Zubeen passes away in Singapore; Assam stunned

Himanta speaks to Indian envoy in Singapore to bring singer's body to Assam • Condolences pouring in
Youth icon suffers a seizure whilst swimming

GUWAHATI, Sept 19: Zubeen Garg, one of Assam's most iconic voices and heartthrob of youths of Assam passed away in Singapore on Friday.

Garg, 52, is survived by his wife. He had travelled to Singapore to attend the three-day North East Festival, which was due to begin on Friday.

In the afternoon, reports suggested that Garg had died in a scuba diving accident.

However, later in the evening his wife Garima Garg issued a statement clarifying that he suffered a seizure whilst swimming, which led to his sudden death.

Despite being rushed to Singapore General Hospital and admitted to intensive care, doc-

tors were unable to save him.

Meanwhile, Chief Organiser of the North East India Festival, Shyamkanu Mahanta said that Zubeen Garg had gone on a yacht trip with a few members of the local Assamese community when an accident occurred, which claimed his life in Singapore.

"We later learned that a few members of the local Assamese community had taken him on a yacht visit, of which we had no prior knowledge," Mahanta said.

A household name in Assam, Garg's career spanned more than three decades and crossed multiple languages. His

Assamese songs such as Anamika, Monor Nijanot, Maya, Asha and Majulir Ejoni Suwali became generational favourites, while his Bengali tracks and Hindi hits reached audiences far beyond the North East.

Assam lost 'one of its favourite sons': CM

'STILL TO SINK IN': Assam mourns singer Zubeen Garg's death

GUWAHATI, Sept 19: People across Assam poured onto the streets in shock, mourning the death of singer Zubeen Garg, the cultural icon whose music transcended generations.

From thronging his Guwahati residences to his college in his native town Jorhat, and his in-laws' house in Golaghat, people from different walks of life and age came together to mourn their beloved 'Zubeen da', as he was popularly called. Garg, 52, died in Singapore, where he had gone to attend the three-day North East Festival.

The festival organisers said Garg had gone on a yacht trip with a few members of the local Assamese community when an accident occurred, which claimed his life.

Hundreds of people gathered at Latalil Playground in Guwahati, where the All Assam Students' Union (AASU) organised a memorial.

"We never thought that we would have to organise such a meet. It is still to sink in. Today is among the saddest days for our state," AASU advisor Samujjal Kumar Bhattacharyya said.

Garg was a regular performer at the Rongali Bihu functions at the Latalil Playground.

Sharing their grief, many fans broke down in front of a large poster erected at the site as his music played in the background.

Music composer Manas Robin, who had a long association with Garg, said it was difficult to accept the news of his death. "He had gone to Singapore with the promise of returning. But only his body will come back now. It is difficult to accept, but one has to give in to destiny's decision," he said. (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)



Zubeen Garg: The Eternal voice of Assam

There are lives that feel larger than their times, voices that refuse to be confined by geography, and spirits that burn so brightly that they leave behind an afterglow long after they have passed. Zubeen Garg belonged to this rare category. He was not only the face of modern Assamese music but also one of India's most versatile cultural icons. A singer, songwriter, composer, actor, filmmaker, poet, philanthropist, and activist, he was a phenomenon who sang in over forty languages, mastered a dozen instruments, and held together the hopes, frustrations, and celebrations of an entire generation. On September 19, 2025, that voice fell silent in a freak accident in Singapore. He was just 52.

The irony is striking. A man who sang with breathless passion, who lent his voice to prayers, protests, and celebrations alike, died struggling for breath underwater while scuba diving. He had flown to Singapore to perform at the North East India Festival scheduled for September 20 and 21. Fate, however, had scripted another story. Rescued from the sea and rushed to Singapore General Hospital, he could not be revived despite all efforts. (Details in Page-4)

Immortal Strains: Zubeen's contributions to Assamese Soul

In the quiet hours of a fateful afternoon on September 19th, 2025, the heart of Assam stopped a little, beating dimmer in collective grief. Zubeen Garg, the voice that had serenaded generations through the misty valleys and vibrant festivals of the Northeast, slipped away at the age of 52 in a tragic scuba diving accident off the coast of Singapore. The news rippled through the region like a sudden monsoon storm, leaving fans, fellow artists, and an entire cultural landscape in collective mourning. Known as the heartthrob of Assam, Zubeen was more than a singer; he was the soul of Assamese music, a bridge between tradition and modernity, and a relentless champion of his people's spirit. His departure feels premature, as if the rivers of Assam, which inspired so many of his melodies, have lost their most eloquent storyteller. Yet, in the wake of this profound loss, it is essential to celebrate the indelible mark he left on Assamese songs, a legacy woven with over 40,000 recordings that continue to echo in homes, fields, and hearts across the world.

Born Zubeen Borthakur on November 18, 1972, in the verdant town of Jorhat, Assam, to Mohini Mohan Borthakur, a poet and lyricist who penned under the pseudonym Kapil Thakur, and Ily Borthakur, a graceful dancer and singer, Zubeen's early life was steeped in the rhythms of creativity. The family, rooted in the Brahmin traditions of Janji in Sivasagar, moved frequently due to his father's role as a magistrate, exposing young Zubeen to the diverse sounds of Assam's landscapes from the Brahmaputra's gentle flow to the lively beats of rural fairs. Fans, friends appeal to bring Zubeen Garg's mortal remains to Jorhat

JORHAT, Sept 19: A wave of grief and disbelief swept through Jorhat on Friday following the sudden demise of legendary singer Zubeen Garg, widely regarded as the city's cultural icon.

Thousands of fans, friends and well-wishers have made a heartfelt appeal to the government and the singer's family

to bring his mortal remains to his hometown, giving the people of Jorhat a chance to pay their last respects.

Soon after the news of his passing spread, residents, especially youth, took to the streets at key locations such as Baruah Chariali and Garali.

They paid floral tributes, lit candles and incense sticks, and held photographs

of the beloved singer in candlelight processions.

Many participants were visibly emotional, struggling to come to terms with the sudden loss of an artist whose music had touched millions.

The city's shopkeepers and businesses closed early in a mark of respect, reflecting the deep bond between Zubeen and his hometown.

Fans recalled his early days in Jorhat, from cycling across the countryside to his unconventional college routine, and how the city shaped his musical journey.

Zubeen Garg's 50th birthday was celebrated in Jorhat on November 18, 2022, with grand fan club events that included a massive cake-cutting ceremony and an evening performance by the singer at the JDSA Ground, attended by thousands of admirers.

Many fans said they were eager for a similar opportunity to bid farewell to the artist who had become a symbol of Assamese music. As the city mourns, supporters continue to urge authorities and the family to (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

'Heartbeat of a generation': Northeast leaders mourn singer Zubeen Garg's death

GUWAHATI/ ITANAGAR/ IMPHAL, Sept 19: Leaders across the Northeast on Friday mourned the death of singing sensation Zubeen Garg, describing him as a generational talent whose voice defined an era.

Garg, who hailed from Assam, was injured while scuba diving in Singapore. He was rushed to a hospital, where he died.

In Assam, all political parties suspended their campaign for the Bodoland Territorial Council election, which will be held on Monday.

Garg (52), best known for the Bollywood number 'Ya Ali' from Imran Hashmi-Kangna Ranaut starrer 'Gangster' (2006), was in Singapore to attend the North East Festival.

Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said, "I am in a loss of words to describe what Zubeen meant for Assam. He has gone too early, this was not an age to go. Zubeen's voice had an unmatched ability to energise people and his music spoke directly to our minds and souls. He has left a void that will never be filled," he posted on X.

"Our future generations will remember him as a stalwart of Assam's culture, and his works will inspire many more talented artists in the days and years to come. Beyond his music, his connection with people and passion for helping them will always be remembered. I will greatly cherish all my interactions with him. That magical voice has forever gone silent. Tragically beyond words!" he added.

Congress Deputy Leader in Lok Sabha, Gaurav Gogoi, said Garg's music touched millions, capturing the spirit of Assam and giving voice to the emotions of the people. (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

Kharge, Rahul mourn 'Voice of Assam' Zubeen Garg's death in Singapore

NEW DELHI, Sept 19: Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge and former party chief Rahul Gandhi on Friday expressed shock and grief at the demise of acclaimed singer Zubeen Garg in an accident in Singapore, and said his music defined a generation and carved a special place in the hearts of millions.

A popular singer from Assam best known for his song 'Ya Ali' from the film 'Gangster', Garg died while scuba diving in Singapore on Friday, organisers of a festival in the Southeast Asian country said. Garg, 52, is survived by his wife.

Kharge expressed shock at the untimely demise of the well-known singer, songwriter, and someone who carved a special place in the hearts of millions of music lovers.

"Celebrated as the 'Voice of Assam', he enchanted people with his voice in several Indian languages and attained the status of a 'cultural icon' at a very young age.

"In this hour of grief, I express my deepest condolences to his family, friends, and countless fans," Kharge said in a post on X. Gandhi described the passing of Garg as a terrible tragedy.

"His voice defined a generation, and his talent was truly unmatched. He overcame personal tragedies to reshape the landscape of Assamese music. His perseverance and courage have left an enduring mark. He will live on in our hearts and minds forever," Gandhi said.

In a post on X, the Congress said, "We are deeply saddened by the untimely demise of phenomenal singer and composer, Zubeen Garg."

Zubeen Garg: Assam's musical icon who gave voice to varied genres of songs

GUWAHATI, Sept 19: Strumming the guitar and belting out one song after another in his inimitable style, Assam's Zubeen Garg had mesmerized youth and elders alike for nearly three decades with his songs and films, which had a universal appeal.

Singer, music composer, film director, and actor Zubeen is credited with singing in over 40 languages and dialects. Still, it was the song 'Ya Ali' from the movie Gangster that brought him fame across the country and earned him the best playback singer at the Global Indian Film Awards (GIFA) in 2006.

The 52-year-old singer, who began singing from the age of three, was an icon for several generations of children and youth who grew up singing or humming his songs.

Be it popular Assamese or western, folk or classical-based songs, Garg gave voice to varied genres of music and excelled in all, with most later-year singers emulating his style of music and singing.

Garg was also never shy of expressing his views on political and social issues.

A large number of Zubeen Garg fan clubs have been set up over the years in every nook and cranny of Assam.

Garg began his professional music career with his debut Assamese album 'Anamika', which was released in November 1992 and still remains on the popularity charts.

His first recorded songs were "Tumi Junu Pariba Hun" and "Tumi Junaki Hubakh" for the album 'Ritu' in 1993.

Garg released many other albums, such as 'Xapunor Xur', 'Junaki Mon', 'Maya' and 'Asha'.

His first album of Bihu songs 'Ujan Pirit' was released before he moved to Mumbai in



1995, which went on to become a resounding commercial success.

The Bollywood music industry beckoned him in the mid-1990s, where he debuted with his first Indipop solo album 'Chandni Raat'. Later, he recorded a few Hindi albums and also sang for films like 'Gaddaar', 'Dil Se', 'Doli Saja Ke Rakhna', 'Fiza', 'Kaante' and 'Zindagi'.

Garg was, however, soon disenchanted with Bollywood, returning to Assam to climb the height of popularity with his numerous songs and he went to compose music for 38 Assamese, four Bengali and three Hindi films.

Zubeen also acted in 27 Assamese films including 'Tumi Mur Mathu Mur', 'Dinabandhu', 'Mon Jai', 'Ramdhenu', 'Kanchanjunga', 'Mission China', 'Dr Bezbarua 2', 'Tumi Ahibane', 'The Underworld' and 'Wide Angle'.

The singer also directed three Assamese films, 'Tumi Mur Mathu Mur', 'Kanchanjunga' and 'Mission China' and acted in the Assamese television serial 'Anuradha' in 2011. (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

Bohag Bihu functions in April in Assam would draw youth late at night to Zubeen's concert more than the venue could accommodate. The chanting of the name "Zubeen", "Zubeen" would welcome the maestro just before he was about to begin. The chanting would soon turn into cries dedicated to his name. CEA Nageswaran flags 'critical trade-offs' in energy transition

KOLKATA, Sept 19: Chief Economic Advisor (CEA) V Anantha Nageswaran on Friday cautioned that India's path to sustainability and climate goals must not undermine its economic aspirations, stressing the "very crucial and critical trade-offs" in energy transition, fiscal stability, and banking soundness.

Speaking at the Bengal Chamber AGM and Indo-Pacific Economic Conclave, he said India has been "a standout performance among the G20 countries in mitigation," but achieving sustainability goals requires acknowledging difficult choices.

"For a country aspiring to become a developed economy by 2047, energy transition and dealing with climate change must not consign not just India but also other developing countries in the Indo-Pacific and Africa to a state of permanent underdevelopment," he said.

Nageswaran pointed out that India's energy consumption will necessarily keep rising as our per capita incomes rise in the coming years.

He termed the carbon budget allotted to developing nations "arbitrary," saying it ignores the "overdrawn carbon budget by today's developed countries over the last 200 years."

The CEA argued that the Sus-



tainable Development Goals (SDG), framed before the Paris Agreement, should take precedence.

"It is appropriate that both temporarily and logically SDG goals take precedence over climate goals," he noted.

Highlighting fiscal vulnerabilities, he said governments in India currently collect revenues "to the tune of 7.5 lakh crore rupees" from petrol, diesel and coal cess, warning that "the quicker we try to phase out fossil fuels there will be an erosion of tax resources available to our governments."

Nageswaran cautioned that retiring thermal power plants could create stranded assets and have

implications on the soundness of the banking system, triggering a chain reaction of undercapitalised banks.

"It is appealing to say development and energy transition are not mutually exclusive. History tells us there are times when they are mutually exclusive and we need to make choices both in terms of sequence and in terms of priorities," he added.

On policy prescriptions, the CEA said developed nations must share finance, technology and innovation, treating technology as "public commons for the world to benefit from."

He urged India to expand beyond solar and wind to hydro and

nuclear, and pointed out that the Union Budget 2025 announced opening up of nuclear energy for private participation, along with amendments to the civil nuclear liabilities act to enable foreign collaboration.

With the US and European mitigation adoption trends, the global climate goal of limiting warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels is becoming increasingly remote, he said, noting that the target "will be more and more distant and will recede in terms of the world's ability to achieve that goal."

Nageswaran, in this situation, underscored the importance of climate adaptation, calling it a "more practical, realistic and viable goal in comparison to emission mitigation," and suggested measures like seawalls, coastal restrictions, and improving energy efficiency.

He also highlighted the need to strengthen public transport, resolve "last mile connectivity" gaps, and promote a circular economy by reviving traditional practices such as rainwater harvesting and temple tanks.

"India cannot afford the high per capita vehicle ownership and electricity-intensive living standards of the West," he stressed, adding that citizen participation and investment in public goods are essential to sustainable living. (PTI)

India's forex reserves jump USD 4.698 bn to USD 702.966 bn

MUMBAI, Sept 19: India's forex reserves jumped USD 4.698 billion to USD 702.966 billion for the week ended September 12, the Reserve Bank of India said on Friday.

In the previous reporting week, the overall reserves had increased USD 4.038 billion to USD 698.268 billion.

The overall reserves had jumped USD 3.51 billion to USD 694.23 billion.

For the week ended September 5, foreign currency assets, a major component of the reserves, increased USD 2.537 billion to USD 587.014 billion, the data released on Friday showed.

Expressed in dollar terms, the foreign currency assets include the effect of appreciation or depreciation of non-US units like the euro, pound and yen held in the foreign exchange reserves.

The gold reserves increased USD 2.12 billion to USD 92.419 billion during the week, the RBI said. The Special Drawing Rights (SDRs) were up by USD 32 million to USD 18.773 billion, the apex bank said. India's reserve position with the IMF was up by USD 9 million to USD 4.76 billion in the reporting week, the apex bank data showed. (PTI)

ITC chief for business models which focus on people, planet



KOLKATA, Sept 19: ITC Ltd chairman and managing director Sanjiv Puri on Friday said that there is a need to create business models that put people and the planet at the centre, as enterprises have a social role to play.

Speaking at an event of the Merchants' Chamber of Commerce and Industry (MCCI) here, Puri said that the "challenges are daunting because we are living in a very different world".

"There is a need to reimagine how we do business in future with a focus on innovation, sustainability, resilience and skilling. And we need to create business models that put people and the planet at the centre," he said.

Puri said circularity is a trend that is picking up. Regenerative business models would come in, and that is an opportunity because things will be created from scratch, he said.

"Digitisation and digital transition in the services economy is a reality, and India has a big advantage. Also, resilience in the supply chain is important," Puri said.

Investments in innovation and R&D are equally required, he said, adding that this is an area that India lacks. (PTI)

Adani Group valuation surges ₹ 69,000 cr in a day after SEBI clears Hindenburg allegations

NEW DELHI, Sept 19: Adani Group companies gained over Rs 69,000 crore in market capitalisation in a single session on Friday, fueled by a buying frenzy following SEBI's clean chit in the Hindenburg case.

The regulator's order, which dismissed allegations of stock manipulation and related-party misuse, ignited a surge of investor confidence, sending Adani stocks sharply higher across the board.

Leading the charge, Adani Power surged 12.40 per cent, emerging as the top gainer across the group's listed entities. Adani Total Gas jumped 7.35 per cent, while Adani Green Energy and Adani Enterprises climbed 5.33 per cent and 5.04 per cent, respectively, according to stock exchange data.

Adani Energy Solutions rose 4.70 per cent, rounding out the list of companies that saw gains above the 4.5 per cent mark.

Adding to the momentum, Morgan Stanley initiated coverage on Adani Power, marking the first recommendation in more than a decade by the research house.

The move is being read as a signal that confidence is returning not just among retail investors but also across global institutional stakeholders, who had largely stayed on the sidelines since the Hindenburg-triggered crash.

The rally came just a day after SEBI concluded its investigation, stating that it found no evidence to sup-

port the accusations raised by US-based short seller Hindenburg Research in early 2023.

Those allegations had erased nearly USD 150 billion in market value across Adani Group stocks at their peak, sparking a global debate on governance, transparency, and political influence.

The clean chit, therefore, is being seen as a watershed moment for the conglomerate and a major relief for investors who had been waiting for regulatory clarity before taking fresh positions.

Adani Group companies dominated the top gainers list on the exchanges, and the trading volumes in these counters reflected heightened investor activity.

The surge was particularly notable in energy-related stocks, but the impact was broad-based across the group, from its flagship incubator company to its media arm.

Adani Power hit its 52-week high during the day. The stock of Sanghi Industries advanced 1.41 per cent, ACC rose 1.21 per cent, Adani Ports went up by 1.09 per cent, and Ambuja Cements inched up 0.28 per cent.

The combined market valuation of all these firms stood at ₹ 13.96 lakh crore.

"Adani group stocks surged after Sebi cleared the group in the Hindenburg probe, triggering renewed investor confidence and strong buying interest across the conglomerate," according to Bajaj Broking Research. (PTI)

Apple mania sweeps Delhi, Mumbai, Bengaluru as iPhone 17 hits stores

NEW DELHI, Sept 19: Apple's latest flagship, the iPhone 17, launched on Friday to an unprecedented frenzy, saw eager customers lining up for hours - even camping overnight for up to 21 hours - outside Apple stores across major cities.

The massive anticipation was palpable as fans in Mumbai, Delhi, and Bengaluru formed long, serpentine queues, determined to be among the first to get their hands on the new devices.

The scene was a vibrant showcase of Apple fandom, highlighting the brand's enduring appeal and the excitement surrounding its latest offering in India.

Retailers reported record-breaking foot traffic on opening day, with early buyers sharing stories of camaraderie and determination in the long lines.

At the Apple Store in Delhi's Saket Citywalk Mall, as also in Mumbai and Bengaluru, people lined up well before store opening hours, underscoring strong demand fuelled by enthusiastic young buyers and the brand's premium appeal.

"I was in the queue since morning, and I am excited to buy the iPhone of this colour," said Ashraf from Sangam Vihar, Delhi, who could not hide his excitement as he clutched his newly-purchased cosmic orange device.

In Bengaluru, the newly-opened Apple Hebbal store at Mall of Asia witnessed heavy footfall as excited shoppers lined up early to purchase the newly launched iPhone 17 lineup along with the latest Apple Watch and AirPods.

One of the customers, Mohammad Suhail, who purchased an iPhone 17 said it was "nice to have a store in Bengaluru."

Apple had launched the retail store in Bengaluru, on September 2, in a grand opening that marked

its debut in South India.

Mumbai saw a similar frenzy outside Apple's Jio World Drive mall at Bandra Kurla Complex business district. A little before 6 am, a scuffle broke out among some of the customers assembled, prompting the security personnel to intervene.

Once the store opened at the designated time of 8 am, it was a smooth flow with customers going in and quickly picking up units of their desired model.

"Every year, I stand in line from 3 am to buy the newest model. I have been very excited about the model and had been waiting for it for the past six months," said Aman Memon, among the first customers, who bought three units for himself and family.

Memon said the colour features of the new phone, along with a newer bionic chip is a big draw for him.

While there is no official word from Apple yet on record turnout, analysts say Apple's growth in India is being fuelled by its strong brand appeal and wider adoption of EMI schemes among young buyers.

Apple unveiled the iPhone 17 series in the price range of Rs 82,900 to Rs 2,29,900, which became available in India starting Friday for customers who have pre-booked the device.

In the US, the iPhone 17 series is priced between USD 799 (about Rs 70,370) and USD 1,999 (Rs 1.76 lakh) apiece.

Tarun Pathak, Research Director at Counterpoint Research, highlighted the aspirational appeal of the Apple brand and its strong momentum in India, marked by double-digit growth. He noted that the increasing adoption of EMI schemes has eased affordability challenges for young buyers, further fuelling demand.

"So the aspirational strength of this particular brand remains. Apple has a very strong momentum in India, growing in double digits. The young, aspirational user base is growing... And now, what is happening is almost three out of five iPhones in India are being sold on EMIs, which actually reduces the purchase barrier and behaviour for lot of these young audience who wish to buy an iPhone," Pathak added.

Taiwanese electronics giant Foxconn is the biggest producer of iPhones, with manufacturing facilities located in China and India. All iPhones produced in India are shipped to meet the requirements of the US market.

The company recently commenced production of the iPhone 17 series at its second-largest manufacturing unit based in Bengaluru, operating under informal restrictions imposed by China.

According to multiple sources, Apple plans to increase iPhone production to 60 million units this year, from about 35-40 million units in 2024-25.

Apple assembled 60 per cent more iPhones, worth an estimated USD 22 billion, in India in the year ended March 31, 2025.

An analysis by S&P Global said that iPhone sales in the US were 75.9 million units in 2024, suggesting a need to double shipments either through new capacity or redirecting shipments bound for the domestic market.

On Thursday, IT Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw while speaking at a pre-event conference for the AI Impact Summit 2026 had said: "Practically all the models of Apple iPhone are now manufactured in India. And most of the advanced countries will be getting the Apple iPhone manufactured in India, that is a good progress we have made." (PTI)

Zubeen passes away in Singapore

Union Minister of State for External Affairs, Pabitra Margherita. "It is very painful news and an immense loss to the state and the nation," Sarma said on the sidelines of a programme. Sarma said that beyond Garg's music, his connection with people and passion for helping them will always be remembered. "I will greatly cherish all my interactions with him. The chief minister, who was campaigning in the Bodoland Territorial Region (BTR) for the September 22 Bodoland Territorial Council (BTC) polls, said that the BJP will cancel all election-related events scheduled for the day. He said he has spoken to Indian High Commissioner to Singapore Shilpak Ambule to bring singer Zubeen Garg's body to the state.

The Indian high commission is in touch with Singaporean authorities, which will decide whether an autopsy is required, the CM told reporters on the sidelines of a programme here. "If an autopsy needs to be done, it is likely that Zubeen's mortal remains will reach Assam on Saturday evening," he said. "We are coordinating to ensure the return of Zubeen's mortal remains to Assam at the earliest. As soon as the process is formed up, I will share an update," he also posted on 'X'. News of his death has left fans and colleagues stunned.

Union Minister Sarbananda Sonowal described him as "the heartbeat of a generation", while Kiren Rijiju remembered him as "a magical voice and a versatile personality". Congress MP Gaurav Gogoi called him "the pride of every Assamese", saying his death was "an irreparable loss for the music world and a personal loss for every Assamese".

Assam Congress president and the party's deputy leader in the Lok Sabha, Gaurav Gogoi, mourned Garg's death and hailed him as a "pride of every Assamese". Describing Zubeen Garg as her "brother", West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee on Friday mourned the death of the popular singer.

"For decades, he stood as a cultural force, an artist whose songs will continue to inspire and unite. This untimely loss leaves a deep void in our musical and cultural life. Union Shipping Minister Sarbananda Sonowal said it was an irreparable loss for Assam, the nation, and the world of music.

Garg had dropped out of college to follow his music career but was awarded an honorary Doctor of Literature (D.Litt.) degree by the University of Science and Technology, Meghalaya in 2024. He was also a prolific writer and had three books of poetry to his credit. (PTI)

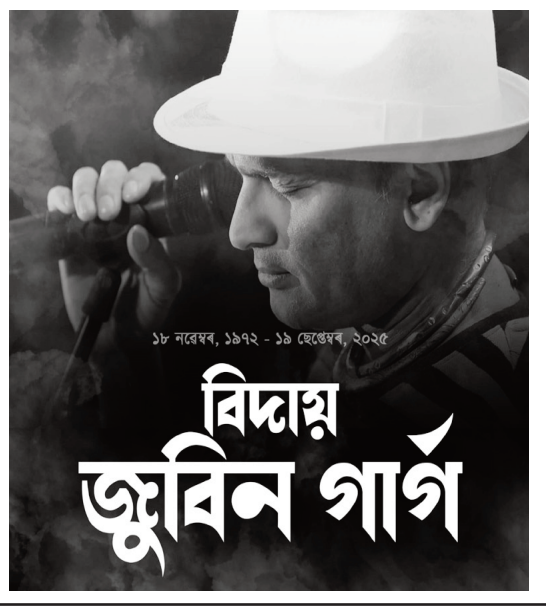

Activist alleges RTI delay by PWD Diphu over pending bills

HT Bureau DIPHU, Sept 19: Social activist Jeet Timung has questioned the Executive Engineer of the PWD Roads Division, Diphu, for failing to respond to an RTI application he submitted seeking details on pending contractor bills since 2018.

Addressing media persons at a press meet held at the District Press Club of Karbi Anglong on Friday, Timung stated that he had submitted an RTI application to the office of the Executive Engineer on March 20, 2025, to obtain information regarding the status of contractor bills that remain unpaid under the PWD Roads Division, Diphu.

Following the submission, the department asked Timung to deposit ₹ 1,000 for photocopying the relevant documents, which he paid on May 19, 2025. However, even after 177 days since the initial application, no information has been provided, despite the RTI Act, 2005 mandating a response within 30 days.

"Since 2018, many contractors under the PWD Roads Division, Diphu, have not received their payments. To know the facts, I filed an RTI application. After being asked, I paid the ₹ 1,000 fee, but the department has not furnished the information," Timung said. He added that he has filed a first appeal with the Secretary of the Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council (KAAC), PWD, and also submitted a complaint to the Principal Secretary, KAAC, on September 1, 2025.

Peter Tisso apprehended in connection with viral video involving Diphu MLA

HT Bureau DIPHU, Sept 19: Peter Tisso, a former district BJP worker from Karbi Anglong, was apprehended by police on the evening of September 18 from Jakhalabandha in Nagaon district. He was brought to Diphu Police Station and produced before the District Judicial Court today.

The arrest is linked to a viral video involving Diphu MLA Bidyasing Englung, which surfaced on Facebook a few weeks ago. The video allegedly

showed the MLA in compromising positions with a woman.

Four days ago, the woman seen in the video released a statement on Facebook, admitting her involvement and naming Peter Tisso and Augustin Kramsa as the individuals responsible for uploading and circulating the video. She also alleged that ₹ 30 lakhs were extorted from MLA Englung, out of which she received Rs. 2 lakhs, while the remaining amount was allegedly taken

by Tisso and his associate.

A case has been registered against Peter Tisso under Case No. 79/2025 at Diphu Police Station.

While being escorted to the District Judicial Court from Diphu Police Station this morning, Tisso told reporters, "They have committed an act and they are responsible. The allegations are false; I am not involved in any crime. There is a political conspiracy with plans to accuse me. I don't know any of these, as I am busy with other work."

Nepal's political trajectory

The commotion in Nepal has brought into sharp focus a generational shift in the country's politics, one that has made the term Gen Z part of the mainstream political vocabulary rather than just a casual reference to youth culture in India and elsewhere in the subcontinent. The unexpected rise of Sushila Karki, who has emerged as a symbol of both promise and risk, marks a generational rupture with the established order that has traditionally shaped Nepal's political trajectory. For India, the choice of someone like Karki—who has expressed a favourable disposition towards New Delhi and Prime Minister Narendra Modi—is reassuring in the short term, but it does not eliminate the structural uncertainties that have long characterised Nepalese politics. The enthusiasm of the youth has given a fresh dimension to politics in Kathmandu, but the lack of historical depth and the inexperience of this generation raise important questions about stability in the long run. The Gen Z generation, both in Nepal and across the region, comes equipped with certain undeniable strengths. They are digitally savvy, globally connected, and brimming with ideas about political reform, economic modernisation, and social inclusivity. Their ability to mobilise public opinion rapidly, leveraging social media and digital networks, has already transformed the political culture of Nepal. This youth-led wave is not merely about idealism; it has a clear sense of urgency in addressing unemployment, corruption, and governance inefficiencies that have plagued Nepal for decades.

Yet, as much as this generational momentum excites the masses, it lacks the accumulated experience, historical grounding, and nuanced understanding of geopolitical balances that come only with long years of political practice. Without this maturity, there is always the danger that leadership may falter when tested by the intricate challenges of governance in a country as politically volatile and strategically positioned as Nepal. For India, however, the rise of Sushila Karki offers immediate comfort. New Delhi has often been confronted with leaders in Kathmandu who vacillate between India and China, leveraging their position to extract short-term gains from both sides. In contrast, Karki's outlook suggests a more stable alignment with Indian interests, at least in the initial phases of her leadership. Modi's government would understandably welcome a cooperative regime in Kathmandu that understands the depth of India's stakes in Nepal. Yet, Indian policymakers are well aware that goodwill in the present does not necessarily translate into stability in the future, especially given the fragility of Nepal's political institutions and the volatility of coalition politics.

The structural importance of Nepal to India cannot be overstated. Beyond cultural ties and the open border that allows free movement of people, there are deep economic interdependencies. Indian investments have been pivotal in driving Nepal's industrial and service sectors, creating jobs and contributing to state revenues.

Zubeen Garg: The Eternal voice of Assam

By 2:30 pm India time, the singer who had given the world "Ya Ali" and countless Assamese gems was no more. The news spread like wildfire, leaving Assam, and indeed India, in stunned disbelief.

Born on November 18, 1972, in Tura, Meghalaya, Zubeen's life always carried the fragrance of destiny. His parents, Mohini Mohon Borthakur, a magistrate and poet known by the pen name Kapil Thakur, and Ily Borthakur, a singer, named him after the great conductor Zubin Mehta. Music was thus inscribed in his very name. From the time he was three, he was already singing under the guidance of his mother. His training was rigorous: eleven years of tabla under Pandit Robin Banerjee, exposure to Assamese folk under Guru Ramani Rai, and self-driven explorations into instruments as diverse as guitar, harmonium, mandolin, and percussion. This foundation gave him the ability to inhabit any genre with ease.

His childhood, however, was not untouched by tragedy. His sister, Jongki Borthakur, a budding singer and actress, died in a car accident in 2002. Zubeen immortalized her memory through his poignant album Xixhu. His other sister, Dr. Palme Borthakur, remained an anchor in his turbulent journey.

Education could not hold him long. After matriculation from Tamulpur Higher Secondary School, he joined B. Borooah College in Guwahati to pursue science but soon abandoned academics to immerse himself fully in music. His gamble paid off. In 1992, his Assamese album Anamika became a breakthrough, making him a household name in Assam. Follow-ups like Xapunor Xur (1992), Junaki Mon (1993), Maya (1994), and Asha (1995) solidified his place. His Bihu album Ujan Piriti was a commercial triumph, and by the mid-1990s he had become Assam's highest-paid singer.

Yet Zubeen was never content with regional boundaries. In 1995 he moved to Mumbai, determined to carve out a space in the highly competitive world of Hindi music. His debut Indipop album Chandni Raat opened the door. Soon came others — Chanda (1996), Shradhaanjali (1996-97), Jalwa (1998), Yubi Kabhi (1998), Jadoo (1999), and Sparsh (2000). He sang for Bollywood films including Gaddaar (1995), Dil Se (1998), Doli Saja Ke Rakhna (1998), Fiza (2000), and Kaante (2002). His versatility was evident, but the definitive moment came in 2006 when Anurag Basu's Gangster featured his song "Ya Ali." That one track changed everything. Melancholic yet transcendent, "Ya Ali" swept across the subcontinent and beyond. It won him the Global Indian Film Award for Best Playback Singer and made him a household name across India. The song still plays at weddings, protests, and quiet evenings, reminding listeners of the raw intensity of his voice. He would go on to contribute to Bollywood with tracks like "Dil Tu Hi Bataa" from Krrish 3 and "Jaane Kya Chahe Man" from Pyaar Ke Side Effects, proving his ability to adapt to mainstream tastes without losing individuality.

Even as Bollywood embraced him, Zubeen never forgot Assam. He became the heartbeat of Assamese cinema, acting in films such as Hiya Diya Niya (2000), Daag (2001), Kanyadaan (2002), Agnishakshi (2003), Mon Jai (2008), Rodor Sithi (2014), Mission China (2017), Kanchanja (2019), Ratnaker (2019), Dr. Bezbaruah 2 (2023), Sikar (2024), and many more. He was not just an actor but often the director, producer, and scriptwriter. Mission China, his ambitious 2017 project, became a landmark in Assamese cinema, showing that regional films could command blockbuster budgets and audiences.

His Bengali career too was luminous. He sang in films

like Sudhu Tumi (2004), Mon Niye (2010), and Samsara (2019). His ability to sing in languages as varied as Boro, Karbi, Tiwa, Mising, Nepali, Malayalam, Tamil, Telugu, Marathi, Sindhi, and Sanskrit gave him a pan-Indian identity. In every language, his songs carried an unmistakable emotional resonance. Yet, Zubeen was more than a performer. He was a social conscience. He founded the Kalaguru Artiste Foundation, which raised money for flood relief, provided medicines, and supported cultural initiatives. During the COVID-19 crisis in 2021, he offered his own house in Guwahati to be converted into a COVID Care Centre. He played football matches to raise funds and used films like Kanchanja to expose corruption in the Assam Public Service Commission recruitment scandal.

He was also unafraid of controversy. A declared irreligious man, he often challenged orthodoxy. In one incident, he snapped his sacred Brahmin thread during a film and later declared that "these Brahmins should be killed," a remark that forced him to apologize but never diluted his contrarian reputation. In another moment, he said that Krishna was not God but a man, a statement that earned him a ban from Majuli District Satra Mahasabha. Despite such storms, he remained an outspoken voice, most powerfully during the anti-CAA protests in Assam, where he emerged as the leading cultural figure on the streets, his songs becoming rallying cries for protesters.

Recognition was plentiful. In 2011, the Assam Convention in Chicago honored him as Guest Artist of the Year. In May 2024, the University of Science and Technology, Meghalaya awarded him an honorary Doctor of Literature (D.Litt.). He published poetry collections like Xabda Anubhuti (2009) and Zubeenor Podoyo (2018, 2020 edition), earning the Seuji-Seuji award in 2017. Villagers named a bamboo bridge after him in Tengapani, and in 2022 a 20-foot statue of him was unveiled in Digboi during the Nazirating Tamuli Tourism Festival. In his personal life, Zubeen found stability with Garima Saikia, a fashion designer from Golaghat, Assam, whom he married in 2002. The couple often appeared together at cultural events, representing a partnership of creativity and quiet strength.

The news of his death in Singapore sent shockwaves across the region. Assam's Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma wrote, "Today Assam lost one of its favourite sons. Zubeen's voice had an unmatched ability to energize people and his music spoke directly to our minds and souls. He has left a void that will never be filled." Former Rajya Sabha MP Ripu Bora mourned him as "our cultural icon," while actor Adil Hussain wrote a heart-rending tribute, calling him "extraordinary" and promising that "he will live amongst us through his songs."

For Assam, the grief was not only for a man but for an era. Zubeen had been their morning radio, their late-night companion, their Bihu celebrations, their political rallies, their wedding songs, their heartbreak laments, their cinema, their poetry, their conscience. His concerts, always electric, brought together thousands not only for the music but for the shared identity he represented.

To speak of Zubeen Garg is to speak of Assam itself — its resilience, its contradictions, its joys, and its heartbreaks. His life was proof that art can cross languages, religions, and politics. His death is proof that such voices, once gone, leave a silence too deep to fill. Yet, Zubeen's story will not end in silence. His albums, his films, his poetry, and his activism have already entered collective memory. His is a voice eternal, echoing in the forests, rivers, cities, and hearts of Assam and beyond.

Immortal Strains: Zubeen's contributions to assamese soul

Named after the legendary composer Zubin Mehta, he adopted the surname Garg from his gotra, a choice that symbolized his aspiration to transcend personal boundaries and embrace a universal artistic identity. From his mother's knee, he absorbed the nuances of Assamese folk tunes, her voice a soft lilt that taught him the power of melody to heal and unite. His younger sister, Jonki Borthakur, shared this passion, blossoming into a talented singer and actress before her untimely death in a 2002 car accident near Tezpur, an event that scarred Zubeen deeply and infused his music with a poignant undercurrent of loss. Another sister, Palme, pursued Bharatnatyam, further enriching the family's artistic tapestry. These familial threads, fragile yet resilient, became the loom on which Zubeen would weave his contributions to Assamese music.

Zubeen's formal education at Tamulpur Higher Secondary School and later at B. Borooah College in Guwahati was brief; a Bachelor of Science degree gave way to the irresistible pull of music. By his school days, he was already composing, scribbling lyrics on paper or hush like a dewdrop on a japi leaf, carried these innovations to every corner. He recorded more than 800 songs annually at his peak, once laying down 36 tracks in a single night, a feat that spoke to his tireless dedication. By the time of his passing, his discography boasted over 40,000 songs across 40 languages, but it was the Assamese ones, numbering in the thousands, that formed the bedrock of his legacy. They weren't just hits; they were lifelines, soundtracking weddings, protests, and quiet evenings under the stars. Xixu, born from the grief of Jonki's passing, trans-

formed personal tragedy into communal catharsis, with songs that mourned yet mended, reminding Assamese listeners that music could be a salve for the soul. These albums, numbering over 40 in Assamese alone, were not mere commercial ventures; they were cultural artifacts, preserving dialects, idioms, and emotions that might otherwise fade in the shadow of Hindi dominance.

What set Zubeen apart was his innate ability to blend genres, a skill honed by his mastery of over a dozen instruments, from the traditional dotara and dhol to the mandolin, keyboard, and percussion sets. His work on Ekhor Nedekha Nodir Xhipare (2012) blended ambient river sounds with acoustic strums, creating the raw poetry of spoken word set to rhythm, and Rang painted life's vivid hues through folk-inflected pop. Dilruba leaned into Sufi mysticism, its qawwali-esque tracks a bold experiment that resonated deeply in a state where spirituality often intertwined with song. Not all were lighthearted; Pakhi, dedicated to his late mother, was a tearful elegy of maternal love, its tender verses like whispers from the wind-swept paddies. Xixu, born from the grief of Jonki's passing, trans-

formed personal tragedy into communal catharsis, with songs that mourned yet mended, reminding Assamese listeners that music could be a salve for the soul. These albums, numbering over 40 in Assamese alone, were not mere commercial ventures; they were cultural artifacts, preserving dialects, idioms, and emotions that might otherwise fade in the shadow of Hindi dominance.

and featuring melodies that climbed charts nationwide. In these, his voice didn't just accompany scenes; it propelled them, turning ordinary dialogues into operatic highs. Tracks like those in Bhal Pabo Najanilu (2013) explored unrequited love with a vulnerability that resonated universally, while Ahetuk (2015) infused social commentary with rhythmic urgency. Zubeen's compositions democratized Assamese cinema music, making it accessible yet sophisticated, drawing younger audiences who might have otherwise turned to Bollywood. He collaborated with lyricists like his father and emerging poets, ensuring lyrics remained poetic anchors, rich with metaphors from Assam's bamboo groves and silk weaves. His film songs often premiered at Joonbeel Mela or Jonbil Mela, cultural hubs where music and community converged, reinforcing his role as a cultural custodian.

Beyond the studio and screen, Zubeen's contributions pulsed through live performances and social impact, where Assamese songs became tools for unity and change. His concerts, from the bustling streets of Guwahati to international stages like the Assam Convention in Chicago in 2011, were electric spectacles. He honored traditions by unveiling a 20-foot statue of himself in Digboi in 2022 during the Nazirating Tamuli Tourism Festival, a symbol of gratitude, and inaugurated the Zubeen Garg Bamboo Bridge over the Na Dihing River in 2020, blending infrastructure with inspiration. Philanthropy was his quiet melody; he championed AIDS awareness, brain cancer research, and mental health initiatives, often performing benefit shows where songs raised funds and spirits. His irreligious stance, declaring no caste or creed, made his music a secular sanctuary, appealing to Assam's diverse tapestry of tribes and faiths. He mentored young talents, though not without controversy, as whispers of personal struggles like alcoholism surfaced in later years, shadows that only humanized his genius. Yet, these did not dim his light; they added depth, much like the minor keys in his ballads.

Zubeen's reach transcended Assam, with forays into Bollywood via the iconic Ya Ali from Gangster (2006), which won him a Global Indian Film Award and introduced Northeast flavors to mainstream India. He sang in Bengali, Tamil, Telugu, and more, but always returned to Assamese roots, refusing to let Hindi overshadow his origins. This fidelity preserved linguistic pride amid globalization's tide. Albums like Shishu, dedicated to children, and his devotional works for Raamdhenu (2011) bridged generations, teaching the young the value of their heritage through catchy hooks and profound choruses.

As Assam mourns, Zubeen's songs endure, from the jubilant Bihu calls that herald spring to the sorrowful strains that console in grief. He didn't just contribute to Assamese music; he redefined it, turning a regional whisper into a national roar. In every note, he captured the essence of a people: resilient, romantic, and rhythmically alive. Though his voice has fallen silent, the echoes he left will sing on, an eternal tribute to the heartthrob who made Assam's songs the heartbeat of its soul. In his memory, let us hum along, for in doing so, we keep him forever young.

Nepal observes 10th Constitution Day, PM Karki calls for dialogue for finding solutions

KATHMANDU, Sept 19: Nepal Prime Minister Sushila Karki on Friday said the protection and successful implementation of the Constitution adopted 10 years ago is the responsibility of all Nepalis, asserting that democracy is a system of dialogue and finding solutions.



movement” of the Nepali people, Karki said “its protection and successful implementation is the common responsibility of all Nepalis.”

The recent Gen Z movement was a result of the dissatisfaction and expectations of the younger generation, Karki explained and made it clear that her government is committed “to listening to and addressing the voices of the people, as democracy is a system of dialogue and finding solutions.”

Karki, 73, became prime minister on September 12, ending days of political uncertainty after the ouster of Prime Minister K P Sharma Oli following youth-led Gen Z protests against his government over corruption and a ban on social media.

The main celebrations were held at Tundikhel Open Ground here. Besides President Ramchandra Paudel, who was the chief guest, and Prime Minister Sushila Karki, the function was attended by Chief Justice Prakash Man Singh Raut, Speaker Devraj Ghimire, National Assembly Chairman Narayan Prasad Dahal and other dignitaries.

President Paudel said the present Constitution has integrated Nepali society having ethnic, lingual, religious, cultural and geographical diversities into the broader national unity by ending all forms of discrimination and oppression resulting from centralised state systems.

He also called on all Nepalis to stay united to realise the aspirations of sustainable peace, good governance, development and

prosperity through the federal democratic republic systems.

“The Constitution has set a broader goal to create an egalitarian society based on social justice and socialism-oriented economy,” he pointed out. Separately, a group of Gen Z members too organised a rally at Maitighar Mandala, the same place where the protests had gathered on September 8 and 9, and vowed to safeguard the achievements made by the Gen Z movement. The two main political parties, the Communist Party of Nepal-United Marxist Leninist (CPN-UML) and the Communist Party of Nepal-Maoist Centre also organised separate programmes at their respective party head offices in Kathmandu. While former Prime Minister Pushpakamal Dahal ‘Prachanda’ addressed the programme at the Maoist Centre party’s central office, deposed Prime Minister Oli was absent during his party’s programme. Later in the afternoon, President Paudel hosted a special function at the President’s Office, which was attended by Prime Minister Karki, ministers and other dignitaries. (PTI)

Antifa, short for “anti-fascist,” is an umbrella term for loosely affiliated far-left activists and groups that resist fascism, fascists and neo-Nazis, especially at demonstrations.

It resembles more an ideology than an organisation, though some have embraced militant tactics. Orban, a right-wing populist and strong Trump ally, said in comments to state radio on Friday that he was “pleased” by Trump’s announcement that he plans to designate Antifa as a “major terrorist organisation” in the United States.

“Antifa is indeed a terrorist organisation,” Orban said. “In Hungary, too, the time has come for us to classify organisations such as Antifa as terrorist organisations, following the American model.”

It was unclear what prompted Orban’s decision to make the move.

Antifascist groups rarely engage in political actions in Hungary, where Orban and his party have held near-total power for more than 15 years.

Yet in his statements on Friday, Orban referenced a 2023 incident in which Antifascist activists engaged in assaults against several suspected participants in an annual far-right event in Budapest.

One of the alleged assailants, Italian Antifascist activist Ilaria Salis, was jailed in Hungary for over a year following the assaults, resulting in a diplomatic dispute between Rome and Budapest over her treatment in detention.

Salis was released to house arrest in May 2024 before winning a seat in the European Parliament, as a result of which she gained legal immunity.

Hungary continues to demand that she be returned to face trial, where prosecutors have sought an 11-year sentence. (AP)

Thailand’s king endorses new Cabinet led by Prime Minister Anutin Charnvirakul



BANGKOK, Sept 19: Thailand’s king endorsed on Friday a new Cabinet headed by Prime Minister Anutin Charnvirakul after a court order removed his predecessor due to ethics violations and public outrage over a deadly border dispute between the Southeast Asian country and its neighbour, Cambodia.

The Cabinet, which includes several non-politicians, is expected to take office next week after taking an oath in front of King Maha Vajiralongkorn.

Anutin, head of the Bhumjaithai Party, was elected premier by Parliament last month. He succeeded Pheu Thai Party’s Paetongtarn Shinawatra, who was dismissed after being found guilty of ethics violations over a politically compromising phone call with neighbouring Cambodia’s Senate President Hun Sen.

The call was followed by a border clash between Thailand and Cambodia in July, which killed dozens.

Most of Anutin’s Cabinet positions went to members from his party and two other parties, Klatham and the military-backed Phalang Pracharath, which make up the main part of his minority coalition government.

Many of the newly appointed ministers, including Anutin himself, had served in the Pheu

Thai-led Cabinet after the 2023 general elections.

The Pheu Thai Party holds no position in the current Cabinet. It had previously said it would become an opposition party.

Anutin will serve as both prime minister and interior minister. He held the latter position under Paetongtarn’s government.

Six members of the Cabinet hold the deputy prime minister jobs. One of them is Thamanat Prompao of the Klatham Party, an influential politician who was convicted and jailed in Australia in 1994 in connection with heroin smuggling.

He will also serve as the agriculture minister.

Several non-politicians nabbed ministerial positions, including Ekniti Nitithanprapas, a former Director-General of the Revenue Department, who has economics degree from the US, was appointed to both deputy prime minister and finance minister positions.

Suphaje Suthumpun, a former CEO of major Thai hotel business Dusit Thani, will serve as commerce minister.

Veteran diplomat Sihesak Phuanketkeow was appointed as foreign minister.

He had served in many posts in the foreign ministry, including as its permanent secretary, vice minister and spokesperson. He was also a former Permanent Representative of Thailand to the United Nations Office in Geneva, and was chosen as President of the UN Human Rights Council in 2010.

Anutin was able to secure the prime minister position after appealing to the People’s Party, the country’s main opposition party, by promising to dissolve Parliament within four months and organise a referendum to draft a new constitution by an elected constituent assembly.

The People’s Party runs on progressive platforms and has long sought changes to the constitution, imposed during a military government, saying they want to make it more democratic. (AP)

Entry of other Arab countries in Pak-Saudi defence pact not ruled out: Asif

ISLAMABAD, Sept 19: The entry of other Arab countries in the mutual defence deal between Pakistan and Saudi Arabia is not ruled out, Defence Minister Khawaja Asif has said, adding that “doors are not closed” for such developments.

Pakistan and Saudi Arabia on Wednesday signed a “strategic mutual defence” agreement, which declares that any attack on either country will be considered “an aggression against both”.

The deal was signed by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman during the Pakistani leader’s day-long visit to the Gulf Kingdom, according to a joint statement.

The deal comes days after an Israeli attack on the Hamas leadership in Qatar, a key US ally in the Gulf region.

Responding to a question whether more Arab nations could become part of the deal, Asif said: “I cannot prematurely answer this, but I will definitely say the doors are not closed.”

Asif, during an interview to Geo News on Tuesday, said he had always called for a similar arrangement like NATO since there was greater vulnerability for Pakistan.

“I think it is a fundamental right of the countries and people here, particularly the Muslim population, to together defend their region, countries and nations,” Asif said.

He said there was no clause in the deal that ruled out the entry of any other nation or that Pakistan could not sign a similar agreement with anyone else.

Asked whether Pakistan’s nuclear assets were also up for use under the agreement, Asif said: “What we have,

our capabilities, will absolutely be available under this pact.”

Asif said Pakistan had always offered its nuclear facilities for inspection and never committed any violation.

Questioned about whether any attack on one country would lead to the involvement of the other and vice versa, the minister said: “Yes, absolutely. There is no doubt in this.”

Asif further said it was not an “aggressive pact” but a defensive arrangement, similar to that of NATO.

He added that Pakistan had also been involved in training Saudi forces for quite a while and the recent development was only a formalised “extension” of all that.

“If there is aggression, whether against Saudi Arabia or Pakistan, we will jointly defend against it,” he said. He said Pakistan had always had a

large military and air force contingent present in Saudi for many decades.

“I think that (pre-existing) relationship has been more defined now and that understanding has been given the form of a defence agreement,” he said. Responding to the deal, External Affairs Ministry spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal has said India will study the implications of the move for its national security as well as for regional and global stability. Jaiswal said the “government remains committed to protecting India’s national interests and ensuring comprehensive national security in all domains”.

Questioned about whether the US was taken into confidence on the matter, Asif said he felt there was “no ground or justification” for any other third party to be involved in the development. (PTI)

World shares are mixed after Intel helped drive Wall Street to more records

MANILA, Sept 19: World shares were mixed on Friday, with most Asian stocks down and European indexes higher after Wall Street rose to more records.

In early European trading, Germany’s DAX rose 0.3 per cent to 23,736.30. The CAC 40 in Paris added nearly 0.9 per cent to 7,922.50 while Britain’s FTSE 100 edged up 0.1 per cent to 9,238.90 as investors assessed a slew of recent monetary policy decisions, including those by the Bank of Japan, the Federal Reserve and the Bank of England.

Futures for the S&P 500 slipped less than 0.1 per cent, while that for the Dow Jones Industrial Average was up less than 0.1 per cent.

Japan’s Nikkei 225 switched from gains to losses, closing nearly 0.6 per cent lower to 45,045.81, after the BOJ decided to keep its benchmark short-term interest rate unchanged at 0.5 per cent and announced plans to start selling its exchange-traded fund holdings and real-estate investment trusts. Data released Friday also showed the country’s annual inflation in August slowed to a 10-month low at 2.7 per cent, from 3.1 per cent the previous month.

In Chinese markets, Hong Kong’s Hang Seng index shed less than 0.1 per cent to 26,537.97 while the Shanghai Composite index edged down less than 0.1 per cent to 3,829.34. Investors are awaiting a phone call later Friday between US President Donald Trump and China’s President Xi Jinping on tariffs and finalising a deal to allow TikTok to keep operating in the United States.

Australia’s S&P/ASX 200 climbed 0.3 per cent to 8,773.50 after losses a day earlier, when data indicated the jobs market was showing signs of softness.

South Korea’s Kospi fell nearly 0.5 per cent to 3,445.24. India’s BSE Sensex edged down 0.4 per cent, trimming earlier gains. Taiwan’s TaieX dipped 0.7 per cent.

Wall Street rolled to more records Thursday as Nvidia and Intel led a rally for technology stocks on the announcement of their deal that includes a USD 5 billion investment.

The S&P 500 rose 0.5 per cent and is on track

for a third straight winning week. The Dow Jones Industrial Average added 124 points, or 0.3 per cent, and the Nasdaq composite climbed 0.9 per cent. All three set all-time highs.

Intel soared 22.8 per cent for its best day since 1987 after Nvidia said it would buy USD 5 billion of the chipmaker’s stock. It’s part of a collaboration where the pair will develop products for data centres and personal computers. Nvidia climbed 3.5 per cent and was by far the strongest force lifting the S&P 500 because it’s Wall Street’s most valuable company.

Encouraging reports on the economy sent Treasury yields climbing in the bond market, meanwhile, including one that said fewer US workers applied for unemployment benefits last week than expected.

That could indicate the pace of layoffs is slowing, and it was a relief after the prior week’s data showed a disconcerting leap to a four-year high. The job market has slowed so much that the Federal Reserve on Wednesday cut its main interest rate for the first time this year in order to give it some help.

The Fed also indicated more cuts may be on the way, though Chair Jerome Powell warned that the Fed is in a precarious position and may have to change course quickly.

That’s because the economy is in an unusual situation where the job market is slowing while inflation is remaining stubbornly high at the same time.

The Fed is in charge of fixing both, but it has only one tool to do so. And helping one by moving interest rates often hurts the other in the short term.

Expectations are high on Wall Street that the Fed will keep cutting interest rates, and an unexpected halt could send stocks tumbling. Critics say stock prices have already shot too high and become too expensive, in part because of heavy bets on continued cuts in rates. On Wall Street, smaller stocks led the way.

They can be some of the biggest beneficiaries of easier interest rates, and the Russell 2000 index of small stocks rallied 2.5 per cent to join its bigger rivals in setting all-time highs. (AP)

First 'Next Gen GST' awareness programme held in Namsai

Tribunals uphold ban on two JK groups

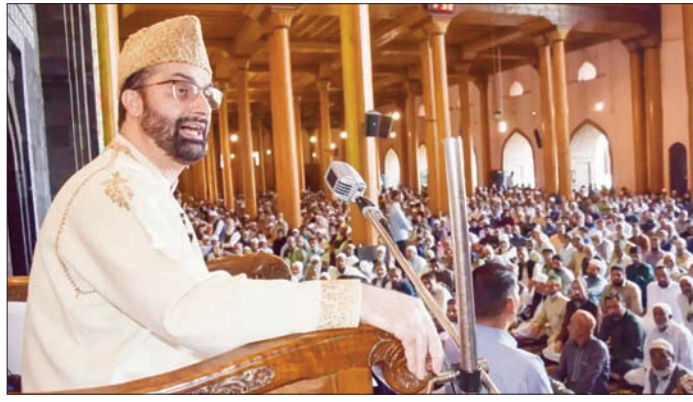
Tribunals declare Awami Action Committee and Ittihadul Muslimeen unlawful associations under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, 1967

NEW DELHI, Sept 19: Two Delhi High Court tribunals have upheld the ban imposed by the Centre on the Awami Action Committee headed by Kashmir's influential cleric Mirwaiz Umar Farooq and Shia leader Masroor Abbas Ansari-led Jammu and Kashmir Ittihadul Muslimeen.

The tribunals, headed by the same judge – Justice Sachin Datta – observed that based on the material and evidence placed before them, there is ample justification to declare the two groups as unlawful associations under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, 1967.

"Thus, this Tribunal, having followed the procedure laid down in the UAPA and its Rules and having independently and objectively appreciated and evaluated the material and evidence on record, is of the firm and considered view that there is sufficient cause for declaring the organisation as an unlawful association under Section 3(1) of the UAPA," the identical order issued by the tribunals read.

On March 11, while declaring the two groups banned, the Union home ministry said that the Awami Action Committee (AAC) and the Jammu and Kashmir Ittihadul Muslimeen (JKIM) were indulging in unlawful activities that were prejudicial to the integrity, sovereignty and security of the country.



It said the leaders and members of the two groups have been involved in mobilising funds for perpetrating unlawful activities, including supporting secessionist, separatist and terrorist activities in Jammu and Kashmir.

The members of these groups show sheer disrespect towards the constitutional authority and constitutional setup of the country through their activities. The outfits were involved in promoting and aiding the secession of Jammu and Kashmir from India by involving in anti-national and subversive activities and sowing seeds of disaffection amongst people, the ministry said. The AAC and the JKIM were exhorted to stabilise law and order, encouraging the use of arms to separate Jammu and Kash-

mir from the Union of India and promoting hatred against the established government, it said.

The tribunal referred to a chargesheet filed by the National Investigation Agency (NIA) in a case pertaining to terrorist and secessionist activities that have plagued Jammu and Kashmir since the late 1980s and the early 1990s.

Among the materials submitted by the government before the tribunal were the NIA chargesheet filed before a court which mentioned the spate of violence unleashed in the valley involving attacks on civilians and security forces alike since the last many decades.

It also mentioned that Pakistan's Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI) was actively supporting numerous terrorist organisations, such as

Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT), Hizb-ul-Mujahideen (HM), Jammu and Kashmir Liberation Front (JKLF), Harkat-ul-Jihad-al-Islami, Jaish-e-Mohammad (JeM) etc., which were involved in the attacks.

"Pakistan has not only been training the terror groups but also supporting them financially and diplomatically. Amidst the violent activities of the terrorists and mass exodus of the minority community from J&K, the All Parties Hurriyat Conference (APHC) was formed as a conglomerate of 26 political/social/religious organisations in the year 1993 which gave a political front to the secessionist activities," the chargesheet said.

It said the investigation in the NIA case uncovered a conspiracy involving various terrorist organisations, such as JKLF, HM, and LeT, in collusion with secessionist group comprising the APHC, funded by Pakistan and its agencies.

The aim was to wage war against the Indian government and advocate for the secession of Jammu and Kashmir from India. The APHC, initially formed as a political front, was found to be actively involved in inciting violence and unrest in Kashmir to further their secessionist agenda, the NIA noted.

The tribunal also took note of the intelligence reports submitted before it. (PTI)

Oct '23 blasts: Kerala police to seek US help in probe into BJP leader's FB post

KOCHI, Sept 19: The Left government in Kerala has granted sanction to the state police to seek US assistance in the probe into a Facebook post allegedly made from the account of BJP leader Rajeev Chandrasekhar, following the twin bomb blasts at a Jehovah's Witnesses convention in Kalamassery that killed eight people on October 29, 2023.

Chandrasekhar, a former union minister, is currently the president of the BJP's Kerala unit. The case concerning the post allegedly made from Chandrasekhar's Facebook page was registered by Ernakulam Central Police two days after the incident, based on a complaint from the Ernakulam Cyber Cell.

The FIR alleged that the Facebook post, purportedly from Chandrasekhar's account, attempted to disturb communal harmony and carried a provocative remark mentioning the Palestinian terrorist group Hamas in the background of the blasts at Kalamassery.

The post blamed the Congress and the CPI(M), claiming that they were indulging in appeasement politics, with the hashtags HamasTerrorist and KochiTerrorAttacks.

It was purportedly pointing fingers towards Hamas leader Khaled Mashal, who virtually attended a pro-Palestine protest held in Kerala, a day before the blast.

According to a Government Order issued on September 8, the State Police Chief had sought permission on July 17, 2025, to submit a Mutual Legal Assistance (MLA) request through the online portal in connection with Crime No. 3408/2023 registered at Ernakulam Central Police Station.

"The Government is pleased to accord sanction to the State Police Chief to send Mutual Legal Assistance in Crime No. 3408/2023 to the Ministry of Home Affairs through the online portal for obtaining legal assistance from the competent authorities in the United States of America," the order said.

The Inspector General of Police, Crime Branch, who is the state's Interpol liaison officer, has been directed to take steps to submit the request in line with



central guidelines, it said.

A police source, speaking exclusively to PTI, said MLA is being sought to obtain details from social media platforms based in the US, including Facebook and X (formerly Twitter).

"The MLA request will be routed through the CBI, which is India's Interpol nodal agency. The Interpol agency in the US will facilitate the request by collecting information from the concerned social media firms there," a police officer said.

Police had also registered another case (Crime No. 3418/2023) against Chandrasekhar and BJP national secretary Anil Antony on similar charges over posts taking the name of Hamas.

Both cases were filed under IPC Sections 153 (provocation with intent to cause riot), 153A (promoting enmity between groups on grounds of religion, race, language or caste), and Section 120(6) of the Kerala Police Act (causing nuisance).

Chandrasekhar later approached the Kerala High Court, which directed police not to take any coercive action against him. The investigation in these cases is still on, a police officer said.

Hours after the deadly blast, Palarivattom native Joseph Martin surrendered before a court in Thrissur district, taking responsibility for the incident. (PTI)

Continued need to probe 'Modani Scam' in all dimensions: Cong on SEBI clean chit to Adani

NEW DELHI, Sept 19: A day after the SEBI's clean chit to the Adani Group in the Hindenburg matter, the Congress on Friday said there is a continued need to investigate the "scam" in all its dimensions as it extends far beyond the scope of investigations by the market regulator. Congress general secretary in-charge communications Jairam Ramesh said in a statement that contrary to the managed headlines, the commercial partner in "Modani Enterprises" has now received a "clean chit" from SEBI only in two of the 20 matters being investigated by it under a Supreme Court-mandated probe. In a statement, Ramesh said there is continued need to investigate the "Modani Scam" in all its dimensions.

He also shared a set of questions the party had posed in the 100-question-series "Hum Adani Ke Hain Kaun" (HAHK), and said they remain unanswered. The Congress leader noted that the Supreme Court on March 2, 2023 had directed SEBI to "conclude the investigation within

two months" following the Hindenburg Report. "Yet, the first SEBI orders were delivered only after two years and seven months, following repeated extensions and delays.

"We now await SEBI's findings on the remaining 22 matters, which include allegations of insider trading in Adani Group companies, violations of rules relating to minimum public shareholding, and the 13 'suspicious transactions' that SEBI told the Supreme Court on August 25 2023, that it was investigating. These involve offshore dealings by close Adani associates Nasser Ali Shaban Ahli and Chang Chung-Ling," he said. "The Modani scam, however, extends far beyond the scope of SEBI's investigations," he asserted.

Raising the issues the Congress had flagged in its list of hundred questions in the HAHK series of questions to the prime minister, he said it also encompasses the alleged misuse of agencies such as the ED, CBI, and Income Tax Department to "force" companies to sell off their assets to the Adani Group. 5 more bodies found in rain-ravaged Chamoli, death toll rises to 7, 2 missing

GOPESHWAR (U'KHAND), Sept 19: Five more bodies were found from the rain-ravaged villages in Uttarakhand's Chamoli district on Friday as rescue teams dug through debris and waded through sludge in search of the missing.

With this, the death toll due to landslides and flooding in the area has climbed to seven. Two bodies were found on Thursday, officials said.

As rescuers pulled out the bodies, the family members of the victims broke down.

Four of the five bodies were found from Kuntari Laga Phali village on Friday and one was pulled out of the rubble in neighbouring Kuntari Laga Sarpani, the State Emergency Operation Centre (SEOC) in Dehradun said.

Landslides and flooding

triggered by heavy rain hit four villages -- Kuntari Laga Phali, Kuntari Laga Sarpani, Sera and Dhurma -- in Chamoli's Nandanagar area, about 260 km from state capital Dehradun and 50 km from the Chamoli district headquarters at Gopeshwar, on Thursday.

A total of 45 houses and 15 cowsheds were damaged in the incidents.

Nandanagar is already reeling from land subsidence.

The bodies found from Kuntari Laga Phali were identified as those of Deveshwari Devi (65), Kanta Devi (38) and her sons Vikas and Vishal, both aged 10. Kanta Devi's husband, Kunwar Singh (42), was rescued alive miraculously 16 hours after the incident on Thursday evening.

The body found from Kuntari Laga Sarpani was identified as that of Bhaga Devi (65).

Two persons are still missing in Dhurma and the search continues for them.

Chamoli District Magistrate Sandeep Tiwari is in Nandanagar to oversee the search-and-rescue operations.

On Thursday, 12 people were injured, including five rescued alive from Kuntari Laga Phali and Dhurma. Those seriously injured are undergoing treatment at the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) in Rishikesh, officials said.

They said 95 people have been shifted to the relief camps set up at Maria Ashram and Gala Godown with adequate supply of food and medicines. (PTI)

Accept leadership failures instead of blaming institutions: Rijju on Rahul's 'vote theft' claims

NEW DELHI, Sept 19: Union Parliamentary Affairs Minister Kiren Rijju on Friday said Congress leader Rahul Gandhi should accept responsibility for his repeated electoral defeats instead of targeting institutions.

His remarks came a day after Gandhi accused Chief Election Commissioner Gyanesh Kumar of protecting those behind "vote theft" and claimed that names of Congress voters were being systematically deleted from the electoral roll in Karnataka.

The Election Commission dismissed the charges as "incorrect and baseless", stating that no deletion of votes can take place without due process.

"If you lose elections repeatedly, you should acknowledge your weaknesses and accept the failure of your leadership. But instead, ...you start blaming institutions. Is

that the right way?" Rijju asked on the sidelines of a FICCI FLO event here.

The Union minister accused the leader of opposition in the Lok Sabha of trying to divert attention from his failures.

"Just to cover up his failures in elections, Rahul Gandhi cannot target any other institution or shift the focus elsewhere," Rijju said, adding that such attempts would not be accepted by the people.

The minister further claimed that Gandhi's remarks often mirrored anti-India propaganda.

"Whatever narratives Pakistan creates, the same narratives are propagated by Rahul Gandhi and his company here in India. For many years now, what Rahul Gandhi and his group say is found to be used by anti-India groups and elements in Pakistan," Rijju asserted. (PTI)

Rahul speaks like an 'urban Maoist': Fadnavis on his Gen Z post

MUMBAI, Sept 19: Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis on Friday accused Rahul Gandhi of speaking like an "urban Maoist", claiming that the Congress leader asked Gen Z to overthrow a democratically elected government.

Gandhi does not believe in the Constitution and rejects the

institutions, the CM said, adding that his advisors also have "urban Maoist" mindset.

His remarks came a day after Gandhi launched his fresh offensive against the Election Commission of India (ECI) and reiterated his "vote chori" allegations. (PTI)

Why should the Assembly not function just because the Prime Minister is visiting, asks Oppn Tripura Assembly session cut short amid PM Modi's visit

AGARTALA, Sept 19: The Tripura Assembly on the first day on Friday witnessed heated exchanges after the Business Advisory Committee (BAC) decided to reduce the number of sitting days in the ongoing session, citing Prime Minister Narendra Modi's scheduled visit to the state.

Tripura assembly session begins today and would end on September 23.

Raising objections, Congress MLA Gopal Chandra Roy alleged widespread corruption across government departments and demanded that the session be extended by at least three more days to allow discussion. CPI(M)

MLA Shyamal Chakraborty backed the demand, while Roy questioned the rationale behind keeping the House adjourned on Monday.

"For us, the issues of farmers, unemployed youths and common people are equally important. Why should the Assembly not function just because the Prime Minister is visiting?" he asked.

Chief Whip and BJP legislator Kalyani Roy countered the opposition's charge, pointing out that Congress members had skipped the BAC meeting despite being served prior notice.

Former minister and Congress MLA Sudip Roy Barman also criticized the decision, noting that As-



Assembly sessions in Tripura are already limited. "The BAC shifted Monday's business to Tuesday since the PM will be in Tripura. But this sets a bad precedent. Per-

haps the Prime Minister himself is unaware of it — otherwise, he might have advised that the House continue," he said.

Leader of the Opposition Jiten- dra Chaudhury echoed similar concerns, remarking that adjourning the House during the PM's visit does not reflect well on the state.

Defending the government, Parliamentary Affairs Minister Ratan Lal Nath argued that most senior officials, secretaries and department heads would be preoccupied with the Prime Minister's programme. "If they are absent, who will respond to members' queries in the House? The decision was taken unanimously in the BAC after discussion. I assure that the next session will have more days," he said.

Later, Deputy Speaker Ram Prasad Paul tabled the BAC report, which was adopted by the House through voting.

Call for collective efforts to ensure child rights

DIMAPUR, Sept 19: The Nagaland State Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NSPCPR), in collaboration with the District Child Protection Unit (DCPU) Dimapur, organised an awareness programme "child rights & child protection" here on Friday, calling for collective efforts to ensure that child rights are protected.

In his keynote address at the programme, NSPCPR chairman Alun Hangsing said those countries that took cognizance of child rights, especially European and Western countries, are the most advanced countries in the world.

He stressed that it is the responsibility of every stakeholder to protect child rights, even as the NSPCPR is there to monitor that the rights of children are protected.

Addressing the event, Dimapur DC Tinojongshi Chang

stressed the need for collective responsibility in safeguarding child rights.

He pointed out the rising cases of child abuse, domestic violence, sexual abuse, and child labour, urging government departments, organisations, and individuals to work together in providing a safe and supportive environment to all children.

Legal consultant, NSPCPR, Lichani Murry gave an overview of the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act with special focus on adoption rules, while member, NSPCPR, Akumla Longchari elaborated on the POCSO Act and rights of trafficked victims.

Longchari underlined the importance of preventive measures, such as discouraging child labour and training teachers and Anganwadi workers.

The resource persons also highlighted various child-related legislations and protection

mechanisms.

Another NSPCPR member Aying Wangsha highlighted the Right to Education Act 2009 and the Child Labour Amendment Act 2016, stressing the prohibition of child labour and the importance of free and compulsory education for children aged 6-14 years.

Presenting a district report, district child protection officer Dimapur Avika Zhimomi said from September 2023 to August 2025, a total of 310 cases of children in need of care and protection were produced before the Child Welfare Committee, while 499 cases were received through the Childline 1098 helpline. He noted that Dimapur, being the state's commercial hub, faces unique challenges such as trafficking, abuse, and abandonment, and called for collective efforts to strengthen child protection systems. The programme concluded with an open house discussion.

Manipur govt not to register deeds for land transfer from indigenous people to outsiders

IMPHAL, Sept 19: The Manipur government has prohibited registration of deeds for the transfer of land from indigenous people to outsiders, according to a notification.

However, the government has allowed registration of deeds related to the transfer of land from an indigenous person to a non-indigenous one on condition that the transferee must be a permanent resident of the state.

In a notification issued on Thursday, the Land Resources Department said, "No deed shall be registered for the transfer of land (by gift, sale, or mortgage) from an indigenous person to a non-indigenous person."

But there is an exception to the restriction, according to the notification. Notwithstanding the restriction on transfers to non-indigenous persons, registration may be permitted "if the persons involved in the land transfer

(by gift, sale, or mortgage) are permanent residents of the state of Manipur", it said.

The notification came into effect immediately. Those who intend to purchase land in Manipur are required to approach the deputy commissioner of the district concerned.

The DCs have been asked to verify applications related to buying land and send them to the administrative secretary (Land Resources), it said.

An internal committee of the Land Resources Department will verify each application before presenting it to a panel of officers who are responsible for recommending to the government the grant of permission for the sale deed registration of land, the notification said. "The recommendation is made under the Manipur Regulation of Sale Deed Registration (Amendment) Rules, 2023," it said. (PTI)

Five detained B'desh nationals to be sent back to their country

AGARTALA, Sept 19: Five Bangladeshi labourers, who were detained in Tripura's Gomati district recently, will be sent back to their country, a senior police officer said on Friday.

The officer said the detained Bangladesh nationals claimed they had entered Indian soil a few days ago and were engaged in construction and furniture work at Maharani under RK Pur police station area of the district. During a check at Maharani, police stopped an auto-rickshaw on Thursday and conducted a search. On suspicion, five passengers were detained, Udaipur SDPO Debanjali Ray told PTI.

"Today, the five labourers were taken to a state government-run home in West Tripura. The BSF will take up the issue with its Bangladesh counterpart to send them back to their country", she said.

Ray said the state has already received communication from the Centre to house the illegal Bangladeshi nationals in a government-run home, instead of arresting them immediately. In Tripura, where infiltration remains a major challenge, law enforcement agencies previously used to arrest Bangladesh nationals under the Indian Passport Act for entering Indian territory illegally and produce them before a local court for further legal action. (PTI)

Six militants arrested in Manipur

IMPHAL, Sept 19: Security forces have arrested six militants belonging to different proscribed outfits from three Imphal Valley districts of Manipur, police said on Friday.

The arrests were made on Thursday.

Three active cadres of the banned Kangleipak Communist Party (PWG) outfit were arrested from their respective residences in Imphal West district. They were identified as Leishangthem Tondon Singh (34), Leishangthem Anand Singh (34) and Heikham Hemchandra Singh (41), a police statement said. Two SLR rifles, two modified .303 rifles, one INSAS rifle, nine magazines of different types and 99 cartridges were seized from their possession. Another cadre of the same outfit was arrested from Andro in Imphal East district. He was identified as Taorem Tomchou Meitei alias Pena (45). One active cadre of the proscribed PREPAK (PRO) outfit was arrested from Ichan Khunou in Thoubal district. Police arrested an active cadre of the banned SOREPA outfit from Samaram Mayai Leikai in Thoubal district. He was identified as Khoinaijam Bhumeswar Singh (24). One dummy gun and three cartridges were seized from his possession, it said. (PTI)

Mon district records highest employment rate at 91.08% 71,034 registered unemployed in Nagaland, says report

DIMAPUR, Sept 19: There are 71,034 unemployed youth registered with employment exchanges in Nagaland as of March 31, 2025, according to a survey report on employment, unemployment, skills and migration in the state.

The report of the directorate of economics & statistics was officially released at a programme at the directorate's conference hall in Kohima on Friday.

Speaking at the programme as the special guest, advisor, economics & statistics and evaluation, H Sethrongkyu Sangtam said the report would help the state government formulate effective policies to tackle unemployment.

He stressed that without quality district-level data, balanced regional development and the vision of a "Viksit Nagaland" could not be achieved.

Sangtam reiterated the government's commitment to addressing the unemployment problem, recalling that the matter was deliberated in the recent session of the Nagaland Legislative Assembly.

Calling the survey report the first of its kind under the Nagaland Sample Survey Unit, he said it would serve as a critical basis for framing labour policies and harnessing the state's demographic dividend. He



added that district-wise socio-economic data in the report would help address unique challenges in each district while strengthening policy implementation.

Neidilhou Keditsu, director, economics & statistics, presented the key findings of the survey report.

The survey reported that the average household size in Nagaland is four members, with household sizes ranging from one to 11. The average monthly household expenditure was estimated at ₹ 16,522, with the lowest at ₹ 1,133 and the highest at ₹ 3,61,647. The average age of people in the working-age group stood at 34 years.

On education, residents had an average of 11 years of formal schooling, with a minimum of one year and a maximum of 22 years. About 16% of respondents studied up to graduation,

4% were postgraduates and above, while 2% were illiterate.

The findings also revealed that 92% of residents did not have any technical education or vocational/technical training.

The labour force participation rate in Nagaland was recorded at 56%. The employment rate was estimated at 83.92%, while the unemployment rate stood at 16.07%.

Wokha had the highest labour force participation rate with 75%, while Tuensang registered the lowest at 41%.

Mon district recorded the highest employment rate at 91.08%, while Phek reported the lowest at 75%. In contrast, Phek registered the highest unemployment rate at 25%, while Mon had the lowest at 8.92%.

On migration, the survey revealed that 55% of migrant respondents had moved from rural to urban settlements.

Party stands with people: Tipra Motha

Party to raise Tripartite Agreement, infiltration concerns in Assembly

AGARTALA, Sept 19: Ahead of the ongoing Tripura Legislative Assembly session, the Tipra Motha Party (TMP) — a partner in the state government — announced that it will seek clarifications on two crucial issues: the status of the tripartite agreement and the measures being taken to curb illegal infiltration.

Addressing a press conference on Friday, Forest Minister and senior TMP leader Animesh Debbarma said the party would move a "short notice discussion" in the House to directly question the concerned ministers.

"Even though we are part of the government, many things remain unknown to us. It is our duty to raise the questions of the people, and we will do so inside the Assembly," Debbarma said, adding that the Assembly should be seen as a platform for debate, not confrontation.

Anticipating criticism, he clarified that the party's stance should not be misread as opposition to the government.

"Some may argue that TIPRA Motha is speaking against the government despite being part of it. That is not true. We are a small constituent of the ruling alliance, and naturally, certain decisions are beyond our knowledge. As people's representatives, it is our responsibility to seek answers on their behalf," Debbarma explained.

He stressed that TMP's priority remains the protection of the rights and interests of the indigenous Tiprasa community, which he said often feels neglected in governance.

"Our demand for answers in the Assembly is not for our party's benefit, but for the marginalized voices that deserve to be heard," he asserted.

Adil Hussain, Vishal Mishra, Pritam mourn Singer Zubeen Garg's sudden demise

NEW DELHI, Sept 19: Actor Adil Hussain, musicians Papon, Vishal Mishra, Armaan Malik and Pritam on Friday expressed shock over the sudden death of renowned Assamese singer Zubeen Garg, who was known for hits such as "Ya Ali", "Piya Re" and "Jajabor".

Garg, 52, died in Singapore on Friday after sustaining injuries while scuba diving. He was rushed to a hospital and admitted to the intensive care unit, but could not be saved.

In a post on X, Hussain said he was "devastated and shocked" by the news of Garg's sudden death.

"I am so very sad... His contribution to Assamese music and culture is extraordinary... He will live amongst us through his songs... Dear Zubeen I remember you with lots of love and fondness... May his singing soul rest in peace and God bless his soul... Goodbye Zubeen... Until we meet on the other side... Keep singing with your beautiful voice and make Gods Happy," he added.

"This is so shocking! The voice of a generation! Gone so soon. At a loss of words! Lost a friend. Lost a brother. A big void. Praying for a peaceful journey of his soul," Papon said on X.

Mishra shared an old photo of Garg on Instagram and wrote, "Zubeen Da, like every one else, I loved your voice & connected to it so much! Left us all too soon." Malik tweeted, "I am devastated and in disbelief. May his soul

rest in peace.. #ZubeenGarg."

Garg, who sang many popular tracks in Assamese, Hindi and other languages, had travelled to Singapore to participate in the three-day North East Festival, which was scheduled to begin on Friday.

"It is with deep sadness that we share the news of Zubeen Garg's passing. While scuba diving, he experienced breathing difficulties and was immediately given CPR before being rushed to Singapore General Hospital. Despite efforts to save him, he was declared dead in the ICU around 2.30 pm IST," a statement issued by organisers of the North East Festival said.

"Zubeen losing his life in an accident is just the most terrible and saddest news.

I'm still trying to come to terms with it... My deepest condolences to Garima and his family. Om Shanti," Pritam shared in a post on X.

Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma condoled the singer's demise, saying the state has "lost one of its favourite sons".

"I am at a loss for words to describe what Zubeen meant for the state. He has gone too early; this was not the age to go," he wrote on X.

Garg is survived by his wife. (PTI)

In another post, he said, "Froze, baked, shivered, ate sand, walked in the Indus, sucked oxygen but still leaving with all those memories that make me

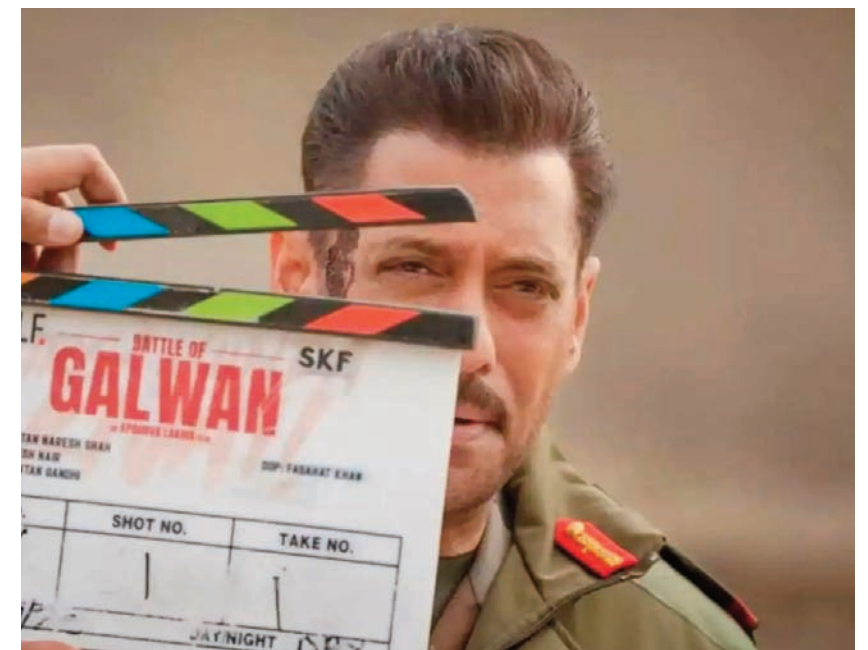
smile."

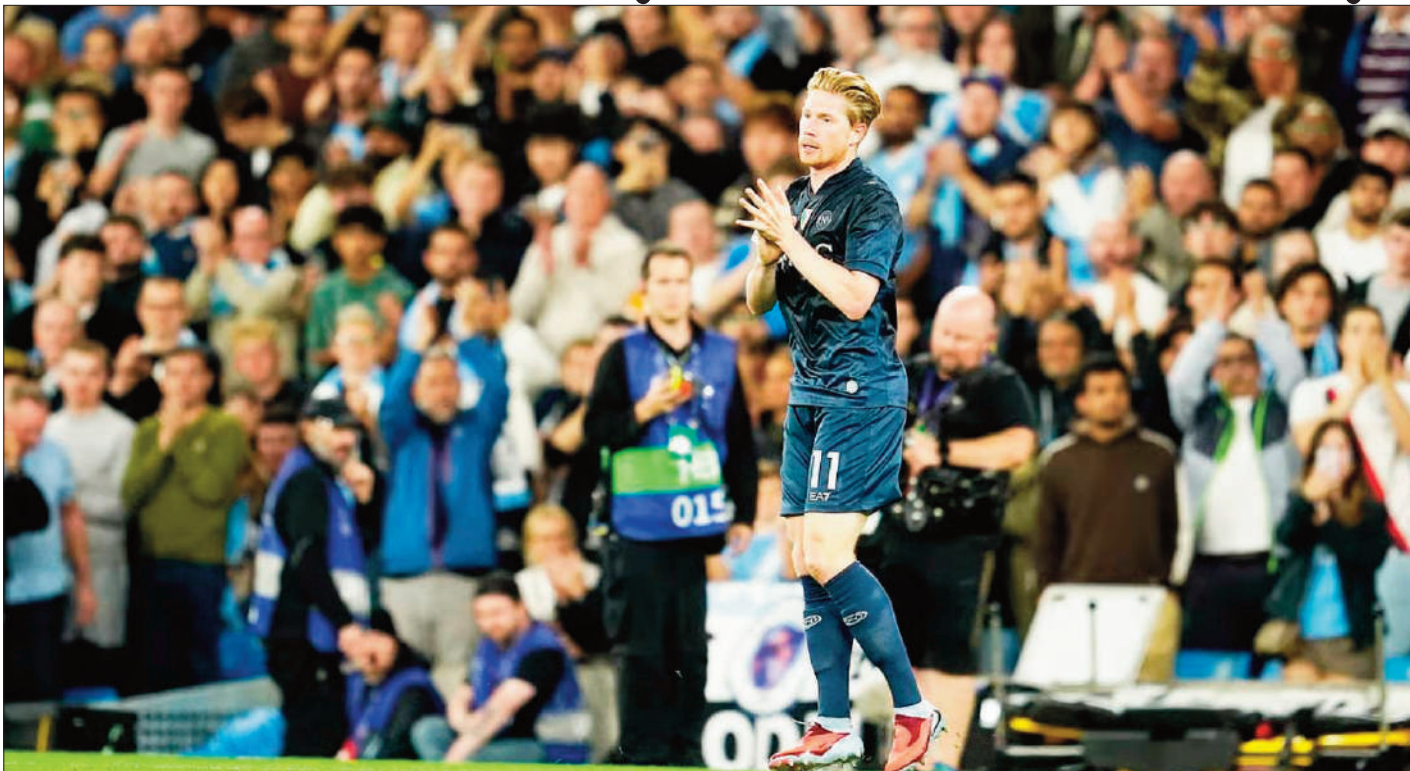

Champions League: Rashford stars in Barcelona win as De Bruyne lose on Man City return



LONDON, Sept 19: Marcus Rashford proved the perfect replacement for Lamine Yamal in Barcelona's 2-1 win at Newcastle in the Champions League and Kevin De Bruyne watched mostly from the sideline as Napoli lost 2-0 at his former club Manchester City.

With Yamal missing through injury, Rashford — a loan signing from Manchester United — got a start on his return to England and

scored both of Barcelona's goals at St. James' Park. The second took the breath away, a piledriver from 25 meters that flew in off the crossbar.

De Bruyne was also back on English soil, at the club where he spent 10 years before an emotional farewell in May.

But his Etihad Stadium return lasted 26 minutes before he was substituted following a red card for teammate Giovanni Di

Lorenzo and City wound up a comfortable winner thanks to second-half goals from Erling Haaland and Jeremy Doku.

Haaland's header put him on 50 goals in 49 Champions League appearances, with the Norway striker reaching that milestone quicker than any other player in the competition's history.

Kairat, a tournament newcomer from Kazakhstan, made what is thought to be longest ever trek for

a Champions League fixture — across three time zones and more than 7,000 kilometers (4,350 miles) — and lost 4-1 at Sporting Lisbon. Sporting scored its final three goals in a four-minute span in the second half and also had a penalty saved.

The comeback of the night went to Eintracht Frankfurt, which recovered from conceding in the eighth minute to beat Galatasaray 5-1.

England coach Thomas Tuchel was in the stands of a raucous St. James' Park to witness Rashford showcase his finishing abilities that Man United could do with right now.

His first goal was a header off Jules Koundé's cross in the 58th to put Barcelona ahead before he created space for himself with some clever footwork and blasted a right-footed shot from outside the area off the underside of the bar in the 67th.

"100%, I'm full of excitement," Rashford said after his first goals for Barcelona. "I'm very motivated and determined. The quality we have in the team, that excites me alone. It's so refreshing to play with these guys."

Anthony Gordon pulled one back for Newcastle in the 89th, putting in a low cross from substitute Jacob Murphy.

Newcastle manager Eddie Howe left record signing Nick Woltemade — the replacement for Alexander Isak — on the bench until the 63rd.

Napoli's defensive reorganization following Di Lorenzo's red card for fouling Haaland as the last man meant De Bruyne was sacrificed. Ever the team player, the Belgium playmaker took the decision well, jogging off to applause from a home crowd that once cheered his every assist and goal.

"It was the only option I could do," Napoli coach Antonio Conte said. "I was really, really sorry for him." (AP)

Mbappé's Real Madrid hosts unbeaten Espanyol with La Liga lead at stake



BARCELONA, Sept 19: Few observers imagined that top spot in the Spanish league would be up for grabs when Espanyol visits Real Madrid on Saturday.

But the undefeated Espanyol is in third place and just two points behind leader Madrid, which has won all four of its La Liga games.

Barcelona is second, tied on points with Espanyol, before hosting fifth-placed Getafe at its 6,000-seat Estadi Johan Cruyff on Sunday.

The modest "parakeets" of Espanyol can dream of ending the round at the top of the standings.

A win at Madrid, combined with Getafe taking at least a point at Barcelona, would see Espanyol move into first place after five rounds.

Espanyol only avoided relegation on the last day of last season and sold star goalkeeper Joan García to rival Barcelona this summer.

But the club was bought this summer by a group that owns English club Burnley and has American shareholders, and it also made several moves in the transfer market. English winger Tyrhys Dolan has impressed and Marko Dmitrovic has filled in for García in goal.

Pere Milla has also emerged as a scoring midfielder with three goals.

Espanyol beat Madrid 1-0 at home last season and can hope to draw inspiration from that stunner.

Madrid will look to take advantage of Kylian Mbappé and his fine scoring form.

The France striker has scored six goals in five games this campaign, including a double in a 2-1 win over Marseilles in their Champions

League opener this week.

Keep an eye on Marcus Rashford after the England forward scored his first two goals — and great goals they were — for Barcelona in a 2-1 win at Newcastle in the Champions League on Thursday.

Coach Hansi Flick praised the on-loan Manchester United player for his strong performance. Rashford will likely be back in the starting 11 given the doubts regarding the fitness of Lamine Yamal.

Madrid watchers will scrutinize Xabi Alonso's starting 11 to see if he again picks Rodrygo over star forward Vinícius Júnior, who he used as a substitute against Marseille.

Yamal has missed the last two games for Barcelona with an unspecified injury "in the public area."

Madrid will be without right back Trent Alexander-Arnold, who is expected to be sidelined for several weeks because of a hamstring injury sustained against Marseille.

Barcelona is still unable to get back to playing at its Camp Nou stadium, which was supposed to have been ready by the start of the season after two years of remodeling work.

The Catalan club said Friday that its Oct. 1 game against Paris Saint-Germain in the Champions League will be played at the city's Lluís Companys Olympic Stadium, where it played the previous two seasons.

That 55,000-seat venue will at least sell many more tickets than the Johan Cruyff stadium, where Barcelona routed Valencia 6-0 last weekend in its home league opener. (AP)

SL all-rounder Wellalage returns home from Asia Cup after father's death

ABU DHABI, Sept 19: Sri Lanka's Dunith Wellalage has returned home from the on-going Asia Cup after his father, Suranga, passed away on Thursday night, the same day when the all-rounder was playing a Group B league match against Afghanistan here.

Wellalage learned of his father's demise only after the match, and he left for Colombo on the earliest available flight. Suranga died after suffering a heart attack. He was 54.

It is unclear whether the 22-year-old will return for the tournament where Sri Lanka are playing Bangladesh in a Super 4 match here on Saturday.

After the game against Bangladesh, Sri Lanka will face Pakistan on September 23 and India on September 26.

"Deeply saddened by the passing of Mr. Suranga Wellalage, father of Dunith Wellalage. My heartfelt condolences to the family. Stay strong Dunith, the whole nation stands with you and your

family in this difficult time," wrote former Sri Lanka captain Lasith Malinga on X.

"Heartfelt condolences to Dunith Wellalage and his family on the loss of his beloved father. Stay strong brother," wrote veteran Afghanistan cricketer Mohammad Nabi on his X handle.

Wellalage, a left-arm spinner, bowled four overs against Afghanistan picking up the wicket of Ibrahim Zadran while conceding 49 runs.

It was the fifth T20I of his ca-

reer. Sri Lanka won the match by six wickets after wicketkeeper-batter Kusal Mendis made an unbeaten 74 off 52 balls.

Sri Lanka head coach and batting great Sanath Jayasuriya, who informed the young cricketer about the tragedy after the match, paid tribute to Wellalage's father in a social media post and promised to stand by him through the difficult time. "Dunith, your father was a cricketer himself, and he can be truly proud of the son he raised. His values, his love for

the game, and his spirit live on through you. I know how strong you are, and I have no doubt that you will continue to make him proud by winning many games for Sri Lanka," he posted on Facebook. "At this difficult moment, please remember that you are not alone. I will be there for you like a father -- guiding you, standing with you, and supporting you every step of the way. The entire team, the nation, and everyone who loves this sport are by your side," he added. (PTI)

I let slip a World Championship medal, rues Sachin Yadav

NEW DELHI, Sept 19: Outperforming the likes of Neeraj Chopra and Julian Weber in his debut World Championship is a nice feeling but India's new-found javelin throw talent Sachin Yadav says it cannot make up for the disappointment of "letting slip" an unlikely bronze after a strong start.

Unheralded Yadav, participating in only his second international event, upstaged celebrated competitors like two-time Olympic medallist Chopra (84.03m), reigning Olympic champion Arshad Nadeem (82.75m) and Diamond League trophy winner Julian Weber (86.11m) in Tokyo on Thursday in a surprisingly strong show.

The Indian's first-round throw of 86.27m was a personal best, bettering the earlier mark of 85.16m recorded while winning a silver in the Asian Championships in May, which was his first international event. Curtis Thompson of the USA won the bronze with 86.67m -- 40cm better than Yadav's effort.

"The opening throw went very well. Weather conditions were good, my body was in great shape and execution was near perfect. The moment I saw my javelin land, I thought I can win a medal. I was confident I would pull off at least one throw of 87m," Yadav told PTI from Tokyo.

"I was competing against the world's best and naturally your performance gets better. But I could not improve my first throw in next five attempts despite trying my best. So, I feel I let slip a World Championships medal," the 25-year-old rued.

His second throw was a foul and the remaining four measured 85.71m, 84.90m, 85.96m and 80.95m. Three of his legal throws were better than his earlier personal best. Hailing from a farmers' family at Khehra village near Baghpat in Uttar Pradesh, Yadav also felt sad for defending champion Chopra, who was eliminated after the fifth round after an underwhelming show due to back pain.

"Me and Neeraj bhai kept talking during the final. After my first

throw, he told me we should get two medals. I knew he was dealing with a back problem but he must be hoping that he would pull off a good throw somehow.

"I was trying to better my first round throw but at the same time I felt sad for Neeraj bhai. It was the first time he was not on podium (since Tokyo Olympics in 2021). In any case, our country was to win a medal. That also did not happen, so I felt bad."

Yadav said his parents do not know much about athletics, leave alone World Championships, and they were surprised to see photo journalists at their village home after his Tokyo performance.

"I have spoken to my mother. My parents are happy but they don't think much about all this, World Championships and winning medals etc. They just wanted me to get a government job.

"They have never even seen the media. They have not seen anything. So for the first time it happened that the media went to my home and took a photo. My mother told me that some people came to our house and took photographs."

Yadav is now with the UP Police, having joined the force in 2023 under the sports quota.

His father had to take loans for his treatment after Yadav suffered an elbow injury at the start of his career in 2021.

"I am injury prone. I had elbow injury just when I started javelin and then had another in between," he said.

Early this year also, he twisted his ankle while winning gold in the Uttarakhand National Games. He did rehabilitation and came back after lying low for around two months. "I am in TOPS (Target Olympic Podium Scheme) and I have OGG as my sponsor. So, I am better off now as far as the financial situation is concerned."

Yadav's rise has been meteoric and that too without a qualified coach in his initial years. He was introduced to javelin by his neighbour Sandeep Yadav who saw the tall youngster playing cricket for fun. (PTI)

McLaren heads into Azerbaijan Grand Prix on verge of F1 constructors' title

BAKU (AZERBAIJAN), Sept 19: The Formula 1 title race is heating up, and McLaren's golden rule — "Let 'em race" — risks expanding into a whole rule book.

Asking Oscar Piastri to give up second place to Lando Norris at the Italian Grand Prix because of a slow pit stop showed how McLaren's seemingly simple approach risks being bogged down in debates about what's fair on track.

The battle between Norris and Piastri will become McLaren's sole focus if the team can wrap up the constructors' title Sunday at the Azerbaijan Grand Prix in Baku with a record seven races remaining.

McLaren leads by 337 points and takes the title if one driver wins and the other is second or third, which would end the faint

mathematical chances of Ferrari, Mercedes and Red Bull.

It's a big contrast to last year, when McLaren held off Ferrari in the final race of the season to win the constructors' title for the first time in 26 years. "It's a pretty remarkable position that we're in," Piastri said. "A very proud moment for everybody and myself included."

Was swapping the cars in Italy the best way for McLaren to make up for a team mistake beyond Norris' control? Or was Piastri punished for something that's "just part of racing," as he suggested over the radio?

The Monza decision has prompted yet more discussion at McLaren about the best way to race.

"We've again had a lot of discus-



sions about how we want to go racing and a lot of that is to stay for us," Piastri said, adding that giving away the details could allow rival teams to exploit McLaren's approach. "I do think we have enough freedom to control our own destiny in the championship."

That call left Piastri with a lead of 31 points, instead of 37. Expect to hear a lot more about it at the end of the season if that six-point swing decides the title.

"You can't plan for every single scenario that's going to happen, but I think we're very aligned," Piastri said. "Ultimately I respect the team's decisions and trust that they'll certainly do their best to make the right ones."

Azerbaijan is a place where team rivalry has boiled over before.

In 2018, it was where up-and-

coming challenger Max Verstappen collided with established contender Daniel Ricciardo. It forced Red Bull into a rethink of its "no team orders" approach — not dissimilar to McLaren's "let 'em race" — and set the two drivers on opposite trajectories.

Ricciardo was only on the podium once more that season, lost out to Verstappen by 79 points and left the team at the end of 2018. Verstappen hasn't had a teammate who's challenged him since.

The gap between him and Yuki Tsunoda is vast — 230 points to 12.

Red Bull heads into Azerbaijan widely expected to promote Isack Hadjar, whose podium finish in the Netherlands was an exclamation point in a strong rookie season, to Tsunoda's seat for 2026. (AP)

Camp to start in October ahead of AFC Women's Asian Cup, clash with IWL avoided: Crispin Chettri

BENGALURU, Sept 19: Indian women's team coach Crispin Chettri on Friday said preparatory camps will be held every month from October ahead of next year's AFC Women's Asian Cup, and steps have been taken to avoid them clashing with the Indian Women's League (IWL) schedule.

Indian senior women and the U20 sides have qualified for the continental showpieces in July and August early this year.

"We have already discussed with our players, coaches of clubs and with the federation also. We'll be hosting camps, and there will be a longer camp from January before the main tournament kicks off," said Chettri in a press conference organised by the All India Football Federation here.

Chettri said the camps were not started in the immediate aftermath of the team's qualification for the marquee event, which will be held in Australia between March 1-21, 2026, because the senior women's



national championship is underway.

"The idea was to host a camp earlier (than October) but we also wanted to see more players in action during the current senior nationals, so that no individual is left out to represent our country."

"So that's the reason why we haven't hosted any camp as of now. So, from October when the senior nationals are over, we can have a few younger players in the camp. I

think we want to give them that right opportunity and that's why we have not started the camp," he said.

India have a challenging draw in the Asian Cup, getting clubbed alongside Japan, Vietnam and Chinese Taipei in Group C.

Chettri said the team has charted an extensive training programme ahead of the tournament, including friendlies against some top sides.

"From October onwards, we'll be

hosting a camp maybe for 15 days every month and before we go for the AFC we'll have a longer camp. Maybe we'll host a certain big team in October.

"Maybe in November we might go to Europe and in January, according to the weather conditions in Australia, we'll travel to Australia earlier or maybe to some place where we can have similar kind of conditions for friendly matches."

The IWL 2025-26 is scheduled to be played between October 25, 2025 and April 30, 2026 and Chettri said the management, the AIFF and the clubs have already discussed ways to avoid a schedule clash.

"We've already planned that. We had meetings with the IWL clubs. We also had a meeting with the competitions committee, and we've ensured that they don't clash, and accordingly part of the IWL will happen after the Asian Cup."

"Our only problem is East Bengal, who are going to play in two continental championships. So,

we're sort of juggling it. We just hope we get all the players. But all this has been planned with the stakeholders," he detailed.

The corresponding U20 AFC Women's Asia Cup will be held in Thailand, and India will be participating in the event after a gap of 23 years.

Head coach Joakim Andersson, who has been in charge of the side since December, 2024, said extensive steps have been taken to ensure a good outing for his wards.

"So, first of all we will go to Slovenia in October for some exposure games against good European opponents and when we come back the players will go back to their clubs and we will be using the FIFA windows to prepare with more games and camps."

"We will also invite some teams to India to play good games. So, that's how it is and from January the IWL will take a break and we'll have the last camp then," said Andersson. (PTI)

Asia Cup: Unbeaten Sri Lanka hope to tame Bangladesh again in opening Super Four game

Suranga's return for the Super Four game highly negotiable



DUBAI, Sept 19: A determined Sri Lanka will take inspiration from their unbeaten group campaign and start favourites against an inconsistent Bangladesh in the first Super Four match of the Asia Cup here on Saturday.

Aby led by Charith Asalanka, the Lankans finished on top of Group B with three wins from as many matches, ahead of Bangladesh and T20 World Cup semifinalists Afghanistan.

Sri Lanka beat Bangladesh by six wickets before defeating Hong Kong and Afghanistan by four and six wickets respectively.

But the Lankans are very capable of collapsing as well. The Islanders almost lost against Hong Kong on Monday after opener Pathum Nissanka's fifty.

A brittle middle-order is the major concern for Sri Lanka as they were on the verge of a familiar nosedive against Hong Kong, just three weeks after they were bowled out for 80 by Zimbabwe in

Harare.

Nissanka has been the standout performer for Sri Lanka with the bat, leading the run-scorers' list with 124 runs from three games, including two fifties.

After two sedate knocks, wicket-keeper-batter Kusal Mendis finally came to the party with an attacking 74 off 52 balls against Afghanistan, much to the delight of the Lankans.

Left-hander Kamil Mishara too has been in good touch but Sri Lanka would look for contributions from the likes of skipper Asalanka, senior batters Kusal Perera and Dasun Shanaka in the middle-order.

In all the three group matches, Sri Lanka thrived while chasing and one would expect the Islanders to continue the same trend if they win the toss on Saturday.

Besides batting, the Sri Lankans have also been mighty impressive with the ball and ground fielding.

Right-arm fast bowler Nuwan Thushara is the fourth highest wicket-taker in the tournament so far with five scalps. Dushmantha Chameera too has been among wickets with the new ball.

Wanindu Hasaranga, Asalanka and Dasun Shanaka have tightened the screws in the middle overs.

But Sri Lanka are will miss the services of all-rounder Dunieth Wellalage as he has returned home from the tournament after his father, Suranga, passed away on Thursday night, the same day when he was playing their final Group B match against Afghanistan in Abu Dhabi.

Wellalage learned of his father's demise only after the match, and he left for Colombo on the earliest available flight.

It is also unclear whether the 22-year-old will return for the tournament or not.

Bangladesh, on the other hand, progressed to the Super Four stage

on Sri Lanka's mercy. Had the Islanders lost against Afghanistan on Thursday, Bangladesh would have been out of the tournament.

Bangladesh started the tournament with an easy seven-wicket win over Hong Kong before going down to Sri Lanka by six wickets. They brought their campaign back on track after a narrow eight-run win over Afghanistan.

Bangladesh's inconsistent batting remains a major concern. The likes of skipper Litton Das, tournament's fourth-highest scorer with 96 runs, Saif Hasan, Tanzid Hasan and Towhid Hridoy will need to come up with consistent performances.

Bangladesh need overall improvement as their catching has also been below par and their bowlers have also often collapsed in the face of sensible and aggressive batting.

Bringing back Taskin Ahmed in place of Shoriful Islam against Afghanistan was a good move.

Bangladesh would also look towards Nasum Ahmed and Mustafizur Rahman to unsettle the Lankan batters.

India chase historic maiden WODI series triumph against Australia



NEW DELHI, Sept 19: Riding high on a record-breaking performance, India will eye a historic first ever women's ODI series win over the mighty Australia when the two sides clash in the decider of the three-match fixture here on Saturday.

The hosts have never managed to conquer the all-powerful world champions in a bilateral series, and a victory here would not only deliver that elusive triumph but also provide a timely surge of belief and momentum heading into the World Cup starting September 30.

However, it will be easier said than done.

After being outplayed in the opener, Harmanpreet Kaur and her team roared back with a stunning 102-run victory, which was Australia's heaviest defeat in terms of runs. It was also India's first win over them in 12 matches.

Yet, for all the broken records, glaring flaws remain. India's fielding was erratic as they put down as many as six catches in the second game, taking their tally of dropped chances to 10 across two matches, most of them regulation.

There were flashes of brilliance too, but the inconsistency is concerning, especially in contrast to the sharp fielding display the same

for a major chunk of India's runs this series. With Shafali Verma no longer in the scheme of things, the vice-captain has taken on the role of the aggressor.

She cracked her 12th ODI century in the second game, the only score above 40 in India's total of 292.

It is now imperative for the likes of Harmanpreet, Harleen Deol and Richa Ghosh to step up, especially with Jemimah Rodrigues ruled out due to a viral infection.

Australia, meanwhile, will be desperate to bounce back.

Skipper Alyssa Healy admitted her side had been "outplayed" in the second ODI, and the eight-time world champions will be keen to iron out their flaws while adjusting to the sweltering Indian heat.

The loss was a rare setback for Australia, who had gone unbeaten in 13 ODIs since their defeat to South Africa in February 2024.

"We came over here with the expectations of it being a huge challenge, not just playing India, but throughout the whole World Cup," Healy said after the defeat.

"So these games are invaluable in terms of practice and getting ourselves ready for the matches to come as well."

Australia are also expected to welcome back opener Phoebe Litchfield, who missed the second game with a low-grade quad strain.

PCB responds, says ICC protocols allow media managers to use cameras

ABU DHABI, Sept 19: The Pakistan Cricket Board on Friday defended its media manager filming a meeting between match referee Andy Pycroft and team officials ahead of their Asia Cup game against UAE, maintaining that the action was within ICC protocols.

On Thursday, ICC CEO Sanjog Gupta had written to the PCB citing "multiple violations" of the Players and Match Officials Area (PMOA) code, including the recording of the interaction that involved coach Mike Hesson, captain Salman Ali Agha, and manager Naveed Akram Cheema.

The ICC communication had also questioned a PCB press release which stated that Pycroft had apologised, clarifying that the referee had only expressed regret over a miscommunication caused by an Asian Cricket Council (ACC) venue manager.

"The team's media manager is part of the squad and has authorised access to the PMOA. His presence there is not a violation," a tournament source said, outlining the board's response.

According to the PCB, existing protocols allow media managers to use cameras in the PMOA. (PTI)

Satwik-Chirag pair storms into China Masters semifinals; Sindhu bows out

SHENZHEN, Sept 19: India's top men's doubles pair Satwiksairaj Rankireddy and Chirag Shetty continued their consistent run to advance to the semifinals of the China Masters Super 750 badminton tournament but PV Sindhu bowed out after falling yet again to Olympic champion An Se Young here on Friday.

Satwik and Chirag, the former world No.1 Indian duo, who recently clinched their second World Championships bronze in Paris and finished runners-up at the Hong Kong Open last week, produced a clinical performance to outclass Chinese pair of Ren Xiang Yu and Xie Haonan 21-14 21-14 in the quarterfinals.

"We felt quite comfortable out there. Our goal was just to focus on our game and see how they responded. Right now, the way we're playing, it feels great — especially being able to play back-to-back matches freely, without any niggles, really happy with how we played today," Satwik said.

Chirag added: "I think we made it tough for them right from the start. We didn't allow them to settle into the game at all. They're definitely a strong pair, but our plan was to keep things simple and take an early lead — and we managed to do that. So yes, really happy with the performance."

Currently ranked ninth in the world, Satwik and Chirag are likely to face their arch-rivals and second seeds Aaron Chia and Soh Wooi Yik of Malaysia in the semifinals on Saturday.

Earlier, double Olympic medalist P V Sindhu's woeful run against world No.1 An Se Young continued, as the Indian suffered her eighth straight defeat against the Korean, going down 14-21 13-21 in the women's sin-



gles quarterfinals.

"Last week wasn't great for me, but this week has been really positive. Reaching the quarterfinals has been encouraging, and I think the key now is to maintain that level and stay consistent in everything I do," Sindhu said.

Satwik and Chirag got off to a flying start, unleashing a flurry of smashes to race to a 7-0 lead. A couple of errors allowed the Chinese to close in at 3-8, but the Indians maintained their rhythm to enter the interval with an 11-5 advantage.

While Ren and Xie attempted to change the pace with quick flat rallies and front-court play, the Indians remained sharp and aggressive. Chirag's flick serve made it 13-7, and another intense rally ended with the Chinese hitting wide to give India a 17-10 lead.

A sharp body attack and a precise toss saw the Indians surge ahead, and they pocketed the opening game after converting their second game point.

The second game was a closer affair in the early exchanges, with both pairs level at 7-7. However, the Indians pulled away to lead 11-9 at the mid-game interval courtesy of disciplined net play and sharp smashes. (PTI)

West Indies have variety in pace attack to take 20 wickets in India: Sammy



KINGSTON, Sept 19: Head coach Daren Sammy feels West Indies possess enough "variety" in their pace attack to take 20 wickets in Indian conditions and urged his side to take inspiration from New Zealand ahead of the upcoming two-Test series.

The India-West Indies series begins in Ahmedabad on October 2, followed by the second Test in Delhi from October 10.

"We have found ourselves in a position where our seam attack could operate in any conditions. That six-to-eight-metre length works across the world. But in our fast-bowling department, we've got four different guys who have their own variety," Sammy told reporters.

The pace attack includes Alzarri Joseph, Shamar Joseph, Anderson Phillip and Jayden Seales, alongside all-rounder Justin Greaves.

"You have Shamar Joseph, who's very skiddy, Jayden, who has a strong front leg and can swing the ball both ways, then you have Alzarri Joseph with his height and the bounce he could extract," Sammy said.

"So, again, we take confidence in that, especially the way they've been bowling over the last year. The ability to take 20 wickets, because that's what you will need in India.

"If you can't take 20 wickets in India, you are on the back foot and we have a bowling line-up of that, especially from the seam department, that could take 20 wickets."

Sammy said the team is looking to follow the example of New Zealand, who beat India 3-0 late last year, as West Indies aim to end their 42-year wait for a series win in India.

"The process remains the same. The lines and lengths don't change in terms of that six-to-eight-metre length. Maybe it's just adjusting whether it's a touch fuller or touch further back into the pitch," said Sammy, who is also the coach of St Lucia Kings in the ongoing CPL 2025.

"I have full confidence in that and it makes me smile knowing that we go out bowling and we take 20 wickets. And that's the first objective in the Test match. (PTI)
