Govt taking 'multi-faceted approach' for flood-hit: CM

First tranche of ₹ 160 crore interim relief released among worst-hit households ● Subsidy under Pradhan Mantri Surya Ghar scheme released

GUWAHATI, Aug 3: The Assam government on Monday released the first tranche of around ₹ 160 crore interim relief to over 75,000 households that were the worst affected in this year's floods, officials said.

The toll in the deluge this year rose to 85 as three more deaths were reported on Sunday even as the number of affected people dipped to 1.35 lakh, they said.

Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma, who is touring the worst-affected districts in Upper Assam, released the first tranche of interim relief from Dibrugarh.

Around 75,000 families with severely damaged houses in Sivasagar, Charaideo, Jorhat and Golaghat districts received ₹ 15,000 each, the officials said.

Subsidy under the Pradhan Mantri Surya Ghar scheme was also re-



leased for affected eligible families. Sarma had earlier announced several interim relief measures for the

worst-hit districts, most of which will be covered with donations received in the Chief Minister's Relief

Flood relief: Himanta takes a jibe at critics

GUWAHATI, Aug 3: Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma on Monday defended the state government's decision to provide ₹ 15,000 as interim assistance to flood-affected families, saying the financial aid was only the beginning of a much larger rehabilitation exercise and not the final compensation package.

Fund. The CM, in a social media post, said, "₹ 160 crore has been credited directly into the bank accounts of

families affected by the #AssamFloods. This morning, I transferred the promised interim assistance of ₹ 15,000 each to nearly 75,000 of the worst-hit households across the four districts, along with the state subsidy under the PM Surya Ghar Yojana to those eligible." He said the government is making efforts to place immediate liquidity in the hands of families so that they can begin rebuilding without delay while final compensation is determined through a comprehensive assessment.

"A further tranche of ₹ 10,000 for severely impacted families in Sivasagar and Charaideo will be released in the next few days. Meta tells parliamentary panel ready to apologise for error related to PM's post

NEW DELHI, Aug 3: Social media giant Meta is learnt to have told a parliamentary committee on Monday that it is ready to apologise for the brief restriction on a post by Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Facebook, as a section of members demanded legal action and sought fixing of accountability.

At a meeting of the department-related standing committee on information technology, members pointed out that while Meta earns huge revenue from India, it does not follow the law of the land, according to sources. They also grilled Meta officials who appeared before the panel over



the issue of algorithmic bias, saying objectionable content like porn is freely available on the platform while "genuine" content was removed. When Facebook has not removed a lot of other objectionable content, who removed Prime Minister Narendra Modi's video from the platform, an MP asked Meta representatives. "Who bears the ultimate responsibility for this?" the sources quoted the panel member as saying. The questioning came against the backdrop of the government's summons to Meta's top executives after Prime Minister Modi's recent Facebook post addressing India's youth and promising stringent action against paper leaks was briefly restricted on the platform.

While the US-headquartered social media giant had attributed the incident to a technical glitch and apologised, the Ministry of Electron-

ics and Information Technology (MeitY) had found the explanation "inadequate". The company had said that the content was removed "in error" and was restored on the platform. In a democracy, "if a video of the prime minister is not safe, then accountability needs to be fixed, another panel member was quoted as saying at the meeting on Monday.

The members also questioned the capabilities of the algorithms designed to check deepfakes of PM Modi.

According to the sources, META officials expressed regret over the incident before the panel and stated they were ready to apologise.

However, a BJP MP remarked that this isn't just about offering an apology. Accountability must be fixed and legal action should be taken in this matter, the member asserted.

The committee headed by BJP member Nishikant Dubey held the meeting to discuss the subject 'Social and Digital platforms and their regulation', days after the government summoned Meta's global team for briefly restricting Prime Minister Narendra Modi's Facebook post.

Union Home secretary Gopinath Mohan, secretary in the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY) S Krishnan and representatives of social and digital media platforms -- Snapchat, Google, X (formerly Twitter), Meta (Facebook, WhatsApp and Instagram) and YouTube -- appeared before the committee. (PTI)

Centre has extended ₹ 2,537-cr assistance for flood management projects in NE

NEW DELHI, Aug 3: The Centre has provided assistance of ₹2,536.96 crore in 263 flood mitigation projects in the northeastern states including Sikkim under the flood management and border areas programme (FMBAP), Jal Shakti ministry informed Rajya Sabha on Monday.

In a written reply, Minister of State for Jal Shakti Raj Bhushan Choudhary said flood management and anti-erosion schemes are formulated and implemented by state governments as per respective priorities, while the Union government supplements their efforts through technical guidance and financial assistance for critical works.

Replying to a question on measures to tackle recurring floods and riverbank erosion in the North-east, the minister said the FMBAP provides central assistance for flood control, anti-erosion and



drainage development works.

"Since the inception of the programme up to March 2026, central assistance amounting to ₹ 2,536.96 crore has been provided under FMBAP for 263 flood management projects in the North Eastern States, including Sikkim," he said. On flood forecasting, (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

Shah must explain in Parl lathicharge-pellet gun action on students: Kharage

NEW DELHI, Aug 3: Congress president Mallikarjun Kharage on Monday demanded that Home Minister Amit Shah should come to Parliament and explain the lathicharge-pellet gun action on protesting students.

The Leader of Opposition in the Rajya Sabha also demanded that Prime Minister Narendra Modi should answer how the donations to the Ram temple were stolen.

"Modi government will have to answer INDIA. 1. Home Minister should come to the Parliament and explain the lathicharge-pellet gun action on students. "Prime Minister should answer how the 'chhanda-chhawa' donated to Shri Ram Mandir, was stolen, even as the Trust was under PM's oversight," Kharage said on X after a meeting of INDIA bloc party floor leaders at his chamber in Parliament House complex.

The Opposition has been seeking a statement from the Home Minister on the police action against protesting students on July 20, including use of pellet guns, and have also demanded his resignation over the issue.

Besides Kharage, Leader of Opposition in the Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi, Congress general secretaries Jairam Ramesh and K C Vebugopal, SP's Dharmendra Yadav, TMC's Mahua Moitra and Sagarikha Ghose, NCP (SP)'s Supriya Sule, Shiv Sena (UBT)'s (CONTD. ON PAGE-2)

SC says states can withdraw FIRs against students who participated in NEET protests

NEW DELHI, Aug 3: The Supreme Court on Monday clarified that the expression "criminal antecedents" in its order on releasing student protesters referred only to those involved in grave and heinous offences, and said states could close or withdraw FIRs against the remaining students in accordance with law.

The clarification came after the Centre submitted that it was "serious" about not pursuing FIRs against students who participated in the NEET examination paper leak protests, including the July 20 Parliament march in Delhi, provided they did not have criminal antecedents.

A bench comprising Chief Justice Surya Kant and Justices Joymalya Bagchi and V Mohana was hearing a batch of pleas alleging police excesses against student protesters during the agitation spearheaded by the Cockroach Janta Party (CJP).

"It is clarified that NCT of Delhi and any other state shall be at liberty to close or withdraw FIRs against protesters... The word criminal antecedents is to be read as grave and heinous offences," it said.

At the outset, Solicitor General Tushar Mehta submitted that there was some misconception regarding how to implement the Union government's commitment to withdraw the FIRs against students.

"There was some misapprehension about what to do with the FIRs against the protesters. I have instructions to say that the government is serious about that commitment. Those who had criminal antecedents... except them, everything can be taken care of," Mehta said. He said FIRs against more than



2,700 people with antecedents involving grave and heinous offences would not be withdrawn.

Mehta said he had discussed with senior advocate Vrinda Grover the legal mechanism for implementing the commitment. Grover said the issue was whether the cases should be withdrawn or the FIRs quashed.

"It was about improvement in the education system. These are young people who have their lives ahead of them. Even for quashing, we have FIRs filed in Bihar, West Bengal, Assam, UP and Delhi. "After this has been worked out with the states, we will come back to this court," she said, adding that individual public prosecutors seeking closure is a tedious and uncertain process.

Senior advocate Gopal Sankaranarayanan submitted that even lawyers' children were beaten during the protests.

"The videos are very shocking. We have given 300 videos to the court. Since directions have come from the top, the Commissioner of police must look at all this.

"Ideally, we have identified un-uniform individuals committing such police excess. A direction has to go to the Commissioner of police and the RAF director as to why police used pellet guns etc," he said.

Sankaranarayanan said police cannot be permitted to act brazenly.

"We have placed videos. We are inviting the court's attention to this serious. Let the affidavit answer these questions. The responsibility has to be fixed," Sankaranarayanan submitted.

Senior advocate Abhishek Singhvi said the expression "criminal antecedents" required clarification, as students could have a traffic violation, petty offences or politically motivated cases against them.

The CJJ observed, "A police officer involved in excessive force should not be unduly protected. And it should not be that a hardened criminal under the garb of student protest is also getting protected."

On the use of pellet guns, Grover said there was no standing order of the Delhi Police permitting their use.

"The petition (on pellet guns) is not saying that the police should not have anything to protect itself. But this particular weapon is unfit for use," she said.

The court said it would like to lay down a protocol governing the use of pellet guns and posted the matter for further hearing on August 18. The apex court had earlier observed that police excesses or a 'lathi charge' cannot be justified merely because there is an agitation and underlined that the right to peaceful protest was "absolutely guaranteed". Cachar launches self-enumeration for Census 2027

SILCHAR, Aug 3: The Cachar district administration launched the Self-Enumeration phase of Census 2027, urging residents to complete the online census process between August 2 and August 16 as part of India's first fully digital Census.

He said citizens can complete self-enumeration through the official portal, se.census.gov.in, between August 2 and 16. Referring to the 2011 Census, Baruah noted that Cachar's population stood at 17,36,319, adding that accurate data collected during the current exercise would help governments formulate better development plans and improve public service delivery.

Speaking at the event on Sunday, Silchar MLA Rajdeep Roy appealed to citizens to complete self-enumeration well before the deadline, stating that reliable population data is essential for planning schools, hospitals, roads, housing and other public infrastructure.

NFR said the temporary changes have been made to facilitate restoration work while ensuring safe train operations through the affected section.

Students level irregularity, fake degree allegations against Ham-One Group Institute

NAGAON, Aug 3: Serious allegations of irregularities, including the issuance of alleged fake degrees and large-scale collection of money from students, have been levelled against the Ham-One Group Institute at Kaoimari in Nagaon by members of the student community.

Council of India (BCI) not recognising such courses under the Advocates Act, 1961.

They further alleged that the institute is involved in an ongoing legal dispute with the BCI and claimed that law degrees awarded by the institute would not be considered valid by the Council.

They also alleged irregularities in undergraduate and B.Pharm programmes and claimed that the institute was collecting up to ₹3 lakh from students seeking admission to B.Ed courses.

The student body announced that it would move the Gauhati High Court against the institute over the alleged irregularities and corruption.

The allegations have been made by student representatives. There was no immediate response from the Ham-One Group Institute to the claims.

BTC leaders complete Census 2027 self-enumeration

Gaza disarmament deal

US President Donald Trump has declared a "historic" deal for Hamas to fully disarm in Gaza, brokered by his Board of Peace. But Netanyahu calls it inadequate, Hamas ties disarmament to a full Israeli pullout, and Washington simultaneously readies fresh strikes on Iran - exposing how unsettled the region truly remains. On the night of July 30, Trump took to Truth Social with characteristic bravado. "Today, the Board of Peace reached a HISTORIC agreement for the COMPLETE DISARMAMENT of Hamas and all other armed groups in Gaza. This is a monumental step toward lasting PEACE and SECURITY," he wrote. It was framed as the long-delayed second act of the ceasefire he brokered in October 2025, and as vindication of his 20-point Gaza peace plan. Within hours, the celebratory mood curdled. Hamas negotiators had indeed signed a disarmament framework with the US-led Board of Peace in El-Alamein, Egypt - the first time the group has ever put its signature on any agreement to give up its weapons. But Netanyahu's office almost immediately issued a statement saying the Board of Peace's 15-point disarmament proposal did not meet Israel's demands for Gaza's complete demilitarisation, leaving the path forward murky. An Israeli official was blunter still, telling reporters that despite "various publications" reporting diplomatic progress, there would be no withdrawal from Israel's current positions before "the genuine disarmament of Hamas."

The Board of Peace - a Trump-chaired body that gathered 40 countries at its inauguration in February, including Israel and Arab states but no Palestinian representatives - says the agreement is essentially a roadmap for implementing the ceasefire deal struck last October. The board called it "a historic breakthrough," saying that for the first time Hamas has committed to an actionable plan for relinquishing all its weapons, to be followed by Israeli withdrawal. Under the plan, Hamas would gradually hand over its weapons over an eight-month period to the National Committee for the Administration of Gaza, a Board of Peace-overseen panel of Palestinian technocrats, with police weapons transferred first and personal weapons surrendered last. As disarmament is completed, Israeli forces are to withdraw, with an International Stabilisation Force working alongside a new Palestinian police force to secure Gaza.

Trump described a Palestinian government that would "work closely with the Board of Peace to help the Palestinian people," even as regional officials noted that the Palestinian Authority still "needs to carry out reforms before we consider integrating them." Crucially, the geography is contested. The deal envisions the IDF immediately returning to the "Yellow Line" that divided Gaza roughly into eastern and western halves - but Netanyahu had earlier ordered the army to take over 70 percent of the Strip, in violation of the original ceasefire, leaving Israel in control of 53 percent of the enclave at the time.

Assam's tea economy stands at a decisive moment, shaped by opportunity and uncertainty in equal measure. For nearly two centuries, tea has defined the state's agricultural identity, supported millions of livelihoods, generated export earnings, and built a globally respected brand associated with strong, malty black tea. Yet the future cannot depend solely on tradition. Climate variability, rising production costs, labour shortages, fluctuating international demand, quality concerns, and changing consumer preferences are steadily altering the foundations on which the industry was built. At the same time, new possibilities are emerging through premium teas, geographical branding, sustainable cultivation, value-added products, tea tourism, digital marketing, and expanding markets beyond conventional buyers. Tea Board data show that Assam remains India's largest tea-producing state, contributing more than half of the country's annual production, while recent production estimates indicate continued growth despite periodic weather-related disruptions. Export performance has also improved significantly, with India recording its highest-ever tea exports in 2025 and Assam contributing substantially to that achievement. However, production alone will not guarantee prosperity. International buyers increasingly demand traceability, lower pesticide residues, sustainability certification, and consistent quality standards. Recent warnings from tea factories regarding pesticide residue in green leaves highlight the seriousness of quality compliance for both domestic and export markets. Climate change presents an even greater structural challenge. Scientific research conducted in Assam's tea-growing districts has shown that changing rainfall patterns and temperature fluctuations are affecting soil biology, a

critical factor in long-term productivity. Extreme floods have repeatedly damaged plantations, disrupted harvesting schedules, and affected thousands of workers, particularly in Upper Assam. The future therefore depends less on expanding acreage and more on increasing productivity, improving resilience, and creating higher value from every kilogram of tea produced. Assam's tea economy must move beyond the traditional model of bulk commodity production towards a diversified ecosystem where premium orthodox tea, specialty green tea, organic cultivation, matcha, handcrafted teas, wellness products, and direct-to-consumer branding receive equal importance. The emergence of Assam's first commercial matcha production illustrates that innovation is no longer a distant possibility but an immediate business opportunity capable of attracting younger consumers and premium international markets.

Another defining feature of Assam's tea economy will be the growing role of small tea growers, who today account for almost half of the state's production. Their contribution has transformed the structure of the industry, but it has also exposed weaknesses in extension services, quality monitoring, access to finance, and bargaining power. Small growers often depend on bought-leaf factories, making them vulnerable to price fluctuations and input costs beyond their control. Recent concerns regarding pesticide residues underline the urgent need for stronger technical support, better farmer education, and wider adoption of scientific cultivation practices. Mechanisation can improve productivity where labour shortages are becoming acute, but technology

should complement rather than replace employment because the tea sector remains one of Assam's largest sources of rural livelihoods. Investment in irrigation, weather forecasting, precision agriculture, disease surveillance, drone-assisted monitoring, and climate-resilient tea varieties can significantly improve long-term sustainability. Government initiatives encouraging orthodox tea production and higher export incentives indicate recognition of these emerging priorities. Branding will become equally important. Global consumers increasingly seek products with a clear origin, authentic production methods, and transparent supply chains rather than anonymous bulk tea. Assam possesses an internationally recognised identity that few tea-producing regions enjoy, but the brand requires stronger protection against imitation and better promotion across premium

retail channels. Digital commerce offers tea producers the ability to sell directly to consumers worldwide, reducing dependence on traditional auction systems and intermediaries. Tea tourism can create another source of income by integrating plantations with heritage experiences, local cuisine, wellness retreats, golf tourism, and cultural attractions. Recent plans to combine Assam's tea gardens with tourism initiatives reflect this broader economic vision. Such diversification spreads risk while strengthening the global image of Assam as more than a producer of raw tea. If value addition, branding, tourism, research, and sustainable cultivation advance together, Assam can capture a much larger share of the value generated by its own tea rather than exporting bulk leaves that earn higher profits elsewhere through blending, packaging, and marketing.

The future of Assam's tea economy will ultimately depend on whether policymakers, plantation companies, small growers, researchers, workers, and entrepreneurs embrace structural transfor-

mation instead of relying on historical success. Global competition from Kenya, Sri Lanka, Vietnam, and emerging producers will continue to intensify, while consumers will increasingly judge tea by sustainability credentials, ethical sourcing, health benefits, and premium quality rather than price alone. Assam has every natural advantage required to remain a global leader, including fertile soil, favourable climate, skilled workers, and a heritage recognised across international markets. Yet competitive advantage must now be earned through innovation, not inherited through history. Stronger research institutions, closer collaboration between universities and plantations, wider adoption of climate-smart agriculture, improved labour welfare, investment in worker housing, healthcare and education, greater participation of women in leadership, and better infrastructure connecting tea-growing districts with ports and logistics hubs will determine long-term competitiveness. Recent production figures demonstrate that Assam retains remarkable productive capacity,

with output rising significantly during 2025 while exports also strengthened. Those achievements should inspire confidence but not complacency. Weather-related disruptions, volatile global prices, compliance requirements, and changing consumer behaviour demand continuous adaptation. Assam's tea industry cannot afford to compete only on volume when premium markets increasingly reward quality, authenticity, and sustainability. The next generation of tea entrepreneurs has an opportunity to redefine the industry through branded products, specialty teas, e-commerce, agro-processing, carbon-conscious cultivation, and global storytelling built around Assam's unique heritage. If those opportunities are matched by consistent public policy, scientific innovation, responsible business practices, and skilled human capital, the tea economy will remain not merely a symbol of Assam's past but one of its strongest engines of economic growth, rural prosperity, export expansion, and international recognition throughout the decades ahead.

Why is it necessary to take action against 'fake religious leaders'?

India's young women power MNC factory revolution

Women in the age group 18 to 30 are the rising work force in India representing the strongest demographic powering an unprecedented revolution of the fairer sex working at the shopfloor level in India, particularly the south, with aggressive hiring by MNCs for their quality work and efficiency.

Every hour, hundreds of smartphones roll off production lines in southern India, destined for stores across America, Europe and Asia. Behind the gleaming aluminium frames and precision-engineered chips are rows of young women dressed in anti-static uniforms, their fingers moving with astonishing speed and accuracy. A trained operator can assemble, inspect or process nearly 500 smartphone units in an hour, a feat of dexterity that global electronics manufacturers say has become one of India's biggest competitive advantages.

The story unfolding across Tamil Nadu, Karnataka and Andhra Pradesh is not merely one of industrial growth. It is rapidly becoming one of the biggest stories of women's economic empowerment in modern India.

For decades, India's manufacturing sector struggled to absorb women into its workforce. Today, that equation is changing dramatically as multinational corporations diversify production away from China and build massive new facilities across southern India. At the centre of this transformation stands Taiwanese electronics giant Foxconn, Apple's largest manufacturing partner.

Its sprawling campuses near Sriperumbudur in Tamil Nadu and Devanahalli near Bengaluru resemble modern industrial townships more than traditional factories. Thousands of women arrive every morning in company buses from villages and towns across Tamil Nadu, Karnataka and Andhra Pradesh. Others live in purpose-built hostels equipped with round-the-clock security, biometric access, medical facilities, transport services and supervised accommodation designed to reassure anxious parents sending daughters hundreds of kilometres from home.

For many of these young women, the job represents something unprecedented. A regular salary. Financial independence. The confidence to support parents, educate siblings and delay early marriage. The migration of women into India's electronics manufacturing hubs represents a quiet social revolution.

Unlike construction or heavy engineering, electronics assembly demands patience, precision, concentration and consistency rather than physical strength. Global manufacturers have increasingly concluded that women excel in such environments because of lower error rates, better process discipline and superior fine-motor skills required for assembling miniature electronic components.

This preference is hardly unique to India. Electronics factories across Taiwan, Vietnam, Malaysia and China have historically relied heavily on female workers. India is now witnessing a similar transition. The numbers are striking.

As Apple expands manufacturing in India, Foxconn, Tata Electronics (which acquired Wistron's India operations), Pegatron and other suppliers

have collectively hired tens of thousands of workers, with women forming a substantial share of assembly-line employees. Apple has steadily shifted more iPhone production to India as part of its "China Plus One" strategy, while Foxconn continues investing billions of dollars in new campuses across southern India. Foxconn's new Bengaluru campus alone is expected to become one of the world's largest iPhone manufacturing facilities over the next few years. But Foxconn is only one chapter in a much larger story. The global manufacturing map is being redrawn.

Rising wages in China, geopolitical tensions between Washington and Beijing, supply-chain disruptions following the pandemic and the desire of multinational corporations to diversify production have encouraged companies to build alternative manufacturing bases. India has emerged as one of the principal beneficiaries.

Electronics majors, semiconductor companies, automobile manufacturers, consumer appliance makers and medical-device firms are expanding rapidly across southern India. Among those increasing their footprint are Apple suppliers Foxconn, Pegatron and Tata Electronics, while companies such as Samsung, Dell, HP, Lenovo, Flex, Jabil, Sanmina, Bosch, Siemens, Hyundai, Kia, Volvo, Schneider Electric and several Japanese and Taiwanese manufacturers have expanded manufacturing capacity or supplier ecosystems in India over the past few years. Many of these companies openly acknowledge that women constitute an increasingly important part of their manufacturing workforce, particularly in electronics, precision engineering, medical devices and component assembly. The transformation is visible beyond factory gates. Entire local economies are changing. Small restaurants, transport operators, hostels, tailoring shops, banks, coaching centres and retail outlets flourish around industrial corridors. Parents who once hesitated to educate daughters beyond school increasingly encourage them to pursue diplomas in electronics, mechanical and industrial engineering. Yet this inspiring story carries uncomfortable contradictions.

Foxconn has also faced criticism over labour practices. A Reuters investigation reported that recruiters working for Foxconn's main iPhone plant in Tamil Nadu had systematically discouraged or rejected married women from assembly jobs, allegedly because managers believed family responsibilities, pregnancy and absenteeism could affect productivity.

The allegations prompted scrutiny because both Apple and Foxconn's supplier codes prohibit discrimination based on marital status. Indian authorities examined the matter after the report, while Foxconn stated that it had removed the practice were identified and that the vast majority of women employed at the facility were married.

The controversy highlights an important question confronting India's industrial future. Can rapid manufacturing growth coexist with inclusive employment? Human-rights advocates argue that genuine women's empowerment cannot stop at providing employment alone.

Equal opportunity, maternity protection, workplace safety, career progression, fair wages and

freedom from discrimination are equally important. The encouraging news is that competitive pressures may ultimately favour better labour standards. Apple, whose global reputation depends heavily on responsible sourcing, has steadily tightened oversight of suppliers following previous controversies involving working conditions. International investors increasingly evaluate environmental, social and governance (ESG) practices before committing capital, making workforce policies a strategic business issue rather than merely a legal obligation.

The larger picture remains overwhelmingly positive. Across southern India, daughters of farmers, daily-wage labourers and small shopkeepers are becoming part of global supply chains.

Many are first-generation industrial workers. Some are first-generation graduates. Many become the highest earners in their families before turning twenty-five. Their salaries finance siblings' education, household improvements, motorcycles, health insurance and even small entrepreneurial ventures back home.

This ripple effect is perhaps the greatest measure of empowerment. Economists have long argued that no society transforms faster than one where women enter formal employment in large numbers. Factory wages create bank accounts. Bank accounts create financial identity. Financial identity creates economic independence. Economic independence gradually reshapes families and communities. The same southern states that once led India's information technology revolution may now be leading its manufacturing revolution as well—this time powered not by software engineers alone, but by thousands of women on factory floors producing some of the world's most sophisticated consumer electronics.

Every iPhone assembled in India tells two stories. One is about geopolitics, supply chains and multinational investment. The other is about a young woman leaving her village, boarding a company bus before dawn, entering a clean-room assembly line and quietly participating in India's emergence as a global manufacturing powerhouse.

That second story may ultimately prove to be the more important one. For the future of Indian manufacturing will not merely be measured by export figures or factory output. It will be measured by how many millions of women find dignity, independence and opportunity through productive employment. If India succeeds in marrying industrial growth with inclusive labour practices, the country's manufacturing boom could become not just an economic miracle but one of the most significant chapters in the history of women's empowerment in independent India.

In a country where female foeticide incidence is high because it involved paying high dowries, girl child, was considered a burden, especially in rural hinterland, particularly in north and western India. Women were not encouraged to study. But with the Modi government launching Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao, slogan, the scenario is changing. The slogan means Save the girl child, educate the girl child, meaning a girl child is as important as a boy child capable of earning bread and bringing prosperity to the family. (IPA Service)

The family offers the most natural illustration of this principle. The generation gap between parents and children ceases to be a problem as long as they continue to communicate openly. Most conflicts between husband and wife arise not from differences in opinion but from the absence of dialogue. Whether between siblings, parents and children, or grandparents and grandchildren, every enduring relationship is sustained by love enriched through meaningful communication. When people stop talking to one another, misunderstandings inevitably multiply. Silence is not always a sign of peace; often, it signals the gradual death of relationships. The same reality is reflected in society. Rising tensions based on caste, class, language, region, or ideology are fundamentally rooted in the lack of dialogue. If different communities regularly came together, listened to one another's concerns, and sought common solutions, many social conflicts could be resolved naturally. Society needs dialogue even more than it needs laws, because while laws can maintain order, only dialogue can build trust.

Dialogue occupies an equally vital place in politics. The soul of democracy lies not merely in elections but in continuous dialogue. Parliaments, legislative assemblies, and public forums exist to facilitate the healthy exchange of ideas. When political parties begin to regard one another as enemies and replace dialogue with accusations and hostility, democracy itself begins to weaken. A truly healthy democracy is one where differences may be profound, yet the doors of dialogue are never closed. The same principle applies to international relations. History bears witness that even the longest and most devastating wars have ultimately concluded at the negotiating table. Whether disputes concern territorial boundaries, economic interests, or strategic con-



flicts, lasting solutions emerge not from weapons but from dialogue. War leaves behind only destruction, whereas dialogue builds the future. Bombs and missiles may alter borders, but they cannot unite hearts. Only dialogue possesses the power to bridge hearts and foster lasting peace.

Many of the world's greatest leaders have affirmed the transformative power of dialogue. Mahatma Gandhi dedicated his life to truth, non-violence, and constructive dialogue, never abandoning communication even with his strongest opponents. Nelson Mandela, after enduring decades of injustice, chose reconciliation over revenge and dialogue over conflict, thereby saving South Africa from civil war. Even the United Nations ultimately serves as a global platform for dialogue among nations. These examples reaffirm that humanity's greatest achievements have emerged not from confrontation, but from communication. Lord Mahavira

spoke not only of dialogue with others but also of dialogue with oneself. A person who does not engage in self-reflection cannot engage meaningfully with others. Self-introspection, self-awareness, and self-purification constitute the very foundation of Mahavira's philosophy. When individuals recognize and overcome their own anger, ego, greed, and hatred, their conduct naturally becomes gentle and compassionate. Such individuals create an atmosphere of harmony rather than conflict.

In today's age of social media, genuine dialogue is often replaced by arguments, accusations, and hostility. People are more interested in defeating others than in understanding them. Civility in language is eroding, and sensitivity toward one another is steadily diminishing. At such a critical juncture, Lord Mahavira's message of disciplined speech, non-violent thought, and Anekantavada has be-

come more relevant than ever before. If we think before speaking, listen before reacting, and strive to understand before judging, countless disputes can be prevented before they even arise. Viewed from this perspective, the Mahavirayatan Foundation's "Dialogue for Solutions" initiative assumes profound significance. If humanity truly seeks lasting peace, social harmony, and sustainable progress, it must embrace Lord Mahavira's timeless message: "Where there is dialogue, there is solution. Where there is a solution, there is peace. And where there is peace, there lies the bright future of humanity." Electric Mobility can power a new economic future for Assam and the Northeast

India's electric vehicle transition is often discussed through sales figures, subsidies and climate targets. For people deciding whether to switch, however, the questions are far more immediate: Can I afford the vehicle? Where will I charge it? Who will repair it? Will spare parts be available? Can it withstand local road and weather conditions? These questions carry particular weight in Assam and the rest of Northeast India. The region's cities are growing, fuel costs affect household and business budgets, and dependable mobility remains essential for education, healthcare, trade and employment. Electric vehicles can address several of these concerns, but vehicles alone will not produce a successful transition. The Northeast needs an EV ecosystem built close to the people it intends to serve.

Delhi offers useful lessons. Its EV push combined purchase incentives, road-tax and registration-fee waivers, charging and battery-swapping infrastructure, public awareness, and support for commercial vehicles. The larger lesson is not that the Northeast should copy Delhi. It is that adoption rises when governments treat electric mobility as a connected system rather than a vehicle category.

Assam already recognised this in its Electric Vehicle Policy of 2021. The policy aimed for battery electric vehicles to account for 25% of new registrations by 2026. It also proposed model electric-mobility cities, including Guwahati, Jorhat, Dibrugarh, Tezpur and Silchar, alongside charging facilities, manufacturing, research, skills and employment. The intent was evident. The next task is to convert those ambitions into visible infrastructure and economic activity.

Build hubs where people live and work. In the Northeast, an EV hub should serve several purposes. It can provide charging or battery swapping, maintenance, spare parts, roadside support, vehicle demonstrations and guidance on finance. For delivery workers and other commercial users, it can reduce the time a vehicle remains off the road.

This is crucial because down-

time means lost income. A delivery rider cannot wait several hours for charging or days for a replacement component. A small business cannot adopt an electric cargo vehicle if dependable servicing is located hundreds of kilometres away.

The hub model can also take EV access beyond state capitals. Guwahati may serve as an important starting point, but the transition must reach district headquarters, commercial centres and smaller towns. A distributed network will give buyers the confidence that support will remain available after a vehicle is sold.

Public land at transport terminals, markets, parking areas and government facilities can be considered for charging or swapping infrastructure through transparent partnerships. State governments should also identify routes where commercial demand is already strong. Infrastructure placed according to daily usage will deliver greater value than installations selected primarily to meet numerical targets.

Turn EV adoption into a local employment programme.

The strongest case for electric mobility in the Northeast may be economic. A wider EV network can create jobs in retail, fleet operations, charging-station management, battery handling, diagnostics, software support, financing, insurance, maintenance and recycling.

Many of these roles require new technical capabilities. Industrial training institutes, polytechnics and universities should work with EV manufacturers and operators to develop short, practical courses. Young people need hands-on instruction in battery safety, electrical systems, vehicle diagnostics, charging equipment and emergency response.

Training should also cover existing mechanics. The region already has a large network of technicians who understand two-wheelers and small commercial vehicles. Helping them acquire EV skills would be faster and more inclusive than building a completely separate service workforce.

Paid apprenticeships can connect classroom instruction with actual jobs. Women should be actively included in technical, sales and operational roles, while entrepreneurship programmes can sup-

port local operators who want to establish service centres, charging points or small fleets.

If the transition is designed properly, the Northeast will not remain a market where finished vehicles are sold. It can become a source of trained workers, service businesses and technical capability.

Move from vehicle sales to local value creation. Local manufacturing does not have to begin with a complete vehicle assembly plant. It can start with components, chargers, wiring systems, body parts, accessories, software services and battery-pack support. Over time, a cluster of suppliers and service providers can reduce logistics costs, improve the availability of parts and adapt products to regional conditions.

This local presence matters in an area where long supply routes can increase costs and delay repairs. Vehicles used in the Northeast must also account for heavy rainfall, hilly roads, humidity and varying power availability. Local testing and technical feedback can help manufacturers improve performance for these conditions.

Affordability must remain central. Electric two-wheelers and three-wheelers can lower daily running expenses, but the initial price still prevents many families and workers from purchasing them. Targeted incentives, affordable loans, battery-leasing options and transparent total-cost comparisons can make adoption possible without placing excessive financial pressure on buyers.

India's national EV programmes have created an important base through demand incentives, public transport electrification and funding for charging infrastructure. Assam and neighbouring states now have an opportunity to build upon that support with plans suited to their communities.

The Northeast should not be treated as the final destination of India's EV rollout. With the right hubs, skills, local production and financing, it can become one of its strongest centres, creating cleaner transport while keeping jobs, enterprise and economic value within the region. Oppn members led by Congress, SP raise issue of Ram temple donation theft in Rajya Sabha

NEW DELHI, Aug 3: Opposition members in the Rajya Sabha, led by the Congress and Samajwadi Party, on Monday targeted the BJP as they raised the issue of alleged theft in donations at the Ram temple in Ayodhya.

Several members of the Congress, Samajwadi Party, TMC, left parties and other opposition parties of the INDIA bloc raised slogans against the government and the BJP while raising the issue.

As soon as the House met in the morning and listed papers were laid on the table of the House, opposition members raised the issue of 'Ram Mandir Chanda Chori'.

The opposition members also sought Home Minister Amit Shah's presence in the House for his response on the issue of police actions against students protesting NEET exam paper leak.

The Upper House has been witnessing repeated adjournments



since the start of the monsoon session, with opposition parties demanding education minister Dharmendra Pradhan's resignation on

the alleged paper leak issue.

Opposition raised its pitch on the issue of Ram temple donation following the resignation of Pradhan.

The opposition members have been demanding a Supreme Court-monitored probe into the alleged theft of donations at the Ram Temple.

Meanwhile, DMK members were also on their feet, carrying placards in support of their claim on the Cauvery water issue.

As opposition members urged Rajya Sabha Chairman C P Radhakrishnan to allow Leader of Opposition Mallikarjun Kharge to raise their issue, the chairman asked them to return to their seats and assured that he will allow the LoP to speak only after that.

The members went back to their seats but continued raising slogans, prompting the chairman to adjourn the House. (PTI)

Tamil Nadu govt moves SC for release of its share of Cauvery water from Karnataka

NEW DELHI, Aug 3: Chief Minister Joseph Vijay led-Tamil Nadu government on Monday approached the Supreme Court seeking directions to the Karnataka government for immediate release of the share of Cauvery water to Tamil Nadu.

Tamil Nadu government standing counsel B Karunakaran confirmed the filing of the petition that alleges that the quantum allocated to it by the Cauvery Water Regulation Committee (CWRC) as well as that released by its neighbour Karnataka was far less.

A CWRC meeting held on July 28 directed Karnataka to release 3,500 cusecs for 15 days starting July 29, an order which was upheld by the CWMA later.

However, the quantum of water released at Biligundlu ranged between 158-550 cusecs from July 29 to August 2, the state government said.

A press release issued by the Tamil Nadu government said that as of August 3, the combined total storage in the reservoirs in Karnataka -- KRS, Kabini, Harangi and Hemavathy -- stood at 77,537 TMC and Karnataka would face no difficulty in releasing Tamil Nadu's due share proportionately.

Following rains in the catchment areas in the KRS and Kabini dams in Karnataka recently, the proportionate water to be realised at Biligundlu should be 26,954 TMC, it said.

"Accordingly, the Cauvery Water Management Authority order allocating 4,536 TMC is very less," the release added.

Karnataka has "failed" to share with Tamil Nadu its due share of water and the quantum was 26,954 TMC, the press release said.

Earlier, the DMK, the main opposition party in Tamil Nadu, moved the top court seeking directions to the Karnataka government for the immediate release of the due share of Cauvery water to the state.

The party has submitted that Karnataka must strictly



follow the apex court's final 2018 verdict and comply with the directions issued by the Cauvery Water Management Authority (CWMA).

"Direct the State of Karnataka / Respondent No. 1 to forthwith and fully implement the direction of the CWRC dated July 28, 2026, as affirmed by the CWMA on July 30, 2026, by ensuring a flow of 3,500 cusecs per day at Biligundlu for the period of 15 days commencing from date of the order passed by this Hon'ble Court, and to make good the shortfall in compliance from July 29, 2026 onwards," the DMK said in its plea.

It also sought a direction to Karnataka to "make good the accumulated backlog of about 9.46 TMC due at Biligundlu as on July 26, 2026, computed on the pro-rata/ distress-sharing basis, by ensuring releases such that about 7,000 cusecs per day is realised at Biligundlu over a period of 15 days", it had said.

The plea has sought directions to the CWMA to monitor the water release from the reservoirs of Karnataka and the flows realised at Biligundlu on a day-to-day basis and to report compliance. (PTI)

Ex-WFI chief Brij Bhushan's acquittal: Maharashtra Cong dubs govt 'mute, deaf & blind'

MUMBAI, Aug 3: Maharashtra Congress chief Harshwardhan Sapkal on Monday took a dim view of the acquittal of former WFI chief Brij Bhushan Sharan Singh in a sexual harassment case, calling it the country's misfortune under a "mute, deaf and blind" government.

Talking to PTI Videos, Sapkal underscored the timing of the decision, remarking on the irony that the honour of the athletes who brought India respect at the just-concluded Commonwealth Games has been undermined.

A Delhi court on Monday acquitted former Wrestling Federation of India (WFI) chief Brij Bhushan Sharan Singh and co-accused Vinod Tomar in a sexual harassment case filed by women wrestlers.

The Delhi Police had filed a chargesheet against Singh, a six-time MP, on June 15 under sections 354 (assault or criminal force to a woman with intent to outrage her modesty), 354A (sexual harassment), 354D (stalking) and 506 (criminal intimidation) of the Indian Penal Code.

Reacting to the court order, Sapkal said the law is "blind" (andha kanoon) in the country. These women have raised the country's honour; they are truly the pride and dignity of the nation, he said, adding that a person like Singh should have been dealt with strictly.

"He (Singh) needed to be

taught a strong lesson. But it is our country's misfortune that a mute, deaf, and blind government is in power," Sapkal charged.

If any worker, leader or person from the BJP does anything — even something as grave as rape — they can still be acquitted. Somewhere this decision appears to send that message, he claimed.

"The real face of the Bharatiya Janata Party is unfortunately before all of us. But while this face has been exposed, the dignity which women deserved, the dignity of the country, and the respect that should be there for athletes have been lowered a lot," Sapkal claimed. (PTI)

Kejriwal to march to PM residence over E20 petrol, alleges Centre 'yielded' to Trump

NEW DELHI, Aug 3: AAP national convenor Arvind Kejriwal on Monday said he will march to Prime Minister Narendra Modi's residence Tuesday with 100 people to submit petitions against E20 fuel, alleging the Centre is pushing it under pressure from US President Donald Trump.

Kejriwal alleged that India has "yielded" to Trump to buy ethanol from the United States and said the government's continued push for ethanol-blended petrol suggested there was a "hidden agenda".

"I will go to PM's residence tomorrow along with 100 people to personally hand over the petitions signed by the public and discuss issues related to ethanol-blended petrol. People are facing several problems in their vehicles despite all that the government is continuing with this, which means there is a hidden agenda," Kejriwal said at a press conference.

"People are saying that PM Modi is under pressure from Trump to buy ethanol from the United States," he added.

Kejriwal said he would personally hand over the petitions to Modi after receiving no response to a letter he had sent to the prime minister last month seeking an appointment to discuss concerns over E20 petrol.

In his letter, Kejriwal had sought the availability of options for both pure petrol and E20 fuel at petrol stations, besides demanding a reduction in the price of ethanol-blended petrol.

"We did not get any response on the letter, so now we will personally hand over the petition to PM Modi. We had launched a petition campaign against ethanol-blended petrol. More than 2 lakh people have signed this petition," he said.

Kejriwal also said the "Ethanol Townhall" organised by the AAP last week was a "huge success", with several people joining the meeting virtually. (PTI)

MP: Cong retains Datia assembly seat; Ghanshyam Singh defeats BJP's Tiwari by 6,000 votes

DATIA, Aug 3: The Congress on Monday retained the Datia assembly seat in Madhya Pradesh, with the party candidate Ghanshyam Singh defeating his nearest rival Ashutosh Tiwari of the BJP by 6,016 votes in the byelection marked by differences in the saffron camp over the choice of candidate.

At the end of all 15 rounds of counting, Singh secured 66,757 votes, while Tiwari polled 60,741 votes. Azad Samaj Party candidate Damodar Yadav secured third position by bagging 22,527 votes, District Election Officer and Datia District Magistrate Swapnil Wankhade told PTI.

A total of 21 candidates were in the fray, including Ghanshyam Singh and Ashutosh Tiwari.

At one point, Singh's lead of 12,607 votes over his nearest rival appeared unassailable, but the BJP nominee managed to close the gap to an extent in the last rounds.

The byelection was necessitated after a Delhi court in April this year sentenced sitting Congress MLA Rajendra Bharti to three years' imprisonment in a cheating case, leading to the termination of his Assembly membership.

"This verdict marks the beginning of the end of the BJP," Ghanshyam Singh told reporters.

In Bhopal, celebrations broke out at the state Congress headquar-

Prashant Kishor wins Bihar's Bankipur, breaks BJP's three-decade hold



PATNA, Aug 3: Jan Suraj Party founder Prashant Kishor made a historic electoral debut on Monday, winning the by-poll for Bihar's prestigious Bankipur assembly constituency, in a big blow to the BJP, which had held the seat since 1995.

The defeat, coming days after the massive Gen Z protests across the country, was even more stinging because the seat was last held by BJP president Nitin Nabin, whose elevation necessitated the by-poll on August 30.

Kishor, who got 64,151 votes, defeated BJP's Neeraj Kumar by 19,324 votes. Kumar garnered 44,827 votes. Rekha Gupta of RJD was a distant third with 14,273 votes.

A little less than 3.8 lakh voters, including 2 lakh men and 1.79 lakh women, were eligible to vote in the polls. The by-poll recorded a voter turnout of 34.30 per cent, down by more than seven per cent from the 41.45 per cent registered in the last assembly elections, held just nine months ago.

"The victory is a wake-up call for Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who must install a new Chief Minister in place of Samrat Choudhary, a man with criminal antecedents," said Kishor, for whom it was a satisfying reversal of fortunes. In the assembly elections, his party had failed to win any seats. Kishor had decided not to contest then.

The 49-year-old Jan Suraj founder had entered the fray, announcing that he saw the by-election as a "referendum" on the BJP-led government in the state.

Kishor, whose victory may help resurrect his fledgling outfit, also said, "On this occasion, besides thanking the common citizens, I would like to thank those who helped Jan Suraj despite not being in the party."

BJP had hurriedly fielded Kumar after its candidate Abhishek "Bunty" pulled out at the eleventh hour, citing "family reasons".

The by-poll to the assembly seat was necessitated by the resignation of BJP national president Nitin Nabin, whose late father, Navin Chandra Sinha, began the party's winning streak in 1995, when the seat was known as "Patna seat".

Nabin had vacated the Bankipur seat in April, upon election to the Rajya Sabha, six months after having won it for the fifth time on the trot.

State BJP president Sanjay reacted to the humiliating defeat, saying, "We bow down before the will of the people. We shall draw lessons from the debacle, unlike our opponents who tend to blame every electoral loss of theirs on EVMs and the Election Commission".

Commending Kishor, Chief Minister Chaudhary said, "In the grand festival of democracy, the people have chosen Jan Suraj in the Bankipur Assembly bypoll. I respect the people's verdict and extend my heartfelt congratulations to Prashant Kishor ji on his victory."

Kishor, who had first shot to fame for managing Modi's 2014 Lok Sabha campaign, has been a vocal critic of Chaudhary. (PTI)

Adityanath hits back at oppn on temple donation theft issue



LUCKNOW, Aug 3: Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath on Monday said those raising questions on the handling of donations at the Ram temple in Ayodhya had earlier attempted to obstruct the temple's construction, and slammed their "double standards".

Talking to reporters before the commencement of the Monsoon Session of the state legislature, Adityanath also appealed to all MLAs to ensure a constructive discussion in the House and said the government had brought a supplementary budget aimed at strengthening welfare measures for various categories of frontline workers.

"The Ayodhya issue is being raised by those who had fired bullets at Ram devotees. They are the same people who used to resort to lathi-charge and firing when people raised the slogan of 'Jai Shri Ram'," the chief minister said without naming any party. (PTI)

ABVP to submit proposals to the High-Powered Committee on exam reforms

KOCHI, Aug 3: The pro-RSS student organisation, ABVP, here on Monday said that it would submit a comprehensive set of recommendations to the High-Powered Committee on exam reforms set up by the Centre, following the NEET paper leak row.

Akhil Bharatiya Vidyarthi Parishad (ABVP) leaders told this at a press conference here following the conclusion of their two-day Central Working Committee (CWC) meeting in Aluva near here on August 1 and 2.

ABVP expressed concern over recurring question paper leaks in examinations conducted by the Jharkhand Public Service Commission (JPSC), Bihar Public Service Commission (BPSC), Karnataka Public Service Commission (KPSC) and recruitment examinations in Punjab, saying such incidents had undermined students' faith in the examination system.

The organisation extended its support to affected students and appealed to student organisations, educationists and civil society to strengthen the movement for examination reforms.

ABVP National General Secretary Virendra Singh Solanki said repeated question paper leaks in Jharkhand, Bihar, Karnataka and Punjab had raised serious concerns over the credibility of the examination system.

"ABVP fully supports the legitimate demands and democratic movements of students. Every student has the right to a fair, transparent, credible and error-free examination system," he said.

With this objective, ABVP will submit detailed recommendations before the High-Powered Committee constituted by the Government of India following the NEET examination irregularities, advocating the institutional reforms necessary to strengthen the country's examination framework," he said. (PTI)

Indian Museum joins hands with IIT-Kharagpur for use of 'AI-based restoration' of artefacts: Govt

NEW DELHI, Aug 3: The Indian Museum in Kolkata has joined hands with IIT-Kharagpur for the use of "AI-based restoration" of archaeological artefacts and digital preservation of its collections, the government informed Parliament on Monday.

Union Culture Minister Gajendra Singh Shekhawat, in a written response to a query in the Lok Sabha, also said the Indian Museum, in collaboration with Google Art and Culture, has prepared a virtual exhibition for promotion of heritage through digital interventions.

Google Art and Culture is the cultural platform of the internet giant.

The minister was asked whether any national framework has been developed for digital archiving, collection management and virtual public access to museum collections in the country.

"Indian Museum, Kolkata, aligning with the vision of 'Vikas Bhi, Virasat Bhi' and in accordance with its mandate of promoting and preserving cultural heritage, has undertaken collaborative initiatives with the academic institutions to strengthen heritage conservation and digital innovation," he said.

The Indian Museum has joined hands with IIT-Kharagpur for the use of "AI-based restoration of archaeological artefacts, for digital preservation of its collections", the minister said.

Also, the Indian Museum, in collaboration with Google Art and Culture, has prepared a virtual exhibition for the promotion of heritage through digital interventions. As part

of its modernisation, AI-based interactive and AR-based visitor engagement tools have been introduced to provide an immersive gallery experience to visitors, he added.

Besides, the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) has launched mobile-based applications for the archaeological museums at Hampi (Karnataka) and Nalanda (Bihar). The applications provide virtual tours of the museums and facilitate digital access to the artefacts displayed therein.

Delhi-based Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts (IGNCA) has undertaken documentation, research, publication and digital preservation of various aspects of Mithila art, traditions and manuscripts through its regular academic and archival activities, he said.

The government also said the Ministry of Culture is taking different initiatives in digital archiving and collection management to preserve our cultural assets through digitisation with JATAN software, developed by C-DAC, Pune, for digitisation of museum

collections and archival resources.

A national digital repository has been created through the Museums of India portal, where digitised collections of eight national-level museums, two ASI site museums and Dr Babasaheb Ambedkar Museum, Pune are available.

In tabulated data, the minister also shared the status of digitisation of museum collections available on the website through JATAN software, according to which out of the total 4,78,971 artefacts at these eight national-level museums, 3,36,359 artefacts (or 70.23 per cent) can be digitally seen on their respective websites.

The individual figures for these museums stood at -- National Museum (total 2,06,169 artefacts) 51.15 per cent can be digitally seen on its website; Indian Museum (total 1,08,000 artefacts) 72.17 per cent can be digitally seen on its website; Victoria Memorial Hall (total 28,394 artefacts) 98.34 per cent can be digitally seen on its website. CBI's claim of 'non-cooperation' in probe into award of contracts SC seeks Arunachal top officials' response

NEW DELHI, Aug 3: The Supreme Court on Monday sought responses from the Arunachal Pradesh's chief secretary and principal secretary (Home) after the CBI's claim about "non-cooperation" by the state government in its inquiry into contracts awarded to firms allegedly related to the kin of Chief Minister Pema Khandu.

A bench of Justices Vikram Nath and Sandeep Mehta said both these officers would remain present before it on August 24 along with their responses to the CBI's status report and also explain why there was non-cooperation.

On April 6, the apex court had directed the CBI to register within two weeks a preliminary enquiry into the allegations of preferential allotment of contracts for public works in Arunachal Pradesh to firms allegedly owned or related to the family members of Chief Minister Khandu.

The top court had directed the Arunachal Pradesh government and all its concerned departments, authorities and instrumentalities to cooperate fully with the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI).

On Monday, the bench perused the status report filed by the CBI.

Additional Solicitor General K M Nataraj, appearing for the CBI, said the probe agency has sought more time to complete the enquiry and the state authorities were not co-operating with it.

"We will call the chief secretary," the bench observed, and said if there was non-cooperation then why a "long rope" was given.



Referring to the CBI's status report, the bench observed the probe agency has flagged certain discrepancies.

"Why do you need anything more for registering a RC (regular case)," the bench asked the law officer.

It said the agency had sought some details from the state authorities which they have not provided.

"We have perused the status report given by the CBI dated July 17, 2026. A perusal of

the same reflects that there is non-cooperation at the end of the state government in providing the necessary records..." the bench said.

It issued notice to the chief secretary and principal secretary (Home) of Arunachal Pradesh seeking their responses.

"Both the aforesaid officers shall remain present before this court along with their responses to the aforesaid report of CBI and also explain why there is non-cooperation

and non-compliance of the order of this court," the bench said, while posting the matter for August 24.

In its April 6 verdict, the top court had observed that the state and its instrumentalities cannot confer benefits according to the "whims of any political or administrative functionary".

It had said it was a fit case where an "independent investigation" was necessary.

"Accordingly, we deem it appropriate that CBI shall register a preliminary enquiry forthwith and shall conduct a time-bound investigation into the award and execution of the public works contracts and work orders which form the subject matter of this writ petition and the affidavits filed in these proceedings," it had said.

The top court had delivered its verdict on a plea filed by NGOs Save Mon Region Federation and Voluntary Arunachal Sena seeking a CBI or SIT probe into the matter.

During the hearing in the matter, the apex court was told that government contracts and work orders worth around ₹ 1,270 crore were awarded in the last 10 years in Arunachal Pradesh to four firms allegedly related to the family members of Khandu.

In its verdict, the top court had said the preliminary enquiry and consequential investigation, if any, shall cover the award and execution of public works contracts and work orders in Arunachal Pradesh from January 1, 2015 to December 31, 2025, including the works and compilations placed on record in the proceedings before it. (PTI)

Govt, citizens working together to restore lasting peace in Manipur: CM



IMPHAL, Aug 3: Manipur Chief Minister Y. Khemchand Singh on Sunday said his government and the people of the state were making sincere efforts to restore lasting peace and that encouraging signs of improvement were now visible.

In another incident, police arrested an Assam resident and seized 80 gm of brown sugar from his possession in Senapati district on Sunday.

The man, identified as Arun Dutta (50), a resident of Dibrugarh, was arrested during a frisking operation at T Khullen checkpoint.

Eight soap cases containing brown sugar weighing a total of 80 gm were seized from his possession, it added. (PTI)

Heavy rain to lash Arunachal till tomorrow

ITANAGAR, Aug 3: Heavy rain is likely to lash parts of Arunachal Pradesh on August 4 and 5, according to the India Meteorological Department (IMD) forecast issued on Monday.

The IMD said thunderstorms with lightning and very heavy rainfall are likely at isolated places in Papum Pare district on Tuesday.

East Kameng is also likely to witness thunderstorms with lightning and heavy rainfall. Most other districts have been placed under a 'yellow' watch, indicating the possibility of adverse weather, while a few districts remain under an 'orange' alert, asking residents to stay prepared. On Wednesday, heavy rainfall activity is expected to ease further, with a yellow watch remaining in force for several districts, including Papum Pare, while no major warning has been issued for large parts of the state.

The ongoing spell of floods and landslides has so far claimed seven lives and affected 1,55,850 people across the northeastern state.

The monsoon has affected as many as 382 circles and 674 villages in 28 districts of the state so far. The forecast indicates a gradual reduction in rainfall intensity from this day onwards.

From Thursday, the weather is expected to improve significantly, with no warning issued for almost the entire state. Only a few western districts are likely to remain under a yellow watch as isolated spells of rain may continue. (PTI)

NE vital part of India's heritage: Manipur deputy CM

IMPHAL, Aug 3: Manipur Deputy Chief Minister Losii Dikho has said the Northeast is a vital part of India's heritage, endowed with rich traditions and immense potential that contributes to the country's progress, an official statement said on Monday.

"As India moves towards the vision of Viksit Bharat, every young person, irrespective of where they come from, should have equal access to quality education and opportunities," he said.

Petrol bombs hurled at MSPCB office; no casualty

SHILLONG, Aug 3: Two unidentified persons hurled petrol bombs at the Meghalaya State Pollution Control Board (MSPCB) office here on Monday afternoon, but there was no loss of life or damage to property, police said.

The attack came days after the board conducted a public hearing for a proposed limestone mining project in the state's East Jaintia Hills district against popular opposition to the project.

The attack took place between 12 noon and 12.30 pm when two masked men arrived on a scooter and lobbed two petrol bombs, officials said.

No injuries or damage to property were reported.

"We have lodged an FIR. Police and the forensic team visited the office and collected evidence," an MSPCB official said.

Superintendent of Police (City) Dangan Khyriem confirmed the incident.

"Two petrol bombs were hurled. A case will be registered based on the FIR," Khyriem told PTI.

Asked whether the attack could be linked to the recent public hearing on the proposed limestone mining project at Lum Syman, Khyriem said it was premature to draw any conclusions.

Police are analysing CCTV footage from the area and have launched a manhunt to trace the two accused, officials added. (PTI)

Mizoram police seize drugs worth over ₹ 8 crore

AIZAWL, Aug 3: Mizoram police has seized heroin and methamphetamine tablets worth over ₹ 8 crore in three operations carried out in Champhai and Aizawl, an official statement said on Monday.

Four people, including a Myanmar national, have been arrested during the operations, the statement said.

The largest seizure was made by Champhai Special Task Force (STF) when a truck travelling from Champhai towards Aizawl was intercepted on August 1, it said.

A search of the vehicle led to the recovery of 9.79 kg of methamphetamine, packed in 10 bundles and valued at an estimated ₹ 7.83 crore, the police statement said.

The driver, identified as Vanlalruatsaka (32) of Melbuk village in Champhai district, was arrested.

Champhai police registered a



case under the NDPS Act, and further investigation is underway, it said.

Methamphetamine tablets, also called crazy drugs or party drugs, are banned in India.

Earlier in the same day, the Champhai STF intercepted a maxicab at the Khankawn check gate and recovered 118 gram of heroin worth ₹ 23.6 lakh from the possession of Vanlalnuana (27), a resident of Shanmyo village in

Myanmar's Tahan, it said.

The accused was booked under the NDPS Act and section 21 of The Immigration and Foreigners Act.

In another operation, a team from the Special Narcotics Police Station (SNPS) in Aizawl seized 241.21 gram of heroin, packed in 20 soap cases, at Zemabawk in the northeastern outskirts of the state capital on August 1.

The drugs were allegedly being transported in a pickup truck by two suspected traffickers identified as Hussain Ahmed Laskar (23) and Noor Ahmed Laskar (34), both from Cachar district in Assam.

They were arrested on the spot and booked under the NDPS Act, 1985.

Further investigation into the case is going on, the statement said. (PTI)

Volunteers remove over 2 tonnes of waste from Yagamso river in Itanagar

ITANAGAR, Aug 3: Volunteers removed 2,160 kg of waste from the Yagamso riverbed and its banks at Chandranagar in Itanagar during a clean-up drive.

The drive was jointly organised by the Youth Mission for Clean River (YMCR) and the Abralow Memorial Multipurpose Society (AMMS) on Sunday, with support from the Itanagar Smart City Development Corporation Ltd (ISCDCL).

Following the removal of debris, volunteers conducted a comprehensive waste audit to determine the primary causes and sources of pollution affecting the riverbody.

The audit revealed a predominance of single-use plastics, packaging materials, construction debris,

old clothing, and household waste.

Organisers on Monday said the diverse array of waste highlights a combination of unchecked littering and improper domestic waste disposal in the area.

Highlighting the significance of the exercise, YMCR vice chairman Keyom Doni said the waste audit was critical to understanding the specific pollutants impacting the river system.

"The audit allows us to move beyond simply removing waste to identifying what is polluting the river and why," Doni said, emphasising the urgent need for heightened community awareness and stricter local waste management measures. (PTI)

India's rich cultural tapestry takes centre stage as Commonwealth baton heads to Ahmedabad

GLASGOW, Aug 3: As the curtain came down on the Glasgow Commonwealth Games, India offered the world a vibrant invitation to Ahmedabad, blending ancient philosophy, contemporary artistry and cultural grandeur in a handover presentation that officially launched the journey towards the centenary edition of the Games in 2030.

The emotional centrepiece of Sunday's closing ceremony at the OVO Hydro saw Glasgow formally pass the Commonwealth Games baton to India before a spectacular showcase of music, dance and storytelling projected India's identity as a nation where tradition and modernity coexist.

Prince Edward, Duke of Edinburgh, representing King Charles III, formally declared the Games closed.

"Thanks for the manner in which you have competed, officiated, supported, organised the Games. You have once again brought the spirit and value of Commonwealth tonight. Thank You Glasgow," he said.

"I call up on athletes of all countries and territories to come to Ahmedabad, India in four years time to celebrate the 24th Commonwealth Games in what will

be the centenary of the Games," he added.

Jaismine Lamboria carried India's flag at the closing ceremony after winning gold in the women's 57kg category boxing competition.

The formal handover began with the Commonwealth Games flag making its symbolic journey across the arena.

Led by bearers holding the Scottish and Indian flags, the procession lowered the folded Games flag, Glasgow's Lord Provost Jacqueline McLaren then passed it to Commonwealth Games Scotland vice-chair Susan Jackson, Scottish netball player Emily Nicholl, Commonwealth Sport president Dr Donald Rukare, two-time Olympic medallist Neeraj Chopra, Indian Olympic Association president PT Usha, and finally Gujarat Deputy Chief Minister Harsh Sanghavi. This marked the official transfer of hosting responsibilities from Scotland to India.

From that solemn moment, the atmosphere transformed into a celebration of India's civilisational ethos.

The Indian presentation unfolded over three acts, taking the audience on what organisers described as a journey celebrating shared values, culture and con-



nection.

The overarching message was rooted in the ancient Indian philosophy of Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam -- "The World is One Family" -- a theme that resonated strongly with the Commonwealth's ideals of unity and friendship.

The opening act also commemorated 150 years of Vande Mataram, India's national song, with a sweeping choreogra-

phy led by actor Manushi Chhillar.

Set against immersive digital visuals, hundreds of dancers painted a vivid portrait of India's diversity while maestro Shankar Mahadevan's stirring score fused orchestral grandeur with Indian musical traditions.

The performance sought to portray India as a civilisation that welcomes the world through its plurality of languages,

customs and artistic traditions. A specially produced film introduced international audiences to Ahmedabad.

The film presented sport as an inseparable part of Indian life, tracing its evolution from ancient traditions of discipline and physical excellence to the aspirations of one of the world's youngest nations.

Gujarat was portrayed as a place where centuries-old heritage intersects with innovation and urban ambition, positioning Ahmedabad as a fitting venue for the Commonwealth Games' landmark centenary edition.

The visual narrative culminated with a message that sport has the power to unite people, celebrate diversity and bring the Commonwealth together in India.

The second act celebrated perhaps the strongest cultural bridge between the outgoing and incoming hosts - music.

Called "The Cultural Jugalbandi", the segment paired internationally acclaimed Indian sitar virtuoso Rishabh Sharma with celebrated Scottish musician Ross Ainslie.

The dialogue between Sharma's sitar and Ainslie's Scottish pipes and whistles became a symbolic conversation between

two ancient musical traditions. Moving seamlessly between meditative passages and energetic crescendos, the performance demonstrated how music can transcend geography and language while respecting cultural identity.

The finale belonged to one of India's most celebrated musical families.

Shankar Mahadevan returned to the stage alongside his sons Siddharth and Shivam Mahadevan for a concert that travelled through some of India's most recognisable songs, including "Suno gaur se duniya walon, Bhaag Milkha, Ae watan watan and Lehara Do."

Gujarati playback singer Bhoomi Trivedi added a special tribute to the host state, ensuring Gujarat occupied centre stage before welcoming the Commonwealth in four years' time.

The Indian showcase followed Glasgow's farewell celebration featuring Scottish music, poetry and dance.

Scotland's wheelchair racer Melanie Woods won the David Dixon Award, which is given to the outstanding athlete of the Commonwealth Games, based on their performance, fair play and overall contribution to their team's participation at the Games. (PTI)

Wrestlers will file appeal against decision to acquit Brij Bhushan: Vinesh

NEW DELHI, Aug 3: World Championships medallist Vinesh Phogat on Monday said that the women wrestlers who had filed a sexual harassment case against former Wrestling Federation of India (WFI) chief Brij Bhushan Sharan Singh will appeal against a Delhi court's decision to acquit him.

A Delhi court on Monday acquitted Singh and co-accused Vinod Tomar in the sexual harassment case filed by the women wrestlers.

"From the very beginning, the entire administration, the government, and the system have been engaged in protecting Brij Bhushan," Phogat posted on 'X'.

"We are deeply saddened that the court did not find Brij Bhushan Sharan Singh guilty of the allegations of sexual violence made by the women wrestlers.

"The women wrestlers have instructed their lawyers to appeal against this decision, and the appeal will be filed as soon as possible. We have not lost hope, and the wrestlers will continue their fight," Phogat said.

Additional Chief Judicial Magistrate Ashwini Panwar acquitted ex-BJP MP Singh and Tomar, former WFI assistant secretary, in the



case.

Phogat, along with wrestlers Sakshi Malik and Bajrang Punia, was the face of the 36-day sit-in protest in April-May 2023 against Singh at Delhi's Jantar Mantar.

Punia also posted the same statement on his 'X' handle.

Phogat also alleged that Singh "intimidated several girls into withdrawing their names".

"We had to gather a lot of courage to come out onto the streets and get an FIR registered against a powerful leader of the ruling party. Using his influence and political power, Brij Bhushan

intimidated several girls into withdrawing their names.

drawing their names.

"However, many women wrestlers stood firm and continued fighting against Brij Bhushan in court," she said.

Based on the complaints filed by the six wrestlers, Delhi police registered a first information report (FIR) against Singh on June 15, 2023.

The Delhi Police had filed a chargesheet against Singh, a six-time MP, under sections 354 (assault or criminal force to a woman with intent to outrage her modesty), 354A (sexual harassment), 354D (stalking) and 506 (criminal intimidation) of the Indian Penal

Code.

One of the wrestlers, a minor, later withdrew her complaint.

In May last year, a Delhi Court accepted the Delhi Police's cancellation report, closing the POCSO (Protection of Children from Sexual Offences) case filed by the minor.

The court on July 2 had reserved the order for August 3 after completion of the final arguments in the case.

Speaking to reporters outside the court, Singh said the court had "honourably" acquitted him and Tomar.

"On the first day, I had said that if any allegation against me was proved, I would hang myself. The court has now honourably acquitted me. I am happy and grateful to my lawyers," he said.

"For now, this is all I can say. I will comment further after going through the court's reasoned order," the ex-BJP MP added.

Public prosecutor Manish Rawat, however, said that after examining the detailed order, "appropriate action" would be taken before the higher courts.

The prosecution can challenge the magisterial court's verdict before the Delhi High Court. (PTI)

Boxing boom, judo show power India to strong Glasgow CWG campaign

GLASGOW, Aug 3: India overcame the absence of several traditional medal-winning sports to surpass expectations at the 2026 Commonwealth Games, signing off fourth with 39 medals on the back of a record-breaking boxing campaign, a historic showing in judo, and another strong performance by its para athletes.

With the Games reduced to just 10 sports, leaving out wrestling, shooting, badminton and hockey, India's chances of a top-five finish looked uncertain before the Games began.

However, the 122-member contingent returned with 13 gold, 17 silver and nine bronze medals, underlining the country's growing depth beyond its traditional strengths.

Boxing led the way. The Indian pugilists produced their best-ever Commonwealth Games campaign, collecting a record seven gold medals and 10 podium finishes overall. While the women lived up to expectations, the men also delivered consistently to make it India's most successful sport in Glasgow.

The performance, however, must be viewed in context. The absence of several European and Central Asian nations meant the competition was not as deep as at the Olympics or World Championships. Even so, India made full use of the opportunity.

Judo was another major positive. Long considered a fringe medal sport, it produced India's best-ever Commonwealth Games performance. Asmita Dey's gold, won months after losing her father, and Harsh Singh's title, reflected the steady progress the sport has made over the last few years.

Para sport continued its upward trajectory.

From powerlifting to athletics, Indian para athletes once again proved that their success at recent Paralympics was no coincidence. The medals across disciplines reflected the growing strength of the



country's para sports programme.

Athletics presented a mixed picture.

Olympic champion Neeraj Chopra, returning from injury, settled for silver and a few other medal hopefuls failed to meet expectations. At the same time, the sport produced some of India's most memorable performances.

Tejaswin Shankar fought back from a knee injury that ended his high jump campaign to win a decathlon medal. Gulveer Singh emerged as India's only double medallist with his distance-running exploits, while Murali Sreeshankar marked his return from a lengthy injury lay-off with another Commonwealth silver.

Weightlifting, one of India's most dependable medal-producing sports, had a quieter Games.

After returning with 10 medals, including three golds, in Birmingham four years ago, the lifters managed eight podium finishes but only one gold, won by Mirabai Chanu.

Competing with a reduced squad after quota cuts linked to previous anti-doping sanctions, the team still delivered a respectable haul but fell short of its own high standards.

There were disappointments elsewhere.

Lawn bowls could not build on the historic gold and silver won in Birmingham, while cycling and swimming continued to search for the breakthrough performances that have remained elusive.

Athletics, too, will believe it missed opportunities to add to the medal tally.

But India's overall performance suggested its medal prospects are no longer tied to just a few established disciplines.

The absence of wrestling and other sports could have significantly reduced the medal haul. Instead, boxing delivered in unprecedented fashion, judo emerged as a genuine medal-winning sport and para athletes continued to strengthen India's position.

Equally significant was the contribution from emerging athletes. With Chopra below his best and weightlifting contributing fewer gold medals than usual, India's overall tally remained healthy because newer faces stepped up across disciplines.

That will be the biggest positive for India as it prepares to host the centenary Commonwealth Games in Ahmedabad in 2030. Glasgow showed that the country's medal base is widening, giving it more avenues for success than ever before. (PTI)

European soccer body UEFA warns FIFA of legal action over Infantino's failed World Cup sell-off plan

NYON (SWITZERLAND), Aug 3: European soccer body UEFA has threatened FIFA with legal action over Gianni Infantino's failed plan to sell a stake in future World Cup profits to private investors, and said any potential evidence should not be destroyed.

Infantino's secretive proposal to raise \$4.2 billion from investors including the New York investment firm of Joshua Kushner was dropped early Saturday, days after the revelation in media reports provoked a global furor.

UEFA led the backlash and on Thursday its 55 member federations met to agree boycotting all FIFA events and competitions while the proposal was active.

Now lawyers for UEFA have informed FIFA that the European body is "actively considering legal action, arbitration, and/or regulatory complaints ... arising out of and in connection with the FFE (FIFA Forward Enterprise) plan proposed by FIFA and all related matters."

The letter dated Friday from the legal firm Dechert in New York was seen Monday by The Associated Press.

The letter named 18 FIFA executives who it said should retain data, documents and electronic messages as potential evidence.

"UEFA puts you on formal notice that any destruction, deletion, alteration, concealment, or loss of relevant materials following receipt of this notice -- or following any earlier date on which you were, or reasonably should have been, aware that proceedings were anticipated -- may constitute spoliation of evidence," the letter said.

On Saturday, UEFA signaled it wants to end Infantino's decade-long presidency, saying he had lost the confidence of world soccer and that "no option should be off the table." Hours earlier, Infantino withdrew the divisive proposal that

offered FIFA's 211 member federations one-off payments of \$20 million each with a mid-September deadline to accept.

The FFE spin-off valued by FIFA at \$20 billion would have taken control of the soccer body's money-making commercial and tournament operations. The 211 members already effectively own the Zurich-based not-for-profit governing body.

It was the project of just one man, FIFA's chief operating officer Kevin Lamour said in a stinging statement Friday to the AP which said staff felt deceived by their boss Infantino. Legal proceedings are "reasonably anticipated," UEFA's lawyer Andrew J. Levander wrote, citing the belief of soccer stakeholders that the plan was "fundamentally incompatible with the proper governance of football."

Opposition to Infantino

UEFA has been most outspoken against its former employee Infantino while the Asian Football Confederation and CONCACAF, the North and Central American and Caribbean soccer body, also have made strong statements to oppose Infantino's plan.

Infantino has most support from his traditional base in Africa, while South America's CONMEBOL is relying on him to expand the 2030 World Cup to 64 teams from 48. That would give more hosting games to Argentina, Uruguay and Paraguay, the home country of CONMEBOL president Alejandro Dominguez.

The private equity plan has provoked a stunning turnaround in fortunes for Infantino who left New York after the World Cup final two weeks ago seemingly a lock to be re-elected unopposed next March for a fourth and final term in office through 2031. The spin-off operation could have created a commissioner-like role for him beyond 2031 paying much more than his current \$6 million annual salary and bonus deal as president. (AP)

Kamilla Rakhimova beats Venus Williams

TORONTO, Aug 3: Kamilla Rakhimova beat Venus Williams 6-4, 6-1 in a rain-delayed match to kick off the National Bank Open women's main draw.

Granted a singles wild-card entry at the WTA 1000 event, the 46-year-old Williams has lost 12 straight matches dating to July 2025.

"We play outside ... you can't control the weather," Williams said Sunday.

"But the fans were amazing. They were with me right in every point -- that was fantastic. I was just fighting to put the ball on the court."

The 24-year-old Rakhimova is from Uzbekistan. She's ranked 82nd in the world.

"Playing Venus is not an everyday experience," Rakhimova said.

"I'm very glad to actually get a chance to play against her. I was looking forward to that match. I knew it was going to be a center-court match. I was trying to enjoy my time on it, no matter what the result." (AP)

2030 CWG will set new benchmarks in accessibility, sustainability: Sanghavi

GLASGOW, Aug 3: Gujarat Deputy Chief Minister Harsh Sanghavi said the 2030 Commonwealth Games in Ahmedabad will set new benchmarks in accessibility and sustainability, while insisting that the city already possesses enough infrastructure to stage the centenary edition of the multi-sport event.

Ahmedabad will host the Commonwealth Games in 2030, marking the event's return to India after two decades. India last staged the Games in New Delhi in 2010.

Sanghavi, who also holds the sports portfolio in the state, said Ahmedabad's biggest focus would be on ensuring the Games are fully inclusive for para athletes.

"For para athletes, Ahmedabad will set a new example. We are already making all hotels accessible for para athletes. Our aim is to make it the most para athlete-friendly Commonwealth Games," he said on Sunday.

He also highlighted Gujarat's push towards green energy and sustainable urban transport, saying the Games would be built around environment-friendly infrastructure.

"Gujarat is India's largest producer of green energy. Ahmedabad will set the best standards in sustainability," he said.

"All local transportation, including the BRT system, will be electric. Right now it is around 90 per cent electric, but by 2030 it will be 100 per cent."

He asserted that the city already has the nec-



essary infrastructure to host the Games, with only limited upgrades required.

"We already have enough infrastructure to conduct the Commonwealth Games even today. If we refurbish around 20 per cent of the existing infrastructure, we will be able to conduct the Games," Sanghavi said.

"As part of our urban development plan, we are further developing our sports infrastructure, and that work will be completed by the end of 2028 or early 2029."

According to him, the investment will have long-term benefits beyond the Games.

"These stadiums will be utilised for training young athletes and for the development of sports science. The hostels built for the Games will later become facilities for students."

Sanghavi added that Ahmedabad already has sufficient hotel capacity and a well-connected public transport network.

"The hotel capacity is sufficient and it has been built on a sustainable model. Even today we can conduct the Commonwealth Games successfully if we want," he said.

"As far as transportation is concerned, all BRT routes are connected to the stadiums and we also have metro connectivity." He said both the Centre and the Gujarat government are fully committed to the project while private participation would also be encouraged.

"We will join hands with the private sector as well, but the Central government and the Gujarat government have assured full support for the Games."

On the possibility of cricket featuring in the 2030 edition, Sanghavi said discussions with Commonwealth Sport are continuing.

"We would like cricket to be part of the 2030 Commonwealth Games, but the final decision rests with Commonwealth Sport and we are in continuous dialogue," he said.

Commonwealth Sport CEO Katie Sadler added: "We are also working with our colleagues in India regarding the optional and additional sports programme." (PTI)
