Kingsley M, Brandon Lee and Aaron Dawson, has produced the powerful and universal campaign which premiered during the 55th Annual Meeting of the World Economic Forum (WEF) in Davos-Klosters, Switzerland, from January 20 to 24.

"It has always been my dream to produce the first song in history featuring every country on the planet. Our vision was to unite 195 ordinary women from all walks of life in this pioneering and groundbreaking initiative to advocate for gender equality and the rights of women and girls, and to help people struggling with mental health issues," said Fuchs, who is also the executive producer of "195".

"Breaking this record is only the beginning, we are on a global mission to make our world a more peaceful place," she said.

16 Naxalites surrender in Chhattisgarh

Kerlapenda village becomes Maoist-free, say police

SUKMA, June 2: Sixteen Naxalites, including six carrying a collective cash reward of ₹ 25 lakh, surrendered in Chhattisgarh's Sukma district on Monday, police said.

Of them, nine cadres belonged to Kerlapenda village panchayat under Chintalanar police station limits.

With this surrender, the village has become Naxalite-free, making it eligible for development projects of ₹ 1 crore as per a new scheme of the state government, an official said.

All 16 cadres, including a woman, turned themselves in before senior police and CRPF officials, here citing disappointment with the "hol- low" and "inhuman" Maoist ideology and atrocities by ul- tras on local tribals, Sukma Superintendent of Police Kiran Chavan said.

The cadres were also im- pressed by the Chhattisgarh government's 'Niyad Nella- nar' (your good village) scheme, aimed at facilitating development works in remote villages, and the state's new surrender and rehabilitation policy, he said.

Among those who surren- dered, Rita alias Dodi Sukki (36), a woman who was ac- tive as member of the central regional committee (CRC) company number 2 of Maoists, and Rahul Punem (18), a party member within PLGA battalion no. 1 of Maoists, carried a reward of ₹ 8 lakh each, he said.

Besides, Lekam Lakhma (28) carried a bounty of ₹ 3

lakh, while three more cadres carried a reward of ₹ 2 lakh each, the official said.

Out of the surrendered cadres, nine belonged to the Kerlapenda village pan- chayat. With their surren- der, the place has become Naxal- free, the official said.

As per the Elvad Panchayat Yojna of the state govern- ment, the village will be pro- vided an incentive of ₹ 1 crore for development works, he said.

The scheme has been intro- duced under the new Chhat- tisgarh Naxal Surrender/Victim Relief and Rehabilitation Policy-2025.

It provides for a sanction of development works of ₹ 1 crore for those village pan- chayats which facilitate in the surren- der of Naxalites active in their area and to pass a res- olution declaring them as Maoist-free.

This is the second such vil- lage panchayat in the district to get rid of the Naxal menace after the state government re- cently introduced the scheme.

In April, Badesatti was de- clared Naxal-free after all 11 lower-rung Naxalites from there surrendered before po- lice.

All the Naxalites who sur- rendered were provided an assistance of ₹ 50,000 each, and will be further rehabili- tated as per the government's policy, the SP said.

Last year, 792 Naxalites surrendered in the state's Bas- tar region, which comprises seven districts including Sukma. (PTI)

'State-sponsored repression': BJP intensifies attack on Mamata govt over arrest of influencer

NEW DELHI, June 2: The BJP on Monday upped the ante against the TMC government in West Bengal over the arrest of influencer Sharmishta Panoli, calling the action "state-sponsored repression" and "violation" of her right to freedom of speech and expression.

BJP spokesperson Gaurav Bhatia also took on West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee over the issue, calling her "ruthless".

Panoli, who hails from Kolkata and studies in Pune's Law University, was arrested by the Kolkata police in Gurugram late on May 30 for allegedly uploading a video on Instagram with communal comments claiming Bollywood actors were silent on Operation Sindoor.

She was later produced before a Kolkata court, which sent her to judicial custody till June 13.

Condemning the Panoli's arrest, Bhatia wrote on X, "Shameful". "This is not governance, this is political vendetta. This is not compliance with the law, but state-sponsored repression. Shame on 'ruthlessness' Banerjee. This is a brutal murder of democracy," he said, adding, "I strongly condemn this misuse of power".

Bhatia said the arrest of the influencer was a viola- tion of her right to freedom of speech and expression provided under Article 19 of the Constitution.

"This is a violation of Article 19 of the Constitution.



Today, the country is asking where has the gang that beat the drum of "freedom of expression" gone?" he asked. Attacking the TMC government, the BJP leader said Banerjee's police travelled "nearly 1,500 kilome- tres" from Kolkata to arrest the law student "just be- cause she had expressed her opinion, for which she had publicly apologised".

"But, the same police did not arrest the accused in the Sandeshkhali case until the high court reprimanded them. In the Murshidabad violence, they worked to pro- tect the accused," he charged.

Bhatia said lawyers' community and the entire "jus- tice loving society" stand with Panoli and her family. "If Sharmishta and her family need any legal help, I

am personally committed to provide all possible legal help," he added. Panoli's arrest has evoked sharp re- actions and criticism from various sections.

Bar Council of India chairman Manan Kumar Mishra on Sunday called for immediate release and fair trial for Panoli. The senior advocate and Rajya Sabha member said that he was standing firmly with Panoli, whose arrest and judicial custody for a now-deleted so- cial media video despite her immediate apology repre- sented "an absolute failure of justice and a blatant assault on freedom of expression".

On Monday, the Bar Council of Delhi condemned the influencer's arrest and demanded her "immediate release to uphold the scale of justice".

The Kolkata police has dismissed criticisms that they have "unlawfully" arrested the Instagram influencer and claimed that all legal procedures were followed.

They defended Panoli's arrest saying that the case was "duly investigated and adhering to legal proce- dures". "Kolkata Police acted lawfully according to the procedure established by law. The accused was not ar- rested for expressing patriotism or for personal belief; legal actions were taken for sharing offensive content which promotes hatred among the communities," Kolkata Police said in a post on Facebook on Sunday. Chain-link, solar fencing installed in UP's forest areas to mitigate human-wildlife conflicts

LUCKNOW, June 2: The Uttar Pradesh government has installed over 231 km of chain-link fencing and 41 km of solar fencing across forest areas to mitigate human-wildlife conflicts, an official statement issued here on Monday said.

The forest department has introduced several innovative measures to protect both wildlife and the lives and livelihoods of villagers residing near forest zones. Among these, the large-scale construction of chain-link fencing stands out as a highly effective intervention, it added.

Forest officials said chain link fencing is a type of fence made from metal wire or steel woven together to create a diamond-shaped mesh pattern and used due to its durability and cost-effectiveness.

Solar fencing forms a secure perimeter protection system that uses solar power to energise an electric fence. It is used in high-risk areas where the movement of wild animals is more, they said.

Solar fencing works by using solar panels to generate electricity, which is then stored in a battery and used to power the energiser. When an animal (or person) comes into contact with the fence, it completes the circuit, delivering a brief and non-lethal shock as a deterrent, the officials said.

These barriers have proven successful in deterring wildlife from straying into human settle- ments, thereby reducing crop damage, human casualties and incidents involving domestic animals entering forest areas and falling prey to wild predators, the statement said.

These efforts have significantly enhanced the safety of both wildlife and rural communities,

including their livestock, which live near forest boundaries. A key part of this strategy involves the deployment of department-trained 'Bagh Mitras', who are playing a vital role in bridging the gap between local communities and forest management, it said.

These volunteers not only promote wildlife conservation but also support conflict preven- tion through awareness programmes and real- time response coordination.

"Between 2023 and 2025, approximately 231 kilometres of chain-link fencing and 41 kilome- tres of solar fencing were installed across forest areas," it said.

Between 2023 and 2024, about 125 km of chain-link fencing and 21 km of solar fencing were installed, followed by 106 km of chain- link and 20 km of solar fencing between 2024 and 2025, the statement said.

The selection and training of 'Bagh Mitras' for villages bordering tiger reserves as well as the Lion Safari in Etawah has emerged as an effective initiative.

These community volunteers help foster a sense of trust between villagers and the Forest Department by conducting regular awareness meetings that cover wildlife safety measures, animal behavioural patterns and emergency re- sponse protocols, it said.

To strengthen these initiatives, the State Dis- aster Mitigation Fund has facilitated the pro- curement of advanced surveillance and tracking equipment including drones, GPS devices, cam- era traps and other modern tools that are instru- mental in monitoring wildlife movements and preventing incursions into inhabited areas. (PTI)

Manipur floods: 19,811 people affected, 3,365 houses damaged

IMPHAL, June 2: More than 19,000 people have been affected by floods in Manipur caused by overflowing rivers and breaches in embankments, officials said on Monday.

They said 3,365 houses have been damaged and 19,811 people affected by floods triggered by incessant torrential rains during the last four days.

Thirty-one relief camps have been opened mostly in Imphal East district to mitigate the hardships of the people who have been evacuated from their homes and localities.

Heingang, Wangkhei and Khurai assembly constituencies in Imphal East district are worst affected along with Senapati district.

Forty-seven landslides too have been reported in different parts of the state during the last four days. Several localities in the state's capital Imphal, and many parts of Imphal East district have been inundated after a swollen river breached embankments and overflowed in Khurai, Heingang and Checkon areas, they said.

Waterlogging was reported on the premises of several offices, health facilities, and establishments, including All India Radio Imphal complex, and state-run Jawaharlal Nehru Institute of Medical Sciences, after the Imphal river overflowed in the Checkon area, one of the officials said.

Several patients, who have been undergoing treatment at Jawaharlal Nehru Institute of Medical Sciences at Porompat in Imphal East district, were shifted to other hospitals on Sunday evening as floodwaters entered the premises of the health facility, he said.



Local clubs, volunteers, SDRF and NDRF personnel joined hands to shift the patients after floodwaters entered the female orthopaedic and surgery wards, located on the ground floor, the official said.

Manipur Governor Ajay Kumar Bhalla visited several inundated areas of Imphal town even as the army and Assam Rifles personnel rescued nearly 800 people from submerged localities in Imphal East, the worst-affected district, they said.

Bhalla, accompanied by Chief Secretary PK Singh and other senior officials, visited Kangla Nongpok Thong, Lairikyengbam Leikai, and Singamei Bridge in Imphal and

assessed the overall situation, a Raj Bhavan statement said.

The water level of the Iril river in Imphal East district crossed the danger mark on Sunday but is yet to breach the embankments, he said. In view of the incessant rain, the governor announced the extension of the summer vacation in schools in Imphal East and West districts and the Senapati sub-division of Senapati district until further orders.

Parts of the Senapati district have been affected after the Senapati river overflowed near Viewland colony, the officials said.

The Indian army and Assam Rifles rescued approximately 800 civilians on Saturday, a

statement said.

Troops of Assam Rifles were deployed with quick reaction teams to the most affected locations in Porompat, Wankhei, Sanjen-thong, Palace Compound, New Checkon, Khurai Heikrumakhong Heingang, Soibam Leikai, Wangkhei Angom Leikai, Nongmeibung Raj Bari in Imphal East district and adjoining areas.

"The total number of people rescued reached approximately 800 people, including 10 to 20 differently abled and aged individuals," the statement said.

The authorities are coordinating with all relevant departments and agencies to ensure timely relief and rehabilitation efforts, another statement said.

Meanwhile, Lok Sabha MP Angomcha Bimol Akojiam has urged the governor to declare the flood situation a "state calamity".

In a letter to Bhalla, Akojiam said the declaration would enable the activation of institutional measures to deal with the present situation.

Manipur Congress President Keisham Meghachandra Singh on Sunday alleged that the water resources department has failed to control floods in various vulnerable areas of the state. He made the remarks during a visit to flood-affected areas of the Heingang constituency of former chief minister N Birren Singh. The Congress leader stressed that residential and agricultural areas have been submerged by overflowing rivers as the construction of various retaining walls remained incomplete. (PTI)

Three army personnel dead, 6 soldiers missing as landslide hits military camp in Sikkim



GANGTOK, June 2: Three army personnel died and six soldiers went missing after a landslide hit a military camp at Chhaten in Sikkim, a defence official said on Monday.

The landslide, which occurred at 7 pm on Sunday near Lachen town in Mangan district, was triggered by heavy rainfall in the area, he said.

"... A catastrophic landslide occurred following intense and continuous rainfall in the region causing death of three combatants, identified as Havaldar Lakhwinder

Singh, Lance Naik Munish Thakur, and Porter Abhishek Lakhada," the official said in a statement.

Bodies of the personnel have been recovered, while four other soldiers were rescued with minor injuries, the official said in a statement.

"Rescue teams are working round-the-clock under challenging conditions to locate the six missing personnel," he said. The army has expressed deep condolences to the families of the deceased and assured all necessary support, the defence official added. (PTI)

All schools remain shut in Mizoram for third day due to rain

AIZAWL, June 2: All schools across Mizoram remained shut on Monday due to heavy rain that triggered landslides, mudslides, rockfalls and waterlogging in different parts of the state, an official said.

School Education Department Director Angela Zothanpuui said that all the 11 district administrations announced the closure of schools on Monday as a precautionary measure to ensure the safety of the students.

The notifications issued by the district administrations said that the school closure directive comes following alarming weather forecasts issued by the India Meteorological Department (IMD), which predicted further heavy rainfall and possible natural hazards, including

been reported in different parts of the state till Sunday, and highways have been blocked at 83 locations, they said.

Officials of the state power department said that at least seven 33 KV sub-stations have been damaged and more than one-third area of the entire state is facing power outages due to rain.

Restoration works are underway and power is expected to be restored in such areas within the next two-three days if there is no further rain, they said.

The State Public Health Engineering Department also said that water supply has been disrupted in around 50 places and water pumping machines, which feed Kolasib and Hnaththial towns and Keitum village in Serchhip district, have been submerged under water. An IMD report said that Serchhip district received the highest amount of rainfall in the last 24 hours at 10.46 cm, followed by Kolasib (9.83 cm) and Aizawl (9.74 cm).

Isolated heavy to very heavy rainfall is likely in the state on Monday, it said.

Chief Minister Lal-duhoma on Sunday held an emergency meeting with ministers and senior officials in the wake of landslides and waterlogging, triggered by heavy rains.

The meeting agreed to take stringent measures regarding construction and building plans as it was observed that several incidents were caused due to human error.

The meeting decided to facilitate the immediate release of funds to district disaster management authorities to enable them to expedite various work. Detailed reports of calamities and the challenges faced by the state government in the wake of heavy rain would be submitted to the Centre as soon as possible.

They also agreed to give priority to highways connecting district headquarters and Lengpui airport to ensure that connectivity was not disrupted. (PTI)

Over 10,600 in relief camps, West District hit hardest; 201 homes damaged

AGARTALA, June 1: Continuous heavy rainfall has triggered severe flooding across Tripura, prompting the state government to open 60 relief camps accommodating over 10,600 people from nearly 2,800 families. West Tripura district remains the worst affected, according to officials.

Tripura Revenue Secretary Brijesh Pandey today addressing a press conference, said that widespread heavy to very heavy rainfall on May 31 and June 1 was caused by active monsoon conditions and significant moisture incursion, as reported by the India Meteorological Department (IMD), Agartala Centre.

"In response to the prevailing and anticipated weather conditions, a Red Alert has been issued for all districts, warning of heavy to extremely heavy rainfall in some areas today and tomorrow. The Chief Minister is personally monitoring the situation, and all District Magistrates have been instructed to remain on high alert," Pandey said.

NHIDCL puts restrictions on movement of vehicles on NH 10 due to emergency work

GANGTOK, June 2: The National Highways & Infrastructure Development Corporation Ltd (NHIDCL) has issued a traffic advisory restricting vehicular movement along the NH-10 (Sevoke to Rangpo) section in the light of ongoing emergency works due to sharp rise in the Teesta River's water level, an official said on Monday.

An official order issued by the DGM(P) PMU-Siliguri issued on Sunday said on June 2 and 3 traffic will be fully closed from 8 am to 2 pm at four key locations - near Sungle (km 14.45), near Likhuvor (km 26 to 28), near Melli (km 33 to 34) and km 49.98.

The 52 km stretch of NH 10 from Sevoke to Rangpo connects Sikkim with Siliguri town in West Bengal.

The traffic regulation will be further coordinated with the respective district administrations of Darjeeling, Kalimpong, Namchi, Pakyong, and Gangtok for smooth execution, it said. (PTI)



In the past 24 hours alone, Agartala recorded 140 mm of rainfall, while Kailashahar in Unakoti district witnessed 192.2 mm. To tackle the crisis, 14 rescue teams have been deployed in key locations across West Tripura and Unakoti.

Of the 14 rescue teams, 11 are operating in West Tripura—including personnel from NDRF, SDRF, Assam Rifles, Fire & Emergency Services, Civil Defence, Aapda Mitra, and Bharat Scouts & Guides—while 3 are stationed in Unakoti.

Relief camps have been estab-

lished across the flood-hit areas: 48 in West Tripura, 3 each in Khowai and Unakoti, and 6 in North Tripura. These camps are currently housing around 2,800 displaced families.

Several roads in North Tripura, Unakoti, Dhalai, and West Tripura were temporarily blocked due to landslides and uprooted trees. Prompt response from community volunteers, SDRF, PWD, Forest Department, and Quick Response Teams has helped restore connectivity in many areas, with efforts still ongoing.

More than 100 stranded tourists evacuated safely from Lachung: Officials

GANGTOK, June 2: The first batch of 18 tourist vehicles from North Sikkim's Lachung, carrying more than 100 stranded tourists, have reached Phidang in Lower Dzongu, officials said on Monday.

Mangan District Collector Anant Jain led the convoy to ensure that the tourists are safely transported back. From Phidang the tourists will move to Gangtok.

The evacuation of the stranded tourists from Lachung began this morning with coordinated effort from the local administration and police, Army, BRO, ITBP, Forest Department, Lachung Dzumsa, TAAS, SHRA, Drivers' Associations, other tourism stakeholders and local public, officials said.

As per the latest update, another tourist convoy comprising 284 vehicles, 16 bikes with 1,678 tourists (Male 737, Female 561, Child 380) has crossed Theng Check Post and

is heading towards Phidang.

Lauding everyone involved in the evacuation process, Jain said that all the tourists from Lachung will be transported back safely today from the Lachung-Chungthang-Siphgyer-Phidang route and onwards to Gangtok.

Jain further said that efforts are underway to restore road connectivity to Lachen and added that once the road is ready, tourists stranded in Lachen will also be evacuated.

The tourists were stranded in north Sikkim as heavy rains battered Mangan district. Two bridges were partially damaged due to inclement weather conditions, they said.

The BRO said that a sudden cloudburst followed by incessant heavy rains on May 30 caused havoc in North Sikkim.

Meanwhile, Sikkim DGP Akshay Sachdeva personally received all

tourists evacuated from Lachung.

Sachdeva, along with IGP Law and Order Tashi Wangyal, DIG Range Gangtok Pratap Pradhan, and SP Mangan Sonam Detchu Bhutia were present at Phidang to receive the tourists.

The tourists expressed their gratitude to the Government of Sikkim and all the agencies involved in the evacuation process.

In another development, the Tourism and Civil Aviation Department, in a statement, advised all tourists to exercise caution while travelling and to plan their trips based on the latest road and weather updates from official sources.

With the monsoon season approaching, heavy rainfall in the region may lead to landslides and road blockages, particularly on routes leading to remote tourist destinations.

"Your safety remains our utmost

priority. In the event of road blockages or any unforeseen circumstances, necessary relief and evacuation support will be promptly provided to the stranded tourists," it said. Mangan district authorities have also resumed search and rescue operations for nine missing tourists (including the driver) when their vehicle plunged into Teesta river in Mangan district on May 29, following improvement in weather conditions.

The operation is being carried out under the close supervision of the district police, district administration, ITBP, Army, Tourism and Civil Aviation department, BRO, NDRF, GREP, Fire and medical teams and other stakeholders. The two tourists who were rescued and had been receiving medical treatment at STNM Hospital, Gangtok are now in stable condition and recovering well, officials said. (PTI)

BENGALURU, June 2: Let actor Kamal Haasan go to court, but no theatres in Karnataka will screen "Thug Life", Karnataka Film Chamber of Commerce president M Narasimhalu said on Monday.

He was reacting to the news that the co-producer of the film, Raaj Kamal International, had approached the court for protection. Speaking to PTI Videos, Narasimhalu said they only knew about Haasan's production house approaching the Karnataka High Court after it was reported in the media.

"We will also talk to our legal team. This is not just a film industry issue; this has become a state and language issue. We have received a letter from the government regarding this. So everyone, including pro-Kannada organisations, politicians and the people of the state, has demanded an apology. Let them go to court. We have not done anything against the law. Here, none of our theatres will screen it," said Narasimhalu.

He said the distributors had informed him that they would arrive at a decision on Tuesday after speaking to Haasan, who is right now in Dubai, promoting the film.

"So, after talking to him, they will tell us their decision. We will also discuss the court protection move and take a decision," said Narasimhalu, adding that even the South Indian Film Chamber of Commerce has tried reaching out to Haasan.

The actor moved the Karnataka High Court on Monday requesting

protection to ensure the smooth release of film 'Thug Life' in the state.

The move comes in response to the KFCC recent announcement that it would not permit the screening of the film in Karnataka unless Haasan issues a public apology for his comment suggesting that Kan-



nada evolved from Tamil. The actor-politician had clarified that his remarks on Kannada were said out of love and that "love will never apologise". (PTI)

INDIA-BORN RESTAURATEUR ASMA KHAN AMONG 195 WOMEN FEATURES IN RECORD-SETTING SONG



NEW DELHI, June 2: India-born British restaurateur Asma Khan is among women from 195 countries who have featured in the "195" song which has entered the Guinness World Records for most nationalities to contribute vocals to a musical recording.

The song has been produced to raise awareness about gender equality and to ignite a global movement to uplift people through the transformative power of sound healing frequencies.

The Frequency School, co-founded by US Grammy-nominated and multi-platinum music producer Maejor, Martina Fuchs, Kingsley M, Brandon Lee and Aaron Dawson, has produced the powerful and universal campaign which premiered during the 55th Annual Meeting of the World Economic Forum in Davos-Klosters, Switzerland, from January 20 to 24. "It has always been my dream to produce the first song in history featuring every country on the planet. Our vision was to unite 195 ordinary women from all walks of life in this pioneering and groundbreaking initiative to advocate for

gender equality and the rights of women and girls, and to help people struggling with mental health issues," said Fuchs, who is also the executive producer of "195".

"Breaking this record is only the beginning, we are on a global mission to make our world a more peaceful place," she said.

Asma Khan, an immigrant to the UK and star of Netflix's Chef's Table, is one of the UK's most prominent female chefs.

She is the founder and owner of Darjeeling Express, a well-known London-based Indian restaurant known for its all-female kitchen and homestyle Indian cuisine. The restaurant features dishes from Khan's family recipes and the cooking traditions of her upbringing in Kolkata.

In 2024, TIME magazine named her one of the world's 100 most influential people. She is a chef advocate for the UN World Food Programme and holds honorary fellowships from Queen's College, Oxford, and King's College, London, where she earned a PhD in British Constitutional Law. (PTI)

Mark Hamill won't essay Luke Skywalker again: I had my time

LOS ANGELES, June 2: Hollywood actor Mark Hamill, known for portraying Luke Skywalker in the first three franchise-spawning "Star Wars" films, said he is done with the character and has no plans to essay him anymore.

In an interview with 'ComicBook', the actor said he is grateful to the director, George Lucas, for letting him be a part of the franchise. But he "had his time" with the role. "I am so grateful to George (Lucas) for letting me be a part of that back in the day, the humble days when George called 'Star Wars' 'the most expensive low-budget movie ever made,'" Hamill said. "We never expected it to become a permanent franchise and a part of pop culture like that. But my deal is, I had my time. I'm appreciative of that, but I think they should focus on the future and all the new characters."

The 73-year-old actor played Skywalker for the first time in the 1977 "Star Wars" film. He later reprised his role in "The Empire Strikes Back" (1980) and "Return of the Jedi" (1983). The last film where he essayed the role was "Star Wars: The Last Jedi" (2017). But he also did a cameo in "Star Wars: The Rise of Skywalker" (2019). "And by the way... When I disappeared in (The Last Jedi), I left my robes behind. And there's no way I'm gonna appear as a naked force ghost. I'm just letting you know that right now," the actor jokingly added. Hamill will next feature in "The Long Walk". Directed by Francis Lawrence, the film also stars Ben Wang and Cooper Hoffman. It is slated to release in September and is based on the novel by Stephen King. (PTI)

Many myths around C-section being easy option: Gauhar Khan on Suniel Shetty's comments

How can there be so much misinformation? And for a male celebrity to say that, who didn't go through pregnancy, didn't carry a child, doesn't know how painful C-section is," she said while responding to Shetty's comments.

In the podcast, Gauhar also revealed that she had a miscarriage before the birth of son Zehaan in 2023.

"There's one thing I never told everyone. I did have a miscarriage before Zehaan. What should I tell you about that feeling? It's impossible to describe it. It was a pregnancy, I lost the baby after almost 9 weeks. That loss was extremely difficult," she said.

The actor, who is married to Zaid Darbar, son of noted music composer Ismail Darbar, announced earlier this year that she is expecting her second child.

In an interview last month, Shetty praised daughter Athiya's decision to opt for a natural delivery.

"In a world where every-

body wants the comfort of having a caesarean baby, she chose not to do that and had a natural delivery. I remember how every nurse and paediatrician in the hospital said that it's unbelievable how she went through the whole process," Shetty said.

The actor, who faced a lot of criticism for his remarks, later told PTI that his words were "misrepresented" "If I am wrong, I have always been ready to say 'sorry' to the world, I have no ego... SATWIK-CHIRAG LEAD CHARGE AS INDIAN SHUTTLERS EYE GLORY IN INDONESIA

JAKARTA, June 2: Former champions Satwiksairaj Rankireddy and Chirag Shetty will look to keep their comeback story on track as they spearhead India's challenge at the USD 1,450,000 Indonesia Open Super 1000 badminton tournament, beginning here on Tuesday.

The former world No. 1 pair, who returned to action after regaining fitness with a creditable semifinal finish at the Singapore Open last week, will be eager to go the distance this week and reclaim the trophy they won in 2023.

Currently ranked 27th, Satwik and Chirag are expected to inch closer to the top 20 following their exploits in Singapore. They will open their campaign against the Indonesian duo of Leo Rolly Candano and Bagas Maulana at Istora Senayan arena, the spiritual home of badminton. The conditions at Istora suit the Indians and a win could set up a potential clash with their nemesis, Malaysia's Aaron Chia and Soh Wooi Yik, who ended their run last week and enjoy a dominant



record against the Indian duo.

The two had missed last few weeks of action due to Satwik's health issues and Chirag's lingering back injury, which took time to heal.

However, the star pair displayed their trademark brilliance last week when they outclassed the world No. 1 Malaysian duo of Goh Sze Fei and Nur Izzuddin with a tactical masterclass en route to the semifinals. Two-time Olympic medallist P. V. Sindhu will also aim for a deep run following a string of underwhelming performances this year.

The 29-year-old suffered a hamstring injury during training in Guwahati in February, which ruled her out of the Asia Team Championships. Since returning, she has lost matches to players such as Thuy Linh Nguyen, Putri Kusuma Wardani, and Kim Ga Eun to make early exit from tournaments. Tuesday's match promises to be another gripping contest as both players attempt to reclaim their stature in world badminton. A win could pit Sindhu, the 2019 World Champion, against Thailand's Pornpawee Chochuwong in the second round.

Among others in women's singles, Anupama Upadhyaya will take on Korea's Kim Ga Eun, Rakshittha Sree Ramraj faces Thailand's left-hander Supanida Katethong, while Malvika Bansod meets Indonesia's Putri Kusuma Wardani.

In the men's singles, HS Prannoy, a 2023 World Championships bronze medallist, will look to regain form when he takes on Indonesia's Alwi Farhan. (PTI)

Gukesh turns tables; Carlsen bangs one after Indian triumphs in Norway Chess showdown



STAVANGER, June 2: World champion D Gukesh got his revenge on Magnus Carlsen as he pounced on a blunder by the world no.1 to defeat him for the first time in a classical game, leaving the Norwegian superstar so frustrated that he banged his fist on the board after Round 6 of Norway Chess Tournament here.

The win on Sunday propelled 19-year-old Gukesh to third position with 8.5 points and he is just one point shy of joint leaders Carlsen and American Grandmaster Fabiano Caruana. "There wasn't much I could do. It was just clearly lost (his position)...luckily he (Carlsen) got into a time scramble," the reticent Chennai-lad said after the eagerly-watched contest.

"First Classical win over Magnus, not the way I expected (or) wanted it to be but I will take it. I was just trying to make moves (today) which kind of were tricky for him," he explained. "...99 out of 100 times I would lose... just a lucky day," Gukesh later told the tournament broadcasters. Five-time world champion Carlsen seemed to have the upper-hand almost throughout the four-hour-long contest but a critical mistake allowed Gukesh to turn the tables on the Norwegian and secure a remarkable win.

Carlsen realised his mistake but by then it was too late. The Norwegian superstar vented his frustration by banging his fist on the table, causing the chess board to be dis-

shevelled. Disbelief and frustration was writ large on his face as he shook hands with Gukesh before placing all the pieces back on the board and walking away patting the winner on the back. Gukesh was calm personified amid all this. He closed his eyes for a moment after the rather tense handshake with a clearly upset Carlsen. The victory had come after a crushing Round 1 loss to iconic player which had cast a shadow on whether Gukesh would be able to overcome Carlsen's challenge in the reverse game.

Arjun Erigaisi, following an Armageddon tie-break win against China's Wei Yi, is tied fourth with Hikaru Nakamura on 7.5 points in a tournament where virtually all the six players have a chance of winning the prestigious title.

Carlsen, playing with black pieces, had earlier outplayed Gukesh with a near-perfect game. But the Indian kept prolonging the proceedings by finding the right moves to survive.

Eventually, Carlsen dropped his knight, and Gukesh pounced on his opponent's error to go for the kill.

"One thing I learned from this tournament was time scrambles can go out of control," said Gukesh.

On his loss in Round 1 despite being in an advantageous position, Gukesh said, "I don't know, I'm still kind of shaken from that game. I don't know what happened, basically. (PTI)

Joe Root hits 166 not out to lead England to series win against WI

CARDIFF, June 2: Joe Root hit a stunning 166 not out as England beat West Indies by three wickets at Sophia Gardens in the second ODI on Sunday to clinch the series.

England scored 312-7 with seven balls remaining in reply to West Indies' 308 all out in 47.4 overs — led by Keacy Carty's 103.

After winning the toss and putting on a ragged display in the field with four dropped catches and two missed runouts, England was reeling in its chase on 2-2 and 133-5.

But Root thumped two sixes and 21 fours, putting on 143 in 121 balls alongside Will Jacks, who made a vital 49, to lift England into an unassailable 2-0 lead in the three-match series.

Root leapfrogged Eoin Morgan to become England's all-time leading ODI run-scorer during his 139-ball innings. Root has 7,082 runs, passing Morgan's tally of 6,957.



"I want to give as much as I can for England for as long as I can," Root said. "I've still got a lot to give and a lot more runs in there and, hopefully, an innings like that shows that."

England's Harry Brook, who scored 47, enjoyed his first series win since becoming full-time white-ball captain.

Brandon King (59) and Shai

Hope (78) backed up Carty but England fought back thanks to 4-63 from Adil Rashid and Saqib Mahmood's 3-37 as the Windies lost its last eight wickets for 103.

It seemed that total would be enough to set up a decider at the Oval on Tuesday but Root's 18th ODI hundred and his highest score in the format got England over the line.

Iyer took his time in middle and we knew that was a danger: Mahela Jayawardene

AHMEDABAD, June 2: Mumbai Indians knew Shreyas Iyer giving himself time in the middle to bat long was a sign of "danger", said head coach Mahela Jayawardene after his side failed to execute in the knockout clash against Punjab Kings. Iyer struck as many as eight sixes and five fours to make 87 not out from only 41 balls to power Punjab Kings into the IPL final for the first time in 11 years.

"He took his time. He knew they would be a bit under pressure, so he was taking his time. We knew that was a danger," Jayawardene told the media after the after-wicket loss on Sunday night.

"As long as we didn't give him that partnership with Nehal (Wadhwa), we would have been able to squeeze through because he would have had to go (out to at-

tack) early, not wait that long."

"He got Nehal to do the bulk of the work at that point, so that shows the experience, and he knew he had to take the game deep and he did. We were trying those options with the wickets, but it just didn't work for us today," Jayawardene added.

A former Mumbai Indians player, Wadhwa (48 off 29 balls) consolidated for Punjab Kings with a robust 84-run stand for the fourth wicket to turn the tables with Iyer at the helm, while also making the most of two lifelines he got in form of dropped catches.

Jayawardene said MI had a good campaign after a poor start to this season. "It was a good campaign for us, the way we started, and how we regrouped as a team and had played some really, really good cricket," he said.

"We had our opportunities getting to the playoffs and we had a really good game first up (Eliminator) and even today I thought we played some good cricket, except for Kings playing better cricket than us, especially with the bat."

Jayawardene heaped praise on their batting mainstay Suryakumar Yadav who showed remarkable consistency throughout the tournament to finish with 717 runs. His tally marked the first time any MI batter scored 700 or more runs in an IPL season. "Sky has been brilliant, very consistent," Jayawardene said.

"Reading the game, especially in those situations. He was very, very good in many different conditions as well, that's where quality of the player stands out."

"For him to be that consistent in playing in different surfaces,

different bowling attacks, shows what a quality T20 batsman he is, especially a lot of the times it took the spinners down pretty well and that role was pretty crucial for us," he added.

The head coach's assessed that MI did not get as many runs as they could probably have got which was also among the reasons for their defeat. "We probably left a bit of runs on the park as well with the bat. We lost our way after having that start. It was (losing) back to back wickets probably (which) slowed us down a little bit," he said.

"But I thought 200 was still a good score in a qualifier... the pressure. We picked up those wickets as well up front and a few mistakes cost us the game and the bowling also, the execution wasn't up to the standards as well," he added. (PTI)

French Open: Carlos Alcaraz shows sportsmanship by conceding a point in win over Ben Shelton

PARIS, June 2: Carlos Alcaraz conjured up what initially appeared — to the chair umpire, to everyone watching in the stands or on TV and to his opponent, Ben Shelton — a remarkable lunging volley to win a point at the French Open.

But Alcaraz knew it shouldn't count. So after briefly thinking about it, the defending champion at Roland-Garros fessed up and called himself for breaking the rules, handing the point to Shelton during what would become a 7-6 (8), 6-3, 4-6, 6-4 victory for Alcaraz in the fourth round.

"It's a shame, because it was the Hot Shot of the day," Alcaraz said later with a smile.

"Crazy shot," Shelton said. Here's what happened: Early in the second set, Shelton whipped a passing shot well out of Alcaraz's reach up at the net.

So Alcaraz flung his racket — and, as his equipment flipped through the air, its strings somehow not only made contact with the ball but sent it back over the net and onto the other side of the court.

Initially, the second-seeded Alcaraz was awarded the point. But he went over to the chair umpire to admit that he wasn't holding his racket when it touched the ball.

That's not allowed, so he conceded the point to Shelton, an American seeded 13th.

When the official informed the Court Philippe-Chatrier crowd what had happened, Alcaraz was given a round of applause.

"I thought, 'OK, I could not say anything.' But I would have felt guilty if I didn't say anything," Alcaraz explained. "It's just about if I know that

I didn't (do), or I did, a wrong thing. ... I have to say: I have to be honest with myself. I have to be honest with Ben, with everyone. ... It's just about the respect we have against each other, and I think that sports, in general, should be like this."

It came at what could have been a critical moment, because instead of leading 40-30 on his serve, Alcaraz was now down 30-40, giving Shelton his first break point of the match.

But Alcaraz saved that one — and five others in that 20-point game — along the way to taking a two-set lead in an entertaining matchup between a pair of 22-year-olds who hit the ball hard.

"I thought it was clean, you know? I thought he hit the volley, and (then) the racket flew out of his hand," Shelton said. "I was kind of surprised that he



was, like, No, I let go of the racket and threw it." ... Obviously a guy with a lot of sportsmanship."

Shelton, twice a semifinalist at majors, delivered serves at up to 143 mph (230 kph) and forehands at up to 116 mph (187 kph). Alcaraz, already a four-time Grand Slam champion, showed off various parts of his repertoire.

It was tighter than the score might indicate: Shelton held three opportunities to own the opening set, leading in the tiebreaker at 6-4, 6-5 and 7-6. Take any of the subsequent points, and Shelton would own that set.

But Alcaraz — who meets No. 12 Tommy Paul of the U.S. in the quarterfinals Tuesday — saved the first with a service winner. Shelton netted a backhand on the next.

And the last ended with Shelton smacking a backhand right at the body of Alcaraz, who was up at the net and contorted himself in order to chop a drop volley winner.

Alcaraz then converted his second set point, closing a 15-stroke exchange with a down-the-line forehand that drew a mistake from Shelton.

The third set went to Shelton when Alcaraz put a forehand into the net, and the big-swinging American punched the air, then his chest, and screamed: "Let's go, baby! Come on!"

The fourth swung Alcaraz's way when he used a drop shot winner to set up a break point that he claimed for a 2-1 edge and, after a total of 3 hours, 19 minutes, he was able to finish off an 11th consecutive win at Roland-Garros. (AP)

Don't want to play for selfish reasons: Maxwell retires from ODIs to focus on T20 cricket



MELBOURNE, June 2: Australian all-rounder Glenn Maxwell, on Monday retired from ODIs to focus on next year's T20 World Cup in India and Sri Lanka, saying that he did not want to "play for selfish reasons" given how his body has been struggling to hold up.

The 36-year-old explosive batter and often underestimated off-spin bowler played 149 ODI matches for Australia including what is regarded by many the greatest one-day innings of all-time.

Maxwell came in against Afghanistan at the 2023 World Cup with his side reeling at 7-91. In a high-pressure situation and battling severe cramps in searing heat, he smashed 201 off just 128 balls to snatch victory from jaws of defeat. Australia went on to win the World Cup, beating favourites India in Ahmedabad.

"I felt like I was letting the team down a little bit with how body was reacting to the conditions. I had a good chat with (Chair of Selectors) George Bailey and I asked him what his thoughts were going forward," he told the 'Final Word Podcast'.

"We talked about the 2027 World Cup and I said to him 'I don't think I am going to make that, it's time to start planning for people in my position to have a crack at it and make the position their own'."

Maxwell had recently returned from an IPL stint with Punjab Kings that was cut short by a broken finger.

"I always said I wasn't going to hand my position over if I felt like I was still good enough to play. I didn't want to just hold on for a couple of series and almost play for selfish reasons," said the explosive batter.

Maxwell's strike rate of 126 is the second highest in ODI

cricket, behind only the West Indian heavy hitter Andre Russell. He has four hundreds and 23 half centuries along with 77 wickets.

"Maxwell has made the decision to prioritise his preparation for the 2026 ICC Men's T20 World Cup in India and Sri Lanka, the Big Bash League and his other global commitments," Cricket Australia said in a statement.

Maxwell played many incredible games across his decorated one-day career which included two ODI World Cup wins. The announcement marks second significant retirement of an Australian team member following Marcus Stoinis' decision to quit ODI cricket earlier this year.

"I think back to right at the start I was picked ahead of my time and out of the blue. I was just proud just to be playing a couple of games for Australia. I thought I was just going to have that," said Maxwell reflecting on his ODI career.

"Since then, I have been able to go through the up and downs of being dropped, being brought back, playing in a few World Cups and being a part of some great teams."

Todd Greenberg, CA Chief Executive congratulated Maxwell an exciting and influential one day international career.

"Glenn's ballistic batting has lit up the cricket world and been one of the cornerstones of Australia's continued success in the 50 over game, including his heroic role in the 2023 World Cup triumph," he said.

"As with other greats of the game, crowds have flocked to grounds just to watch Glenn bat and children have been inspired to pick up a bat after seeing him put opposition attacks to the sword with a breathtaking array of shots."

Former Australia captain and current chief selector George Bailey too spoke glowingly of Maxwell.

"Glenn will be known as one of the one-day game's most dynamic players, who had key roles in two ODI World Cup victories."

"His level of natural talent and skill is remarkable. Fortunately, he still has much to offer Australia in the T20 format. All things going well he will be pivotal in the next 12 months as we build toward the World Cup early next year," said Bailey.

RCB and Virat Kohli's 18-year wait meets Punjab Kings' tenacity as IPL set to crown new winner

AHMEDABAD, June 2: Virat Kohli's nearly two-decade long agonising wait to lay hands on an IPL Trophy with Royal Challengers Bengaluru will be up against Shreyas Iyer's resolve to make first-time winners out of the tenacious Punjab Kings when the 18th season finale of the world's biggest T20 league unfolds here on Tuesday.

The summit clash here at the Narendra Modi Stadium could witness a thousands of fans donning jersey No.18 to support Kohli, who is in an IPL final for a fourth time overall.

The sentiments of the fans would indeed run high given it will be Kohli's last appearance on the cricket field for a while, having recently retired from Test cricket and India's next ODI assignment a few months away.

Parting ways with issues that plagued their previous campaigns, RCB have been clinical all the way through, coming into the final with an eight-wicket hammering of Punjab in a one-sided Qualifier 1.

Kohli (614 runs) has gone about his business like every other year, piling up runs at the top and continuing to lay platforms but where it has made the difference for RCB is that there's a lot more substance to their batting beyond the superstar.

Kohli has not been the only one to carry the focus and attention this year, rather he has quietly gone about his business in fortifying for RCB. Phil Salt is a perfect foil for the Indian superstar who goes all-out in his attack, while Mayank Agarwal, skipper Rajat Patidar and Jitesh Sharma are the trusted lieutenants of that batting line-up.

Since he has missed RCB's last two games, it remains to be seen if Tim David is fit for this contest as he forms a vital death overs batting pair with another burly hitter in Romario Shepherd.

Like Kohli in their batting, the calm and



composed Josh Hazlewood (21 wickets) has been at the helm of RCB's rise and the fourth highest wicket-taker and the Australian would want to add more to move up the ladder in one last game.

On their part, stung by that crushing defeat in their homeground at Mullanpur, Iyer's Kings showed no scars from that defeat as they knocked out five-time winners Mumbai Indians in Qualifier 2 to reach their first final after 11 years.

It's only fitting that PBKS and RCB, who finished at the top two positions respectively after a gruelling 70-match league round, have a crack at the trophy which has eluded them from the time the competition began.

Perennial finishers in the second half of the 10-team points table, Punjab Kings have staged a sensational turnaround with two

dogged personalities in captain Iyer and coach Ricky Ponting at the helm.

For Iyer (603 runs), a second consecutive appearance in an IPL final after winning it last year with Kolkata Knight Riders speaks volumes about his capabilities as a leader who marshals his troops as good as any other in the format.

It is, therefore, not a surprise to see Iyer being the only cricketer in the 18-year history of the tournament to have led three different teams in IPL finals, with Delhi Capitals being the third.

Iyer's perseverance is not the only quality that stands out for the 30-year-old Punjab captain but also the fact that he remains as hungry to win this IPL as he was when he began the journey with the franchise a few months ago.

In Prabhsimran Singh, Josh Inglis, Priyansh Arya and Shashank Singh, Iyer has adequate support to hold his fort staunchly and even lead aggressive attacks on the opposition camp.

Punjab's bowling, without Marcus Jansen, did look a little depleted but having managed to keep a lid on Mumbai Indians' for the entirety of an innings on a batting-friendly wicket tells that there is more to it than what has been perceived.

Yuzvendra Chahal is still dealing with a hand injury and was not at his absolute best in the Qualifier 2 but Punjab would need him to fire against his former franchise.

While there are no predictions of rains impacting the contest, an additional hour to the playtime extending the duration to 120 minutes and having a reserve day in the final are the measures in place to ensure the contest is completed.

Klaasen announces retirement from international cricket

CAPE TOWN, June 2: South African power-hitter Heinrich Klaasen on Monday announced his retirement from all forms of international cricket with immediate effect as he aims to strike a work-life balance, prioritising his commitments in franchise leagues across the globe.

The 33-year-old Klaasen had announced his retirement from Test cricket in January last year and has now also decided to quit the white ball formats having represented the Proteas in 4 Tests, 60 ODIs and 58 T20Is in which he scored 2764 runs.

"It is a sad day for me as I announce that I have decided to step away from international cricket. It took me a long time to decide what's best for me and my family for the future. It was truly a very difficult decision but also one that I have absolute peace with," Klaasen announced on his Instagram.

One of the most sought after batters in the T20 leagues, Klaasen had recently represented Sunrisers Hyderabad in the IPL and scored a ton in the concluding league game. His next assignment will be Major League Cricket in the United States for Seattle Orcas later this month. Klaasen, who played in the T20 World Cup final against India, termed playing for the national team as his "biggest privilege".

"From the first day, it was the biggest privilege representing my country and it was everything that I have worked for

and dreamed about as a young boy," Klaasen said in his emotional statement.

Someone who is known for his towering sixes and game-changing knocks as a finisher in the T20 universe, the decision is hardly surprising as the hectic international calendar is taking a toll on physical and mental health of the players.

There have been multiple surveys that have pointed at this trend where barring India whose active male cricketers are not allowed to ply their trade in other leagues, top players from other countries would explore options of turning full-fledged freelancers.

"I look forward to spending more time with my family as this decision will allow me to do so."

Klaasen fondly remembered the friendships forged on a day when another white ball exponent Glenn Maxwell quit ODIs.

"I have made great friendships and relationships that I will treasure for life. Playing for the Proteas gave me the opportunity to meet great people that changed my life, and to those people I can't say thank you enough. My road to wearing the Proteas shirt was different than most and there were certain coaches in my career that kept believing in me - to them I will always be grateful."

"To have played with the Proteas badge on my chest was and will always be the biggest honour in my career," he concluded. (PTI)



PCB makes it mandatory for contracted players to compete in one domestic event

LAHORE, June 2: The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) on Monday made it mandatory for all centrally-contracted and international players to play at least one domestic event during the season when free from national commitments.

The PCB felt that the only way to improve the quality of players was to make the domestic structure more competitive.

PCB Chairman Mohsin Naqvi, who chaired the meeting, said it would allow domestic players and youngsters to play alongside international players and share dressing room with them.

"It will benefit the domestic players in the long run and be prepared for what to expect at the International level," he said.

The meeting was attended by national team's new white-ball head coach, Mike Hesson, Salman Ali Agha, the captain of the T20 side, Usman Wahla, the head of international cricket affairs and Aaqib Javed the Director National Cricket Academy. The PCB also decided to start work on issuance of new central contracts for 2025-26 and meet the July 30 deadline, having missed it in last two years.

The PCB last year introduced new first class, ODI and T20 competitions known as the Champions Cup and even hired five mentors for all five teams at hefty salaries but decided to scrap the Champions Cup for the coming domestic season.

Usman Wahla also confirmed the international commitments for the next six months including home series against South Africa and Sri Lanka and tours to West Indies and Bangladesh. (PTI)

Kohli's aggression, Hardik's resilience inspiring young TT player Ankur



AHMEDABAD, June 2: An ardent fan of Virat Kohli and Hardik Pandya, rising Indian paddler Ankur Bhattacharjee once aspired to be a cricketer before shifting to table tennis, but his love for cricket still remains.

The 18-year-old is big admirer of Kohli's aggression and Hardik's mental strength and wants to imbibe those qualities into his game.

"There is a lot of aggression in my game, so I admire Virat Kohli sir's aggressive attitude. I also love Hardik Pandya sir's mental strength. I follow both a lot and try to bring their qualities into my game," Ankur told PTI.

Despite turning pro in table tennis, his love for cricket still remains and he doesn't miss a single India match.

But after taking up table tennis, his only goal was to fulfil his parents' dream.

"I love cricket a lot and try not to miss a single India match. I wanted to be a cricketer but my father and mother both were table tennis players and they are my personal coach too," Ankur said.

"My mother pressured me by saying everyone plays cricket, you play table tennis. Then I started playing and I loved it."

"Both my father (Angshuman Bhattacharjee) and mother (Kuntali Bhattacharjee) were national level players."

Ankur is currently participating in the sixth season of the Ultimate Table Tennis League for Kolkata Thunder Blades.

"This year I feel our team is stronger

than last year. My form is also better than last year, so I feel we can win the title this year," he said.

"UTT is a big platform for youngsters, I feel more such tournaments like UTT should happen. Like last year before playing UTT my India ranking was out of 10, but now I am India ranking 2 in singles."

"I have just returned after playing World Championships and had a decent performance there."

Ankur had already stamped his authority at the junior level, having won the under-19 boys singles title at the Youth National Championships for three years in a row. He has also won three consecutive bronze medals at the Junior Asian Championships.

"I played 6 tournaments at youth level this year and won all of them. This is my first year at senior level and till now I feel I am performing well but I need to take this to the next level," he said.

Just like any other athlete, Ankur's target is to finish on the podium in big international tournaments in future.

"Just came back after playing World Championships, so the next target is to win a medal for India at Asian Championships in Bhubaneswar this year," he said.

"Just like everyone, my future goal is to win Olympic gold but it is easier said than done. I am not thinking about it now. I am taking one step at a time."

Besides being a table tennis player, Ankur also writes poems in Bengali, a quality which he got from his grandfather.

"I used to write a lot earlier and even written for some books as well. I got inspired to write from my grandfather who was a poet. Now I don't get much time to write but do try as and when I can," he said. (PTI)

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
