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## Zubeen's death: SIT conducts search in Shyamkanu house for 2<sup>nd</sup> day Witnesses asked to appear within 10 days



**GUWAHATI, Sept 26:** Assam Police's CID on Friday issued notices to people who were present or aware of the events leading to singer Zubeen Garg's death in Singapore, asking them to appear within 10 days, a senior official said.

He added that the Special Investigating Team (SIT), formed by the CID to probe Garg's death, continued its searches at the residence of North East India Festival organiser Shyamkanu Mahanta here for the second day.

"Investigation into Garg's death is continuing. Today, we served notices to all persons familiar with the incidents leading to his death. They have to come and give their statements within 10 days," the officer, who did not wish to be named, said.

Besides Mahanta's residence, the houses of Garg's manager Siddhartha Sharma and musician Shekhar Jyoti Goswami were searched on Thursday, the officer said.

Sharma and Goswami were

present with the singer when he had died by drowning in the sea on September 19.

Besides those accompanying Garg from Guwahati, members of Assamese community residing in Singapore were also present during the drowning incident while the group was on a yacht trip.

The non-resident Assamese people have also been brought under the purview of the investigation.

The officer further said statements of several artistes and others related to the cultural field were recorded on Friday.

"They had come to the CID office regarding the probe into Garg's death. These statements have been recorded," he said.

The 10-member SIT is being led by Special DGP M P Gupta.

Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma on Thursday said the state government will recommend a CBI inquiry if the SIT investigation is found to be 'unsatisfactory'.

Meanwhile, the state police refuted claims that internet services in the state will be disconnected.

## BTC polls: BPF wins 1, ahead in 22 seats

Several UPPL candidates set to bite the dust ● Hagrama wins in one of two constituencies he contested

**GUWAHATI, Sept 26:** The Bodoland Peoples' Front (BPF) won one seat and was leading in 22 out of the 40 seats of the Bodoland Territorial Council (BTC) on Friday, officials said.

The BJP won one seat and was leading in nine, while the United People's Party Liberal (UPPL) was ahead in seven seats.

BPF's Ganesh Kachari was declared winner in Suklai Serfang and BJP's Lakhi Das in Nagrijuli, both in Tamulpur district.

Counting of votes began at 8 am but it has been slow as votes have been cast in ballot papers, with the remaining results likely to come in late, an official said.

BPF chief Hagrama Mohilary, who had contested from two constituencies, was leading in Debargaon but trailing in Chirangdar, while the incumbent BTC chief Pramod Boro also contested from two seats - Dotma and Goibari - and was leading in both.



Elections to the 40-member council, comprising the five districts of Kokrajhar, Chirang, Baksa, Udalguri and Tamulpur, was held on September 22.

In the 12 constituencies of Kokrajhar district, the BPF was leading in nine, UPPL in two and BJP in one, while in Udalguri district, the BPF was ahead in seven seats, UPPL in one and BJP in two.

In Baksa district, which has six seats, the BPF was leading in three, BJP in two and UPPL in one.

In Chirang district, the BPF was ahead in three seats, while both the BJP and UPPL were ahead in two each.

The BJP was ahead in two seats and had won one, while BPF also secured a seat, and UPPL was leading in one in Tamulpur district.

Of the 40 seats in the BTC, 30 are reserved for Scheduled Tribe (ST) candidates, five for non-STs and the remaining five are open to both ST and non-ST candidates.

The alliance partners United Peoples' Party Liberal (UPPL), BJP and Gana Suraksha Party (GSP) have headed the outgoing Council.

In the last Council polls held in December 2020, the UPPL had won 12 seats, BJP nine and GSP one seat, while the Bodoland Peoples' Front (BPF), which had headed the Council for the previous three terms, emerged as the single largest party with 17 seats and Congress secured one seat with its elected member later joining the BJP.

The BPF was then BJP's alliance partner in the state government but the ruling party decided to join hands with the UPPL and the GSP to jointly form the Council. Assam Chief (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

## AFSPA extended in parts of Manipur, Nagaland, Arunachal

**NEW DELHI, Sept 26:** The Armed Forces (Special Powers) Act was on Friday extended for six months in entire Manipur, except the jurisdiction of 13 police stations, in view of the prevailing law and order situation there.

The AFSPA, under which a particular state or some areas are declared "disturbed", has also been extended to nine districts in Nagaland and 21 police station areas in five other districts of the state for six months, according to a notification issued by the Union home ministry.

The law was also extended to Tirap, Changlang and Longding districts in Arunachal Pradesh and three police station areas, bordering Assam, in Namsai district in the state.

The extension of the disturbed area in the particular areas in the three states will be effective from October 1 for six months.

The AFSPA, often criticised as a draconian law, gives armed forces operating in disturbed areas sweeping powers to search, arrest and open fire if they deem it necessary.

"And whereas, a further review of the law and order situation in the state of Manipur has been undertaken. Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred by Section 3 of the Armed Forces (Special Powers) Act, 1958 (28 of 1958), the entire State of Manipur, excluding the areas falling under the jurisdiction of the following 13 (thirteen) Police Stations of 5 districts, is declared as 'disturbed area' for a period of six months with effect from 01.10.2025, unless withdrawn earlier," the notification related to Manipur read.

The police station areas where the AFSPA will not be in force in Manipur are: Imphal, Lamphal, City, Singjamei, Patsoi, Wangoi in Imphal West district, Porompat, Heingang, Iribung in Imphal East district, (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

## GST 2.0 new impetus for economy, oppn criticism reveals 'internal negativity': Scindia

**GUWAHATI, Sept 26:** Union Minister Jyotiraditya Scindia on Friday maintained that the next generation GST reforms, or GST 2.0, has infused a new impetus in economic activities of the country, increasing purchasing power of consumers and driving up sales of sellers.

He dismissed opposition parties' criticism of the reforms as a manifestation of their 'internal negativity'.

"I visited many shops and interacted with shopkeepers and customers here. There is an atmosphere of positivity everywhere," the Union Minister of Communications and Development of North Eastern Region said at a press conference here.

He maintained that the GST 2.0

reforms has injected a new impetus of growth in economic activities through reduced and simplified taxes.

"As a result, customers have more money in hand to spend and consequently, the sale figures of the sellers have gone up. People of all sections, age have benefited," he claimed.

"These reforms are in line with the Prime Minister's vision of 'Sabka saath, sabka vikash, sabka vishwas, sabka prayas' of together making the country self-reliant and 'vishwaguru'," Scindia added.

Asked about opposition parties decrying the reforms, the minister said, "The opposition has no other job but to oppose. If it is a good thing, development, progress, they will oppose. The institutional struc-

ture of India, they will try and depose, whether it be the Supreme Court of the Election Commission."

Scindia maintained that the 'internal negativity' of the opposition parties has 'now translated into external negative persona'.

"The people of India have rejected them not once or twice, but three times. But that realisation is still to dawn on them. Let them proceed with their negative agenda, we are on our path of development," he added.

The Union Communications minister further said the inauguration of close to 98,000 mobile 4G towers across the country and the Swadeshi 4G network on Saturday will be a golden day for the country.

## CM reviews arrangements for Zubeen's 13<sup>th</sup>-day rituals in Jorhat

**GUWAHATI, Sept 26:** Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma on Friday reviewed the arrangements for the 13th-day rituals of singer Zubeen Garg, to be held in Jorhat, where the singer spent his formative years at his family residence.

The arrangements will be finalised in consultation with Zubeen's wife Garima, officials said.

Garg (52) died by drowning in the sea in Singapore on September 19.

His body was cremated at Kamarkuchi, on the outskirts of Guwahati, with full state honours on Monday, amidst a mass outpouring of public grief.

People of Jorhat had urged for the last rites to be performed there, but Zubeen's family had opted for Guwahati or its neighbouring areas due to ill health of the singer's octogenarian father.

The government had said the 13th-day Vedic rituals will be performed in Jorhat and a memorial for the singer-composer will also be built in the eastern Assam town.

"Held a meeting with Jorhat DC and other stakeholders to discuss plans for #BelovedZubeen's rituals to be held in Jorhat and the way ahead in developing his Samadhi in the town which will reflect his life and times in the most fitting manner," Sarma said in a post



on X after a video conference. The CMO, also in a post on social media, said the 13th-day rituals will be arranged by the state government in Jorhat, where his 'chitabhasma' (ashes) will also be taken.

It said the chief minister reviewed the preparations with Jorhat MLA Hiten Goswami, neighbouring Mariani MLA Rupjyoti Kurmi and the district commissioner through video conference.

State Cultural Affairs Minister Bimal Bora will meet Garima Garg later on Friday to finalise the arrangement, based on which further steps will be taken, the CMO added. (PTI)

## Shipping Ministry planning new scheme for ship building, repair industry: Sonowal

**CHENNAI, Sept 26:** The Ministry of Ports and Shipping will come with a National Shipbuilding Mission scheme to manage and operate ship building and repair industry, Union Minister Sarbananda Sonowal said on Friday.

The Union Minister of Ports, Shipping and Waterways said currently 5 per cent of India's export and import cargo is carried on Indian-owned/flagged ships, resulting in Rs 6 lakh crore being paid to foreign companies towards sea freight services.

"This new scheme will help our nation to save about ₹ 4.50 lakh crore per year in freight charges and would provide new employment to about 25-30 lakh people," he said, after presenting degrees to students during the 10th convocation of Indian Maritime University here.

The proposal to set up the National Shipbuilding Mission was

part of the three-pronged strategy that has been approved by the Cabinet headed by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, he said.

The three-pronged strategy is for transforming ship building, ship recycling and creating a robust globally competitive maritime ecosystem, he said.

"This signals the revival and resurgence of the Golden Era of the Maritime Sector of India. For the first time ever in the history of Independent India, a significant financial outlay of ₹ 70,000 crore has been earmarked for the development of the Maritime sector," he said.

Secondly, a revamped ship building financial assistance scheme to address the cost disadvantages of building ships in India, including a credit note for shipbreaking in Indian yards to promote shipbuilding, has been (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

## Unacceptable, entirely baseless: India on NATO chief's claims

**NEW DELHI, Sept 26:** India on Friday described as "entirely baseless" NATO Secretary General Mark Rutte's remarks that Prime Minister Narendra Modi dialled Russian President Vladimir Putin and asked for the strategy on Ukraine in view of impact of Washington's punitive tariffs on India for its energy ties with Moscow.

External Affairs Ministry spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal said "speculative or careless" remarks that misrepresent Modi's engagements or suggest conversations that never occurred are "unacceptable".

Strongly justifying India's continued procurement of Russian crude oil, Jaiswal said there cannot be any "double standards" in the matter "against the backdrop of US President Donald Trump's recent remarks that appeared to be critical of the EU and NATO nations for their energy ties with Russia.

Rutte told CNN on the margins of the UN General Assembly in New York that Trump's tariffs on India are having a "big impact" on Russia and New Delhi is on the phone with Putin.

"And Narendra Modi is asking him to explain his strategy on Ukraine because India is being hit with tariffs," the NATO chief claimed.

Jaiswal said Rutte's statement is "factually incorrect and entirely baseless."

"At no point has Prime Minister Modi spoken with President Putin in the manner suggested. No such conversation has taken place," he said.

"We expect the leadership of an important institution like NATO to exercise greater responsibility and accuracy in public statements," he added.

Jaiswal said India's energy im-

ports are meant to ensure predictable and affordable energy costs to the Indian consumer.

The MEA spokesperson, strongly justifying India's continued procurement of Russian crude oil, said New Delhi will continue taking all necessary measures to safeguard its national interests and economic security.

Jaiswal also appeared to dismiss the European Union's recent criticism of India's energy ties with Russia EU foreign and security policy chief Kaja Kallas last week said that India's military exercises and its purchase of Russian crude oil "stand in the way of closer ties" between the two sides.

"Because, ultimately, our partnership is not only about trade but also about defending the rules-based international order," she said after unveiling a new strategic agenda to ramp up (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

## Police arrest Sonam Wangchuk

**LEH, Sept 26:** Climate activist Sonam Wangchuk was arrested Friday by a police party here, two days after violent protests by supporters of the movement for statehood and extension of Sixth Schedule of Constitution left four persons dead and 90 others injured, officials said.

Wangchuk was taken into custody by the police party led Ladakh DGPS D Singh Jamwal at 2.30 pm, the officials said.

It was not immediately clear about the charges pressed against Wangchuk. The home minister had blamed Wangchuk, a senior member of Leh Apex Body (LAB) which along with Kargil Democratic Alliance (KDA) is spearheading the agitation in support of the demands for the past over five years, for provocation leading to the violence. ## Over 57 pc in Assam have high levels of triglycerides Report estimates one-third of India's children have high triglycerides

**NEW DELHI, Sept 26:** Over a third of India's children aged 5-9 could be having high triglycerides, with Jammu and Kashmir, West Bengal and northeastern states showing highest prevalence, according to a government report.

Over 67 per cent of children in West Bengal, 64 per cent in Sikkim, 55 per cent in Nagaland, 57 per cent in Assam and 50 per cent in Jammu Kashmir were estimated to have high levels of triglycerides -- a type of blood fat that is known to increase risk of heart disease in later life.

Kerala and Maharashtra were among the states showing lowest prevalence at 16.6 per cent and 19.1 per cent, respectively.

"Children in India 2025" -- the fourth edition since its start in 2008 -- was released by the Ministry of



Statistics and Programme Implementation during the 29th Conference of Central and State Statistical Organisations (Co-SSO) on September 25 in Chandigarh.

The report "provides a compre-

hensive and detailed analysis of the well-being of children in the country," the ministry said in a statement.

Data gathered via government's ministries and departments, such as National Family Health Survey

2019-21 and Comprehensive National Nutrition Survey 2016-18, were compiled.

Prematurity and a low weight at birth was found to be the most common cause of death among newborns in the first 29 days of life -- national prevalence estimated at 48 per cent.

Birth asphyxia (not getting enough oxygen) and trauma during birth, and pneumonia were second and third most common reasons, with a prevalence of 16 per cent and nine per cent.

Authors of the report also classified about five per cent of the country's teenagers as hypertensive -- highest prevalence of 10 per cent seen in Delhi, followed by Uttar Pradesh (8.6 per cent), Manipur (8.3 per cent) and Chhattisgarh (seven) (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

The central or the Kohora range,

which falls under Golaghat district, is likely to open in the second week of October. The elephant safari is scheduled to begin on November 1.

## Sensex, Nifty tank nearly 1 pc on selling in pharma, IT shares

MUMBAI, Sept 26: Benchmark stock indices Sensex and Nifty tumbled nearly 1 per cent on Friday, marking their sixth consecutive day of decline, following heavy selling in pharma and IT shares as US President Donald Trump announced 100 per cent duties on branded drugs from next month.

The 30-share BSE Sensex tanked 733.22 points or 0.90 per cent to settle at a three-week low of 80,426.46. During the day, it dropped 827.27 points or 1 per cent to 80,332.41.

The 50-share NSE Nifty tumbled 236.15 points or 0.95 per cent to an over three-week low of 24,654.70. The index has been on a decline since September 19, tanking over 3 per cent in six straight sessions. Sensex has tumbled by 2,587.50 points or 3.16 per cent in six sessions to Friday.

Most pharma shares dropped, dragging the BSE Healthcare index down by 2.14 per cent after Trump's move to impose 100 per cent import tariffs on branded and patented pharmaceutical drugs from October 1. Wockhardt shares tanked 9.4 per cent. Laurus Labs, Biocin, Zyclus Life, Glenmark, Sun Pharma and Dr Reddy's also declined.

In his post on social media platform Truth Social, Trump wrote, "Starting October 1st, 2025, we will be imposing a 100% Tariff on any branded or patented Pharmaceutical Product, unless a Company IS BUILDING their Pharmaceutical Manufacturing Plant in America."

The US President further clarified, "IS BUILDING" will be defined as, "breaking ground" and/or "under construction." There will, therefore, be no Tariff on these Pharmaceutical Products if construction has started.

Among Sensex firms, Mahindra & Mahindra, Eternal, Tata Steel, Bajaj Finance, Asian Paints, Sun Pharma, Tech Mahindra, Infosys, Tata Consultancy Services and HCL Tech were the biggest laggards.

However, Larsen & Toubro, Tata Motors, ITC and Reliance Industries were the gainers.

"Indian equities ended sharply lower on Friday in a broad-based sell-off after the US announced a steep 100 per cent tariff on imports of branded and patented



pharmaceutical products effective October 1. The unexpected move rattled already fragile investor sentiment, which was still digesting the recent hike in H-1B visa fees that triggered heavy selling in IT counters this week.

"Both IT and healthcare stocks bore the brunt of the sell-off, dragging the broader indices lower as investors rushed to reassess earnings outlooks and export growth prospects," Ponnudi R, CEO of Enrich Money, an online trading and wealth tech firm, said.

The BSE smallcap gauge tanked 2.05 per cent and midcap index lost 1.96 per cent.

All sectoral indices ended lower. Telecommunication dropped the most by 2.69 per cent, followed by BSE Focused IT (2.43 per cent), IT (2.41 per cent), consumer durables (2.34 per cent), teck (2.03 per cent), commodities (1.91 per cent), metal (1.90 per cent), services (1.73 per cent), consumer discretionary (1.70 per cent).

As many as 3,100 stocks declined while 1,041 advanced and 139 remained unchanged on the BSE.

Since last Thursday, the BSE benchmark has lost 2,587.5 points or 3.11 per cent, and the Nifty tumbled 768.9 points or 3 per cent.

"Markets remained under pressure and extended their losing streak for the sixth straight session. The tone was weak from the outset and worsened as the day progressed. The announcement of tariffs on

branded drugs weighed heavily on sentiment, adding to recent concerns over visa policy changes," Ajit Mishra - SVP, Research, Religare Broking Ltd, said.

"The Indian market experienced a bloodbath, mirroring the rout across Asian markets. Investor sentiment was rattled by a fresh wave of tariffs targeting the pharmaceuticals, dragging pharma stocks deep into the red. Meanwhile, Accenture's weaker guidance and job cuts highlighted slowing IT spending, with AI-driven growth failing to meet expectations, prompting a broad sell-off in tech shares," Vinod Nair, Head of Research, Geojit Investments Limited, said.

In Asian markets, South Korea's Kospi, Japan's Nikkei 225 index, Shanghai's SSE Composite index and Hong Kong's Hang Seng ended significantly lower.

Equity markets in Europe were trading in positive territory. US markets ended lower on Thursday.

Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) offloaded equities worth Rs 4,995.42 crore on Thursday, according to exchange data.

Global oil benchmark Brent crude dipped 0.27 per cent to USD 69.23 a barrel.

On Thursday, the Sensex tanked 555.95 points or 0.68 per cent to settle at 81,159.68. The Nifty tumbled 166.05 points or 0.66 per cent to 24,890.85. (PTI)

Defending its purchase of Russian crude oil, India has been maintaining that its energy procurement is driven by national interest and market dynamics.

India turned to purchasing Russian oil sold at a discount after Western countries imposed sanctions on Moscow and shunned its supplies over its invasion of Ukraine in February, 2022.

Consequently, from a mere 1.7 per cent share in total oil imports in 2019-20, Russia's share increased to 35.1 per cent in 2024-25, and it is now the biggest oil supplier to India. (PTI)

## Centre clamps raw jute stock limits amidst surging prices, resentment among millers

KOLKATA, Sept 26: Amidst a steep rise in raw jute prices, the government has issued an order capping the maximum stock that traders, balers, and millers can hold, while industry stakeholders believe that the move will boost the supply of the commodity in the short term but may not be effective to stabilise the market in the long run.

The order, issued by the Office of Jute Commissioner under the Ministry of Textiles, allowed balers with presses to hold a maximum of 2,000 quintals of raw jute, other stockists to 300 quintals, and mills to no more than 45 days of consumption at current production rates.

The order comes in the wake of jute prices breaching the Rs 9,000 per quintal mark, with mills struggling to procure the raw material and facing thin arrivals.

"The stock control order may be a deterrent against hoarding at the market level, but it is unwarranted for millers. If a raw jute stock limit is imposed at the early season, we may face difficulties in the rest of the year in ramping up production for jute bags and meeting the government sector's requirements. We do not support stock restrictions on jute mills so early in the season," Indian Jute Mills Association chairman Raghavendra Gupta told PTI.

Traditionally, mills enter the season with 10 lakh bales of stock, but this year they are beginning the critical September-October festival packaging period with historically low reserves, according to millers.

Gupta said millers are in "a vulnerable position with a low stock of the raw material". "On average, millers now have a stock of 25 days, which is roughly 5 lakh bales.

Since raw jute was being hoarded at the 'mokam' (marketplace in villages) level, there was hardly any arrival at mills," he said, claiming that import restrictions through land port from Bangladesh and a decline in production have been adding to the woes. Jute Balers' Association committee member Jai Bagra dismissed the allegation of hoarding. He said raw jute production is down by 10-15 per cent this year, and carryover to the current season was estimated to be "not over 18 lakh bales".

The carryover was to the tune of 30 lakh bales in the last year, he said.

"Less production, coupled with less carryover and restrictions on raw jute import from Bangladesh, are reasons why the prices are skyrocketing. There is no hoarding as no one will be able to hoard the commodity when traders are paying through the nose," Bagra told PTI. He said the stock control order might cool off the market to some extent in the short run.

"But the move may not be effective in taming prices in the long run, as crop (raw jute) is expected to be less this year. In the 2024-25 jute year (July-June), the raw material availability will be to the tune of 95 to 98 lakh bales, including imports. Moreover, the government's order for jute bags is likely to be steady this year, and demand for raw materials from millers will remain steady."

Former IJMA president Sanjay Kajaria said the new stock control order is aimed at curbing hoarding and speculative trading, but he felt that it might have "limited impact". (PTI)

Durga Puja has long been one of Assam's most cherished celebrations — a festival where faith, art, and community spirit converge. Every year, as the clear blue autumn skies arrive and the monsoon recedes, the state comes alive with colorful pandals, rhythmic dhak beats, and a shared sense of devotion. But in recent years, the timing, mood, and even logistics of Durga Puja in Assam have been increasingly influenced by a new and unsettling factor: climate change.

The Brahmaputra valley, home to one of the most dynamic river systems in the world, has always been sensitive to seasonal variations. Yet, the past decade has witnessed a disturbing shift. Erratic monsoons, delayed retreats of rain, and sudden flash floods have begun disrupting the natural rhythm of life — and Durga Puja has not been spared. What was once considered a festival of clear skies and crisp autumn air now often unfolds under the threat of heavy showers, flooded streets, and unpredictable weather patterns.

Seasonal Symphony Disrupted Traditionally, Durga Puja coincides with the retreat of the monsoon and the arrival of Sharad Ritu, the post-monsoon season celebrated in poetry and song. For artisans who depend on this seasonal income, such disruptions can be financially devastating.

Climate change has also increased the price of raw materials. Bamboo, hay, and clay often become scarce after floods, raising production costs. Many small idol-making workshops have had to shut down or take loans, making them economically vulnerable.

Changing Ritual Spaces Pandals, the heart of Durga Puja celebrations, are also affected. In urban areas like Guwahati, organizers are forced to spend more on waterproofing, drainage arrangements, and stronger structures to withstand sudden storms. Rising temperatures have also made ventilation a bigger concern, with many committees installing coolers and fans to ensure devotees' comfort — further increasing costs and energy consumption.

In rural areas, where budgets are smaller, heavy rain sometimes washes away decorations and even damages electrical systems, forcing committees to cancel cultural programs. This deprives local communities of the social and artistic expressions that are integral to the festival.

The Environmental Footprint of the Festival Ironically, while Durga Puja is being affected by climate change, the festival itself has historically contributed to environmental stress. Non-biodegradable idols painted with chemical colors have polluted rivers during immersion, while pandals consume large amounts of electricity for lighting.

In recent years, however, a growing awareness has led to positive changes. Many committees are switching to eco-friendly idols made with natural clay and organic dyes. Immersions are increasingly being organized in artificial tanks to prevent direct pollution of the Brahmaputra and its tributaries. Solar-powered lighting and energy-efficient LED installations are also becoming popular, reducing the carbon footprint of the celebrations.

Health and Safety Concerns Climate change has also brought new health challenges during Durga Puja. Standing water after unseasonal rain becomes a breeding ground for mosquitoes, leading to spikes in dengue and malaria cases during the festive season. Organizers now have to spend more on sanitation measures, mosquito control, and health awareness campaigns.

Cultural and Emotional Impact Durga Puja is not just a religious ritual; it is a marker of cultural continuity. Families plan their shopping, travel, and social gatherings around this time of year. When climate change disrupts the festival, it impacts not just logistics but also emotions.

campaigns about plastic waste, tree plantation drives, and river-cleaning activities are often launched during Durga Puja, turning the festival into a platform for environmental education.

A Call for Climate-Resilient Festivities If climate change continues unchecked, the challenges to Durga Puja will deepen. Rising river levels could force the relocation of immersion sites, heat waves could make open-air pandals unbearable, and more frequent floods could make festival planning impossible in some regions.

This is why integrating climate resilience into festival planning is crucial. Local governments, cultural organizations, and communities must work together to develop infrastructure that can withstand extreme weather. At the same time, celebrations must continue to move toward eco-friendliness — using sustainable materials, minimizing energy use, and ensuring safe waste disposal.

Conclusion: Faith in the Time of Change Durga Puja in Assam has survived centuries of political upheavals, social transformations, and economic challenges. Its core message — the triumph of good over evil — feels even more urgent in the age of climate change. The goddess slaying Mahishasura can be seen as a metaphor for humanity's struggle against the destructive forces of environmental degradation.

As Assam celebrates Durga Puja amid rising climate uncertainty, the festival becomes more than a ritual. 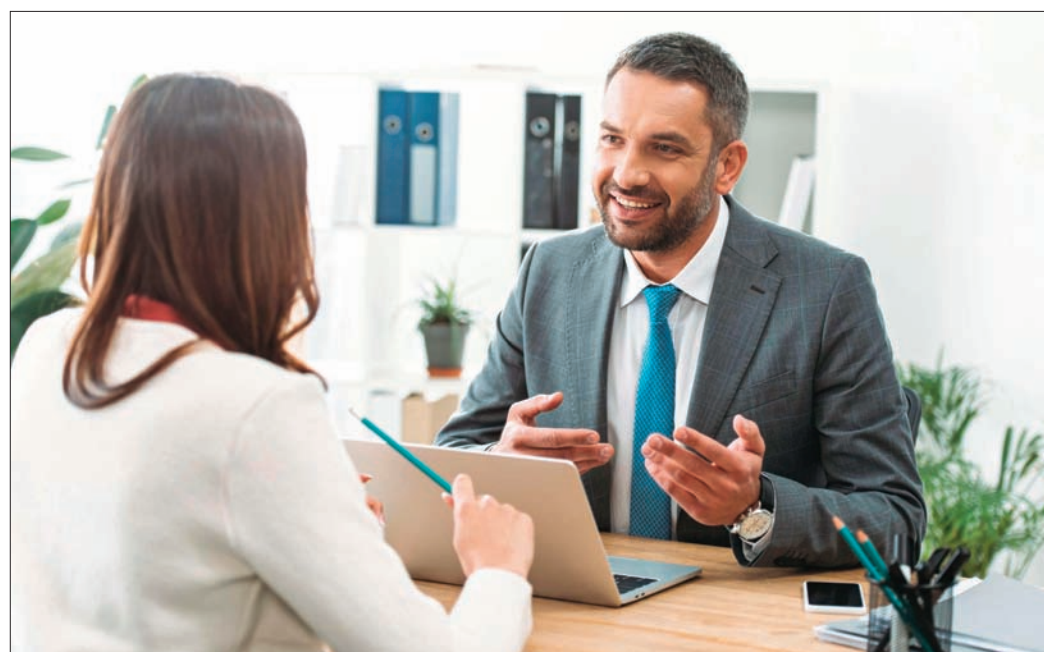

# Sharif in US for 80<sup>th</sup> session of United Nations General Assembly US President Trump meets Pak PM Sharif, Field Marshal Munir at White House

**NEW YORK/ISLAMABAD, Sept 26:** US President Donald Trump has met with Pakistan Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and Field Marshal Asim Munir at the White House to discuss bilateral ties.

Trump said a "great leader" was coming while talking to reporters at the White House after signing several executive orders on Thursday.

"In fact, we have a great leader coming, the prime minister of Pakistan coming, and the field marshal (of) Pakistan. Field marshal is a very great guy and so is the prime minister, both. And they're coming," Trump said.

This was the first formal bilateral interaction between Trump and Sharif, coming six years after former premier Imran Khan met Trump during the latter's first term in July 2019.

Sharif is in the US for the 80th session of the United Nations General Assembly and will address the General Debate from the UNGA podium on Friday.

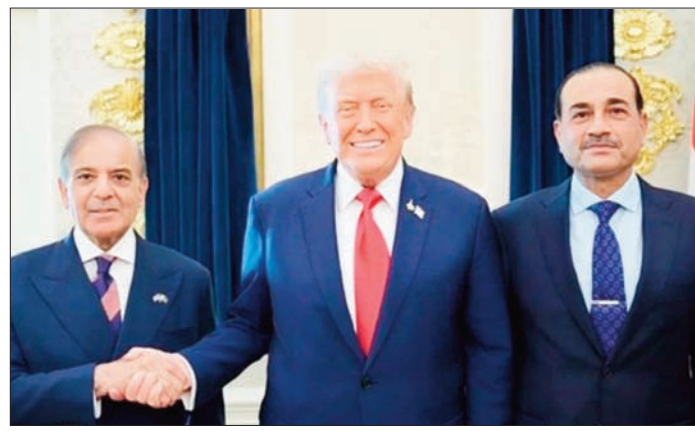
The meeting was held at the

Oval Office in Washington DC, where Vice President J D Vance and Secretary of State Marco Rubio were also present, according to a statement by the Pakistan Prime Minister's Office (PMO), which added that it was held in a "pleasant atmosphere".

The meeting was closed to the press and was scheduled to start at 4:30 pm (local time) but was delayed by about 30 minutes due to President Trump's engagements. It continued for approximately one hour and 20 minutes.

Post-meeting photos showed both Prime Minister Sharif and Field Marshal Munir exchanging views with Trump. Trump was also all smiles as he flashed his signature thumbs up sign during a group photo.

Sharif met Trump in New York on the margins of the UNGA session on Tuesday when the US president held a multilateral meeting with leaders from Arab nations and others, including Egypt, Indonesia, Qatar, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia and Turkey.



Earlier, Radio Pakistan reported that the two were "expected to discuss matters of mutual interest as well as regional and global situation".

Sharif arrived at the White House around 4.52 pm and was greeted by senior administration officials.

The Pakistani prime minister's motorcade was seen leaving the White House around 6.18 pm, according to the White House pool.

announced on social media that India and Pakistan had agreed to a "full and immediate" ceasefire after a "long night" of talks mediated by Washington, he has repeated his claim nearly 50 times that he "helped settle" the tensions between India and Pakistan.

India has been consistently maintaining that the understanding on cessation of hostilities with Pakistan was reached following direct talks between the Directors General of Military Operations of the two militaries.

The last Pakistani prime minister to visit the White House was Imran Khan, who met Trump in July 2019 on an "official working visit".

Before him, Sharif's brother and then Pakistani prime minister Nawaz Sharif visited the White House in 2015.

Historically, Pakistan and the US were Cold War allies and for years worked together in defeating the USSR in Afghanistan and later on fighting together against militancy.

But their policies diverged with respect to Afghan Taliban and the

US felt betrayed due to Pakistan's alleged ties to the militants. The tipping point was reached when the US in a secret operation killed Osama bin Laden in Pakistan in 2011.

The two countries have reached a trade agreement that entails a 19 per cent tariff on Pakistani imports and will allow Washington to help develop Pakistan's oil reserves. US goods and services trade with Pakistan totalled an estimated USD 10.1 billion in 2024, up 6.3 per cent (USD 523.0 million) from 2023.

The US' total goods trade (exports plus imports) with Pakistan was an estimated USD 7.2 billion in 2024. US goods exports to Pakistan in 2024 were USD 2.1 billion, up 3.3 per cent (USD 67.2 million) from 2023.

US goods imports from Pakistan in 2024 totalled USD 5.1 billion, up 4.8 per cent (USD 233.9 million) from 2023. The US goods trade deficit with Pakistan was USD 3 billion in 2024, a 5.9 per cent increase (USD 166.7 million) from 2023. (PTI)

## China launches investigation into Mexico's tariffs on imports from Asia



**BEIJING, Sept 26:** China has opened an investigation into whether import tariffs being imposed by Mexico are a trade and investment barrier.

Mexico plans to impose taxes as high as 50 per cent on more than 1,400 products from Asia to protect factories at home, which are facing stiff tariffs imposed by President Donald Trump on exports to the United States.

A Chinese Commerce Ministry statement posted Thursday said the tariffs would harm the interests of affected countries.

"China believes that, against the backdrop of the current US abuse of tariffs, all countries should jointly oppose all forms of unilateralism and protectionism and must not sacrifice the interests of third parties because of coercion," the statement said.

The Commerce Ministry also announced Thursday that it was launching an anti-dumping investigation into pecans imported from Mexico and the United States.

Mexico has been under pressure from the Trump administration to limit Chinese imports, some of which the US says use Mexico as a backdoor to the American market.

Mexican President Claudia Sheinbaum has said that the tariffs are not the result of US pressure.

China will be the most affected as Mexico imported USD 130 billion worth of products from the country in 2024, second only to the what Mexico bought from the United States. Other countries hit will include South Korea, Thailand, India, Philippines and Indonesia.

It's not clear if the investigation into the Mexican tariffs would result in any concrete steps against Mexico.

Under the regulation governing such investigations, a finding that a trade barrier exists can lead to consultations with the other country, a settlement under a multilateral framework and other appropriate measures. (AP)

## One of Haiti's leaders says his country is at war with gangs and asks world for help

**PORT-AU-PRINCE, Sept 26:** One of Haiti's leaders has asked the world to help his troubled Caribbean country fight what he characterised as a war against relentless gang violence and widespread hunger.

Laurent Saint-Cyr, head of Haiti's transitional presidential council, addressed the UN General Assembly in New York on Thursday, saying that immediate action was needed because people were dying daily across Haiti.

"Just a four-hour plane ride from here, a human tragedy is unfolding," he said. "Every day, innocent lives are extinguished. ... Entire neighborhoods are disappearing."

"It's important to say this: Haiti is experiencing war, a war between criminals that want to impose violence as a social order and an armed population that is fighting for human dignity and freedom," Saint-Cyr said.

Violence between the country's gangs and police, as well as with vigilante groups, has left more than 3,100 people dead from January to June, with another 1,189 injured, according to the UN.

The mayhem has displaced more than 1.3 million people across Haiti in recent years, while more than half of Haiti's nearly 12 million inhabitants were expected to experience severe hunger through the first half of the year.

The refugees settle where they can, such as the shelter found by Kettia Jean Charles and her family in the Delmas 31 low-income area of the capital, Port-au-Prince. No longer as safe as it once was, it's still a refuge compared to the Solino neighbourhood where she ran a beauty salon — now a ghost town after gangsters drove out most remaining locals in November.

"I used to sleep in a bed, had my own business, and my children

went to school. Now, I am living this catastrophic life," Charles said.

Charles, 34, is at least seven months pregnant — she's not sure exactly how many weeks — and lives with her husband and three children in a home made of four plastic sheets with a tarp for a roof. She gets some help from relatives nearby and the family fights for the scraps of food provided at the shelter.

"I am asking for help so I can get out of this situation," Charles said as she wiped away tears. "Since I have come here, it has been very humiliating because I have no money, so I have to beg."

Last year, a UN-backed mission led by Kenyan police officers launched operations in Haiti meant to help an under-staffed and under-funded local police department fight back against the gangs.

But more than a year has passed, and the mission still has less than 1,000 personnel, far below the 2,500 envisioned, and some USD 112 million in its trust fund — about 14 per cent of the estimated USD 800 million needed a year.

The US and Panama have urged the UN Security Council to authorise a new force of 5,550 in Haiti, a proposal backed by Saint-Cyr.

"It is crucial to mobilise a strong force with a clear mandate and with adequate material, logistical and financial resources," he said.

In the once-thriving neighbourhood of Solino, which had several shops, businesses and even a health clinic, the gangs took everything they could, including electrical wiring, toilets and light fixtures. Nearly every home now has charred and bullet-riddled walls.

"All I dream about now is leaving this camp so that my children can go to school and contribute to society," Charles said. (AP)



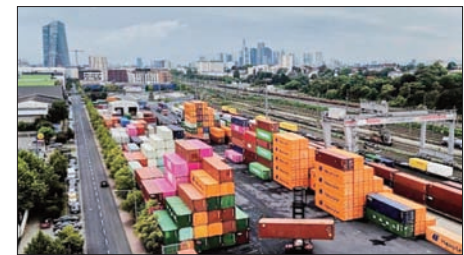
## Trump to put import taxes on pharmaceutical drugs, kitchen cabinets, furniture and heavy trucks

**WASHINGTON, Sept 26:** President Donald Trump has said that he will put import taxes of 100 per cent on pharmaceutical drugs, 50 per cent on kitchen cabinets and bathroom vanities, 30 per cent on upholstered furniture and 25 per cent on heavy trucks starting on October 1.

The posts on his social media site on Thursday showed that Trump's devotion to tariffs did not end with the trade frameworks and import taxes that were launched in August, a reflection of the president's confidence that taxes will help to reduce the government's budget deficit while increasing domestic manufacturing.

While Trump did not provide a legal justification for the tariffs, he appeared to stretch the bounds of his role as commander-in-chief by stating on Truth Social that the taxes on imported kitchen cabinets and sofas were needed "for National Security and other reasons".

Under the Trade Expansion Act of 1962, the administration launched a Section 232 investigation in April about the impacts on national security from pharmaceutical drug and truck imports. The Commerce Department launched a 232 investigation into timber and lumber in March, though it's unclear whether the furniture



tariffs stem from that.

The tariffs are another dose of uncertainty for the US economy with a solid stock market but a weakening outlook for jobs and elevated inflation. These new taxes on imports could pass through to consumers in the form of higher prices and dampen hiring, a process that economic data suggests is already underway.

"We have begun to see good prices showing through into higher inflation," Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell warned in a recent news conference, adding that higher costs for goods account for "most" or potentially "all" of the increase in inflation levels this year.

The president has pressured Powell to resign, arguing that the Fed should cut its benchmark interest rates more aggressively because infla-

tion is no longer a concern. Fed officials have stayed cautious on rate cuts because of the uncertainty created by tariffs.

Trump said on Truth Social that the pharmaceutical tariffs would not apply to companies that are building manufacturing plants in the United States, which he defined as either "breaking ground" or being "under construction". It was unclear how the tariffs would apply to companies that already have factories in the US.

In 2024, America imported nearly USD 233 billion in pharmaceutical and medicinal products, according to the Census Bureau. The prospect of prices doubling for some medicines could send shock waves to voters as health care expenses, as well as the costs of Medicare and Medicaid, potentially increase.

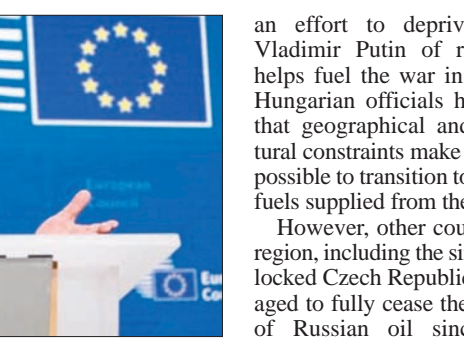
The pharmaceutical drug announcement was shocking as Trump has previously suggested that tariffs would be phased in over time so that companies had time to build factories and relocate production. On CNBC in August, Trump said he would start by charging a "small tariff" on pharmaceuticals and raise the rate over a year or more to 150 per cent and even 250 per cent. (AP)

## Hungary's Orbán tells Trump that dropping Russian energy would bring economy 'to its knees'

**BUDAPEST, Sept 26:** Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orbán said Friday that Hungary will continue to source fossil fuels from Russia despite demands from his ally US President Donald Trump, and that he'd informed the president that dropping Russian energy would be a "disaster" for Hungary's economy.

Hungary remains one of the only countries in Europe to continue purchasing Russian oil and natural gas following Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine in February 2022.

But Trump, an admirer of the long-serving Hungarian leader, earlier this month called on all NATO countries including Hungary to



an effort to deprive President Vladimir Putin of revenue that helps fuel the war in Ukraine — Hungarian officials have insisted that geographical and infrastructural constraints make it nearly impossible to transition to using fossil fuels supplied from the West.

However, other countries in the region, including the similarly landlocked Czech Republic, have managed to fully cease their purchases of Russian oil since Moscow launched its invasion. Slovakia, which neighbours Hungary, has also maintained its Russian energy imports.

Yet despite pressure from the EU and the Trump administration, Orbán, widely considered the EU leader with the closest relationship to the Kremlin, said Friday that when it comes to energy sources, "It is clear what is in Hungary's interest and we will act accordingly."

Hungary and the United States, he said, "are sovereign countries. There is no need for either of us to accept the arguments of the other. America has its arguments and interests, and Hungary does too." (AP)

## S Korea fires warning shots to repel North Korean vessel breaching sea boundary

**SEOUL, Sept 26:** South Korea's military said it fired warning shots early Friday to drive away a North Korean merchant ship that briefly crossed the disputed western sea boundary between the rival neighbours.

The ship crossed the Northern Limit Line near the South Korean border island of Baengnyeong around 5 am but retreated after South Korea's military issued an audio warning and fired warning shots, South Korea's Joint Chiefs of Staff said.

There were no immediate reports that North Korea forces returned fire or responded with force.

The response was carried out in accordance with operational procedures and the military remains in a heightened state of readiness to firmly safeguard territorial waters, the South's Joint Chiefs of Staff said.

South Korea's military frequently has fired warning shots to repel North Korean patrol or commercial vessels breaching its waters. The poorly marked western sea boundary between the Koreas has been the scene of

past skirmishes and attacks, including the North's 2010 shelling of a South Korean island and its alleged torpedoing of a South Korean navy ship, which together killed 50 South Koreans.

During a fiery speech in January 2024, North Korean leader Kim Jong Un said his country does not recognise the Northern Limit Line in the Yellow Sea, which was drawn by the US-led UN Command at the end of the 1950-53 Korean War. North Korea insists on a boundary encroaching deeply into South Korea-controlled waters.

The Koreas exchanged warning shots in 2022 after the South's navy fired at a North Korean merchant ship that crossed the western sea boundary.

Tensions on the Korean Peninsula remain high as North Korea continues to dismiss Seoul's calls to resume diplomacy. Relations have soured in recent years as Kim accelerated his weapons programme and deepened alignment with Moscow following Russia's invasion of Ukraine in February 2022. (AP)

## Slovenia bans Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu from entering, citing ICC arrest warrant

**LJUBLJANA, Sept 26:** Slovenia on Thursday said it was banning Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu from entering the European Union country to underscore its defence of international law.

The decision was linked to an arrest warrant issued by the International Criminal Court against the Israeli prime minister. Foreign Ministry official Neva Grasic said, according to the official STA news agency.

The EU nation of some 2 million people, which recognised a Palestinian state last year, has been a vocal critic of Israeli actions in Gaza and Thursday's move against Netanyahu was apparently designed to underscore the country's policies.

Slovenia already had barred Israeli National Security Minister Itamar Ben-Gvir and Finance Minister Bezalel Smotrich from entering the country and imposed an arms embargo on Israel.

"All countries that are bound by the international court, including Slovenia, must not recognise the situation resulting from Israel's illegal presence in the occupied Palestinian territory, and must not offer any support in maintaining this situation," she added.

The Slovenian government said on X that the decision sends "a clear message to the state of Israel that Slovenia expects consistent respect for the decisions of international courts and international humanitarian law."

By doing so, Slovenia "confirms its commitment to international law, universal values of human rights and a principled and consistent foreign policy," the government added. (AP)

Microsoft said it disabled services to a unit within the Israeli military after a company review determined its artificial intelligence and cloud computing products were being used to help carry out mass surveillance of Palestinians.

The action comes after The Associated Press and The Guardian published reports earlier this year revealing how the Israeli Ministry of Defence had been using Microsoft's Azure platform to aid in the war in Gaza and occupation of the West Bank.

Brad Smith, Microsoft's vice chair and president, wrote in a blog post that the company was taking steps to enforce compliance with its terms of service.

An AP investigation in February showed that the Israeli military's use of Microsoft products skyrocketed after a deadly surprise attack by Hamas militants on October 7, 2023. The AP's report cited internal Microsoft data showing the Israelis were using gigabytes of cloud storage and massive amounts of AI-enabled language translation services.

The AP also reported that Israel's military used Microsoft Azure to compile informa-

knowledge gathered through mass surveillance, which it transcribes and translates, including phone calls and text messages. That intelligence is then cross-checked with Israel's in-house AI systems for targeting airstrikes.

AP reported that internal Microsoft data showed multiple Azure subscriptions were tied to Unit 8200, an elite cyber warfare unit within the Israeli Army responsible for clandestine operations, collecting signal intelligence and surveillance.

Following AP's report, Microsoft ac-

products were being used in violation of its terms of service. However, Smith did not name the specific Israeli unit losing access to Microsoft services.

Microsoft declined to answer detailed questions from AP on Thursday, including whether Unit 8200 was involved. The company would also not answer how it would ensure the Israeli military wouldn't simply shift its mass surveillance operations to any of the hundreds of other Azure subscriptions under its control.

The Israeli military did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Hossam Nasr, one of more than a dozen Microsoft employees fired or arrested after protests over the company's involvement in the war in Gaza, called Thursday's announcement a "significant and unprecedented win". But, he said, it was not enough.

"Microsoft has only disabled a small subset of services to only one unit in the Israeli military," said Nasr, an organiser with the group No Azure for Apartheid. "The vast majority of Microsoft's contract with the Israeli military remains intact." (AP)

## BMS submits 14-point charter of demands to Chief Minister on labour welfare

**ITANAGAR, Sept 26:** The Bharatiya Mazdoor Sangh (BMS), Arunachal Pradesh unit, recently submitted a 14-point charter of demands to the chief minister, seeking urgent intervention and welfare measures for workers and the labour community across the state.

"We stand for the welfare of the workers' community and always seek government intervention for resolution of their problems. Employees serving in different departments for several years have been contributing to state and national development, yet their genuine grievances are pending," Chapo stated.

BMS Secretary General Donik Taling informed that during National Labour Day celebrations held in different parts of the state, BMS teams submitted memoranda to the chief guests and guests of honour, most of whom were ministers, lawmakers, senior officials and public leaders. He said the occasion was used to highlight the concerns of workers and to press for redressal of their issues at the policy level.

The 14-point charter of demands submitted to the chief minister includes several measures aimed at improving the condition of workers.

The demands are: declaration of September 17 as a holiday to mark National Labour Day; enhancement of honorarium for Anganwadi workers and helpers; increase in remuneration for ASHA workers and ASHA facilitators; enhancement of PM Poshan workers' honorarium from the present ₹2,000 per month to ₹18,000; enhancement of pension and retirement benefits for contingency and casual workers from ₹3,00,000 to ₹10,00,000; payment of minimum wages to cooks and chowkidars serving in residential schools across the districts; regularisation of Anganwadi workers, helpers, ASHA workers and facilitators on a seniority basis as and when posts fall vacant in their respective departments; provision of compulsory accidental death benefits for workers whose deaths occur during duty hours under the Power and Public Health Engineering Departments; implementation of the principle of "same grade pay for same work" for staff in government establishments; creation of WC/MTS posts and regularisation of contractual and contingency workers serving more than 20 years in a department; compulsory engagement of family members of retired contingency workers who did not receive retirement benefits; and the creation of the Arunachal Pradesh Motor Transport Workers Welfare Board.

The BMS leadership reiterated that these measures are vital to ensure justice and dignity for thousands of workers who have been rendering dedicated service in different departments and sectors.

They urged the government to consider the demands sympathetically and implement them at the earliest.

## 'This means a well-established system is already in place'

# Bihar's 75 lakh women receive ₹ 10,000 each as PM launches entrepreneurial scheme ahead of polls

**PATNA, Sept 26:** Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Friday launched Bihar's Mukhya Mantri Mahila Rojgar Yojana, and transferred ₹ 10,000 each to the bank accounts of 75 lakh women.

The ₹ 7,500-crore scheme, an initiative of Bihar's NDA government, is aimed at promoting women's empowerment through self-employment and livelihood opportunities.

The prime minister launched the scheme virtually from Delhi, with Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar, his deputy Samrat Choudhary, and several Union and state ministers joining it through video conference from Patna. A large number of women of the state also joined it virtually. The launch of the scheme assumes significance ahead of the upcoming assembly polls in the state.

The PM said he was impressed by the vision of the scheme, under which at least one woman from every family will be a beneficiary.

Starting with an initial financial support of ₹ 10,000, up to ₹ 2 lakh would be provided to the beneficiaries depending on the success of their enterprise.

Assessing that the magnitude of the scheme is massive, the PM said that the women of Bihar can now open shops selling groceries, utensils, cosmetics, toys, and stationery. They can also pursue livestock-related businesses such



as cattle rearing and poultry farming, he said, adding that for these ventures, necessary training will be provided. He noted that Bihar already has a robust network of self-help groups, with nearly 11 lakh groups actively functioning.

This means a well-established system is already in place, the PM said. Noting that the central government has opened new sectors for women and daughters across the country, the prime minister highlighted that today, a large number of young women are joining the armed forces and police, and even flying fighter jets.

Affirming that addressing every hardship faced by citizens is the government's responsibility, Modi recalled that during the COVID-19 pandemic, a scheme to provide free foodgrains was launched.

"Now, under the Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Anna Yojana, over 8.5 crore needy individuals in Bihar are receiving free ration... this has significantly improved lives," he said.

"A large portion of Bihar prefers Usna (parboiled) rice. Previously, mothers and sisters were provided with Arwa rice through government ration, and had to exchange it in the market for Usna rice -- often receiving only 10 kg of Usna rice for 20 kg of Arwa rice. The government has now started providing Usna rice directly through the ration system," he added.

Modi said that traditionally, property in India, be it a house, shop or land, was registered in the name of men.

However, with the launch of the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana, a

new provision was introduced to ensure that mothers, sisters and daughters are also named as owners of homes, he said.

The PM said that over 50 lakh PM Awas homes have been constructed in Bihar, and in most of them, women are listed as co-owners.

The PM also virtually interacted with women, who had joined from different district headquarters in large numbers.

Interacting with Putul Devi, a small entrepreneur from Purnea district, who told PM that now she would expand her small sweet shop and would sell 'jalebi' and other popular sweets, the PM, took a veiled dig at opposition leaders and said, "You spoke about selling 'jalebi'... you must be aware of the fact that lot of politics was played on 'jalebi' in the country in the recent past."

The PM was referring to the politics over 'jalebi' during the Haryana assembly polls last year.

Further, speaking on the occasion, Chief Minister Nitish Kumar said, "The NDA government has been working for the overall development of the state. We are improving the conditions of women and empowering them. We have always worked in the interest of the people and will continue to work tirelessly for the development of the state. We stay focused on our work." (PTI)

## Abhishek Banerjee hails Calcutta HC order on deportation, slams Centre

**KOLKATA, Sept 26:** TMC national general secretary Abhishek Banerjee on Friday hailed Calcutta High Court's order setting aside the Centre's decision to deport two women and their families from West Bengal's Birbhum district to Bangladesh, saying it exposed a "cruel and systematic campaign of harassment aimed at Bengalis".

In a post on X, Banerjee said the "long arm of the law has finally caught up" as the court held the Foreigners Regional Registration Office's (Delhi) detention and deportation order unlawful and directed the "immediate repatriation of six people, including the pregnant woman from Birbhum, who were labelled 'Bangladeshi migrants' and expelled".

The TMC Lok Sabha leader alleged that the episode highlighted a targeted political agenda.

"This judgment lays bare a cruel and systematic campaign of harassment aimed at Bengalis by the Bangla-Birodhi zamindars," he said, vowing to "hold the ones responsible to account, in courts, in public debate and at the polls." He warned that in the 2026 Assembly elections, "the people of Bengal will not tolerate XENOPHOBIA, HUMILIATION, or the

POLITICS OF EXCLUSION. Come 2026, those who trafficked in fear and persecution will face a decisive verdict from the electorate."

Reiterating his party's stance, he added that "justice has begun to be served" and that the TMC's resolve to protect the dignity, rights and language of the people of Bengal remains "unshaken".

Banerjee's remarks came in the backdrop of the Calcutta High Court order on Friday quashing the Centre's move to deport two women and their families, terming them "illegal immigrants".

The court directed the central government to ensure that Sonali Bibi, Sweety Bibi and four other deported family members, including three children, are brought back to India within a month. It also dismissed the Centre's plea to grant a temporary stay on the order.

While the BJP is yet to react to the TMC leader's statement, Banerjee's sharp attack indicates that the ruling party in West Bengal plans to make the issue of deportation and alleged targeting of Bengalis a major political plank ahead of the 2026 Assembly elections. The issue of migrant safety has been a rallying point for the TMC in recent weeks. (PTI)

## Pray to Maa Durga that 'Sonar Bangla' glory is restored by new govt post 2026 polls: Shah

**KOLKATA, Sept 26:** Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Friday inaugurated the Durga Puja pandal of Santosh Mitra Square here, and said he prayed to the goddess that post the 2026 West Bengal assembly polls, there is a new government which restores the state's lost 'Sonar Bangla' glory. Shah said Bengal should once again become safe, peaceful and prosperous, fulfilling the dream of Nobel laureate Rabindranath Tagore.

"I have prayed to Maa Durga that after this election, a government should be formed that can build a 'Sonar Bangla' (golden Bengal). Our Bengal should once again become safe, prosperous, peaceful and abundant. We should be able to build a Bengal that Kavi Guru Rabindranath Tagore had envisioned," Shah said.

"I also extend my greetings to people of the state and the country



for Durga Puja," Shah said at the inauguration of the pandal of the Santosh Mitra Square Sarbojanin Durgotsab Samity in north Kolkata. The home minister also expressed grief over the recent rain-related deaths in the state, and conveyed condolences to the bereaved families.

"At the beginning of the festivi-

ties, we experienced a very sad moment. More than 10 people lost their lives. I pay my homage to all those who died," Shah said. At least 11 people died following torrential rain in the metropolis and adjoining areas on September 23.

Shah described Bengal's Durga Puja festivities as a cultural treasure admired across the globe.

## MiG-21 added many proud moments to military aviation journey: Rajnath

**CHANDIGARH, Sept 26:** Defence Minister Rajnath Singh on Friday said the MiG-21 is not only an aircraft or a machine but a national pride, and a testimony to the deep ties between India and Russia.

Noting that the over 60-year-old journey of the MiG-21 is unmatched, he said the mighty machine picked up the burden of the country's security on its wings for decades, and shaped "our confidence and strengthened our strategy".

The defence minister was addressed a gathering at the decommissioning ceremony of the Russian-origin MiG-21 at the Chandigarh Air Force Station here.

The iconic Mikoyan-Gurevich MiG-21 fighter jets, which have been the backbone of Indian Air Force's (IAF) combat fleet, flew for the last time in Indian skies here on Friday, bringing the curtain down on a 62-year-long journey. The MiG-21 fighter jets have been part of the IAF's combat fleet since the 1960s.

Remembering the valour of the armed forces, Singh said the MiG-21 has a big contribution in their journey of bravery.

"We gathered here for the final operational sortie of MiG-21. Being amongst you, I have emotions of pride and gratitude," Singh said.

"When we are today giving a send-off to MiG-21 from its operational journey, I feel that we are giving a send-off to a chapter which will be written in golden letters in military aviation history," he said.

"MiG-21 is not only an aircraft or a machine but it is also a proof of deep ties between India and Russia," he stated.

The history of military aviation is incredible, he said, adding MiG-21 aircraft added many proud moments in the military aviation journey.

"In the history of the world's military aviation, there has not been any fighter jet which was made in such a big number," he stated.

Over 11,500 MiG 21 aircraft were made worldwide, and of them, 850 fighter jets remained part of the IAF, he said and added, "This number is the testimony of this aircraft's popularity, credibility and multi-dimensional capability".

"MiG-21 has been a witness to many brave works. Its contribution has not been limited to one incident or a war," he said as he recalled its role in the 1971 war with



Pakistan, 1999 Kargil conflict as well as 2019 Balakot air strikes.

Recalling the many occasions when MiG-21 proved its decisive capacity, he said, "From 1971 war to Kargil war, or from Balakot air strikes to Operation Sindoor, there was no such occasion when MiG-21 did not provide tremendous power to our armed forces". "Who can forget the 1971 war? During a war against Pakistan, the day MiG-21 attacked the Dhaka Governor House in adverse conditions, that day the outline of the outcome of the battle was decided," he said.

"Be it any historic mission, MiG-21 always kept the honour of the national flag high. This farewell is of our collective memories and national pride, and of this journey of courage, sacrifice and excellence," he said.

Singh said he was seeing the MiG-21 journey from a different perspective as well.

"This perspective is also giving a glimpse of traditions of ancient India. Our ancient culture teaches that the presence of God is not only in living but also in non-living things," the minister said.

"We consider this land our mother and ourselves its children. You must have seen that when a new house is built, we perform 'puja' before entering it. If we have a new car, we perform 'puja' for it.

"In a few days on Dussehra, we perform 'Shastra puja'. This tradition is not only faith and belief, it is an emotion of our gratitude towards each tool, each system and each instrument which protect and empower us," he said.

"Our civilisation and our culture teach us that respect should not only be given to a human being but also to everything which made some contribution in our lives," Singh said.

"When we give respect to every small and big thing then MiG-21 is our national pride and it has been a shield of our defence and a sym-

bol of our strength and then how can we leave its respect," he stated.

When we gathered here to give farewell to MiG-21, it should not be seen as a formal military ceremony but as an expansion of cultural tradition, he said.

The way we give respect to a soldier on his retirement, the same way, we are today giving respect to this mighty machine which picked up the burden of our security on its wings for decades, he said.

Everybody knows about its valour, he said, adding the aircraft is deeply embedded in its country's emotions and memories.

Hailing the role of the aircraft, he said the 60-year-old journey of MiG-21 is unmatched.

"For us this is not a fighter jet but like a family member and with which our attachment is quite deep," he said.

He said the MiG-21 shaped our confidence, strengthened our strategy and helped us in establishing at the global stage. This fighter jet faced each challenge in its journey and proved its capability every time, he asserted.

The minister made it clear that the MiG-21 that were being used till now were 40-year old while those inducted in the 1960s and 1970s were out of service for a long time.

"When there is talk of MiG-21, it is often said that IAF was flying 60-year-old aircraft. I want to clarify an important fact that the MiG-21, which came to the armed forces in the 1960s and 1970s, have already been out of service a long time ago," he said.

MiG 21 aircraft, which we were flying till now, were maximum 40-year-old. The 40-year lifetime for the standards of such aircraft is completely normal, he asserted.

In several countries, such fighter jets are kept active till such time, he said, stressing that MiG-21 had been kept updated technically. (PTI)

## Manmohan Singh library with 1,200 books encapsulating journey of country, Cong opens

**NEW DELHI, Sept 26:** Sections dedicated to Mahatma Gandhi, Jawaharlal Nehru, Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel and Indira Gandhi, multiple volumes of "The Encyclopedia of the Congress", as well as the party's poll manifestoes, are part of a library named after former prime minister Manmohan Singh in the Congress headquarters.

The library was inaugurated by Congress Parliamentary Party chief Sonia Gandhi on Friday in the presence of Singh's wife Gursharan Kaur and other members of the family, as well as party president Mallikarjun Kharge and former party chief Rahul Gandhi.

The library houses about 1,200 books, to begin with, which encapsulate the journey of the country and the Congress.

"Today, on the occasion of Dr. Manmohan Singh ji's birthday, we inaugurated the Dr. Manmohan Singh Research Centre and Library at Indira Bhawan, New Delhi. Dr. Singh's life and work are a beacon of simplicity, honesty, and dedication," Rahul Gandhi said in a post on Facebook. "This centre is not just a tribute to his legacy but a reminder for future generations of what true service to the nation looks like," he said. In a post on X, Congress general secretary Jairam Ramesh said, "Today on the occasion of the 93rd birth anniversary of Dr Manmohan Singh, the Chairperson of the Congress Parliamentary Party Sonia Gandhi ji inaugurated the Dr Manmohan Singh Research Centre and Library in the presence of Gursharan Kaur ji."

Though the Congress had an informal library at its 24, Akbar Road headquarters but this is the first time the party has built a proper library with over 1,200 books, including many rare ones at its new Indira Bhawan headquarters. As one enters the library, what catches the eye is a rare photograph of all the members of the Constituent Assembly who framed India's Constitution, while on the other side is a photograph of Manmohan Singh in his office in 1991,

the year he presented his historic budget as the finance minister that ushered in liberalisation.

There are separate sections dedicated to Mahatma Gandhi and India's first prime minister Nehru. There are also separate sections for Singh, Indira Gandhi, Rajiv Gandhi, Patel, Subhas Chandra Bose and Maulana Abul Kalam Azad, among others. There are also books on former prime minister P V Narsimha Rao.

The library houses biographies, selected works and selected speeches of many freedom fighters. It also has books on diplomacy and country-specific books on their bilateral ties with India.

An interesting section houses several volumes of "The Encyclopedia of the Indian National Congress" that consists of the entire history of the party since 1885, including commentaries, speeches and minutes of Congress Working Committee meetings. This encyclopedia has been compiled by a librarian from the party's office at 5, Rajendra Prasad Road -- Abdul Moin Zaidi -- and his wife Shahida Gufran Zaidi. There are several books by Zaidi, documenting the 139-year history of the party. The library also has manifestoes of the party from all general elections since 1951-52. It has historic pictures -- from Nehru and VK Krishna Menon walking together to founding leaders of the Congress -- A O Hume, Dadabhai Naoroji and William Wedderburn -- in one frame.

Several books written by P Chidambaram, Shashi Tharoor, Mani Shankar Aiyar, Manish Tewari and Salman Khurshid, are also part of the library. There are also books on leaders of other parties, including former prime minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee, in the library.

Indira Gandhi Bhawan, designed by Hafeez Contractor, was inaugurated earlier this year. It narrates the tale of the party's 139-year-old history with its walls adorning pictures from the freedom struggle to the party's governance achievements. (PTI)

## Mental well-being central to preventing heart disease, says former Union health secy

**NEW DELHI, Sept 26:** Mental well-being is central to preventing chronic and non-communicable diseases, especially heart disease, former Union Health Secretary Rajesh Bhushan said on Friday, underlining that alongside regular exercise and stress management, nurturing mental health early in families and reinforcing it in schools is critical.

Bhushan said life is not a sprint but a marathon, and young people need guidance to build patience, resilience, and balance rather than be pushed into early burnout.

He was delivering the keynote address at the Illness to Wellness Awareness Conference held here on the occasion of World Heart Day 2025.

"Schools can play a transformative role by replacing unhealthy practices with healthier alternatives, fostering mental wellness, and encouraging physical activity.

"If we want to address India's heart health crisis, we need to shift from a curative mindset to cultivating genuine health-seeking behaviour across our families, schools, and communities," Bhushan, who is also the chairperson of the Illness to Wellness Foundation's governing council, said.

The conference, under the theme 'Heart Care - Don't Miss a Beat', saw leading cardiologists, policymakers, and public health professionals advocating to address India's growing heart health crisis, as it emphasised the urgent need for preventive care, lifestyle interventions, mental health integration, digital health solutions, and community awareness.

Anil Rajput, chairperson, advisory council, Illness to Wellness Foundation, said, "World Heart Day reminds us that the heart is truly the seat of life. We are fortunate that



the Government of India has implemented a range of initiatives addressing heart health, from the National Programme for Prevention and Control of Cancer, Diabetes, Cardiovascular Diseases and Stroke (NPCDCS) to Ayushman Arogya Mandirs and PM-JAY (Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana), providing preventive care, early detection, and financial protection for treatment."

Coupled with wellness movements like Fit India, Khelo India, and Har Ghar Yoga, these programmes are promoting physical activity, mental well-being, and healthy lifestyles, according to Rajput. Technology, including telemedicine and AI-driven diagnostics, is further bridging the gap between urban and rural healthcare, ensuring timely and efficient heart care for all citizens, he said. "Supporting these efforts collectively can make a meaningful difference in safeguarding India's heart health," he added.

Experts addressed the rising incidence of sudden cardiac

arrests in young adults, the impact of mental stress, pollution, and poor lifestyle choices, and the critical importance of timely preventive screenings. They also highlighted how digital health, wearable technology, and artificial intelligence are transforming cardiac care delivery across India, bridging the urban-rural divide.

Dr Sandeep Bansal, director, Vardhman Mahavir Medical College and Safdarjung Hospital, said, "Cardiovascular disease is no longer a problem of the elderly. India is witnessing heart attacks striking far earlier, with nearly 60 per cent of cases occurring below the age of 55. Prevention is the most cost-effective strategy; it costs only a fraction, about one-sixth, of what treatment demands.

"To achieve real progress, we must strengthen hypertension control, integrate mental health into heart care, and raise awareness right from schools," Bansal said.

Addressing heart disease requires collective effort, strong government policies, private sector participation, and societal acceptance of healthier choices, he said.

Dr K K Talwar, chairman, PSRI Heart Institute, Delhi, added that while genetics play a role in heart disease, lifestyle factors such as stress, work pressure, and job insecurity are equally important. "Early awareness, adoption of healthy habits, and stress management, from families, schools, and workplaces, are essential to prevent cardiovascular events. Regular initiatives like cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training sessions further equip communities to respond effectively in emergencies, helping save lives and promote overall heart health," he said. (PTI)

'Shift to GST 2.0 with a two-rate structure poses immediate transitional challenges'

# Manipur: Market drive conducted on revised GST rates

**IMPHAL, Sept 26:** Manipur government officials on Friday undertook a drive at key market areas of Imphal to check and raise awareness on the implementation of revised GST rates in the state.

Market drive was conducted by officials of Consumer Affairs and Public Distribution along with DIPR at key commercial areas of Thangal bazaar, Paona market and Khuyathong in Imphal, where most wholesalers and distributors are concentrated, officials said.

During the drive, revised GST rate structures across different categories of stationary items, medicines and FMCG were given while traders and consumers were informed on the "compliance procedures and benefits of the new reforms", they said.

Urging all sections to actively embrace the reforms, the officials also stated that "the shift to GST 2.0 with a two-rate structure poses



immediate transitional challenges".

They called on wholesalers and retailers to maintain proper records, adjust pricing with anti-profiteering rules, and proactively manage inventory, pricing, compliance and communication.

Meanwhile, Officer on Special

Duty (Petroleum Oil Lubricant), Consumer Affairs, Food and Public Distribution, Haobam Bobby told mediapersons that, "Strict monitoring will be carried out against the illegal sale and stocking of petroleum products such as Motor Spirit (petrol) and High Speed Diesel (diesel) without valid

licenses. "As per the Explosives Act, any individual dealing with petroleum products must obtain a license from the Petroleum and Explosives Safety Organisation (PESO)", he said, adding that "unauthorised persons have been found operating petrol fuel dispensers from their residences and selling fuel illegally."

Haobam cautioned that such practices are extremely dangerous, pose risks of explosion and fire hazards. Haobam also stated that these activities are clear violations of the Prevention of Black Marketing and Maintenance of Supplies of Essential Commodities Act, 1980, and offenders will face strict penalties under the law.

Haobam also said, "CAF & PD has issued a 15-day deadline to those involved to immediately cease such practices, failing which legal action will be initiated." (PTI)

# Warning against selling of fuel illegally

**IMPHAL, Sept 26:** Consumer Affairs, Food and Public Distribution (CAF&PD) Department, Government of Manipur, has given 15 days' time to individuals illegally selling petrol and diesel to stop the practice, warning that legal action will be taken under the Prevention of Black Marketing and Maintenance of Supplies of Essential Commodities Act, 1980, if the practice does not stop.

Officer on Special Duty (Petroleum, Oil and Lubricants), CAF&PD, Haobam Bobby announced the decision at the DIPR auditorium in Imphal on Friday.

He said the move comes after complaints of bulk sale of petrol and high-speed diesel using fuel pump nozzles in areas of Thoubal and Imphal East districts. "Those selling fuel illegally in bulk must stop within 15 days from today (September 26). Failure to comply will invite strict legal action," Bobby warned.

The department will also con-



duct drives against those stocking fuel in bulk to verify whether they possess a 'certificate of safety' issued by the Chief Controller and a 'certificate of tank test' under Rule 126 of the Petroleum Rules, 2002. The Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas had notified these guidelines on March 13, 2002.

During inspections, officials will verify petrol pumps and home-based dispensing units to check

whether they have valid dealership from an Oil Marketing Company (OMC), along with no-objection certificates, environment clearance, fire safety certificates, and explosive licenses from the Petroleum and Explosives Safety Organisation (PESO).

Bobby further said the crackdown will also target roadside black-market petrol sellers across the state. (NNN)

# Tripura CM sanctions ₹ 50.65 cr for infrastructure, welfare projects

Saha has given administrative and financial approval for a number of projects.

₹ 12 crore has been approved for sanitation and solid waste management, safe drinking water,

water drainage, road construction, maintenance of capital assets, conservation and development of water bodies, street lighting in newly created wards/nagar panchayats, provision of online services, construction of electric crematoriums, etc, in 14 municipalities and 6 nagar panchayats of the state.

₹ 9.37 crore has been approved for maintenance work of various types of fixed assets for the convenience of the public during the upcoming Durga Puja.

₹ 9.28 crore has been approved for the expeditious completion of various pre-approved construction works in six R&D divisions of the state, namely Teliamura, Amarpur, Kumarghat, Kanchanpur, Satchanda, and Shantirbarbar.

In Agartala city, administrative approval and expenditure of ₹ 17.38 crore have been sanctioned for the development of Cantonment Road, covering the stretches from Durga Chowmuhani to Lake Chowmuhani, Lake Chowmuhani to Radhanagar, Buddha Mandir to Radhamadhav Unnayan Sangha, and Pragati School to Buddha Mandir.

"On the occasion of the upcoming Durga Puja festival, a total of ₹ 2,310 each has been sanctioned as a festival grant for 11,150 cook-cum-helper workers working under the Pradhan Mantri Poshan Scheme (School MDM), and a total of ₹ 2.58 crore has been sanctioned as bonus and advance for 26 contractual workers under the Primary Education Department (PM-Poshan)," said Saha.

# US Consul General calls on Mizoram CM

**AIZAWL, Sept 26:** US Consul General in Kolkata, Kathy Giles, called on Mizoram Chief Minister Lalduhoma on Friday and discussed investment opportunities in the northeastern state, an official said.

Diaz informed Lalduhoma that her country is ready to extend help if there is any area in which US-based companies can do investment, he said.

In response, Lalduhoma thanked Diaz for her willingness to help Mizoram and informed her that foreign funding projects are being executed with the permission of the Centre, the official said.

The chief minister said that a good relationship between Mizoram and the US is necessary, as the number of Mizos willing to visit the US has been increasing after many people from the Mizo community have settled in the US.

Diaz also met leaders of the Central Young Mizo Association (CYMA) on Friday and had a fruitful discussion, according to CYMA general secretary Mal-sawmliana. (PTI)

# Zoologists to assess rodent outbreak in Mizoram



**AIZAWL, Sept 26:** Teams of Zoologists from Pachhunga University College (PUC) in Aizawl will study and assess the current outbreak of rodents, sources in PUC said.

Led by Prof Lalramliana, two teams from the Zoology department of PUC set out on Thursday to visit the affected villages, while one team set out on Friday, the sources said.

The teams will examine and find out the species of the rodents and identify whether they are potential to spread scrub typhus, it said.

According to the findings of experts from PUC and researchers from other countries, rodents carry and spread several diseases and it was confirmed that scrub typhus is largely spread by rats or rodents in Mizoram.

Rodent attacks are currently reported in at least three Mizoram districts, affecting more than 800 jhum farmers. State agriculture department deputy director (Plant Protection) Lalrindiki said that the rodent infestation is linked to the flowering of a particular bamboo species called bambusa tulda (rawthing), locally known as 'Thingtam' famine, which occurs every 46 years and is due in 2025. The rodent infestation has been reported from 45 villages in Mamit district and two in Lunglei district and one in Saitual district, she said.

Lalrindiki said 800 jhum farmers, who mainly grow rice and soybeans, have been affected by the rodent attacks. Out of 2,500 hectares of land under jhum cultivation, about 158 hectares have so far been infested, she said.

Mamit district, which borders Tripura and Bangladesh, is the worst affected, with 769 farmers from 45 villages facing the attacks.

She said that the agriculture department supplied rodenticides or plant protection chemicals to farmers free of cost, and teams from the department have been dispatched to the affected villages to guide farmers and village council leaders on how to use them. Awareness on mass poisoning of rodents is being carried out, and the department is closely monitoring the situation, she said. 'Thingtam', which recurs in a 48-year cycle, last happened in the state in 1977. Mizoram reported the last rodent attack in 2022, during which at least nine districts were affected. Due to the flowering of Melocanna baccifera, Mizoram experienced a famine-like situation in 2007. However, no one died because of timely financial assistance from the Centre and massive preparation by the state government. (PTI)

# NMC has sanctioned proposal for 50 new MBBS seats in AGMC

**AGARTALA, Sept 26:** Tripura Chief Minister Manik Saha on Friday said the National Medical Council has almost sanctioned a proposal to introduce 50 more MBBS seats in the Agartala Govt Medical College (AGMC).

Currently, the AGMC has 150 MBBS seats and 115 postgraduate seats in different disciplines. While speaking at a programme, the CM said, "We have approached the National Medical Council (NMC) for the introduction of 50 more MBBS seats in AGMC and the proposal has been almost sanctioned", he said. # Dog bite cases in Meghalaya alarming

**SHILLONG, Sept 26:** Meghalaya reports a staggering 19,000 dog-bite cases annually, with East Khasi Hills accounting for over 5,000 cases and 15 fatalities already this year. Alarmingly, most deaths occur due to the casual approach towards bites or scratches.

This was revealed during a function to observe the World Rabies Day organized by the District Joint Steering Committee for Rabies Elimination, East Khasi Hills, in collaboration with the Health and Veterinary Departments, Shillong Municipal Board, NGOs, and community leaders at Lumparing Sports Club Indoor Hall on Friday.

The event was held under the theme "Act now: You,

me and the community", emphasizing the importance of collective action in preventing rabies.

Addressing the function as chief guest, Minister in-charge Animal Husbandry & Veterinary, Sanbor Shulal urged citizens to vaccinate pets, promptly manage dog-bite wounds, and support stray dog control, emphasizing that rabies is 100% preventable but fatal if neglected. PK Sangma, Additional Deputy Commissioner, East Khasi Hills, highlighted the urgent need for community action to prevent rabies, while Dr RR Marak, District Nodal Officer, NRCP, shared alarming statistics on dog-bite cases and fatalities in Meghalaya. 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# Mizoram to introduce common exam for class 9 students from new academic session

**AIZAWL, Sept 26:** Mizoram Education Minister Dr. Vanlalhlana on Friday said the government will introduce a common exam for class 9 students from the next academic session to improve the education system. Vanlalhlana visited some state-run schools in the state's Mamit district, which share borders with Tripura and Bangladesh.

Addressing teachers and students while visiting the schools, the minister said the Mizoram Board of School Education (MBSE)

will introduce common examinations in class 9 from the new academic session. He said the purpose of the move was to academically prepare students for national-level entrance exams such as JEE and NEET, while also motivating teachers to enhance their efforts. The minister added that the State Council of Educational Research and Training (SCERT) will introduce the Standardized Assessment for Elementary Schools (SAES). (PTI)

# Elaborate security arrangements in place for peaceful Durga Puja celebrations in Tripura: DGP

**AGARTALA, Sept 26:** Tripura Director General of Police (DGP) Anurag Dhankar on Friday said elaborate security arrangements are in place across the state to ensure peaceful Durga puja celebrations.

Durga Puja, the biggest festival in the northeastern state, starts from September 28.

"Altogether 7,750 security personnel will be deployed during the festivities," Dhankar told reporters at a press conference here. In state capital Agartala, there are over 250 pujas.

Dhankar said as part of fool-proof security, police will install 320 CCTV cameras at the strategic locations in addition to the existing cameras.

Puja organisers were also exhorted to install CCTV cameras for crowd management and identify suspicious movement of anti-social elements, if any, he said.

Dhankar said as many as 241 assistance booths will be set up in important locations to assist devotees.

"We are expecting people from rural areas to visit Agartala to join the festivities using trains. Therefore, we will deploy security personnel at railway stations", he said.

According to Dhankar, police will strictly enforce noise pollution during the festival season.

"Puja organisers will be allowed to use play music under the permissible limits", he said. (PTI)

# JICA team visits Kohima to explore research collaboration

**DIMAPUR, Sept 26:** A delegation of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) India office, led by its country head Takuro Takeuchi and representative Saya Ishikawa, visited Kohima to explore research collaboration between the Nagaland Institute of Medical Sciences & Research (NIMSAR) and Japanese universities, an official statement said on Friday.

JICA is supporting the establishment of a 400-bed Medical College Hospital at NIMSAR through official development assistance, aimed at strengthening tertiary healthcare services and enhancing medical education in Nagaland.

The JICA delegation visited Naga Hospital Authority Kohima, Seikhazou urban primary health centre and NIMSAR Kohima and held meetings with Nagaland chief secretary Sentiyanger Imchen and officials at the directorate of health & family welfare.



The discussions focused on the state's research priorities, including stomach cancer, toxicology, elderly care management, infertility, and medicinal plant and biohazard studies, as well as potential faculty and student exchanges.

It was informed that the state will identify the scope and priority areas where such collaboration can take

place, based on Nagaland's requirements, so that these can be taken up in subsequent meetings.

State health officials proposed that such collaborations could extend beyond the health sector, to which the JICA delegation said a follow-up visit may take place in January 2026 to advance these initiatives.

# THERE'S A SPACE FOR ALL KINDS OF FILMS: VARUN DHAWAN ON BO CLASH BETWEEN 'SUNNY SANSKARI' AND 'KANTARA'

## Neeraj Ghaywan told us we cannot take these characters for granted: Ishaan Khatter on 'Homebound'



**MUMBAI, Sept 26:** Actor Ishaan Khatter says "Homebound" cast was tasked with a challenge by director Neeraj Ghaywan: to live his character rather than simply recite his lines, and this set them on an immersive and introspective journey.

The film, directed by Neeraj Ghaywan, explores the friendship of two young men, Chandan (Vishal Jethwa) and Shoaib (Khatter), in North India, whose shared dream of joining the police force is challenged by societal prejudice based on their caste and religion. "But Neeraj made it very clear to me and everybody who worked on this film that we cannot take it for granted... He said these characters will not come to you; you need to walk those miles and bridge the gap. So, his first request to us was, 'You can perform this with craft, you can do a brilliant, impressive performance, but I want you to go beyond that. I want you to try and live these characters,'" the actor told PTI recalling his conversation with the director.

Khatter, best known for "Beyond the Clouds", "Dhadak", and "Pippa", said working with a director like Ghaywan was something that he desired at this point in his career.

"Very few directors push you that way. I started with a director like that, Majid Majidi, and I immediately knew that Neeraj was going to be a very big

gift for me and he was."

"Homebound", which released in theatres on Friday, is inspired by journalist Basharat Peer's The New York Times article "Taking Amrit Home", also titled (A Friendship, a Pandemic and a Death Beside the Highway).

The actor said he instantly connected with Shoaib's character in the film.

"I could feel the simmering anger, his intelligence and understanding of the situation, his deep love for his country and sense of belonging," he said. According to Khatter, the film explores the many layers of privilege and patriarchy, which he believes people will relate to.

"There are so many layers of privileges that you become acutely aware of when you watch this film. Neeraj is a very keen observer of life and society. There are some beautiful scenes in the film that show you the layers and the levels of social capital and standing.

"Even when you think that people will be under the same community, household even, there are still layers of privileges. For example, with Chandan's character, the privilege of just being a son in a patriarchal world, even though they come from the same household."

Khatter said his director told them early on that the only way to portray such layered roles was to live the characters. (PTI)

## Anupam Kher on SRK's first National Award win: Recognition of mainstream cinema

**MUMBAI, Sept 26:** Cinema veteran Anupam Kher said he was elated to see superstar Shah Rukh Khan win his first National Film Award for best actor, calling the honour long overdue and a recognition for mainstream cinema. At the 71st National Film Awards ceremony held on Wednesday, President Droupadi Murmu presented the award to SRK for his performance in the 2023 blockbuster "Jawan". maker Vidhu Vinod Chopra's "12th Fail". "I am very happy for him, and personally happy that he finally got it after 40 years. You can imagine his disappointment — for 'Swades', he 100 per cent should have got the National Award.

"So many other performances, like 'Dilwale Dulhania Le Jayenge', went unrecognised. Each time he must have felt upset. So I am really glad he has finally received it," Kher said.

Kher has worked with Shah Rukh on multiple films, including "Dilwale Dulhania Le Jayenge", "Kuch Kuch Hota Hai", "Mohabbatein", "Veere-Zaara" and "Paheli". The actor said he also called Malayalam superstar Mohanlal to congratulate him on being honoured with Dadasaheb Phalke Award. "I called him up and said, 'Mohanlal, you are the youngest recipient of Dadasaheb Phalke award.' He said, 'yes'. And it is amazing," he said. (PTI)

# Diljit Dosanjh, Imtiaz Ali hail International Emmy nods for 'Amar Singh Chamkila'

**NEW DELHI, Sept 26:** Filmmaker Imtiaz Ali and actor-musician Diljit Dosanjh have expressed joy over the two International Emmy nominations for their film "Amar Singh Chamkila", calling it a recognition of Punjab and its artists.

The Netflix film, based on the life and times of slain Punjabi musician Amar Singh Chamkila, is nominated in the TV Movie/Mini-Series category. Dosanjh has earned a nod in the Best Performance by an Actor category.

The International Academy of Television Arts & Sciences announced the nominations in New York on Thursday night, with the film emerging as the lone Indian entry.

"'Amar Singh Chamkila' is a rare film because it has to do with the

scent of the land of Punjab- its music, its socio-politics, its conflict, its aspirations, and its many problems.

At the 53rd International Emmy Awards gala, scheduled to be held in New York City on November 24, the film will vie for the TV Movie/Mini-Series award alongside "Herrhausen: The Banker and the Bomb" (Germany), "Lost Boys & Fairies" (United Kingdom) and "Vencer o Morir" (Chile).

Ali, 54, congratulated the film's team, especially lead star Dosanjh, saying the film could not have been made without him.

"I would like to congratulate the team for these nominations, and I would like to congratulate Diljit Dosanjh twice over because he's also nominated in the Best Actor category in the Emmy Awards for this film... Not for a moment on the shoot was he not Chamkila. It was a wonderful grassroots kind of experience shooting in Punjab for 'Amar Singh Chamkila'," he added.

Dosanjh, who has been widely praised for his portrayal of Chamkila, who was gunned down at the age of 27 in 1988 along with his wife Amarjot, said the honour was a tribute to the late musician's legacy.

"I feel truly honoured Amar Singh Chamkila, an artist from Punjab, is being recognized and talked about at a global level on such a prestigious stage like the International Emmys. I am grateful to Imtiaz Ali sir for choosing me for the role," the 41-year-old said.

In the best actor category, Dosanjh will be competing against David Mitchell for "Ludwig" (United Kingdom), Oriol Pla for "Yo, adicto" (Spain), and Diego Vasquez for "One Hundred Years of Solitude" (Colombia).

The film, produced by Mohit Choudhary, Select Media Holdings LLP, Saregama and Window Seat Films, also starred Parineeti Chopra. It featured music by A R Rahman with lyrics by Irshad Kamil. (PTI)



# India eyes best ever show in biggest World Para Athletics Championships

**NEW DELHI, Sept 26:** Some of the globe's best para athletes, including blade runners, prosthetic jumpers and wheelchair-bound competitors, will showcase their awe-inspiring grit and resilience on the sporting field when the biggest ever World Para Athletics Championships begins here on Saturday.

India, a rising power in para sports, including para athletics, has rolled out top-class facilities for the 12th edition of the showpiece, which will run till October 5 at the iconic Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium.

With 2200 athletes and officials from 104 countries participating in the nine-day showpiece, the New Delhi edition is the biggest in history, with India joining Qatar (2015), UAE (2019) and Japan (2024) as the fourth nation to host the prestigious event.

The para athletes, numbering over 1500, will compete across 186 medal events, 15 more than the 2024 edition in Kobe, Japan.

The championships promise top-class performances as over 100 medalists who altogether won 308



medals in Paris Paralympics, including 112 gold, 96 silver, and 100 bronze, are set to test their mettle on the grandest para athletics stage.

There will be 101 events for men, 84 for women, and one mixed in the championship. World Para Athletics President Paul Fitzgerald said new world records will be made and new champions will be crowned, and praised India for providing top-class facilities for the event.

"This edition will be the largest single event para championships in history and credit to India for hosting this," he said.

"Spectators inside the stadium and a global audience around the world will experience the brilliance of the athletes competing in newly renovated facilities designed to maximise their skill, speed and strength." The centre-piece of the event is the Mondo track laid at the competition venue as well as the warm-up area, considered to be the first instance of the high performance surface at both the arenas.

The track, which is made of two-layered vulcanized rubber, has been

widely lauded for its uniform elasticity, shock absorption, and anti-slip qualities, that enhance the performance of athletes and reduce the risk of injury. The warm-up area has also been fitted with LED floodlights so that the athletes can also do practice after sunset or early in the morning.

Top-class fitness centre has also been built beside the warm-up area for the use of athletes before competition. A number of world's best para athletes will vie for the top honours and among them will be 'Blade Jumper' Markus Rehm of Germany, wheelchair racer Catherine Debrunner of Switzerland and fastest para sprinter Petrucio Ferreira of Brazil. Rehm, a four-time Paralympic champion and seven-time world champion in the men's long jump T64, holds a world record that surpasses every Olympic gold medal jump this century. Debrunner, who made headlines with five gold and a silver across six events in the 2024 Paris Paralympics, will compete in five races in New Delhi. (PTI)

*The way cricketers push themselves inspired me: Bolt*



**MUMBAI, Sept 26:** Legendary sprinter Usain Bolt says cricket was his inspiration to excel on the track after watching talented cricketers push themselves and give their all on the field.

Bolt, whose name is synonymous with speed and world records, ended his career with eight Olympic gold and 11 World Championships top-podium finishes, something never achieved by any track and field athlete.

"For me, I was a huge cricket fan growing up. So, I watched cricket growing up. Watching all the talent of the cricketers growing up and the way they worked and the way they pushed themselves and the way they carried themselves was something that inspired me at a young age to work hard and to be the best that I could be," said the Jamaican in a "Fireside chat" at the Jamnabai Narsee Campus here on Friday.

Jamaica has produced several legendary cricketers like Michael Holding, Courtney Walsh, Chris Gayle and Jeff Dujon, and they might have had an impact on Bolt.

Asked what would be the three words that describe his road to greatness, Bolt, who holds the 100m world record of 9.58 seconds, said it was all about hard work for him.

"For me, it's as simple as hard work, you know what I mean? It takes a lot of hard work and dedication to the sport. I love track and field, so it's something that I loved growing up and I worked very hard on."

"... and it was a tough road because it's never easy to get to the top, but I really wanted to be the best in the world, so I pushed myself through injuries and doubts and tough times to be one of the best in the world, so it's just dedication," said the 39-year-old Jamaican, who dabbled in a bit of football post retirement in 2017.

Most elite athletes, including Indian javelin star Neeraj Chopra, have said that defending an Olympic gold is tougher than winning it for the first time and Bolt agreed.

"Oh, I think defending. I think it's easier to actually win, but when you're being chased, it's actually harder. So, I think defending the second gold was harder." (PTI)

*Muddappa set to open 2025 Drag Racing Nationals at MIC*

**CHENNAI, Sept 26:** Bengaluru's Hemanth Muddappa, the undisputed "Drag King" of Indian motorsport, will launch his 2025 campaign at the Madras International Circuit as the MMSC FMSCI Indian National Motorcycle Drag Racing Championship with a double-header here on Saturday.

The 15-time National champion, riding for Mantra Racing with tuner Sharan Pratap, will field his Hayabusa, BMW S1000RR, and Ninja across four premier classes -- unrestricted, 1051-1650cc, 851-1050cc, and 551-850cc.

Familiar rivals including Attaulla Baig, Mujahid Pasha, Aymaan Baig, and Hyderabad's Mohammed Riyaz are expected to provide him stiff opposition.

Muddappa enters the season on the back of a high-profile international triumph. In April, he outpaced 13-time world champion Ricky Gadson of the USA at The Valley Run 2025, clocking 9.477 seconds on his BMW S1000RR -- the fastest time of the event.

Last year, despite racing through injury, the 34-year-old showcased metronomic consistency of 2024 by adding three more National crowns to his tally, taking his championship haul to a record 15 titles.

That performance cemented his status as the most decorated drag racer in the country.

"Every season starts afresh. The challenge is to keep pushing the limits with precision," Muddappa said after beginning practice at MIC on Friday. (PTI)

**BENGALURU, Sept 26:** India skipper Harmanpreet Kaur knows that fans have placed heaps of expectations on her side ahead of the upcoming ICC Women's ODI World Cup at home, and she wants to enjoy the moment without succumbing to the pressure to land a maiden title. India will start their campaign in the tournament with a match against Sri Lanka on September 30 at Guwahati.

"I think leading your country is always a very special moment for any player, but leading your country in ODI World Cup is even more special, and on top of that, it is a home World Cup, so it's even more special," Harmanpreet said during a captains' press meet organised by the ICC. "I mean, it's unbelievable because, you know, when I started playing I never even thought I would get the opportunity to lead my country, it was only in a dream."

"The ODI World Cup is happening after 12 years (at home), and I think it is going to be very amazing for all of us. It's all about enjoying this moment and not taking too much pressure," she added. India will come up against arch-rivals Pakistan at Colombo on October 5, but Harmanpreet wanted to focus on cricket rather than worrying about the political connotations of the match. The recent Indo-

Pak contests in the ongoing Asia Cup at the UAE saw some heated moments when some players engaged in over-the-top celebrations and verbal altercations. "Well, we can only control one thing which is playing cricket on the field and we are not thinking of other things. Because as cricketers, we can only control the things we have in our hand. But in other parts, I have zero control and I don't even take those things into my mind."

"We don't even discuss those things in the dressing room. We are only here to play cricket and our focus is only on cricket," she said. Talking about pressure, Australian captain Alyssa Healy will have a rich legacy to live up to. Defending champions Australia have seven trophies in their cabinet, and is that record a millstone around her neck?

"I don't think it's quite in Australian culture to get too complacent about things at any point in time. And I don't think it gets any easier. I think India in their home conditions are going to be really, really tough to beat. "I think this ODI World Cup is going to be one of the strongest ones that I have been a part of. As a skipper, I'm really looking forward to that challenge of going out there and competing against some of the best teams in the world," said Healy. (PTI)

## Teenager Jonathan steals limelight with gold, Rashmika claims Silver

**NEW DELHI, Sept 26:** India's 16-year-old Jonathan Gavin Antony stole the limelight on day two of the ISSF Junior World here by winning the men's 10m air pistol title with a flawless performance.

The young Indian, who had topped qualification with 586-19x, carried his form into the finals, shooting 21 of 24 shots in the 10s to secure gold with a commanding margin of 8.5 points.

Italy's Luca Arrighi took silver with 236.3 (572-21x), while Spain's Lucas Sanchez Tome claimed bronze on 215.1 (573-11x).

The final also witnessed the tournament's first shoot-off, where Iran's Hosein Gohari edged out Italy's Gabriele Aldo Villani for sixth place, after both were tied on 156.8. The Iranian went on to finish fifth with 174.8 (572-12x).

Individual Neutral Athlete Vladislav Makarov (194.3) and Igor Tupitsyn (134.9) finished fourth and seventh respectively. India's Chirag Sharma, who had



entered the finals second with 578-15x, finished eighth with 115.6.

In the junior women's 10m air pistol final, Individual Neutral Athlete Evelina Shiena delivered a composed performance, leading from start to finish to secure gold with 240.9.

India's Rashmika Sahgal, who had qualified fifth with 573-17x, battled hard but fell short, taking silver with 236.1, 4.8 points behind Evelina.

Iran's Fatemah Shekari, who had qualified eighth with 567-14x, rose to the occasion to secure bronze with 213.8.

Among the other Indian finalists, Vanshika Chaudhary, who had topped qualification with 576-17x, finished fifth after 18 shots with 174.2, while Mohini Singh, the second-best qualifier with 576-12x, was placed sixth with 153.2.

The skeet competition also began with qualification rounds

on day two. Asian Championship silver medalist Harnehar Singh Lally led the men's field with an impressive 74 hits out of 75.

He was closely followed by Cyprus's Andreas Pontikis, Finland's Lassi Akseli Matias, and Italy's Marco Coco, all with 73 hits.

India's Jyotiraditya Singh Sisodiya and Atul Singh, along with Czechia's Alex Petrask, are in the chasing pack with 72 hits each.

In the junior women's skeet, reigning Asian champion Mansi Raghuvanshi topped first qualification with 71 hits from 75 targets. She was followed by USA's Chloe Chaleunsinh with 69 and Italy's world championship silver medalist Arianna Nember with 68.

Individual Neutral Athletes Varvara Zaitseva and Kseniia Shuliak, along with India's Agrima Kanwar, are tied on 67. Olympian Raiza Dhillon is seventh with 65, alongside Yashasvi Rathore, also on 65. (PTI)

## Ryder Cup will start with a bang: Bryson DeChambeau in the opening group with fiery Jon Rahm

**FARMINGDALE (USA), Sept 26:** U.S. captain Keegan Bradley is making sure fans get their money's worth at the Ryder Cup.

It's been 12 years from the time Bethpage Black was announced as the host of this Ryder Cup, two years since Europe celebrated victory in Rome and four days of anticipation that has been building even on a rain-soaked course Thursday. And then Bradley announced Bryson DeChambeau would be smashing away in the opening foursomes session with emotionally charged Justin Thomas. They face Tyrrell Hatton and Jon Rahm, the fiery Spaniard who has never lost in this format. "They're a formidable force," DeChambeau said. "But we want to send a message."

Soon after the four matches were

announced, DeChambeau headed to the range and began blasting drives to simulate the 389-yard opening hole, slightly downhill that turns hard to the right over trees, reachable by those who can fly their drive some 365 yards in the air. "That's nothing, right?" DeChambeau said. In his last Ryder Cup, at Whistling Straits in 2021, he drove the green on the first hole and walked 364 yards to the green carrying his putter. European captain Luke Donald has 11 players back from his winning team in Rome. He considers this a new team for a new challenge — Europe hasn't won on the road in 12 years — and he mixed up a few of his pairings.

Rory McIlroy and Tommy Fleetwood are together again. They won both foursomes matches in Rome.

But he split up Viktor Hovland and Ludvig Aberg, both with new partners. Bradley said he had DeChambeau and Thomas in mind for a while. DeChambeau hasn't played foursomes in the Ryder Cup since 2018 — he lost matches while paired with Tiger Woods and Phil Mickelson in France — and the alternate-shot format requires a measure of conservative play so as not to give away the hole.

DeChambeau is not one to play it safe. He is an entertainer as much as an elite golfer, and Bradley expects him to hit driver off the first tee. "We want him to do what he does, and he got up there today and hammered one right in front of the green," Bradley said. "Bryson thrives under this sort of atmosphere. I can see him walking out

there just relishing the moment and relishing the chance to get up there and hit that shot."

Thomas brings so much emotion to these matches that in an informal poll in 2023, most Europeans said he would be the one player who gets under their skin.

Europe countered by sending out the same team that put the first blue point on the board for Europe at Marco Simone. And neither Rahm nor Hatton lack emotion.

"We are facing two fantastic, very accomplished players. It will not be easy," Rahm said. "They are both players that like to get the crowd going. It will be a very energetic match. But I wouldn't say Tyrrell and I are short of energy ourselves. So I think it's going to be a lot of fun for both teams." (AP)

## Bryson DeChambeau, a man of the people, brings his show to Ryder Cup with some bickering to boot

**FARMINGDALE (USA), Sept 26:** There's one YouTube video of Bryson DeChambeau riding in a golf cart with Adam Sandler — Happy Gilmore, himself — trying to break 50 in a two-man scramble. (They didn't.)

There's another of DeChambeau lofting wedge shots over his house trying to make a hole-in-one on a green in his backyard. (He did, finally.) These videos, part of a steady stream of content delivered to a subscriber base of 2.35 million and growing, might best explain why DeChambeau stands out, even in a field filled with golf's very best at this week's Ryder Cup.

DeChambeau's return to the Ryder Cup marks the latest step in his remarkable evolution from overly analytic, flat cap-wearing know-it-all into golf's man of the people.

It's a journey not even his much-derided and debated departure

from the PGA Tour to LIV Golf could derail.

"I couldn't be more excited for the opportunity to hopefully get them riled up," DeChambeau said Thursday of the fans he'll attract at Bethpage Black, which traditionally brings in one of the loudest galleries in golf.

Examples of the energy DeChambeau brings to this event have been evident on the first tee box through the practice rounds.

On Tuesday, he teed up ball after ball and let er rip, seeing how close he could get to the green on the downhill, dogleg-right, 397-yard par-4. On Thursday, he entered the arena-like setting — surrounded by thousands of grandstand seats — stomping his feet and clapping in time to "We Will Rock You" blaring over the loudspeakers, then timing his drive to the start of the sports anthem's guitar solo.

Growing popularity comes with

detractors, and a small feud with McIlroyEven with his newfound popularity, DeChambeau is not beloved by everyone, which, in a way, draws even more eyeballs to him on the rare occasions when he steps onto golf's biggest stages.

Ratings for the LIV Tour have been anemic, meaning most people see DeChambeau four times a year — at the majors. They get a rare fifth look this year.

Those majors are DeChambeau's only chance to earn Ryder Cup ranking points. His string of good finishes — one win, two runner-ups and three more top-10s over the past two years — gave him enough to earn an automatic spot on this year's team.

"Making this team was a passion project of mine," he said.

Earlier this week, Golf Channel's Brandel Chamblee, never a fan of LIV, said DeChambeau needs to maximize the opportuni-

ties because he "plays most of his golf on a tour where he could mostly be in the witness protection program."

"Nobody watches, he doesn't get any attention," Chamblee said. "So when he does come out, there's a bit of a circus-barker element to it to drum up some interest for himself."

DeChambeau's response: the numbers — specifically his 2.35 million YouTube subscribers — don't lie. But was he upset with the comment?

"I think any time that people can throw stuff at me like that, I enjoy it. I appreciate it," he said. "I think it's good for ultimately the game of golf because it starts to spur conversation on."

DeChambeau is less dependent on growing a following strictly through playing tournament golf. He gears his content toward a younger audience. (AP)



### 2026 World Cup mascots include bald eagle Clutch, jaguar Zayu and moose Maple

NEW YORK, Sept 26: Next year's World Cup will have three mascots, a bald eagle Clutch in the U.S., a jaguar Zayu in Mexico and a moose Maple in Canada. FIFA made its announcement Thursday in a news release, less than nine months before the June 11 opener of the tournament, the first World Cup to be played in three nations.

For the 1994 World Cup in the U.S., organizers revealed a dog named Striker as the mascot during a news conference in October 1992 at Hollywood's Mann Chinese Theater. A name-the-mascot campaign included more than 25,000 entries.

Past World Cup mascots also included a lion Willie (England 1966), a boy Juanito (Mexico 1970), two boys Tip and Tap (West Germany 1974), a boy Gauchito (Argentina 1978), an orange Naranjito (Spain 1982), a jalapeño pepper Pique (Mexico 1986), a stick figure Ciao (Italy 1990), a cockerel Footix (France 1998), futuristic creatures Ato, Kaz and Nik (Japan and South Korea 2002), a lion Goleo VI and a soccer ball Pille (Germany 2006), a leopard Zakumi (South Africa 2010), an armadillo Fuleco (Brazil 2014), a wolf Zabivaka (Russia 2018) and a floating keffiyeh La'eeb (Qatar 2022). ## Rahul, Sudharsan slam centuries as India A beat Australia A by 5 wickets to seal series



LUCKNOW, Sept 26: KL Rahul and B Sai Sudharsan struck sublime hundreds as India A registered a stunning five-wicket win over Australia A while hunting down a target of 413 to seal the two-match unofficial Test series 1-0 here on Friday.

It was the sixth highest successful run chase in the country's first-class history, and Rahul's form

(176 not out, 210 balls, 16x4, 4x6) is an ominous sign for the West Indians ahead of the two-match Test series, starting next month.

The highest chase remains in the name of West Zone when they overhauled South Zone's target of 536 in the 2010 Duleep Trophy final.

Starting the fourth and final day from their overnight 169 for two,

India lost Manav Suthar at the total of 189.

But Sudharsan (100, 172 balls) and skipper Dhruv Jurel (56) added 78 runs for the fourth wicket to keep India A in the chase of a daunting 412.

Sudharsan fetched his eighth first-class hundred in 170 balls, vindicating his call-up for the upcoming home Tests against the

West Indies.

However, the 23-year-old was dismissed two balls after going past the landmark by Australia off-spinner Corey Rocchiccioli.

But it brought together Rahul and Jurel at the crease and the former pummelled the Aussie bowlers mercilessly in their stand of 115 runs for the fifth wicket.

Rahul, who had retired hurt on 74 on Thursday, brought up his 22nd first-class hundred in 136 balls, and the next 76 runs cascaded in a mere 74 balls as India A closed in on the target briskly.

It was a continuation of the fine form that Rahul displayed against England in the recent five-match Anderson-Tendulkar Trophy while amassing 532 runs at an average of 53.20 with two centuries.

Jurel departed with the team score at 382, but by then the home side was well within sight of a fantastic win, which was completed by Rahul and Nitish Kumar Reddy (16 not out) a few minutes before tea.

## Dropped catches and bad decisions cost Bangladesh, admits Simmons



DUBAI, Sept 26: Bangladesh head coach Phil Simmons blamed dropped catches and bad shot-selection for the team's defeat to Pakistan, which ended its hopes for an Asia Cup final berth.

Having Pakistan reeling at 51 for 5, Bangladesh let the game slip when they dropped Shaheen Shah Afridi and Mohammad Nawaz, both of whom went on to play crucial cameos here on Thursday.

Afridi struck two sixes in a 13-ball 19, while Nawaz's brisk 25 off 15 balls (two sixes, one four) lifted Pakistan to a fighting 135 for 8.

"When we dropped Shaheen and Nawaz, that's where the game changed," Simmons said at the post-match press conference.

"Before that, we were in control. Some of the catches maybe (had something to do with the lights) but I don't think the ones we dropped had anything to do with the lights," he said, referring to Dubai's famous "ring of fire" lighting system, under which fielders often struggle to sight the ball.

At the halfway mark, Bangladesh appeared well-placed to chase down the modest target, but their batters faltered with a string of poor shots.

"It was just bad decisions. All of the teams have that at some point. It was us today. We didn't make the best shot selections," Simmons

said bluntly.

The 62-year-old conceded that Bangladesh's lack of depth continues to hurt them when senior players like their captain Litton Das, who missed the last two games due to a side strain, are absent.

"We just chased 169 (against Sri Lanka) two games ago. We are not a team that can lose Tanzid (Hasan) and captain (Litton Das) in one game and just fill (the void) like that.

"We are getting to that stage, where we are not there yet. Losing the captain in such good form is a big thing for us.

"We chased 169 on the same wicket, where we made better batting decisions. Batting order doesn't say we batted well or badly. We made bad decisions today."

Despite historically struggling with strike rates compared to the top T20I sides, Simmons insisted the problem lay more in failure to build partnerships than power-hitting.

"The (strike-rate) gap will reduce the more we play at the international level, the guys will know what to do at this level," he said.

"I agree that our strike-rate isn't up there, but we are up there in six-hitting. I don't think it is about our ability to score quickly. We have to bat for longer and put on partnerships," he added. (PTI)

## Rauf, Farhan plead not guilty in ICC hearing but sanctions likely: Tournament sources

Rauf set to be fined for 'abusive language and aggressive gestures' during the game against India



DUBAI, Sept 26: Pakistan cricketers Haris Rauf and Sahibzada Farhan pleaded not guilty during their ICC hearing for allegedly provocative actions in the Asia Cup game against India here on Friday but sanctions are likely for some of their gestures, according to tournament sources.

It is learnt that Rauf is set to be fined for "abusive language and aggressive gestures" during the game against India on Sunday last.

Farhan, on the other hand, has pleaded not guilty to any code of conduct violation for his gun-fire celebration during the same match, claiming that it is a "traditional way of celebrating in his ethnic Pakhtun tribe" in Pakistan.

The hearing was conducted by match referee Richie Richardson and both the players appeared before him in person even though the responses given by them were in writing.

The two were accused of making provocative gestures by the BCCI in a formal complaint on Wednesday. The bitter neighbours are due to clash in the final of the regional showpiece on Sunday.

While Rauf had mocked the Indian fans in the stands by gestur-

ing about falling planes, Farhan's celebration after his half century in the game was also seen as offensive by the Indian side.

Pakistan too had filed a complaint against India captain Suryakumar Yadav for making political comments after he dedicated his team's win over the arch foes on September 14 to the victims of Pahalgam terror attack and the Indian Armed Forces.

Suryakumar pleaded not guilty to the charge but was apparently told not to make any statement that could be construed as political in the remainder of the tournament.

The ICC is yet to come out with an official statement on the matter.

Tensions between the two sides have been running high starting with India's refusal to do a traditional handshake with Pakistani players at the time of toss and after the games as a gesture of solidarity with the Pahalgam victims.

Twenty six people were killed in the attack that was carried out by Pakistan-backed terrorists in April.

In retaliation, India launched Operation Sindoor in May to destroy terror infrastructure in Pakistan. (PTI)

## Inaugural BFI Cup in Chennai from Oct 1

NEW DELHI, Sept 26: Aimed at providing upcoming boxers a pathway to the national camp, the Boxing Federation of India will conduct the inaugural BFI Cup in Chennai from October 1 to 7.

The competition, which is set to be conducted in 10 categories for both men and women, will provide the gold and silver-medallists entry to the elite national camp.

"Indian boxing is undoubtedly on the rise and the BFI is committed to an athlete centric approach that is already showing good results," said BFI president Ajay Singh in a media release.

"The BFI Cup is another step in that direction as it will provide many young boxers a chance to make their mark and come in national contention."

"Tournaments like the BFI Cup will provide the top

boxers an opportunity to test their preparation and also helps BFI identify fresh talent," he added.

State units or boards which finished inside top-eight in the 8th Elite nationals can send one boxer to the BFI Cup in each category along with the Sports Authority of India's (SAI) National Centre of Excellence (NCOE) in Rohtak, which regularly hosts the youth camps, and host Tamil Nadu.

Apart from this, participants from the last two Elite National Championships will also be allowed to compete, the federation said. Those who competed in the 2024 and 2025 Asian U-22 championships, medallists in any international meet since 2022, medallists from the Goa and Uttarakhand National Games, and medallists from the 6th Youth Nationals will also be eligible to participate. ### Gary Stead returns to NZC as high-performance coach

WELLINGTON, Sept 26: Former BlackCaps head coach Gary Stead has rejoined New Zealand Cricket (NZC) in a new role as high-performance coach, the board announced on Friday. According to an NZC statement, Stead's responsibilities will include "supporting player and coach development, as well as high-performance programmes." This appointment comes less than four months after Stead stepped down as head coach of the New Zealand men's team in June, following a highly successful tenure from 2018 to 2025.

During that period, he guided the team to three major finals in limited-overs cricket -- the 2019 ODI World Cup, the 2021 T20 World Cup, and the 2025 Champions Trophy. He also led New Zealand to victory in the inaugural World Test Championship final (2019-2021), defeating India.

"New Zealand cricket's very much been at my heart for the past 30 odd years and to be able to keep contributing to the game I love is really special," Stead said.

"I'm still passionate about coaching and trying to help people learn and improve. If I can pass on some of my skills and experiences to the wider cricket network and in turn help the BLACKCAPS and WHITE FERNS win on the world stage - that would be really satisfying," he added. (PTI)

## Barcelona called him 'a cornerstone of the finest Barça side of all time.' Busquets to retire at end of MLS season after extraordinary career with Barcelona and Spain

MIAMI, Sept 26: Former Barcelona and Spain midfielder Sergio Busquets is retiring from soccer at the end of his current season with Inter Miami, the Major League Soccer team said Friday.

The 37-year-old Busquets is widely regarded as one of the best defensive midfielders of his generation, forming a storied three-man midfield at Barcelona with Xavi Hernández and Andres Iniesta behind Lionel Messi.

Busquets debuted for Barcelona in 2008 under Pep Guardiola and went on to play 722 matches for the club -- putting him third all-time behind Xavi and Messi -- while winning nine Spanish league titles and the Champions League three times. What Busquets lacked in speed and scoring, he more than made up for in his tackling, precise passing and ability to provide balance to the team both in defense and going forward.

Barcelona called him "a cornerstone of the finest Barça side of all time." He played 143 games for Spain, winning the World Cup in 2010 and the European Championship in 2012. He was Spain's captain upon retiring from international competition in 2022.

In 2023, Busquets joined Inter Miami where he was reunited with



Messi and other former Barcelona teammates Luis Suárez and Jordi Alba. The team said Busquets has had an "extraordinary career" and is "one of the greatest midfielders in football history."

Former teammates -- and rivals -- praised him on social media.

"What a privilege it was to play with you all those years, brother," Iniesta wrote on Instagram. "Your way of playing was one of a kind,

and we will never forget it." Former Real Madrid defender Sergio Ramos, Busquets's club rival and his teammate with Spain, recalled their time shared on the field as well as Busquets' "modest and authentic character."

"(You were) a rival most of the time, other times my teammate, (but) you always stood out thanks to your class, vision, and talent," Ramos wrote on X. (AP)

## Pranavi leads Indian charge in France; Diksha, Avani trailing

DEAUVILLE (FRANCE), Sept 26: Pranavi Urs began the week with a round of one-under 70 and was the best-placed Indian golfer at tied 23rd in the Lacoste Ladies Open de France here.

It was a modest day for the other Indians as Diksha Dagar began the week with a card of one-over 72 to find herself tied 54th, while Avani Prashanth (73) was tied 70th and Tvesa Malik (74) was at tied 82nd.

Pranavi started on the front nine, which was uneventful. Her first birdie of the day came on the 10th, but she immediately dropped a shot on the 11th before gaining one with a birdie on the 12th. She parred the remaining holes.

Diksha started her round on the front nine and dropped shots on the fifth and seventh holes before picking up a stroke on the ninth. On the back nine she struck a birdie on the 12th but finished the day one-over due to a late bogey on the 17th hole. Avani's round included four bogeys and two birdies. Tvesa, on the hand, stumbled to four bogeys and managed one birdie on the first day.

Italian Alessia Nobilio started the week with a bogey-free round of six-under 65 to take the top spot. German Helen Briem finished the day at five-under 66 after making six birdies and one bogey. (PTI)

## Only result on Sept 28 will matter: Pakistan head coach Hesson on Asia Cup finale against India

DUBAI, Sept 26: They have endured comprehensive defeats against India on back-to-back Sundays in the ongoing Asia Cup but Pakistan head coach Mike Hesson believes that all that matters is the result on coming Sunday when the arch-rivals clash in an Asia Cup final for the first time in 41 years.

India beat Pakistan by seven wickets in a group league game and followed it up with another convincing victory by six wickets in the Super 4s stage.

"We know that we played on the 14th. We played on the 21st. But really, the only match that really counts is the one at the end. And that will be our focus. Trying to play our best game when it counts," Hesson replied to a query about his message to his players ahead of Sunday's final after they comfortably disposed off a meek challenge from Bangladesh by 11 runs here on Thursday.

India and Pakistan have never played the summit clash of the continental event since the inception of the event in 1984 when it used to be only played in Sharjah. Hesson said his side "deserved the opportunity" in this edition.

"So now it's up to us to make the most of it. And I think all the games that have happened up to this point now have been around trying to get yourself in a position to win the trophy. And that's what we've been talking about the whole time," he added.

After steadfastly denying the Indian media so far, Pakistan media manager Naem Gillani finally made an exception and allowed a question from the travelling group on Thursday.

"Look, my message is we just focus on the cricket and that's certainly what we'll be doing. Those things, you probably know more about than me," he answered

to a query as to how the team is reacting to the outside noise and the impending ICC hearings that his players Sahibzada Farhan and Haris Rauf face for provocative gestures during the games against India.

"I deal with the cricket side. In terms of gestures, look, there's always a bit of passion, in terms of when you're in high-pressure games."

"But we will be having our focus on playing a good game and focusing on the cricket, and that's part of my job."

Hesson also doesn't appreciate the notion that his men can't read spinners from the hand and countered this perception saying that one doesn't need to in order to be successful.

"I have heard a number of people say we are not picking the ball from the hand. And I've answered that question before. (PTI)
