**Centre okays trial against Zubeen death accused**

GUWAHATI, Nov 18: Union Home Minister Amit Shah granted sanction under Section 208 of the BNSS to the Assam government to proceed against those linked to the death of Zubeen Garg in Singapore, allowing the police to file charge sheet, Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said on Tuesday, the first birthday of the singer post his death.

Section 208 of the BNSS says that if a crime is committed outside India, the case can be taken up by the court only after the central government gives prior sanction, he said.

The CM said that today "marks the 53rd birthday of our beloved Zubeen Garg — a day that reminds us of his music, his voice, and his



irreplaceable place in Assam's heart".

"On this very day, the Hon'ble Union Home Minister Sri @Amit-

Shah Ji has granted the required sanction under Section 208 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS) to proceed against the

accused linked to Zubeen's death in Singapore," Sarma said in a post on X.

This sanction is a crucial legal step, allowing the administration to file a charge sheet and move forward firmly and lawfully for trial of the case, Sarma added.

He said that they remain fully committed to file the charge sheet against the accused persons within December 10 this year.

Garg died in Singapore, where he had gone to participate in the North East India Festival (NEIF), on September 19 and after his cremation here, multiple FIRs were filed, with the state government constituting a Special Investigating team (SIT) under the CID to investigate the case. ## 'No problem for existing voters'

*New residents, evicted voters can enroll at new address: Assam CEO on SR*



GUWAHATI, Nov 18: As the Election Commission rolled out 'Special Revision' (SR) of electoral rolls of Assam from Tuesday, the state's Chief Electoral Officer (CEO) Anurag Goel stressed that existing voters will not face any problem under the exercise.

He emphasised that new residents can also enroll themselves, in-

cluding people evicted from encroached government land, by producing their previous voter details, as the state prepares for assembly elections early next year.

Addressing a press conference here, Goel said, "The purpose of the SR is to ensure that all eligible voters are included and ineligible removed from electoral rolls."

The EC had on Monday ordered SR for Assam with January 1, 2026, as the qualifying date to carry out the exercise. The final voter list based on it will be published on February 10. Goel claimed that it is for the first time that SR of electoral rolls is being conducted in any state, and that it was necessitated due to the special provisions of citizenship in Assam.

"There are special provisions for citizenship in Assam. NRC has been updated and only publication is awaited, and the NRC data will be conclusive proof for citizenship. Under the circumstances, the EC has ordered SR for Assam in place of Special Intensive Revision (SIR)," the CEO said.

He said that while special summary revision is a "routine" matter and SIR a thorough procedure, SR comes in between the two to ensure error-free electoral rolls. Under SR, booth-level officers (BLOs) will make home (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

Fans from across the state also gathered at 'Zubeen Kshetra', where he was cremated, to pay their tributes by offering 'gamosas' (traditional scarves) and flowers, lighting lamps and singing



his songs. Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma, in his tribute to Garg, said, "Some presence fades from sight but shines brighter in memory."

## J Infratech awarded ₹ 116 cr highway project in Assam

## 'Zero tolerance', 'no whitewashing': EAM

MOSCOW, Nov 18: India on Tuesday said that the world must display "zero tolerance" towards terrorism in all its forms and manifestations, asserting that there can be no justification, no looking away and "no whitewashing".

"As India has demonstrated, we have the right to defend our people against terrorism, and will exercise it," External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said in his address at the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) Council of Heads of Government meeting here.

Jaishankar said India believes that the SCO must "adapt to the changing global landscape, develop an expanded agenda, and reform its working methods". "We will contribute positively and fully to these objectives," he said.

The SCO was founded at a summit in Shanghai in 2001 by the presidents of Russia, China, the Kyrgyz Republic, Kazakhstan, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan.

India and Pakistan became its permanent members in 2017.

In July 2023, Iran became the new permanent member of the SCO at an India-hosted virtual summit of the grouping.

"We must never forget that the SCO was founded to combat the three evils of terrorism, separatism and extremism. These threats have become even more serious in the years that have passed," he said.

"It is imperative that the world displays zero tolerance towards terrorism in all its forms and manifestations. There can be no justification, no looking away and no whitewashing," the EAM said.

Jaishankar also emphasised on the prevailing economic situation globally and the importance of fostering greater cultural ties in the influential bloc. "We assess the global economic situation to be particularly uncertain and volatile currently. Supply side risks have been aggravated by demand side complexities. There is consequently an urgent requirement to de-risk and diversify. This is best done by as many of us, forging the widest possible economic links," he said.

For that to happen, it is essential that this process be "fair, transpar-



ent and equitable," the EAM said.

"India's endeavours to conclude free trade agreements with many of us here are relevant," Jaishankar said. And, India's long-standing ties with SCO members makes it particularly pertinent, he added.

"As a civilisational state, India strongly believes that people-to-people exchanges lie at the core of any genuine relationship. Facilitating greater interaction between our intellectuals, artists, sports people, and cultural icons will pave the way for greater understanding across the SCO," the external affairs minister said. He said there is a growing record of collaborative activities with regard to cultural exchanges.

The exposition of sacred Buddhist relics in many of the countries which are SCO members is a "notable example," he said.

India is also willing to extend its considerable experience of heritage conservation in Southeast Asia to Central Asia, Jaishankar said.

The theme of the session covered trade, economic, cultural and humanitarian cooperation.

Emphasising on humanitarian cooperation, the EAM also said this is important in an "era of climate change, pandemics and conflicts".

As SCO continues to evolve, India "strongly supports" its reform-oriented agenda.

"We welcome centres addressing challenges such as organised crime, drug trafficking, and cybersecurity. As the organisation becomes more diverse, the SCO must be more flexible and adaptable," the EAM added. (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

## SIR in Assam only after official NRC notification: Himanta

GUWAHATI, Nov 18: Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma stated on Tuesday that a comprehensive Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of the state's electoral rolls is contingent upon the official notification of the National Register of Citizens (NRC), a process he anticipates will be finalized by the middle of next year.

The Chief Minister's remarks clarify the procedural holdup in

undertaking a thorough cleanse of the voter list, a move deemed necessary to address persistent inaccuracies. He explained that the current electoral rolls are plagued by significant discrepancies that undermine their integrity.

Citing specific issues, Sarma pointed to the presence of names belonging to deceased individuals, minors ineligible to vote, and married women whose entries have not been updated to reflect changes in

their surnames or addresses. These errors, he indicated, highlight the urgent need for a systematic revision. "The NRC has not been notified yet," Sarma said, outlining the prerequisite for the SIR. "Once that is done — hopefully by mid-next year — the Special Intensive Revision can finally take place in Assam." In the interim, the Chief Minister confirmed that the Election Commission of India (ECI) has directed. (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

## Suicide bomber's brother gives in during quizzing

*Red Fort blast: Video glorifying suicide attack found in suicide bomber's phone*

NEW DELHI, Nov 18: Jammu and Kashmir Police have recovered a mobile phone of the Red Fort suicide bomber, Dr Umar-un-Nabi, and the extracted data has provided chilling evidence to show that he had prepared a video justifying the suicide attack as a "martyrdom operation".

The critical evidence was unearthed after the detention and subsequent interrogation of Zahoor Illahi, brother of Umar who was driving the explosive-laden car that blasted outside Red Fort on November 10 killing 15 people, officials said on Tuesday.

Illahi was picked up by a special

team formed by Senior Superintendent of Police (Srinagar) G V Sundeeep Chakravarty as the entire white-collar terror module conspiracy began to unravel.

Initially feigning ignorance, Illahi eventually cracked under sustained questioning and told his interrogators that Umar, who was in the Kashmir valley between October 26 and 29, had handed him the mobile phone with explicit instructions to "dump it in water" if any news about him surfaced, the officials said.

Illahi subsequently led the police team to the dumping spot. Though the

handset was damaged, forensic experts managed to extract the vital data, which strongly indicates Umar's deep radicalisation through exposure to violent extremist content that included watching radical videos pertaining to suicide bombings by the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria (ISIS) and Al-Qaeda.

Umar had also made various videos of himself talking about the suicide attack and claimed that such acts were one of the most praised acts in the religion. The videos were shot in April this year with Umar, the 28-year-old doctor from Pulwama in Kashmir, speaking in a heavy (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

## SFC Energy AG to purchase methanol from APL at ₹ 90,000 per ton

*APL of Narum signs landmark German export deal*

DIBRUGARH, Nov 18: In a major boost to Assam's industrial and export credentials, the Namrup-based Assam Petrochemicals Limited (APL) has signed a major export order with German renewable energy firm SFC Energy AG.

The deal involves the sale of 180 tons of methanol to the European company at a premium rate—marking a landmark accomplishment for the state-owned enterprise.

According to company sources, SFC Energy AG agreed to purchase methanol from APL at ₹90,000 per ton, compared to the Indian market price of around ₹ 25,000 per ton. The significant price gap highlights the purity and high-grade production quality of the methanol manufactured in APL's modern Namrup facility.

SFC Energy, which collaborates with India's FC TechNrgy in defense energy infrastructure, specializes in Direct Methanol

APL Chairman Bikul Deka described the agreement as a testament to the company's growing global reputation. "This successful

export deal reflects the recognition of Assam's methanol in the international market. The superior quality of our product has attracted global buyers willing to pay premium prices," Deka said.

He credited the achievement to the company's workforce and consistent focus on quality innovation. "Every worker at APL

# Stock markets halt 6-day rally; Nifty ends below 26,000-mark on profit taking

MUMBAI, Nov 18: Snapping the six-day winning streak, benchmark Sensex dropped by nearly 278 points and the Nifty closed below the 26,000-mark due to profit-taking in IT, metal and capital goods shares amid a weak trend in global markets.

The 30-share BSE Sensex declined by 277.93 points or 0.33 per cent to settle at 84,673.02. During the day, it dropped 392.59 points or 0.46 per cent to 84,558.36.

The 50-share NSE Nifty dipped 103.40 points or 0.40 per cent to 25,910.05. Among Sensex firms, Tech Mahindra, Infosys, Bajaj Finance, Bajaj Finserv, Etemal, Adani Ports, Hindustan Unilever and Bharat Electronics were the major laggards.

However, Bharti Airtel, Axis Bank, Asian Paints and Titan were among the gainers.

"The domestic equity market edged lower as investors booked profits after the recent rebound, mirroring weak global sentiment. Expectations of a US Fed rate cut in December have diminished, weighing on sentiment, with IT, metal, and realty stocks declining amid a stronger dollar," Vinod Nair, Head of Research, Geojit Investments Limited, said.

The BSE smallcap gauge dropped 0.85 per cent and midcap index declined 0.70 per cent.

Among sectoral indices, realty tanked 1.98 per cent, followed by BSE Focused IT (1.16 per cent), IT



(1.15 per cent), metal (1.07 per cent), commodities (0.95 per cent) and industrials (0.93 per cent).

Consumer Durables index emerged as the only gainer.

A total of 2,740 stocks declined while 1,463 advanced and 138 remained unchanged on the BSE.

In Asian markets, South Korea's Kospi, Japan's Nikkei 225 index, Shanghai's SSE Composite index, and Hong Kong's Hang Seng index settled sharply lower.

"A sharp sell-off in global equities, driven by concerns over stretched valuations in the technology sector, sparked broad-based profit booking on the domestic bourses as well. However, Indian markets managed to limit their losses, especially when compared with over 3 per cent declines witnessed in Japan's Nikkei and South Korea's Kospi.

## You'll hear good news on India-US trade deal once it's fair: Goyal

NEW DELHI, Nov 18: Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal on Tuesday said "you will hear a good news" on the proposed trade pact between India and the US once the deal is fair, equitable and balanced. He said that India will also protect the interests of farmers and fishermen in the agreement.

Negotiation for a trade agreement is a process and India as a nation has to secure the interests of farmers, fishermen and small industry, he said at the Indo-US Economic Summit, organised by Indo-American Chamber of Commerce here.

"...India as a nation has to secure its interests. Have to secure the interests of our stakeholders, businesses and balance it with our sensitivities with the farmers, with the fishermen, with small industries.

When we find the right balance, rest assured we will get outcomes on this...When the deal will become fair, equitable and balanced, you will hear good news," Goyal said.

India and the US have been negotiating the proposed bilateral trade agreement since March. So far six rounds of negotiations have been completed.

Goyal added that there is no reason to be worried about the bilateral relations between the two countries.

"Pariwaar mein kabhee kabhee thodee bohot nok-jhok toh hotee rahatee hai (sometimes there is a bit of bickering in the family also)," he said, adding, "I do not believe there is any hiatus in the relationship." (PTI)

Subsequently, seven people, including festival organiser Shyamkanu Mahanta, his manager Siddhartha Sharma, his cousin Sandipan Garg, musician Shekhar Jyoti Goswami, singer Amritprabha Mahanta and two Personal Security Officers (PSO), were arrested in this connection. Sarma had said in October that the charge sheet by the SIT will be submitted within the stipulated period of three months and the investigations were proceeding on expected lines. The Assam government is very serious about Zubeen Garg's death and "we will definitely ensure justice to him and nobody will be spared in that context", he said. Usually, three months of time is given to submit a charge sheet and the police will not take more time than that to ensure that, the CM said.

He said that the SIT has assured him that investigations will be completed by the end of November and the chargesheet will be submitted most likely in the first week of December. The Assam cabinet had also recently decided that the state government will request the Gauhati High Court for a fast-track court to decide and deliver justice on Zubeen Garg's death case.

"There is usually a complaint that the courts take a long time to deliver justice and so the state cabinet has decided to approach the Chief Justice of the Gauhati High Court for a fast track hearing into the case after the Special Investigating team submits its chargesheet," Sarma said. The Assam cabinet has also decided to appoint a Special Public Prosecutor on the recommendation of the state Advocate General who will be engaged only for the hearing of the case from the filing of the charge sheet to the delivery of justice. (PTI)

visits and the head of the family or a competent member will verify the number and names of eligible voters in that household. In case of death, the voter's name will be deleted, and for inclusion of a new name, forms will be provided by the BLO, which have to be filled up and submitted within the stipulated time.

"Under SR, existing voters do not have to show any documentary evidence. The verification by the head of the family or competent member will suffice. For new voters, the document showing linkage with an existing voter will suffice," Goel said. Asked about voting rights of people evicted during recent anti-encroachment drives in the state, the CEO said they can enroll themselves in the new place of residence. "Wherever a person is currently residing, they can enroll themselves there by producing the previous Electors Photo Identity Card (EPIC). Even a person who may have come to Assam recently and will be staying here for a prolonged period, can enroll themselves through the same process," he said.

Goel added that the onus remains on the voter to get their name struck off from the list where they were previously enrolled. A software is used to detect duplication of voters through checking of names and photographs by the EC within a state, but a margin of error remains, he said. He also highlighted the provision for appealing against wrongful exclusion or inclusion of names from the voter list and urged the people to use it. Goel further said that 29,656 BLOs - one against each existing polling station - have been appointed, while 61,553 booth-level agents (BLAs) of political parties will accompany them for smooth conduct of the exercise.

With rationalisation of polling stations scheduled to be undertaken, another 1,826 polling stations are likely to be added in the state, he said. The CEO also clarified that 'D-voters' (doubtful voters) will not be covered under the SR, with the state currently having 94,277 such names. (PTI)

This measure is intended as a corrective step to identify and rectify the existing anomalies in the voter list ahead of the more extensive NRC-linked exercise. The announcement underscores the state government's ongoing efforts to ensure the accuracy and reliability of Assam's electoral database.

The Election Commission of India on Monday announced that Assam will undergo a Special Revision of its electoral rolls, an exercise that will culminate in the publication of the final voters' list on February 10, 2026. The decision comes at a time when the state is moving toward the 2026 Assembly elections and the accuracy of the electoral roll remains central to political discourse in Assam. According to officials, the process ordered for Assam is neither a routine annual summary revision nor as exhaustive as the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) conducted recently in several other states. It sits "somewhere in between," with the Election Commission opting for a more targeted and improved verification mechanism. Instead of using blank enumeration forms, booth-level officers will work with pre-filled registers to confirm, correct or update voter details, which the Commission believes will reduce errors and speed up verification.

## Gauhati HC grants bail to doctor

The wife's counsel NJ Dutta submitted before the court that various provisions of the law at the time arrest were not followed by the police while taking his client into custody. He also claimed that his client has been incarcerated for a long time and expressed doubt that the trial will progress at a "reasonable speed".

Dutta pointed that the FIR in the case was lodged on May 5, 2023, charge-sheet filed on July 7 the same year, charges framed on June 24, 2024, and till the filing of the bail application, only 15 witnesses out of total 74 had been examined. He cited previous judicial pronouncements which provided for discouraging long incarceration of an accused facing trial. Justice Kalita also took into consideration that Dutta's husband and co-accused has been granted bail by a co-ordinate bench in the same case on October 28.

"...this Court is of the considered opinion that a case has been made out by the accused applicant for her release on bail," the judgment said. "Accordingly, it is directed that the accused applicant, Dr Sangeeta Dutta, shall be released on bail in connection with Sessions (Special) Case No. 112/2023, on furnishing a bail bond of ₹ 1,00,000 only, with two local sureties of the like amount (one of whom shall be a Government Servant residing within the State of Assam), to the satisfaction of the learned Trial Court," it added.

The court also set certain conditions for Dutta's bail, including surrendering her passport, Aadhaar and PAN cards before the trial court, cooperating with the trial process and not misusing her liberty by indulging in any activity that may hamper or tamper with the progress of the case. (PTI)

## NFR boosts renewable energy with 11.95 MWp solar installations

Northeast Frontier Railway generates 8.98 lakh units monthly, saving ₹ 66 lakh

**GUWAHATI, Nov 18:** Northeast Frontier Railway (NFR) is steadily enhancing its renewable energy capacity with a cumulative 11.95 MWp of rooftop solar installations across key stations, offices, workshops and service buildings in its five divisions—Katihar, Alipurduar, Rangiya, Lumding and Tin-

sukia—since 2011. The initiative also covers NFR headquarters at Maligaon and its workshops, forming a key part of Indian Railways' green energy mission.

During the current financial year till October 31, 2025, NFR added 2.80 MWp of solar capacity at multiple locations in the zone. These installations generate an av-

erage of approximately 8.98 lakh units of solar energy per month, translating into estimated monthly savings of ₹ 66 lakh.

To further strengthen its renewable energy footprint, NFR is executing projects to enhance solar generation capacity to 38 MWp across all five divisions, including its headquarters and workshops. Plans are also in final stages for an additional 1.73 MWp of solar plants at NFR headquarters.

NFR continues to expand solar power projects under both CAPEX and RESCO models, aiming to increase clean energy utilisation, reduce carbon emissions and achieve significant cost savings. With strategic planning and continuous monitoring, the railway is progressing toward an energy-efficient and environmentally sustainable network in the North-eastern region.

## Vocational training centre abandoned for over 30 years

**DALGAON, Nov 18:** A government-run Vocational Training Centre for Animal Husbandry and Veterinary Sciences in Dalgaon has remained locked and abandoned for more than three decades, residents say, gradually becoming a hotspot for anti-social activities.

The centre was established during the tenure of former Chief Minister Syeda Anowara Taimur to provide skill-based employment opportunities for local youth. While it functioned for a few initial years, it was abruptly closed for reasons never officially explained.

Despite multiple electoral terms and successive MLAs—including Abdul Jabbar, Ilias Ali and the current representative Mazibur Rahman—no visible effort has been made to revive the facility, locals allege. Today, the building is in ruins, overgrown with weeds, filled with debris and reportedly used for gambling, drug use and other illegal activities after sunset.

"This centre could have produced hundreds of skilled veterinary assistants and livestock experts by now. Instead, it has become a den of vice," said a senior resident, requesting anonymity.

## Peerless Hospital organises health check-up camp for female students

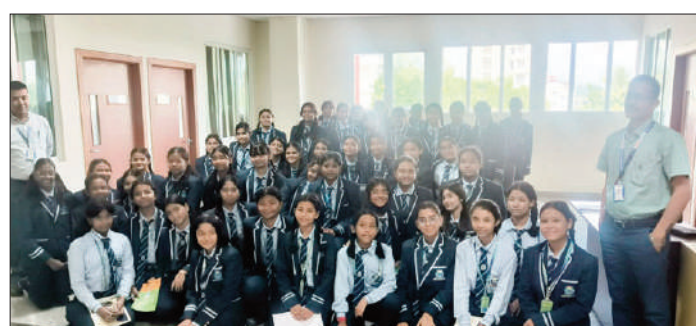
Initiative focuses on hygiene, nutrition and preventive healthcare for adolescent girls

## Tea tribes demand scheduled tribe status

**MARGHERITA, Nov 18:** Gautam Dhanowar, president of the Margherita branch of the Assam Chah Mazdoor Sangha (ACMS) has accused both the Assam state and BJP-led Union governments of repeatedly denying Scheduled Tribe (ST) status to the Adivasi and Tea Tribes community, calling it a "deeply unfortunate and historic injustice."

Speaking to the media, Dhanowar said the community has lived, worked and contributed to Assam for over 200 years, especially in tea gardens that built the state's economy and enhanced India's global reputation. Despite this, he said, the community remains marginalised, exploited and deprived of basic rights and opportunities.

Dhanowar highlighted that the Adivasi and Tea Tribes are descendants of tribal workers brought from Jharkhand, Odisha, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh and West Bengal during British rule. While these communities enjoy full ST benefits in neighboring states, including reservations in education, employment and political representation, Assam has consistently denied them similar recognition. He also criticised the Coordina-



tion Committee of the Tribal Organisations of Assam (CTOA) for opposing the demand, accusing certain groups of playing "dirty politics" to keep the community marginalised for electoral gains. Dhanowar recalled that Tea Tribes were denied voting rights in Gaon Panchayat elections until 1992, emphasising that decades of broken promises continue to fuel frustration.

Drawing a comparison with other states, he asked why Assam continues to withhold ST recognition from communities that fulfill all constitutional criteria.

Dhanowar urged both the Union and Assam governments to immediately initiate the process for granting ST status to the six notified Tea and Adivasi communities in the state, warning that further delays would deepen the sense of betrayal among millions of workers.

With assembly elections approaching, the renewed demand for ST status is expected to become a key electoral issue in more than 40 constituencies dominated by tea garden workers, putting fresh pressure on the ruling governments to act on a long-standing promise.

## Bihar poll outcome

When the votes were counted in Bihar's 2025 assembly elections, the result was unambiguous: The Bharatiya Janata Party and Janata Dal (United) alliance had secured 202 of 243 seats, decimating an opposition that just months earlier had harboured hopes of unseating the incumbents. The landslide victory wasn't merely about numbers. It represented a sophisticated recalibration of Indian state politics, where traditional caste calculations gave way to welfare promises, where memories of past chaos outweighed present grievances, and where women voters emerged as kingmakers. At the campaign's center stood an unlikely but effective duo: Narendra Modi, India's prime minister and the BJP's national face, and Nitish Kumar, Bihar's chief minister whose political longevity has survived multiple alliance shifts. Together, they created a narrative of competence that the opposition struggled to counter. Modi brought national gravitas and sharp campaign messaging, linking Kumar's state-level achievements to his government's broader development agenda. The partnership transcended mere political convenience: The BJP and JD(U) contested seats on equal terms, signalling genuine power-sharing rather than a dominant party accommodating a junior partner.

The National Democratic Alliance's success began with meticulous seat-sharing arrangements. Rather than the destructive internal competition that has plagued other coalitions, the NDA parcelled out constituencies based on each party's strengths. The BJP, JD(U), and smaller partners like the Lok Janshakti Party and Hindustani Awam Morcha avoided overlapping candidacies and pooled resources strategically. This discipline created a unified electoral front that contrasted sharply with the opposition's fragmented approach. While the Mahagathbandhan — the grand alliance of opposition parties — bickered over seat allocations and positioning, the NDA projected cohesion and purpose. Perhaps no campaign theme proved more potent than invoking "Jungle Raj" — the lawlessness that characterized Lalu Prasad Yadav's rule in the 1990s and early 2000s. Modi and Kumar repeatedly warned that opposition victory would return Bihar to those chaotic years, when kidnappings, extortion and caste violence were rampant. The irony wasn't lost on observers: This election was among the most peaceful in Bihar's recent history. Yet the narrative resonated with voters old enough to remember that era and young voters whose parents had lived through it. For an electorate craving stability, the NDA positioned itself as the only credible bulwark against a return to disorder.

## Sheikh Hasina's Fall, Bangladesh's Future

Bangladesh has rarely been out of the headlines since the summer of 2024, and for good reason. What started as a student protest against job quotas turned into one of the fastest and most dramatic political upheavals in South Asia's recent history. By August 2024, Sheikh Hasina, who had ruled the country for fifteen straight years and a total of twenty years across different terms, was forced to flee to India on a military helicopter. A few months later, in November 2025, a special tribunal in Dhaka sentenced her to death in absentia for crimes against humanity linked to the violent crackdown on those very protests. Her former home minister, Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal, received the same sentence. An entire era seemed to close with the stroke of a judge's pen.

To understand how Bangladesh reached this point, we have to go back a little. Sheikh Hasina is the daughter of Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, the founding father of the nation who was assassinated in a military coup in 1975 along with most of his family. Hasina and her sister survived only because they were abroad at the time. That tragedy shaped her life and her politics. When she finally returned and entered politics, many saw her as the natural heir to her father's legacy. Her party, the Awami League, won landslide victories in 2008, 2014, 2018, and 2024, though the later elections were heavily criticised for rigging and the exclusion of opposition candidates.

Under her leadership the country changed in visible ways. High-rise buildings rose in Dhaka, new bridges and metro lines were built, garment exports kept growing, and millions were lifted out of extreme poverty. Bangladesh was often praised as an economic miracle, growing faster than many bigger neighbours. Yet the other side of the story grew darker with every passing year. Critics were jailed under the Digital Security Act, journalists disappeared, and oppo-

sition rallies were routinely attacked. By 2024 many young people felt the country was moving forward economically but sliding backward democratically.

The spark came in June and July 2024. Students demanded the reform of a quota system that reserved thirty percent of government jobs for the children and grandchildren of freedom fighters from the 1971 Liberation War. They said the system had become a tool for the ruling party to reward loyalists. At first the protests were peaceful, but when the government responded with tear gas, rubber bullets, and finally live ammunition, everything exploded. Images of bloodied students filled social media. The government cut internet access for days, but the anger only grew. Helicopters and even drones were reportedly used against protesters in some areas. Estimates of the death toll range from three hundred to over a thousand, depending on the source. In the end the army refused to fire on civilians any longer, and on 5 August Hasina left the country.

What followed was both hopeful and chaotic. An interim government was formed under Muhammad Yunus, the Nobel Peace Prize winner famous for microcredit and Grameen Bank. At seventy-four years old, Yunus was an unlikely revolutionary, yet students and much of the public trusted him because he had stayed out of party politics for decades. His job is enormous: hold fair elections, rebuild broken institutions, calm a polarised society, and keep the economy from collapsing.

The death sentence handed to Hasina and her home minister in November 2025 was meant to bring closure to the families of those killed. The tribunal accused them of ordering the lethal force used in July and August 2024. Many Bangladeshis celebrated the verdict as justice finally being

run round the clock have cut shifts because foreign buyers are nervous about instability. Inflation is high, the currency has lost value, and foreign reserves are lower than they have been in years. Remittances from millions of Bangladeshis working abroad are still coming in, but many families are struggling to buy basic food. Yunus has promised reforms: a new voter list, an independent election commission, and changes to the constitution to prevent any future leader from becoming too powerful. He says elections will be held by the end of 2026 at the latest, but first he wants the country calm enough for a credible vote.

Politics is slowly reorganising itself. The Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP), the main opposition for decades, is trying to make a comeback after years of repression. Its leader Khaleda Zia is old and frail, but her son Tarique Rahman, living in London, is active behind the scenes. New student-based parties have also emerged, promising a complete break from the old guard. Islamist groups like Jamaat-e-Islami, banned under Hasina, are registering again and gaining visibility. Whether all these forces can compete peacefully remains the biggest question.

For ordinary people the mood swings between hope and fear. A young university student in Dhaka told a foreign reporter, "We removed a dictator, but now we are scared of the vacuum." A garment worker in Chittagong said, "I marched in August because I wanted freedom. Today I just want my factory to reopen so I can feed my children." An elderly man who lived through the 1971 war worries that the country is once again tearing itself apart over revenge instead of building something new.

Muhammad Yunus keeps repeating that this is Bangladesh's "second independence." He asks people to be patient, to forgive but not forget, and to work together. It is a tall order. The scars of 2024 are still fresh, and the death sentence against Hasina has reopened many wounds rather than healing them. Yet there is also a sense of possi-



bility that was missing for years. Young people who coordinated protests through WhatsApp groups and TikTok videos now talk about rewriting the constitution themselves. Women who marched in the streets refused to go back to silence. Bangladesh today is a country in transition, raw, noisy, and uncertain. It has shown the world that even long-entrenched leaders can be brought down by the courage of ordinary citizens, especially students who decided they had enough. At the same time it is a warning that revolutions are easier to start than to finish. The next twelve to eighteen months will decide whether this dramatic chapter ends in a stronger democracy or in new cycles of anger and authoritarianism.

For now, millions of Bangladeshis are watching, waiting, and trying to believe that the price paid in blood last year will one day be worth it. They hope the country can find a way to punish those responsible for past crimes without becoming trapped in endless revenge. They want elections that everyone accepts, an economy that works for the poor, and a society where no one has to live in fear because of their political beliefs or religion. It is a simple dream, but after everything that has happened, it feels further away than ever, and closer than it has ever been.

## Education as a Tool for Breaking Social

Education stands as one of the most powerful forces capable of transforming societies, reshaping human consciousness, and dismantling the entrenched barriers that divide people along lines of caste, class, gender, religion, or ethnicity. It is more than an academic process or a means to secure employment—it is a social instrument that nurtures equality, dignity, and progress. Thinkers like John Dewey emphasized that education should cultivate democratic values and empower individuals to participate actively in society. Similarly, in India, reformers like Raja Ram Mohan Roy, Ishwar Chandra Vidyasagar, Jyotirao Phule, and Dr. B.R. Ambedkar envisioned education as the ultimate weapon to fight oppression and social discrimination.

The transformative potential of education is most evident in its ability to change the mindset of individuals and communities. Ignorance breeds prejudice, while knowledge opens the door to empathy and understanding. When people are educated, they begin to question inherited biases and challenge unjust structures. Education provides the cognitive tools to analyze one's surroundings critically and the moral foundation to act against injustice. A literate woman, for instance, not only changes her own life trajectory but also influences her family and community. Studies across the globe have shown that when women are educated, social indicators such as health, sanitation, and child welfare improve dramatically. Thus, education is not merely about reading and writing; it is about cultivating awareness and agency.

The historical evolution of education in India provides a profound example of its power to disrupt social hierarchies. During the colonial era, education became both a tool of control and an instrument of awakening. The British introduced English education primarily to create clerical workers loyal to the colonial administration. Leaders like Mahatma Gandhi, Jawaharlal Nehru, Rabindranath Tagore, and Ambedkar recognized that education could not remain confined to the elite if India was to progress as a nation. Gandhi's concept of "Nai Talim" or basic education emphasized learning through productive work and moral instruction, while Tagore's Santiniketan blended freedom of thought with cultural awareness, laying the foundation for an education system that was deeply humanistic.

Despite constitutional guarantees, access to quality education remains uneven in modern India. Although Article 21A and the Right to Education Act of 2009 mandate free and compulsory education for children aged 6 to 14, disparities persist across regions and social groups. The digital divide has further widened inequalities, with rural and marginalized communities struggling to access online education during the pandemic. Nevertheless, the expansion of literacy and the establishment of inclusive educational policies have had far-reaching impacts. Schemes promoting girl-child education, reservation in higher education for Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, and Other Backward Classes, and initiatives like mid-day meals have contributed to a gradual breaking down of social barriers. Schools have increasingly become spaces where children from diverse backgrounds learn together, share experiences, and develop a sense of collective identity that transcends caste or class distinctions.

Education also plays a pivotal role in fostering gender equality. Historically, women were denied education on the pretext of traditional norms and patriarchal values. Their exclusion from the learning process perpetuated economic dependence and social subordination. Today, however, education has empowered women to occupy leadership positions across professions and public life. The rising literacy rates among women have resulted in greater participation in politics, entrepreneurship, and community development. Female education has been directly linked to the decline in child marriage, improvement in maternal health, and reduction in domestic violence. When a woman is educated, she becomes not just an individual learner but a catalyst for social transformation. Education thus becomes a silent revolution against centuries of gender oppression. Moreover, education fosters social cohesion by cultivating tolerance and respect for diversity. In a multicultural country like India, where linguistic, religious, and cultural differences coexist, education acts as a unifying thread. Schools and universities are microcosms of society where students from different communities interact and exchange ideas. This interaction helps dismantle stereotypes and encourages inclusive thinking. The values of secularism, democracy, and fraternity enshrined in the Constitution can only flourish when individuals understand and internalize them through education. Ultimately, education's greatest contribution lies in fostering empathy and moral awareness. A truly educated person does not merely possess degrees or skills but understands the value of justice, equality, and human dignity. Education must teach individuals to respect differences, to challenge injustice, and to act with compassion. It must awaken the conscience of society. When education succeeds in doing this, it becomes the strongest weapon against ignorance and intolerance. It is through this moral awakening that societies can move toward harmony and collective progress.

The dream of a just and equitable world depends on how effectively education is used as an instrument of social transformation. Every classroom has the potential to be a site of liberation, every book a key to freedom, and every student a future agent of change. The barriers that divide humanity—whether of caste, gender, race, or wealth—are not immutable. # Nagas urge Centre, Naga negotiators to deliver early political solution



**DIMAPUR, Nov 18:** The Naga Common Platform (NCP) on Tuesday passed three resolutions, including an early and comprehensive solution to the long-pending Naga political issue. The NCP passed the three resolutions unanimously at the stakeholders' rally organised by Nagaland Gaon Buras Federation (NGBF) in collaboration with various apex civil society organisations at Agri Expo, Chumoukedima. The Naga Common Platform expressed full support for the land-

mark agreements signed between the Government of India, the NSCN (IM), and the Working Committee of the Naga National Political Groups (WC NNPGs) in 2015 and 2017, respectively. They urged the Centre to deliver a political settlement based on the Framework Agreement and the Agreed Position to ensure lasting peace in Nagaland. The NCP remarked that a century of political struggle and 28 years of negotiation have burdened the people, and called on both the Government of India and Naga ne-

gotiators to heed stakeholders' voices and bring the talks to their logical conclusion. The three-point resolutions were signed by Shikuto Zalipu, Convener of the NCP Organising Committee; secretaries Akhu Naga and Zanbenthung Ezung; along with several other Naga leaders. Despite calls from several tribal apex bodies not to attend, thousands converged at the venue for the rally. The Nagaland Tribal Hohos Coordination Committee (NTHCC) had earlier announced its decision

to abstain from the event, stating that forming a parallel platform could undermine ongoing reconciliation efforts among Naga stakeholders.

The NTHCC, which includes the Angami Public Organisation, Ao Senden, Chakhesang Public Organisation, Lotha Hoho, Pochury Hoho, Rengma Hoho, Sümi Hoho and the Nagaland Zeliang People's Organisation, reaffirmed its commitment to unity and a collective political future for the Naga people.

Meanwhile, addressing the gathering, organising committee member K K Sema underscored the need for a unified, transparent and inclusive platform to resolve the Indo-Naga political issue.

He expressed concern over fragmentation within the Naga movement, the rise of multiple illicit taxations by various groups, and the lack of transparency in negotiations.

Sema appealed to the NSCN (IM) to be forthright with the Naga public, stating that their future cannot be decided in secrecy.

Several other speakers echoed the demand for an early and honourable solution, highlighting the urgency of ending the prolonged political stalemate. (PTI)

# Thousands rally in Kohima for justice; submits memo addressed to CM in woman murder case

**KOHIMA, Nov 18:** Thousands of people from all walks of life on Tuesday converged at Police Headquarters in Nagaland's capital, Kohima, demanding capital punishment or life imprisonment for the accused in the brutal murder of a 22-year-old woman on October 24.

The peaceful protest rally, organised by the Southern Angami Youth Organisation (SAYO)—to which the woman belonged—saw participants wearing traditional tribal attire and holding placards and banners calling for justice.

Leaders representing several organisations addressed the gathering, including Porutso Khel (sector) of Jakhama village, the victim's native village; Jakhama Youth Organisation; Southern Angami Women Organisation; Angami Youth Organisation; Angami Women Organisation; Western Angami Youth Organisation; Northern Angami Youth Organisation; and Chakroma Youth Organisation.

They condemned the heinous crime and supported the call for swift justice and stronger protections for women.

Speakers also mourned the loss of a promising young athlete who had represented both district and state basketball teams, and who was also a brilliant economics topper.

The rallyists marched nearly 3 km from PHQ junction to the Deputy Commissioner's office, where representatives of SAYO and the Southern Angami people submitted a memorandum addressed to Chief Minister Neiphiu Rio through the DC Kohima.

They sought urgent and decisive action in the case, stating that the murder had "shaken the conscience of the entire community" and intensified fear among women and girls.

The memorandum described the murder as "inhuman and unacceptable" and urged the highest level of state for intervention.



SAYO acknowledged the arrest of one accused—Samuel, the victim's adopted uncle—but demanded that all persons connected to the crime, directly or indirectly, be identified, arrested, and interrogated without delay. No perpetrator or accomplice must remain at large, it said.

The organisation sought the "strictest and most deterrent punishment" under the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS) 2023, urging an uncompromising prosecution to send a powerful message against crimes targeting women.

Citing the gravity of the crime and the potential threat to witnesses and society, the memorandum asked authorities to oppose bail applications at every stage. It urged that no accused be released on bail until justice is fully delivered and discouraged anyone from attempting to bail out the accused.

The organisation stated it would continue its stand until justice is delivered and concrete safety mechanisms are put in place. It urged the government to prioritise the matter and ensure timely action as the case progresses with the State authorities. (PTI)

## Opposition VPP demands audit of funds allotted to MLAs in Meghalaya

**SHILLONG, Nov 18:** Opposition Voice of the People Party (VPP) president Ardent M Basaiawmoit on Tuesday sought an independent inquiry into the implementation of MLAs' schemes in Meghalaya.

He urged the state government to constitute the probe immediately and begin the investigation from 2008, starting with his constituency in East Khasi Hills district.

In a letter addressed to the chief minister, Basaiawmoit said he was responding to the CM's recent remarks expressing concern over the manner in which MLA schemes are implemented, particularly in constituencies represented by those in the opposition.

Basaiawmoit said he appreciated the chief minister's apprehensions and fully endorsed the view that MLA schemes must be utilised transparently and effectively.

He added that the VPP, a new political party formed by him in 2022 with four MLAs, had already issued instructions to all its legislators to ensure transparent implementation of schemes.

The MLA scheme in Meghalaya involves substantial public funds, including the annual MLA Local Area Development Scheme allocation of over Rs 2 crore each over and above the Discretionary Grant (DG).

Each MLA receives Rs 10 lakh a year under the DG, meant for urgent or welfare-related assistance. A CAG report had earlier flagged gaps in accountability, noting that utilisation certificates for over Rs 10 crore in DG funds remained unsubmitted over the years in the state.

Drawing from the CM's statement, Basaiawmoit said an independent inquiry was essential to inform the public and restore trust in the system. The investigation, he suggested, should begin with projects sanctioned since 2008 in Nongkrem before covering other constituencies across the state.

He expressed hope that the government would consider the demand seriously in the interest of transparency and public confidence. (PTI)

## Meghalaya: 2 women in critical condition after drunken guard rams car into them

**SHILLONG, Nov 18:** Two students of North Eastern Hill University (NEHU) here were critically injured after a drunken guard of the institution rammed a car into them, an official said on Tuesday.

The incident took place around 7 pm on Monday near gate number 2 of the campus.

The guard was driving a car in an intoxicated condition and he lost control of the vehicle, he said. The car first hit a parked scooter before veering towards the gate and hitting the two students, identified as Daritngem Pohdukhei and Stephanie Shadap, both from the Chemistry Department.

CCTV footage showed the vehicle speeding towards the students as they were walking along the road moments before the impact, the official said. (PTI)

## 366 brokers arrested in three years

# Infiltration along Tripura's international border sees sharp decline

**AGARTALA, Nov 18:** Illegal infiltration into Tripura from Bangladesh has dropped significantly since June 2025, according to a statement issued by the Superintendent of Police (Police Control).

Tripura, which shares an 856-km international border with Bangladesh, has witnessed a notable reduction in cross-border movement following intensified surveillance and targeted operations against border brokers and their networks.

Sources said security forces have arrested 366 brokers and accomplices over the last three years under various legal provisions. Authorities have also registered multiple cases against individuals involved in forging documents and facilitating the movement of illegal immigrants.

"The combined efforts of the Police and the Border Security Force (BSF) have been crucial in dismantling the infiltration network. The BSF continues to maintain strict vigilance along the border, while personnel of the Tripura State Rifles (TSR) have been instructed to enhance coordination on the issue," police officials stated.

To strengthen monitoring beyond border areas, plainclothes security personnel have been deployed at Agartala's Maharaja Bir Bikram (MBB) Airport, major railway stations, and key bus terminals.

The Special Branch has also been directed to share intelligence inputs related to infiltration without delay. Acting on such information, authorities have recently arrested several Bangladeshi and Rohingya infiltrators, along with Indian brokers allegedly involved in assisting them.

Officials emphasized that sustained cooperation among the state police, BSF, and intelligence agencies will be essential to maintaining the recent progress in curbing illegal infiltration.

During the inaugural programme, Project-PI, Prof. Khan Chand, provided a brief overview of the project and the benefits of eco-friendly banana fibres. Drawing on his extensive experience in food processing, he elucidated the journey of banana fibre from extraction to marketable product.

A total of 25 local farmers participated in the inaugural session. The importance of adopting sustainable, innovative technologies in agriculture to uplift rural farmers was stressed at the programme.

The interactive session underscored the potential of banana fiber as an eco-friendly alternative for various

industries and inspired participants to embrace new skills for economic growth.

During the training, they were given hands-on training designed to teach them the efficient extraction of banana fibre and the sequential processes required to convert this natural resource into marketable products. This initiative aims to enhance value addition and generate alternative livelihoods for the farming community. Such programmes are aimed at bridging the gap between advanced scientific research and its practical application at the grassroots level, thereby fostering community development and entrepreneurship among local farmers.

## Nagaland University develops high-yield ginger variety to boost farmers' income

**NEW DELHI, Nov 18:** Nagaland University researchers have developed a new ginger variety 'SAS-KEVU' that consistently delivers superior yield, dry matter recovery and culinary quality, making it a high-value option for farmers, fresh produce market and spice-processing industry, according to officials.

The SAS-KEVU has been formally notified by the Sub-Committee on Crop Standards, Notification and Release of Varieties (Horticultural Crops), Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare and published in the Gazette of India

Taken up under the All India Co-ordinated Research Project (AICRP) on Spices, located in Nagaland University, SAS-KEVU emerged after nearly a decade of scientific evaluation and extensive multi-location testing across seven AICRP centres in India.

"This landmark achievement is the result of nine years of rigorous, co-ordinated national trials carried out by our dedicated team of scientists in collaboration with partner institutions. 'SAS-KEVU' has been specifically developed to deliver higher yields, improved quality, and greater resilience, offering farmers a reliable



variety that can substantially enhance their incomes," said Jagadish K Patnaik, Vice Chancellor, Nagaland University.

According to C S Maiti, Professor at Nagaland University, the variety's journey began in 2014, when 19 clones of the local Nadia ginger were collected from growing areas of Nagaland and studied in detail for their morphological and biochemical traits. From these, the clone NDG-11

-- later named SAS-KEVU -- was identified as the strongest performer. "With a yield potential of 17.21 tonnes per hectare, SAS-KEVU outperformed the national check variety by more than 9 per cent in national demonstrations. Its dry recovery rate of 21.95 per cent offers a strong advantage for processors looking for higher output during drying.

"The rhizomes exhibit a soft texture, bold size and lemon-yellow

flesh with significantly lower fibre, enhancing both consumer appeal and suitability for pickles, beverages, culinary use and value-added products," Maiti said.

The researchers explained that food processing industry users will benefit from SAS-KEVU's moderate oil content and pulpy bold rhizomes, which aligns well with requirements for candy and ginger paste.

For farmers, the variety's combination of high yield, high market acceptance and desirable rhizome traits translates into improved returns per hectare. The crop matures in nine months fitting seamlessly into the production cycles of regions where ginger is traditionally grown.

"With the Central Government's notification under the Seeds Act, 1966, SAS-KEVU is now approved for seed production and agricultural sale in Nagaland, Mizoram, West Bengal and Andhra Pradesh.

"The variety, which is the first crop variety was developed by AICRP (Spices) team from Nagaland University and also recorded as first Ginger variety from the research institute of North East States in India," said Graceli I Yephomi, Assistant Professor, Department of Horticulture, School of Agricultural Sciences. (PTI)

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# ED raids against Al Falah University, linked persons in Red Fort blast case

**NEW DELHI, Nov 18:** The Enforcement Directorate on Tuesday conducted simultaneous searches in Delhi-NCR against the trustees and promoters of Al Falah University of Faridabad, the varsity central to the Red Fort area car blast case, officials said.

Multiple teams of the federal probe agency raided at least 25 premises of the Al Falah trust and University establishment since 5:15 am, they said.

Teams of the agency raided an office location in Delhi's Okhla area with a security cordon being provided by the police and paramilitary forces.

Fifteen persons have been killed in the blast that took place on November 10 near the iconic monument in Delhi and the role of a number of doctors linked to the University and in Kashmir is under the scanner of the anti-terror probe agencies.

"The operation forms part of an ongoing investigation into financial irregularities, use of shell companies, accommodation entities and money laundering. The role of Al-Falah Trust and related entities is under investigation," an ED official said.



The official said "key" personnel overseeing finance and administration of the trust and the University have also been covered in the raids.

The agency has taken cognisance of the first information reports filed by the NIA and the Delhi Police in the case. Till now, the NIA has arrested two persons, stated to be

the alleged close aides of "suicide bomber" Dr Umar Nabi.

At least nine shell (dummy) companies linked to the group, all registered at a single address, are under the examination of the ED, according to the officials.

Preliminary findings point to multiple "risk" indicators consistent with shell-com-

pany behaviour like no physical presence or meaningful utility consumption at declared places of business and common mobile number and email across various companies and accounts.

The ED investigators have also found absence of EPFO/ESIC filings inconsistent with reported scale of operations and overlapping of directors/signatories and weak KYC trails across entities.

Instances of minimal salary disbursement through banking channels and absence of HR (human resource) records part from synchronised incorporation patterns and common contact coordinates across firms have been detected at the varsity, the officials said.

In addition, prima facie discrepancies have been noted in claims regarding UGC and NAAC recognition which indicate alleged non-compliance to norms established for educational institutions, the officials said.

The Al Falah varsity is located in the Dhauj area of Haryana's Faridabad district, and it is a medical college-cum-hospital. (PTI)

# JD(U) would have won less than 25 seats had it not given ₹ 10,000 to women: Kishor



**PATNA, Nov 18:** Jan Suraj Party leader Prashant Kishor on Tuesday claimed that Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar's JD(U) would have been limited to just 25 seats had his government not given ₹ 10,000 to over 60,000 beneficiaries in each constituency just before the assembly elections and promised ₹ 2 lakh to 1.5 crore women across the state under a self-employment scheme.

He accused the NDA government of promising ₹ 40,000 crore of people's money, and rolling out a large chunk of it just ahead of the elections.

Addressing a press conference here, Kishor said that his Jan Suraj Party made an honest effort to make people understand the issues facing them but failed to make a mark in the polls, and that he took full responsibility for the debacle.

"None of our candidates is going to the assembly. People's mandate for us is to go among the people and struggle," he said.

Citing an English phrase, he said, "You are not defeated until you quit."

"We may have made mistakes, but have not committed the crime of doing divisive politics and buying the votes of the innocent people," he added.

Kishor also alleged that 'vote chori' (theft of votes) is a pan-India issue, and urged national opposition parties to hold deliberations on the matter and move the Supreme Court, if needed.

"We received a setback, but we will rectify the mistakes, build ourselves and come back stronger... there is no going back for us," he asserted.

On the question whether he failed to understand Bihar, he said, "Yes, I failed to understand Bihar, unlike Nitish Kumar, BJP leader Samrat Choudhary and others who divided people on caste and religious lines and bought votes of people using money."

"To not get votes is not a crime... at least I have not indulged in corruption or divisive politics," he said.

Kishor said he would "definitely quit" politics if the NDA government fulfils its poll promise and gives ₹ 2 lakh each to 1.5 crore women under self-employment initiatives. The Jan Suraj leader was alluding to his pre-poll claim of quitting politics if JD(U) got more than 25 seats.

"Between Nitish Kumar and his victory, there is only one thing -- buying of 60,000 votes in each assembly constituency at ₹ 10,000. It should be made clear whether it was a vote purchase or part of a self-employment programme," he said.

"People have given the mandate to NDA, now it's on the shoulders of Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Nitish Kumar to work on fulfilling their poll promises," he said.

"Self-employment is very important; they must give the ₹ 2 lakh they promised. This will prove that the sum of 10,000 given to women was a welfare initiative. People who don't get the money in six months' time can come to Jan Suraj, we will fight to ensure they get the amount," he said.

He also urged Modi and Kumar to keep the corrupt and criminals out of the government when it is formed.

Notably, before the polls, Kishor had raised the issue of charges of crime and corruption against several NDA leaders, including Samrat Choudhary, Ashok Choudhary, and Mangal Pandey.

Kishor said that as repentance on not being able to make people understand on what issues they should vote, he would hold a fast for a day at Bhitiharwar in West Champaran district on November 20, when the NDA government is likely to take oath. (PTI)

# Authorities struggle to manage massive pilgrim flow at Sabarimala

**PATHANAMTHITTA (KERALA), Nov 18:** As nearly two lakh devotees arrived at the Lord Ayyappa shrine at Sabarimala here on Tuesday within 48 hours of the temple opening for the annual 'mandala-makaravilakku' pilgrimage season, the TDB and the police struggled to manage the massive flow of pilgrims, including children.

Visuals on TV channels showed a massive crowd of devotees packed like sardines in the small area in front of the 18 steps that have to be climbed to reach the main doors of the shrine.

Large crowds of devotees packed the pilgrimage route from Pamba, the foothills of Sabarimala, to the Sannidhanam, with many facing hours-long delays in climbing the path.

Small children carried on top of their parents' shoulders could be seen crying as the huge crowd of devotees jostled with each other to move forward.

Many devotees were seen climbing over the barricades in place for crowd control, with the police failing to prevent such incidents.

There were also reported complaints of pilgrims not receiving water while standing in the long queues for hours.

Earlier, newly appointed Travancore Devaswom Board (TDB) president K Jayakumar said that instructions have been issued to ensure devotees are able to steadily climb the 18 steps for the darshan and that no one cuts the lines to move in front.

He also said that 200 additional personnel have been assigned to go to the people in the queues and provide them with water.

"I have never seen such a massive and dangerous crowd on the temple grounds till now. It appears some people cut the line to jump in front. Even I am scared seeing the large crowd here."

"I have issued directions to ensure steady movement of the pilgrims and ensure no one cuts the line or queue. Such a large crowd should not have collected here," he said.

Jayakumar also said that he has issued directions to restrict the flow of devotees at Nilakkal to reduce the crowd of pilgrims at Pamba and ensure they can complete their pilgrimage quickly without having to wait 3-5 hours in queues.

"People can wait at Nilakkal. There are facilities there for that. Also, will set up seven additional

spot booking counters there so that devotees do not have to come to Pamba for that," he said.

Later, restrictions were put in place and devotees were temporarily prevented from moving forward at Nilakkal and some other waypoints along the pilgrimage route as part of the crowd control measures.

ADGPS Sreejith contended that things were still in control.

He said that last year, the number of pilgrims crossed the one lakh mark on four separate days.

But this time, within two days, around two lakh pilgrims have arrived for the pilgrimage.

There are two problems, and these can be resolved if the people cooperate. Firstly, despite us capping spot booking at 20,000 as per court directions, more people are turning up for it.

"They are demanding immediate darshan through spot booking. So, we had to allow 37,000 people through spot booking as we could not turn them away," he told reporters here.

The second problem was that people arriving through virtual-Q booking were not arriving on the day they had booked.

"They turn up when they feel like it. They should not do that. If people come in a disciplined manner, these problems can be resolved," he said.

Sreejith also said that enough police personnel have been deployed. Furthermore, many people are not coming via queues, which has also resulted in the present situation, he added.

In the morning, the TDB president said that the devotees were not entering the queue complexes set up at Sabarimala, afraid that they might lose their priority in the line.

"But, if they enter the queue complexes, it would be easier for us to provide them with water and biscuits," he said.

He also said that around 200 cleaning personnel were being brought from Tamil Nadu to clean the toilets at Sabarimala.

Later in the afternoon, Jayakumar said that things were not out of control.

He said that entry to Sabarimala will be restricted to one lakh per day.

"This is an unprecedented crowd. There is nothing to be concerned about right now. From tomorrow, spot booking will be restricted to 20,000 per day. Things will be normalised soon," he added. (PTI)

# Top naxal commander among six Maoists killed in Andhra Pradesh encounter

**MAREDUILLI/RAIPUR, Nov 18:** Top naxal commander Madvi Hidma and his wife were among the six Maoists killed in an encounter with security personnel in Andhra Pradesh's Alluri Sitaramaraju district on Tuesday, police said.

The death of Hidma, an alleged mastermind of several attacks, was described by Chhattisgarh police as the "last nail in the coffin" of insurgency.

Alluri Sitaramaraju district superintendent of police (SP) Amit Bardar said the encounter happened between 6.30 am and 7 am in the forested area of Maredumilli mandal.

"Today morning, between 6:30 AM and 7:00 AM, an exchange of fire (EOF) occurred between Maoists and the police party in the Maredumilli Mandal area. During the encounter, six Maoists were neutralised," an official press release said.

Two women and four men were killed in the exchange of fire.

Based on reliable sources and field verification, police confirmed that Hidma, his wife Madakam Rajee, Deve, Lakmal (Chaitu), Malla (Mallalu) and Kamlu (Kamlesh) died.

Intelligence inputs over the past few weeks had indicated increased Maoist movement along the Andhra Pradesh-Chhattisgarh-Odisha border, leading to intensified combing operations, police said.

Following the encounter, police seized two AK 47 rifles, one pistol, one revolver and a single bore weapon, a number of electrical



and non-electrical detonators, fuse wire, seven kit bags and others.

"Combing operations are continuing in the surrounding areas to ensure complete sanitisation and prevent further Maoist activity," the press release added.

According to the SP, it was a joint operation carried out by various wings of the police department.

Addressing a press conference, Andhra Pradesh Intelligence ADGP Mahesh Chandra Ladda said Maoists from a few battalions were planning to shift to Andhra Pradesh due to continuous pressure in Chhattisgarh.

Consequently, police kept a close and continuous watch on their movements.

"For the last two days, we had very specific intelligence that a few top Maoist leaders were entering the state and were planning to revive the movement," Ladda said, adding that the bodies of the six Maoists were shifted for post-mortem, and that the necessary action will be taken thereafter.

Further, police monitoring in other districts such as NTR, Krishna, Kakinada and Eluru led to

the arrest of 31 more members of the proscribed organisation.

Out of the 31 arrested, nine were security guards of central committee member Devji, while the remaining were from the battalion, Ladda said.

It has also been reported that a few Maoists managed to flee from the encounter site, and combing operations are currently under way, the official added.

Meanwhile, Chhattisgarh Police described Hidma's death as the "last nail in the coffin" of the insurgency. He had masterminded several attacks over the last two decades.

A native of Puvarti village in Sukma district in Chhattisgarh, Hidma's age and appearance remained mysterious until his photograph surfaced earlier this year.

He headed the Maoists' People's Liberation Guerrilla Army (PLGA) Battalion No.1, the strongest military formation of the outfit in Dandakaranya, which spans parts of Andhra Pradesh, Odisha, Telangana, and Maharashtra, apart from Bastar, for several years, officials said. (PTI)

# Over 96 per cent of enumeration forms distributed under SIR, says Kerala CEO

**THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, Nov 18:** Kerala Chief Electoral Officer (CEO) Rathan Khelkar on Monday said the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls is progressing effectively and appealed to everyone to ensure the successful completion of the exercise as per the scheduled timelines.

Over 96 per cent of the enumeration forms have already been distributed owing to the dedicated and committed efforts of Booth Level Officers (BLOs) across the State, the official noted in a statement. The CEO's office issued the statement on the day the Left government in the state approached the Supreme Court seeking a direction to postpone the SIR.

The statement also assumed significance at a time when Kerala is witnessing an intense row over the suicide of a BLO allegedly due to work strain. (PTI)

# EC must immediately demonstrate it's not operating under BJP's shadow: Congress

**NEW DELHI, Nov 18:** Upping the ante over its 'vote chori' pitch, the Congress on Tuesday said the Election Commission's conduct during the SIR process has been "deeply disappointing" and demanded that the poll body must immediately demonstrate that it is not operating under the BJP's shadow. Congress president Mallikrjun Kharge also alleged that the BJP is attempting to weaponise the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls process for "vote chori", as he chaired a meeting with key office bearers of 12 states and Union territories where the SIR is underway.

Kharge, former party chief Rahul Gandhi and AICC general secretary organisation KC Venugopal participated in a review meeting with state unit chiefs, Congress Legislature Party leaders and secretaries of 12 states and Union

territories where the SIR is underway.

"We held a comprehensive strategy review with AICC general secretaries, AICC in-charges, PCCs, CLPs, and AICC secretaries from the states/UTs where the SIR process is underway. The Congress Party is unequivocally committed to safeguarding the integrity of the electoral rolls," Kharge said on X after he chaired the meeting. At a time when public confidence in democratic institutions is already strained, the Election Commission's conduct during the SIR process has been "deeply disappointing", he said.

"It must immediately demonstrate that it is not operating under the BJP's shadow and it remembers its Constitutional oath and allegiance to the people of India, not to any ruling party," Kharge said. (PTI)

# 'Didn't sense any disgruntlement'

**MUMBAI, Nov 18:** While most Shiv Sena ministers on Tuesday skipped the meeting of the Devendra Fadnavis-led Maharashtra cabinet, Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar, who heads the ruling NCP, said he did not sense any disgruntlement during the meeting.

From the Shiv Sena, only Deputy Chief Minister Eknath Shinde, who heads the party, attended the cabinet meeting, sources said. The ruling Sena wanted to send a message to ally BJP that it did not approve of the latter weaning away its workers and leaders. The recent defections from the Sena to the BJP in Kalyan-Dombivli seem to be the trigger point, they said. Talking to reporters here, Pawar, however, said he was under the impression that the absence of Sena ministers was due to the scrutiny of nomination papers for the December 2 municipal council polls.

"Makrand Patil from the NCP was absent (for the cabinet meeting). Even our Hasan Mushrif left early. Had I had known about Shiv Sena ministers being upset, I would have asked Eknath Shinde about it. But I did not sense any disgruntlement," Pawar said. (PTI)

# SC refuses to entertain fresh PIL on rising pollution levels in Delhi, others cities

**NEW DELHI, Nov 18:** The Supreme Court on Tuesday refused to entertain a fresh PIL by a wellness expert seeking urgent judicial intervention to tackle a "persistent and systemic failure" in addressing the country's rising air pollution levels.

The top court, however, allowed holistic health coach Luke Christopher Coutinho to withdraw the PIL and file an intervention plea in a pending case filed by environmentalist M C Mehta on pollution.

"The petitioner seeks liberty to withdraw the plea to file an intervention in pending proceedings in the MC Mehta case," the CJ said.

The court is scheduled to hear the main plea on pollution on Wednesday.

Coutinho had filed the plea on October 24 and made the Centre, Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB), Commission for Air Quality Management (CAQM), several Union ministries, NITI Aayog, and the governments of Delhi, Punjab, Haryana, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, and Maharashtra as parties.

The plea said the current air pollution crisis has reached proportions of a "public health emergency", violating citizens' fundamental right to life and health under Ar-



ticle 21 of the Constitution.

The plea sought declaration of air pollution as a national public health emergency and formulation of a time-bound national action plan.

"The National Clean Air Programme

(NCAP), launched in 2019 with the target of reducing particulate matter by 20-30 percent by 2024 (subsequently extended to 40 percent by 2026), has not met its modest objectives. As of July 2025, official data reveals that only 25 of the 130 designated

cities have achieved a 40 per cent reduction in PM10 levels from the 2017 baseline, while 25 other cities have in fact seen an increase," it said.

Similar violations are cited in the plea for Kolkata and Lucknow, among others. The plea sought a direction to make NCAP targets binding with "statutory force, including clear timelines, measurable indicators, and enforceable penalties for non-compliance".

In Delhi alone, 2.2 million schoolchildren have already suffered irreversible lung damage, as confirmed by government and medical studies, the plea alleged.

The plea also submits that air quality monitoring systems are inadequate.

It also sought setting up a National Task Force on Air Quality and Public Health chaired by an independent environmental health expert.

It sought immediate curbs on crop residue burning, including farmer incentives and sustainable alternatives besides phasing out high-emitting vehicles and promoting e-mobility and public transport.

The plea sought strict enforcement of industrial emission norms with real-time monitoring and public disclosure. (PTI)

# PM's Rammath Goenka Lecture served as both economic outlook: Tharoor

**NEW DELHI, Nov 18:** Senior Congress leader Shashi Tharoor on Tuesday said Prime Minister Narendra Modi's Rammath Goenka Lecture served as both an economic outlook and a cultural call to action, urging the nation to be restless for progress.

Noting that Prime Minister Modi appealed for a 10-year national mission to restore pride in India's heritage, languages and knowledge systems, Tharoor said he wishes the PM had also acknowledged how Rammath Goenka had used English to raise a voice for Indian nationalism.

"Attended PM Narendra Modi's Rammath Goenka Lecture at the invitation of @IndianExpress last night. He spoke of India's 'constructive impatience' for development and strongly pushed for a post-colonial mindset," he said on X.

"On the whole, the PM's address served as both an economic outlook and a cultural call to action, urging the nation to be restless for progress. Glad to have been in the audience despite battling a bad cold and cough!" the Congress leader said.

Tharoor said the PM emphasised that India is "no longer just an 'emerging market' but an 'emerging model' for the world, noting its economic resilience. PM Modi said he'd been accused of being in 'election mode' all the time, but he was really in 'emotional mode' to redress the problems of the people".

A significant part of the speech was dedicated to overturning Macaulay's 200-year legacy of "slave mentality", Tharoor said.

"PM Modi appealed for a 10-year national mission to restore pride in India's heritage, languages, and knowledge systems. I wish he had also acknowledged how Rammath Goenka had used English to raise a voice for Indian nationalism!" the senior Congress leader said. (PTI)

# PPA announces first list of ZPM candidates

Election campaigning launched from Kimin as Arunachal gears up for Panchayat polls

ITANAGAR, Nov 18: The People's Party of Arunachal (PPA) on Tuesday announced its first list of Zilla Parishad Member (ZPM) candidates for the upcoming Panchayat Raj elections in the state, becoming the first party to release names ahead of the polls scheduled for December 15.

PPA president and Doimukh MLA Nabam Vivek said that despite being an alliance partner in the Arunachal Pradesh government under NEDA, the party has taken the lead in announcing its candidates. The notification issued by the State Election Committee covers ZPM candidates for the 14th Doimukh Assembly Constituency, including Gomu Boje Yab (2nd Doimukh), Tana Rekha (13th Gumto), Biri Taming (12th Banderdewa), Nabam Sina (5th Lower Balijan), Teli Taya (4th Upper Balijan/Sangdupota), Dake Thomas (6th Tarasso) and Bamang Yayu (3rd Kimin).

The State Election Commission (SEC) has announced polls for 27 Zilla Parishads, 245 ZP constituencies, 2,103 Gram Panchayats and 8,181 GP constituencies, spread



across 2,171 polling stations. Upper Subansiri tops with 17 ZP constituencies and 146 GPs, while Namsai leads with 573 GP constituencies. The total electorate stands at 7,59,210 with females accounting for 52.91% of voters.

For municipal elections, Itanagar Municipal Corporation has 60,066 electors across 20 wards, while Pasighat Municipal Council has 12,372 electors across 8 wards. Polling will be conducted at 67 stations in IMC and 12 stations in PMC. The last date for filing nominations is November 24, scrutiny on November 26, withdrawal by November 29,

with polling on December 15 and counting on December 20. The election process is expected to conclude by December 23. Campaigning has officially begun at Kimin in Papum Pare district with the presence of four PPA MLAs and the announcement of eight candidates across all ZP segments of the Doimukh Assembly constituency.

The Model Code of Conduct (MCC) has been enforced statewide, prohibiting activities that incite tension, misuse of places of worship, loudspeakers without permission, distribution of liquor 48 hours prior to polling and electioneering near hospitals or schools. Candidates are barred from offering food or gifts to influence voters, including meat distribution and must adhere to expenditure limits: ₹ 3 lakh for ZPM and ₹ 50,000 for Gram Panchayat candidates.

Authorities have emphasised strict compliance with MCC rules, traffic regulations and prior permissions for political events to ensure smooth and fair conduct of Panchayat and Municipal elections across Arunachal Pradesh.
